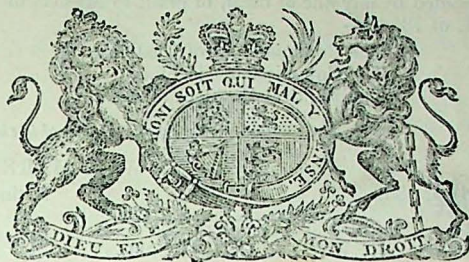

3. <i>Vid voce</i> and extemporaneous translation into English, and parsing, out of a tale, or anecdote, or dialogue in the Indian language,—maximum number of marks, 60.		
4. <i>Vid voce</i> and extemporaneous translation into the Indian language out of a tale, or anecdote, or dialogue in English,—maximum number of marks, 60.		The characters required to be known at this Examination are the printed Nusk, and written Taleek and Nagri characters; and the Test-Books are :— Bagho Bahar, Ukhlakee Hindoe, Goole Bukavull-e, and a compilation of extracts from different Works, which is to be published hereafter. The first exercise to be written both in the Persian, Arabic, and Nagri characters.
5. <i>Vid voce</i> and extemporaneous translation into English of a letter or petition in the Indian language in business hand, lithographed and written,—maximum number of marks, 50.		
6. <i>Vid voce</i> and extemporaneous translation into the Indian language of the proceedings of a Court Martial, or other Court of Criminal Justice, General Order, or Civil or Military Regulation,—maximum number of marks, 50.		
7. Conversation in the Indian language,—maximum number of marks, 55.		
8. <i>Vid voce</i> and extemporaneous translation of a few idiomatic sentences, both into English from the Indian language, and into the Indian language from English,—maximum number of marks, 50.		
9. Pronunciation, as tested throughout the Examination,—maximum number of marks, 50.		
10. Handwriting, as tested in the written exercises,—maximum number of marks, 25.		
MURATHEE. —The ten points described above		
GUZERATHEE. —The ten points described above		
CANARESE. —The ten points described above		
PERSIAN. —The ten points described above		

Errors shall be divided into three classes, viz. errors in *meaning*, errors in *syntax*, and errors in *spelling*.

In each class two species or kinds shall be distinguished under the heads of *major* and *minor*, one of the former being reckoned equal to two of the latter.

A major error in meaning shall be counted as five units of value; a major error in grammar as three; and a major error in spelling as two.

The errors of each Translation shall be distinctly marked on the face of it.

The sum of errors, reckoned as above directed, shall be deducted from the full value, and the remainder assigned as the value of the Exercise.

In the *viol voce* Exercises each Examiner shall give a mark representing, according to his judgment, the degree of the proficiency exhibited by the Examinee under the several heads; and the average of such marks shall be assigned as the value of the Exercise.

No Candidate shall be considered entitled to a Certificate of having passed the ordinary Test who shall have obtained less than 60 per cent. of the aggregate value of full marks, or who shall have obtained in respect of any particular Exercise less than 20 per cent. of the marks assigned to it.

Candidates obtaining 75 per cent. shall be entitled to a Certificate of "Passed with Credit," and 90 per cent. of "Passed with high Proficiency."

Every Examinee, whether successful or unsuccessful, shall be allowed to see the general result of the judgment formed respecting him, and the grounds of that judgment, so far as they appear on his own Exercises.

Hours of Posting.—BANGHY PARCELS will, from and after the 1st February 1859, be received every day, Sundays excepted, for despatch, from 10 A. M. till 5 P. M., and LETTERS and NEWSPAPERS every day till 6 P. M., after which hours respectively Late Letters, Newspapers, or Parcels will be received till 7 P. M., on payment of an extra postage (or fee) of 8 annas on each cover. The full postage, and likewise the fee, must be prepaid in Stamps. REGISTERED LETTERS can be posted as heretofore, but the Prepayment of Postage is no longer optional. The Postage, as well as the Registration Fee of 4 annas, must be Prepaid in Stamps.

Malta and Gibraltar.—Letters for MALTA and GIBRALTAR may be prepaid or not, at the option of the sender.

Cairo.—Letters for Cairo must be PREPAID, but cannot be Registered.

Constantinople.—Letters for CONSTANTINOPLE cannot be Registered.

Ionian Islands.—Letters for the IONIAN ISLANDS must be prepaid to Alexandria, whence they will be forwarded *viâ* Trieste. Postage Eight Annas on a letter not exceeding half an ounce.

Banghy Parcels for Scinde and the Punjab.—Notice is hereby given, that all Banghy Parcels for Scinde and the Punjab, intended to be sent by Sea *viâ* Kurrachee, must be so marked, that is "Per Steamer," or else they will be subject to be sent by land, and to be charged with Banghy rates of Postage.

Holders of Window Delivery Tickets.—The Holders of Window Delivery Tickets are reminded that their Overland Letters, if not sent for before the Second Delivery, will be sent out by that Delivery instead of being kept in the Post Office for an indefinite period.

Newspapers.—Newspapers RE-DIRECTED are chargeable with FORWARD POSTAGE.

Securing Letters with Sealing Wax.—The Public are urgently recommended to close all letters, containing Remittances, Cheques, Bank Notes, or valuable Documents, with *Sealing Wax*. Bank Notes ought always to be divided, one half being sent after the receipt of the other half has been acknowledged.

Letters closed with gum, or the ordinary wafer, can be opened without any difficulty, or the slightest chance of detection.

Compulsory Prepayment of Letters to the United Kingdom.—From the 1st of September next the present system of *optional* Prepayment of Letters sent from India to the United Kingdom will be abolished, and from that date the Prepayment of Postage on Letters posted in any part of India for the United Kingdom, whether marked *viâ* Southampton or *viâ* Marseilles, will be *compulsory*. The Rates of Postage are as under:—

All Letters posted on or after the 1st of September upon which at least a single rate of Postage—that is to say, 4 Annas on a Southampton Letter, and 6 Annas on a Marseilles Letter—has not been paid, will be returned to the senders. But in order to obviate the inconvenience which would be caused to the public by detaining and returning to the senders Letters which, *through inadvertence*, may be posted without the full amount of Postage being paid upon them, Letters insufficiently prepaid, but on which at least a single rate of Postage has been paid, will be forwarded, charged with the deficiency of Postage and a fine of Sixpence, or four Annas.

Prepayment must be made, as now, by Stamps.
