PROCLAMATION.

BOMBAY TO WIT.—By virtue of a Precept to me directed, I hereby proclaim and give notice, that the Session of Oyer and Terminer, and General Gaol Delivery, will be holden before the Supreme Court of Judicature at Bom-

bay, at the Court House, on Monday, 3rd of December next, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon, for the trial of all Treasons, Murders, and other Felonies, Perjuries, Trespasses, and other Crimes and Misdemeanors, had, done, or committed within the Town and Island of Bombay, and the Limits thereof, and the Factories subordinate thereto; and also to enquire, hear, and determine in like manner, all Treasons, Murders, Felonies, Forgeries, Perjuries, Crimes, Extortions, Misdemeanors, Trespasses, Wrongs, Oppressions, had, done, or committed by any of Her Majesty's British Subjects in any of the Territories which now are subject to, or dependent upon, the said Government of Bombay, or within any of the Dominions of the Native Princes of India in alliance with the said Government.

And also, that at the same time and place will be holden a Session of Admiralty, for the trial of all Treasons, Murders, Piracies, Robberies, Trespasses, Misdemeanors, and other Crimes and Offences, had, done, perpetrated, or committed on the High Seas.

And I hereby give notice to all persons bound to prosecute, and give evidence at the above Sessions, or in any way concerned therein, that they are to attend at the time and place above mentioned, and not to depart without leave of the Court.

And I hereby give notice to all Justices of the Peace, Coroners, Escheators, and also all Chief Constables and Bailiffs of the Town and Island of Bombay and the Limits thereof, that they be then

and there in their own persons, with their Rolls, Records, Indictments, and other remembrances, to do those things which to their offices in that behalf appertain to be done.—Dated this fourteenth day of November, 1849, and in the thirteenth year of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria.

The lists in question exhibit the current selling rate of each article in Company's Rupees. PUBLIC ORDER

To regulate the religious procession of the Mohurram, and for the preservation of the public peace during that festival, sanctioned by the Right Honorable the Governor in Council, as provided for by Rule, Ordinance, and Regulation II. A. D. 1827.

1st. Every person desirous of erecting or carrying about a *Taboot*, *Punjia*, or *Dholeka Punjia*, at the ensuing Mohurram, must obtain a license from the Magistrates of Police; and a license will be granted to no persons except Musulmans.

2nd. The licenses shall bear the signature of the Magistrate of Police, and all persons obtaining them shall be bound to produce them when demanded by any authority having a right so to do; any refusal to do so shall be held to be a breach of these rules.

3d. Each *Taboot* is to have but one set of "*Tassa*," one set of "*Dholee*," one "*Karnah*," and fifteen "*Hillals*."

4th. Any persons who may be seen carrying a Sword, Dirk, Bludgeon, or other offensive weapon, will be taken into custody.

5th. *Taboots* meeting on the public road are to give way to one another in the same manner that carriages do, each *Taboot* keeping to the left.

6th. *Taboots* are not permitted to go abreast on the public road, but they are to follow each other in a peaceable manner.

7th. No *Taboots* are allowed to go in procession on the last night of the Mohurram before 12 o'clock, or to continue so after 3 o'clock on the following morning. These processions are limited (on the last night and day of the Mohurram) to the Blendy Bazaar Road, Duncan Road, Chinch Bunder, and Market Streets; and *Taboots* are not to be taken out on the last day before 12 o'clock; and on meeting carriages and horsemen, are strictly enjoined to cease playing country music until they shall have passed the *Taboots*, keeping the left side of the road; and it is directed, that they be thrown into the sea, and the ceremony concluded by 5 o'clock p. m.

8th. No procession of the *Zool Junnah* or Horse through the public streets or road will be permitted.

9th. All persons licensed to sell Spirituous Liquors, and all venders of Opium and Bhang, are enjoined to keep their shops closed; and persons found selling anything of an intoxicating nature during the aforesaid period, will be taken into custody and punished.

10th. Any persons violating any of the above rules, or behaving in any manner likely to create a breach of the peace, or making a disturbance of any kind, will be immediately taken into custody, and dealt with according to law.

No. 565 of 1849.—The Right Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to direct the publication of the following rules connected with the formation and conservation of Cantonments, in addition to those already existing, and as an addenda to those of 1838 :—

2. The limits of every Military Cantonment shall be fixed by the Commanding Officer of the Station, in concert with the Political Officer or Collector of the District, marked by boundary stones, or in some other equally permanent manner, and the description thereof published in general orders.
3. A plan of every Cantonment so marked, to be signed by these authorities, will be kept in the Quarter Master General's Office, where it will be duly registered.
4. Officers Commanding Divisions of the Army, or in charge of Cantonments, shall not permit dwelling houses, or such like buildings to be erected within the limits of a military station, until they shall have obtained the sanction of Government, through the prescribed channel.
5. The preservation of cleanliness is of the first importance; and to this end, the encroachment of huts or shops, temporary or otherwise, beyond the space already marked out for that purpose, or extending enclosures or courtyards without the sanction of Government, is to be particularly prevented. Any person erecting such buildings without this necessary sanction, shall be liable to have them demolished, and he will be required to remove the materials at his own cost.
6. All persons residing within Military Cantonments are required to keep all drains and water channels, in and about their premises, free from obstructions; to remove all causes of Malaria, to keep their hedges, inner and outer, cut to the height of four feet from the level of the road, and branches of trees within their premises to be lopped off to the height of six feet, and to discontinue the use of the prickly pear as a hedge.
7. Owners of houses within Cantonments, not being resident Military Officers, are required to have their names registered in the Major of Brigade or Station Staff Officer's Office, together with the *bona fide* value of their buildings, the monthly rent, and the names of their occupants.
8. The rent of all buildings to be limited to 20 per cent. of their *bona fide* value, if taken from month to month, or 15 per cent. if for a period of 12 months; and in case of dispute, this value to be determined by a Committee of Arbitration, as laid down in Jameson's Code, Article 241, Section X. page 112.
9. But as no rules can be framed for making this estimate, the Committee will be guided by their own judgment and experience, when taking into consideration the value of the materials composing each building, its state of repair, accommodation, and general convenience.
10. Should the rent charged be found to exceed 20 per cent. in the former case, and 15 in the latter, of the *bona fide* value of the buildings, it shall be reduced to that standard. It is to be understood that this per-centage includes the cost of all annual and necessary repairs, &c., should the house owner be bound to make them.
11. In the event of the house owner refusing to lower his rent, or decline to make the repairs required, should such be his agreement, the tenant will be at liberty, with the previous sanction of the Officer Commanding the Station, to make them himself, deducting the cost thereof, as well as the sum in excess of the per-centage laid down in the preceding para., from the rent.
12. The above rules are to be considered applicable to all Military Stations under this Presidency, excepting the Garrison of Bombay.

2nd. The Troops which shall cross to the West of the Sutledge and Beas, after the date of this Order, shall receive the usual marching and Cantonment rates receivable in other Divisions of the Army, with the exception of Troops who may be stationed across the River Indus.

3rd. These Troops being on the extreme frontier of a newly-conquered country, and required to be in constant readiness to move at a moment's notice, will, for the present, and until further orders, continue to receive Scinde allowances.

4th. The Native mustered Establishments, including Dooly Bearers and others attached to Troops stationed across the Indus, will in like manner receive Field Batta when so serving.

5th. The Troops now serving in the Punjaub will continue to receive Scinde allowances until, in the course of relief, they shall cross to the Eastward of the Sutledge or Beas.

6th. Companies of Sappers and Pioneers, or other Native Troops, and Natives attached to Troops and Companies of European Artillery now serving in the Punjaub, and who may not be relieved, will continue to receive Scinde allowances till the 1st January 1850.

The Honorable the President of the Council of India in Council, with the concurrence of the Most Noble the Governor General, has been pleased to resolve that Medical Officers attached to Residencies, or to Political Agencies, shall, in like manner with Medical Officers employed in the Civil and Military Departments, be subject to the control, in professional matters, of the Superintending Surgeon of the District in which they may be stationed, and that such control shall be exercised by the Superintending Surgeon, notwithstanding that he and the Residency or the Agency Medical Officer may belong to different Presidencies.

This order is to be considered applicable to all the Presidencies.

The following Act, No. XIV. of 1849, passed by the Hon'ble the President of the Council of India in Council, with the concurrence of the Most Noble the Governor General, is published for general information :—

ACT No. XIV. of 1849.

Passed by the Hon'ble the President of the Council of India in Council, on the 25th August 1849, with the assent of the Most Noble the Governor General of India.

To punish tampering with the Army or Navy.

Whereas the laws in force for punishing mutiny and sedition do not sufficiently provide for the punishment of all persons endeavouring to stir up mutiny and sedition among the Forces of the East India Company, or to seduce them from their allegiance and duty, It is enacted as follows :—

I. Every person, who maliciously and advisedly endeavours to seduce any person or persons, serving or engaged to serve in the Military or Naval Forces of the East India Company from his or their allegiance to Her Majesty, or duty to the said Company, or who endeavours to stir up any person or persons belonging to either of the said Services, to commit any act of mutiny, or to make or endeavour to make any mutinous assembly, or to commit any traitorous or mutinous practice whatsoever, shall, on conviction, suffer transportation for life, or imprisonment with or without hard labour for any term, not longer than seven years, as the Court shall adjudge.

II. Any person charged with any offence, punishable under this Act, may be committed by any Magistrate within the territories under the Government of the East India Company, and shall be tried by the Court of Sessions; or if the offender be not within the ordinary jurisdiction of the Court of Sessions, by the Supreme Court of Judicature, established by Royal Charter within the Presidency in which he is in custody.

III. No Court shall, on the trial of any offence under this Act, require any Futwa from any Law Officer.

IV. This Act shall not exempt any person governed by the Articles of War from being tried by a Court Martial, and punished according to the Articles of War, nor any person belonging to the Indian Navy from being tried by a Court Martial, and punished according to the laws for the observance of discipline in the Indian Navy; but no person shall be tried for the same offence under the said Articles or Laws, and also under this Act.

The following Act is passed by the Hon'ble the President of the Council of India in Council, on the 26th of October 1849, with the assent of the Most Noble the Governor General of India, which has been read and recorded.

Ordered, that the Act be promulgated for general information.

No. XV. OF 1849.

An Act to amend the Law respecting the Stamped Material in use in the Presidency of Bombay.

Whereas it is inconvenient to specify particularly by law the stamped materials to be used in the Presidency of Bombay, It is enacted as follows :

I. Clause 1st, Section VI., Regulation XVIII. 1827, of the Bombay Code, is repealed.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 26th day of October 1849 :

ACT No. — OF 1849.

An Act for better defining the Law as to the removal of Prisoners.

Whereas, by the Regulations in force, prisoners may in certain cases be removed from one prison to another by special order of the Nizamut Adawlut or Foujdaree Adawlut, and in other cases by the Governor or Governor in Council of the Presidency ; and it is expedient that the Government should be empowered to direct such removal, in every case which appears necessary, without application to the Court for a special order, It is enacted as follows :

I. Act No. VIII., 1844, is repealed.

II. When any person is under sentence of imprisonment, within the territories under the Government of the East India Company, by any authority other than that of one of the Supreme Courts of Judicature established by Royal Charter, the Governor or Governor in Council, or other person administering the Government of the Presidency or place, may order the removal of such prisoner from the prison, or place, in which he is confined, to any other public prison or

place of confinement within the same Presidency or place.

III. The time of removal from one prison to another, or while the prisoner is in custody under such warrant of removal, shall reckon as part of his imprisonment.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 26th day of January 1850.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 26th day of October, 1849 :

ACT No. — OF 1849.

An Act to amend Act X. 1841.

For amendment of Act X. 1841, It is enacted as follows :

I. Section XIII. of Act X., 1841, is repealed.

II. The Passes which, under Section XXIV. of the said Act, may be issued for conferring the privileges and advantages of a British Ship, in certain cases, to any ship or vessel built within the dominions of a Native Prince or State in subordinate alliance with, or having subsidiary treaties with the East India Company, may, after the passing of this Act, be issued in the like cases, and under the same restrictions, to any ship or vessel, belonging to any such Native Prince or State, or their subjects, wherever the same may have been built.

III. All ships or vessels, of whatever rig and of whatever tonnage, owned by British Subjects, entitled to registry under Act X., 1841, or owned by such Native Princes or States, or by their subjects entitled to Passes under Act X., 1841, as amended by this Act, employed only in coasting voyages, may be registered and obtain Passes, and the tonnage may be marked, according to such rules as shall be made from time to time by the Governor or Governor in Council of each Presidency.

Ordered that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 26th day of January 1850.

XVII. The Clerk and Bailiffs shall give security for such sum, and in such manner and form, as the Governor in Council, from time to time, shall order, for the due performance of their several offices, and for the due accounting for and payment of all monies received by them under this Act, or which they may become liable to pay for any misbehaviour in their office.

XVIII. There shall be payable in the Courts holden under this Act the fees set forth in the annexed Schedule beside the sum of two annas in the rupee on the amount of the sum claimed, which fees shall be paid over to an account to be termed the General Fund of the Court.

XIX. The rateable fee or commission shall be paid by the plaintiff before the summons issues; the other fees on every proceeding shall be paid in the first instance by the plaintiff or party on whose behalf such proceeding is to be had, on or before such proceeding: if the plaintiff recovers a less sum than he has demanded, the defendant shall not, in any case, be required to repay to him more than the fees and commission calculated upon the sum recovered. If the case is settled by agreement of the parties, before hearing, half the amount of the fees paid up to that time shall be returned to the parties by whom they have been severally paid. The Judges of the said Court may at their discretion grant summons to poor plaintiffs without deposit, or with a partial deposit of fees and commission, and also may remit costs wholly or partially to poor suitors.

XX. The Governor in Council may, at any time, lessen the amount of the fees to be taken in the Courts holden under this Act in such manner as to him shall seem fit, and may again increase such fees, so that the scale of fees given in this Act be not in any case surpassed.

XXI. The Governor in Council shall, from time to time, make such rules as to him shall seem meet for securing the balances, and other sums of money in the hands of any Officers of every Court holden under this Act, and for the due accounting for and application of all such balances and other sums of money.

XXII. The Courts shall sit daily, except on Sundays, Christmas-day, and Good Friday, and on Native or other Holidays, which the Governor in Council shall direct the Court to observe; and each of the Judges may sit, apart from the others or with either of them, at the same time or at different times; and any one or two of the said Judges so sitting apart shall have all the judicial authority which is herein given to all the Judges.

XXIII. A Seal shall be made for every Court holden under this Act, under the direction of the Governor in Council, and all summonses and other process issuing out of the Court shall be sealed or stamped with the seal of the Court; and every person who shall forge the seal or any process of the Court, or who shall serve or enforce any such forged process, knowing the same to be forged, or deliver or cause to be delivered to any person any paper falsely purporting to be a copy of any summons, or other process of the said Court, knowing the same to be false, or who shall act or profess to act under any false colour or pretence of the process of the said Court, shall be guilty of felony.

XXIV. All suits, where the debt or damage claimed or value of the property in dispute is not more than Five Hundred Rupees, whether on balance of account or otherwise, may be brought in the Court of Small Causes; and all such suits brought in the said Court shall be heard and determined in a summary way. Provided always, that the Court shall not have jurisdiction in any matter concerning the revenue, or concerning any Act ordered or done by the Governor, or Governor General, or any Member of the Council

of India, or of any Presidency in his public capacity, or done by any person by order of the Governor General or Governor in Council, or concerning any Act ordered or done by any Judge or Judicial Officer in the execution of his office, or by any person in pursuance of any judgment or order of any Court, or any such Judge or Judicial Officer, or in any suit for libel or slander.

XXV. On the application of any person desirous to bring a suit under this Act, the Clerk of the Court shall issue under the seal of the Court a summons, which shall be numbered, and shall set forth the names of the plaintiff and defendant, the cause of action, with such particulars as shall be, from time to time, directed by the Rules of the Court, and the amount sued for, and shall be served on the defendant, so many days before the day on which the Court shall be holden at which the cause is to be tried as shall be directed by the rules for regulating the practice of the Court; and delivery of such summons to the defendant, or in such other manner as shall be specified in the rules of practice, shall be deemed good service; and no misnomer or inaccurate description of any person or place in any such summons shall vitiate the same, if the person or place be therein described so as to be commonly known.

XXVI. No mis-statement of the cause of action in the summons issued under this Act, shall vitiate the same, and the Judges of the Court may, in their discretion, rectify such mis-statement as soon as discovered, and alter the record accordingly, and if the defendant, or one of the defendants be present in Court at the time of such discovery, the hearing of the cause after the record shall have been so altered, shall be proceeded with as if no such mis-statement had happened, but in the absence of the defendant or of all the defendants, a new summons of the same number and date as the original summons shall be issued, with the altered statement of the cause of action.

XXVII. All persons shall be deemed within the jurisdiction of the Court, who dwell or carry on their business or work for gain within the district of the Court at the time of bringing the action, or who did so dwell or carry on their business or work therein at the time when the cause of action arose, or within six months before the time of bringing the action for causes of action which arose within the same time.

XXVIII. Any summons or other process of any of the said Courts, service of which is needed out of the district of the Court, may be exhibited in any Court of Law, or before any Magistrate, and shall be thereupon endorsed by the Magistrate or Judge of such Court; and, when so endorsed, may be served in like manner as any order or process from such Court or Magistrate; and such service shall be as valid as if the same had been made by the Bailiff of the Court out of which such summons or other process shall have issued within the jurisdiction of the Court for which he acts.

XXIX. Service of any summons or other process of the Court, which shall require to be served out of the district of the Court, may be proved by affidavit, or solemn affirmation, purporting to be sworn or made before any Judge or Magistrate; and, in every case of the unavoidable absence of the Bailiff by whom any summons or other process of the Court has been served, the service of such summons or other process may be proved, if the Judges think fit, in the same manner as a summons served out of the district of the Court.

XXX. Any minor may prosecute a suit in any Court holden under this Act for any sum of money not greater than Five Hundred Rupees, which may be due to him for wages or piecework, or for work as a servant, in the same manner as if he were of full age.

[]

XXXI. The jurisdiction of the Court shall extend to the recovery of any demand, not exceeding the sum of Five Hundred Rupees, which is the whole or part of the unliquidated balance of a partnership account, or the amount or part of the amount of a distributive share under an intestacy, or of any legacy under a will.

XXXII. Any executor or administrator may sue and be sued in any Court holden under this Act, in like manner as if he were a party in his own right; and judgment and execution shall be such as in the like case would be given or issued in the Supreme Court in the like case; but no executor or administrator shall be summoned in that capacity within six months after the death of the person whose executor or administrator he is.

XXXIII. A plaintiff shall not be allowed to divide any cause of action, for the sake of bringing two or more suits in any of the said Courts; but any plaintiff, having cause of action for more than Five Hundred Rupees, may abandon the excess, which shall be entered in the Plaintiff book and stated in the summons, and thereupon the plaintiff shall, on proving his case, recover to an amount not exceeding Five Hundred Rupees; and the judgment of the Court shall be in full discharge of all demands in respect of such cause of action; and entry of the judgment shall be made accordingly.

XXXIV. The Governor General, and Members of the Supreme Council of India, the Governors and Members of Council of the Presidencies of Fort William in Bengal, Fort St. George, and Bombay, respectively, and the Chief Justices and Judges of the several Supreme Courts established therein by Royal Charter, shall not be liable to arrest, or imprisonment by process issuing out of any Court holden under this Act, and no writ or process shall be sued out of the said Court against any of the persons privileged by Act No. 1, 1844, or Act No. XVIII. 1848, without the consent of the Governor in Council.

XXXV. Where any plaintiff shall have any demand recoverable under this Act, whether founded on contract or wrong, against two or more persons jointly answerable, it shall be sufficient if any of such persons be served with process, and judgment may be obtained and execution issued against the person or persons so served, notwithstanding that others, jointly liable, may not have been served or sued, or may not be within the jurisdiction of the Court; and every such person against whom judgment shall have been obtained under this Act, and who shall have satisfied such judgment, shall be entitled to demand and recover in the Court, holden under this Act, contribution from any other person jointly liable with him; and in all cases of misjoinder of defendants, the Judges may order the suit to proceed against such of the defendants only against whom cause of action appears, and may give judgment against them only; giving also judgment for costs for the defendants improperly joined.

XXXVI. The Judges of the Court shall be empowered to determine all questions as well of fact as of law, in all cases which they have authority to try.

XXXVII. On the day in that behalf named in the summons, the plaintiff shall appear, and thereupon the defendant shall be required to appear to answer; and on answer being made in Court, the Judges shall proceed in a summary way to try the cause, and give judgment, without further pleading or formal joinder of issue.

XXXVIII. A defendant, having any cause of action against the plaintiff, whether or not the same exceeds Five Hundred Rupees, shall be entitled to set the same against the plaintiff's demand, and if judgment is given in such case for the plaintiff, shall be entitled to sue the plaintiff for the balance only of his

original demand; after deducting the amount of debt or damages and costs recovered against him under this Act.

XXXIX. The Judges may, in any case, with the consent of both parties to the suit, order the same, with or without other matters within the jurisdiction of the Court in dispute between such parties, to be referred to arbitration, to such person or persons, and in such manner, and on such terms as they shall think reasonable and just; and such reference shall not be revocable by either party, except by consent of the Judges; and the award of the arbitrator or arbitrators, or umpire, shall be entered as the judgment in the cause, and shall be as binding and effectual to all intents, as if given by the Judges; provided, that the Judges may, if they think fit, on application to them at the first Court held after the expiration of one week after the entry of such award, set aside any such award, or may, with the consent of both parties, revoke the reference, or order another reference to be made in the manner aforesaid;

XL. The Judges of each Court, holden under this Act, subject to the approval of the Judges of the Supreme Court, shall have power to make and issue all the general rules for regulating the practice and proceedings of the Court, and also to frame forms for every proceeding in the Court for which they shall think it necessary that a form be provided, and also for keeping all books, entries, and accounts to be kept by the Clerk of the Court, and, from time to time, to alter any such rule or form; and the rules so made and the forms so framed, shall be observed and used in the Court of that Presidency, and shall be sent to the Supreme Court for approval, but shall be of force until disapproved; and in any case, not expressly provided for herein, or by the said rules, the general principles of practice in the Supreme Court may be adopted and applied at the discretion of the Judges, to actions and proceedings in their Court.

XLI. If upon the day of the return of any summons, or at any continuation or adjournment of the said Court, or of the cause for which the said summons shall have been issued, the plaintiff shall not appear, the cause shall be struck out; and if he shall appear, but shall not make proof of his demand to the satisfaction of the Court, the Judges may consult the plaintiff or give judgment for the defendant; and, in either case, where the defendant shall appear and shall not admit the demand, may award to the defendant, by way of costs and satisfaction for his trouble and attendance, such sum as they, in their discretion, shall think fit; and such sum shall be recoverable from the plaintiff by such ways and means as any debt or damage ordered to be paid by the same Court can be recovered: provided always, that if the plaintiff shall not appear when called upon, and the defendant, or some one duly authorized on his behalf, shall appear, and admit the cause of action to the full amount claimed, and pay the fees payable in the first instance by the plaintiff, the Court, if it shall think fit, may proceed to give judgment, as if the plaintiff had appeared.

XLII. If on the day so named in the summons, or at any continuation or adjournment of the Court, or cause in which the summons was issued, the defendant shall not appear or sufficiently excuse his absence, or shall neglect to answer when called in Court, the Judges, upon due proof of service of the summons, may issue a writ of attachment to compel the appearance of the defendant; or, in their discretion, may proceed to the hearing or trial of the cause on the part of the plaintiff only; and the judgment thereupon shall be as valid as if both parties had attended; provided always, that the Judges in any such case, at the same or any subsequent Court, may set aside any judgment so given in the absence of the defendant, and the execution thereupon; and may grant new trial of the cause, upon such terms, as to payment of costs, giving security,

[]
for debt or costs, or otherwise, as they think fit, on sufficient cause shown to them for that purpose.

XLIII. The Judges may in any case make orders for granting time to the plaintiff or defendant to proceed in the prosecution or defence of the suit, and also may, from time to time, adjourn any Court, or the hearing or further hearing of any cause, in such manner as to them may seem fit.

XLIV. The defendant in any action brought under this Act, for the recovery of money, whether for debt or damages, within such time as shall be directed by the rules for regulating the practice of the Court, may pay into Court such sum of money as he shall think a full satisfaction for the demand of the plaintiff, with the costs incurred by the plaintiff up to the time of such payment; and the said sum of money shall be paid to the plaintiff; but, if he shall elect to proceed, and, if the plaintiff shall recover no further sum in the action than shall have been so paid into Court, the plaintiff shall pay to the defendant the costs incurred by him in the said action after such payment; and such costs shall be settled by the Court, and an order shall thereupon be made by the Court for the payment of such costs by the plaintiff.

XLV. On the hearing or trial of any action or any other proceeding under this Act, the parties thereto, their wives, and all other persons, may be examined, on behalf of either the plaintiff or defendant, subject nevertheless to the Acts and Regulations in force, with respect to the examination of women of a rank and situation in life, which, according to the customs of the country, would render it improper to compel them to appear in a Court of Justice.

XLVI. Every person shall be examined on oath, or, when exempt by law from taking an oath in any Court of Justice, on solemn affirmation, and every person, who, in any examination upon oath or solemn affirmation under this Act, shall wilfully and corruptly give false evidence, shall be deemed guilty of perjury.

XLVII. Either of the parties to the suit or any other proceeding under this Act may obtain, at the office of the Clerk of the Court, summonses to witnesses, with or without a clause requiring the production of books, deeds, papers, and writings in their possession or control, and in any such summons any number of names may be inserted.

XLVIII. Every person, on whom any such summonses shall have been served, either personally or in such other manner as shall be directed by the general rules or practice of the Court, and who shall refuse or neglect, without sufficient cause, to appear, or to produce any books, papers, or writings required by such summonses to be produced, and also every person present in Court, who shall be required to give evidence, and who shall refuse to be sworn and give evidence, shall forfeit and pay such fine, not exceeding One Hundred Rupees, as the Judges shall set on him; and the whole or any part of such fine, in the discretion of the Judges, after deducting the costs, may be applied towards indemnifying the party injured by such refusal or neglect.

XLIX. The Judges of any Court established under this Act, in all suits where the debt or demand exceeds the sum of Thirty Rupees, upon proof before them that any defendant against whom a summons has been taken out, conceals himself from, or otherwise evades process of the Court, or is disposing of his property and effects with intent to defraud the plaintiff, or his creditors generally, or is about to withdraw his person or effects from the jurisdiction of the Court, may issue a warrant for the apprehension of such person, and may commit him to gaol until he shall find security for his appearance in the said Court from time to time, until judgment shall be pronounced in the

suit commenced by such summons, and for payment of the amount and the costs which may be decreed against him therein.

L. Payment of any fine imposed by any Court under the authority of this Act may be enforced upon the order of the Judges, in like manner as payment of any debt adjudged in the said Court, and shall be accounted for as herein provided.

LI. All the costs of any action or proceeding in the Court, not herein otherwise provided for, shall be paid by or apportioned between the parties, in such manner as the Judges shall think fit; and, in default of any special direction, shall abide the event of the action; and execution may issue for the recovery of any such costs, in like manner as for any debt adjudged in the said Court.

LII. Every order and judgment of any Court holden under this Act, except as herein provided, shall be final and conclusive between the parties; but the Judges shall have power to nonsuit the plaintiff, in every case in which satisfactory proof shall not be given to them, entitling either the plaintiff or defendant to the judgment of the Court; and shall also in every case whatever have the power, if they shall think fit, to order a new trial to be had, upon such terms as they shall think reasonable, and in the mean time to stay the proceedings.

LIII. No cause commenced in any Court, holden under this Act, shall be removed from the said Court into the Supreme Court by any writ or process, unless the debt or damage claimed exceeds One Hundred Rupees, and then only by leave of a Judge of the said Supreme Court, on proof to his satisfaction that some question of law is likely to arise therein, which, by reason either of its difficulty, novelty, or general importance, or of some erroneous course of decision on the same point in the Court of Small Causes, may appear to him fit to be tried in the Supreme Court, and upon such terms as to payment of costs, giving security for debt or costs, or otherwise, as he shall think fit.

LIV. The Judges of the Court of Small Causes may, in their discretion, reserve any question of law on which they entertain doubts, or which they shall be requested by either party to the suit to reserve, for the opinion of the Judges of the Supreme Court, and shall give judgment contingent upon the opinion of the said Supreme Court on a case which they shall thereupon be entitled to state to the said Court. If only two Judges sit together, and shall differ in opinion, the question on which they differ shall be so referred.

LV. The Judges may make orders concerning the time or times, and by what instalments, any debt, or damages, or costs, for which judgment shall be obtained in the said Court, shall be paid; and all such monies shall be paid into Court, unless the Judges shall otherwise order.

LVI. If there be cross judgments between the parties, execution shall be taken out by that party only, who shall have obtained judgment for the larger sum, and for so much only as shall remain after deducting the smaller sum; and satisfaction for the remainder shall be entered, as well as satisfaction on the judgment for the smaller sum; and, if both sums shall be equal, satisfaction shall be entered upon both judgments.

LVII. Whenever the Court shall have made an order for the payment of money, the amount shall be recoverable, in case of default or failure of payment thereof forthwith, or at the time or times and in the manner directed, by execution against the body or the goods and chattels of the person against whom such order is made, without further notice or order; and the Clerk of the said Court, at the request of the person prosecuting such order, shall issue under the seal of the Court a writ of execution to one of the

Bailiffs of the Court, which shall be his warrant to take the body of such person in execution, or to levy, or cause to be levied, by distress and sale of the goods and chattels of such person such sum of money as shall be so ordered, wheresoever they may be found within the district of the Court, and also the costs of the execution; and all Constables, and other Peace Officers within their several jurisdictions shall aid in the execution of every such writ.

LVIII. If the Court shall have made any order for payment of any sum of money by instalments, execution upon such order shall not issue until after default in payment of some instalment according to such order; and execution or successive executions may then issue without further notice or order for the whole of the said sum of money and costs then remaining unpaid, or for such portion thereof as the Court shall order, either at the time of making the original order, or at any subsequent time, under the seal of the Court.

LIX. Whenever any warrant shall issue for taking in execution the body of any person under this Act, the Bailiffs of the Court shall be empowered, by virtue thereof, to take and convey him to any prison, appointed by the Governor in Council to be the prison of the Court, there to remain for such term as shall be directed by the warrant, not longer than six calendar months, or until he shall sooner perform the order of the Court.

LX. No person shall be imprisoned twice under the same judgment, nor shall execution against the body and goods issue at the same time under the same judgment.

LXI. Every person suing out a warrant of execution against the body of any other person under this Act shall deposit with the Clerk of the Court, at the time of the issue of the warrant, diet money for one week, after the rate of one anna and a half for each day, which shall be paid by the Clerk to the keeper of the prison at the time of the execution of the warrant.

LXII. Notice of the execution of every such warrant shall be forthwith given to the person at whose suit it issued, who shall thereupon deposit with the keeper of the prison, diet money for the remainder of the month in which the warrant is executed, after the same daily rate, and shall continue thereafter to deposit monthly with the said keeper, in advance, diet money at the same daily rate, for each month which the debtor is liable to be kept in prison at his suit.

LXIII. The diet money shall be employed for the subsistence of the prisoner, and if, by default of the detaining creditor, such diet money is not paid, the prisoner shall be entitled to his discharge by order of the Court.

LXIV. All diet money, which shall be spent in providing subsistence for any prisoner, shall be costs in the cause, and all diet money which shall not be so spent, shall be repaid to the creditor advancing the same.

LXV. Whenever any prisoner shall offer good and reasonable security for payment of any debt or damage and costs, either in full, or by instalments, as the Court shall think reasonable, the Court may order him to be discharged on giving such security.

LXVI. Upon payment of the debt or damage and costs in full, the prisoner shall be entitled to be forthwith discharged.

LXVII. If the debt or damage and costs are not paid, the imprisonment shall not extinguish the liability to pay the same; but all property then belonging to or afterwards acquired by the prisoner shall be liable to be taken in execution after his discharge from prison for satisfaction thereof, or of so much thereof as

is not paid, including the diet money actually expended for subsistence of the prisoner.

LXVIII. Every Bailiff executing any process of execution issuing out of the said Court against the goods of any person, may, by virtue thereof, seize and take any of the goods of such person, (excepting the necessary wearing apparel and bedding of such person or his family, and the tools and implements of his trade,) and may also seize and take any money or bank notes, and any cheques, bills of exchange, promissory notes, bonds, specialties or securities for money belonging to any such person against whom any execution shall have issued as aforesaid.

LXIX. The Bailiff shall forthwith deliver any cheques, bills of exchange, promissory notes, bonds, specialties, or other securities for money, which shall have been so seized or taken as aforesaid, to the Clerk or other person appointed by the Judges to receive the same, who shall hold them as a security or securities for the amount directed to be levied by such execution, or so much thereof as shall not have been otherwise levied or raised for the benefit of the plaintiff; and the plaintiff may sue in the name of the defendant, or in the name of any person in whose name the defendant might have sued, for the recovery of the sum or sums secured, or made payable thereby, when the time of payment thereof shall have arrived.

LXX. If it shall, at any time, appear to the satisfaction of the Court that any defendant is unable, from sickness or other sufficient cause, to pay and discharge the debt or damage recovered against him, or any instalment thereof ordered to be paid as aforesaid, the Judges, in their discretion, may suspend or stay any judgment, order, or execution given, made, or issued in such action, for such time and on such terms as they shall think fit, and so, from time to time, until it shall appear by the like proof as aforesaid that such temporary cause of disability has ceased.

LXXI. No sale of any goods, which shall be taken in execution as aforesaid shall be made, until after the end of five days at least next following the day on which such goods have been so taken, unless such goods be of a perishable nature, or upon the request, in writing, of the party whose goods have been taken.

LXXII. Until such sale the goods shall be deposited by the Bailiff by whom they were taken in some fit place, or they may remain in the custody of a fit person approved by the Judges to be put in possession by the Bailiff.

LXXIII. The Judges, from time to time, as they shall think proper, may appoint such and so many persons for keeping possession, and so many of their Bailiffs or other fit persons to be sworn brokers and appraisers for the purpose of selling or valuing any goods, chattels or effects taken in execution under this Act, as shall appear to them to be necessary, and may direct security to be taken from each of them, for such sum and in such manner as they shall think fit, for the faithful performance of their duties, without injury or oppression; and the Judges may disqualify any person, broker or appraiser so appointed, as a conspiring person.

LXXIV. No goods taken in execution under this Act shall be sold for the purpose of satisfying the warrant of execution; except by one of the brokers or appraisers so appointed.

LXXV. The costs to be demanded or taken for such appraisement and sale shall be one anna in the rupee on the produce of the goods sold; and the Judges may apply the sum so raised as costs towards payment of the contingent charges and remuneration of the said brokers and appraisers in such manner as shall be approved by the Governor in Council.

LXXVI. The Clerk of the Court shall keep an account of all sums received upon such sales, distinguishing

[]
ing the amount paid to the party entitled to the benefit of the execution, and the amount levied and retained as costs, and also of all sums allowed to the brokers and appraisers upon such sales.

LXXVII. Whenever any defendant against whom judgment shall have been given in the Court of Small Causes, shall go before execution thereof out of the jurisdiction of the Court, the Judge of any zillah or town where he shall be found, upon receiving from the plaintiff either in person or by vakeel, an application in writing setting forth these facts, with a duly authenticated copy of the judgment of the Court, shall execute the said judgment in the manner prescribed by law for execution of his own decrees; unless the defendant shall allege any reasonable cause why the judgment should not be executed, and shall give security to such amount as the Judge of such zillah or town shall deem reasonable, that he will, within such time as shall be allowed him for that purpose, either satisfy the judgment, or produce a duly authenticated copy of an order of the Judges of the Court of Small Causes, discharging their former judgment.

LXXVIII. No judgment or execution shall be stayed, delayed or reversed upon or by any writ of error or *supersedeas* thereon, to be sued for the reversing of any judgment given in any Court holden under the provisions of this Act, unless the amount recovered exceeds One Hundred Rupees, and then only after the person suing out such writ shall become bound with two sufficient sureties to be approved by the Clerk of the Court, in treble the sum adjudged to be recovered in the former judgment, to prosecute the said writ with effect, and also to satisfy and pay, (if the writ be not prosecuted, or if the judgment be affirmed,) the debt or damages and costs adjudged, and all costs and damages to be awarded for the delay of execution.

LXXIX. Upon every warrant of execution issued against the goods and chattels of any person, the Clerk of the Court shall cause to be stated the sum of money and costs adjudged, with the sum paid for such warrant; and if the party against whom such execution shall be issued, shall, before an actual sale of the goods and chattels, pay or cause to be paid or tendered unto the Clerk of the Court, or to the Bailiff holding the warrant of execution, such sum of money and costs, as aforesaid, or such part thereof as the person entitled thereto shall agree to accept in full of his debt or damages and costs, together with the fees herein directed to be paid, the execution shall be superseded, and the goods and chattels of the said party shall be discharged and set at liberty.

LXXX. The Clerk of every Court holden under this Act shall cause a record of all summonses, and of all orders, and of all judgments and executions, and returns thereto, and of all fines, and of all other proceedings of the Court, to be fairly entered, from time to time, in a book or books belonging to the Court, which shall be kept at the Office of the Court; and shall be duly authenticated by one or more of the Judges, and such entries in the said book or books, or a copy thereof bearing the seal of the Court, and purporting to be by him read certified as a true copy by the Clerk of the Court, shall be admitted in all Courts and places as evidence of such entries, and of the proceeding referred to by such entry or entries, and of the regularity of such proceeding, without any further proof.

LXXXI. The Clerk of every such Court shall, in the month of *March*, in each year, make out a correct list of all sums of money belonging to suitors in the Court, which shall have been paid into Court, and which shall have remained unclaimed for five years before the first day of the month of *January* then last past, specifying the names of the parties for whom or whose account the same were so paid into Court; and a copy of such list shall be put up and remain and a c.

during Court hours in some conspicuous part of the Court house, and at all times in the Clerk's Office; and all sums of money which shall have been paid into any such Court, to the use of any suitor or suitors thereof, and which shall have remained unclaimed for the period of six years before the passing of this Act, and which are now in the hands of any Commissioner or Officer of such Court, or otherwise held in trust for such suitors, and all further sums of money, which shall hereafter be paid into such Court to the use of any suitor or suitors thereof, shall, if unclaimed for the period of six years after the same shall have been so paid into Court, be applicable as part of the fees receivable on account of the Court, and shall be carried to the same account; and no person shall be entitled to claim any sum which shall have remained unclaimed for six years; but no time during which the person entitled to claim such sum shall have been an infant, or married woman, or of unsound mind, or out of the Territories under the Government of the East India Company, shall be taken into account in estimating the said period of six years.

LXXXII. If any person shall wilfully insult any Judge, Clerk, or Officer of the said Court, for the time being, during his sitting or attendance in Court, or shall wilfully interrupt the proceedings of the Court, or otherwise misbehave in Court, it shall be lawful for any Bailiff or Officer of the Court, with or without the assistance of any other person, by the order of the Judges, to take such offender into custody, and detain him until the rising of the Court; and the Judges shall be empowered, if they shall think fit, by a warrant under their hands, and sealed with the seal of the Court, to commit any such offender to any prison to which they have power to commit offenders under this Act, for any time not exceeding seven days, or to impose upon any such offender a fine, not exceeding Fifty Rupees for every such offence, and in default of payment thereof to commit the offender to any such prison as aforesaid, for any time not exceeding seven days, unless the said fine be sooner paid, or instead of inflicting summary punishment under this Act, may cause the offender to be indicted in the Supreme Court, if the offence be an indictable misdemeanour.

LXXXIII. If any Officer or Bailiff of any Court holden under this Act shall be assaulted while in the execution of his duty, or if any rescue shall be made or attempted to be made of any person arrested, or goods levied under process of the Court, the person so offending shall be liable to a fine, not exceeding One Hundred Rupees, to be recovered by order of the Court, or before a Magistrate, as hereinafter provided; and the Bailiff of the Court, or any Peace Officer, in any such case, may take the offender into custody, (with or without warrant,) and bring him before such Court, or Magistrate accordingly.

LXXXIV. If any Bailiff of the said Court, who shall be employed to execute any warrant of the Court, shall, by neglect, or connivance, or omission, lose an opportunity of executing such warrant, then upon complaint of the party aggrieved by reason of such neglect, connivance, or omission, (and the fact alleged being proved to the satisfaction of the Court,) the Judges shall order the Bailiff to pay such damages as it shall appear that the plaintiff has sustained thereby, not exceeding in any case the sum of money for which the said execution is issued, and the Bailiff shall be liable thereto; and upon demand made thereof, and on his refusal so to pay and satisfy the same, payment thereof shall be enforced by such ways and means as are herein provided for enforcing a judgment recovered in the said Court, without prejudice, nevertheless, to the execution of the original warrant.

LXXXV. If any Clerk, Bailiff, or Officer of the Court, acting under colour or pretence of the process of the said Court, shall be charged with extortion or

[]

misconduct, or with not duly paying or accounting for any money levied by him under the authority of this Act, the Judges may inquire into such matter in a summary way, and for that purpose may summon and enforce the attendance of all necessary parties, in like manner as the attendance of witnesses in any case may be enforced, and may make such order thereupon for the repayment of any money extorted, or for the due payment of any money so levied as aforesaid, and for the payment of such damages and costs as they shall think just; and also, if they shall think fit, may impose such fine upon the Clerk, Bailiff or Officer, not exceeding One Hundred Rupees for each offence, as they shall deem adequate; and in default of payment of any money so ordered to be paid, payment of the same may be enforced by such ways and means as are herein provided for enforcing a judgment recovered in the said Court.

LXXXVI. Every Clerk, Bailiff, or other Officer employed in putting this Act, or any of the powers thereof, in execution, who shall wilfully and corruptly exact, take or accept any fee or reward whatsoever, other than his lawful salary, for any thing done or to be done by virtue of this Act, or on any account whatsoever, relative to putting this Act into execution, shall, upon proof thereof before the said Court, and in the case of a Clerk, on confirmation of the finding of the Court by the Governor in Council, be for ever incapable of serving, or being employed under this Act in any office of profit or emolument, and shall also be liable for damages as herein provided.

LXXXVII. If any claims shall be made to, or in respect of, any goods or chattels taken in execution under the process of any Court holden under this Act, or in respect of the proceeds or value thereof, by any person not being the party against whom such process has issued, the Clerk of the Court, upon application of the Officer charged with the execution of such process, as well before as after any action brought against such Officer, may issue a summons calling before the said Court, as well the party issuing such process as the party making such claim, and thereupon any action, which shall have been brought in the Supreme Court in respect of such claim, shall be stayed, and any Judge of the Supreme Court, on proof of the issue of such summons, and that the goods and chattels were so taken in execution, may order the party bringing such action to pay the costs of all proceedings, had upon such action after the issue of such summons out of the Court of Small Causes, and the Judges of the Court of Small Causes shall adjudicate upon such claim and make such order between the parties in respect thereof, and of the costs of the proceedings as to them shall seem fit, and such order shall be enforced in like manner as any order made in any suit brought in such Court.

LXXXVIII. The powers of Act No. VII. 1847, to regulate distresses for small rents in Calcutta, shall be extended to the recovery of all arrears of rent not exceeding Five Hundred Rupees, and the Judges of every Court of Small Causes under this Act shall be empowered to exercise within their several jurisdictions the extended powers of the said Act: and the said Act shall be construed as if instead of Calcutta and the Settlement of Fort William in Bengal, the limits of the jurisdiction of the Court had been therein mentioned, and the Judges of the Court of Small Causes under this Act, instead of the Commissioners of the Court therein mentioned, and the amount of Five Hundred Rupees instead of One Hundred Rupees, and the forms contained in the Schedule annexed to the said Act shall be altered accordingly, and shall refer to this Act instead of Act No. VII. 1847.

LXXXIX. The affidavit of arrear required by the said Act No. VII. 1847, may in every case be made either by the person entitled to such arrear or by his or

her lawfully constituted attorney, and a warrant of distress may issue on such affidavit.

XC. Where any person shall hold or occupy any house, land, or tenement, of which the value or the rent payable in respect thereof does not exceed the rate of Five Hundred Rupees by the year, without leave of the owner, or under a lease or agreement which is ended, or duly determined by a legal notice to quit, and such tenant, or, if such tenant do not actually occupy the premises or occupy only a part thereof, any person by whom the same or any part thereof shall be then actually occupied, shall neglect or refuse to quit and deliver up possession of the premises, or of such part thereof respectively, the owner or his agent may take out a summons from the Court directed to such tenant or occupier, to show by what title he claims to hold or occupy the premises or part thereof.

XCI. If the tenant or occupier shall not thereupon appear at the time and place appointed, and show cause to the contrary, and shall still neglect or refuse to deliver up possession of the premises, or of such part thereof, of which he is then in possession, to the said owner or his agent, such owner or agent may give to the Court proof of the holding, and of the end or other determination of the tenancy, if any had existed, with the time or manner thereof, and of the right by which he claims the possession.

XCII. Upon proof of due service of the summons, and of the neglect or refusal of the tenant or occupier, as the case may be, the Judges may issue a warrant under the seal of the Court, to any Bailiff of the Court, requiring and authorizing him within a period to be therein named, not less than seven, or more than ten clear days from the date of such warrant, to give possession of the premises to such owner or agent, and such warrant shall be a sufficient warrant to the said Bailiff to enter upon the premises with such assistants as he shall deem necessary, and to give possession accordingly; Provided always, that entry upon any such warrant shall not be made on a *Sunday, Good-Friday, or Christmas-day*, or any other day observed by the Court as a Holiday, or at any time except between the hours of six in the morning and six in the afternoon: Provided also, that nothing herein contained shall be deemed to protect any person by whom any such warrant shall be sued out of the Court of Small Causes from any action which may be brought against him by any such tenant or occupier for such entry and taking possession, where such person had not, at the time of suing out the same as aforesaid, lawful right to the possession of the same premises.

XCIII. Such summons as last aforesaid may be served either personally, or by leave of the Court, upon proof that the tenant or occupier is not to be found within the jurisdiction of the Court, by leaving the same with some person, being in and apparently residing at the place of abode of the person or persons so holding over as aforesaid; or if the place of abode of such person or persons shall either not be known, or admission thereto cannot be obtained for serving such summons, by posting the said summons on some conspicuous part of the premises so held over.

XCIV. No action or prosecution shall be maintainable against the Judges or against the Clerk of the Court, by whom such warrant as aforesaid shall have been issued, or against any Bailiff or other person by whom such warrant may be executed or summons affixed, for issuing such warrant, or executing the same respectively, or affixing such summons, by reason that the person by whom the same shall be sued out had not lawful right to the possession of the premises.

XCV. Where the owner, at the time of applying for such warrant as aforesaid, had lawful right to the possession of the premises, or of any part thereof so held over as aforesaid, neither

[]

owner nor his agent, nor any other person acting in his behalf, shall be deemed to be a trespasser, by reason merely of any irregularity or informality in the mode of proceeding for obtaining possession under the authority of this Act; but the party aggrieved may, if he think fit, bring an action on the case for such irregularity or informality, in which the damage, alleged to be sustained thereby, shall be specially laid, and may recover full satisfaction for such special damage with costs of suit: Provided that, if the special damage so laid be not proved, the defendant shall be entitled to a verdict, and that, if proved, but assessed at any sum, not exceeding Ten Rupees, the plaintiff shall recover no more costs than damages, unless the Judge, before whom the trial shall have been holden, shall certify that in his opinion full costs ought to be allowed.

XCVI. In every case in which the person by whom any such warrant shall be sued out of the Court of Small Causes, had not at the time of suing out the same lawful right to the possession of the premises, the suing out of any such warrant as last aforesaid, shall be deemed a trespass by him against the tenant or occupier of the premises, although no entry shall be made by virtue of the warrant; and in case any such tenant or occupier will become bound with two sufficient Sureties, to be approved by the Clerk of the Court, in such sum as to the Judges shall seem reasonable, regard being had to the value of the premises and to the probable cost of such action, to sue the person by whom such warrant was sued out with effect and without delay, and to pay all the costs of the proceeding in such action, in case a verdict shall pass for the defendant, or the plaintiff shall discontinue or not prosecute his action, or become nonsuit therein, execution upon the warrant shall be stayed until judgment shall have been given in such action of trespass; and, if upon the trial of such action of trespass, judgment be given for the plaintiff, such judgment shall supersede the said warrant.

XCVII. Recovery of the possession of any such house, land, or tenement, shall be no bar to the institution of a regular suit for trying the title thereunto, which may be brought in the Supreme Court as if this Act had not been passed.

XCVIII. Every bond given on the removal of any action out of the Court of Small Causes or upon staying, delaying, or reversing any judgment or execution awarded therein, or the execution of any such warrant of possession as aforesaid, or on moving for a new trial, or to set aside a verdict, judgment, or nonsuit, shall be made to the other party to the action, and shall be approved by the Judges and attested under the seal of the Court; and if the bond so taken be forfeited, or if upon the proceeding for securing which such bond was given, the Judge before whom such proceeding shall be had shall not certify upon the record in Court, that the condition of the bond hath been fulfilled, the party to whom the bond shall have been so made may bring an action of debt and recover thereon: Provided always, that the Court in which such action as last aforesaid shall be brought may, by a rule of Court, give such relief to the parties liable upon such bond as may appear to him reasonable, and such rule shall have the nature and effect of a defeasance to such bond.

XCIX. All actions and proceedings, which before the passing of this Act might have been brought in the Supreme Court, where any Officer of the Court of Small Causes shall be a party, except in respect of any claim to any goods and chattels taken in execution of the process of the Court, or the proceeds or value thereof, may be brought and determined in the Supreme Court, at the election of the party suing or proceeding, as if this Act had not been passed.

C. If any action shall be commenced after the passing of this Act in the Supreme Court, for any cause other than those lastly herein before specified, for which

a summons might have been taken out from a Court holden under this Act, and a verdict shall be found for the plaintiff for a sum less than Five Hundred Rupees, if the said action is founded on contract, or less than One Hundred Rupees, if it is founded on wrong, the plaintiff shall have judgment to recover such sum only, and no costs; and if a verdict shall not be found for the plaintiff, the defendant shall be entitled to his costs as between attorney and client, unless in either case the Judge, who shall try the cause, shall certify on the back of the record that by reason of the difficulty, novelty, or general importance of the case, or of some erroneous course of decision on like cases in the Court of Small Causes, the action was fit to be brought in the Supreme Court.

CI. If any person shall bring any suit in the Supreme Court in respect of any grievance committed by the Clerk, Bailiff, or Officer of any Court holden under this Act, under colour or pretence of the process of the said Court, and upon the trial of the action, no greater damages shall be found for the plaintiff than the sum of Five Hundred Rupees, no costs shall be awarded to the plaintiff in such action unless the Judge shall certify in Court upon the back of the Record, that the action was fit to be brought in the Supreme Court.

CII. All penalties, fines and forfeitures by this Act, inflicted or authorized to be imposed, (the manner of recovering and applying whereof is not hereby otherwise particularly directed,) upon proof before any Justice of the Peace or Magistrate having jurisdiction where the offender shall reside or be, or the offence shall be committed, either by the confession of the party offending, or by the oath or affirmation of any credible witness, shall be levied, with the costs attending the summons and conviction, by distress and sale of the goods and chattels of the party offending, by warrant under the hand of any such Justice or Magistrate, and the overplus (if any) after such penalties, fines and forfeitures, and the charges of such distress and sale are deducted, shall be returned, upon demand, unto the owner of such goods and chattels.

CIII. If any such penalties, fines, and forfeitures, respectively, shall not be paid forthwith upon conviction, it shall be lawful for such Justice or Magistrate to order the offender so convicted to be detained in safe custody until return can conveniently be made to such warrant of distress; unless such offender shall give sufficient security to the satisfaction of such Justice or Magistrate for his appearance before him on such day as shall be appointed for the return of such warrant of distress, such day not being more than eight days from the time of taking any such security, which security the Justice or Magistrate shall be empowered to take by way of recognizance or otherwise, as to him shall seem fit.

CIV. If, upon return of such warrant, it shall appear that no sufficient distress can be had thereupon, or in case it shall appear to the satisfaction of the Justice or Magistrate, either by confession of the offender or otherwise, that he hath not, within the jurisdiction of such Justice or Magistrate, sufficient goods and chattels, whereon to levy all such penalties, forfeitures, costs and charges, the Justice or Magistrate may, at his discretion, without issuing any warrant of distress, commit the offender to the Common Gaol or House of Correction, for any time not exceeding three calendar months, unless such penalties, forfeitures and fines, and all reasonable charges attending the recovery thereof, shall be sooner paid and satisfied.

CV. The monies arising from any such penalties, forfeitures, and fines as aforesaid, when paid and levied, shall, (if not by this Act directed to be otherwise applied,) be from time to time paid to the Clerk of the Court, and shall be applied in like manner as the fees thereof.

CVI. In all cases in which by this Act any penalty or forfeiture is made recoverable before a Justice or

Magistrate, he may summon before him the party complained against, and on such summons may hear and determine the matter of such complaint; and, on proof of the offence, may convict the offender, and adjudge him to pay the penalty or forfeiture incurred, and proceed to recover the same, although no information in writing shall have been exhibited before him; and all such proceedings by summons without information in writing shall be as valid and effectual, to all intents and purposes, as if an information in writing had been exhibited.

CVII. In all cases where any conviction shall be had for any offence committed against this Act, the form of conviction may be in the words or to the effect following: (that is to say,) "Be it remembered that on this _____ day of _____ in the year _____ A. B. is convicted before _____ a Magistrate (or before a Judge appointed under Act of 1849) of having (state the offence;) and I (or we) the said _____ do adjudge the said _____ to forfeit and pay for the same the sum of _____ [or to be committed to _____] for the space of _____] given under hand () and seal () the day and year aforesaid."

CVIII. No order, verdict, or judgment or other proceeding, made concerning any of the matters aforesaid, shall be quashed or vacated for want of form.

CIX. Where any distress shall be made for any sum of money to be levied by virtue of this Act, the distress itself shall not be deemed unlawful, nor the party making the same be deemed a trespasser, on account of any defect or want of form in the information, summons, conviction, warrant of distress, or other proceeding relating thereto, nor shall the party distraining be deemed a trespasser from the beginning, on account of any irregularity which shall afterwards be committed by the party so distraining, but the person aggrieved by such irregularity may recover full satisfaction for the special damage in an action upon the case.

CX. All actions and prosecutions to be commenced against any person for any thing done in pursuance of this Act, shall be commenced within three calendar months after the fact committed, and not afterwards, and notice in writing of such action, and of the cause thereof, shall be given to the defendant one calendar month at least before the commencement of the action; and no plaintiff shall recover in any such action, if tender of sufficient amends shall have been made before such action is brought, or if after action brought, a sufficient sum of money shall have been paid into Court, with costs by or on behalf of the defendant.

ACT No. — OF 1849.

An Act declaring the Law as to the privilege of Her Majesty's European Subjects.

Whereas Her Majesty's natural-born subjects, born in Europe, and the children of such subjects, are now in certain cases, by law, exempt from the jurisdiction of the Courts established by the East India Company, and it is not lawful for the Governor General of India in Council, without the previous sanction of the Court of Directors of the said Company, to make any law or regulation, whereby power shall be given to any Court of Justice, other than the Courts of Justice established by Royal Charter, to sentence to the punishment of death any of Her Majesty's natural-born subjects, born in Europe, or the children of such subjects; and whereas doubts have been entertained as to the proper course of procedure in cases of persons entitled to any of the said exemptions, It is declared and enacted as follows:

I. Every person charged with any offence, or brought before any Court established by the East India Company within the territories under the Government of the said Company, who is or claims to be entitled to any of the said privileges and exemptions, must plead and prove to the satisfaction of the Court his privilege and exemption; and, in default thereof, is amenable to the jurisdiction of such Court, and may be tried and punished in like manner as other inhabitants of the said territories.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information, and that a copy of it be submitted for the approval of the Hon'ble the Court of Directors.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India, after the sanction of the Hon'ble Court shall have been obtained.

ACT No. — OF 1849.

An Act for extending the principle of Section IX., Regulation VII., 1832, of the Bengal Code, throughout the Territories subject to the Government of the East India Company.

Whereas it was enacted by Section IX., Regulation VII., 1832, of the Bengal Code, that "whenever in any civil suit the parties to such suit may be of different persuasions, when one party shall be of the Hindoo and the other of the Mahomedan persuasion, or where one or more of the parties to the suit shall not be either of the Mahomedan or Hindoo persuasions, the laws of those religions shall not be permitted to operate to deprive such party or parties of any property to which, but for the operation of such laws,

they would have been entitled ;" and whereas it is expedient to extend the principle of that enactment throughout the territories subject to the Government of the East India Company, It is enacted as follows :

I. So much of any law or usage now in force within the territories subject to the Government of the East India Company, as inflicts on any person forfeiture of rights or property, by reason of his or her renouncing, or having been excluded from the communion of any religion, shall cease to be enforced as Law in the Courts of the East India Company, and in the Courts established by Royal Charter within the said territories.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 26th day of January 1850.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 26th of October 1849.

ACT No. — OF 1849.

An Act for abolishing exemption from the jurisdiction of the East India Company's Criminal Courts.

Whereas Her Majesty's British subjects, resident in the territories under the Government of the East India Company, without the towns of Calcutta and Madras, and the town and Island of Bombay, are now, by law, exempt from the jurisdiction of the Criminal Courts, established by the East India Company in the said territories, to which all other persons, whether natives or other inhabitants in the said territories, beyond the said towns and Island, are amenable, and whereas it is necessary for the due administration of justice that such exemption be abolished, It is enacted as follows :

I. In every part of the territories under the Government of the East India Company, without the towns of Calcutta and Madras, and the town and Island of Bombay, all persons are henceforth amenable to the jurisdiction of the Magistrates and Criminal Courts of the East India Company, and may be apprehended, tried, and punished by them respectively, according to the Regulations and Acts now or hereafter to be in force ; save only that no such Magistrate or Court shall have power under this Act to sentence to the punishment of death any of Her Majesty's natural-born subjects born in Europe, or the children of such subjects.

II. Every one of Her Majesty's natural-born subjects born in Europe, and every child of such subjects, convicted before any such Criminal Court of any offence, which, according to any Regulation or Act, now or hereafter to be in force, is punishable with death, shall be transported out of the territories under the Government of the East India Company, for life, or for such terms as the Court shall adjudge.

III. The Judges and Magistrates of the Courts of the East India Company may, in any case in which it shall seem fit to them, with the approval of the Governor or Lieutenant Governor or Governor in Council of the Presidency or place, send any of Her Majesty's natural-born subjects, born in Europe, or the child of any such subject, charged with any offence before them, to be tried before the Supreme Court of

Judicature, instead of trying and punishing him under this Act.

IV. Clause CV. of 53 George III., Chapter 155, being so much of an Act of Parliament passed in the fifty-third year of the reign of King George the Third, for the better administration of justice within the British territories in India, as relates to assaults, forcible entries, or other injuries accompanied with force, which may be committed by British subjects, at a distance from the place where the Courts are established by Royal Charter, is repealed.

V. Nothing in this Act shall be deemed to take away the jurisdiction of the several Courts established by Royal Charter in Calcutta, Madras and Bombay, for the trial and punishment of treasons, felonies and misdemeanours, and for the due administration of criminal justice, according to the tenour of the said several Charters ; so nevertheless that no person shall be liable to be punished twice for the same offence.

VI. The word Magistrate, as used in this Act, shall be understood to mean every Officer, however styled, who has authority to exercise all or any of the powers of a Magistrate.

ACT No. — OF 1849.

An Act for Trial by Jury.

Whereas the laws in force for trial by jury in certain cases require to be amended, and made the same throughout British India, It is enacted as follows :

I. Regulation X., 1827, of the Madras Code, Sections IV., V., VI., of Regulation VI., 1832, of the Bengal Code, and Section XXXII. of Act VII., 1843, are repealed ; but this repeal shall not affect the validity of any proceedings taken in any Court under the repealed Sections before the arrival of a copy of this Act at the Sudder station where such Court is held, or any proceedings which may be then depending before such Court.

II. Every person who, at the time of his commitment for trial before a Sessions Judge, claims to be tried by a jury, shall be entitled to be tried under this Act.

III. All persons of reputed intelligence, respectability and consideration, between the ages of twenty-five and fifty years, are qualified to serve on juries.

IV. All qualified persons are liable to serve on juries, unless included in any of the classes following, that is to say,

First.—Judges, magistrates, and other judicial officers, law officers, vakceels, officers and servants of the Courts of justice.

Second.—Commissioners, collectors, deputy collectors, and other persons in the revenue service.

Third.—Post masters, and persons in the service of the post office.

[]
Fourth.—Officers, and others in the Military Service of Her Majesty or the East India Company.

Fifth.—Surgeons and others, who openly and constantly practice in the profession of physic.

Sixth.—Chaplains, priests, and others employed in religious offices.

Seventh.—Principals, professors and teachers of any Government college or school.

Eighth.—Ascetics, and other persons, who, by habit or religious vows, have relinquished all care of worldly affairs.

Ninth.—Persons disabled by permanent diseases, which confine them to their homes.

Tenth.—Persons specially exempt by any order of Government.

V. The collector in each district shall make out yearly, under the direction of the commissioner, a list of the names and the dwelling places of all persons within his district qualified and liable to serve on juries, whose usual dwelling place is not more than () miles from the Sudder station where a Court of Sessions is held.

VI. Any person excluded from the list, who thinks that his rank, station and character entitle him to be included therein, and also every person improperly included therein, may require the collector to alter the list accordingly: if the collector shall not comply with the request, an appeal from his decision shall lie to the commissioner, whose decision is final. The list, when finally corrected, shall be sent to the magistrate of the Sudder station.

VII. The magistrate at the Sudder station shall summon as many persons as seem to him to be needed for jury trials. The names shall be drawn by lot, excluding those who have served within two years, unless when the number cannot be made up without them.

VIII. All persons liable to serve on juries, who shall refuse, or without lawful excuse, to be allowed by the judge, neglect to attend when summoned, or who, when attending, shall refuse to try the prisoners whom they are charged to try, shall be liable to such reasonable fine as the judge, having regard to their rank and means of paying the fine, shall set on them for their contempt of Court: all such fines shall be subject to review on summary appeal to the Nizamut or Foujdaree Adawlut.

IX. Whenever any jury trial is to be had, five persons shall be chosen by lot at the time of holding the sessions, from those who attend on their summons: in default of a sufficient number, the judge shall make up the jury from the persons present in Court, or whom he shall cause to be summoned for the purpose.

X. Either the prosecutor or the prisoner may object to any of the persons chosen to be of the jury, stating the ground of his objection: if it is allowed by the Judge, the juryman objected to shall be set aside for that trial and another chosen in his stead. The place of birth, descent, or creed of any juryman shall not be lawful ground of challenge. If not objected to, the same jury may try as many prisoners successively as to the Judge seems expedient.

XI. One of the jury shall be appointed by the Judge to act as their foreman.

XII. All the evidence for and against the prisoner shall be taken in the presence and hearing of the jury, who shall also be entitled to suggest questions to the witnesses, which, if proper to be put, shall be put under the direction of the Judge. At the end of the trial the Judge shall explain the evidence to the jury, and thereon the foreman shall declare, for the verdict of the jury, whether in their opinion, or in the opinion of a majority of them, the prisoner is guilty or not guilty.

XIII. As soon as the verdict is given, the Judge shall declare his approval or disapproval of it. If the Judge approves of a verdict of not guilty, the prisoner shall be discharged: if the judge approves of a verdict of guilty, he shall proceed to pass sentence on the prisoner, or send the proceedings for final sentence to the Nizamut or Foujdaree Adawlut, as the case may be, according to law; and the jury shall have no voice in deciding on the amount of punishment to be awarded: if the Judge disapproves of the verdict, he shall refer the case with his observations to the Nizamut or Foujdaree Adawlut. In the last mentioned case the jury also shall be empowered to record, under the hand of their foreman, the reasons for their verdict, which the Judge shall send with the other records of the trial.

XIV. An appeal shall lie to the Nizamut or Foujdaree Adawlut against the decision of the Judge in not setting aside a juryman objected to: if on such appeal the objection is sustained, the Court may order a new trial.

XV. The Governor General of India in Council may from time to time suspend the operation of the previous Sections of this Act in those districts in which there is not a sufficient number of inhabitants qualified to furnish a jury.

XVI. After the passing of this Act no Futwah shall be required in any case from the law officer of any Court.

ACT NO. — OF 1849.

An Act for giving privileges to Registered Companies.

For giving certain privileges to Registered Companies, It is enacted as follows:

I. A Registered Company within the meaning of this Act is an unincorporated Company of partners, associated under a deed registered according to this Act, which deed contains a provision, that the shares in the stock or business of the said Company are transferable without the consent of all the partners.

II. The Governor of Bengal, or Governor of Madras or Bombay in Council may grant to any persons desiring to register the Company to which they belong, a certificate that such Company is entitled to be registered under this Act.

III. Every petition for such certificate shall be signed by seven partners of the said Company at least, and shall set forth the following particulars, that is to say:

First —The names and additions of all those who are at that time partners of the Company, and their usual places of residence.

Second.—The style under which the Company is to carry on its business.

Third —The names of the principal place or places,

[]

within the Presidency in which they seek to be registered, where the business is to be carried on.

Fourth.—The proposed amount of capital stock, not being in any case less than () rupees, and the means by which it is to be raised, and the number of shares into which it is to be divided.

Fifth.—The amount of capital stock then paid, and where and how invested.

IV. The deed of partnership of every such Company, in addition to any other provisions it may contain, shall contain specific provisions for the following purposes, that is to say :

First.—For holding Ordinary General Meetings of the Company twice at least in every year, at appointed times and places.

Second.—For holding Extraordinary General Meetings of the Company whenever seven shareholders, or any greater number may require it

Third.—For the Management of the affairs of the Company, and the election and qualification of the Managers.

Fourth.—For preventing the Company from purchasing any shares or making loans of money or securities for money to any person on the security of a share or shares in the partnership business.

Fifth.—For preventing the loan of any money or securities for money to any Manager.

Sixth.—For the audit of the accounts of the Company, twice at least in each year, by two or more Auditors chosen at a General Meeting of the shareholders, and not being Managers at the time.

Seventh.—For the communication of the Auditors' report, and of a balance sheet, and profit and loss account, to every Shareholder, as often as the accounts are audited, and one week at least before each of the half-yearly Meetings.

V. Such partnership deed shall be annexed to the petition ; and if the Governor or Governor in Council shall think fit, he may, in his discretion, grant such certificate and refer the said deed to the Advocate General to be by him settled and approved, for which the Advocate General shall be entitled to have from the Company a fee of (.)

VI. As soon as the deed of partnership, as finally settled by the Advocate General, has been duly executed by all the Shareholders, personally or by their lawfully-constituted Attornies, and one-half at least of the capital stock of the Company has been paid and invested in the name of the Company, any seven or more of the partners may petition the Supreme Court of Judicature for leave to register the deed in the said Court ; and the said Court or any Judge thereof, on being satisfied that the provisions of this Act have been duly complied with, may order the deed to be registered in the said Court ; and upon such registry the Company associated by the said deed shall be deemed a registered Company within the meaning of this Act.

VII. With the deed of partnership shall be registered a memorial setting forth in alphabetical order the names of all the partners, with their several additions, places of abode, and the number of shares belonging to each, and the names of the Managers of the Company : and in default of any other special provision in the deed, the persons by whom the petition for registry of the deed is signed shall be deemed the first Managers of the Company.

VIII. Within one month after the expiration of every twelve calendar months from the date of the registry of the first memorial, the Managers shall cause a further memorial to be registered in the same Court, setting forth the same particulars with respect to the persons then being shareholders of the Company, and also the persons then being Managers of the Company.

IX. When several persons are jointly interested in any share, the name, addition, and place of abode of every such person shall be separately entered in every such memorial, and each of such persons shall be considered as jointly and separately liable for the engagements of the Company on account of such share ; unless when such share belongs to any other registered Company, in which case the name of such Company shall be entered in the memorial instead of the names of the partners thereof.

X. The several memorials shall be signed by one of the Managers of the Company, and verified by a declaration before the Master of the Supreme Court : and if any such declaration be false in any material particular, the person wilfully making such false declaration shall be liable to the penalties of perjury.

XI. An office copy of any such registered deed or memorial or of any part thereof, issued under the seal of the Court, shall be received in evidence before all Courts as proof of the contents thereof, and no proof shall be required that the person, by whom any such memorial purports to be verified, was a manager of the Company.

XII. The keeper of the records of the Supreme Court shall allow all persons at reasonable times to inspect any such deed or memorial, and shall furnish office copies of any such deed or memorial, or any part thereof under the seal of the Court, to all persons applying for the same.

XIII. Such fees shall be paid for registering every such deed and memorial, and for allowing inspection and furnishing copies thereof, or of any part thereof, as the Judges of the Supreme Court, with the approval of the Governor or Governor in Council, from time to time, shall establish.

XIV. Subject to the provisions of the deed of partnership, every shareholder in any such registered Company may sell and transfer all or any of his shares therein by a deed according to the form in the Schedule annexed to this Act, or to the like effect, and the same, when duly executed, shall be delivered to the Secretary, who shall make an entry thereof in a book to be called the Register of Transfers, and shall endorse such entry on the deed of transfer, and deliver an acknowledgment of the receipt thereof to the purchaser, for which entry and endorsement the Company shall be entitled to have a fee not exceeding one rupee ; and until such transfer is so entered and endorsed the purchaser of the share shall not be entitled to receive any share of the profits of the business, or to vote in respect of such share.

XV. No shareholder shall be entitled to transfer any share until he has paid all calls at that time due on every share held by him.

XVI. The directors may close the register of transfers for a time not exceeding fourteen days before each ordinary half yearly meeting, and may fix a day for closing the same, of which seven days' notice shall be given in the *Government Gazette*.

XVII. The Company shall not be bound to see to the execution of any trust, whether express, implied, or constructive, to which any share is subject ; and the receipt of the person in whose name any share stands in the books of the Company, or in the case of a minor, idiot, or lunatic, the receipt of the guardian or Committee, or where the share stands in more than one name, the receipt of the person whose name stands first, shall be a sufficient discharge to the Company for any dividend or other sum of money payable on account of such share, whether or not the Company had notice of any such trust ; and the Company shall not be bound to see to the application of any money paid on such receipt.

XVIII. Every such registered Company shall sue and be sued by the registered name of the Company,

as if it were an incorporated Company, and in no other manner.

XXIX. In any indictment or information for any theft or embezzlement of the monies or goods of the said Company, or for any other offence committed against them or their property, or with intent to defraud or injure them, they may be described by the registered name of the Company.

XX. In any suit brought in the name of any such registered Company the plaintiffs shall be liable to be nonsuited, unless it is proved on their part that the suit is brought by direction of one or more of the partners appointed at a general meeting to be managers or directors of the Company.

XXI. No such suit, indictment, information or other proceeding shall abate or be prejudiced by any change of the persons constituting the partnership, or of the managers.

XXII. No suit by or against the Company shall be in any wise affected by the defendant or plaintiff therein being or having been a shareholder of the Company: but any such shareholder, either alone or jointly with any other person or persons as against the Company, or the Company as against any such shareholder, either alone or jointly with any other person or persons, shall have the same right of action, remedy, and execution, in respect of any claim whatever, as the shareholder or Company would have had, if such claim had been against a stranger.

XXIII. Every judgment in any proceeding against the Company shall be executed in the first instance against the joint property and effects of the Company only, and not, except as hereinafter provided, against the separate property and effects of any shareholder.

XXIV. Any plaintiff, having obtained such judgment against the Company, which is not satisfied within fourteen days thereafter, may apply to the Supreme Court of Judicature for a rule or rules, calling upon any one or more of the persons, who at the time when the proceedings were commenced were registered shareholders of the Company, simultaneously or successively, to shew cause why execution in satisfaction of such judgment should not be had against him or them.

XXV. On the return of any such rule, the Court may, if it shall think fit, direct an issue or issues to be tried for determining any disputed points which are material to its judgment, and may either discharge or make the rule absolute, or make such order or orders therein, and as to the costs of the application as to the Court shall seem fit; and, if any such rule is made absolute, such writ of execution shall be sued out thereon as the Court, from time to time, shall devise and order, and execution of any such writ shall be had in like manner as of any other writ of the like nature.

XXVI. If satisfaction of the judgment cannot be had by the proceedings against the Company or the registered shareholders as aforesaid, the plaintiff may have execution, in like manner, against the person, property, and effects of any person who, within three years before the time when the proceeding was commenced, in which such judgment was obtained, was a registered proprietor, either when the cause of action arose, or at any time subsequently.

XXVII. Every person, against whom or against whose property and effects any such judgment shall

have been executed, shall be reimbursed out of the property and effects of the Company for all monies paid, and for all damages sustained by him, to be ascertained and certified by some officer of the Court out of which the judgment issued, and shall be entitled forthwith to have execution against the property and effects of the Company for the amount of such expenses and damages with lawful interest thereon.

XXVIII. If such shareholder or former shareholder be not thereby fully paid all such expenses and damages with interest thereon, the amount thereof or of so much as he has not received shall be divided into as many parts as there are then shares in the said business, not including forfeited shares, and the holder of every share for the time being shall pay one of such parts on demand, and in default thereof the person against whom execution was had in default of the Company may apply to the Court for a rule calling on every such shareholder to shew cause why execution should not issue against him for the amount due from him; and, if such rule be made absolute, execution shall issue thereon as if the person suing out such rule had been the plaintiff, and the person to whom the rule is directed the defendant, in a suit in which judgment had been given for recovering such amount.

XXIX. If by the bankruptcy or insolvency of any shareholder, or from any other cause other than the neglect or wilful default of the persons entitled to have contribution as aforesaid from the shareholders, the amount of any number of such parts shall not be recovered from the persons liable to pay the same, the deficiency shall be again divided in like manner as the original amount of the expenses and damages incurred, and the same process shall be repeated, and so as often as shall be necessary, until the whole amount of the said expense and damage shall have been rateably contributed by all the solvent shareholders, according to the number of their shares respectively.
