Is hereby given, that Verbal Tenders will be received at this Office at noon on Thursday, the 15th proximo, for supplying Gram to the Commissariat Department at Poona and Kirkee, for the use of the Mounted Corps, and for other Departmental purposes, from the 1st March 1849 to the 28th February 1850.

The Gram must be of unexpectionable quality, of the description usually furnished to this Department, and delivered free of expense beyond the stipulated price, into the stores at Poona or Kirkee, as may be ordered; if the gram tendered is considered objectionable by the Executive Commissariat Officer, or the Indenting Officers, and is not immediately replaced by the Contractor with approved gram, the required quantity will be purchased wherever procurable, at his risk and loss, and in every such instance he will be liable to be fined (50) fifty Rupees, or 30 per cent on the amount of the expenses so incurred, at the option of the Executive Commissariat Officer; but the Contractor, if dissatisfied, will be at liberty to claim to have the rejected gram examined by a Committee of Officers, whose decision thereon shall be final.

A supply of not less than one month's consumption during the fair season, and of three months' during the monsoon, is to be constantly kept in the Commissariat stores.

The provisions of the Contract are only intended to extend to demands made at Poona and Kirkee, but in the event of any of the Cavalry or public Camels moving, it will be optional with the executive Commissariat Officer to take from the Contractor one month's gram for their use on the march.

The biddings for the Contract will be in the Company's Rupee, and no person will be permitted to bid who has not previously deposited in this Office Rupees (2,200) two thousand and two hundred, which sum will be forfeited in the event of delay, evasion, or refusal on the part of any bidder to execute the necessary Deed of Contract, when required to do so, in the event of his offer being accepted; in which case he must also be prepared to furnish bonded security to the further amount of Company's Rupees (8,800) eight thousand and eight hundred, which, together with the above mentioned deposit, will be held as a guarantee for due fulfilment of every part of the Contract.

NOTICE TO MARINERS ENTER-ING THE PORT OF AKYAB.

A Flagstaff having been erected on Faqueer or Mosque Point, in lat. 20° 7' N. long. 92° 56' E., it is recommended for Vessels making the Port in the day to steer until they get the Table Land of the Bolongo bearing East, and the Great Savage Light House N. by E., when they will be about one mile from the South end of the bar in 61 fathoms. From this position the Flagstaff will be distinctly seen bearing N. \ E., they must steer direct for it, crossing the bar in 31 to 4 fathoms till the light on the Savage bears S. E. by S. & S., which will put them inside the passage Rock, bearing from the Savage Light House N. W. 1 N. about 1 of a mile; they should then steer N. E., or more Easterly according to the state of the tide, to enable them to clear a red buoy, which is placed in 10 fa-thoms at the South end of the Faqueer's Reef. After clearing it they can haul up for the inner Flagstaff, and anchor abreast of it in 3 to 31 fathoms at low water inside of a black buoy, which is on the south end of an extensive flat projecting from Flat Island in 2½ fathoms low water spring tides. The abovementioned Flagstaff is visible from the deck of a vessel about 12 miles.

POST OFFICE NOTICES.

The following Rules approved of by Government respecting the Posting of Palkee Bearers are published for the information of the Public, and for the guidance of the several Post Masters under this Presidency:

- I. Travellers may be furnished with Dawk Bearers on application at the different Post Offices, where they will obtain all the requisite information as to the estimated distances between known Stations, to which only Dawk Bearers can be laid by any Post Master.
- II. A set of Dawk Bearers comprizes twelve, and one Mussalchee, for which is charged, payable in advance, at the rate of eight annas per Mile; but as in many instances, owing to the delay caused by Travellers remaining longer on the road than the stipulated time, this sum is found unequal to the expense, a further sum of four annas per Mile is required to be paid as a deposit to cover any eventual expense or demurrage caused by delay on the part of the Traveller. Should none occur, the full amount of the sum deposited is refunded, upon the Traveller furnishing a certificate from the Deputy Post Master at the place where his journey finished, that he arrived there without having incurred demurrage. It is the duty of the Deputy Post Masters to furnish Travellers with certificates specifying according to circumstances whether or otherwise they have come on demurrage ;such certificate however, it must be understood, is only applicable to the Deputy Post Master's Division who grants it, for it sometimes happens that a Traveller having incurred demurrage on part of the road, by travelling subsequently during those hours originally appointed for halting, reaches the last Division within the given time.
- N. B. It is to be particularly observed, that in some Districts, Bearers are with difficulty procured, and where they have to be sent a considerable distance to take up the Traveller, and in like manner to return home, for time so occupied they are paid additionally, and in all such cases Post Masters are authorized to charge the actual cost for the Traveller's Bearers.

When Demurrage is incurred adjustment of expenses deferred. III. When it is reported that a Traveller comes on demurrage on any part of the road, the adjustment of the amount depo-

sited to cover such expenses will be postponed until the receipt of the Bills for the Dak from all the Post Masters through whose Divisions the Trayeller may have passed.

Form to be provided to Travellers to insure their complaints being brought to notice. IV. Travellers, whether proceeding from the Presidency or from Outstations, are provided with a Form, in which they are requested particularly to

note any cause of dissatisfaction they may meet with on their journey, and the places where they meet with obstructions or irregularities on the part of the Bearers or subordinate Post Office Servants; this Form being affixed to the certificate which the Traveller has to present for signature, secures its being noticed.

When Bearers are withdrawn from their Posts by directions of the Traveller, adjustment of account how *deferred.

V. When a Dak has been ordered and circumstances may render it expedient for the Traveller to postpone his journey, or to withdraw the Bearers entirely, he will of course

be held liable for any expense which may have been incurred on his account. The amount paid for the Dak, and the amount deposited to cover demurrage, will therefore remain unadjusted until reports are received from the General Post Master on the line of route upon which the Dak was ordered.

Weight of Travellers' Baglers' Banghies limited gage must not exceed for each Banghy Burdar, twenty-four seers, and this must be divided into two Parcels, or Pattarahs, of such dimensions as to render them conveniently portable when slung as Bunghies.

Terms upon which a Traveller avails himself of the Post Office to lay Dáks. VII. It is to be generally understood, that although Government permits their servants to lay Dak Bearers for the con-

venience of the Public, the State derives no benefit from this source, and that neither Government nor any of their Officers are in any degree responsible to the Traveller for the misfortunes and disappointments which are inseparable from Dak travelling; thus every Traveller travels at his own risk, and is liable to the losses and increased expenses incidental to delays and accidents, and that Government can in no instance be considered liable to make good any losses whatever.

Post Master General will investigate complaints.

VIII, When irregularities and consequent inconvenience occur to Travellers, the Post Master

General on being applied to, will immediately investigate the complaint brought to his notice; but this can only be done in the same manner, and to the same end, as a superior in any other Department would interfere to enquire into complaints preferred against his subordmates.

In case of surcharge or unjust charges, Post Master General will investigate with a view to a refund. IX. In case of surcharge alone, or charges which to the Parties complaining might appear unjust because arising out of some positive neglect or error

on the part of the Deputy Post Master who lays the Dak, it would be the duty of the Post Master General to investigate the matter with a view to afford pecuniary redress.

Penalty for refusing payments on account of Dak Bearers. X. In every case of refusal to make good demands on account of laying Dak Bearers, Post Masetain all Letters, Parcels,

ters are authorized to detain all Letters, Parcels, &c. for the person from whom demands are due in the same manner as they are authorized to act under Clause IX of the General Rules.

Post Master General's decision final.

Any decision pronounced by the Post Master General in all references relative to Dak Bearers, to be considered final.

GENERAL POST OFFICE, MAY 1847.

The Post Master General having been informed by the Court of Directors of the East

India Company, that on and after the first June next, persons in this country may forward private correspondence by the Government Express from Bombay to Calcutta, and Madras; all persons desirous of availing themselves of this privilege will be required to mark upon the covers of their letters the words "by Express from Bombay," and in addition to this special address it will not be necessary that all letters intended to be forwarded by the way of Southampton should be so endorsed as hitherto.

The postage to be charged in India on the delivery of letters sent by this Express, will be, in addition to the ordinary inland rates,

One ropee for every letter not exceeding half a tola in weight.

Two rupees for every letter above half a tola, but not exceeding one tola in weight.

Four rupees for every letter above one tola, but not exceeding two tolas in weight, two tolas being the maximum weight of letters to be conveyed by Express.

On Newspapers.—Each newspaper office in Calcutta and Madras will be allowed to receive two newspapers at the ordinary rates of Inland postage; on all other newspapers forwarded by Express, a postage of five Rupees each will be charged, and no newspaper will be received for the Express exceeding three tolas in weight.

N. B .- One tola and a quarter is nearly equivalent to half an ounce avoirdupois.

FORT WILLIAM, HOME DEPARTMENT, LEGISLATIVE.

30th December, 1848. The following Act passed by the Hon'ble the President of the Council of India in Council on the 30th December 1848, with the assent of the Right Hon'ble the Governor General of India, which has been read and recorded.

Ordered, that the Act be promulgated for general information.

ACT No. XXVI. or 1848.

An Act to extend to the Straits the Act for regulating Coroners' Juries

Whereas it is expedient to extend the operation of Act No. IV. 1848, it is enacted as follows:

From the First day of March 1849, Act No. IV.1848 shall apply to the Settlements of Prince of Wales' Island, Singapore, and Malacca, and to all inquests held there by any Coroner, or Deputy Coroner; and the word Presidency as used in the said Act shall be taken to mean also the Government of the said Settlements.

FORT WILLIAM, HOME DEPARTMENT, LEGISLATIVE.

30th of December, 1818.

The following Act is brought up before the Legislative Council this day-Resolved, That the Rules requiring that all Acts shall be brought up for second reading in two months, or in three months from the date of the first reading, be suspended in respect to the following proposed Act, and that it be at once passed into Law; the assent of the right Hon'ble the Governor General of India having been obtained and recorded.

ACT No. XXVII. or 1848.

An Act to amend the Act XII. of 1844.

Whereas it is deemed expedient that the Act No. XII. of 1844, entitled "An Act for better securing the observance of an Exact Discipline in the Indian Navy," should be amended as hereinafter is mentioned, And whereas the Court of Directors of the East India Company have given their previous sanction to the several enactments hereinafter contained, It is enacted as follows:

I. From and after the first day of February 1849, the Articles and Orders hereinatter following, as well in time of Peace as in time of War, shall be observed and put in execution in manner hereinafter mentioned in addition to the 35 Articles and Orders contained in the said Act, that is to say:

36th. Every person belonging to the Indian Navy who shall be guilty of Manslaughter, or any other oftence against the person, or of any offence against the property, of any subject against Her Majesty, or any other person entitled to Her Majesty's protection, or to the protection of the respective Governments of the East India Company, or any other person whomsoever, not being an enemy of Her Majesty or of the East India Company, (and the punishment of which offence is not provided for by the said Act,) shall be liable to Transportation for life, or for a term of years, or to such other punishment according to the nature and degree of the offence as a Court Martial shall award.

37th. All Insubordination, Disorders, Irregularities, and Neglects which any person belonging to the Indian Navy may be guilty of, to the prejudice of good order or of discipline in the Naval Service of the East India Company, and all disgraceinl conduct of a cruel or dishonest or indecent or malicious or mischievous character, though not particularly specified in the said Act, or in this Act, shall be liable to such punishment, having regard to the nature and degree of the offence, as a Court Martial shall adjudge.

38th. Where any person belonging to the Indian Navy, (not being of the rank of an Officer.) shall be guilty of any offence, which the Officer in Command of the Ship or Vessel shall deem necessary to be punished without trial by Court Martial, the offence shall be investigated by such Commanding Officer; and the offender shall be liable to such punishment, (not extending to life or limb, or to transportation, or imprisonment exceeding six days, or to any corporal punishment exceeding twelve lashes,) as such Officer shall by his Warrant adjudge.

II. In the several cases in which a Court Martial is by the said Act authorized to award the punishment of death, and also in grave cases of embezzlement against the 8th and 24th Articles of the said Act, and also in the case of grave offences against the 20th and 21st of the said Articles, a Court Martial may, if it shall adjudge the same to be proper, award sentence of transportation for life or for a term of years.

III. In all cases where a capital punishment shall have been awarded by a Court Martial, it shall be lawful for the Governor General in Council, (if he shall think the circumstances of the case make it proper so to do,) to order the offender to be transported for life, or for a certain term of years.

IV. In cases where any sentence of transportation shall be passed under the provisions of the said Act, or of this Act, or any sentence of death be commuted to transportation, the offender shall be conveyed to or left at some one of the Presidencies of India, and shall be liable to be dealt with as in the case of other offenders sentenced to transportation, and shall be subject to all such orders for carrying the sentence into execution as shall in that behalf be given by the Governor General in Council, or if the offender shall be at the Presidency of Fort St. George or the Presidency of Bombay, then by the Governor in Council of such Presidency; subject, however, in the last mentioned case, to any orders made by the Governor General in Council, in case any such orders shall have been so made.

V. The Governor General of India in Council, and the Governors in Council of Madras and Bombay respectively, shall have full power and authority from time to time, as there shall be occasion, to direct any superior Officer, Captain, or Commander of the Indian Navy, who shall be in any Port of the East India, to hold Courts Martial in any such Port as shall be found most expedient and for the good of the East India Company's Service; and such superior Officer, Captain, or Commander shall preside at such Court Martial.

VI. And for removing the doubts which have been entertained as to the effect and intention of the 9th Section of the said Act No. X11, of 1844, in relation to the Officers of whom Courts Martial, to be held or appointed under that Act, shall be composed, it is declared and enacted, that any Officer of the Indian Navy, ordered by Government or the Superintendent of the Indian Navy to be present at any Court Martial, for the purpose of serving thereat if required, shall be eligible to act on any Court Martial, although such Officers may not be commissioned to any Ship or Vessel.

If on any occasion there shall not be present a sufficient number of Superior Officers, Captains, Commanders, and Lieutenants of the Indian Navy to form a Court Martial, for the purposes of the said Act or of this Act, the required number of Officers may, with the sanction of the Government, or Officer by whose authority the Court Martial shall have been convened, be made up or completed by any Officer or Officers in the Military Service of the East India Company then being Commissioned and in Pay, and of the Rank either of Major or Captain, who may be present, and may be ordered, or be ready, to afford his or their services on such Court Martial; and, for default of such or of a sufficient number of such, then the defi-ciency may be supplied by any Officer or Officers of Her Majesty's Naval Service of sufficient Rank, according to the said Act, who may be present, and may be ready to afford his or their services on such Court Martial; and the proceedings of a Court Martial so constituted shall be valid and effectual.

VIII. The Clauses and Provisions of the said Act No. XII. of 1844, for regulating the places to which and persons to whom the same is to extend, and also the other Clauses and Provisions thereof shall apply to this Act, and the two Acts shall be construed together as one Act, and the same effect shall be given thereto, and to the several Articles and Provisions thereof respectively as if the Articles and Provisions contained in this Act had been originally contained in the said Act No. XII. of 1844, and had formed part of the Articles and Provisions of that Act.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 30th December 1848.

ACT No. - OF 1848.

An Act for letter defining the Duties of Customs and Excise.

Whereas under the Regulations in force for taking a duty of twenty Spanish Dollars for each and every Leaguer of Arrack or Asiatic Rum imported into and intended for consumption within Prince of Wales' Island, Singapore, and Malacca, doubts have arisen whether any duty may be taken on importation of a quantity less than a Leaguer, and it is expedient that such doubts be removed, and that the meaning of all such or the like expressions in any Regulation or Act for the levy of Custom or Excise Duties within the

territories under the Government of the East India Company be plainly declared, It is declared and enacted as follows:

I. Whenever by any Regulation or Act now or hereafter to be in force, not containing any direction to the contrary, a certain duty of Customs or Excise, or in the nature thereof is leviable on any given quantity, by weight, measure, or value, of any goods or merchandise, a like duty is leviable according to the same rate on any greater or less quantity.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the First day of March 1849.

The Right Honorable the Governor in Council has much satisfaction in republishing for general information the following Notification issued on the 17th instant, by order of the Right Honorable the Governor General of India, announcing the entire defeat on the afternoon of the 13th instant, of the Sikh Army under Rajah Shere Sing.

2. His Lordship in Council directs that in commemoration of this event, a salute of 21 Guns be fired this morning at sun-rise, from the Saluting Battery, and that a similar Salute be fired on receipt of this order at all the Principal Military Stations under this Presidency.

THE 17TH JANUARY 1849.

1. The Governor General has much satisfaction in intimating to the President in Council, and notifying for public information, that he has this day received

- a demi-official Letter from His Excellency the Commander in Chief, in which His Excellency announces to the Governor General, that on the afternoon of the 13th instant the Troops under his command attacked and entirely defeated the Sikh Army under Rajah Shere Sing, in its position near the river Jhelum.
- 2. The action was obstinately and severely contested. The enemy was in great force, and occupied very strong positions. They were driven back at every point, with the loss of many of their Guns, and had, by the latest intelligence, relinquished all the positions in which they had been entrenched.
- 3. The details of these operations have not yet reached the Governor General; as soon as they are received they will be published for general information.
- 4. The Governor General directs that a Salute of 21 Guns be fired at every principal Station of the Army, as soon as this Notification shall be received.

BY THE RIGHT HONORABLE THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

MARINE DEPARTMENT.

BOMBAY CASTLE, 27TH JANUARY 1849.

No. 20 of 1849.—Captain Stephen Lushington, R. N., appointed by the Honorable the Court of Directors to be Superintendent of the Indian Navy, has this day assumed charge of the duties of that Office.

The following Commission, under the Honorable the East India Company's Seal, appointing Captain Lushington to be Commander in Chief of the whole Establishment of the Indian Navy, and of all Officers employed and to be employed, whether on shore or affoat, within the limits of the Company's Charter, takes effect from this day, and is published for general information.

THE HONORABLE THE EAST INDIA COMPANY.

To STEPHEN LUSHINGTON, Esquire, a Captain in the Royal Navy.

Whereas we have recently appointed you to be Superintendent of the Indian Navy, and we see fit to appoint you to be Commander in Chief of the same as hereinafter mentioned. Now we do hereby appoint you, the said Captain Stephen Lushington, to be Commander in Chief of the whole Establishment of our Indian Navy, and of all our Ships and Vessels called or known by that name, employed or to be employed in any of the Seas or Rivers within the limits of our Charter, and of all Officers therein employed and to be employed, whether on shore or affoat, within the said limits, subject to such orders and directions as you may receive from us under our common Seal, or from our Court of Directors under the hands of any thirteen or more of them, or from our Governor General of India in Council, or from our Governor in Council of Bombay. And we do hereby will and require you, upon and from and after your arrival at Bombay aforesaid, to take upon you the charge and command of our Ships and Vessels as Commander in Chief of the Indian Navy accordingly; hereby charging all Commodores, Captains, Commanders, Officers, and Ships' Companies belonging

to our Ships and Vessels, to be obedient to you their Commander in Chief, and you likewise to follow such orders and directions as you shall from time to time receive from us, under our common Seal, or from our Court of Directors, under the hands of any thirteen or more of them, or from our Governor General of India in Council, or from our Governor in Council of Bombay, and for so doing this shall be your Commission.

Given under our common Seal, this twenty-third day of November, in the Twelfth Year of the Reign of our Sovereign Lady VICTORIA, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, and in the Year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight.
