BOMBAY TO WIT.—By virtue of a Precept to me directed, I hereby proclaim and give notice, that the Session of Oyer and Terminer, and General Gaol Delivery, will be holden before

the Supreme Court of Judicature at Bombay, at the Court House, on Thursday, the 5th day of July next, at eleven o'clock in the forencon, for the trial of all Treasons, Murders, and other Felonies, Perjuries, Trespasses, and other Crimes and Misdemeanors, had, done, or committed within the Town and Island of Bombay, and the Limits thereof, and the Factories subordinate thereto; and also to enquire, hear, and determine, in like manner, all Treasons, Murders, Felonies, Forgeries, Perjuries, Crimes, Extortions, Misdemeanors, Trespasses, Wrongs, Oppressions, had, done, or committed by any of Her Majesty's British Subjects in any of the Territories which now are subject to, or dependent upon the said Government of Bombay, or within any of the Dominions of the Native Princes of India in alliance with the said Govern-

And also, that at the same time and place will be holden a Session of Admiralty, for the trial of all Treasons, Murders, Piracies, Robberies, Trespasses, Misdemeanors, and other Crimes and Offences, had, done, perpetrated, or committed on the High Seas.

And I hereby give notice to all persons bound to prosecute, and give evidence at the above Sessions, or in any way concerned therein, that they are to attend at the time and place above-mentioned, and not to depart without leave of the

And I hereby give notice to all Justices of the Peace, Coroners, Escheators, and also all Chief Constables and Bailiffs of the Town and Island of

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 19th of May 1849 :-

ACT No. - or 1849.

An Act for licensing Pawnbrokers in the Settlement of Prince of Wales' Island, Singapore, and Malacca.

Whereas it is expedient to make better provision for the holding of Shops for receiving Goods on Pawn in the Settlements of Prince of Wales' Island, Singapore, and Malacca, It is enacted as follows :

- I. The exclusive right of holding Shops for receiving Goods on Pawn in the Settlements of Prince of Wales' Island, Singapore, and Malacca, shall be vested, from time to time, in such persons as the Governor or other Chief Civil Authority of the said Settlement, or a public Officer by him thereto authorised, may license for that purpose, on such conditions as may be determined, either by public or private sale of such exclusive right; and the person in whom such exclusive right shall be vested shall be called the " Pawn Farmer."
- II. Every keeper of a Shop for the receipt of goods on Pawn shall take out a License for the same from the Superintendent of Police of the Station or place at which such Pawn Shop shall be situated, for the grant and registration of which a fee of () Dollars shall be paid to the Superintendent of Police; and every such License may be annulled, whenever the Superintendent of Police shall think fit.
- III. The number and situation of Houses to be appointed as licensed Pawn Shops in the said Settleappointed as necessed Fawn shops in the said Settlement shall be determined by the Governor or other Chief Civil Authority of the said Settlement, or by such public Officer or Officers as he may thereto authorise, and such Shops shall be subject to such rules and penalties as the said Governor, or other Chief Civil Authority shall, from time to time, make in that
- No person other than the Pawn Farmer or the keepers of licensed Pawn Shops hereinafter mentioned shall exercise the trade of a Pannbroker within the said Settlement; and every person other than the Pann Farmer, or the keepers of such licensed Pann Shops who shall take in pledge, or keep in deposit any goods or chattels as security for the loan of any sum of money under One Hundred and Fifty Dolards and Fifty Dolards. lars, shall forfeit for each offence a penalty not exceeding Fifty Dollars.
- V. Every keeper of a licensed Pawn Shop who shall take any goods or chattels on Pawn, from any person, between the hour of seven at night and day-light on the following morning, shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding Fifty Dollars.
- Every Pawn Farmer or keeper of a licensed Pawn Shop, who shall knowingly take from any Eu-ropean or Native Soldier any article whatsoever, as a Pawn, Pledge, or Security for any sum of money lent

or advanced to such Soldier, or who shall knowingly buy from any European or Native Soldier any article whatsoever, without an authority in writing in each case from the Commanding Officer of such Soldier, shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding Fifty Dollars.

Every Pawn Farmer or keeper of a licensed Pawn Shop, who shall take from any Child, under the age of fourteen years, any article whatsoever, as a Pawn, Pledge, or Security, for any sum of money lent or advanced to such Child, or who shall buy from such Child any article whatsoever, shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding Fifty Dollars.

The Pawn Farmer and all keepers of licensed VIII. Pawn Shops are required to report to the Superintenent of Police of the Station or place in which they severally reside, all cases in which any person offering any article to be pawned is suspected of having unlawfully obtained possession thereof; and the said Pawn Farmer and keepers of licensed Pawn Shops shall keep proper Registers in writing, specifying the nature and value of every article pawned, the name and dwelling place of the person pawning the same, the date and the hour of the day in which the same was offered and taken in pawn, the amount lent, and the time within which the same is to be repaid; and shall give a duplicate of the entry in such Registers to the person pawning the article respecting which the entry is made, and in default thereof shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding Fifty Dollars.

IX. All such Registers shall be produced for in-spection by the said Pawn Farmer or keepers of such licensed Pawn Shops whenever they shall be thereto required by any Justice of the Peace, Superintendent of Police, or any Peace Officer; and any Pawn Farmer or keeper of a licensed Pawn Shop failing to keep and produce his Registers when so required, shall forfeit his exclusive right or License, and also forfeit a

penalty not exceeding Fifty Dollars.

X. All perishable goods remaining in the hands of the Pawn Farmer, or any keeper of a licensed Pawn Shop, unredeemed for a period of Four Months from the date on which the same have been pawned, shall be deemed to be forfeited; and all other goods shall be deemed to be forfeited at the end of One Year from such date, when the said Pawn Farmer, or the keeper of such licensed Pawn Shop may sell the same by public auction, (after due notice thereof given in writing to the Superintendent of Police, and by beat of gong to the public, two days before the day of sale,) and any excess which may arise by such sale beyond the amount of the debt due to such Pawn Farmer or such licensed keeper by the person who pawned such goods, shall be paid to such person on demand; and should the amount arising by such sale fall short of the amount of such debt, such loss shall be borne by such Pawn Farmer, or such licensed keeper.

Every Pawn Farmer, or keeper of a licensed Pawn Shop, who shall knowingly sell any goods before the time herein limited in that behalf, or otherwise than herein provided, or who shall knowingly give any false account of the produce of any such sale to the person entitled to any such excess, or who shall neglect or refuse to pay such excess to the person thereunto entitled, shall be deemed to have embezzled such goods, and shall be liable to be punished accordingly.

XII. The rate of interest which the Pawn Farmer, or any keeper of a licensed Pawn Shop may charge and take, shall be declared by the Governor or other Chief Civil Authority of the said Settlement; and a list of such rates written in the English, Malayan, Bugis, Chinese, and Tamul Languages and Characters, shall be hung up in some conspicuous part of the Shop of such Pawn Farmer, or licensed keeper; and every Pawn Farmer, or keeper of a licensed Pawn Shop who shall charge or take from any person any higher rate of interest than such as shall have been declared in manner above-mentioned, or who shall fail to have

and keep hung up in his Shop such list, shall forfeit a

penalty not exceeding Fifty Dollars.

XIII. All penalties under this Act may be imposed on conviction of the offence by confession of the offender, or by the oath of one or more witnesses before two Justices of the Peace, and in case of non-payment of any pecuniary penalty forfeited under this Act, the convicting Justices may issue a Warrant under their hands, directed to any Peace Officer to levy the amount of such penalty by seizure and sale of any goods of the offender which may be found within the jurisdiction of such Justices; and it no such property shall be found, any Justice of the Peace, by Warrant, under his hand, may commit the offender either to the House of Correction or to Her Majesty's Gaol at the Station where the conviction is had, for any period not exceeding Four Months.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India, after the 19th day of August next.

The following Act is passed by the Hon'ble the President of the Council of India in Council on the 26th May 1849, with the assent of the Right Hon'ble the Governor General of India, which has been read and recorded:—

Ordered, that the Act be promulgated for general information.

. ACT NO. X. OF 1849.

An Act for appointing a Commissioner of Revenue at Madras.

Whereas it is expedient that the Governor of Fort St. George in Council should be empowered to depute a Member of the Board of Revenue, to perform in any of the Districts of that Presidency all or any of the duties which, by the General Regulations and Laws of the Presidency, belong to the Board of Revenue collectively, It is enacted as follows:—

I. The Governor of Fort St. George in Council may, from time to time, whenever he shall see fit, depute a Member of the Board of Revenue to perform alone, in any of the Districts of that Presidency, all or any of the duties which, by the General Regulations and Laws of the Presidency, belong to the Board of Revenue collectively.

II. When a special Commission shall be given to a Member of the Board of Revenue under this Act, the Member of the Board named therein shall by virtue thereof be empowered to exercise, within the limits of his Commission, all the powers and duties which by law are vested in the Board of Revenue collectively, without exception, or subject to any exceptions or restrictions, which shall be prescribed in such Commission; and all Regulations and Acts concerning the Board of Revenue shall be deemed to apply to the said Commissioner within the limits of his Commission, and with regard to all things concerning the Revenues of the District included in it, so far as is necessary to give full effect to his Commission and to this Act.

III. Every such Commission shall be published in the Fort St. George Gazette, and the Commissioner shall enter on his Office from the date of such publication; and in like manner the revocation or other determination of any such Commission shall be published in the Fort St. George Gazette.

IV. The correspondence and other documents belonging to any such Commission shall be deposited, on the determination thereof, in the Office of the Board of Revenue, and shall be deemed Records of the said Board.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 19th of May 1849:—

ACT No. - of 1819.

An Act for Consolidating the Laws for Collecting a Revenue of Excise on Spirituous Liquors and Intoxicating Drugs in the Settlement of Prince of Wales' Island, Singapore, and Malacca.

Whereas it is expedient to make better provision for the collection of a Revenue of Excise upon Opium, Chandoo, Seree, Toddy, and Bang, Arrack and Spirits, and the granting of Excise Licenses for the sale of the said Articles by retail within the Settlement of Prince of Wales' Island, Singapore, and Malacca, It is enacted as follows:—

- I. Regulations II., III., IV., V., and VII. of 1830, passed by the Governor of Prince of Wales' Island, Singapore, and Malacca in Council, Regulation IV. of 1831, and Act No. V. of 1839, passed by the President of the Council of India in Council, and Regulations X. and XI. of 1833, passed by the Governor General of India in Council, are repealed.
- II. The exclusive right of making Chandoo or other perparation of Opium for smoking, and of retailing Chandoo or Opium in smaller quantities than one chest; and the exclusive right of retailing Spirituous Liquors and Arrack in less quantities than One Hundred and Sixty Gallons, and of making and distilling Arrack and Spirituous Liquors; and the exclusive right of selling Toddy and Bang within the Settlement of Prince of Wales' Island, Singapore, and Malacca; and the exclusive right of selling Seree or Betel-leaf within the respective Towns of George Town, Singapore, and Malacca, in the said Settlement, shall be vested, from time to time, in such persons as the Governor, or other Chief Civil Authority of the said Settlement, or such public Officer by him thereto authorised may license for that purpose, on such conditions as may be determined either by public or private sale of such exclusive rights.
- III. The person in whom the exclusive right of making Chandoo or other perparation of Opium for smoking, and of retailing Opium in smaller quantities than one chest, shall be vested, shall be called the "Opium Farmer;" and the person in whom the exclusive right of retailing Spirituous Liquors and Arrack in less quantities than One Hundred and Sixty Gallons, and of making and distilling Arrack and Spirituous Liquors shall be vested, shall be called the "Spirit Farmer;" and the person in whom the exclusive right of selling Toddy and Bang shall be vested, shall be called the "Toddy Farmer;" and the person in whom the exclusive right of selling Seree or Betel-leaf shall be vested, shall be called the "Seree Farmer."
- IV. The number of Houses or Shops to be severally licensed under this Act for the retailing or smoking of Chandoo or prepared Opium, and for the retail

of Seree or Betel-leaf, and for retailing Spirituous Liquors, Arrack and Wines, and for the retail of Toddy or Bang, within the said Settlement and places, shall be determined, from time to time, by the Governor or other Chief Civil Authority of the said Settlement, or by such public Officer or Officers as he may authorise for that purpose; and the said Houses or Shops shall, as regards their situation and hours for opening and closing, be subject to such Rules and penalties as the said Governor or other Chief Civil Authority shall, from time to time, make in that behalf.

V. The Superintendent of Police at each of the Stations of Prince of Wales' Island, Singapore, and Malacca shall grant to the keeper of every such House or Shop a license, which shall contain the name of the keeper or keepers, and the situation of the House or Shop, and shall be registered in the Police Office of the Station in which the same shall be granted; for which grant and registration the following Fees shall be paid, that is to say, For an Opium House, Three Dollars; for a Seree or Betel-leaf Shop, Three Dollars; for a Tavern, Five Dollars; for an Esting House or Spirit Shop, Three Dollars; for a Toddy Shop, Two Dollars: and every such License may be recalled and cancelled by the Superintendent of Police as occasion shall appear to him to require: and every person who shall open or keep such House or Shop, without having first obtained and registered such License, shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding Fifty Dollars.

VI. Every Farmer under this Act, and every keeper of any House or Shop licensed under this Act, who shall sell or exchange Opium, prepared or unprepared, Seree or Betel-leaf, Wine, Spirituous Liquor or Arrack, Toddy or Bang, otherwise than for the Coin usually current within the said Settlement, shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding Twenty-five Dollars.

VII. Every person within the said Settlement, who shall deliver to any servant or labourer any Opium prepared or unprepared, Seree or Betel-leaf, Wine, Spirituous Liquor or Arrack, Toddy or Bang, in consideration of wages or hire due to such servant or labourer, shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding Fifty Dollars.

VIII. Every keeper of any House or Shop licensed under this Act, who shall allow any person to gamble therein, or in whose House any person shall be found gambling, shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding Twenty-five Dollars.

IX. Every keeper of any House or Shop licensed under this Act, who shall knowingly allow any person to enter therein, with any kind of Weapon or edged or pointed Tool upon his person, shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding Fifty Dollars.

X. Every person, other than the Opium Farmer, who shall make Chandoo or any other preparation of Opium for smoking within the said Settlement, or who shall import thereto any Chandoo or Opium prepared

thereto any Chandoo or Opium prepared elsewhere for smoking, or who shall sell or offer for sale or purchase, or who shall knowingly have or receive into his or her possession any such Chandoo or other preparation of Opium for smoking, shall forfeit, for the first offence, a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Dollars; for the second offence, shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding Two Hundred Dollars; and for every subsequent offence, forfeit a penalty not exceeding Four Hundred Dollars; and all such contraband Chandoo or other preparation of Opium, and the receptacles in which the same is contained, and all vessels and utensils, which have been, or are plainly intended to be used in making Chandoo or any other preparation of Opium, shall be seized and forfeited.

XI. Every person, other than the Opium Farmer, who shall sell or offer for sale, and also every person who shall buy from any person other than the Opium Farmer, any quantity of raw Opium less than one chest,

save for exportation, shall forfeit, for the first offen ce, a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Dollars; for the second offence, forfeit a penalty not exceeding Two Hundred Dollars; and for every subsequent offence, forfeit a penalty not exceeding Four Hundred Dollars; and all such raw Opium shall be seized and forfeited.

XII. Every person, who shall import into the said Settlement any raw Opium in less quantity than one chest, or have in his possession, custody, or control, any raw Opium in less quantity than one chest, unless for the purpose of being exported, shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding Two Hundred Dollars; and all such raw Opium so imported or found, shall be seized and forfeited.

XIII. Every person, other than the Opium Farmer, who shall export any Opium by land from the said Settlement, shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding Four Hundred Dollars; and the Opium, and vessels and conveyances in which it is contained, shall be seized and forfeited.

XIV. Every person who shall be desirous of exporting by Sea, or of selling for exportation by Sea, raw Opium, in any quantity less than one chest, shall deposit a chest containing the custom ry quantity in the Office of the Registrar of Imports and Exports; and whenever such person shall apply for any portion of such Opium to be delivered to him or to any purchaser thereof for exportation, he shall deliver to the Registrar of Imports and Exports, or his Deputy, a written Bill of Entry, in duplicate, expressing the quantity of Opium that is to be exported, and the name of the person who is about to export the same, and of the vessel, and of the master, and of the place to which the same is to be exported, and having also, in case the Opium mentioned therein is to be sold for exportation, the name of the purchaser written on the back thereof; and the said Registrar or his Deputy shall thereupon cause the quantity of Opium specified in the Bill of Entry to be taken out of such chest, and delivered to the person who is to export the same, and shall deliver to such person one of the copies of such Bill of Entry, signed by the said Registrer or his Deputy, and having the hour upon which the same shall be so delivered marked thereon; and the Bill of Entry so signed shall be the Exporter's Permit to export the said Opium; and such chest shall remain in the custody of the said Registrar or his Deputy, until all the Opium contained therein shall have been exported or sold, when the chest shall be destroyed; and every person who shall commit a breach of any of the provisions contained in this Section, shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Dollars.

XV. Every person who shall receive any such Permit as aforesaid, for the exportation by Sea of any quantity of Opium less than one chest, and who shall not, upon receiving the same, forthwith cause such Opium to be conveyed to and placed on board of the vessel mentioned in such Permit, shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding Fifty Dollars, and the Opium, and the vessels and conveyances in which it is contained, shall be seized and forfeited.

XVI. Every person, not thereunto authorised under this Act, who shall make Chandoo or other preparation of Opium for smoking on board of any vessel anchored or being within the limits of the territorial jurisdiction of the Court of Judicature of the said Settlement, or in whose possession any such Chandoo or prepared Opium shall be found on board of such vessel, shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Dollars, and all such Chandoo or prepared Opium so made or found, shall be seized and forfeited.

XVII. Every person who shall sell or buy on board of any vessel anchored or being within the limits of the jurisdiction aforesaid, any raw Opium in a less quantity than one chest, shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Dollars: and all such raw

Opium so sold or bought, shall be seized and for-feited.

XVIII. Any Justice of the Peace within the said Settlement, upon the information upon oath of any person that he has good cause to believe that there is, on board of any vessel anchored or being within the limits of the jurisdiction aforesaid, any contraband Opium, or Chandoo, or raw Opium, may issue his Warrant, authorising the Opium Farmer, or any Revenue Officer duly appointed under this Act, or any Peace Officer, to go on board of such vessel, and to make search for, and to seize such Opium or Chandoo, and to bring the offender or offenders before a Justice of the Peace, to be dealt with according to this Act.

XIX. Every person, other than the Opium FarTye-Chandoo or Opium-Dross.

Shall, for the first offence, forfeit a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Dollars; for the second offence, shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding Two Hundred Dollars; and for every subsequent offence, shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding Four Hundred Dollars.

XX. No Seree or Betel-leaf shall be used or consumed by any person within the li-Seree or Betelmits of the Towns of George Town, Singapore, and Malacca respectively, unless the same shall have been bought from the Seree Farmer, and every person, other than the Seree Farmer, who shall retail Seree or Betel-leaf within the limits of the said Towns respectively, or who shall have in his possession within the limits of the said Towns respectively, any Scree or Betel-leaf, unless the same shall be duly proved to have been bought from the Seree Farmer, or unless the same shall be on its way from the place of growth or importation to the house of the Seree Farmer, under such Permit as is hereinafter specified, shall forfeit, for the first offence, a penalty not exceeding Fifty Dollars; for the second offence, shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Dollars; and for every subsequent offence, shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding Two Hundred Dollars: and all such contraband Seree or Betel-leaf shall be seized and forfeited.

XXI. No Proprietor, Renter, or Holder of any Estate or Plantation, which produces Seree or Betelleaf, shall sell any such Seree or Betelleaf, within the limits of the said Towns respectively, to any person other than the Seree Farmer; and any such Proprietor, Renter, or Holder of any such Estate or Plantation, who shall, within the limits of the said Towns, sell any such Seree or Betelleaf to any person other than the Seree Farmer, shall forfeit, for the first effence, a penalty not exceeding Fifty Dollars; for the second offence, shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Dollars; and for every subsequent offence shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding Two Hundred Dollars.

NXII. The Serce Farmer shall pay, to the growers or Importers of all Serce or Betel-leaf grown in the said Settlement, or imported into the limits of the said Towns respectively, and tendered to him, the price thereof, at a rate to be, from time to time, declared by the said Governor, or other Chief Civil Authority, or such public Officer or Officers as he shall thereto authorise, which rate shall be notified to the Serce Farmer; and if the Serce Farmer shall refuse to buy at that price any such Serce or Betel-leaf tendered to him, he shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding Fifty Dollars.

XXIII. The said Governor, or other Chief Civil Authority, or such public Officer or Officers as he shall, from time to time, thereto authorise, shall, from time to time, declare the rate at which the Seree Farmer shall sell and retail Seree or Betel-leaf within the limits of the Towns aforesaid; and if the Seree Farmer shall ask or take from any person more than the rate

so declared, he shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding Fifty Dollars.

XXIV. All Importers of Seree or Betel-leaf into the said Settlement, shall give notice thereof to the Seree Farmer, stating the quantity required to be landed, and the Seree Farmer shall forthwith grant a Permit for the landing the same, specifying the place whereat the same shall be landed, and every Seree Farmer who shall refuse between the hours of six in the morning and six in the evening to give such Permit, and also every person who shall land any such Seree or Betel-leaf without having first given such notice and obtained such Permit, or who shall land such Seree or Betel-leaf at any place other than the place specified in such Permit, shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding Fifty Dollars.

XXV. Every person, other than the Spirit Farmer, who shall import into the said Spirituous Liquors and Arrack. Settlement any Spirituous Liquor or Arrack, shall, before landing such Spirituous Liquor or Arrack, or any part thereof, deliver to the Spirit Farmer a Bill, in which shall be specified the name of the vess I, the quantity and kind of the Liquor, and the place where the same is intended to be stored; and, if such Liquor is intended to be used or consumed in the House of the Importer, he shall, at the same time, pay or secure to the Spirit Farmer, the sum of Fifty Cents for every gallon of such Liquor, or if in bottles, the sum of Fifty Cents for every four quart bottles, and a proportionate rate for any quantity less than one gallon, or less than four quart bottles, so to be landed; and the Spirit Farmer shall thereupon in either case, if the application is made between the hours of six in the morning and six in the evening, deliver to such person a written Permit to land the same; and every person who shall land any such Liquor without having first delivered such Bill, and paid or tendered such sum when payable, and also every Spirit Farmer, who shall refuse to give such Permit without good cause shewn, shall, for every such offence, forfeit a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Dollars; and all such Liquor landed contrary to the provisions of this Section, and the vessels and conveyances in which the same is contained, shall be siezed and forfeited.

XXVI. Every person other than the Spirit Farmer, or a person duly licensed as hereinafter mentioned, who shall sell within the Settlement of Prince of Wales' Island. Singapore, and Malacca, otherwise than for exportation, any Spirituous Liquor or Arrack in a less quantity than One Hundred and Sixty Imperial Gallons, or, if sold in bottles, in a less quantity than fifty dozens of quart bottles, or any Wine in a less quantity than three Gallons, or one dozen of quart bottles, without first tendering and paying to the Spirit Farmer a sum of Fifty Cents for every Gallon, or for every four quant bottles of such Wine, Spirituous Liquor or Arrack, and a proportionate rate for any quantity less than one Gallon, or less than four quart bottles, shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Dollars: and all such Wine, Spirituous Liquor or Arrack, and the vessels in which the same is contained, shall be seized and forfeited.

XXVII. Every person other than the Spirit Farmer, who shall remove or cause to be removed any Wine, Spirituous Liquor or Arrack from one House, Shop, Godown or other Building to another, or from the possession of one person to that of another, without having first obtained from the Spirit Farmer a written Permit, hereinafter described, to remove the same, shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding Fifty Dollars; and all such Wine, Spirituous Liquor or Arrack so removed, and the vessels in which the same is contained, shall be seized and forfeited.

XXVIII. The Spirit Farmer shall, on the application of any person, (if made between the hours of six in the morning and six in the evening,) grant a written

Permit for the removal of any Wine, Spirituous Liquor or Arrack (provided the same be not sold contrary to the provisions of this Act.) which Permit shall describe the quantity and kind of Wine or Liquor required to be removed, and the name of the person about to remove the same, and the places from and to which the same is to be removed, and the time during which such Permit is in force; and every Spirit Farmer who shall, without good cause shewn, refuse to grant such Permit, shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Dollars.

XXIX. Every person other than the Spirit Farmer or a Distiller of Spirits, duly licensed under this Act, having in his House, Store, Godown or possession, any Spirituous Liquor or Arrack, who shall broad a cask of such Liquor for the purpose of drawing off any quantity thereof, without having first given notice to the Spirit Farmer of his intention so to do, and also every person who shall omit to report to the Spirit Farmer any leakage from and out of any cask of Spiritus Liquor or Arrack in his House, Store, Godown or possession, shall, for every such offence, forfeit a penalty not exceeding Twenty-five Dollars.

XXX. The Spirit Farmer may enter the Warehouse, Godowns or Premises of any person wherein are kept any Spirituous Liquors or Arrack not contained in bottles, and take an account of the quantity of such Liquors, and notice any leakage of the same, and gauge and otherwise examine the same at any time between the hours of eight in the morning and five in the evening, upon obtaining a Warrant so to do, under the hand of any Justice of the Peace, which Warrant such Justice is authorised to grant whenever he shall see cause so to do.

XXXI. The keepers of all Taverns duly licensed under this Act may sell to the inmates, customers, or frequenters thereof, Wines and Spirituous Liquors, so that the same be drunk within such Taverns; and every keeper of any such licensed Tavern who shall sell any Wine or Spirituous Liquor otherwise than is herein provided, shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding Fifty Dollars.

XXXII. Every keeper of any Eating House or Spirit Shop licensed under this Act, who shall serve, supply or sell to the customers, inmates or frequenters thereof any Wine, Spirituous Liquor or Arrack, other than such as shall have been bought by him from the Spirit Farmer, shall, for every such offence, forfeit a penalty not exceeding Fifty Dollars.

XXXIII. Every Spirit Farmer, and also every keeper of a licensed Eating House or Spirit Shop, who shall knowingly sell or deliver to any European or Native private Soldier, any Wine, Spirituous Liquor or Arrack, without having an authority in writing so to do from the Commanding Officer of such Soldier, shall, for every such offence, forfeit a penalty not exceeding Fifty Dollars.

XXXIV. Every Spirit Farmer, or other person, who shall sell or offer for sale any adulterated Spirits, or Spirits distilled from Neepa, shall forteit, for every such offence, a penalty not exceeding Four Hundred Dollars.

XXXV. From the passing of this Act, whoever, being a Mannfacturer of Sugar in the said Settlement, shall be desirous of having a Distillery at his Sugar Manufactory, for making, or distilling, or rectifying or compounding Spirits or Arrack, shall apply in writing to the Superintendent of Police of the Station or place within which such Sugar Manufactory is situated, and in such application shall be inserted the name of the applicant, the situation of his Manufactory, and the number and size of the Stills he is desirous of keeping; and the Superintendent of Police shall grant such License under his hand and seal to the applicant, on payment of a fee of Ten Dollars, and such License shall be registered in the Police Office of such Station or place,

XXXVI. No licensed Distiller shall send out of, or deliver from his Distillery (unless for the purpose of being carried on board of a ship for exportation) any Spirits or Arrack to any person other than the Spirit Farmer; and every licensed Distiller who shall send out, or deliver from his Distillery, any Spirits or Arrack to any such person, (except as aforesaid,) shall, for every such offence, forfeit a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Dollars; and all such Spirituous Liquors or Arrack, and the vessels in which the same is contained, shall be seized and forfeited.

XXXVII Every person other than the Spirit Farmer or a licensed Distiller, who shall make, or distil, or rectify, or compound any Spirits or Arrack, or shall keep or have in his possession any Still, or other Utensil or Apparatus, for distilling, or making, or rectifying, or compounding Spirits or Arrack, shall, for every such offence forfeit a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Dollars: and all such Spirits or Arrack and every such Still or other Utensil or Apparatus, shall be seized and forfeited.

XXXVIII. Every person other than the Spirit Farmer, who shall make or distil Samsoo in the said Settlement, or who shall keep or have in his possession any Still or other Utensil or Apparatus for distilling or making Samsoo, shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Dollars: and all such Samsoo and every such Still or other Utensil or Apparatus, shall be seized and forfeited.

XXXIX. No person shall land Samsoo, in any part of the said Settlement, except for the purpose of selling the same to the Spirit Farmer; and every person who shall land any Samsoo in any part of the said Settlement, except for the purpose of selling the same to the Spirit Farmer, and also every person who shall sell any Samsoo to any person other than the Spirit Farmer, shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Dollars; and all such Samsoo and the vessels in which the same is contained, shall be seized and forfeited.

XL. All Spirituous Liquor or Arrack imported, landed, removed in, or exported from any part of the said Settlement on account of Her Majesty's Government, or the Government of the East India Company, is exempt from the operation of this Act.

XLI. Every Owner, Renter, Holder or Occupier of any Estate or Plantation which produces Toddy or Bang, and also every other person other than the Toddy Farmer, and the keepers of the licensed Toddy Shops, who shall sell any Toddy or Bang within the said Settlement to any person other than to the Toddy Farmer, shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding One Hundred Dollars, and all such Toddy or Bang shall be seized and forfeited; but this enactment shall not be deemed to forbid Bakers from using in their Bread, Toddy, the produce of their own Estate or plantation.

XLII. The Governor or other Chief Civil Authority of the said Settlement, or such public Officer or Officers as he shall thereto authorise, shall, from time to time, fix the price which the Toddy Farmer shall pay to the Owners, Renters, Holders or Occupiers of Estates or Plantations which produce Toddy or Bang, for all such Toddy or Bang which the said Farmer may buy from them; and every Toddy Farmer who shall refuse to buy any such Toddy or Bang at that price, shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding Fifty Dollars.

XLIII. Every person, other than the Owners, Renters, Occupiers, or Holders of Estates, which produce Toddy or Bang, who shall have in his possession any Toddy or Bang, unless the same shall be duly proved to have been bought from the Toddy Farmer, or from the keeper of a licensed Toddy Shop hereinafter mentioned, shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding Fifty Dollars: and all such Toddy or Bang, and the vessels in

which the same is contained, shall be seized and forfeited.

XLIV. Every keeper of a licensed Toddy Shop, who shall sell to any customer, in mate or frequenter of such licensed Toddy Shop, or shall have in his possession any Toddy or Bang, unless the same shall be duly proved to have been bought from the Toddy Farmer, shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding Fifty Dollars: and all such Toddy or Bang, and the vessels in which the same is contained, shall be seized and forfeited.

XLV. Every Toddy Farmer and keeper of a licensed Toddy Shop who shall knowingly sell or deliver any Toddy or Bang to any European or Native Soldier, without having an authority in witing from the Commanding Officer of such Soldier, shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding Fifty Dollars.

XLVI. All Fees received for registering Licenses to keep Opium Shops under this Act, shall be paid to the Opium Farmer for the time being; and all fees received for registering Licenses to keep Seree Shops under this Act, shall be paid to the Seree Farmer for the time being; and all Fees received for registering Licenses to keep Spirit Shops and Distilleries under this Act, shall be paid to the Spirit Farmer for the time being; and all Fees received for registering Licenses to keep Toddy Shops for the sale of Toddy and Bang under this Act, shall be paid to the Toddy Farmer for the time being; and all other Fines, Penalties or Forfeitures whatsoever, received under this Act, shall be paid into the Municipal Fund, established under Act No. IX. of 1848, of the station at which such Fines, Penalties or Forfeitures are imposed, to be applied to the general purposes of the said Act.

XLVII. Any Justice of the Peace within the said Settlement may, by his Warrant directed to any Peace Officer or Officers within the said Settlement or to any Revenue Officer or Othcers appointed in manner hereinafter mentioned, empower him or them by day or by night (but if between the hours of eleven o'clock at night and five in the following morning, then such Warraut to be executed by, or in the presence of a Peace Officer) to enter and search any Dwelling-house, Shop, or other Building, in any case in which there shall appear to such Justice of the Peace, upon the oath of any party, good and sufficient cause to believe that in any such Dwelling-house, Shop, or other Building, is concealed or deposited any article subject to forfeiture under this Act, and to seize and take possession of any such article found to be concealed or deposited therein and any Officer to whom such Warrant shall be directed in case of resistance, may break open any door of such Dwelling-house, Shop, or other Building, and remove by force any other obstruction to such entry, search, seizure, and removal as aforesaid,

XLVIII. If any person shall be found committing any act in breach of this Act, or if any Peace or Revenue Officer shall have probable cause to believe that any person has concealed upon his person any article subject to forfeiture under this Act, such Peace or Revenue Officer may immediately arrest such person without a Warrant, and shall thereupon immediately take such person before some neighbouring Justice of the Peace, who shall determine, if there be reasonable grounds of suspicion, and such Justice may direct such person to be immediately searched: and every person who shall obstruct any such Officer in making any such arrest as aforesaid, and also every Officer who shall not immediately take any person so arrested before a Justice of the Peace, shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding Fifty Dollars.

XLIX. Every Peace or Revenue Officer who shall maliciously and without reasonable grounds arrest or detain any person on the plea that such person hath infringed any of the provisions of this Act, shall forfeit a penalty not exceeding Fifty Dollars.

L. No Revenue Officer shall be competent to act under the provisions of this Act, unless he shall be ap-

pointed specially so to do in writing by the Governor or other Chief Civil Authority of the Station in which such Revenue Officer is required to act, which authority shall be duly registered at the Police Office of such Station, and shall be liable to be annulled at the pleasure of the said Governor or other Chief Civil Authority.

LI. All penalties under this Act may be imposed on conviction of the offence by confession of the offender, or by the oath of one or more witnesses before two Justices of the Peace, and in case of non-payment of any Penalty imposed or forfeited under this Act, the convicting Justices may issue their Warrant under their hands directed to any Penalty by seizure and sale of any Goods of the offender which may be found within the jurisdiction of such Justices; and if no such property shall be found within such jurisdiction, then any Justice, by Warrant under his hand, may commit the offender to prison for any period not exceeding two months, where a pecuniary penalty of Twenty-five Dollars can be imposed, and in the same proportion for any greater penalty which can be imposed.

LII. In all cases of conviction under this Act, wherein imprisonment shall be awarded for non-payment of any Penalty imposed or forfeited upon such conviction, the convicting Justices of the Peace, at the time of such conviction, in their discretion may order that the offender be imprisoned either in the House of Correction or in Her Majesty's Gaol at the Station at which the conviction is had.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India, after the 19th day of August next.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 2nd of June 1849:—

ACT No. - of 1849.

For avoiding loss by the default of public Accountants.

For better avoidance of loss through the default of Public Accountants, It is enacted as follows: —

I. Every Public Accountant shall give security for the due discharge of the trusts of his office, and for the due account of all moneys which shall come into his possession or control, by reason of his office.

II. In default of any Act having special reference to the office of any Public Accountant, the security given shall be of such amount and kind, real or personal, or both, and with such sureties, (regard being had to the nature of the office,) as shall be required by any rules made, or to be made, from time to time by the authority by which each Public Accountant is appointed to his office, subject to the approval of the Governor or Governor in Council of the Presidency or place.

1II. Every person is a Public Accountant within the meaning of this Act, who, by reason of any office held by him in the Territories under the Government of the East India Company, is entrusted with the receipt, custody, or control of any moneys or securities for money, or the management of any lands belonging to Her Majesty or to the East India Company, or as Official Assignee or Trustee, or as Surberakur, or in any other official capacity, with the receipt, custody or control of any moneys or securities for money, or the

management of any lands belonging to any other person or persons.

IV. The Sudder Board of Revenue or the body exercising the powers of the Sudder Board of Revenue shall be empowered at the instance of the head of the office to which any Public Accountant belongs, or of the Governor or Governor in Council, to proceed against any such Public Accountant and his sureties, for any loss or defalcation in his accounts, as if the amount thereof were an arrear of land revenue due to Government.

V. All Regulations and Acts now or hereafter to be in force for the recovery of arrears of land revenue due to Government, and for recovery of damages by any person wrongfully proceeded against for any such arrear, shall apply, with such changes as are necessary to make them applicable to the case, to the proceedings against and by such Public Accountant.

VI. All sales of estates, summarily sold before the passing of this Act, in satisfaction of the security bonds of any Public Accountants within the meaning of this Act, shall be deemed as good and valid, and be as liable to be reviewed and annulled, as if such estates had been sold under Authority of this Act, and no further or otherwise.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India, after the 2nd day of September next.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 2nd June 1849:—

ACT No. - or 1849.

For punishing Breaches of Trust.

For the punishment of Breaches of Trust, It is enacted as follows:—

I. Every person employed in the Public Service of Her Majesty, or of the East India Company, and entrusted by reason of such employment, with the receipt, custody or control of any chattel, money, or valuable security, who shall embezzle the same or any part thereof, or in any manner fraudulently apply, use, or dispose of the same or any part thereof for any purpose other than a purpose to which the same is applicable under the trust reposed in him, shall be deemed to have feloniously stolen the same, and shall be liable to be transported out of the Territories under the Government of the East India Company, for any term not exceeding four-teen years, or to be imprisoned with or without labour, for any term not exceeding three years.

II. All Official Trustees, Assignees and Receivers of money, by virtue of their several offices or appointments, all Justices of the Peace, Coroners, and other persons, receiving by virtue of their offices or appointments any fines, forfeitures, penalties, or other moneys, on behalf of Her Majesty or of the East India Company, all Sheriffs Under-Sheriffs, Bailiffs, Officers, and other persons employed to levy money in execution of the judgment or order of any Court, or in receiving any taxes or other moneys directed to be levied by any regulation of the Governor or Governor in Council of any Presidency or Place, or by any Act of the Governor General of India in Council, and also all subordinate Officers and Ser-

vants employed in the office or service of any of the persons herein before enumerated, and entrusted with money in the course of such employment, are declared to be persons employed in the public service within the meaning of this Act; but this special enumeration, of some of the persons included in the general description of persons in the Public Service of Her Majesty or the East India Company, shall not be taken to abridge the meaning of that general description.

III. The Clauses respectively numbered CII, CIII. and CIV. in an Act of Parliament passed in the ninth year of the reign of King George the Fourth, initialed "An Act for improving the Administration of Criminal Justice in the East Indies," are repealed, except as to all things done or forborne to be done before the passing of this Act.

IV. Every Member and Officer of a Trading Corporation or Company, and also every Banker, Mer chant, Factor, Broker, Attorney or other Agent, whether he be commonly so employed, or be employed as an Agent in that instance only, and whether he act as such Agent gratuitously or otherwise, to whom any chattel, money or valuable security is entrusted for safe custody, or for any special purpose, and whether with or without any authority to sell, negotiate, pledge, or employ the same, but with an authority limited to some defined purpose as to the application of such money, chattel, or valuable security or of any part thereof, or of the proceeds or of any part of the proceeds thereof, who shall fraudulently apply, use or dispose of the same or any part of the proceeds thereof, for any purpose other than a purpose for which the same was entrusted to him, shall be deemed to have feloniously stolen the same, and shall be liable to be transported out of the Territories under the Government of the East India Company, for any term not exceeding fourteen years, or to be imprisoned with or without labour for any term not exceeding three years.

V. Every Sub-Agent, Clerk, or Servant of any such Trading Corporation or Company, or of any Banker, Merchant, Factor, Broker, or other Agent as aforesaid, who, knowing the purpose for which such chattel, money or valuable security was entrusted to the Corporation, Company, Person or Persons by whom he is employed, shall fraudulently apply, use, or dispose of the same for any purpose other than a purpose for which the same was entrusted to his employer or employers, shall be deemed to have committed the offence herein before mentioned, though he were not himself immediately employed or entrusted with the disposition thereof by the person entitled thereto.

VI. Every person possessed, or having the receipt, custody or control, of any chattel, money, or valuable security in trust for any other person or persons, who shall embezzle the same or any part thereof, or in any manner fraudulently apply, use or dispose of the same, for his own use or benefit, in breach of the trust reposed in him, shall be deemed to have feloniously stolen the same, and shall be liable to be transported out of the Territories under the Government of the East India Company, for any term not exceeding fourteen years, or to be imprisoned with or without labour for any term not exceeding three years.

VII. Every instrument entitling or showing the title of any person to any share or interest in any public stock or fund of any country or state, or in any stock of any Corporation or Compony, or for the transfer of any such share or interest, or for the receipt of any dividend or interest on any such share, or entitling or showing the title to any deposit in any Bank, and every Warrant, order, or instrument for the payment of any money on any event certain or contingent, or for the delivery or receipt of any goods or merchandize, on any such event, is a valuable security within the meaning of this Act.

VIII. Any offender under this Act may be proceeded against on the same charge for any number of dis-

tinct acts of embezzlement or fraudulent application, use, or disposition as aforesaid, committed by him within six calendar months, from the first to the last of such acts: and proof of a gross deficiency in the accounts of any such Trustee or Public Servant shall be evidence of the offence charged, until such deficiency is otherwise explained.

IX. If the offence relates to money or to any Banknote, Bank Post Bill, Banker's Cheque, Bill of Exchange, Promissory Note, Government Paper, or other like security for the payment of money, it shall be enough in the indictment or charge to allege the embezzlement or fraudulent application, use or disposition of money, without specifying any particular coin or valuable security; and such allegation shall, so far as regards the kind of property, be sustained, if the offender is proved to have embezzled or fraudulently applied, used or disposed of any amount of money or any valuable security, though the particular kind of coin or valuable security of which such amount was composed shall not be proved.

X. It shall not be necessary, in any proceeding against any offender under this Act, to declare the person to whom the property embezzled or fraudulently applied or disposed of belongs, otherwise than hereinafter provided, or to give any other description of it than by stating its general character according to the provisions of this Act; and if the offence be that of embezzlement or fraudulent application, use or disposition, by a person in the public service of the Crown, or of the East India Company, of property entrusted to him by reason of such employment, or part thereof, it shall be enough to state that the defendant was in such service, and that he received the property by reason of such employment, and embezzled the same, or part thereof, or fraudulently applied, used, or disposed of the same, as the case may be; and if the case be one of fraudulent application, use, or disposition by any person not being such public servant, but entrusted as aforesaid, it shall be enough to state that such person was entrusted with the property, (describing its general character, as aforesaid,) and it shall be enough to state shortly the purpose of the trust, and that he fraudulently applied, used, or disposed of the same, contrary to his duty in that behalf.

XI. The Court before which any offender is tried under this Act shall have power upon the trial to make any amendments that may be necessary, by reason of any variance between the statements of the charge and the evidence, either in the description of the property, or of any person, or of any office, appointment, or employment, or of the purpose of the trust, or otherwise, when in the opinion of the Court the person charged cannot have been misled as to his defence by such imperfect or erroneous statement.

XII. Every offender under this Act may be tried and punished by any Court to which he is amenable, either in the place where he is taken into custody, or where he committed the offence.

XIII. The punishment of any offender under this Act shall not be deemed to take away or lessen his liability to make good any loss sustained by Her Majesty, or the East India Company, or any other person or persons by his misbehaviour or breach of trust.

*XIV. Every such public servant, and every such trustee, charged with a felonious breach of trust under this Act, who shall be proved to have knowingly made up or furnished false statements or accounts of the sums of money received or paid by him, or entrusted to his care, or of the goods or balance of money in his custody or control, shall be liable to fine in the discretion of the Court, although no actual embezzlement or fraudulent application, use or disposition of trust moneys, chattels, or valuable securities is proved against him, and in addition to such fine may be imprisoned, with or without labour, as the Court shall adjudge, for any term not exceeding two years; but

no person convicted of felonious breach of trust, as aforesaid, shall be punished also for making up false accounts in connection with the same breach of trust.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India, after the 2nd day of September next.

No. 106 of 1849.—The Right Hon'ble the Governor in Council, having received the instructions of the Hon'ble the Court of Directors, is pleased, in conformity therewith, to publish the following rules for regulating the appointment of Interpreters in the Indian Navy, in supercession of the General Order, No. 65 of 1848, and all former Orders upon the subject:—

1st. The languages to be studied and recognised as qualifying for the Office of Interpreter in the Indian Navy, are—1st, Hindoostanee; 2nd, Persian; 3rd, Arabic; 4th, Malay; and 5th, Scindee.

2nd. The Examinations of Officers of the Indian Navy are to be held under the same rules, and before the same Committee, as those of the Army; and the Commander in Chief, before submitting to Government the name of any Officer to be sent before the Committee, will satisfy himself that a sufficient degree of proficiency has been attained to render the examination proper.

3rd. Moonshee Allowance will be granted, as in the Army, to every Officer of the Indian Navy who passes the prescribed examination, at the rate of 30 Rupees per menseur for six months, for each language.

4th. The appointments of Interpreters in the Indian Navy are restricted to three, viz. :-

One for the Persian Gulf Station.

One for the Aden Station.

One for any Squadron or Vessel proceeding on special service.

These appointments are to be held by Officers below the rank of Commander, and not being the 1st Lieutenant of any ship.

The remuneration for the Office of Interpreter is fixed at 100 Rupees per mensem, and it is to be clearly understood, that the Officer so appointed will nevertheless continue to perform every duty on board or on shore, which may fall to him as an effective Officer of the ship.

5th. To be eligible for Office as an Interpreter, an Officer must have passed the prescribed examination in Hindoostanee and in Persian, and in at least one of the other three of the languages above named; and it is distinctly declared, that without due certificates, no Officer will be entitled either to the Moonshee allowance, or to the appointment of Interpreter.
