Fort St. George, March 20th, 1860.

The Government of Madras are prepared to receive offers, through the Superintendent of Marine, for the establishment of a line of Steamers of not less than 600 tons gross, and 150 horse-power, or thereabout, between Madras, the Northern Ports, and Rangoon, on the following conditions:—

- 1st.—That a Steamer be despatched to Rangoon two days after the arrival of the first or second Suez Steamer of the month, as may hereafter be decided, touching at Masulipatam, Coconada, and Vizagapatam, and that she return to Madras by the same route.
- 2nd.—That she carry all Mails free of expense to Government.
- 3rd.—That she shall afford the regulated space below decks for at least 100 Natives, accommodation (Cabin) for 5 Officers and 3 Warrant Officers, and stowage in the hold for 30 tons of Stores.
- 4th.—That the freight and passage money shall be according to the following scale:—

5th.—That each cabin passenger be permitted to carry 3 cwts. baggage, and each deck passenger 40 lbs., exclusive of their Arms and Knapsacks; and that extra space be allowed for the men's provisions, which will be supplied by the Commissariat.

6th.—That the Commander be held responsible for the custody and issue of the provisions in the mode adopted on board Government Transports, or other Vessels carrying Troops; and

7th.—That, in the event of the Steamer failing to keep to her time of departure from Madras the subsidy and guarantee shall not be claimable, and that, in all cases, the subsidy shall not be payable until the vessel has accomplished her voyage out and home.

2. The Government will guarantee freight and passage money to the extent of Seven thousand and five hundred (7,500) Rupees on each full trip from Madras and back.

3. Cabin passengers are to be provided with a liberal table, including liquors.

4. Intermediate passage is intended for Warrant Officers who are entitled to a plain, substantial mess, without liquor.

5. Deck passengers will be fed by the Government, but the Commander will be required to take charge of, issue, and cook their food.

6. Parties tendering should state full particulars of the vessel, or vessels, they would propose to employ, more especially as to age, tonnage, horse-power, and tween-deck accommodation for Troops; and the subsidy required should be stated for the voyage from Madras and back.

7. No penalties will be stipulated for in the event of failure.

8. Tenders should be addressed to the "Superintendent of Marine, Madras," and despatched so as to arrive not later than the 31st July next.

GENERAL ORDERS

BY HIS EXCELLENCY THE HONORABLE THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

MILITARY DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 7th June 1860.

No. 354 of 1860.—With reference to General Order No. 298, dated the 15th ultimo, Captain A. B. Church, of the 9th Regt. N. I., will continue to hold the appointment of Deputy Judge Advocate General, and will also perform the duties of Cantonment Magistrate at Kurrachee.

No. 355 of 1860.—Assistant Surgeon F. S. Stedman, Civil Surgeon at Hyderabad, is allowed a furlough to Europe for fifteen months, on medical certificate, under the New Furlough Regulations.

No. 356 of 1860.—The furlough to Europe, on medical certificate, granted to Major (now Lieutenant Colonel) G. R. Grimes, in General Order dated 16th October 1858, No. 1015, is extended from the 25th April to the 10th May 1860, both days inclusive.

No. 358 of 1860.—The services of Acting Assistant Apothecary J. Winn (No. 351), are placed at the disposal of the Commodore Commander in Chief, Indian Navy, for duty in that branch of the Service.

No. 359 of 1860.—Mr. Thomas Selby is confirmed in the office of Assistant Military Auditor General.

No. 360 of 1860.—With reference to Articles 78 and 80, of Section XXIV., page 355, of Jameson's Code, the allowance of Four Rupees, for keeping each Fire Engine in repair and working order, will cease from the 1st July next. Oil and Dungaree, for cleaning and preserving Engines and their appurtenances, will be obtained from the Commissariat Department, on Monthly Indents, passed by the Inspector General of Ordnance in such proportions as may be actually required.

Repairs to Fire Engines will be executed in Arsenal, under the provision of Articles 630 and 631, Section XXXVIII., page 130, of the 3rd Appendix of Jameson's Code.

No. 361 of 1860.—The following extract (paragraph 6th) of a letter from the Secretary of State for India, No. 68, dated 24th April last, is published for information :—

"I have to inform you that it has been decided that those Officers who have come to this country on duty with discharged Troops, and have been granted extensions (not exceeding six months) of their privilege leave, on medical certificate or private affairs, shall not be considered to have vitiated their claim to furlough at the end of ten years' service, though they may not have been six years in India since their return from this country."

No. 362 of 1860.—The subjoined Regulations, in force under the Bengal Presidency, are made applicable to the Artillery of the Bombay Army :—

I. An Officer, though posted to the Horse Artillery, receives Foot Artillery pay, under the following circumstances, viz :—

I. From the date of commencement of a furlough to that of rejoining his Troop or Brigade on return to India.

II. While doing duty with the Foot Artillery as Regimental Staff in a Battalion of Foot, or in a Division of Artillery.

III. On nomination to Staff employ or to a detached duty, whereof the prescribed remuneration compensates for the loss of Cavalry pay and horse allowance, the restriction continuing from the date of his quitting his Troop or Brigade (or from the date of the G. O. announcing his removal, if absent from his Troop or Brigade at the time of nomination,) to the date of return to his Troop or Brigade on relief from the Staff employ or detached duty.

2. Horse Artillery pay and allowances will continue payable for the entire period of absence on a temporary duty, of which the prescribed remuneration would not compensate for the loss of Horse Artillery pay and allowances; provided that, on completion of the duty, the Officer rejoin his Troop without delay. Horse Artillery pay and allowances will also be passed for three months from the date of an Officer quitting his Troop or Brigade, on other temporary detached duty, or on other Staff employment, than that of Regimental Staff in a Battalion of Foot Artillery or a Division of Artillery.

3. An Officer of Horse Artillery, appointed to act as Adjutant and Quartermaster to even a mixed Division of Artillery, which, perhaps, includes his own Troop, will be posted to the Foot Artillery; for he will receive Foot Artillery pay and allowances from, at latest, the date of coming into receipt of the Staff allowance of Adjutant.

No. 363 of 1860.—The following General Order, by the Government of India, dated Fort William, 18th May 1860, No. 523, is republished :—

"Her Majesty's Government have resolved that the following Royal Warrant shall be made applicable to the Soldiers of the Indian Army:—

'No. 558.

VICTORIA R.

Whereas we have judged it expedient to revise those parts of our Royal Warrant, dated 1st July 1848, which prescribe the periods of service to entitle the well-conducted Soldier to obtain the different rates of Good Conduct Pay under the said Warrant, Our Will and Pleasure is that, from the date of this, Our Royal Warrant, the period of service to entitle such Soldier to the first grant of Good Conduct Pay shall be three years instead of five years, and that the successive additions shall be as heretofore,—after every further period of service of five years; subject, however, to the conditions prescribed by Our Royal Warrant of 1st July 1848.

Given at our Court at St. James's, this First day of March 1860, in the Twenty-third year of our Reign.

No. 364 of 1860.—The following General Order, by the Government of India, dated Fort William, 18th May 1860, No. 525, is republished:—

"The Honorable the President in Council is pleased to notify, with the concurrence of His Excellency the Governor General, that Donation Batta and any other Gratuity awarded for service in the Field shall, after this date, be issued according to the Rank in which the Officer may eventually draw Pay, though such Rank be assigned retrospectively.

This order is applicable to the three Presidencies, but will not have retrospective effect.

6. The General Officer commanding the Southern Division will be transferred to the Malwa and Rajpootana Division.

7. The Brigadier commanding at Belgaum will refer legal questions to the Deputy Judge Advocate General, Poona Division of the Army.

8. His Excellency the Commander in Chief will issue such subsidiary orders as may be necessary to give effect to these arrangements. The date from which they will have effect will be determined by His Excellency, on consideration of the season of the year and other circumstances.

Medical Practitioners particularly are requested to aid the registration. Blank forms of Death Reports, to keep by them in readiness, are given gratuitously on application at the Office of the Deputy Commissioner of Police.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind, that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all single cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.

There are days during this Monsoon when the Sea on the Bar is so heavy, that Ships at the above draft could not with safety cross.

Approaching the Port (see Note 2).

At all seasons, if coming from the Southward, the coast of Sind, from the parallel of 23° 30' North Latitude, should not be approached under 14 fathoms. This line of soundings will carry a Ship from 7 to 8 miles off the dangerous Banks which extend from the Hujamaree, Kediwarry, and Kokowarry mouths of the Indus River, to a distance of 7 miles, showing in several places

10 fathoms on their extreme edge. The set of the Tides and Currents being very uncertain, the Coast low throughout, and barely visible from the outer edge of the Banks in clear weather, too much attention cannot be paid to the Lead in passing these Banks.

Ras Muari (or Cape Monze), distant 18 miles W. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. from the Western entrance to Kurrachee, is high, and bold of approach. Ships during the South-West Monsoon season, should make this headland, running to the Eastward for Manora Point, keeping it (Manora Point) on any bearing to the North of East.

Manora Point, forming the West side of Kurrachee Harbour, is 100 feet in height, and can be approached to within half a mile on any bearing from North to East, with 5 fathoms water; on this Point stands the Lighthouse and Signal Station. As at certain times of tide, Pilots cannot get off, attention should be given to all directions signalled from the shore.

Masters of Ships should not, under any circumstances, attempt to enter the Port without a Pilot.

Anchorage in the Roads—

From June to the middle of September, Ships should not on any account anchor, but stand off; and on keeping the Lighthouse, bearing from N. by E. to NE., 1 to 2 miles distant, until boarded by a Pilot, or directed by signal.

Anchorage—Lighthouse N. by E. to NNE., distance 1 mile, in 7 fathoms.

April and May—

Lighthouse NNE. to NE., distance $1\frac{1}{2}$ mile, in 8 fathoms.

Note 1.—The "Bussorah Merchant," the deepest Ship that has crossed the Bar, did so in 1857, drawing 20 feet 3 inches, there being at the time 22 feet 2 inches water, with a slight swell; she bumped several times in crossing, losing her false keel.

Note 2.—Since the beginning of 1857, the Ship "Admiral Boxer" has been totally lost on the Indus Banks. The Ships "Thomas Campbell" and "Augusta," with the Steamer "Pioneer," have grounded on them, but were eventually floated off. Two large Troop Steamers have also, in the same period, touched on them.

DANGEROUS SHOAL IN THE MIDDLE OF THE PERSIAN GULF.

A dangerous shoal was reported some time back to exist in the middle of the Persian Gulf, by the Commander of the Ship "Shah Allum," who first discovered and sounded on it; and, in consequence thereof, the shoal, which has lately been carefully surveyed, has been called the "Shah Allum Shoal."

It lies in the middle of the Persian Gulf, equidistant from the Islands Sheykh Shayb and Halool, and its bearing from the Westward end of Sheykh Shayb is S. 55° W., distant 44 miles. The shoal forms a small bank of sharp and rugged rocks, and that portion of it where the soundings are under 20 fathoms, is only 2½ miles wide in a North and South direction, and 2 miles in an East and West direction. The dangerous part is at the North end, where is not more than one-third of a mile across, on which there is generally from 4 to 5 fathoms in overfalls, but in one spot there are rocks having only from 15 to 17 feet on them, according to the tide, the time of which is not accurately known. The least water on any part of the shoal is not less than 12 feet.

The "Shah Allum Shoal" is steep to all round, having 37 fathoms at its South extremity, and from 40 to 45 fathoms at its North, about a mile distant from the shoal, which renders it all the more dangerous, as this great depth of water produces no discolouration on its surface, nor does it allow the shoal to be seen from aloft until on it, but the bottom may be seen, when in seven fathoms, and plainly when under that depth. Sea-birds frequent the site of the shoal, and flocks of them are generally to be seen hovering over it. There are sometimes also slight marks observable on the water, in its vicinity, supposed to be caused by the tides.

In clear weather, the mountains on the coast of Persia between Taurie and Nakhiloo, can be distinctly seen from the shoal, and the well known landmark called Assaloo Notch bears from it N. 54° E.

The shoalest spot is in Latitude 26° 25' 20" North, and 1° 40' 13" East of Bushire Residency Flagstaff.

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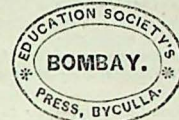

NOTIFICATION.—In modification of the Notification from this Department, dated the 25th May 1855, published in the *Calcutta Gazette* of the 2nd June 1855, and in further modification of Section VII. of Act XVII. of 1854, the Honorable the President in Council is pleased, under the authority vested in him by Section XXV. of the said Act, to direct that on and after the 1st of May 1860, the postage on every Newspaper, Pamphlet, or other printed or engraved paper, whether the same be imported or not imported, shall be One Anna if not exceeding six tolahs in weight, and that One additional Anna shall be charged for every additional six tolahs or fraction of six tolahs.

His Honor in Council is also pleased, under Section XXI. of Act No. XVII. of 1854, to direct that on and after the 1st of May aforesaid, no Newspaper or other article on which postage is chargeable under Section VII. of Act XVII. of 1854, shall be forwarded by Post, unless at least one rate of postage shall be prepaid by a Stamp or Stamps; and if any Newspaper or other article above referred to shall be posted, having affixed thereto a postage Stamp or Stamps, the value of which shall be equal to or more than a single rate of postage, but less than the full rate of postage to which such Newspaper or other article is liable, such Newspaper or other article shall be forwarded, and the deficient postage shall be charged upon delivery, together with the addition of a single rate of postage, or One Anna, over and above the deficient postage.

Express Packet from London to India.—The Public are hereby informed, that it is most probable that an EXPRESS PACKET will be made up in London for despatch by the Bombay Marseilles Mail, which will leave England on the 3rd of April 1860. On the arrival of the Mail Steamer at Bombay, an Express will be despatched to Calcutta, Madras, and Lahore (*via* Agra). Increase of Postage on Newspapers and Prices Current.—Under instructions from the Secretary of State for India, an additional charge of One Penny will be levied from this date upon all single Newspapers and Prices Current conveyed *via* Egypt to the United Kingdom, through the United Kingdom, or to places between Egypt and the United Kingdom, such as Malta, Gibraltar, Corfu, Ionian Islands, Trieste, &c.

The total Postage upon such Newspapers is as under:—

Via Egypt.

On a Newspaper not exceeding 4 ounces in weight 2d. or 1s. 6p.

On a Newspaper above 4 ounces and under 8 ounces in weight 3d. or 2s. 0p.

On a Newspaper above 8 ounces and under 12 ounces in weight .. 4d. or 3s. 0p.

Prepayment must be made by Stamps.

The above Rules do not apply to Newspapers for France and Spain, or for transmission through France and Spain.
