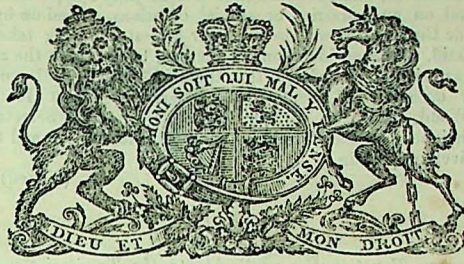

The Right Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to publish, for general information, the following Despatch from Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for India, No. 6, dated 20th February 1860, and of its accompaniment:—

"INDIA OFFICE, London, 20th February 1860.

TO HIS EXCELLENCY THE RIGHT HONORABLE THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL, Bombay.

MY LORD,—Her Majesty's Government having had under their consideration the expediency of revising the Table of Salutes to be given to European Functionaries in India, as fixed by Her Majesty's Order in Council, of the 20th March 1857, in order that the salutes to European Functionaries in India and the Indian Seas should correspond with the honours accorded to Functionaries of a similar rank in all other parts of Her Majesty's dominions, Her Majesty has been pleased to approve a revised Table of Salutes, and I now transmit to you 6 copies of the same, and desire that you will give the directions necessary to the strict observance of the orders therein contained.

"AT THE COURT AT BUCKINGHAM PALACE, THE 23RD DAY OF JANUARY 1860.

PRESENT :

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Whereas there was this day read at the Board a Representation from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for India in Council, setting forth that a Committee, composed of certain Officers, had been appointed to consider the expediency of revising the Table of Salutes to be given to European Functionaries in India, fixed by

Her Majesty's Order in Council of the 20th of March 1857, in order that the Salutes to European Functionaries, in India and the Indian Seas, should correspond with the Honours accorded to Functionaries of a similar rank in all other parts of Her Majesty's dominions, and submitting for Her Majesty's approval two revised Tables of Salutes to European Functionaries, and on anniversaries or special occasions, agreed on by such Committee, with certain modifications subsequently made thereon: Now therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the said revised Tables of Salutes, so modified as aforesaid, into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the said revised Tables of Salutes (a copy whereof is hereunto annexed) be strictly observed and attended to. Whereof the Right Honorable Sidney Herbert, and the Right Honorable Sir Charles Wood, Bart., two of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to take notice, and to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

“PARA. 4.—The rule laid down in the Despatch in this Department, No. 78, dated 4th November 1857, which provides that “no Officer appointed to act for another is entitled to full Staff pay, until he shall have been performing those duties for more than six months,” may be applied to all cases of Military Officers in Civil employ, as recommended by your Government.”

Notification.

Fort St. George, March 20th, 1860.

The Government of Madras are prepared to receive offers, through the Superintendent of Marine, for the establishment of a line of Steamers of not less than 600 tons gross, and 150 horse-power, or thereabout, between Madras, the Northern Ports, and Rangoon, on the following conditions:—

- 1st.—That a Steamer be despatched to Rangoon two days after the arrival of the first or second Suez Steamer of the month, as may hereafter be decided, touching at Masulipatam, Coconada, and Vizagapatam, and that she return to Madras by the same route.
- 2nd.—That she carry all Mails free of expense to Government.
- 3rd.—That she shall afford the regulated space below decks for at least 100 Natives, accommodation (Cabin) for 5 Officers and 3 Warrant Officers, and stowage in the hold for 30 tons of Stores.
- 4th.—That the freight and passage money shall be according to the following scale:—

5th.—That each cabin passenger be permitted to carry 3 cwts. baggage, and each deck passenger 40 lbs., exclusive of their Arms and Knapsacks; and that extra space be allowed for the men's provisions, which will be supplied by the Commissariat.

6th.—That the Commander be held responsible for the custody and issue of the provisions in the mode adopted on board Government Transports, or other Vessels carrying Troops; and

7th.—That, in the event of the Steamer failing to keep to her time of departure from Madras the subsidy and guarantee shall not be claimable, and that, in all cases, the subsidy shall not be payable until the vessel has accomplished her voyage out and home.

2. The Government will guarantee freight and passage money to the extent of Seven thousand and Five hundred (7,500) Rupees on each full trip from Madras and back.

3. Cabin passengers are to be provided with a liberal table, including liquors.

4. Intermediate passage is intended for Warrant Officers who are entitled to a plain, substantial mess, without liquor.

5. Deck passengers will be fed by the Government, but the Commander will be required to take charge of, issue, and cook their food.

6. Parties tendering should state full particulars of the vessel, or vessels, they would propose to employ, more especially as to age, tonnage, horse-power, and 'tween-deck accommodation for Troops; and the subsidy required should be stated for the voyage from Madras and back.

7. No penalties will be stipulated for in the event of failure.

8. Tenders should be addressed to the "Superintendent of Marine, Madras," and despatched so as to arrive not later than the 31st July next.

The following resolution passed by the Government of India and published in the *Calcutta Gazette* of the 31st March 1860, is republished for general information :—

“ No. 2499.

Extract from the proceedings of the Government of India, in the Financial Department, dated 16th March 1860.

Read a letter from the Government of the North-Western Provinces, No. 124a, dated 17th ultimo, with enclosures, submitting, for consideration and orders, a question connected with the allowance of Captain Fanshawe, of the Post Office Department, and proposing a general rule, to hold good in similar cases.

Read also a report from the Civil Auditor, Fort William, No. 825, of 29th ultimo, on the above subject.

RESOLUTION.—Captain Fanshawe, who originally held the appointment of Inspecting Post Master, Meerut Division, was subsequently appointed Post Master and Superintendent Workshops at Allyghur, the salary of the two offices being, however, the same, *viz.*, 400 Rupees each per mensem.

2. After his nomination to Allyghur, Captain Fanshawe also continued to discharge the duties of the Meerut Division, and the question now submitted for consideration is, what allowance he is entitled to draw for performing the duties of two appointments.

3. Captain Fanshawe claims the full salary of his substantive, and a moiety of the acting, appointments the claim being supported by the Postmaster General, North-Western Provinces.

4. The Agra Civil Auditor suggests, that, as a general rule to hold good in similar cases, when an Officer, holding a permanent appointment, is required, by the exigencies of the State, to discharge the duties of another or second office (not subordinate to his own), he shall receive a moiety of the salary of the appointment in which he is officiating, in addition to the full salary of his own appointment, provided, that no extra expense be entailed on the Government.

5. In submitting the case, the Government of the North-Western Provinces remarks—“ As the Post Office Department is entirely under the control of the Government of India, the Lieutenant Governor can give no decision on this question, but refers it to his Honour in Council for disposal, both as regards the particular case, and the general suggestion.”

6. On this reference, the President in Council is pleased to approve the rule proposed by the Agra Civil Auditor, in similar cases, not otherwise provided for under the established rules, and also to direct that Captain Fanshawe's case be settled in accordance therewith.

ORDERED.—That a copy of the foregoing Resolution be sent to the Government of the North-Western Provinces, in reply to the letter above adverted to.

From the inner buoy the Fort at the water's edge on Bancoot Point, is about $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles distant, bearing N. E. by E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E.

Vessels running into the Bancoot River from Seaward have only to bring the buoys in line and run from one to the other, passing them so as to keep them a few yards on the Port side. When the Inner Buoy is reached, steer N. E. by E $\frac{1}{2}$

N.B.—This table is an extract from a more extensive yearly Return that is prepared for statistical purposes, and chiefly for the detection of any removable sources of disease, with a view to improving the healthiness of the Island. As the principal object cannot be fully attained unless the true causes of death be recorded, persons of all stations are requested, in each case of death occurring in their circle, to obtain, in writing, from the Medical Attendant, the name of the fatal disease, that it may be delivered to the Policeman at the funeral place. Medical Practitioners particularly are requested to aid the registration. Blank forms of Death Reports, to keep by them in readiness, are given gratuitously on application at the Office of the Deputy Commissioner of Police.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind, that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all *single* cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.

The Certificate must be in the form of a letter to the Director General, explaining why the Express is sent, and what saving of time is expected.

Banghy Registration Fees prohibited.—Notice is hereby given, that the full address and weight of all Parcels is registered in Books kept in all Post Offices for the purpose, and receipts given to the senders, if required; and that Post Office officials are therefore forbidden to accept Fees for the special Registration of Banghy Parcels. Articles sent on Book Post rates cannot be registered, unless a Registration Fee of Four Annas is paid.

Letters containing Explosive Substances.—Any person who knowingly posts a Letter, Packet, or Parcel, containing explosive or other dangerous substances, is liable to a fine not exceeding Two Hundred Rupees. A party who had infringed the Law, unwittingly, was recently fined Ten Rupees by the Chief Magistrate of Police. The Community are therefore warned against this offence.

Express Packet from London to India.—The Public are hereby informed, that it is most probable that an EXPRESS PACKET will be made up in London for despatch by the Bombay Marseilles Mail, which will leave England on the 3rd of April 1860. Increase of Postage on Newspapers and Prices Current.—Under instructions from the Secretary of State for India, an additional charge of One Penny will be levied from this date upon all single Newspapers and Prices Current conveyed *via* Egypt to the United Kingdom, through the United Kingdom, or to places between Egypt and the United Kingdom, such as Malta, Gibraltar, Corfu, Ionian Islands, Trieste, &c.

Prepayment must be made by Stamps.

The above Rules do not apply to Newspapers for France and Spain, or for transmission through France and Spain.

Bombay Postal Guide.—Parties seeking for information regarding Postal matters are recommended, instead of constantly troubling the Post Office with inquiries, to consult the Bombay Postal Guide. If that does not furnish what is required, application should be made to the Postal Authorities, who will cheerfully attend to all requisitions.

English Postage Labels.—The Public are warned not to affix (as many persons now do) English Postage Labels to Letters posted for despatch by the Overland Mails. Such labels are not recognised in this country; and, when sent from India, are ignored by the London General Post Office.

Change of Residence.—In order to facilitate the delivery of letters, &c., parties arriving at and leaving Bombay are requested to send notice of their movements and whereabouts to the Bombay Post Office.

Zanzibar, Johanna, and Mozambique.—Letters and Newspapers addressed to Zanzibar, Johanna, and Mozambique, will be forwarded *via* Aden, except in the months of December, January, and February, when they will be sent direct as opportunities may offer.

Officers to pay Forward Postage.—It has been ruled by the Supreme Government, that the order, exempting Officers with the Army from the charge of Forward Postage on all re-directed Letters to their address, shall cease to have effect from the 1st of May 1860. Officers serving in the field should take steps to ensure their Letters being correctly addressed.
