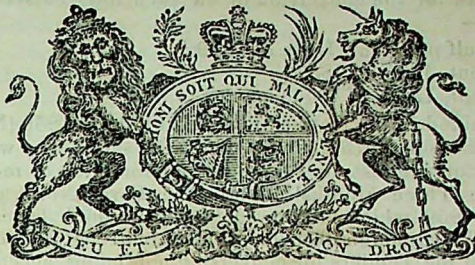

With reference to the above Notification, the following Telegram, dated the 8th instant, received from the Government of India, is published for general information:—

"Please to publish the following in your Official Gazette:—

Referring to Notification No. 33, of the 27th ultimo, the Holders of Government Treasury Bills are hereby informed that the Government will be prepared to receive Tenders, on or before

the First day of June next, for the conversion of all such Bills outstanding into any of the following Stocks, namely:—

1. The Five-and-Half per Cent. Loan of 1859;
2. The Five per Cent. Loan of 1857;
3. The Four per Cent. Loan of 1854;

subject to the terms contained in the Notifications of 20th April 1859 (No. 23), 16th January 1857 (No. 5), and 28th October 1853 (No. 34), under which the said Loans were respectively raised, so far as regards the rates of interest, and the time and condition of re-payment. The terms for conversion may include Three Months' Bills in the Form No. 2, given in the Notification No. 34, of the 30th April 1859, which fall due in May, but which have not yet been presented for payment,—on such Bills, although over-due, interest will be allowed up to the date of conversion; or, in the event of the Tenders for conversion not being accepted, to the 10th of June, if not presented for payment sooner.

The other classes of Bills, which may be included in such Tender, are—*first*, Three Months' Bills in Form No. 2, of the Notification No. 34, of 30th April 1859, whether accepted or not accepted for payment; *secondly*, Bills in Form No. 1, of the same Notification; and, *thirdly*, Bills issued under Notification No. 6, of the 26th January 1859.

Sealed Tenders are to be delivered to the Financial Secretary to the Government of India, at Fort William, to the Chief Secretary to the Government of Madras, Fort St. George, and to the Chief Secretary to the Government of Bombay, respectively, for the conversion of such of the said Bills as may have been issued at the respective Presidencies; and the said Tenders will be opened by the respective Officers—namely, the President, the Accountant General of the Presidency to which the Bills may appertain, and one of the Directors of the Bank of Bengal, or of Madras or Bombay, as the case may be, at ten o'clock A.M., the Second day of June next, when the acceptance or rejection of the said Tenders will be declared. A Paper, containing the minimum rates which the Government will be prepared to accept for the conversion of the Bills into the respective Stocks, will be sealed up and placed in the hands of the Director of the Bank of Bengal, Madras, or Bombay, as the case may be, appointed by the President at the opening of the Tenders, who will, in case the Tenders are rejected, open the said Paper, but, if accepted, will return it unopened to the Secretary to Government.

It is hereby further intimated that the Treasury Bills, issued under Notification No. 6, dated 26th January 1859, and bearing interest at the rate of Three Pies per day for each One Hundred Rupees, and which may not be converted into Stock under this Notification, will be paid off at the General Treasuries of the Presidencies, from which they have been issued, under the terms of the said Notification of the 26th January 1859, three months from the date hereof—that is to say, on the Ninth day of August 1860, from which date interest on the said Bills will cease to accrue.

“FINANCIAL DEPARTMENT.

No. 31.

Fort William, the 23rd April 1860.

The following Resolution is published for general information:—

Read again the Resolution of Government in this Department, on the subject of a Financial Budget, Estimates, and Audit.

RESOLUTION.—By the Financial Resolution of the 7th April 1860, the objects and importance of a Budget containing previous Estimates of expenditure on each particular service for each year, were pointed out. It was also ordered that Estimates for the coming year should be immediately submitted by each local Government, as also by each Department of the State not under a local Government, to the Financial Department of the Supreme Government. In furtherance of one among the many objects of the Budget, the attention of the Supreme Government has been given to the matter of Stores for the Public Department consisting of Ordnance and Military Stores, Commissariat, Medical, Clothing, Stationery, Marine and Public Works Stores.

2. The supply and accumulation of Stores throughout India, have, as might have been expected, increased enormously since the disturbances of 1857. The amount value of Stores of every description supplied from England alone has risen to more than one and a half crores of Rupees, or one and a half million sterling in the year 1858–59, and it is probable that the value of all Stores on hand may now amount to twelve crores of Rupees, or twelve millions sterling.

3. The magnitude of these amounts will show the necessity that exists, that only the requirements absolutely essential to efficiency should be made in all branches of the Service; the provision of Stores in India and requisitions for them from Home being limited accordingly.

4. Special consideration should be given to this point, when the amounts necessary for each service are entered by Heads of Departments in the coming Budget, and as the circumstances which necessitated the supply of such a vast amount of Stores have happily ceased, and as the accumulation now on hand is unprecedentedly large, it may confidently be anticipated, that, with the cessation of active operations and

the reduction of the Military Forces, the demands for Stores for the next Official Year may be greatly curtailed, and the finances proportionately relieved.

5. The local Governments and Heads of Departments must be careful to secure the absolute efficiency of the Service, and at the same time provide for all reasonable contingencies; but this limit must be rigorously observed, and all expenditure in excess thereof, all unnecessary accumulation of Stores, and excess in allotments thereof, carefully avoided.

6. Each Head of a Department must consider himself directly responsible to Government for enforcing all practicable economy in his Department, and when indenting for Stores limit his requisition to the lowest amount consistent with efficiency. Judgment must be exercised as to the quantity needed of each individual article. The quantity actually in hand will be observed, and it will be considered whether more need be indented for or not. If more must be indented for, still this requisition must be limited to the lowest amount practicable. It will be distinctly understood that the requisitions, both as regards quantities and nature of Stores, will be complied with as promptly as practicable, and the importance of this point will be earnestly pressed by the Government of India on the Home Government.

7. Also economy will be promoted by the concentration of Departmental Stores in as small a number of Depôts as possible, so as to bring all within the supervision of the Controlling Officer and diminish the aggregate of Stores.

8. The Executive Officers entrusted with the charge of Stores must, on their part, carefully watch over their issue and expenditure, for it is only by means of this minute supervision of details that the aggregate quantity of Stores consumed can be kept in check, and Government will not fail to look to its Controlling and Executive Officers for the exercise of vigilance in their respective spheres.

9. In the Ordnance Department, the value of the aggregate quantity of Stores on hand throughout the Empire is enormous, amounting to not less than eight crores of Rupees,—considerably more than the amount value of Stores on hand before 1857,—notwithstanding the great losses of Arms, &c. consequent on the mutiny, and the subsequent large consumption of Stores.

10. The quantities of Ordnance Stores procured on Indent from Home, purchased in the Country, obtained from the Commissariat, and made up in Magazines, have all greatly increased, and although this is in part due to the large expected requirements of the Service, the change of Arms from the old Musket to the Enfield Rifle in the European Infantry generally, and to the augmentation in the number of Guns, owing to the increase made to the Artillery since the disturbances, still after every allowance has been made for these circumstances, the amount of Stores in hand is so great as apparently to ensure, with small additions, a sufficiency to meet probable requirements for some time to come,—say for three years at least,—and for a period longer than that for which it is usually considered necessary to lay in Stores. This anticipation is strengthened by the consideration of the extensive reductions in the Military Forces, already made and still in progress, and by the fact that this abundance of Ordnance Stores appears to exist in all parts of the Empire alike, and in respect to most, if not all, of the articles both in use and in reserve. As regards the Madras and Bombay Presidencies, it has been ascertained on the most competent authority that the supply from Home during the next year may be very much limited, and, judging from the past requisitions, it may be expected that a similar limitation will be found practicable as regards the Bengal Presidency.

11. The Inspectors General of Ordnance should, therefore, before framing their Estimates for the coming Budget, revise unfulfilled requisitions for Stores from Home, and, whilst having due regard to the probable need of the Service on the one hand, and the amount of Stores now available on the other, consider that it is necessary in the present state of the Finances to reduce supplies in proportion to the reduction of the Military Forces, and to limit demands both in England and India to the lowest point consistent with efficiency; the same principle being followed by the Supreme Government in sanctioning the final Budget.

12. The quantity of Malt Liquor supplied from Home to the Commissariat during the past two year has been very great, and calculated on a scale to meet the wants of a much larger force than is now maintained; and should now therefore be so far limited as to avoid wastage, whilst at the same time providing for the contingencies to which this branch of supply is liable, and as the stores of liquor of other kinds also are known to be generally abundant, the question of the necessity of further increase to them should be carefully weighed before further supplies are laid in.

13. The quantity of grain and other supplies laid in at the fortified places throughout the Empire has been reduced since the re-establishment of peace; and as such supplies can always be obtained in the country at the shortest notice, the strict limit of actual Military requirements must be observed as regards this item of expenditure: the Commissaries General instructing the Officers of that Department to frame their requisitions so as not to exceed the requirements of the Army on its reduced strength.

14. The quantities of some articles of Store on hand in the Medical and Clothing Departments are far from excessive, and indeed in some cases actually deficient. This extreme should be as carefully avoided as the opposite, as often leading Government into unnecessary expense and putting the Service to inconvenience; but, in these Departments also, wherever any article of Store is already abundant, the same rule as prescribed for other Departments will be adhered to in framing the Estimates for the ensuing year.

15. In the Public Works Department, the accumulation of Stores which existed when the progress of work was partially suspended may probably by this time have been greatly reduced, and as the financial means available do not at present admit of the rapid advancement or wide extension of operations in that Department, the supplies should be limited accordingly. The Chief Engineer of each Presidency or Circle must be well acquainted with the exact state of the work under his supervision, and can therefore judge of the amount of stock needed in each Executive Division; and the resources of each of the several work-shops should also be considered when making demands for supplies from other sources.

SIR,

I am directed to acknowledge the receipt of your letter, No. 1774, dated the 27th ultimo, soliciting instructions on the point as to whether an Absentee, under Section XIV. of the Covenanted Civil Absentee Rules, is entitled to draw his half salary for the period of his leave under that Section, in the event of his exceeding the limit allowed, viz., six months.

2. You seem to think that, as it is provided in Clause 2 of Section XIV. of the Rules, no portion of the half salary allowed to be drawn will be claimable till the Absentee shall have returned to his duty, and that, as the Absentee, by overstaying his leave, forfeits his appointment, and is thus precluded from returning to his duty, he cannot be held entitled to any portion of the half salary allowed under the Rules.

3. In reply, I am desired to inform you that the Honorable the President in Council is of opinion that it could not have been contemplated by Clause 2 of Section XIV. of the Covenanted Civil Absentee Rules, that the allowance of half salary should be forfeited in cases in which Officers might have exceeded the limit of their leave under that Section, nor does it require, His Honor in Council considers, a strained interpretation of the word *duty* to support that view. Return to *duty* has always been used as nearly equivalent to return to active service. Servants on leave at home were always permitted to return to their *duty* whether they had any appointment or not. If the Officer were to leave the Service altogether and not to return, the half salary would not be payable; and that, the President in Council thinks, is the true meaning of the limitation. His Honor in Council would accordingly lay it down, as a Rule of interpretation, that an absent Officer is entitled to draw his authorised allowances during absence on leave upon his *bonâ fide* return to the Service, and when he is ready to take any appointment the Government to which he reports himself may give him. Any other interpretation would, His Honor in Council thinks, be contrary to the whole spirit of the Regulations, and might operate very unequally by mere chance.

Fort St. George, March 20th, 1860.

The Government of Madras are prepared to receive offers, through the Superintendent of Marine, for the establishment of a line of Steamers of not less than 600 tons gross, and 150 horse-power, or thereabout, between Madras, the Northern Ports, and Rangoon, on the following conditions:—

- 1st.—That a Steamer be despatched to Rangoon two days after the arrival of the first or second Suez Steamer of the month, as may hereafter be decided, touching at Masulipatam, Coconada, and Vizagapatam, and that she return to Madras by the same route.
- 2nd.—That she carry all Mails free of expense to Government.
- 3rd.—That she shall afford the regulated space below decks for at least 100 Natives, accommodation (Cabin) for 5 Officers and 3 Warrant Officers, and stowage in the hold for 30 tons of Stores.
- 4th.—That the freight and passage money shall be according to the following scale:—

5th.—That each cabin passenger be permitted to carry 3 cwts. baggage, and each deck passenger 40 lbs., exclusive of their Arms and Knapsacks; and that extra space be allowed for the men's provisions, which will be supplied by the Commissariat.

6th.—That the Commander be held responsible for the custody and issue of the provisions in the mode adopted on board Government Transports, or other Vessels carrying Troops; and

7th.—That, in the event of the Steamer failing to keep to her time of departure from Madras the subsidy and guarantee shall not be claimable, and that, in all cases, the subsidy shall not be payable until the vessel has accomplished her voyage out and home.

2. The Government will guarantee freight and passage money to the extent of Seven thousand and Five hundred (7,500) Rupees on each full trip from Madras and back.

3. Cabin passengers are to be provided with a liberal table, including liquors.

4. Intermediate passage is intended for Warrant Officers who are entitled to a plain, substantial mess, without liquor.

5. Deck passengers will be fed by the Government, but the Commander will be required to take charge of, issue, and cook their food.

6. Parties tendering should state full particulars of the vessel, or vessels, they would propose to employ, more especially as to age, tonnage, horse-power, and 'tween-deck accommodation for Troops; and the subsidy required should be stated for the voyage from Madras and back.

7. No penalties will be stipulated for in the event of failure.

8. Tenders should be addressed to the "Superintendent of Marine, Madras," and despatched so as to arrive not later than the 31st July next.

“The following Order by Her Majesty in Council is, under instructions from Her Majesty’s Secretary of State for India, published for general information, and the orders therein contained are to be strictly observed from this date:—

‘AT THE COURT AT BUCKINGHAM PALACE, THE 23RD DAY OF JANUARY 1860.

PRESENT:

The QUEEN’S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY IN COUNCIL.

Whereas there was this day read at the Board a Representation from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for India in Council, setting forth that a Committee, composed of certain Officers, had been appointed to consider the expediency of revising the Table of Salutes to be given to European Functionaries in India, fixed by Her Majesty’s Order in Council of the 20th of March 1857, in order that the Salutes to European Functionaries in India and the Indian Seas, should correspond with the Honours accorded to Functionaries of a similar rank in all other parts of Her Majesty’s dominions, and submitting for Her Majesty’s approval two revised Tables of Salutes to European Functionaries, and on anniversaries or special occasions, agreed on by such Committee, with certain modifications subsequently made thereon: Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the said revised Tables of Salutes, so modified as aforesaid, into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the said revised Tables of Salutes (a copy whereof is herewith annexed) be strictly observed and attended to. Whereof the Right Honorable Sidney Herbert, and the Right Honorable Sir Charles Wood, Bart., two of Her Majesty’s Principal Secretaries of State, and the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to take notice, and to give the necessary directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

N.B.—This table is an extract from a more extensive yearly Return that is prepared for statistical purposes, and chiefly for the detection of any removable sources of disease, with a view to improving the healthiness of the Island. As the principal object cannot be fully attained unless the true causes of death be recorded, persons of all stations are requested, in each case of death occurring in their circle, to obtain, in writing, from the Medical Attendant, the name of the fatal disease, that it may be delivered to the Policeman at the funeral place. Medical Practitioners particularly are requested to aid the registration. Blank forms of Death Reports, to keep by them in readiness, are given gratuitously on application at the Office of the Deputy Commissioner of Police.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind, that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all single cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.

Notice to Mariners.

DANGEROUS SHOAL IN THE MIDDLE OF THE PERSIAN GULF.

A dangerous shoal was reported some time back to exist in the middle of the Persian Gulf, by the Commander of the Ship "Shah Allum," who first discovered and sounded on it; and, in consequence thereof, the shoal which has lately been carefully surveyed, has been called the "Shah Allum Shoal."

It lies in the middle of the Persian Gulf, equidistant from the Islands Sheykh Shayb and Halool, and its bearing from the Westward end of Sheykh Shayb is S. 55° W., distant 44 miles. The shoal forms a small bank of sharp and rugged rocks, and that portion of it where the soundings are under 20 fathoms, is only 2½ miles wide in a North and South direction, and 2 miles in an East and West direction. The dangerous part is at the North end, where is not more than one-third of a mile across, on which there is generally from 4 to 5 fathoms in overfalls, but in one spot there are rocks having only from 15 to 17 feet on them, according to the tide, the time of which is not accurately known. The least water on any part of the shoal is not less than 12 feet.

The "Shah Allum Shoal" is steep to all round, having 37 fathoms at its South extremity, and from 40 to 45 fathoms at its North, about a mile distant from the shoal, which renders it all the more dangerous, as this great depth of water produces no discolouration on its surface, nor does it allow the shoal to be seen from aloft until on it, but the bottom may be seen, when in seven fathoms, and plainly when under that depth. Sea-birds frequent the site of the shoal, and flocks of them are generally to be seen hovering over it. There are sometimes also slight marks observable on the water, in its vicinity, supposed to be caused by the tides.

In clear weather, the mountains on the coast of Persia between Taurie and Nakhiloo, can be distinctly seen from the shoal, and the well known landmark called Assaloo Notch bears from it N. 51° E.

The shoalest spot is in Latitude 26° 25' 20" North, and 1° 40' 13" East of Bushire Residency Flagstaff.

TELEGRAM.

Please to publish the following in your *Official Gazette*.

As the object which the Government had in view in calling in Treasury Bills which are now in circulation appears to be greatly misunderstood, and as an apprehension appears to exist that it is intended as an indirect mode of creating a new Loan, the Government deems it needful to issue the following explanations:—

On the 20th of April 1859, under Notification No. 28, a Five-and-a-half per cent. loan was opened, limited to Five Crores, upon certain conditions, and it was understood that the Government would open no new loan before the 1st May 1860, and which understanding has been strictly adhered to. That loan was closed in the ordinary way the 14th of February last. But there still remains open the issue of Treasury Bills in the two forms under the Notification No. 34, of the 13th of April 1859, of indefinite duration and amount, and which, as long as such an issue lasted, acted as a continual and unlimited means of borrowing on part of the Government, and of absorbing Money from the market. It was the desire of the Government, after the closing of the Five-and-a-half per cent. loan, also to close all other means by which the Treasury could borrow money; and therefore, by Notification No. 33, dated the 27th ultimo, notice was given that Money would cease to be received for the Treasury Bills, and

that this means of clearing debt would be closed. But it becomes necessary to consider how to deal with the amount of Bills in circulation which thus constituted a portion of the Public Debt; and it was decided that, the amount being very small—being only about Twenty-three Lacs in Bengal, and Fifty-nine Lacs for all parts of India, including all the different classes of Treasury Bills, that is, three pie Bills and two-and-a-half pie Bills, Nos. 1 and 2,—the owners should have the choice of converting them into a permanent stock, or receiving their money as the Bills fall due. An option is given to them to take Four per cent., Five per cent., Five-and-half per cent. stock, subject to the same terms as regards the time and conditions of repayment as applied to those several stocks which have already been closed, but at such prices as the Government shall fix. It must be plain that by this option given to the present Holders of Treasury Bills, the Government does not add to its entire debt, or abstract any money from the market, while, by the arrangement, Government closes the Treasury against any further borrowing. All that is now done to convert a debt, for payment of which the Government might be called upon at short and uncertain periods, to be one of a more fixed and permanent character, is certainly essential to the economical management of the Public Finances. Such conversion, however, to take place entirely at the option of the Holders, and provided they are willing to give such terms as the Government think fair to the Public, otherwise they will be paid off in cash. So far, therefore, from this operation being intended as a new mode of indirectly raising loans, it is adopted as a plan effectually closing all the existing means open to the Treasury of borrowing money, which will be made more apparent when it is stated that the Government has no intention of calling upon the Indian Money Markets for loan of any kind whatever, whether in the shape of Treasury Bills, or in any other form, during the current financial year ending the 30th of April 1861.
