The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 9th of November 1849.

ACT . No. --- or 1849.

An Act for freedom of the Coasting Trade of India.

Whereas by an Act of Parliament passed in the thirteenth year of the reizn of Her Majesty, initialed An Act to amend the Laws in force for the encouragement of British Shipping and Navigation, it is enacted with regard to the Coasting Trade of India, that it shall be lawful for the Governor General of India in Council to make any regulations authorizing or permitting the conveyance of goods or passengers from one part of the possessions of the East India Company to another part thereof, in other than British Ships, subject to such restrictions or regulations as he may think necessary, It is enacted as follows:

I. Goods and Passengers may be conveyed from one part of the territories under the Government of the East India Company to another part thereof, in other than British Ships, without any restriction, other than is or shall be equally imposed on British Ships, for securing payment of duties of Customs or otherwise.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Conneil for the first time on the 9th of November 1849:

ACT No. -- OF 1849.

An Act for assimilating the Penal Jurisdiction of Police Magistrates at the Straits' Settlements to that of Justices of the Peace at Calcutta.

Whereas it is expedient to apply the provisions of the Acts XXI., 1839, and III., 1842, to the Straits' Settlements, It is enacted as follows:

- 1. All powers given by Act XXI., 1839, or Act III., 1842, to any Justice of the Peace for the Town of Calcutta, for the trial and punishment of certain simple Larcenies and other Felonies within the Town of Calcutta, and of assaults on board of Merchant Ships, in the River Hooghly, may be exercised by any Magistrate or Justice of the Peace, of the Settlements of Prince of Wales' Island, Singapore and Malacca, for the trial and punishment of the like Larcenies and Felonies, within the said Settlements respectively, and the like assaults on board of any Merchant Ship in the roads belonging to the said Settlements respectively.
- II. In execution of the powers of the said Acts, by any Magistrate or Justice of the Peace for any of the said Settlements, the said Acts shall be read, as if the said Settlement and the Recorder's Court there were severally mentioned therein, instead of the Town of Calcutta, and Supreme Court of Justice at Calcutta,

and as if the roads of the said Settlement were mentioned therein, instead of the River Hooghly, or the mouths thereof.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 16th of November 1849:

ACT No. --- OF 1849.

An Act to amend the Law for the Dismissal of Pleaders in Bengal.

Whereas the laws in force for the dismissal of pleaders, practising in the Courts of the East India Company; in the Presidency of Fort William, in Bengal, require amendment, It is enacted as follows:

- I. Section X., of Regulation XXVII. 1814, of the Bengal Code, is repealed.
- II. The power of dismissing pleaders practising in either of the Sudder Courts of the said Presidency is vested in the Judges of those Courts, respectively: the power of dismissing pleaders practising in the Courts of the Zillah Judges, or in Courts subordinate to them, in the said Presidency, is vested in the Zillah Judges, respectively.
- III. An appeal from the order of any Zillah Judge, for the dismissal of a pleader, may be made to the Sudder Dewannee Adawlut, according to the rules in force for the admission of appeals.
- IV. No such pleader shall be dismissed for any cause, other than is specified in Section VI. of Regulation XXVII., 1814, of the Bengal Code.

ACT No. -- OF 1849.

An Act for the protection of Judicial Officers.

For the greater protection of Magistrates and others acting judicially, It is enacted as follows:

I. No Judge, Magistrate, Justice of the Peace, Collector, or other person acting judicially shall be liable to be sued in any Civil Court, for any act done curity to the further amount stated, which, together with the above-mentioned deposit, will be held as security for the due fulfilment of every part of the Contract.

The Contractors will be required to comply with all demands, without delay or demor; the supplies must be unexceptionable, and of the best quality of the sort described in the Lists. not approved of by the Commissariat Executive Officer, or Indenting Officers, they will be rejected, and others will be purchased, wherever procurable, at their risk and loss; and in all such cases the Contractors will be liable to be fined (50) (30) per cent, on the fifty Rupees, or thirty amount of expense so incurred, at the option of the Executive Commissariat Officers, but if the Contractors are dissatisfied with the decision of the above Officers or either of them, they can claim to have the rejected articles examined by a Committee of Officers, whose decision thereupon shall be final.

Under the permission given by the Hon'ble the Court of Directors, in their Despatch No. 27, dated the 12th of September last, the Right Hop'ble the Governor in Council is pleased to natify, for the information of the remaining Members of Warden's Official Fund, that all those who are desirous of withdrawing from the Fund will be at liberty todo so, and to receive back their Subscriptions without Interest, provided they prefer their applications to the Head of the Department to which they belong, or, if not now in Government employ, to the Head of the Department in which they last served, within two months from the date of this notification being received by the Head of the Department.

The parties who may withdraw from Warden's Official Fund, under this Notification, will become eligible to Pensions under the Government Pension Regulations of the 8th of September 1835, on their retirement from Government employ.

or ordered to be done by him in the discharge of his Judicial duty, whether or not within the limits of his jurisdiction; provided that he at the time, in good faith, believed himself to have jurisdiction to do or order the act complained of: and no Officer of any Court or other person, bound to execute the lawful warrants or orders of any such Judge, Magistrate, Justice of the Peace, Collector, or other person acting judicially, shall be liable to be sued in any Civil Court, for the execution of any warrant or order, which he would be bound to execute, if within the jurisdiction of the person issuing the same.

ACT NO. --- OF 1849.

An Act for enabling Government to levy Tolls on public Roads.

Whereas it is expedient to enable Government to levy Tolls upon roads constructed at the expense of the Government, It is enacted as follows:

- 1. Acts IJ., 1837, and VIII., 1838, are repealed, but not so as to revive any Regulation or Act thereby repealed.
- II. The Governor of Fort William in Bengal, the Lieutenant Governor of the North Western Provinces of Bengal, the Governor of Fort St. George in Council, and the Governor of Bombay in Council, may cause such rates of Toll as they may respectively think fit to be levied upon any road which may have been or may hereafter be made or repaired at the expense of the Government, and may place the collection of such Tolls under the management of such persons as may appear to them proper; And all persons employed in the management and collection of such Tolls shall be liable to the same responsibilities as would belong to them if employed in the collection of the land Revenue.
- III. In case of non-payment of any such Toll on demand, the Officers appointed to collect the same may seize any of the carriages or animals on which it is chargeable; and if any Toll remains undischarged for twenty-four hours, with the costs arising from such seizure, the case shall be brought before the Officer appointed to superintend the collection of the said Toll, who may sell the property seized for discharge of the Toll, and all expenses occasioned by such non-payment, seizure, and sale, and cause any balance that may remain to be returned, on demand, to the owner of the property.
- IV. All Police Officers shall be bound to assist the Toll Collectors, when required, in the execution of this Act, and for that purpose shall have the same power which they have in the exercise of their common Police duties.
 - V. Any person aggrieved by the unlawful seizure

or sale of any property under this Act, may have redress by suit in the Civil Court of the zillah.

VI. The Tolls, levied under this Act, shall be deemed public revenue.

For removal of doubts whether the powers of Act XXVIII., 1839, for taking any ground within the Islands of Bombay and Colaba, for any new public road or throughtare, are available for enabling the Government to take land needed for any railway for the conveyance of goods or passengers within the said Islands, the construction of which may be sanctioned by Parliament or by the Government of India, and for extending the powers of the said Act to other public purposes, It is enacted as follows:

I. Sections XV. to XXI., both inclusive, of Act XXVIII., 1839, as amended by Act () 1849, shall extend to enable the Board of Conservancy, with the sanction of the Governor of Bombay in Council, to take any ground or building within the Islands of Bombay and Colaba, which may be needed by the Governor of Bombay in Council for any railway for the conveyance of goods or passengers, the construction of which is or shall be sanctioned by Parliament, or by the Government of India, or for any other purpose which shall be declared to be a purpose of public utility by the said Governor in Council; and thereupon the East India Company shall become and be the legal owners of the said ground or building, and every other person theretofore interested in the premises shall be divested of all right, title, and interest to and in the same.

SAILING DIRECTIONS FOR THE PORT OF AKYAB, IN THE ARRACAN RIVER.

Ships sailing for Akyab duzing the South-West Moonsoon should steer for the South end of the Western Bolongo, in Lat. 19° 50′ N., Long, 93° 3′ E., then standing along the Coast to the Northward and Westward about five or six Miles off Shore, until the Light is sighted on the Great Savage, at the entrance of the Arracan River, then steer so as to bring it to bear N. by East or N. N. E., and if they intend to run in during the night, with either of these bearings they will cross the bar in the best water, in three fathoms low water spring tides.

After deepening across it, the course should be altered to N. by W. or even N. N. W., according to the state of the Tide and Sea at the time, to avoid the Western Rocks (above water) bearing from the Light S. W. ½ S., distant nearly half a mile; the Flood Tide sets in on these Rocks.

When the Light bears East in six to nine fathoms on the edge of the flat to the Weştward, the course must be altered to N. N. E. and N. E. by N.; having brought the Light to bear S. E. by S. \(\frac{1}{2}\) S. the Ship will be inside of Passage Rock, which is five to seven feet above water, and bears from the Savage Light N. W. \(\frac{1}{2}\) N. distant a quarter of a mile, and should then steer N. E. Easterly, to avoid the Reef projecting from Faqueer's Point, a mile in extent to the South; some of the Rocks are above water at balf ebb. There is a Red Buoy placed on the Southern entrance, in about nine fathoms, which with attention may be seen in a clear night without the Moon, and after bringing Faqueer's Point to bear N. W. by N. to N. W. the Ship should anchor.

On Faqueer's Point a small Light House is nearly finished, the Light of which will be a deep red, and will be seen about six miles, or three miles beyond the Bar, as a leading mark to clear the Western Rocks, keeping it a little open to the Westward of the Savage Light when steering in or out, also to point out when the Ship is inside of the Reef off Faqueer's Point. With this Light bearing N. W. by N. to N. W. is good anchorage, having excellent holding ground, and perfectly sheltered from the Sea.

A stranger should not attempt to run in at night, particularly in the rains, except at high or low water, as the ebb tide runs very rapidly in strong eddies off the Passage Rock, over the dangerous flat to the Westward; and the flood in strong eddies upon the Rocks.

During the N. E. Monsoon, Ships bound to Akyab, from the Northward, should endeavour to make the Table Land of the Western Bolongo in Lat. 20° 1′ N., then steering due East they will avoid the Oyster Reef in Lat. 20° 5′ N., Long. 92° 40′ East, which is distant from the Savage Light fifteen miles due West. This course is recommended, as although in favorable weather the Savage Light is seen, outside the Reef in 16 to 17 fathoms water, the depth suddenly decreases, and the probability of hazy or rainy weather would prevent the Light being seen, and steering boldly in to sight it, to the Northward of Lat. 20° 1′ would endanger the safety of the Vessel, by suddenly falling upon the Oyster Rock or Reef before sighting the Light House.

I would not advise strangers on any occasion to make use of the Channel inside of the Oyster Rock or Reef.

The directions above given by Captain Paterson were published in 1844. The Red Light referred to was finished and first exhibited in 1845. In 1848 a Red Buoy was laid on the N. E. edge of the Bar, in 3½ fathoms low water.

The following additional directions are therefore considered necessary by the Port Master, and by Captain Dicey, of the Hon'ble Company's Steamer Tenasserim.

In the event of the Red Buoy on the edge of the Bar breaking adrift, it is recommended in working across the Bar not to bring the Great Savage Light to bear more Easterly than N. E. by N. until you deepen over. When you do so, Captain Paterson's directions may be followed.

Captain Paterson's caution as to not going in at night, must still be attended to, as the Red Light is not seen till the Bar is crossed.

A PROCLAMATION.

VICTORIA R.

Whereas by Our Order in Council of this day's date we were graciously pleased to annul, from and after the Thirty-first day of December next, Our Royal Prolamations of the Ninteenth day of May and the Sixth day of July, One thousand eight hundred and forty-six, regulating, according to the scheme set forth therein or recognised thereby, the distribution of the net proceeds of Prizes captured from the enemy, of captures and seizures under the several Acts of Parliament passed relating to the Revenues of Customs, and to Trade and Navigation, for the Abolition of the Slave Trade, for the capture and destruction of Piratical Vessels, and of the Rewards conferred for the same, as also of the awards for all Salvage granted to the Crews of Our Ships and Vessels of War, when not otherwise specially apportioned by the terms of the respective Awards and Allowances; And in consequence of several new Ratings and Denominations of Officers and others having been introduced into Our Naval Service since the dates of Our said former Proclamations, and for other causes, it is expedient that provision should be made for the future distribution of such net proceeds and Salvage not otherwise specially apportioned, and all other monies whatsoever granted to be shared in the manner of Prize Money.

We do, therefore, now make known to all Our loving subjects, and to all others whom it may concern, by this Our Proclamation, by and with the advice and consent of Our Privy Council, that Our Royal Will and Pleasure is, and we do hereby direct, That the distribution of all such net Proceeds of Prizes, Rewards, Allowances, Salvage, Awards, and of all Bounties and Grants whatsoever distributable to Our Royal Navy in the manner of Prize Money, shall be made as follows; viz.—

- That the Flag Officer or Officers shall have one-sixteenth part of the whole net proceeds arising from Prizes captured from the Enemy, and from all other captures, seizures, &c., as aforesaid, made by any of the Ships or Vessels under his or their Command, and of the Rewards conferred for the same, according to the following conditions and modifications, save and except as hereinafter provided and directed; that is to say, When there is but one Flag Officer he shall have the entire one-sixteenth; when two Flag Officers shall be sharing together, the Chief shall have two-thirds, and the other Flag Officer shall have the remaining one-third of the one-sixteenth part; and when there shall be more than two Flag Officers, the Chief shall receive one-half of the said one-sixteenth, and the remaining half shall be equally divided among the Junior Flag Officers; Commodores of the First Class and Captains of the Fleet to share as Flag Officers.
- Provided always, That no Flag Officer, unless actually on board any of Our Ships or Vessels of War, and at the actual taking, sinking, burning, or otherwise destroying any Ship or Ships of War or Privateers belonging to the Enemy, shall share in the Distribution of any Head Money or Bounty Money granted as a Reward for the taking, sinking, burning, or otherwise destroying any such Ship or Vessel of the Enemy.
- That no Flag Officer, unless actually present at the capture or destruction of any Pirate Ship, Vessel, or Boat, shall be entitled to share in any distribution of the Proceeds or Bounty in respect of the Crews of such Piratical Ship, Vessel, or Boat,
- That no Flag Officer shall share in any Remuneration or Reward conferred or awarded to any of Our Ships or Vessels as Salvage, unless he shall have been actually on board the Ship or Vessel to which the Award shall be made, or have personally aided and assisted in the transaction at the time the service was rendered.
- That no Flag Officer commanding in any Port in the United Kingdom shall share in the Proceeds of any Prizes captured from the Enemy, nor in other Captures, Seizures, Rewards, or any distributive Proceeds as aforesaid, made by any Ships or Vessels which shall sail from or leave such Port by Order of the Lord High Admiral, or of Our Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral.
- That when Ships or Vessels under the Command of several Flag Officers belonging to separate Stations shall be Joint Captors, &c., each Flag Officer shall receive a Proportion of the one-sixteenth, according to the number of Officers and Men present under the command of each such Flag Officer, and when Ships or Vessels under Orders from the Lord High Admiral, or from Our Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral, are Joint Captors, &c., with other Ships or Vessels under a Flag or Flags, the like Regulation as to the apportionment of the Flag share to the Flag Officer or Officers is to be observed.

And with reference to these Regulations it is to be noted, that a Captain, Commander, or other Commanding Officer of a Ship or Vessel shall be deemed to be under the command of a Fiag when he shall actually have received some order from, or be acting in the execution of some order issued by a Flag Officer, whether he be or be not within the limits of the station of such Flag Officer; and in the event of his being directed to join a Flag Officer on any station, he shall be deemed to be under the command of such Flag Officer from the time when he arrives within the limits of the station, which circumstance is always to be carefully noted in the Log Book; and it shall be considered that he continues under the Flag Officer of such station until he shall have received some order directly from, or be acting in the execution of some order issued by some other Flag Officer, duly authorized, or by the Lord High Admiral, or Our Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral.

And we hereby direct, That the Captain, Commander, Licutenant Commanding, or Master Commanding. or any other Officer Commanding any Ship, Sloop, or Vessel of War, singly making a Capture or Seizure, or otherwise entitled to the distributive Benefit arising from any Proceeds, Reward, Grant, Bounty, Salvage, or Award as aforesaid, that is to say, the Officer actually in command at the time shall have one-eighth of the remainder, or if there is no Flag, one-eighth of the entire act Proceeds; and if more than one Commanding Officer of the same Rank of Command shall be entitled to share as Joint Captors, &c., the one-eighth shall be equally divided between them; but when Captains, Commanders, Lieutenants Commanding, and Masters Commanding, respectively, Our Ships, Sloops, and Vessels of War, shall share together, in whatever variety of combination, the one-eighth shall be so divided into parts for a graduated Apportionment, as to provide for each Captain receiving six parts, each Commander of a Sloop three parts, and each Lieutenant Commanding or Master Commanding a Vessel of War, two parts, which we hereby direct shall be the proportion in which they shall respectively share; Commodores of the Second Class, and Field Officers of Marines or of Land Forces serving as Marines doing duty as Field Officers, (above the Rank of Major,) to share as Captains; and Field Officers of Marines or of Land Forces serving, as Marines, and doing duty in the rank of Major, to share as Commanders of Sloops.

And we hereby further direct, That after provision shall thus have been made for the Flag share (if any), and for the portion of the Commanding Officer or Officers, the remainder of the net proceeds shall be distributed in Ten Classes, so that each Officer, Man, and Boy composing the rest of the complements of Our Ships, Sloops, and Vessels of War, and actually on board; at the time of any such capture, Seizure, &c., as aforesaid; and every person present and assisting, shall receive shares, or parts of shares, according to his Class, as set forth in the following Scale:—

- First Class:—Commanders under Captains in rated Ships, Masters of the Fleet, Medical Inspectors, Inspectors of Steam Machinery affoat in or with any Ship or Ships above the sixth rate,—Forty shares each.
- Second Class:—First Lieutenants in rated Ships not bearing Commanders, Secretaries to Admirals of the Fleet or to Admirals Commanding in Chief, Deputy Medical Inspectors, Inspectors of Steam Machinery affoat in or with any Ship or Vessel below the Fifth Rate,—Twenty-five Shares each.
- Third Class:—Sea Lieutenants, Masters, Captains of Marines, of Marine Artillery, or of Land Forces doing duty as Marines, whether having higher Brevet Rank or not, Secretaries to Admirals or to Commodores of the First Class not Commanding in Chief, Chief Engineers of the First Class,—Twenty Shares each.
- Fourth Class: Lieutenants or Quarter Masters of Marines, Lieutenants of Marine Artillery, Lieutenants, Quarter Masters, or Ensigns of Land Forces doing duty as Marines, Secretaries to Commodores of the Second Class, Chaplains, Surgeons, Paymasters, and Pursers, Naval Instructors, Mates, Assistant Surgeons, Second Masters, Chief. Engineers of the Second and Third Classes, Gunners, Boatswains, Carpenters, Assistant Engineers, Engineers not yet on the Establishment, as regulated by the Order in Council of 1847, Clerks in Charge, Passed Clerks,—Twelve Shares each.
- Fifth Class:—Midshipmen, Masters' Assistants, Clerks (not passed), Naval Cadets, Assistant Clerks,—Seven Shares each.
- Sixth Class:—Seamen's Schoolmasters, Masters at Arms, Chief Boatswain's Mates, Admirals' and Captains' Coxswains, Ship's Corporals, Quarter Masters, Gunners', Boatswains', and Carpenters' Mates, Captains of the Forecastle, of the After-Guard, of the Hold, of the Main Top, and of the Fore Top, Coxswains of the Launch, Sailmakers, Ropemakers, Caulkers, Leading Stokers, Ship's Cooks, Blacksmiths, Pilots, Serjeants of Marines, of Marine Artillery, or of Land Forces doing duty as Marines, Six Shares each.
- Seventh Class:—Captains of the Mast and Mizen Top, Yeomen of Signals, Coxswains of the Barge, Pinnace, and Cutter, Second Captains of the Forecastle, of the Main Top, of the Fore Top, and of the After-Guard, Sailmakers' and Caulkers' Mates, Paymasters' and Pursers' Stewards, Musicians, Coopers, Armourers, Corporals of Marines, or of Land Forces doing duty as Marines, Bombardiers of Marine Artillery, Head Kroomans,—Four Shares each.
- Eighth Class:—Able Seamen, Carpenter's, Sailmaker's, and Cooper's Crew, Yeomen of Store Rooms, Ordinary Seamen, Privates and Fifers of Marines, or of Land Forces doing duty as Marines, Gunners of Marine Artillery, Painters, Stokers, Coal Trimmers, Second Head Kroomans, Sick Berth Attendants, Bandsmen,—Two Shares each.
- Ninth Class:—Cooks' Mates, Paymaster's and Purser's Stewards' Mates, Paymaster's and Purser's Stewards' Boys, Admiral's Domestics, the Stewards and Cooks of Admirals, of Captains of the Ward Room, of the Gun Room, and of Sub-Officers; Second Class Ordinary Seamen, Assistant Stokers, Barbers, Tailors, Landsmen, Ship's Boys of the First Class, Engineer Boys, First and Second Class Kroomans, Supernumeraries borne for victuals only, not specially authorized to do duty, persons borne merely as Passengers, and not declining to render assistance on any occasion of Capture, Scizure, &c.,—One Share and one quarter of a Share each.
- Tenth Class: -Ship's Boys below the First Class, -Three quarters of a Share each.

Seamen Gunners to share in all Captures, Seizures, Rewards, &c., as aforesaid, in the Class immediately above that in which their Rating is mentioned.

And in all cases in which supernumeraries, whether Officers or Men, shall be ordered to do duty on board any of Our Ships or Vessels by the Lord High Admiral, or by Our Commissioners for executing the

Office of Lord High Admiral, or by other proper authority, (the orders of the Captain or Commanding Officer, if no Senior be present, to be deemed sufficient authority,) of which due notation as to fact and authority is to be made in the Muster Books, they shall share according to the Class of the Ranks or Ratings which they respectively hold in the Service, if not ordered to do duty in a higher capacity.

And in order that Our Royal intentions herein may be duly carried into effect, We further direct that when any Capture or Seizure is made, or service performed for which a distributable Grant or Reward is to be, or is expected to be, conferred or awarded to any of Our Ships or Vessels of War, the Captain or Commanding Officer shall transmit or cause to be transmitted, as soon as may be, to the Secretary of the Admiralty, a true and perfect list of all the Officers, Seamen, Marines, Soldiers, and others who were actually on board on the occasion, accompanied by a separate List containing the names of those belonging to the Crew who were absent on duty or otherwise at the time, specifying the cause of such absence; each List to contain the quality of Service of each person, together with the description of the Men, taken from the Description Book of the Ship or Vessel, and their several Ratings, to be subscribed by the Captain or Commanding Officer, and three or more of the Chief Officers on board. And when the List of those actually on board shall have been verified on Examination with the Muster Books, &c. the Accountant General of Our navy shall, upon request, grant to the Agent or Agents nominated or appointed by the Captors or Seizers, &c., a certificate that such List is correct or has been corrected, as occasion may require, for the due distribution of the respective Prize or other Proceeds distributable as Prize Money.

And in the event of difficulty arising with respect to any of the Regulations hereby proposed, or if any case should occur not herein provided for, or not sufficiently provided for, We are pleased hereby to authorize the Lord High Admiral, or Our Commissoners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral for the time being, to issue such directions thereupon as may appear just and expedient; which directions shall have the same force and effect as if specially provided for in this Our Royal Proclamation.

Provided always, That the Distribution hereinbefore ordered shall take effect only with respect to the Proceeds of Captures, Seizures, and Services as aforesaid, which shall be made and performed on and after the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty; and that the Proceeds arising from all Captures, Seizures, and Services as aforesaid, made or performed prior to that date shall be distributed in accordance with any Proclamation or Proclamations now in force or in force at the time of such captures, seizures, or services, and applicable thereto, which we are pleased hereby to direct accordingly.

Given at our Court at Osborne House, Isle of Wight, this Thirtieth day of July, in the year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-nine, and in the thirteenth year of Our Reign.

Bearings from the Rock.

The following information is furnished by Captain Biden, Master Attendant at Madras, who surveyed the Rocks in 1846.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

SAILING INSTRUCTIONS as a guide when Ships or Vessels are on the Coast of Orixa, or off the SANTAPILLAY ROCKS.

1. Whereas a recent survey of the SANTA-PILLAY ROCKS under the direction of Lientenant Fell, I. N., and a further inspection thereof by the Master Attendant, on the 6th instant, clearly prove that those Rocks comprise one of the most dangerons shoals in the Indian Seas, and as no well-defined land-mark has hitherto been notified for the purpose of indicating their locality, and warning Commanders of Ships and Vessels of their near approach to those Rocks, it is therefore expedient to publish the following remarks for the guidance of all Mariners who may navigate the Cost of Orixa, and the Bay of Bengal.

 The Santapillay Rocks are in Latitude 17° 59′ 25″ N. Longitude 83° 47′ 37″ E.

and are distant from the Coast between 5 and 6 miles. They are about ten feet under water, steep to on all sides, and their extent is not beyond 200 yards in length. When there is but little wind and a smooth sea, this shoal presents no indication by broken or discolored water, as Lieutenant Fell, when in search of it during very fine weather, brought the Surveying Brig "Kristna" to anchor within 100 yards of the Rocks before he could observe the slightest appearance of a Shoal. He then proceeded in one of that Vessel's boats over the Rocks, and found 10½ feet on the shoalest part; on the Eastern side 7 and 10 fathoms; and on the Western limit 10½ fathoms, rocky bottom.

3. The Master Attendant surveyed the Santapillay Rocks in the H. C.'s Steam Vessel " Hugh on the 6th instant, during fine weather; Lindsay, and with a moderate breeze from S. W. and a ground swell, the breakers were clearly discerned from the mast head at the distance of 6 or 7 miles, bearing due South, and Santapillay Peak bearing W. b. N. in 7 fathoms, off shore about 2 miles. The breakers were soon after seen from the deck; and at 11 h. 45 m. A. M., when the Reef, which broke with considerable force, bore from S. 56° E. to S. 57° E., and Santapillay Peak was bearing N. 43° W., the "Hugh Lindsay" was anchored in 91 fathoms, coarse sand and shells, distant from the reef 2 miles; and from the Coast 33 miles. Latitude, by an indifferent observation, 18° 1' N. 4. Two boats were sent under Captain Crawford, to examine the reef, and they carried regular soundings from the Steamer of 9 and 9½ fathoms until within a quarter of a mile, and in less than 100 yards of the breakers, where they found 10¼ and 10½ fathoms, rocky bottom. The breakers were too high to admit of the boats crossing over the reef; but Captain Crawford pulled round it, and gave as his opinion that the Shoal, which lies N. N. W. and S. S. E. is in circumference about a quarter of a mile, with ten fathoms all round very close to the rocks. From the "Hugh Lindsay" the breakers seemed to exend the length of 200 yards.

5. The inner channel is safe for Ships and Vessels of every class, as soundings of 5 fathoms within a mile of the Coast, and 9½ fathoms within ¼ of a mile of the Rocks afford a clear space of nearly four miles in breadth.

6. In fair weather, and when the Peak of Santapillay is visible, that lofty and remarkable landmark affords an infallible guide to the true position of the Santapillay Rocks. This Peak is at least 2,000 feet above the level of the Sea, and presents a striking contrast to all the hills in its vicinity. It bears N.50° W, from the Rocks, and the base of the mountain is not more than 7 or 8 miles from the Coast.

7. But in thick weather, when no well-defined land-mark is discernible, then it becomes absolutely necessary to approach the Coast between Ganjam and Vizagapatam with great care and caution. Change of current, and the absence of all means, by night or day, of obtaining a single observation may, without strict and unremitting attention to soundings, place a Ship or Vessel in imminent peril close to, or upon the Santapillay Rocks, which should not be approached from the Eastward, by day or night, under 17 fathoms.
