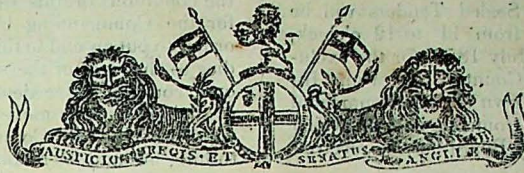

## Notice

Is hereby given, that Sealed Tenders will be received at this Office, from 11 to 12 o'clock, noon, on Friday the 22nd July 1853, for the exclusive privilege of selling Country Liquor and Intoxicating Drugs for the Town and Cantonment of Sholapoor, for one year from the date on which the sanction of the Military Board may be received at this Station.

2. The Troops composing the Cantonment of Sholapoor are as follows:—

Resident Population.....	10,000
1 Regiment of Native Light Cavalry, and Followers .....	962
1 Regiment of Native Infantry.....	873
1 Company of Native Foot Artillery, with No. 2 Light Field Battery attached.....	164

3. No deduction will be allowed, except for Troops who may leave the Cantonment.

4. Detachments of 500 Men moving or stationed within the Command are to be supplied with Liquor and Drug Shops by the Contractor.

5. Troops moving from the Station to be supplied with Liquor Shops by the Contractor, which are to remain until replaced by others from the Station they halt at.

6. The amount to be paid by the Contractor shall not be increased or decreased as Troops arrive in or depart from the Cantonment, except in cases where the strength of such Troops exceeds one-fourth the number of Sepoys and Followers stationed at the time of concluding the Contract.

7. It is hereby declared, that the Contractor is to take the Contract with all its advantages and drawbacks, as he will not be considered entitled to any remission in consequence of failure of seasons, or any other cause save those distinctly specified in the Contract. All petitions for remission of monthly payments will consequently not be attended to.

8. The Contractor to remain always with the Bazar Department, and have agents wherever, within the local limits of the said Command, they be required by order of the Superintendent of Bazars and Police; and the said Contractor will be held responsible for his or their agents fulfilling the terms of this Contract.

9. The Contractor shall not sell or permit to be sold any Liquor or Drugs whatever at any lower rates than those contained in his Contract.

10. The Tenders, &c. to be in Company's Rupees; and no person will be allowed to tender for the Contract unless he previously deposits in this Office the sum of Company's Rupees (1,500) one thousand and five hundred, in cash, which will be forfeited in the event of delay, evasion, or refusal to execute the necessary Deed of Contract, should the offer be accepted, in which case he must be prepared to add thereto such amount as shall complete a month's rent, to be deposited in the Collector's Treasury, until the expiration of his Contract.

11. The tenderer will be required to sign and execute the Deed of Contract, which will have been previously prepared, and to furnish at the same time two competent persons as securities for the due performance of the whole Contract.

12. Should the Contractor appear to the Officer Commanding the Station to have any interest or concern, either directly or indirectly, with any person whom Government may declare unworthy of being dealt with in the management of this Con-

tract, or if he shall at any time fail in any one of the conditions of this Contract, it shall be lawful for the Commanding Officer of the Station, by order, to put an end to this Contract, without prejudice to the right of the said Company to damages on account of antecedent breach of contract; and in such case such money as shall have been advanced by the said Contractor shall not be repaid to him, but may be retained by the said Company.

13. The power is reserved to Government, to reject even the best bid, should it see fit to do so.

14. The Contractor to defray the expenses of maintaining a Preventive Police, when and wherever it may be found necessary by the Commanding Officer, for suppressing clandestine sale of Spirits to European Troops.

15. The Contractor is bound to abide by the provisions of paragraphs 23, 24, 25, and 26 of G. O. C. dated 28th August 1852.

16. People exempted from the spirit of para. 23 of the above General Order are prohibited from taking out of the Shops any quantity of Liquor exceeding (1) one bottle, without a written pass from the Superintendent of Bazars and Police.

17. After these Shops are closed at 9 o'clock p. m. no Liquor whatever shall be clandestinely sold to any individual, on pretence of accident, sickness, or other necessity, without a pass from the Kotwal of the Camp Bazar.

18. Further particulars will be made known to any person or persons on application at this Office, every day, from 10 A. M. to 4 o'clock P. M., Sundays excepted.

The 10th June 1853.

The following Extract from the Proceedings of the Governor General of India in Council, in the Legislative Branch of the Home Department, under date the 10th June 1853, is published for general information.

Read a second time the Draft of a proposed Act, dated the 5th November 1852, and published in the *Calcutta Gazette* of the 10th November 1852, for the amendment of Procedure in Cases of Appeal to the Sudder Courts in the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal.

*Resolution.*—The Governor General in Council resolves that the following revised Draft on the subject be published for general information :—

ACT No. — OF 1853.

*An Act for the amendment of Procedure in Cases of Appeal to the Sudder Courts in the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal.*

Whereas it is desirable to simplify and shorten the procedure and modes of pleading in regular appeals to the Courts of Sudder Dewanny Adawlut in the said Presidency ; it is enacted as follows :

I. Act IV. 1850, and Sections II. III. and IV., Act XXX. 1850, are hereby repealed, except as to appeals presented before the passing of this Act.

II. Every petition of regular appeal in a case appealable to the Sudder Court shall be presented to the Court in which the decision was passed within six weeks from the day of the decision ; unless the Sudder Court shall, upon sufficient cause shown, extend the time for presenting such appeal. Such petition of appeal shall contain only notice that the party, being dissatisfied with the judgment, is desirous of appealing from it, except in cases of petitions under Section XIII. of this Act.

III. On presentation of a petition of regular appeal to the Court in which the decision was passed, notice thereof to the respondent, as well as a proclamation to the same effect, shall immediately issue from that Court. If the notice cannot be personally served, the proclamation shall at once be fixed upon the door of the respondent's dwelling-house, or in some conspicuous place in the village where he usually resides ; or in cases in which the respondent may not have a fixed residence within the jurisdiction of the Company's Courts, the proclamation may be fixed upon the door of his house of business or catcherry, or the notice may be served on his known local agent. In case the proclamation cannot be fixed or served in the manner above mentioned, it shall be affixed in the Court-house of the said last mentioned Court, and also in such other place, if any, as the said last mentioned Court shall direct. The Nazir shall return the order of notice or proclamation with an endorsement, stating at what times and places it may have been served or fixed up. The return of the Nazir is to be filed in Court, and to form a part of the record of the trial.

IV. The Rule in Section XI. Regulation VI. 1793, which directs copies of all original papers transmitted to the Sudder Dewanny Adawlut with the record of an appealed case to be made out and deposited in the Court in lieu of the originals, is hereby modified, and it shall be necessary to copy only the exhibits and any papers of importance which either of the parties may specify, including the pleadings, or any parts of them which may be desired by either of the parties.

V. The appeal record shall be certified to the Sudder Dewanny Adawlut as soon as conveniently may be after the presentation of the petition of appeal.

VI. On arrival of the appeal record at the Sudder Court, notice shall be affixed in the Court-house of the Sudder Dewanny Adawlut, or given in such form and manner as that Court shall order by a Rule to be framed under Section II. Act XVII. 1841, requiring the

appellant to file, within four weeks from the date thereof, his grounds of objection to the decision of the Court below. Within the said space of four weeks the appellant shall file in the Court of Sudder Dewanny Adawlut his grounds of objection to the decision. Such grounds of objection shall be stated distinctly and concisely, without any argument or narrative of facts ; they shall be numbered consecutively, and shall be on paper bearing the stamp duty prescribed by Article 9, Schedule B, Regulation X. 1829. On failure to file the grounds of objection within the said space of four weeks, the appeal shall be dismissed, unless the appellant shall show reasonable cause to the satisfaction of the Court for his default, in which case the Court may allow him to file his grounds of objection within such further time as the Court may order. A separate paper, containing detailed reasons in support of the grounds of objection, may, at the option of the appellant, be filed on plain paper within the said period of four weeks, or such further time, if any, as may be allowed by the Court for filing the grounds of objection.

VII. On the filing of the grounds of objection by the appellant, notice shall be given to the respondent, in the manner prescribed by the preceding Section of this Act, requiring him to file his grounds of objection, if any, to the decision within four weeks from the date of such notice ; and any grounds of objection to the decision, whether involved in the appeal or in the objections filed by the appellant, or not, may be filed by the respondent within the said space of four weeks, or within such further time as the Sudder Court may allow for that purpose, upon reasonable cause shown to the satisfaction of the Court for such extension of time.

VIII. At the expiration of such last mentioned space of four weeks, or of such extended time as may be allowed by the Court as last aforesaid, the record shall be considered complete, and the case ready for hearing. The grounds of objection, if any, which shall be filed by the respondent, shall be stated distinctly and concisely, without any argument or narrative of facts ; they shall be numbered consecutively, and shall be on paper bearing the stamp duty prescribed by Article 9, Schedule B, Regulation X. 1829.

IX. If any of the grounds of objection filed by the respondent shall not be involved in the appeal, on the grounds filed by the appellant, but would be the ground of a separate petition of appeal by the respondent, such grounds of objection shall be on paper bearing, in addition to the stamp above named, the stamp which would have been required on a separate petition of appeal filed by the respondent, unless the respondent shall have presented a separate petition of appeal in the case ; Provided that, if the suit in appeal be referred back for further investigation and decision, without a judgment on the merits of the case, the last mentioned stamp duty paid by the respondent shall be returned to him in the same manner as if such stamp duty had been paid on a separate petition of appeal.

X. A separate paper, containing detailed reasons in support of the grounds of appeal filed by the respondent, or in answer to the detailed reasons, if any, filed by the appellant, may, at the option of the respondent, be filed on plain paper within the period of four weeks allowed for filing the respondent's objections, or within such further time as may be allowed by the Court for filing such objections.

XI. Either party may, by leave of the Sudder Court or any Judge thereof at any time before the hearing, amend his grounds of appeal, or add grounds of appeal to those filed, upon such terms and conditions, and within such time as the said Court or Judge may order. The said Court may also, upon the hearing of any appeal, allow either party to amend his grounds of objection, or to add further grounds, or to urge and be heard by himself or his vakeel, in support of any objection to the decision not included in his grounds of objection, upon such terms and conditions



as to postponement of the cause, and as to the payment of costs or otherwise, as the Court may think just, to prevent the opposite party or his vakeel from being taken by surprise or otherwise. Without such leave of the Court, neither party shall be allowed to urge or be heard in support of any objection not included in his grounds of objection filed. But the Court shall not be confined to such grounds of objection on deciding the cause.

XII. If the grounds of objection filed by the appellant and respondent shall be upon points of law only, and shall not raise any question of fact, the Sudder Court, upon application on behalf of either party, may fix a day for the hearing and decision of the appeal, without regard to the place in which it may stand in the general list of appeals pending in the Court.

XIII. Appeals by paupers shall be preferred in all respects as heretofore; except that the distinct grounds of objection to the decision of the Court below shall be stated in the manner above mentioned, and written on plain paper, and presented within four weeks from the date of permission to appeal as a pauper. If detailed reasons for preferring the appeal be also presented, they shall be presented within the same four weeks.

XIV. If an appeal be preferred upon points of law only, without disputing any of the facts found by the judgment of the Lower Court, the appellant may give notice of his intention to appeal upon points of law only, without specifying the points in his petition, and such notice shall bar him from any appeal upon the facts. If the appellant, in an appeal under this Section, shall intend to appeal against the construction put upon any document in the Court below, he shall give notice of such intention in his petition of appeal, in order that the document may be forwarded to the Sudder Dewanny Adawlut, and unless such notice be given, the appellant shall not be at liberty to controvert the legal construction put upon such document in the Court below. The petition of appeal, however, shall merely give notice of the intention, but need not specify the objections to the construction put upon the document. An appeal under this Section shall be especially certified to the Sudder Dewanny Adawlut as an appeal of law only. In such appeal it shall not be necessary to forward to the Sudder Dewanny Adawlut any part of the record in the Lower Court, except the decree of the Court and the Nazir's return to the order for notice or proclamation of appeal, and any document of which the appellant may, in his petition of appeal, give notice of his intention to dispute the legal construction as above mentioned. In cases under this Section the respondent shall be bound to make appearance in the Sudder Dewanny Adawlut within six weeks from the serving of notice, or the affixing of the proclamation of appeal in the manner provided by Section III. of this Act. At the expiration of the said space of six weeks, the Sudder Dewanny Adawlut shall fix such day as it may deem proper for the hearing and decision of the appeal upon objections of law to be laid before it, without regard to the place in which it may stand in the general list of appeals pending in the Court, and the Court shall also fix a day for the parties to bring in and file their grounds of objection.

XV. If upon an appeal preferred upon points of law only, the respondent shall file grounds of objection, raising any question of fact, the Court may hear the appeal upon the questions of law, in the first instance, in the manner pointed out in the last preceding Section; and if their decision of the case upon points of law shall render it necessary to determine the objections on matters of fact, they shall send for the remainder of the record, and the case shall be set down for hearing in the list of regular appeals for decision upon objections on matters of fact, and shall be determined upon such objections, in the same manner as any other regular appeal.

XVI. Upon the hearing of any appeal, the Court shall give judgment according to the justice of the case,

without regard to any technical error or defect which does not affect the merits.

XVII. This Act extends only to the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be reconsidered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 10th day of July next.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 10th of June 1853:—  
ACT No. — of 1853.

*An Act for amending the Law of Special Appeals.*

Act No. III. of 1843 is hereby repealed, except as to cases in which a petition for appeal shall have been presented before the time fixed for the commencement of this Act.

II. If any application for a special appeal shall have been presented before the time fixed for the commencement of this Act, and no order shall have been passed thereon before the time so fixed, such application shall be heard and determined in the same manner as an appeal presented under this Act; and all the provisions of this Act shall extend to such application and to the hearing thereof, and to all subsequent proceedings thereon; and also to the hearing and determination of the appeal if the same shall be admitted.

III. If any such application shall have been presented, and the appeal admitted before the time so fixed as above mentioned, the appeal shall be heard and determined according to the provisions of the said Act No. III. of 1843, except only that the Court of Sudder Dewanny Adawlut, or the Court of Sudder Adawlut, as the case may be, shall determine the appeal without reference to the points certified, and may call for or refer to any part of the proceedings which may be necessary.

IV. A special appeal shall lie to the Courts of Sudder Dewanny Adawlut at Calcutta, Agra, and Bombay, respectively, and to the Court of Sudder Adawlut at Madras, from any decision passed on regular appeal in any of the Civil Courts subordinate to the said Sudder Courts, respectively, on any of the following grounds, namely:—

1st. On the ground that the decision hath failed to determine all matters in difference in the cause, or hath determined the same or any of them contrary to law or usage having the force of law.

2nd. On the ground of a misconstruction of any document.

3rd. On the ground of any ambiguity in the decision in a matter important to a determination of the matters in difference in the cause, upon the merits.

4th. On the ground of any substantial error or defect in procedure, or in the investigation of the case, provided such error or defect be apparent on the record, and shall have produced, or be likely to have produced, any error or defect in the decision of the case upon the merits. Provided always, that no such special appeal shall lie, nor shall any such decision be reversed, altered, or remanded by any of the said Sudder Courts, upon the ground that the decision of any question of fact is contrary to or not warranted by the evidence in the case, or any probability deduced from the record.

V. A special appeal shall not be admitted unless a petition be presented to the proper Sudder Court within three months from the date of the decision appealed against, or unless the petitioner can show just and reasonable cause to the satisfaction of the

said Sudder Court for not having presented it within such limited period, and every such petition shall be accompanied by copies of the several decrees previously passed in the case.

VI. Every petition for a special appeal shall set forth concisely and under distinct heads the particular grounds on which the application is made.

VII. The said Sudder Courts shall cause lists of the petitions which shall be presented for the admission of special appeals to be prepared weekly, and to be affixed in the Court-houses of the said Sudder Courts, respectively. The said lists shall set forth the dates on which such petitions are likely to be brought on for hearing, and the said Sudder Courts shall cause extracts from the said lists to be transmitted to the Courts in which the decisions on regular appeal were passed; such extracts shall be affixed in some conspicuous place in the last mentioned Courts, and extracts therefrom shall be transmitted by such Courts to the Courts in which the original suits were instituted, and such last mentioned extracts shall be affixed in some conspicuous place in the said last mentioned Courts. The time to be fixed by the Sudder Court for the hearing of any petition shall not be less than six weeks from the date of despatch of the extracts referring to the same from the Sudder Court.

VIII. It shall be lawful for the said Sudder Courts, or any one or more of the Judges thereof, respectively, to hear applications for special appeals, duly presented as aforesaid, in the presence of the special appellant, or his vakeel, and also of the respondent or his vakeel, or such of them as shall attend, and it shall be competent for the said Court, or for such Judge or Judges thereof, to call for and peruse any document forming a part of the record of the cause; or to order the amendment of the petition of special appeal forthwith, or within such time as they or he may order, not exceeding one month from the date of such order; or to make an order of reference to the Court which pronounced the decree appealed from for further information or explanation; or to reject or admit such special appeal; or if it shall appear that the facts have not been sufficiently recorded, or that the case is otherwise so insufficient that the Sudder Court could not, if the appeal were admitted, pass a final decree thereon, to issue an injunction, setting forth the errors, irregularity, or other defects in the decision appealed against, and remanding the same to the Court by which the same shall have been passed, in order that such decision may be reviewed by the last mentioned Court, and such order or decree passed thereon as may be conformable to law. Provided always, that no such remand shall be ordered as aforesaid, except upon grounds whereon a special appeal will lie under this Act. If any such application shall be heard by only two Judges, and they differ in opinion as to admitting the appeal, it shall be admitted.

IX. When any petition for a special appeal shall be rejected as aforesaid, the order shall state the reason for disallowing each of the grounds set forth in such petition, and every such order of rejection may be once reviewed by the same Judge or Judges of the said Sudder Courts, respectively, or by any Judge or Judges sitting for or instead of him or them, if they or he shall think fit to review the same. Provided, that no such review shall be allowed unless application for the same be made within three months from the date of such order.

X. When any special appeal shall be admitted, the same shall be heard and determined by the said Sudder Courts, or by any three or more of the Judges thereof, and such hearing and

determination shall be upon all the grounds whereon a special appeal will lie under this Act.

XI. The existing Laws and Regulations of the Presidencies of Bengal, Madras, and Bombay, relating to special appeals, shall continue in force, so far as they are not inconsistent with, or repealed by, this Act.

XII. This Act shall commence and take effect from Commencement of and after the day of Act. 1853.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India, after the 10th day of September next.

The Honorable the Court of Directors have permitted Captain J. G. J. Johnstone, of the Invalid Establishment, to retire from the Service.

No. 446 of 1853.—The Right Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to declare that Harness, Saddles, and other Military Appointments and Stores, are not to be replaced, as a matter of course, on their completing the periods laid down in the Regulations for them to last, unless they shall have become actually worn out or unserviceable, and shall have been condemned by a Committee, whose proceedings should in all cases be appended as a Voucher to the Indents preferred for a new supply.

The Right Honorable the Governor in Council moreover directs, with reference to Section III. Articles 19 and 20, pages 15 and 16 of Jameson's Code, that the proceedings of a Committee shall be the proper Voucher for exchanging Horse Appointments, and generally all Stores of an important or expensive nature, whether the same shall have become unserviceable at a Magazine Station, or at a distance from an Arsenal or Magazine.

No. 447 of 1853.—The Right Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to republish to the Army the following General Order, No. 489, by the Most Noble the Governor General of India in Council, dated Fort William, 10th June 1853:—

With the sanction of the Honorable the Court of Directors, as communicated in their Military Letters to the Government of the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal, No. 130, of the 20th October 1852, and No. 49, of the 20th April 1853, para. 14, all existing Orders, as far as they relate to the withdrawal of Officers from their Regiments for Staff, Civil or Military, or other detached employ, are hereby cancelled, and the following Rules, applicable to the three Presidencies, are substituted:—

1. No Officer can be appointed to a situation on the General Staff, or to any other detached employment, Military or Civil, (except that of Aide-de-Camp,) until he shall have performed three years' Regimental duty with a Corps of the Line.

2. An Officer may hold the situation of Aide-de-Camp after having served one year with his Regiment; but the period passed in that situation, except when employed on Field Service, is not to be counted in the Regimental duty above prescribed.

3. No Officer is eligible to hold the situation of Adjutant General, Quarter Master General, Military Auditor General, or Commissary General, who has not previously attained the rank of Major in the Army, unless he shall have actually served twenty years in India. The Deputies in those Departments must have attained the rank of Captain in the Army, or have served twelve years in India; and Assistants, if they have not attained the rank of Captain, must have served ten years in India. No Commissioned Officer is eligible to an appointment in the Ordnance Commissariat Department until five complete years from his first joining the Artillery. The situation of Deputy Principal Commissary of Ordnance may be held by a Regimental Field Officer, or by a Captain, if he be actually serving in the Department; but no Officer under the degree of a Field Officer in the Army can be appointed Principal Commissary of Ordnance.

4. No Officer can be appointed to the Department of the Quarter Master General of the Army until he shall have passed an Examination in Surveying and Plan-drawing.

5. No Officer can be appointed to the Commissariat Department until he shall have passed the Examination in the Native languages prescribed for Interpreters, as well as the prescribed Departmental Examinations.

6. No Officer who has entered the Service since the 9th January 1837 can be appointed to any Staff situation, or to any other detached employment, Military or Civil, until he shall have passed the prescribed Examination in Hindoostanee.

7. No more than six Officers, including Field Officers, Captains, and Subalterns, can be permanently withdrawn for Staff or detached employ from any Regiment of Native Cavalry or Infantry; but a seventh may be taken in cases of great emergency, with the sanction of Government: of these numbers, however, no more than three can be of the rank of Regimental Captain.

8. As a general Rule, when three Captains are absent from a Corps, all on permanent employ, and a Subaltern of the same Corps, holding also a permanent detached appointment, to which he is eligible both as Subaltern and Captain, is promoted to Regimental Captain, the Officer so promoted shall be required to vacate his appointment; but if one or more of the three Captains withdrawn be officiating only, the Subaltern promoted will retain his appointment, and the Captain last withdrawn for an officiating appointment shall rejoin his Regiment. It is, however, optional with Government to retain, on public grounds, the services of the Subaltern promoted, notwithstanding the number of absent Captains may exceed the limit of three.



9. Officers unequal for a limited period to the performance of Regimental duty from wounds received on service, may be appointed to Staff and Civil situations without reference to the number absent from the Corps to which they belong; but this rule is not to be considered as sanctioning any permanent increase of withdrawals for Staff employ from the Regiments, of such Officers, the number allowed from them being, as from all other Corps, limited to six, to which it is to be reduced as situations lapse.

10. A Staff situation which can be held only by an Officer whose Regiment is serving at the Station, or forming part of the Garrison to which the appointment appertains, and any vacancy occasioned by the absence of the permanent incumbent for a short period, may, on an emergency, be filled up by the nomination of an Officer on the spot, without reference to the number of permanent absentees, provided the Commander in Chief is of opinion that he can be spared from Regimental duty; but an Officer so nominated, if not before relieved, must return to Regimental duty on his Corps marching from the Station or Garrison in which he is so temporarily employed on the Staff.

11. The tenure of Staff, Civil, and other detached employment is regulated as follows:—
