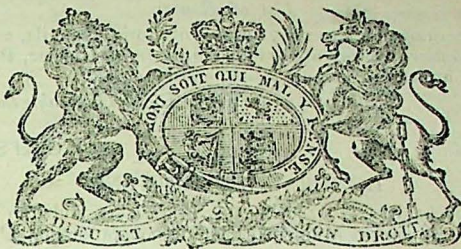

The following Resolution of the Government of India, dated the 8th instant, is published for general information:—

"FINANCIAL DEPARTMENT.

Fort William, the 8th March 1860.

RESOLUTION.—The Honorable the President in Council remarks that the distinction between the two cases, viz. that of a break caused by the abolition of office and that by the resignation of appointment is clear. In the one the break is for the convenience of Government, and in the other for that of the Officers themselves. In the latter case, therefore, the time cannot be counted for pension."

REVENUE DEPARTMENT.

The Right Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased, under Section III. of Act XXIX. of 1857, to declare that the Territories of any Native Chief not subject to the jurisdiction of the Courts of the Bombay Presidency shall, so far as respects the duties on Salt, be deemed to be Foreign Territories, and that Salt, passing out of such Territories into those of this Presidency, is liable to the duty fixed for that article by the Schedule annexed to Act XXII. of 1859.

It is hereby further notified, for the information of the public, in conformity with Sections IV. and VI. of Act XXIX. of 1857, that the undermentioned routes have been fixed on as those alone by which it shall henceforth be lawful to import Salt across the Kattiawar Frontier, and that all Salt imported on

The Right Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to republish, for general information, the following Notification by the Right Honorable the Governor General, dated Peshawur, 29th February 1860 :—

“No. 729.

NOTIFICATION.

FOREIGN DEPARTMENT,

Peshawur, Wednesday, the 29th February 1860.

His Excellency the Right Honorable the Viceroy and Governor General held a general Durbar this day, at Peshawur, for the reception of the Chiefs and principal Native Residents of the Peshawur Division.

These, together with the principal Civil and Military Officers of the Station, having been first assembled, the Viceroy and Governor General, accompanied by His Excellency the Commander in Chief, entered and took his seat under a Royal Salute.

Each Chief and Native Gentleman was introduced to the Viceroy and Governor General, the customary offerings were presented and accepted, and suitable Khilluts were bestowed on all according to their rank.

His Excellency took the occasion to confer on Khoja Muhammed Khan, Rais of Khutuk, the title of Khan Bahadoor, for his services during the rebellion.

His Excellency then addressed the assembly in the following words :—

“KHANS OF THE PESHAWUR DIVISION! I have summoned you to meet me here, that I may thank you for your loyalty and good service to the State.

“I see among you many who have voluntarily taken arms in the Queen's Indian Army, and many who, unable by age or infirmity to do so in person, have sent their sons and dependents to strengthen its ranks during the contest which was lately raging in Hindostan.

“I see others who have heartily aided the Civil Government in maintaining order in this division of the Empire during a time of excitement and trouble.

“Peace is now restored to every corner of India, and it is a pleasure to me to thank you in the Queen's name for the share which you have had in the good work.

“KHANS! As the Chiefs of this country you are the advanced guard of the British power on this side of India. You have for neighbours restless, warlike, and unruly tribes who have too often done violence to the lives of British subjects and to the authority of the Government.

“Quite recently some of these men have learned, not for the first time, how swift and sharp can be the punishment of those who so offend.

“I now charge you, in your intercourse with them, to warn them that the like punishment will never fail to overtake those who, by their crimes, disturb the tranquillity of the Frontier. Tell them, that if any of them suffer wrong at the hands of British subjects, they shall receive prompt redress; but that peace must not be broken. They shall have justice, but I will have peace.

“KHANS! I look to you as loyal Chiefs to aid the Government in enforcing this rule, and in repressing violence on both sides of the border.

“You will thereby best promote your own prosperity and that of your dependents, and command respect from the subjects of the neighbouring power.”

This having been interpreted in the Native language, the Viceroy and Governor General left his seat under a Royal Salute, and the Durbar broke up.

Fort St. George, March 20th, 1860.

The Government of Madras are prepared to receive offers, through the Superintendent of Marine, for the establishment of a line of Steamers of not less than 600 tons gross, and 150 horse-power, or thereabout, between Madras, the Northern Ports, and Rangoon, on the following conditions:—

- 1st. That a Steamer be despatched to Rangoon two days after the arrival of the first or second Suez Steamer of the month, as may hereafter be decided, touching at Masulipatam, Coconada, and Vizagapatam, and that she return to Madras by the same route.
- 2nd.—That she carry all Mails free of expense to Government.
- 3rd.—That she shall afford the regulated space below decks for at least 100 Natives, accommodation (Cabin) for 5 Officers and 3 Warrant Officers, and stowage in the hold for 30 tons of Stores.
- 4th.—That the freight and passage money shall be according to the following scale:—

5th.—That each cabin passenger be permitted to carry 3 cwts. baggage, and each deck passenger 40 lbs., exclusive of their Arms and Knapsacks; and that extra space be allowed for the men's provisions, which will be supplied by the Commissariat.

6th.—That the Commander be held responsible for the custody and issue of the provisions in the mode adopted on board Government Transports, or other Vessels carrying Troops; and

7th.—That, in the event of the Steamer failing to keep to her time of departure from Madras the subsidy and guarantee shall not be claimable, and that, in all cases, the subsidy shall not be payable until the vessel has accomplished her voyage out and home.

2. The Government will guarantee freight and passage money to the extent of Seven thousand and Five hundred (7,500) Rupees on each full trip from Madras and back.

3. Cabin passengers are to be provided with a liberal table, including liquors.

4. Intermediate passage is intended for Warrant Officers who are entitled to a plain, substantial mess, without liquor.

5. Deck passengers will be fed by the Government, but the Commander will be required to take charge of, issue, and cook their food.

6. Parties tendering should state full particulars of the vessel, or vessels, they would propose to employ, more especially as to age, tonnage, horse-power, and 'tween-deck accommodation for Troops; and the subsidy required should be stated for the voyage from Madras and back.

7. No penalties will be stipulated for in the event of failure.

8. Tenders should be addressed to the "Superintendent of Marine, Madras," and despatched so as to arrive not later than the 31st July next.

DANGEROUS SHOAL IN THE MIDDLE OF THE PERSIAN GULF.

A dangerous shoal was reported some time back to exist in the middle of the Persian Gulf, by the Commander of the Ship "Shah Allum," who first discovered and sounded on it; and, in consequence thereof, the shoal which has lately been carefully surveyed, has been called the "Shah Allum Shoal."

It lies in the middle of the Persian Gulf, equidistant from the Islands Sheykh Shayb and Halool, and its bearing from the Westward end of Sheykh Shayb is S. 55° W.; distant 44 miles. The shoal forms a small bank of sharp and rugged rocks, and that portion of it where the soundings are under 20 fathoms, is only 2½ miles wide in a North and South direction, and 2 miles in an East and

West direction. The dangerous part is at the North end, where is not more than one-third of a mile across, on which there is generally from 4 to 5 fathoms in overfalls, but in one spot there are rocks having only from 15 to 17 feet on them, according to the tide, the time of which is not accurately known. The least water on any part of the shoal is not less than 12 feet.

The "Shah Allum Shoal" is steep to all round, having 37 fathoms at its South extremity, and from 40 to 45 fathoms at its North, about a mile distant from the shoal, which renders it all the more dangerous, as this great depth of water produces no discolouration on its surface, nor does it allow the shoal to be seen from aloft until on it, but the bottom may be seen, when in seven fathoms, and plainly when under that depth. Sea-birds frequent the site of the shoal, and flocks of them are generally to be seen hovering over it. There are sometimes also slight marks observable on the water, in its vicinity, supposed to be caused by the tides.

In clear weather, the mountains on the coast of Persia between Taurie and Nakhiloo, can be distinctly seen from the shoal, and the well known landmark called Assaloo Spot bears from it N. 51° E.

The shoalest spot is in Latitude 26° 25' 20" North, and 1° 40' 13" East of Bushire Residency Flagstaff.

DIRECTIONS FOR CROSSING THE BAR OF THE BANCOOT RIVER.

Notice is hereby given, that two Conical Buoys, painted white, have been placed on the Bar of the Bancoot River, and these two buoys in line show the deepest channel over the Bar.

The Outer Buoy is in 16 feet at low water spring tides, and is a little outside of the deepest part of the Bar, where there is 8 feet at low water.

The Inner Buoy is about three quarters of a mile further in than the Outer one, bearing from it E ½ N., and is moored in 18 feet at low water spring tides.

From the inner buoy the Fort at the water's edge on Bancoot Point, is about 1½ miles distant, bearing N. E. by E. ½ E.

Vessels running into the Bancoot River from Seaward have only to bring the buoys in line and run from one to the other, passing them so as to keep them a few yards on the Port side. When the Inner Buoy is reached, steer N. E. by E ½ E. for the Fort on Bancoot Point, rounding it at a distance of 60 yards, and thence to the anchorage off the Village.

The least water on the bar at low water spring tides, in the line between the two buoys, is seven feet, and the rise and fall at that period is about eleven feet.

N.B.—This table is an extract from a more extensive yearly Return that is prepared for statistical purposes, and chiefly for the detection of any removable sources of disease, with a view to improving the healthiness of the Island. As the principal object cannot be fully attained unless the true causes of death be recorded, persons of all stations are requested, in each case of death occurring in their circle, to obtain, in writing, from the Medical Attendant, the name of the fatal disease, that it may be delivered to the Policeman at the funeral place. Medical Practitioners particularly are requested to aid the registration. Blank forms of Death Reports, to keep by them in readiness, are given gratuitously on application at the Office of the Deputy Commissioner of Police.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind, that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all single cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.

A party who had infringed the Law, unwittingly, was recently fined Ten Rupees by the Chief Magistrate of Police. The Community are therefore warned against this offence.

Express Packet from London to India.—The Public are hereby informed, that it is most probable that an EXPRESS PACKET will be made up in London for despatch by the Bombay Marseilles Mail, which will leave England on the 3rd of April 1860. On the arrival of the Mail Steamer at Bombay, an Express will be despatched to Calcutta, Madras, and Lahore (*via* Agra). Letters may be posted for despatch by Express to any Station in India, and will be forwarded by Express to the Post Office on the abovementioned line which is nearest to their destination; from thence they will be sent by the first ordinary Mail.

Every Letter or Newspaper posted in England for despatch by Express must be registered and prepaid. The Registry Fee is charged in addition to the Ordinary and Express Postage.

Express Postage will be levied, in addition to ordinary Postage, at the rate of Two Shillings for every quarter of an ounce on Letters, and Two Shillings for every four ounces in the case of Newspapers.

Increase of Postage on Newspapers and Prices Current.—Under instructions from the Secretary of State for India, an additional charge of One Penny will be levied from this date upon all single Newspapers and Prices Current conveyed *via* Egypt to the United Kingdom, through the United Kingdom, or to places between Egypt and the United Kingdom, such as Malta, Gibraltar, Corfu, Ionian Islands, Trieste, &c.

The total Postage upon such Newspapers is as under:—

Via Egypt.

On a Newspaper not exceeding 4 ounces in weight	2d. or 1s. 6p.
On a Newspaper above 4 ounces and under 8 ounces in weight	3d. or 2s. 0p.
On a Newspaper above 8 ounces and under 12 ounces in weight ..	4d. or 3s. 0p.

Prepayment must be made by Stamps.

The above Rules do not apply to Newspapers for France and Spain, or for transmission through France and Spain.

Bombay Postal Guide.—Parties seeking for information regarding Postal matters are recommended, instead of constantly troubling the Post Office with inquiries, to consult the Bombay Postal Guide. If that does not furnish what is required, application should be made to the Postal Authorities, who will cheerfully attend to all requisitions.

English Postage Labels.—The Public are warned not to affix (as many persons now do) English Postage Labels to Letters posted for despatch by the Overland Mails. Such labels are not recognised in this country; and, when sent from India, are ignored by the London General Post Office.

Change of Residence.—In order to facilitate the delivery of letters, &c., parties arriving at and leaving Bombay are requested to send notice of their movements and whereabouts to the Bombay Post Office.

Zanzibar, Johanna, and Mozambique.—Letters and Newspapers addressed to Zanzibar, Johanna, and Mozambique, will be forwarded *via* Aden, except in the months of December, January, and February, when they will be sent direct as opportunities may offer.

Officers to pay Forward Postage.—It has been ruled by the Supreme Government, that the order, exempting Officers with the Army from the charge of Forward Postage on all re-directed Letters to their address, shall cease to have effect from the 1st of May 1860. Officers serving in the field should take steps to ensure their Letters being correctly addressed.
