The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 15th of September 1849:—

ACT No. — of 1849.

*An Act to enable Principal Sudder Ameens, in certain cases of Appeal, to confirm the decision without summoning the Respondent.*

Whereas it will lessen the delay and expense of Appeals, if the powers possessed by Zillah and City Judges of confirming decisions on certain Appeals without serving any notice on the Respondents, are extended to Principal Sudder Ameens, It is enacted as follows:—

I. The powers given to Zillah and City Judges, by Clause Third, Section XVI. of Regulation V. 1831, of the Bengal Code, are extended to Principal Sudder Ameens, in all Appeals referred to them.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India, after the 15th day of November next.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 15th of September 1849:—

ACT No. — of 1849.

*For confirming the title to Lands in Calcutta taken for public purposes.*

Whereas the execution of works of public usefulness in Calcutta is liable to be hindered by the difficulty in making a good title to the land taken for such purpose, It is enacted as follows:—

I. The powers and provisions of the first seven Sections of Regulation I, 1824, of the Bengal Code, shall be applicable to all lands within the town of Calcutta, which shall have been declared by the Governor of Bengal to be needed for any public purpose.

II. In all cases in which payment of any part of the purchase or compensation money is reserved according to the Fifth Clause of Section VI. of the said Regulation, on account of any lands taken for any public purpose under this Act, the Government Securities mentioned in the said Clause shall be deposited with the Government Agent at Fort William in Bengal, in the name and with the privy of the Accountant General of Her Majesty's Supreme Court of Judicature at Fort William, to be placed by him to the credit of the persons interested in such lands, describing them as nearly as may be done according to the course of proceeding in the said Court in matters and causes depending before it in Equity.

III. The said Securities shall remain in the hands of the Government Agent, and the interest accruing thereon shall be, from time to time, received and paid, under the order of the said Supreme Court, to the person or persons for the time being, who would have been entitled to receive the rents and profits of the said lands, if the same had not been taken as aforesaid, until there shall be some person or persons absolutely entitled to receive the principal sum of the monies so reserved, and thereupon the said Government Securities, with all interest then due thereon, shall be transferred and paid to such person or persons under the like order of the said Court, and so long as no person can be found entitled to receive the interest of the said Government Securities, the Government Agent shall continue to receive, and, from time to time, to invest the accumulation of interest due thereon in the purchase of other Government Securities, to be held and applied by him on the same trusts as the Securities first purchased.

The following Extract from the Proceedings of the Hon'ble the President of the Council of India in Council, in the Legislative Branch of the Home Department, under date the 15th September 1849, is published for general information:—

Read again the Draft of a proposed Act, dated the 8th March 1849, and published in the *Calcutta Gazette* of the 17th March 1849, to enable the Bengal Courts of Nizamut and of Session to punish certain offences by Fine.

*Resolution.*—The President in Council resolves that the following amended Draft on the subject be published for general information:—

ACT No. — of 1849.

*An Act for regulating the Sentences of Criminal Courts in certain cases in the Presidencies of Fort William and Fort St. George.*

Whereas it is expedient to declare and amend the law as to punishment by fine and imprisonment in certain cases in the Presidencies of Fort William in Bengal and Fort St. George, It is declared and enacted as follows:—

I. Regulation II, 1834, of the Bengal Code, is repealed.

II. The Courts of Nizamut, Foujdaree and of Session, within the Territories subject to either of the said Presidencies, may punish by reasonable fine, at the discretion of the Court, any offenders, convicted before them, of any offence which renders them liable to discretionary punishment; and, in default of payment of the fine, may sentence them to imprisonment, with or without labour, for any term not exceeding seven years in the case of sentences passed by the Courts of Session, or fourteen years in the case of sentences passed by the Nizamut or Foujdaree Adawlut.

III. In all cases of conviction within the said Territories, either in one of the Supreme Courts of Judicature, established by Royal Charter, or in any of the

Courts of the East India Company, of any offence punishable by imprisonment, which is not capital, nor punishable by transportation, the Court in its discretion may order such imprisonment to be with or without hard labour.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India, after the 15th day of December next.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 15th of September 1849 :—

ACT No. — of 1849.

*An Act for restitution of the value of Stolen Property*

Whereas it is expedient that the several Criminal Courts within the Territories under the Government of the East India Company be empowered to add the punishment of fine to the punishments already provided for persons convicted before them of certain offences respecting Property, and to apply the same for the benefit of those who have suffered by such offences, It is declared and enacted as follows :—

I. All Criminal Courts within the said Territories may add to the punishment competent to them to inflict upon persons convicted before them of robbery, theft, embezzlement, cheating, or other offence arising out of the wrongful appropriation of property, the punishment of fine not exceeding the loss appearing to be caused to the several persons who have suffered by such wrong ; and may pay and distribute the proceeds of the said fine, or any part thereof, to or for the benefit of the said several persons, according to the discretion of the Court.

II. Payment of every such fine may be enforced by distress and sale, under the order of the Court, of the goods of the offender; and in default thereof, may be enforced by imprisonment, with or without hard labour, for any term not exceeding the term for which the same Court is empowered to imprison any offender in default of payment of any fine of the like amount set upon him.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 15th day of September 1849 :—

ACT No. — of 1849.

*An Act for amending the Law concerning the Jurisdiction of the Courts of Sudder Ameens and District Moonsiffs, in the Presidency of Fort St. George.*

In modification of Section II. of Act XI. of 1836, It is enacted as follows :—

I. After the passing of this Act, no person whatever, shall, by reason of place of birth, or by reason of descent, be in any Civil proceeding whatever exempt from the Jurisdiction of the Courts of the Sudder Ameens and District Moonsiffs, in the Territories subject to the Presidency of Fort St. George.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India, after the 15th day of December next.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 15th of September 1849 :—

ACT No. — of 1849.

*An Act for abolishing the Court of Petty Sessions and enlarging the powers of Police Magistrates at Bombay.*

Whereas it is expedient to abolish the Court of Petty Sessions at Bombay, and to make other provision for the exercise of the functions of the said Court, It is enacted as follows :—

I. From and after the ( ) day of ( ) 1849, the Court of Petty Sessions at Bombay, and all officers belonging to the said Court shall be abolished.

II. All the powers vested in the said Court of Petty Sessions by Act No. XXVIII. 1839, except the power of convicting and punishing any person for an offence against the said Act, and also all the powers and duties vested in the said Court by Sections II. and III. of Act No. XIV. 1842, shall be transferred to and exercised by the Board of Conservancy, formed at Bombay under Act No. XI. 1845 ; and all the powers and duties, by the said Act No. XXVIII. 1839, vested in the Surveyor of the Court of Petty Sessions, shall be transferred to, and may be exercised by any of the Superintendents of Repairs appointed under the said Act No. XXVIII. 1839.

III. All the powers vested in the said Court of Petty Sessions by the following Rules, Orders and Regulations of the Governor of Bombay in Council, that is to say, No. 2 of 1813, Article 9 First Part ; No. 1 of 1818, Section 3 ; No. 2 of 1827, Title 7, Article 2 ; No. 2 of 1827, Title 16, Article 3 ; and also by Act No. IV. 1841, and by Sections VII. and VIII. of Act No. XIV. 1842, and the power of convicting and punishing any person for any offence against Act No. XIV. 1842, and all the powers vested in the said Court by any Rule, Ordinance, or Regulation of the Governor of Bombay in Council, or by any Act of the Governor General of India in Council, which relate to the issue of any licence or permission in the nature of a licence, or the performance of any periodical executive duty by the said Court, not hereinbefore transferred to the

Board of Conservancy, shall be transferred to the Magistrates of Police for the Town and Island of Bombay, and may be exercised by any two or more of them sitting together.

IV. All the powers of the said Court of Petty Sessions, not hereinbefore specially transferred to the said Board of Conservancy or Magistrates of Police, shall be transferred to the Justices of the Peace for the Town and Island of Bombay, and may be exercised by any two or more of them sitting together.

V. All Rules, Ordinances, and Regulations of the Governor of Bombay in Council, and all Acts of the Governor General of India in Council, wherein mention is made of the said Court of Petty Sessions, shall be construed according to the subject matter thereof, as if the said Board of Conservancy, or Magistrates of Police, or Justices of the Peace, (as the case may require,) had been mentioned therein instead of the said Court, so far as is necessary to give full effect to this Act.

VI. All the records of the said Court of Petty Sessions, relating to the Powers of the Court, which are to be exercised by the Board of Conservancy, shall be given to the charge of the said Board: all the other records of the Court shall be given to the charge of the Chief Magistrate at Bombay.

VII. All sums of money in the said Court, or in the hands of any of its Officers in their official capacity, shall be paid into the General Treasury, to the credit of the Municipal Fund, subject to the claims of all persons having an interest therein.

VIII. A single Magistrate of Police at Bombay may exercise all the powers conferred upon the Court of Petty Sessions at Bombay by Act No. III. 1841, and the form of judgment provided by Section VII. of the said Act, shall be altered by employing the words "twenty" instead of "ten" in every case of conviction before him, whether under the powers originally given to him by the said Act, or the extended powers given to him by this Act.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 15th of September 1849.

ACT No. — OF 1849.

*An Act to incorporate a Company for building a Pier at Madras.*

Whereas a Company has been formed for building a Pier at Madras, which undertaking will be of great public utility, and ought to be encouraged, It is enacted as follows:—

I. A deed of partnership for the said Company shall be prepared, subject to the approval of the Advocate General of the East India Company at Madras, and as soon as the deed so approved shall have been executed by the holders of four-fifths of the whole number of the shares in the said undertaking, either

personally or by their lawfully constituted Attornies, and one-tenth part of the value of each share shall have been paid into the Bank of Madras, or invested in Government Securities on account of the said Company, any seven or more persons, parties to the said deed, may apply to the Supreme Court of Judicature established by a Royal Charter at Madras, by Petition, for leave to register the said deed in the Supreme Court, and the said Court, on being satisfied that the provisions of this Act have been duly complied with, shall order the deed to be so registered.

II. The original Capital Stock of the said Company shall be five lakhs of Rupees, and shall be divided into one thousand shares, each of five hundred Rupees, and the amount of the Capital Stock may be at any time increased, by the creation of new shares of five hundred Rupees, to such amount as shall be approved by the Governor of Fort St George in Council: but no such increase of Capital Stock shall be allowed to be made until a Memorial of such increase shall have been registered with the approval of the Governor in Council in the said Supreme Court.

III. Upon the registry of the deed of partnership, the persons by whom the said deed is executed, and all persons who shall thereafter become possessed of any share in the said undertaking, and their successors, shall be incorporated by the style of "The Madras Pier Company," and by that name shall have perpetual succession and a common Seal, and shall plead and be impleaded in all Courts, and before all Justices and others, and may purchase and hold lands for the purposes of this Act.

IV. No action or suit, by or against the said Company, shall be affected by reason of the Plaintiff or Defendant therein being or having been a shareholder of the Company: but any such Shareholder, either alone, or jointly with any other person or persons, as against the Company, or the Company as against such shareholder, either alone, or jointly with any other person or persons, shall have the same right of action and remedy in respect of any cause whatever as if the same had arisen with a stranger.

V. Subject to the regulations of the deed of partnership, every shareholder may sell and transfer his shares in the said Company by deed in the form given in the Schedule (marked A) annexed to this Act, or to the like effect; and the same, when duly executed, shall be delivered to the Secretary to the Company, who shall make an entry thereof in a book to be called the Register of transfers, and shall endorse such entry on the deed of transfer, for which entry and endorsement the Company shall be entitled to have the sum of one Rupee, and the Secretary shall give to the purchaser an acknowledgment of the transfer having been completed: and until such entry and endorsement are made, the purchaser of the share shall not be entitled to receive any share of the profits of the undertaking, or to vote in respect of such share.

VI. The Company shall not be bound to see to the execution of any trust, whether express, implied, or constructive, to which any share is subject, and whether or not they have had notice of such trust, and the receipt of the person in whose name any share stands in the books of the Company, or in the case of a minor, idiot, or lunatic, of his or her guardian or Committee, or when more than one person is interested in any share, the receipt of the person whose name stands first in the register, opposite to such share, shall be a sufficient discharge to the Company for any dividend on account of such share, and the Company shall not be bound to see to the application of the money paid on such receipt.

VII. The Capital Stock of the said Company, and the lands, works, and buildings belonging to them, and all the property of the said Company, shall be held by them, and their successors, as personal estate, and not as of the nature of real estate.

VIII. All suits brought against the said Company shall be brought in the Supreme Court of Judicature at Fort St George, and not elsewhere, except as hereinafter provided, in the case of neglect or abandonment of the Pier.

IX. Service of any notice, writ, or other proceeding, personally upon any Manager or Secretary of the Madras Pier Company, or by leaving the same with any clerk in the service of the said Company at their office or place of business, shall be deemed good service upon the said Company.

X. The said Madras Pier Company shall be empowered to build a Pier or landing place on such part of the beach of the Town of Madras as they shall think fit, but if built more than yards southward of the present Custom House, not without the approval of the Governor of Fort St. George in Council, and for that purpose shall be empowered to dig out the beach and soil at and near the place of such Pier, and to make all fit and convenient approaches thereunto, and, if they think fit, to enclose such approaches, and also to establish and maintain cranes and weighing houses, toll gates and houses, and all other buildings and appurtenances for landing and shipping men, animals, and goods of all kinds at the said Pier, and for securing payment of the tolls hereinafter mentioned.

XI. The said Madras Pier Company may lay and maintain, from any part of the said Pier to the Custom House for the time being, at Madras, such railways or tram roads as the said Company, with the approval of the Governor in Council, shall think fit, under such restrictions and regulations, where the same shall cross any public road or way, as the Governor in Council shall think fit.

XII. The said Madras Pier Company may lay down pipes for the supply of water to the shipping along the said Pier, and from the Pier to the Government water-works, or such other tanks, wells, and reservoirs of water as they think fit; and may dig into any of the public thoroughfares for the purpose of laying or repairing any such pipes, under such restrictions as the Governor in Council shall think fit, for causing as little obstruction as possible to the public thoroughfares; and the Company shall be bound, with as little delay as possible, to restore any thoroughfare to its former state at their own expense.

XIII. The said Madras Pier Company shall be bound to light the said Pier and the approaches thereto, by means of a sufficient number of lamps, to the satisfaction of the Governor in Council.

XIV. The Madras Pier Company shall be empowered to make, from time to time, such bye-laws as they shall find necessary for keeping order and preventing nuisances on the Pier and the approaches thereunto, and for regulating the approach and stations of boats and vessels near the said Pier, and for the behaviour of the boatmen and others making use of the said Pier, and may impose penalties for the breach of such bye-laws, not exceeding the sum of fifty Rupees for any one offence, or, in the case of continuing nuisance, not exceeding the sum of five Rupees for every day during which the nuisance is continued.

XV. No such bye-law shall be of force until approved by the Governor of Fort St. George in Council, nor until the same, as approved by the Governor in Council, has been published for one week in the *Madras Gazette*: and a copy of the *Gazette* containing such bye-law shall be proof in all Courts and before all Justices that the same was duly made and approved.

XVI. The Madras Pier Company shall be entitled to have, from all persons using the said Pier, such tolls as they, by any bye-law, from time to time shall think fit to impose, not exceeding the rate of the tolls set forth in the Schedule marked B, annexed to this Act.

XVII. Copies of all bye-laws made under this Act shall be put up so as to be easily read in English and Dukkinée in the Office of the Company, and in some conspicuous place or places on the Pier: and a copy of all such bye-laws shall be given by the Company, either in English or Dukkinée, to every person applying for the same, on payment of four Annas, and the Company shall be liable to a penalty of fifty Rupees for every day during which, by their default, such copies are not put and kept up in the Office and on the Pier, as aforesaid.

XVIII. The Madras Pier Company, by themselves or their servants, may stop any person neglecting or refusing to pay any toll which may be lawfully payable by him or her for the use of the said Pier, and may seize and distrain any boat, carriage, or other conveyance, or any horse or other animal, or any goods carried or drawn thereon or thereby, for which a toll is lawfully payable, and if such toll and the reasonable costs of such seizure and distraint are not paid within twenty-four hours next after such seizure, may sell the same and reimburse themselves for all costs and charges incident to such seizure and sale, over and above the amount of the toll, returning the overplus, if any, to the owner, on demand.

XIX. All disputes concerning the amount of any toll, or the charge of keeping and selling any distress, may be heard and determined by any Justice of the Peace for the Town of Madras, who shall have power to examine as well the servants of the Company as the person charged with payment of the toll, and all other witnesses, and to award such sum as he shall think fit, to be payable for costs and damages by one party to the other; all which costs and damages shall be recovered, with the costs of the proceedings, in like manner as penalties imposed under this Act.

XX. The tolls collected under this Act, and all sums of money received by way of composition for tolls, shall be applied, in the first place, to defray the wages of the Toll Collectors, and other expenses absolutely necessary for the collection of the tolls, and in the next place to repairing, maintaining, cleaning, and lighting the Pier, and the works and buildings connected therewith, and in the next place to pay such salaries and expenses as are sanctioned by the Company, and to the improvement of the Pier and other works, as the Company, from time to time, shall resolve; and then in payment of such dividends as the Company, from time to time, shall declare to be payable.

XXI. The Owners and Masters, or persons having charge of any vessel lying in the roadstead of Madras, shall be jointly and severally answerable for any damage or mischief done to the Pier or works of the said Company by their vessels respectively, or any boat belonging thereto, or by any Seaman, Boatman, or other person employed by them respectively, and shall be liable to pay any compensation and costs of the proceedings on account of such damage or mischief, which may be recovered in one of the Supreme Courts of Judicature established at Madras, Calcutta, and Bombay, or when the amount does not exceed two hundred Rupees, may be awarded to be paid by a Justice of the Peace of the Town of Madras: and all sums so awarded to be paid by a Justice of the Peace may be recovered, in like manner as penalties under this Act.

XXII. The Madras Pier Company and their servants shall be empowered to seize any person whom they shall find destroying or damaging the said Pier and works, or committing any breach of the bye-laws made for prevention of nuisances thereon, and to detain him in Custody until he can be carried before a Justice of the Peace for the Town of Madras, to be dealt with according to law.

XXIII. Payment of all sums of money awarded to be paid by any Justice of the Peace under this Act, and all penalties imposed by any such Justice, shall be

enforced and recovered as pecuniary penalties incurred under Act IV. 1842.

XXIV. The Madras Pier Company shall be bound to allow the free and equal use of the said Pier, and the approaches thereunto, to all persons desirous of using the same, and tendering the tolls payable under this Act; and every Officer or Servant of the said Company, who shall wilfully obstruct any person desirous of lawfully using the said Pier, or who shall assault or use any scurrilous or abusive language toward any person using or desirous of using the said Pier, shall, on conviction thereof before any Justice of the Peace for the Town of Madras, forfeit and pay such penalty as the Justice shall award, not exceeding fifty Rupees.

XXV. Whether or not any penalty shall have been imposed on the actual offender, the Madras Pier Company shall be liable to be sued in an action on the case for any loss, damage or inconvenience sustained by any person lawfully using or desirous of lawfully using the said Pier, or the approaches thereunto, through any wilful obstruction, hindrance, or delay caused to such person by any of their Officers or Servants.

XXVI. The Master Attendant, and his Deputy the Collector of Sea Customs, and his Deputy, with their Boats, Vessels, and Crews, and also all Officers of Customs and Police Officers, in the discharge of their duty, shall be allowed to use the said Pier at all times, and freely to pass and repass thereon without payment of any toll.

XXVII. Grain and all other goods may be landed at the said Pier, without being liable to any penalty, under Section X. Act IV., 1842.

XXVIII. A plan and specification of the intended Pier, according to an estimate of cost not less than Three Lakhs of Rupees, shall be deposited in the Office of the Chief Secretary to the Government of Fort St. George, within six months after the registry of the said partnership deed: and if the Madras Pier Company shall not proceed to build the said Pier, with all convenient despatch, and to expend thereon and on the approaches thereto at least Fifty Thousand Rupees, in every period of twelve months after the deposit of the said plan and specification until the completion of the said work, according to the said plan and specification, with such alterations as shall be, from time to time, approved by the Governor in Council, or if the said Pier shall be at any time thereafter abandoned or left in a ruinous and unserviceable condition, the Governor of Fort St. George in Council may cause notice of the default to be given to the said Madras Pier Company: and if the Madras Pier Company thereupon shall neglect for the space of one year after receiving such notice, to remove all the material of the said Pier, the Governor of Fort St. George in Council may take possession of the said Pier and approaches, which shall thenceforth become the property of the East India Company, discharged from all claim on the part of the said Madras Pier Company, and the said Governor in Council may either complete or repair the said Pier, or remove and sell the materials thereof; and if the Governor in Council shall remove the materials of the said Pier within one year from the time of taking possession thereof, and the proceeds of the sale of such materials shall not be sufficient to defray the costs of such taking possession, removal and sale, the East India Company may recover the amount of such deficiency by an action or actions at law to be brought either against the Madras Pier Company, or against all or any of the shareholders of the said Madras Pier Company, in any of the Supreme Courts of Judicature in India, or Superior Courts of Law in Great Britain or Ireland, as if they were not incorporated, and were jointly and severally liable to make good the amount of such deficiency.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 22nd September 1849 :

Act No. — OF 1849.

*An Act for better defining the special duty levied on Tobacco in Bombay.*

Whereas the laws in force respecting the special duty payable on Tobacco imported into Bombay are obscure, and require to be explained and amended, It is declared and enacted as follows :—

I. Regulations XXXIII. 1827, and XV. 1828, of the Bombay Code, and so much of Act No. I. 1838, as relates to the customary or special duty levied on the import of Tobacco into the Island of Bombay, are rescinded and repealed.

II. All Tobacco imported into the Island of Bombay, from whatever port or place it is carried, is and shall continue to be liable to the payment of a special duty, levied at the rate of nine rupees for the Indian maund, which duty shall be paid instead of all other customs duty, either on importation, or after being warehoused in the Custom House Warehouse, on being delivered out for internal consumption, or for exportation, at the option of the importer : and no drawback of the said duty shall be allowed on exportation, unless the Tobacco has been warehoused in the Custom House Warehouse, and then only on exportation to the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, in which case a drawback of seven-eighths of the duty leviable shall be allowed, if claimed at the time of re-exportation.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India, after the 22nd day of December next.

The Report must consist of ten Medical Cases and ten Surgical Cases, selected by the Author from among those submitted to his care while officiating as Clinical Clerk and Surgical Dresser.

The history of the case, and the daily reports, must be the work of the Author, from observation of the case while under his care. Each case must be accompanied by "Remarks" relating to the Pathology, the causes and treatment of the disease in the particular instance, with allusions to analogies or striking differences between it and other instances of the same disease which may have been treated in the Clinical wards, or in the other wards of the Hospital, during the present or preceding Session.

In awarding this Prize, regard will be paid to the care, the accuracy, completeness, and conciseness with which the history and daily reports of the cases are drawn up; and also to the intelligence and practical knowledge evinced in the selection of the cases, and in the remarks appended to them.

### VIII.

*Prize consisting of PEREIRA'S MATERIA MEDICA, and ROXBURGH'S FLORA INDICA, presented by VENAYUK GUNGADHUR SHASTREE, ESQ.*

To be awarded to the Student of the College who, in addition to a good knowledge of *Materia Medica*, shews the greatest acquaintance with *Indian Plants*.

*Conditions of Competition applicable to all the Scholarships and Prizes.*

1. Competition for the Scholarships is open both to Free and Stipendiary Students.

2. The award of the Scholarships will be determined partly by the results of the Examinations, held at the close of the Session, but in a great measure also from the estimate formed during the Session, of the industry, assiduity, proficiency, and propriety of demeanour of the competitors.

3. The Scholarships will be held for a period of one year.

4. A *minimum* standard of proficiency will be fixed on, and should this standard not be exceeded, the Scholarships will not be awarded.

5. In the event of a Student being the successful competitor for more than one Scholarship, he shall, in addition to the award of one Scholarship, receive some honorary mark of distinction, but the second Scholarship shall pass down to the proficient in the next degree.

6. In the event of other Prizes being awarded to the successful competitor for a Scholarship, he shall receive the Prize in addition to the Scholarship.

7. The presence of the Students in the College and Hospital will be ascertained by roll-call, at least four times daily, throughout the Session; and those Students who, during the Session, have been absent from more than 15 roll-calls, exclusive of absence on recognised holidays, from sickness, duly certified, and leave granted on unavoidable grounds, will not be permitted to compete for these Scholarships.

8. Those Students whose English Exercises, written during the Session, shew a marked want of attention to improvement in Composition, will also be debarred from competing for these Scholarships.

9. Should the written Exercises, required as part of the Examination for the Scholarships, shew a marked want of attention to improvement in English Composition, the writer will be held disqualified for a Scholarship, whatever his qualifications in other respects may be.

10. The successful competitors will be required to shew, by the result of the general Examination at the close of the Session, that they have not neglected any of the branches of study with



which they may have been engaged during their attendance in the College. Deficiency in this respect will disqualify for the Scholarships.

GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

The following Report of the Board of Conservancy, submitted to Government by the Worshipful Bench of Her Majesty's Justices, is published for general information.

*By order of the Right Hon'ble the Governor in Council,*

Bombay Castle, 27th September 1849.

The Board of Conservancy have the honor of laying before the Worshipful Bench the following Report of their proceedings during the past official year, with detailed Statements of their receipts and disbursements, contemplated by Section XVIII. of the Municipal Act XI. of 1845.

2nd. The Statements herewith forwarded will, the Board trust, afford the Bench full information, not only upon all matters connected with the income and expenditure on account of the Municipal Fund to the 30th April last, but also regarding the various works for the improvement of the Island, completed, or in progress, under the direction of the Board.

3rd. APPENDIX A is an account of the actual income and expenditure of the Municipal Fund from the 1st May 1848 to 30th April 1849, and of its assets and liabilities under the latter date. It shows that during that period the receipts amounted to..... Co's Rs. 3,36,855 14 3

It may be proper here to mention that, in the above stated amount of expenditure is included a sum of Rupees 13,303-7-0, advanced to the Contractor for repairing Roads, in order to enable him to procure tools, materials, &c.; while, on the other hand, in the amount of receipts is comprised the portion of that advance, Rupees 10,000, repaid by the Contractor. The former cannot be considered an ordinary item of expenditure, nor the latter one of income—strictly speaking, therefore, the actual income amounted to Rs. 3,26,855 14 3

From the explanation at the foot of this account, the Worshipful Bench will observe that there was due to the Sub-Treasurer on the 30th April last the sum of Rupees 55,089-8-0, on account of advances made by him under the credit which Government was pleased to grant on that Officer in favor of the Fund. Against that sum that Officer holds Government paper, belonging to the Fund, to the amount of Rupees 39,213-5-4.

5th. In the Returns annexed to the Board's former Reports, the various items of expenditure on account of new works, repairs, &c., were distinguished with reference principally to the periods when, and the authorities by whom, they had been sanctioned. But a distinction founded on such circumstances appearing to be no longer necessary, the Board have, in the Statements submitted with this Report, exhibited the outgoings from the Fund under heads indicative of the nature and objects of the expenditure. According to this classification the Worshipful Bench and the Government will be enabled at once to perceive what sums have been laid out during the past year on new works and improvements, how much expended in repairs to Public Buildings, Tanks, Wells, &c., and what has been paid for keeping in repair and watering the roads, for scavenging and for other purposes.

APPENDIX B shows the expenditure incurred for new works, and charges connected therewith, from 1st May 1848 to 30th April 1849; also the saving effected in respect to such works as were completed during that period, and the amount required on account of those which remained unfinished on the 1st May 1849.

APPENDIX C shows the expenditure incurred on account of repairs to public works, &c., from 1st May 1848 to 30th April 1849, with the saving effected in respect to such repairs as were completed during that period, and the amount required on account of such as were not completed on the 1st May 1849. It also exhibits the payments made under clause IX. of Act XI. of 1845.

APPENDIX D shows the expenditure incurred for repairing and watering the roads, for scavenging, lighting, &c., from 1st May 1848 to 30th April 1849.

6th. On new works and improvements, of which a detail is given in Appendix B, the Bench will perceive that there has been expended during the past year Rupees 87,654-14-0. Of this sum, Rupees 54,172-13-4 are on account of new works sanctioned during the year, and the remainder for works sanctioned in former years. The actual cost of new works brought to completion in 1848-49 was less than the sanctioned amount, Rupees 89,221-9-5, by Rupees 15,511-7-9; the particulars of which saving will be seen on reference to the Statement.

7th. The expenditure under the head of Repairs to Public Buildings, &c., amounted to Rupees 5,172-2-1, and for Repairs to Public Tanks and Wells, Rupees 1,290-5-7, as shown in Appendix C.

8th. From Appendix D the Bench will observe that there has been expended for repairing and watering the roads, Rupees 82,303-14-10; and for scavenging, Rupees 35,000.

9th. Of the chief public works which were noticed in the Board's last Report, as then in progress, or which it was proposed to execute, the following have been completed, or nearly so, during the past season:—

*Parell Road.*—The improvement of this road, the principal thoroughfare of the island, between its divergence from the Breach Candy road to the commencement of the Bhendy Bazar, a distance of about five thousand feet, has been the most important and costly work of the

present season. Covered drains have been, throughout its length, substituted for the former open side gutters; its junction (near Pydownee) with the Bhendy Bazar Road and Copper-smith Street has been much improved by the removal of three houses; the dangerous corner formed by the wall of the Mombadavy Tank enclosure has been done away with; and the ground formerly occupied by the Kalbadavy Pagoda and the adjoining houses, (by which the thoroughfare was much narrowed,) has been taken into the road, and the whole of the steps formerly projecting into the street have been removed. The road-way has been relaid, and a proper section given to it.

*Main Town Drain.*—For the purpose of preventing the nuisance (one of the most complained of in the Island) formerly arising from the uncovered portion of the Main Town Drain, the expedient alluded to in their last annual Report has been resorted to. The banks have been raised in such a manner as to admit of the drain being flushed with salt water. The emission of any offensive effluvia has been found to cease with a depth of two feet of salt water; and the banks will now admit of a depth of upwards of 4 feet at the commencement of the uncovered portion of the drain, and of a depth of nearly 7 feet at the Bellasis Road Bridge, which formerly the salt water did not reach at all. Circumstances did not admit of the experiment being tried until late in the season; but its results were then so satisfactory that the Board entertain a confident hope that the arrangements made will have the effect of completely remedying the Drain Nuisance. This has been the most important sanitary work of the season.

*Grant College Drain.*—The formation of a covered drain, 1,465 feet in length, from the North of the Grant College compound to the junction of Bellasis and Duncan Roads, is also an important work, as providing drainage for a portion of the Town which was formerly frequently flooded during the Monsoon; and thereby affording the means for remedying the disreputable state of the adjacent compounds.

*Kandia Tank Street.*—This important thoroughfare has been opened out into the Bhendy Bazar Road, by the removal of the intervening houses, and the extension of the road over the ground which they occupied.

*Oomercarry Sewer Lane.*—The opening of this thoroughfare, 960 feet in length (which has been constructed over the Oomercarry Sewer, arched over in 1845), is a great convenience to the densely populated districts it traverses, and by improving their ventilation, and rendering them accessible to the Police, and Overseers, is calculated to improve their sanitary condition.

*Public Necessary.*—A public necessary has been constructed in the neighbourhood of Shaik Abdoola Packmoria Street, on a plan which admits of its serving also as a place of deposit for the neighbouring Hallalcores' Baskets, and of the night soil thus collected being daily emptied into tank carts, by which it is conveyed to the sea channel of the Sluices during the rains, and to the Cesspools in the flats during the fair weather.

*Improvement of the approaches of the Vegetable, Mutton, and Fish Markets.*—By this work, which has involved the construction of about 500 feet of new road, and the removal of the greater portion of two houses, the east side of the Vegetable and Mutton Market, and the western side of the Fish Market have been cleared, and both Markets are now completely accessible on all sides.

*2nd. Bhoewada Street.*—In this street, 542 feet in length, covered drains have been substituted for the former open side gutters, and the road-way has been re-made.

*1st. Bhoewada Street.*—In this street, 530 feet in length, similar improvements have been effected.

*In Syed Abdool Rahimon Street, and Beebee Jan cross road,* formerly a filthy unmade passage, 245 feet in length, the road has been raised, properly drained, and macadamized.

*Shaik Abdoola Packmoria and Bhendy Bazar cross road.*—This new road (260 feet in length) between the above-mentioned two streets, has been constructed over a portion of the Oomercarry Sewer.

*Moongavur Packady; 1st row.*—This street, 268 feet in length, forming the principal approach to the Mazagon Dock Yard, hitherto unmade, has now been raised and macadamized.

*10th.* The other works, which have been performed during the past season—such as the levelling of the Moongavur Packady, 1st row, at Mazagon, the excavation of cesspools in the

flats, widening and improving portions of certain roads, cleaning and repairing tanks and wells, annual repairs to the markets, sluices, public necessities, slaughter houses, deepening and cleaning the channel of the town drain, &c.—do not call for particular notice.

11th. The Board are happy to be able to report that the number of gullies requiring to be paved at the public expense, still continues to decrease, on account of the natives now readily paving such passages themselves.

12th. Amongst the improvements contemplated by the Board when their last Report was submitted, were the following:—

Making cross drains and re-making road-way in Syed Abdool Rehmon Street.

Making covered drains on both sides in Picquet Road.

Opening out Khutterwadee Street in Wittulwadee.

Making cross drains and re-making road-way in Mirza Oil-maker, Street.

Covering over a small portion of the Oomercary Sewer between Duncan and Grant Roads, and making a road-way and cross drains.

But the state of the Municipal Fund did not admit of these works being undertaken during the past season. The Board propose, however, to have such of them as are most needed for the public comfort or convenience executed during the ensuing year.

13. In their last Report the Board remarked that the income of the Fund for 1847-48 from all sources, which had been estimated at Rupees 4,02,130, had amounted only to Rupees 2,76,667, owing to the collections on account of the House Assessment, Wheel Tax, and Shop and Stall Tax having fallen much short of what might fairly have been expected. Having special reference to the experience of that year, and seeing little prospect of an improvement in the Collections, the Board, in preparing the estimate of the income for 1848-49, made a large allowance for out-standing balances, as well as for current dues that might remain unrealized, and set down the prospective receipts of the year at Rupees 3,61,469. The actual income, however, as the accounts now submitted show, fell short of even this sum, having amounted to Rupees 3,26,855-14-3,—or, to speak more correctly, only to Rupees 3,14,834-6-3, as the former sum includes a contribution from Government of Rupees 12,021-8-0 not anticipated in the estimate. The deficiency in this, as in the preceding year, is attributable to the backward state of the collections on account of the above-mentioned taxes, forming the principal sources of the income of the Municipal Fund.

This will be manifest from the following Abstract of the sums due, and the sums got in on account of those taxes. :—

14th. The aggregate Collections of the year, both on account of current dues and arrears of former years, did not equal the amount of the former alone; and in consequence, instead of a reduction, a large increase has taken place in the out-standing balances. These, on the 1st May last, amounted to no less than Rupees 2,98,063-8-0. Of this sum a considerable portion

is now irrecoverable, and the Board fear that, unless effectual measures are speedily adopted for the realization of the arrears, much that might now be collected will be irretrievably lost. There is, the Board would add, an equally urgent need for arrangements calculated to ensure the regular collection of the current dues, otherwise heavy losses must arise from their being allowed to fall into arrear.

15. The Board are aware that the Worshipful Bench have no control over the Collector of the Wheel Tax, nor over the Collector of the Shop and Stall Tax, these Officers being appointed by Government; and also that the House Assessment is collected by the Superintendent of Police, under an arrangement between Government and the Bench, for a term of years, which has not yet expired. Still, considering how much the means of carrying out public improvements have been contracted within the last few years by the state of the collections, the Board deem it incumbent on them to notice the subject in this place, not doubting that the Worshipful Bench will draw the attention of Government to the matter in such a manner as a due regard to the interests of the public may suggest.

16th. APPENDIX E is a prospective estimate of the income, certain expenditure, and probable balance of the Fund available for its general purposes, during the official year that will end on the 30th April 1850. In this Estimate, as was done in that of last year, a large allowance has been made for sums due to the Fund which may not be collected within the year. The actual receipts in the ensuing season, from all sources, are estimated at Rs. 3,39,049 9 1

as the probable amount available for public improvements during the current year.

17th. There are several works of public utility, the execution of which the Board are obliged to postpone, owing to the present state of the Fund. Those to which, besides the works alluded to in para. 12, they propose to direct their attention in the current season, are the following, which appear to be most required for promoting the health of the Town, or for the comfort or convenience of the inhabitants.

The purification of Back Bay is amongst the most important of the works proposed to be executed next season. It is proposed to effect this by preventing altogether the emptying of sweepers' baskets, or other filth, into the sea at Back Bay, by altering the construction of the Sonapoor necessary in such a manner as to admit of its also serving the sweepers as a place of deposit for their baskets, and by arranging for the whole of the filth there collected, which now flows into the Bay, being carried away in carts to the cesspools in the flats; also by arching over the uncovered portion of the Pork Market sewer, and by the general improvement of the suburb of Sonapoor.

It is intended to cover up the Town Drain from Bapoo Khote Street to Parell Road, at Pydownee, and to make a street over it. By this work the only portion of the drain in the heart of the Town which remains uncovered, will be arched over, and a new road provided, that will conduce greatly to the convenience of the public.

The construction of a main sewer and cross drains in Pydownee Row from 2nd Don Tar Row to Parell Road, near Pydownee Bridge. This work will admit of a populous district, which suffers much from filth and other nuisances, as well as from insufficient drainage, being thoroughly cleansed.

The Bhooleshwur Road, from Cawasjee Patell's Tank to the gate which leads to the Panjrapole, is one of the most crowded thoroughfares in the native town. It is proposed to widen this road, and to make covered side drains and cross drains.

A covered Drain on the side of the Esplanade Cross Road—This is much required, the present side gutters being in a most filthy state.

In Gunneshwadee, or Sootarchallee, Street it is intended that the present open side gutters should be converted into covered drains, the road-way being re-made.

The construction of a proper road-way in Dongry Jao Souza Cross Street, and of a lane leading from old Nagpada Street to Gorra Molla, is also contemplated.

The traffic through the present great thoroughfare, the Girgaum and Parell roads, would be greatly relieved, were a more direct communication formed between the Fort and Tar Deo, where the Mahaluxmee road commences, which leads to the populous districts of Worlee and Mahim. This would be effected by the construction of the road from Trimbeck Furashram Street, or from Waddington's Bridge, to Tar Deo, which was laid down amongst the proposed improvements to be effected as soon as Government should be enabled to take possession of such portion of the lands under the Foras tenure as might be required for public purposes. The Board hope to be able to undertake the construction of the new road above indicated in the ensuing season; and if the arrangements for enabling Government to obtain possession of the required land have not yet been brought to a conclusion, the Board would suggest that the attention of Government be drawn to the desirableness of effecting this object as early as may be practicable.

18th. The Board have to beg that the Worshipful Bench will, in submitting this Report to Government, be so good as to recommend that the Board may be at liberty to consider the estimated surplus of income over the expenditure, amounting, say to Rupees (80,000) eighty thousand, at their disposal during the current year, for carrying out new works of improvement, subject of course, in the cases provided for in the Act, to the approval of the Bench and the sanction of Government.
