NOTICE TO MARINERS ENTER-ING THE PORT OF AKYAB.

A Flagstaff having been erected on Faqueer or Mosque Point, in lat. 20° 7' N. long. 92° 56' E., it is recommended for Vessels making the Port on the Bolongo bearing East, and the Great Savage Light House N. by E., when they will be about one mile from the South end of the bar in 61 fathoms. From this position the Flagstaff will be distinctly seen bearing N. \(\frac{1}{2}\) E., they must steer direct for it, crossing the bar in 3\(\frac{1}{2}\) to 4 fathoms till the light on the Savage bears S, E. by S. & S., which will put them inside the passage Rock, bearing from the Savage Light House N. W. 1 N, about 4 of a mile; they should then steer N. E., or more Easterly according to the state of the tide, to enable them to clear a red buoy, which is placed in 10 fathoms at the South end of the Faqueer's Roef.

After clearing it they can haul up for the inner Flagstaff, and anchor abreast of it in 3 to 3½ fathoms 'at low water inside of a black buoy, which is on the south end of an extensive flat projecting from Flat Island in 21 fathoms low water spring tides. The abovementioned Flagstaff is visible from the deck of a vessel about 12 miles.

The Gram is to be of unexceptionable quality, of the description usually furnished to mounted Corps, and to be delivered free of all expense to Government, beyond the stipulated price, at the Commissariat Store Room in the Fort and at the Horse Lines. In case of disputes as to the quality of Gram tendered, a Committee of Officers will decide the point; when, if the Gram be rejected, the required quantity will be purchased, wherever procurable, at the risk and loss of the Centractor, who will be liable to a fine of Rupees (50) fifty, or (30) thirty per cent. on the amount of the expenses so incurred, at the option of the Executive Commissariat Officer.

A supply of not less than one month's consumption during the fair season, and of two months' during the Monsoon, to be kept in the Commissariat Store in the Fort, whenever required by the Executive Commissariat Officer.

To prevent dispute hereafter it is to be distinctly understood, that the Provisions of this Contract are only intended to demands made at this Station; but in the event of either of the Batteries or any detail thereof moving, it will be optional with the Commissariat Officer to take one month's or any number of days' Gram for their use on the march, and the Contractor will not be liable to any greater demand.

No person will be allowed to tender for the Contract unless he previously deposits in this office the sum of Company's Rupees (620) six hundred and twenty in cash, which sum will be forfeited in the event of delay, evasion, or refusal to execute the

POST OFFICE NOTICES.

The following Rules approved of by Governent respecting the Posting of Palkee Bearers re published for the information of the Public, nd for the guidance of the several Post Masters .nder this Presidency:

Travellers may be furnished with Dawk Bearers on application at the different Post Offices, where they will obtain all the requisite information as to the estimated distances between known Stations, to which only Dawk Bearers can be laid by any Post Master.

II. A set of Dawk Bearers comprizes twelve, and one Mussalchee, for which is charged, payable in advance, at the rate of eight annas per Mile; but as in many instances, owing to the delay caused by Travellers remaining longer on the road than the stipulated time, this sum is found unequal to the expense, a further sum of four annas per Mile is required to be paid as a deposit to cover any eventual expense or demurrage caused by delay on the part of the Traveller. Should none occur, the full amount of the sum deposited is refunded, upon the Traveller furnishing a certificate from the Deputy Post Master at the place where his journey finished, that he arrived there without having incurred demurrage. It is the duty of the Deputy Post Masters to furnish Travellers with certificates specifying according to circumstances whether or otherwise they have come on demurrage;such certificate however, it must be understood, is only applicable to the Deputy Post Master's Division who grants it, for it sometimes happens that a Traveller having incurred demurrage on part of the road, by travelling subsequently during those hours originally appointed for halting, reaches the last Division within the given time.

N. B. It is to be particularly observed, that in some Districts, Bearers are with difficulty procured, and where they have to be sent a considerable distance to take up the Traveller, and in like manner to return home, for time so occupied they are paid additionally, and in all such cases Post Masters are authorized to charge the actual cost for the Traveller's Bearers.

III. When it is report-When Demurrage ed that a Traveller comes is incurred adjuston demurrage on any part of the road, the adjust-ment of the amount depoment of expenses deferred. sited to cover such expenses will be postponed until the receipt of the Bills for the Dak from all the Post Masters through whose Divisions the Tra-

veller may have passed.

IV. Travellers, whether proceeding from the Presidency or from Outstations, are provided with a Form, in which they are requested particularly to

note any cause of dissatisfaction they may meet with on their journey, and the places where they meet with obstructions or irregularities on the part of the Bearers or subordinate Post Office Servants; this Form being allixed to the certificate which the Traveller has to present for signature, secures its being noticed.

When Bearers are withdrawn from their Posts by directions of the Traveller, adjustment of account how deferred.

V. When a Dak has been ordered and circumstances may render it ex-pedient for the Traveller to postpone his journey, or to withdraw the Bearers entirely, he will of course

be held liable for any expense which may have been incurred on his account. The amount paid for the Dak, and the amount deposited to cover demurrage, will therefore remain unadjusted until reports are received from the General Post Master on the line of route upon which the Dak was ordered.

VI. Travellers' Bug-Weight of Travelgage must not exceed for lers' Banghies limited Banghy each Burdar, twenty-four seers, and this must be divided into two Parcels, or Pattarahs, of such dimensions as to render them conveniently portable when slung as Bunghies.

Terms upon which Traveller avails himself of the Post Office to lay Daks.

VII. It is to be generally understood, that although Government permits their servants to lay Dak Bearers for the con-

venience of the Public, the State derives no benefit from this source, and that neither Government nor any of their Officers are in any degree responsible to the Traveller for the misfortunes and disappointments which are inseparable from Dak travelling; thus every Traveller travels at his own risk, and is liable to the losses and increased expenses incidental to delays and accidents, and that Government can in no instance be considered liable to make good any losses whatever.

Post Master General will investigate complaints.

VIII. When irregularities and consequent inconvenience occur to Travellers, the Post Master

General on being applied to, will immediately investigate the complaint brought to his notice; but this can only be done in the same manner, and to the same end, as a superior in any other Department would interfere to enquire into complaints preferred against his subordinates.

In case of surcharge or unjust charges, Post Master General will investigate with a view to a refund.

IX. In case of surcharge alone, or charges which to the Parties complaining might appear unjust because arising out of some positive neglect or error

on the part of the Deputy Post Master who lays the Dak, it would be the duty of the Post Master General to investigate the matter with a view to afford pecuniary redress.

Penalty for refusing payments on account of Dak Bearers.

X. In every case of re-fusal to make good demands on account of laying Dâk Bearers, Post Mas-

ters are authorized to detain all Letters, Parcels, &c. for the person from whom demands are due in the same manner as they are authorized to act under Clause IX of the General Rules.

India Company, that on and after the first June next, persons in this country may forward private correspondence by the Government Express from Bombay to Calcutta, and Madras; all persons desirous of availing themselves of this privilege will be required to mark apon the covers of their letters the words "by Express from Bombay," and in addition to this special address it will not be necessary that all letters intended to be forwarded by the way of Southampton should be so endorsed as hitherto.

The postage to be charged in India on the delivery of letters sent by this Express, will be, in addition to the ordinary inland rates,

One rupee for every letter not exceeding half a tola in weight.

Two rupees for every letter above half a tola, but not exceeding one tola in weight.

Four rupees for every letter above one tola, but not exceeding two tolas in weight, two tolas being the maximum weight of letters to be conveyed by Express.

On Newspapers,—Each newspaper office in Calcutta and Madras will be allowed to receive two newspapers at the ordinary rates of Inland postage; on all other newspapers forwarded by Express, a postage of five Rupees each will be charged, and no newspaper will be received for the Express exceeding three tolas in weight.

N. B.—One tola and a quarter is nearly equivalent to half an ounce avoirdupois.
