26th March 1859.

The following Act, passed by the Legislative Council of India, received the assent of the Right Honorable the Governor General on the 22nd March 1859, and is hereby promulgated for general information :-

ACT No. VIII. OF 1859.

An Act for Simplifying the Procedure of the Courts of Civil Judicature not established by Royal Charter.

Whereas it is expedient to simplify the Procedure of the Courts of Civil Ju-Preamble. dicature not established by Royal Charter ; It is enacted as follows :---

Chapter I.

OF THE JURISDICTION OF THE CIVIL COURTS.

1. The Civil Courts shall take cognisance of all

Civil Courts have cogui-sance of all suits unless specially barred.

suits of a Civil nature, with the exception of suits of which their cognisance is barred by any Act of Parliament,

or by any Regulation of the Codes of Bengal, Madras, and Bombay respectively, or by any Act of the Governor General of India in Council.

Exemption of certain women from personal appearance.

A Bill to Regulate the Appointment, Employment, and Dismissal of Village Watchmen in the Territories under the Government of the Lieutenant Governor of Bengal.

Whereas it is expedient to regulate by enact-ment the administration of the Rural Police ; It is enact-Preamble. ed as follows :-

I. In default of any special rule or custom, the requisite number of village watch-Number of village watchmen.

men shall be held to be one watchman for every hundred

houses. Where villages are small and scattered, so that one man cannot watch one hundred houses, the number of watchmen, relatively with the number of houses, may be increased by the Magistrate with the approval of the Commissioner; provided always that a watchman shall not be appointed to fewer than sixty houses.
