The names of the parties, their occupation, and place of residence, who are to stand security, to be specified, and a Certificate, as per accompanying form, should be forwarded with the Tenders, which are to be superscribed "Tender for Medical Comforts," or as the case may be.

It is not to be binding on Government to take the articles enumerated in this list to the extent specified, but merely such quantity or quantities as may be considered necessary to meet the demands of the Service, whether they be under or over the probable annual consumption quoted. Should the supplies much exceed the probable consumption quoted, it is to be clearly understood that the Contractors will be allowed to advance no claim on Government on account of the same.

It is to be distinctly understood that every Detail of troops proceeding from this to the interior, whose numerical strength exceeds (7) seven men, is to be accompanied by one or more Bakers and Butchers, to provide fresh bread and meat on the line of march to the soldiers, and which Bakers and Butchers are to be provided by the Contractors, and the bread and meat to be supplied at separate rates, as indicated in the list.

All the supplies are to be made in a cleaned state, free from sediment or dirt of any kind, and are invariably to be furnished of the best description of the sort or kind required ; and all charges for their conveyance and delivery to the Corps and Departments requiring them, to be borne by the Contractors, as no public carriage will be allowed for that purpose.

The Contractors shall also be bound to supply Tea, Black Pouchong, and Green Hyson ; also Spirits and Wines, of the best sort, to the Hospitals and Troops at this station.

In the event of any of the articles herein named being required either larger or smaller, or of superior quality than the size and description specified, they are to be furnished without hesitation or demur, at rates increased or diminished (as the case may be) proportionally : such charges being passed on the Receiving Officer's Certificate.

It is further to be understood, that Government will be at liberty to obtain supplies of all or any of the above articles by manufacture in their Jails, or from any Departments, &c., notwithstanding any Contract that may be entered into with reference to this list.

The Tenders for these Contracts will be opened in the presence of such of the parties as are in attendance at this Office, precisely on the day and hour specified, and no Tender can be received afterwards.

Any retrenchments by the Military Board on account of errors in the rates, over charges, &c., to be recovered from the first Bills presented for payment.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 9th of November 1849.

ACT No. — OF 1849.

An Act for freedom of the Coasting Trade of India.

Whereas by an Act of Parliament passed in the thirteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty, intituled An Act to amend the Laws in force for the encouragement of British Shipping and Navigation, it is enacted with regard to the Coasting Trade of India, that it shall be lawful for the Governor General of India in Council to make any regulations authorizing or permitting the conveyance of goods or passengers from one part of the possessions of the East India Company to another part thereof, in other than British Ships, subject to such restrictions or regulations as he may think necessary, It is enacted as follows :

I. Goods and Passengers may be conveyed from one part of the territories under the Government of the East India Company to another part thereof, in other than British Ships, without any restriction, other than is or shall be equally imposed on British Ships, for securing payment of duties of Customs or otherwise.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India, after the 9th day of February 1850.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 9th of November 1849 :

ACT No. — OF 1849.

An Act for assimilating the Penal Jurisdiction of Police Magistrates at the Straits' Settlements to that of Justices of the Peace at Calcutta.

Whereas it is expedient to apply the provisions of the Acts XXI., 1839, and III., 1842, to the Straits' Settlements, It is enacted as follows :

I. All powers given by Act XXI., 1839, or Act III., 1842, to any Justice of the Peace for the Town of Calcutta, for the trial and punishment of certain simple Larcenies and other Felonies within the Town of Calcutta, and of assaults on board of Merchant Ships, in the River Hooghly, may be exercised by any Magistrate or Justice of the Peace, of the Settlements of Prince of Wales' Island, Singapore and Malacca, for the trial and punishment of the like Larcenies and Felonies, within the said Settlements respectively, and the like assaults on board of any Merchant Ship in the roads belonging to the said Settlements respectively.

II. In execution of the powers of the said Acts, by any Magistrate or Justice of the Peace for any of the said Settlements, the said Acts shall be read, as if the said Settlement and the Recorder's Court there were severally mentioned therein, instead of the Town of Calcutta, and Supreme Court of Justice at Calcutta,

and as if the roads of the said Settlement were mentioned therein, instead of the River Hooghly, or the mouths thereof.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 16th of November 1849 :

ACT No. — OF 1849.

An Act to amend the Law for the Dismissal of Pleaders in Bengal.

Whereas the laws in force for the dismissal of pleaders, practising in the Courts of the East India Company, in the Presidency of Fort William, in Bengal, require amendment, It is enacted as follows :

I. Section X., of Regulation XXVII. 1814, of the Bengal Code, is repealed.

II. The power of dismissing pleaders practising in either of the Sudder Courts of the said Presidency is vested in the Judges of those Courts, respectively: the power of dismissing pleaders practising in the Courts of the Zillah Judges, or in Courts subordinate to them, in the said Presidency, is vested in the Zillah Judges, respectively.

III. An appeal from the order of any Zillah Judge, for the dismissal of a pleader, may be made to the Sudder Dewannee Adawlut, according to the rules in force for the admission of appeals.

IV. No such pleader shall be dismissed for any cause, other than is specified in Section VI. of Regulation XXVII., 1814, of the Bengal Code.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 16th of November 1849.

ACT No. — OF 1849.

An Act for the protection of Judicial Officers.

For the greater protection of Magistrates and others acting judicially, It is enacted as follows :

I. No Judge, Magistrate, Justice of the Peace, Collector, or other person acting judicially shall be liable to be sued in any Civil Court, for any act done

or ordered to be done by him in the discharge of his Judicial duty, whether or not within the limits of his jurisdiction; provided that he at the time, in good faith, believed himself to have jurisdiction to do or order the act complained of; and no Officer of any Court or other person, bound to execute the lawful warrants or orders of any such Judge, Magistrate, Justice of the Peace, Collector, or other person acting judicially, shall be liable to be sued in any Civil Court, for the execution of any warrant or order, which he would be bound to execute, if within the jurisdiction of the person issuing the same.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 16th of November 1849:

ACT No. — OF 1849.

An Act for enabling Government to levy Tolls on public Roads.

Whereas it is expedient to enable Government to levy Tolls upon roads constructed at the expense of the Government, It is enacted as follows:

I. Acts II., 1837, and VIII., 1838, are repealed, but not so as to revive any Regulation or Act thereby repealed.

II. The Governor of Fort William in Bengal, the Lieutenant Governor of the North Western Provinces of Bengal, the Governor of Fort St. George in Council, and the Governor of Bombay in Council, may cause such rates of Toll as they may respectively think fit to be levied upon any road which may have been or may hereafter be made or repaired at the expense of the Government, and may place the collection of such Tolls under the management of such persons as may appear to them proper; And all persons employed in the management and collection of such Tolls shall be liable to the same responsibilities as would belong to them if employed in the collection of the land Revenue.

III. In case of non-payment of any such Toll on demand, the Officers appointed to collect the same may seize any of the carriages or animals on which it is chargeable; and if any Toll remains undischarged for twenty-four hours, with the costs arising from such seizure, the case shall be brought before the Officer appointed to superintend the collection of the said Toll, who may sell the property seized for discharge of the Toll, and all expenses occasioned by such non-payment, seizure, and sale, and cause any balance that may remain to be returned, on demand, to the owner of the property.

IV. All Police Officers shall be bound to assist the Toll Collectors, when required, in the execution of this Act, and for that purpose shall have the same power which they have in the exercise of their common Police duties.

V. Any person aggrieved by the unlawful seizure

or sale of any property under this Act, may have redress by suit in the Civil Court of the zillah.

VI. The Tolls, levied under this Act, shall be deemed public revenue.

Resolved, that the Rule, requiring a previous publication of two months or three months before the passing of any Act of the Government of India, be suspended in respect to the following proposed Act, and that it be re-considered at the first Legislative Meeting after the 28th proximo.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 16th of November 1849:

ACT No. — OF 1849.

An Act for taking land in Bombay and Colaba for public purposes.

For removal of doubts whether the powers of Act XXVIII., 1839, for taking any ground within the Islands of Bombay and Colaba, for any new public road or thoroughfare, are available for enabling the Government to take land needed for any railway for the conveyance of goods or passengers within the said Islands, the construction of which may be sanctioned by Parliament or by the Government of India, and for extending the powers of the said Act to other public purposes, It is enacted as follows:

I. Sections XV. to XXI., both inclusive, of Act XXVIII., 1839, as amended by Act () 1849, shall extend to enable the Board of Conservancy, with the sanction of the Governor of Bombay in Council, to take any ground or building within the Islands of Bombay and Colaba, which may be needed by the Governor of Bombay in Council for any railway for the conveyance of goods or passengers, the construction of which is or shall be sanctioned by Parliament, or by the Government of India, or for any other purpose which shall be declared to be a purpose of public utility by the said Governor in Council; and thereupon the East India Company shall become and be the legal owners of the said ground or building, and every other person theretofore interested in the premises shall be divested of all right, title, and interest to and in the same.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 16th of November 1849 :

ACT No. — OF 1849.

An Act for settling the boundaries of the Tributary Mehals in Cuttack.

Whereas certain jungle or hill zemindaries in the Zillah of Cuttack, enumerated in Section XXXVI. of Regulation XII., 1805, of the Bengal Code, and the Territory of Mohurbunge, in the same Zillah, were temporarily exempt by the said Regulation from the Regulations relating to the settlement and collection of the public revenue, and, by Regulation XIII., 1805, of the Bengal Code, were temporarily exempt from the Laws and Regulations for the maintenance of the Police, and for the administration of justice in criminal cases, and whereas doubts have been entertained how disputes as to the boundaries of the said zemindaries are to be determined, It is enacted as follows :

I. Every case in which the boundaries between any of the said zemindaries, and an estate subject to the Regulations of the Bengal Code, shall be in dispute, shall be heard, tried, and determined in the first instance by the Superintendent of the Tributary Mehals, in Zillah Cuttack, according to such instructions as he shall, from time to time, receive from the Governor of Bengal; and his award, when confirmed by the Governor of Bengal, shall be final and conclusive, and shall be carried into execution by the Superintendent of Tributary Mehals, by giving possession of the land in dispute to the parties entitled under his award.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

The person or persons whose offer may be accepted, will be required to sign and seal a Contract, stipulating to the above effect, and that he or they will comply immediately with all emergent demands for the article included in the above-mentioned List, and will meet other demands of less urgency within the periods stated in the requisitions made upon him or them, in failure whereof, or if the supply be condemned by a Committee of Officers, as aforesaid, the Spirits Rectified, or such other as may be required in lieu thereof, shall be purchased by this Department, without reservation, at his or their risk and cost; and in all such cases an advance of Rupees (30) thirty per cent. upon the amount of expenses incurred, or a fine of Rupees (50) fifty, at the option of the Executive Officer, may be levied as liquidated damages for each and every such breach of Contract, as often as the same may occur; also the Contract may, in all such cases, be put an end to on the part of the East India Company.

No person will be allowed to bid for the Contract, unless he previously deposits in this Office the sum of Rupees (55) fifty-five, in cash, which sum will be forfeited in the event of delay, evasion, or refusal to execute the necessary Deed of Contract, should his offer be accepted; in which latter case he must be prepared to give unexceptionable bonded security to the extent of Rupees (220) two hundred and twenty, to be held by Government for the due fulfilment of his Contract.

It is to be distinctly understood, that Bills for the quantities of the article included in the above-mentioned List, supplied, shall be preferred within or before the expiration of one month from the date of the delivery of the article, in default of which the Contractor shall be liable to forfeit the full value or amount of the supplies for which Bills have not been so preferred, unless it shall clearly appear that the delay was unavoidable.

The amount of retrenchments made by the Military Board on the Contractor's Bills, will be recovered from the first Bills preferred for payment by the Contractor; but in the event of such retrenchments, or any portion thereof, being remitted, the amount, or so much of the amount as shall be so remitted, will then be refunded to him.

The annual outlay on the above Contract is estimated at Rupees 1,102, or thereabouts. All further particulars will be communicated on application at this Office, or at the time of bidding, and no reason will be assigned for the rejection of any offer.

The following information is furnished by Captain Biden, Master Attendant at Madras, who surveyed the Rocks in 1846.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

SAILING INSTRUCTIONS as a guide when Ships or Vessels are on the Coast of Orixa, or off the SANTAPILLAY ROCKS.

1. Whereas a recent survey of the SANTA-PILLAY ROCKS under the direction of Lieutenant Fell, I. N., and a further inspection thereof by the Master Attendant, on the 6th instant, clearly prove that those Rocks comprise one of the most dangerous shoals in the Indian Seas, and as no well-defined land-mark has hitherto been notified for the purpose of indicating their locality, and warning Commanders of Ships and Vessels of their near approach to those Rocks, it is therefore expedient to publish the following remarks for the guidance of all Mariners who may navigate the Coast of Orixa, and the Bay of Bengal.

2. The Santapillay Rocks are in
Latitude 17° 59' 25" N.
Longitude 83° 47' 37" E.

and are distant from the Coast between 5 and 6 miles. They are about ten feet under water, steep to on all sides, and their extent is not beyond 200 yards in length. When there is but little wind and a smooth sea, this shoal presents no indication by broken or discoloured water, as Lieutenant Fell, when in search of it during very fine weather, brought the Surveying Brig "Kristna" to anchor within 100 yards of the Rocks before he could observe the slightest appearance of a Shoal. He then proceeded in one of that Vessel's boats over the Rocks, and found 10½ feet on the shoalest part; on the Eastern side 7 and 10 fathoms; and on the Western limit 10½ fathoms, rocky bottom.

3. The Master Attendant surveyed the Santapillay Rocks in the H. C.'s Steam Vessel "Hugh Lindsay," on the 6th instant, during fine weather; and with a moderate breeze from S. W. and a ground swell, the breakers were clearly discerned from the mast head at the distance of 6 or 7 miles, bearing due South, and Santapillay Peak bearing W. b. N. in 7 fathoms, off shore about 2 miles. The breakers were soon after seen from the deck; and at 11 h. 45 m. A. M., when the Reef, which broke with considerable force, bore from S. 56° E. to S. 57° E., and Santapillay Peak was bearing N. 43° W., the "Hugh Lindsay" was anchored in 9½ fathoms, coarse sand and shells, distant from the reef 2 miles; and from the Coast 3½ miles. Latitude, by an indifferent observation, 18° 1' N.

4. Two boats were sent under Captain Crawford, to examine the reef, and they carried regular soundings from the Steamer of 9 and 9½ fathoms until within a quarter of a mile, and in less than 100 yards of the breakers, where they found 10½ and 10½ fathoms, rocky bottom. The breakers were too high to admit of the boats crossing over the reef; but Captain Crawford pulled round it, and gave as his opinion that the Shoal, which lies N. N. W. and S. S. E. is in circumference about a quarter of a mile, with ten fathoms all round very close to the rocks. From the "Hugh Lindsay" the breakers seemed to extend the length of 200 yards.

5. The inner channel is safe for Ships and Vessels of every class, as soundings of 5 fathoms within a mile of the Coast, and 9½ fathoms within ¼ of a mile of the Rocks afford a clear space of nearly four miles in breadth.

6. In fair weather, and when the Peak of Santapillay is visible, that lofty and remarkable land-mark affords an infallible guide to the true position of the Santapillay Rocks. This Peak is at least 2,000 feet above the level of the Sea, and presents a striking contrast to all the hills in its vicinity. It bears N. 50° W. from the Rocks, and the base of the mountain is not more than 7 or 8 miles from the Coast.

7. But in thick weather, when no well-defined land-mark is discernible, then it becomes absolutely necessary to approach the Coast between Ganjam and Vizagapatam with great care and caution. Change of current, and the absence of all means, by night or day, of obtaining a single observation may, without strict and unremitting attention to soundings, place a Ship or Vessel in imminent peril close to, or upon the Santapillay Rocks, which should not be approached from the Eastward, by day or night, under 17 fathoms.

No. 642 of 1849.—The following General Order by the Hon'ble the President of the Council of India in Council, No. 428, dated Fort William, the 16th November 1849, is re-published:—

1. Under instructions from the Hon'ble the Court of Directors, communicated in Military Letter to the Governor of the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal, No. 78, dated 19th September 1849, and with reference to Her Majesty's Warrant, dated 27th June 1846, the Hon'ble the President of the Council of India in Council is pleased to establish the following General Rules regarding claims to Indemnification for Losses by Officers and Soldiers of the Armies of the three Presidencies, to have effect from this date; also to re-publish, under separate heads, the several Regulations on the subject now in force at this Presidency.

GENERAL RULES.

2. Indemnification is not intended to make good the full amount of loss sustained, but is granted only to such extent as shall enable the claimant to re-equip himself for service.

3. Indemnification shall, invariably, be confined to losses which have been altogether unavoidable, and may be granted in the following cases; viz.

First.—For losses in action with the Enemy.

Second.—By Capture.

Third.—By Shipwreck, or by inevitable casualties on board Ship, occasioned by storms or stress of weather, when proceeding on duty.

Fourth.—By accidental Fire.

Fifth.—By the destruction of a public Store-house ; or,

Sixth.—By the destruction of Articles or of Horses, or *Baggage Cattle*, to prevent their falling into the hands of the Enemy, or to prevent the spreading of an infection or contagious disorder.

4. Provided, that in all the above cases the Articles or Animals were placed in the situation in which the loss occurred, under the sanction of proper authority ; that every exertion was used to prevent the loss ; and that any orders for the destruction of Articles or of Animals were issued by competent authority, and carried into effect with all possible promptitude.

5. No claim can be admitted in the following cases, viz.

First.—Losses from desertion.

Second.—From Articles having been improperly packed, placed, or left in improper situations.

Third.—From the death of Horses or *Baggage Cattle* by fatigue in the ordinary course of service.

Fourth.—From the breaking down of carriages, being private property.

Fifth.—From the loss of Accoutrements, Clothing, or necessaries in Hospital ; or,

Sixth.—From any circumstances whatever which might have been prevented, by proper care and attention, on the part of the Regiment or of the claimant, or person in charge.

6. No claim can be admitted from the representatives of Officers or men slain in action, or dying in consequence of wounds.

7. No indemnification shall be granted for losses sustained by Officers when proceeding on, or returning from leave, nor to those in receipt of Boat Allowance, that allowance being on a scale sufficient to remunerate them for all expenses attendant on the insurance of their property, as well as for their boat accommodation.

8. If an Officer or a Soldier shall have neglected to bring forward his claim for a period exceeding one month from the date of his loss, this delay shall be considered a sufficient reason for rejecting the claim, however valid it may be in other respects, unless the claimant can prove that he was unavoidably prevented from making an earlier claim.

9. Whenever *Baggage* or Articles of Equipment are sent by a vessel in which the Officer to whom they belong is not himself a passenger, it is incumbent upon such Officer to protect himself against loss by effecting an insurance thereupon ; and if he has an opportunity of doing so, and neglects to avail himself of it, no compensation will be given by the State for any loss that may happen.

10. When losses occur on Service in the Field, the General or other Officer in command shall assemble, with all convenient despatch, Committees for the investigation of claims arising out of those losses ; which Committees shall be guided by the principles laid down in this Regulation, and the whole of their proceedings, or certified copies thereof, shall be transmitted through the prescribed channel to the Commander in Chief for His Excellency's observations and opinions.

11. No claim shall be admitted on account of the loss of money, being the private property of individuals ; but in special cases, where public money, which has regularly been received by individuals, and has unavoidably remained in their hands, shall be lost on service, application for indemnification may be made according to the Form A., such application being supported by the several certificates and documents therein specified.

12. Claims on account of necessaries lost on Service, by Non-Commissioned Officers and Soldiers individually, shall contain a specification of the articles lost, and of their actual value at the time of their loss ; and Officers in charge of Troops and Companies, and Commanding Officers of Regiments, are held responsible that no such claim shall include any charge on account of articles not sanctioned as Regimental necessaries by the standing orders of the army.

13. Non-Commissioned Officers and Soldiers, who have been taken and detained as Prisoners of War, more than four months, shall not be allowed to receive indemnification for necessaries lost when they were taken prisoners ; all claims, therefore, made by men who have been Prisoners of War, shall contain a Statement of the precise period during which they were absent from their Regiments in consequence of being captured.

14. Such Officers only are entitled to compensation for loss of Horses in Action, as may be in receipt of Horse Allowance, either personally or as forming an item of their Staff Allowances.

15. Upon the first appearance of a disorder in any Horse, the Commanding Officer of the Station or Detachment will order a Committee to assemble, composed of such Officers as in his opinion are best qualified to judge of the nature of the disorders of Horses ; and if, upon examination, it shall appear, to the satisfaction of the Committee, that such Horse is infected with the *Farcy* or *Glanders*, it will be their duty to recommend that the animal be immediately shot, with a view to prevent contagion ; should the Commanding Officer concur in the opinion of the Committee, he will, by his counter-signature, confirm the proceedings, and order the Horse to be immediately shot, in the presence of a Commissioned Officer ; and the proprietor of the Horse is authorized to present a bill for compensation at the rates hereinafter mentioned, bearing an attestation on honor that the Horse destroyed was used by him as a Charger, or Parade Horse, and accompanied by a certified copy of the confirmed proceedings of the Committee, and such bill the Military Auditor General is authorised to pass without further reference.

16. The above Rule is applicable to the Chargers of Officers of the Light Cavalry and Horse Artillery, and of Officers attached to Horse Field Batteries, but not to Horses of Officers of any other Arm, nor to Staff Officers, except under peculiar circumstances of proximity to those of the Cavalry in Camp or other situation, where the destruction of a diseased Horse might be considered by the Commanding Officer of the Detachment a measure of necessary precaution.

17. The following rates of compensation for the loss of Chargers in Action, or shot in consequence of being infectionally diseased are sanctioned.

18. To Horse Artillery and Cavalry Officers for the loss of a Charger, selected from the ranks, or Remounts of their respective Corps, a compensation equal to the price they would have been entitled to receive on returning such Charger to the ranks, viz., the residue of the original price, after a deduction of ten per cent. per annum, for the period that may have elapsed since the date of selection.

19. To all Mounted Officers, for the loss of a Charger not selected from the ranks, at whatever price purchased, a compensation equal to the residue of such price, after the deduction of ten per cent. per annum, provided the residue do not exceed the sum of eight hundred rupees (800), which is the maximum of compensation allowed in any case.

20. Bills for compensation for the loss of a selected Charger are to be accompanied by a certificate, shewing, the owner's Name, Rank, Troop, and Regiment, from what Troop the animal was selected, whether a Stud Horse or otherwise, and those for compensation for a Charger not selected from the ranks by a declaration on honor, specifying the price paid and the date of purchase.

21. Compensation for Horses of the Irregular Cavalry, killed in Action, is sanctioned at the rate of Company's Rupees (125) One Hundred and Twenty-five, each. The same is also allowed when they are killed by fatigue, destroyed or disabled on extraordinary duties. On these occasions a Committee of Cavalry Officers is to be assembled for the purpose of ascertaining the circumstances attending each case, the nature of the duty on which the animal was employed, the authority for so employing him, either Civil or Military; the Commanding Officer is to declare that the accident arose from no neglect or cruelty of the rider, as far as he is acquainted with the circumstance; and he is also to state, to the best of his knowledge, that the Horse was in good and sound health, and capable of performing his general duties when detached. The Committee is to recommend such amount of compensation, in no case exceeding the prescribed maximum of Company's Rupees (125) One Hundred and Twenty-five, as taking into consideration their age, the period they have been in the service, and the amount originally paid for them, the owners may be deemed entitled to.

22. The proceedings of the Committee are to be prepared in accordance with the following Form; and Officers commanding Corps of Irregular Cavalry, whose reports will accompany the proceedings of the Committee, are enjoined to comply strictly with the instructions contained in the foregoing paragraph.

24. Compensation for Horses of Irregular Cavalry lost or missing in Action, or captured by the Enemy, is not

25. Compensation is sanctioned for European Commissioned and Warrant Officers, who may lose the whole of their Baggage and Camp Equipage when on duty in the Field, or when proceeding by Sea, under the orders of Government, at the following rates:

26. The Baggage and Camp Equipage of all Regimental Staff Officers to be valued as those of Subaltern Officers, and of Superintending Surgeons as those of Captain or Surgeon, being the rank in which the latter draw Batta and Tentage.

27. In no case is compensation to be granted without a declaration upon honor from the Officer concerned that he has sustained the loss for which he claims to be reimbursed, accompanied by a certificate from his Commanding Officer that at the time the loss was sustained, such Officer was employed on public duty, and that, according to the best of his knowledge and belief, the loss did not arise from any fault or neglect of the Officer applying for compensation.

28. Officers, in drawing compensation, will further certify upon honor, whether they have lost the entire of their Baggage or Camp Equipage, or only a part thereof; in the latter case they will estimate their loss at one-fourth, one-half, or three-fourths, as the case may be, according to which they shall be paid the like proportions of the sums sanctioned for the loss of the entire of their Baggage and Camp Equipage.

29. Officers holding Non-Military Appointments have no just claim to compensation for loss of purely Military Equipments.

30. An Officer of Infantry is entitled to compensation for loss of Baggage at the Infantry rate, though at the time of loss he may be doing duty with a Mounted Corps.

31. The Subordinate Medical Establishment being supplied with Camp Equipage and Carriage by the Commissariat Department, the rules regarding compensation for those Equipments are only applicable to them when not so supplied, and an actual loss occurs of their own property.

32. Compensation is further allowed to all Officers of the Artillery or Engineers, who may lose Professional Instruments while on duty in the Field, or while proceeding by Sea, under the orders of Government, as the particular circumstances of each case may appear to require, at the following rates :

34. Half-Pay Drummers are allowed a moiety of the amount sanctioned for a Full Pay Drummer. Women one-half, and Children one-fourth of the amount allowed to a Private of Infantry.

35. The loss of Baggage, by Non-Commissioned Officers and Privates is to be estimated at one-fourth, one-half, three-fourths, or the whole value, as the case may be, on the principle laid down for Officers' Baggage, and Officers transmitting Bills for the Compensation, shall certify on honor, to the best of their knowledge and belief, after minute enquiry, that the proportions charged for in the Bills are correct, as far as can be ascertained, and that the loss of the Baggage was not occasioned by any want of care or exertion on the part of the Soldier.

36. The maximum of Compensation to be drawn by Native Troops of the Line and by Local Troops, for loss of private Effects, inclusive of public Equipments, to be as follows:—

Jemedars, Non-Commissioned Officers, and Native Doctors	1½	ditto ditto.

37. Quarter Masters of Regiments are to restore, at the public charge, to Non-Commissioned Officers and Privates, all articles strictly denominated Regimental Equipments, that is, Havresacks, Head-dress, Breast-plate, Great Coats, and such Clothing as is furnished from the Off-reckoning Fund. Of the private Effects lost by each individual, a detail is to be furnished by Commanding Officers, with a Statement of the probable value, and to be accompanied by Contingent Bills, containing the names of the Sufferers and the amount of Compensation drawn for each, inclusive of the cost of the Regimental Equipments, to be furnished as above stated.

38. Uncovenanted Servants, when proceeding to the Upper Provinces with the Governor General or the Commander in Chief, are not entitled to Compensation for the loss of their Baggage, the additional allowance granted to such individuals being sufficient to guard them against loss, by insuring their property.

39. Whenever a Cantonment at which Officers have drawn only half batta, shall be abandoned, such Officers are allowed six months' Extra Batta as a compensation for the loss of their Houses, but no Compensation allowance is granted to any Officer either on the abandonment or on the first occupation of a full batta Station: Officers on full batta being considered to be in the Field.

40. When Arms, Accountrements, and Regimental appointments of H. M.'s Regiments are lost during hostilities, compensation is granted for such articles to the extent of three-fourths of their value, but no allowance is made for those rendered unserviceable.

41. Compensation for loss of property by Bazar Chowdries and Bunneahs, during hostilities, is inadmissible. Horse equipments, the property of Government, lost or destroyed on such occasions, are to be supplied by Troop Officers, charging the same in Contingent Bills duly attested.

42. Claims for loss of Mess property are allowed to the extent of three-fourteenths of the entire valuation, the articles being restricted to those for which Compensation is admissible.

43. Compensation for Grasscutters' Ponies, when admissible, is allowed at Company's Rupees (12) twelve each.

If in any case the claimant cannot replace the money lost, without first receiving an allowance from the public to enable him to do so, an explanatory Certificate to that effect should be produced; and in all such cases the amount of the allowance which may be granted, instead of being issued to the claimant, will be applied to the discharge of the just demands which the Regiment or individuals may have on account thereof.

SAILING DIRECTIONS FOR THE PORT OF AKYAB, IN THE ARRACAN RIVER.

Ships sailing for Akyab during the South-West Moonsoon should steer for the South end of the Western Bolongo, in Lat. 19° 50' N., Long, 93° 3' E., then standing along the Coast to the Northward and Westward about five or six Miles off Shore, until the Light is sighted on the Great Savage, at the entrance of the Arracan River, then steer so as to bring it to bear N. by East or N. N. E., and if they intend to run in during the night, with either of these bearings they will cross the bar in the best water, in three fathoms low water spring tides.

After deepening across it, the course should be altered to N. by W. or even N. N. W., according to the state of the Tide and Sea at the time, to avoid the Western Rocks (above water) bearing from the Light S. W. ½ S., distant nearly half a mile; the Flood Tide sets in on these Rocks.

When the Light bears East in six to nine fathoms on the edge of the flat to the Westward, the course must be altered to N. N. E. and N. E. by N.; having brought the Light to bear S. E. by S. ½ S. the Ship will be inside of Passage Rock, which is five to seven feet above water, and bears from the Savage Light N. W. ¼ N. distant a quarter of a mile, and should then steer N. E. Easterly, to avoid the Reef projecting from Faqueer's Point, a mile in extent to the South; some of the Rocks are above water at half ebb. There is a Red Buoy placed on the Southern entrance, in about nine fathoms, which with attention may be seen in a clear night without the Moon, and after bringing Faqueer's Point to bear N. W. by N. to N. W. the Ship should anchor.

On Faqueer's Point a small Light House is nearly finished, the Light of which will be a deep red, and will be seen about six miles, or three miles beyond the Bar, as a leading mark to clear the Western Rocks, keeping it a little open to the Westward of the Savage Light when steering in

or out, also to point out when the Ship is inside of the Reef off Faqueer's Point. With this Light bearing N. W. by N. to N. W. is good anchorage, having excellent holding ground, and perfectly sheltered from the Sea.

A stranger should not attempt to run in at night, particularly in the rains, except at high or low water, as the ebb tide runs very rapidly in strong eddies off the Passage Rock, over the dangerous flat to the Westward, and the flood in strong eddies upon the Rocks.

During the N. E. Monsoon, Ships bound to Akyab, from the Northward, should endeavour to make the Table Land of the Western Bolongo in Lat. 20° 1' N., then steering due East they will avoid the Oyster Reef in Lat. 20° 5' N., Long. 92° 40' East, which is distant from the Savage Light fifteen miles due West. This course is recommended, as although in favorable weather the Savage Light is seen, outside the Reef in 16 to 17 fathoms water, the depth suddenly decreases, and the probability of hazy or rainy weather would prevent the Light being seen, and steering boldly in to sight it, to the Northward of Lat. 20° 1' would endanger the safety of the Vessel, by suddenly falling upon the Oyster Rock or Reef before sighting the Light House.

I would not advise strangers on any occasion to make use of the Channel inside of the Oyster Rock or Reef.

The directions above given by Captain Paterson were published in 1844. The Red Light referred to was finished and first exhibited in 1845. In 1848 a Red Buoy was laid on the N. E. edge of the Bar, in 3½ fathoms low water.

The following additional directions are therefore considered necessary by the Port Master, and by Captain Dicey, of the Hon'ble Company's Steamer *Tenasserim*.

In the event of the Red Buoy on the edge of the Bar breaking adrift, it is recommended in working across the Bar not to bring the Great Savage Light to bear more Easterly than N. E. by N. until you deepen over. When you do so, Captain Paterson's directions may be followed.

Captain Paterson's caution as to not going in at night, must still be attended to, as the Red Light is not seen till the Bar is crossed.
