Fort St. George, March 20th, 1860.

The Government of Madras are prepared to receive offers, through the Superintendent of Marine, for the establishment of a line of Steamers of not less than 600 tons gross, and 150 horse-power, or thereabout, between Madras, the Northern Ports, and Rangoon, on the following conditions:—

1st.—That a Steamer be despatched to Rangoon two days after the arrival of the first or second Suez Steamer of the month, as may hereafter be decided, touching at Masulipatam, Coconada, and Vizagapatam, and that she return to Madras by the same route.

2nd.—That she carry all Mails free of expense to Government.

3rd.—That she shall afford the regulated space below decks for at least 100 Natives, accommodation (Cabin) for 5 Officers and 3 Warrant Officers, and stowage in the hold for 30 tons of Stores.

4th.—That the freight and passage money shall be according to the following scale:—

5th.—That each cabin passenger be permitted to carry 3 cwts. baggage, and each deck passenger 40 lbs., exclusive of their Arms and Knap-sacks; and that extra space be allowed for the men's provisions, which will be supplied by the Commissariat.

6th.—That the Commander be held responsible for the custody and issue of the provisions in the mode adopted on board Government Transports, or other Vessels carrying Troops; and

7th.—That, in the event of the Steamer failing to keep to her time of departure from Madras the subsidy and guarantee shall not be claimable, and that, in all cases, the subsidy shall not be payable until the vessel has accomplished her voyage out and home.

2. The Government will guarantee freight and passage money to the extent of Seven thousand and five hundred (7,500) Rupees on each full trip from Madras and back.

3. Cabin passengers are to be provided with a liberal table, including liquors.

4. Intermediate passage is intended for Warrant Officers, who are entitled to a plain, substantial mess, without liquor.

5. Deck passengers will be fed by the Government, but the Commander will be required to take charge of, issue, and cook their food.

6. Parties tendering should state full particulars of the vessel or vessels they would propose to employ, more especially as to age, tonnage, horse-power, and 'tween-deck accommodation for Troops; and the subsidy required should be stated for the voyage from Madras and back.

7. No penalties will be stipulated for in the event of failure.

8. Tenders should be addressed to the "Superintendent of Marine, Madras," and despatched so as to arrive not later than the 31st July next.

No. 375 of 1860.—Captain E. Southey, Engineers, has been appointed Deputy Consulting Engineer in the Railway Department.

With proper care, the Clothing claims of the Soldiery requiring to be adjusted beyond the year in which they become due will be very rare; but when the delay may be clearly shown to be excusable, the Superintendent of Army Clothing is empowered to admit them.

"Under the authority of the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for India, the following Rules are to be observed in preparing Rolls of Remittances of Officers and Soldiers of the British Army serving in India ;—all previous orders on the subject are cancelled :—

Regimental Paymasters and Officers Commanding Batteries of Royal Artillery, are required to forward, monthly, to the Divisional Paymaster, two copies of the detailed Returns and Rolls which they furnish direct to the War Office in England, according to War Office Forms Nos. 57, 327, and 327 A, except that the amount in Rupees and Sterling should be distinctly stated against each name. To secure uniformity of practice, the Forms will be supplied, in the first instance, by the Accountant General in the Military Department.

Duty of Paymaster Queen's Troops.

The Accountant General in the Military Department, in lieu of the present consolidated Roll showing details, will prepare an Abstract of Totals under certain heads, as per Form B, and forward it together with the original Rolls.

Duty of the Accountant General.

Regimental Paymasters and Officers Commanding Batteries of Royal Artillery, are required to render their Returns as soon after the close of the month as possible, to allow of their reaching the Office of the Accountant General in sufficient time for the preparation and despatch of the Abstract by the second Mail of the month.

N.B.—This table is an extract from a more extensive yearly Return that is prepared for statistical purposes, and chiefly for the detection of any removable sources of disease, with a view to improving the healthiness of the Island. As the principal object cannot be fully attained unless the true causes of death be recorded, persons of all stations are requested, in each case of death occurring in their circle, to obtain, in writing, from the Medical Attendant, the name of the fatal disease, that it may be delivered to the Policeman at the funeral place. Medical Practitioners particularly are requested to aid the registration. Blank forms of Death Reports, to keep by them in readiness, are given gratuitously on application at the Office of the Deputy Commissioner of Police.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind, that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all single cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.

DANGEROUS SHOAL IN THE MIDDLE OF THE PERSIAN GULF.

A dangerous shoal was reported some time back to exist in the middle of the Persian Gulf, by the Commander of the Ship "Shah Allum," who first discovered and sounded on it; and, in consequence thereof, the shoal, which has lately been carefully surveyed, has been called the "Shah Allum Shoal."

It lies in the middle of the Persian Gulf, equidistant from the Islands Sheykh Shayb and Halool, and its bearing from the Westward end of Sheykh Shayb is S. 55° W., distant 44 miles. The shoal forms a small bank of sharp and rugged rocks, and that portion of it where the soundings are under 20 fathoms, is only 2½ miles wide in a North and South direction, and 2 miles in an East and West direction. The dangerous part is at the North end, where is not more than one-third of a mile across, on which there is generally from 4 to 5 fathoms in overfalls, but in one spot there are rocks having only from 15 to 17 feet on them, according to the tide, the time of which is not accurately known. The least water on any part of the shoal is not less than 12 feet.

The "Shah Allum Shoal" is steep to all round, having 37 fathoms at its South extremity, and from 40 to 45 fathoms at its North, about a mile distant from the shoal, which renders it all the more dangerous, as this great depth of water produces no discolouration on its surface, nor does it allow the shoal to be seen from aloft until on it, but the bottom may be seen, when in seven fathoms, and plainly when under that depth. Sea-birds frequent the site of the shoal, and flocks of them are generally to be seen hovering over it. There are sometimes also slight marks observable on the water, in its vicinity, supposed to be caused by the tides.

In clear weather, the mountains on the coast of Persia between Taurie and Nakhiloo, can be distinctly seen from the shoal, and the well known landmark called Assaloo Notch bears from it N. 5¼° E.

The shoalest spot is in Latitude 26° 25' 20" North, and 1° 40' 13" East of Bushire Residency Flagstaff.

DRAFT of BYE-LAWS for the MANAGEMENT and REGULATION of BURIAL and BURNING GROUNDS in the TOWN and ISLAND of BOMBAY.

WHEREAS it is expedient to prevent danger to the public health arising from the burial, burning, and exposure of the dead in the populated parts of the Town and Island of Bombay; It is enacted as follows:—

1. That no person shall bury, or cause to be buried, any corpse in any Burial-ground in the Town and Island of Bombay, and in a grave constructed of masonry, in such manner that the coffin or the corpse shall be at a less depth than three feet from the surface of the ground.
Graves constructed of masonry not to be less than three feet from surface of the ground.
2. That no person shall bury, or cause to be buried, in any such Burial-ground, any corpse in a grave, not constructed of masonry, which shall be less than six feet deep, and that such grave shall be carefully and properly filled in.
The depth of ordinary graves not to be less than six feet.
3. That no person shall build, or dig, or cause to be built or dug, a grave in any such Burial-ground at a less distance than two feet from any other existing grave.
Graves not to be less than two feet apart from each other.

4. That if, when digging any grave in any such Burial-ground, any coffin or any undecayed portion of a corpse be found, such coffin or remains shall not be disturbed, but the ground be immediately filled up, and not opened again until after a period of six months.

5. That no person, when burning, or causing to be burnt, any corpse or part of a corpse in any Burning-ground within the Town and Island, shall permit the same or any part thereof to remain without being completely reduced to ashes, or to be removed, until the same be completely consumed.

6. That every person who shall bring or convey, or cause to be brought or conveyed, any corpse or part thereof to any Burning-ground within the Town and Island, shall have or cause the same to be burnt within four hours after its arrival at the said Burning-ground.
Corpses to be burnt within four hours after arrival at the Burning-ground.

And also, that at the same time and place will be holden a Session of Admiralty, for the trial of all Treasons, Murders, Piracies, Robberies, Trespasses, Misdemeanors, and other Crimes and Offences, had, done, perpetrated, or committed on the High Seas.

And I hereby give Notice to all persons bound to prosecute and give evidence at the above Sessions, or in any way concerned therein, that they are to attend at the time and place above mentioned, and not to depart without leave of the Court.

And I hereby give Notice to all Justices of the Peace, Coroners, Escheators, and also all Chief Constables and Bailiffs of the Town and Island of Bombay, and the Limits thereof, that they be then and there in their own persons, with their Rolls, Records, Indictments, and other Remembrances, to do those things which to their Offices in that behalf appertain to be done.—Dated the 18th Day of June 1860, and in the Twenty-third Year of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria.

Closing of Post Offices.—Experimental Post Offices at Bankee and Nanpara, in Oude, have been closed.

New Post Offices in the Bengal Presidency.—No. 227.—Port Blair letters should be forwarded through the Calcutta Post Office.

No. 228.—Cusmar, in the district of Sarun, about 76 miles from Chuprah. Packets for Cusmar should be forwarded inside the Chuprah Mail.

No. 229.—Bholepore, on the Railway Line between Burdwan and Cynthia, 34 miles from Burdwan.

No. 230.—Cynthia, on the Railway Line in the district of Beerbhoom, about 11 miles from Sooree.

Post Office at Keamaree.—Notice is hereby given, that a Post Office has been permanently opened at Keamaree, a seaport town of Sind, and distant five miles from Kurrachee. Letters, Papers, &c. for Keamaree should be sent in the Kurrachee Post Office Packet.

A separate Packet for Keamaree will be made up in the Bombay Post Office when Mails are sent by sea to Sind.

Post Office at Meterhaut.—An Experimental Post Office has been opened at Meterhaut, in Bengal. Letters, &c. for Meterhaut from North-West and South should be sent in the sorting packet to Calcutta, from North in the packet to Berhampore, from East in the sorting packet to Dacca. The Post Offices at Calcutta, Berhampore, and Dacca should make up a separate packet for Meterhaut, and send the same inside the Barraset Mail.

Meterhaut is 20 miles east of Barraset, and letters addressed to Arbalia, Tarragooniah, and Busserhant, should be sent in the Mail to Meterhaut.

Increase of Postage on Newspapers and Prices Current.—Under instructions from the Secretary of State for India, an additional charge of One Penny will be levied from this date upon all single Newspapers and Prices Current conveyed *via* Egypt to the United Kingdom, through the United Kingdom, or to places between Egypt and the United Kingdom, such as Malta, Gibraltar, Corfu, Ionian Islands, Trieste, &c.

The total Postage upon such Newspapers is as under:—

Viâ Egypt.

On a Newspaper not exceeding 4 ounces in weight 2d. or 1s. 6p.

On a Newspaper above 4 ounces and under 8 ounces in weight 3d. or 2s. 0p.

On a Newspaper above 8 ounces and under 12 ounces in weight .. 4d. or 3s. 0p.

Prepayment must be made by Stamps.

The above Rules do not apply to Newspapers for France and Spain, or for transmission through France and Spain.

Zanzibar, Johanna, and Mozambique.—Letters and Newspapers addressed to Zanzibar, Johanna, and Mozambique, will be forwarded *via* Aden, except in the months of December, January, and February, when they will be sent direct as opportunities may offer.

Banghy Registration Fees prohibited.—Notice is hereby given, that the full address and weight of all Parcels is registered in Books kept in all Post Offices for the purpose, and receipts given to the senders, if required; and that Post Office officials are therefore forbidden to accept Fees for the special Registration of Banghy Parcels. Articles sent on Book Post rates cannot be registered, unless a Registration Fee of Four Annas is paid.

English Postage Labels.—The Public are warned not to affix (as many persons now do) English Postage Labels to Letters posted for despatch by the Overland Mails. Such labels are not recognised in this country; and, when sent from India, are ignored by the London General Post Office.
