Is hereby given, that persons desirous of entering into a contract for supplying Europe Cloth to this Department, for the term of one year from the 1st day of September next, may, on application at this Office from 11 A. 2. Sealed tenders for the contract will be received at this Office on Friday the 12th proximo, at 2 P. M. precisely. These must specify, both in words and figures, the rate per cent. above or below the prices exhibited in the above list at which the supply will be made, on the understanding that the articles supplied are to be of unexceptionable quality, according to musters which may be seen in this office, or of the sort usually supplied, and are to be delivered, in the first instance at the Commissariat Stores if required, and afterwards to the indenting Departments, in good condition, free of all charges beyond the stipulated price, in such quantities as may from time to time be demanded, and that the same are liable to examination and rejection by the executive Commissariat Officer, or by the indenting or receiving Officer; or by a Committee of Officers appointed on the part of Government, in the event of the contractor being dissatisfied with the decision of the above Officers, or either of them; it being understood that the decision of such Committee is to be final and binding on all parties.

3. No tender will be received unless accompanied by a deposit in cash of the sum of Rupees (214) two hundred and fourteen, which sum will be forfeited in the event of delay, evasion, or refusal on the part of the contractor to execute the necessary deed of contract, whenever required to do so, on his tender being accepted; in which latter case he must be prepared to give unexceptionable bonded security to the further amount of Rupees (856) eight hundred and fifty-six, which, together with the amount previously deposited, will be held as a guarantee for the due fulfilment of his contract.

4. A contractor must comply immediately with all emergent demands, and meet others of less urgency within the periods stated in the requisitions made upon him; in failure whereof, or if any supply be condemned by a Committee of Officers as aforesaid, the articles, or such others as may be required in lieu thereof, shall be purchased by this Department without delay, at his risk and cost, if it be considered expedient to do so; and in all such cases thirty per cent. upon the amount of expenses incurred, or a fine of from Rupees (30) thirty to (120) one hundred and twenty, at the option of the executive Commissariat Officer, will be levied as liquidated damages for each and every such breach of contract; it being understood that the simple condemnation of any article by a Committee constitutes such a breach of contract, whether the rejected articles be replaced by the contractor or by this Department; in every such case, also, it is to be understood that the contract may be cancelled, at the discretion of the Commissary General; and that if the contract be so cancelled, the cash deposit of Rupees (214) two hundred and fourteen, mentioned in paragraph 3 of this Notice, will be forfeited to Government.

5. It is also to be understood that any negligence, evasion, or refusal on the part of a contractor to make supplies, or obey orders, or any

attempt on his part, or that of his agents, to pass off articles of an inferior quality in lieu of those he is bound to supply, or any neglect to deliver them at the time and place ordered, will subject him, in every instance, to be fined to the extent of twenty-five rupees, at the option of the executive Commissariat Officer, from whose order an appeal may be made to the Commissary General, whose decision is to be final; but in cases when it may be deemed fit to exact any of the penalties provided for in the preceding clause, no further penalty shall be leviable under this clause.

6. It is further to be understood that the contractor, or an accredited agent on his part, approved of by the executive Commissariat Officer, is to attend at this office during the usual hours of business, *i. e.* from 10 A. M. to 5 P. M. daily (Sundays excepted), also at such other time or place as may be indicated by the executive Commissariat Officer, when he may consider it desirable for the public service to require such attendance.

7. Any party whose tender is accepted will be required to produce his sureties for the approval of the Honorable Company's Solicitor, within fifteen days from the date of the acceptance of his tender, or the contract will be resold. No reason will be stated for rejecting any security tendered.

8. Bills for articles supplied under this contract must be preferred within one month from the date of the delivery of the articles, in default of which the contractor will forfeit the full value of the supplies for which bills have not been so preferred, unless it clearly appear, to the satisfaction of the Commissary General, that the delay was unavoidable.

9. The amount of retrenchments made by the Military Board on the contractor's bills will be recovered from the first bills preferred for payment; but in the event of such retrenchments, or any portion thereof, being remitted, the amount remitted will be refunded.

10. Any party who, after tendering for the contract, fails to furnish the necessary security, as provided for in Clause 7 of this Notice, will be interdicted from tendering on future occasions, unless he produces a certificate from individuals of unexceptionable character and sufficient means, guaranteeing the due execution and performance of the contract, on his offer being accepted.

and, the offer being accepted, the tenderer will be required to execute a contract under seal, in accordance with the stipulation in this Notice contained.

The contractor will be required to supply for a period of 3 years 30 Draught Bullocks, of Mysore, Malwa, or Hannum-Conda breed, equal to the draft of Guns and heavy Stores, each Bullock to be 50 inches high or upwards.

The Cattle should not be under 5, or above 8 years in age.

The offer should be the rate per mensem for each approved Draught Bullock, and the period within which the required number of Cattle will be produced for inspection and approval of a Committee of Officers to be appointed by the Commanding Officer.

The pay of the Cattle to commence from the day they may be passed by a Committee.

The following attendants to be present with the Bullocks. They should be settled with monthly by the contractor, and are not to be discharged without the permission of the Commissariat Officer, viz:—

- 1 Chowdry.
- 1 Duffadar.
- 11 Drivers.

The hire of the Cattle to be paid in arrears on the 10th of each month.

The Cattle to be picketed close to, or rather within the Camel Lines, to enable the Commissariat Warrant Officer to superintend their feeding and grooming; and they should be allowed such ration of Grain as may be deemed necessary by the Commissariat Officer, not exceeding 4 lbs. per diem per head.

The contractor or his agent to attend at the Commissariat Office daily, to receive orders.

The contractor should be bound to supply extra Cattle whenever required for the service of Government, as follows, and for which he is to receive the rate of hire that may be tendered for the 30 Bullocks above alluded to, viz:—

- 50 Draught Bullocks in 20 days;
- 100 Draught Bullocks in one month;

of such breed as may be procurable on the spot, well adapted for the duty required.

The contractor to be paid in advance one and a half month's hire for such extra Bullocks as may be required, and in the event of their being discharged within three months from the date of their entertainment, he will be allowed 3 months' hire for the same.

All the Bullocks furnished by the contractor will be branded in presence of the Committee passing them with the letters S. D. A., of one inch in length, on the off hip, the number of each Bullock, and two last numbers of the year in which they may be supplied.

The contractor is answerable for all losses of Government property that may be conveyed by his Cattle, and the amount thereof will be recovered from the first monthly payment of the Bullocks; but any unavoidable losses by capture of an enemy, when under the protection of Camp or of regular Sepoys, to be taken into special consideration by Government.

The Commissariat Officer is authorized to submit for inspection of a Committee of Officers, to be appointed on the part of Government, any Bullocks which he may consider unfit for service; and if

condemned, the contractor must replace them. Should he refuse or neglect to do so, or to replace casualties in the Bullocks, or attendants, the Commissariat Officer will do so at his (the contractor's) risk, and recover the amount from the first monthly bills that may become due to him.

Should the Bullocks be in a dirty state, or in bad condition, or should the orders of the Commissariat Officer be disobeyed by the contractor, he is liable to be fined by the Commissariat Officer, in a sum not exceeding (25) twenty-five Company's Rupees for each offence; and in case of any infringement of the conditions of the agreement, it will be optional with Government to put an end to the contract.

As a security for the due fulfilment of the contract, the contractor will be bound to place at the disposal of Government the whole of the Draught Bullocks (30) to be supplied by him, as a guarantee for the exact, regular, and due performance of the agreement, and the same will be forfeited to Government should he fail in any of the conditions of his contract.

Persons desirous of taking the contract will be required to lodge in this Office a deposit of Rupees (100) one hundred, in cash, which will be forfeited in the event of delay, evasion, or refusal to execute the necessary deed of contract, should his offer be accepted. The 15th July 1853.

The following Act, passed by the Governor General of India in Council on the 15th July 1853, is hereby promulgated for general information:—

ACT No. X. of 1853.

An Act to amend Act No. XXII. of 1836.

Whereas it is expedient to prevent boats, rafts, and floats from remaining longer than necessary in any part of the lines of Navigation described in Act No. XXII. of 1836, it is enacted as follows:—

I. Section IV. of the said Act is repealed, except as to rent now due under any order or notification made in pursuance of the provisions thereof.

II. The Governor of Bengal shall be competent to prescribe the length of time during which boats, rafts, or floats may remain in any part of either of the lines of Navigation aforesaid without paying rent or demurrage, and also the rate of rent or demurrage to be levied on any boat, raft, or float which shall remain therein longer than the prescribed time.

III. The provisions of Sections VII. VIII. and IX. of the said Act, so far as they apply to rent, are hereby extended to the rent or demurrage to be prescribed in pursuance of this Act.

The following Act, passed by the Governor General of India in Council on the 15th July 1853, is hereby promulgated for general information:—

ACT No. XI. of 1853.

An Act to facilitate the Removal of Nuisances and Encroachments below High-water Mark in the Islands of Bombay and Colaba.

Whereas there is a large sea-shore in the Islands of Bombay and Colaba, and it is expedient, with a view to the safe navigation of the Harbour of Bombay, and to the public interests generally, to facilitate the removal of nuisances, obstructions, and encroachments below high-water mark in the said Harbour, or upon or about the shores of the said Islands, it is enacted as follows:—

I. It shall be lawful for the Collector of Land Revenue at Bombay to give notice requiring the removal of any nuisance, obstruction, or encroachment anywhere below high-water mark in the said Harbour of Bombay, or upon or about the shores of the said Islands; such notice shall be given by affixing the same in some conspicuous place on or near to the encroachment, obstruction, or nuisance complained of, and by publication thereof in the *Bombay Government Gazette*, and shall state that unless the nuisance, obstruction, or encroachment be removed or abated within one month, the same will be removed or abated by the said Collector; such notice may be in the Form No. 1, in the Schedule to this Act annexed, or to the like effect.

II. If any person shall deny the right of the said Collector to effect such abatement or removal, he shall, within one month after such notice shall have been given as aforesaid, apply to the Supreme Court of Judicature at Bombay, by petition, setting forth the grounds of his alleged right, and praying that the said Collector may be restrained from causing such abatement or removal, and the said Court may thereupon (on the petitioner's giving sufficient security for costs) fix a time for hearing and adjudicating upon such petition,

and give such directions and make such orders as the said Court may think just, and the said Court may also make an order for restraining the alleged nuisance, obstruction, or encroachment from being extended, or from being abated or removed by the said Collector, until after adjudication upon the said petition, or the dismissal thereof for want of prosecution.

III. Upon the hearing of every such petition, the onus of proving the alleged right shall be on the petitioner.

IV. No person shall be allowed after the expiration of such period of one month to present any such petition as aforesaid, unless on satisfactorily accounting to the said Court for the delay.

V. If no such petition shall be presented within the said period of one month, or if the same be presented and determined against the right of the petitioner, or be dismissed for want of prosecution, it shall be lawful for the Collector to cause such abatement or removal as aforesaid, by any person or persons to be authorized by warrant under his hand, and such warrant may be in the form No. 2, in the Schedule to this Act annexed, or to the like effect; and the said Collector, and any person acting under his warrant, shall not be answerable for any damage unavoidably occasioned in the removal of any such nuisance, obstruction, or encroachment.

VI. The said Collector may sell the materials of any encroachment or obstruction removed under this Act, and may apply the proceeds of sale in or towards payment of the expenses of the removal, and if any surplus shall remain, the same shall be forfeited, and be paid and applied in such manner as the Governor of Bombay in Council shall direct.

VII. Nothing in this Act shall prejudice or affect the rights of the East India Company as trustees for the Crown in any part of the said Harbour, or of the sea-shore of the said Islands, or preclude or interfere with any such proceedings, civil or criminal, for abating such nuisances and encroachments as aforesaid, as might have been had if this Act had not been passed.

VIII. The words "high-water mark" in this Act shall mean the ordinary line of high-water at monsoon tides.

The 22nd July 1853.

The following Act, passed by the Governor General of India in Council on the 22nd July 1853, is hereby promulgated for general information:—

ACT No. XII. of 1853.

An Act supplemental to Act No. III. of 1853, relating

to the Great Indian Peninsula Railway Company in the Presidency of Bombay.

Whereas by Act No. III. of 1853 certain offences are made punishable by pecuniary penalties or forfeitures, and doubts have arisen whether such offences are punishable by Magistrates of Police in the Islands of Bombay and Colaba, and it is expedient to remove such doubts, and also to define by what Officers such offences shall be punishable; It is enacted as follows:

I. Any person who shall be guilty of any offence for which, according to the provisions of the said Act, such person shall be liable to any pecuniary penalty or forfeiture, shall be punishable for such offence by any Magistrate of Police, Justice of the Peace, Magistrate, Joint Magistrate, or person lawfully exercising the powers of a Magistrate, within the local limits of whose jurisdiction such offence shall be committed, and any person hereby made punishable by a Magistrate of Police or Justice of the Peace, shall be punishable upon summary conviction.

II. Any Deputy or Assistant Magistrate, and any district or joint Police Officer, may, to the extent of the powers conferred upon him by the general Regulations of the Bombay Code, and by the Acts of the Governor General of India in Council, exercise the powers conferred upon a Magistrate by this Act, coupled with Act No. II. of 1839.

III. Payment of any fare to which any passenger not producing or delivering up his ticket shall be liable under Section I. of the said Act No. III. of 1853 may be enforced in the same manner as any penalty under this Act.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 8th July 1853:—

ACT No. — OF 1853.

An Act for regulating the Collection and Distribution of the Effects of Officers, Seamen, and others dying in the Marine Service of the East India Company called the Indian Navy.

Whereas it has been deemed expedient, in pursuance of the provisions of an Act passed in a Session of Parliament holden in the 3rd and 4th years of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, to provide for the due collection, conversion into money, application, remittance and distribution of the effects and credits of Officers, Engineers, Soldiers, Marines, Seamen, and all others belonging to the marine establishment of the East India Company called the Indian Navy, who shall die in the service of the said Company out of the United Kingdom, and for the discharge of their marine debts, It is enacted as follows:

I. When any Commissioned Officer belonging to the Indian Navy shall die in the service of the East India Company out of the United Kingdom, whether his death shall take place on board ship or on shore, the First Lieutenant of the ship or vessel to which such Officer belonged at the time of his death, or the Officer of such ship or vessel next in rank to the Commander thereof, or the Commander himself, if there is no other Commissioned Officer on board, or any Officer he may appoint, shall immediately secure all his effects or equipage on board the said ship or vessel, or on shore in quarters, and any other effects of the deceased within the territorial possessions of the East India Company which the Commander of such ship or vessel shall direct or authorize to be collected or secured, and shall with all convenient speed, and not later than one month after the death of the Officer, with the assistance of two

other Officers not under the rank of Purser or of Clerk in Charge, such Clerk having served not less than two years at sea, to be appointed by the Commanding Officer of the said ship or vessel, make an inventory thereof, and transmit that inventory, together with an account of the debts and credits, to the office of the Secretary to the Government of the Presidency of Bombay in the Marine Department, to the end, that after payment of such Officer's marine or ship debts and the expenses of his interment, where any shall have been incurred, the overplus, if any, shall be paid over by the said Secretary to the legal representatives of the Officer so deceased, as hereinafter mentioned.

II. When any Non-commissioned Officer, Seaman, or other person belonging to or serving in the Indian Navy shall die out of the United Kingdom in the service of the East India Company, whether his death shall take place on board ship or on shore, the First Lieutenant of the ship or vessel to which such Non-commissioned Officer, Seaman, or other person belonged at the time of his death, or the Officer of such ship or vessel next in rank to the Commander thereof, or the Commander himself, if there be no other Commissioned Officer on board, or any Officer he may appoint, shall immediately secure all his effects or equipage on board the said ship or vessel, or on shore in quarters, and any other effects of the deceased within the territorial possessions of the East India Company which the Commander of the ship or vessel shall direct or authorize to be collected or secured, and shall with all convenient speed, not later than one month after the death, in the presence of two other Officers of the rank in the preceding Section mentioned, to be appointed by the Commander of the said ship or vessel, take an inventory thereof and of his credits, and shall take care that the same be applied in the first instance to the liquidation of his marine or ship debts, the remainder, if any, to be paid over to the Secretary to the Government of Bombay in the Marine Department, in order that the same may be paid to the legal representatives of the deceased.

III. When any such Commissioned or Non-commissioned Officer or Seaman, or other person as aforesaid, shall at the time of his death as aforesaid have been detached temporarily from his own ship, and shall be serving with another ship at a distance from his own, the Officers of the ship in which the deceased was serving, as well as the Officers of the ship to which the deceased belonged at the time of his death, shall act in manner above directed in Sections I. and II. of this Act.

IV. If any Commissioned Officer or Non-commissioned Officer, Seaman, or other person belonging to or serving in the Indian Navy shall die within the Presidency of Bombay, away from the ship or vessel to which he shall belong, except when temporarily serving with another ship, the Commander-in-Chief of the Indian Navy shall in such case appoint a Committee consisting of such three Officers as he may direct, to secure the effects of the deceased, or such of them as he may direct, and to apply the same and act in regard thereto as in the first and second Sections of this Act mentioned.

V. The said First Lieutenant and other Officers to be selected and appointed for the purposes aforesaid are hereby required to take upon them the said duties, and faithfully discharge the same, and in all respects conform to the provisions and regulations hereinafter particularly specified.

VI. The effects and credits, within the territories under the Government of the East India Company, of deserters from the Indian Navy, shall be collected and applied in like manner in payment of their marine or ship debts, and the remainder, if any, shall be brought to the credit of the said Company.

VII. It shall be lawful for the Officers, or other persons so authorized as aforesaid, to secure and collect the effects or any part of the effects of any such deceased Officer, Seaman, or other person so dying as aforesaid,

to ask, demand, and receive any such effects to which his authority shall extend, and to commence, prosecute, and carry on any actions or suits for the recovery thereof, and to sell and dispose of or otherwise deal with the same without taking out any letters of administration, either with any will annexed or otherwise, in every respect as if such Officers or persons employed or authorized as aforesaid had been appointed executors, and had proved the will or had taken out administration of such effects; and no Administrator General, Registrar of any Court in the East Indies, or any person acting under the appointment or authority of such Court *ad colligenda* or otherwise, shall in any manner interpose in relation to any such effects unless required or authorized so to do by any such Officer or person so authorized as aforesaid.

VIII. All sums of money due by deceased Officers, Engineers, Marines, Seamen, and other persons belonging to or serving in the Indian Navy, to the Indian Navy Fund, or in respect of mess-bills unadjusted since the last regular issue of pay-bills, or in respect of military or marine clothing appointments, or of equipments or other articles supplied from the ship's stores, or of servants' wages due, or of any ship expenses during the current month, or of any Sanatorium or Hospital charges, or of any mess or marine or ship accounts, and all sums of money due to any agent or Pay-master or Purser or any other Officer upon any such account, or on account of any advance made for any such purpose, and also any charges or expenses attending or relating to the illness or funeral of any such Officer, Seaman, or other person, shall be deemed and taken to be marine or ship debts, and shall be paid out of any arrears of pay or allowances, or out of any prize or bounty money, or the equipage, goods, chattels, and effects of any Officer, Seaman, or other person dying out of the United Kingdom while in the service of the said Company, in preference to any other debts, claims, or demands whatsoever upon the estate and effects of such Officer, Seaman, or other person; and if any doubt shall arise as to whether any claim or demand made in relation to any Officer, Seaman, or other person is a marine or ship debt or not, or whether such charges or expenses attending or relating to the illness or funeral of such Officer, Seaman, or other person are proper to be allowed, or whether any such marine or ship debts remain due, such question shall be decided and concluded by any order or certificate to be made by the Secretary to the Government, and all such payments shall be good and valid in law; and every person who shall make any such payment out of any such arrears of pay, effects, or proceeds as aforesaid under the provisions of this Act, or in pursuance of any such order or certificate of such Marine Secretary, or into whose hands any such money shall come, shall be and are hereby indemnified for and in respect of such payments, and all other acts, matters, and things done in pursuance of the provisions of this Act, or of the order or certificate of the said Secretary in relation to the distribution of such assets, anything in any Act or Acts or law or laws to the contrary notwithstanding.

IX. All such marine or ship debts shall and may be paid without probate of any will being obtained, or any letters of administration, or any confirmation of testament or letters testamentary or dative being taken out by any person, and the surplus only of such arrears of pay or allowances, prize or bounty money, equipage, goods and chattels, or the proceeds thereof, shall be deemed the personal estate of the deceased for the payment of any duty in respect of any probate or of any letters of administration or confirmation of testament, or letters testamentary or dative, or for the purpose of distribution as personal estate; and it shall be lawful for the said Secretary to order and direct the payment or distribution of any such surplus, in any case in which the same shall not exceed five hundred Company's rupees, without any probate or letters of administration, or confirmation of testament, or letters

testamentary or dative, or payment of any duty of stamps or upon legacies or otherwise; and it shall also be lawful for any Pay-master or other person to issue any sum not exceeding the value of five hundred Company's rupees which may be due to any such deceased Officer, Seaman, or other person, unto the widow or relative of any such Officer, Seaman, or other person, or unto the representative or representatives of any such widow or relative in India in like manner, without any probate or letters of administration or confirmation of testament, or letters testamentary or dative, or payment of any duty of stamps, or upon legacies or otherwise, the same to be paid to the person who shall be notified by the said Secretary as aforesaid as being entitled thereto; and all such payments respectively shall be as valid and effectual, to all intents and purposes, as if the same had been made by or to any executor or administrator, or under the authority of any probate or letters of administration or confirmation of testament, letters testamentary or dative, anything in any Act or Acts or law or laws to the contrary notwithstanding.

X. Any such effects, or the proceeds or surplus of such effects of any Officer, Seaman, or other person so dying, when remitted to any person under any order of the Secretary to the Government of Bombay, or to such Secretary, shall not by reason of coming to the hands of such person or Secretary be taken to be assets or effects in the place to which such proceeds or surplus may be remitted, so as to render it necessary that administration should be taken out in respect thereof; and it shall be lawful for the Secretary to the Government of Bombay to order that such effects or the proceeds or surplus of any such effects shall be remitted to any other place in India where the same can more conveniently be paid over to the person or persons entitled thereto, and the obedience to the orders of such Secretary in respect to the payment and disposal of any such effects, proceeds, or surplus of such effects shall be a discharge from all actions, suits, and demands in respect thereof, to any person to whose hands any such effects, proceeds, or surplus shall have come, and which shall have been paid and disposed of under the order of such Secretary.

XI. The effects or the proceeds or surplus of effects of any such Officer, Seaman, or other person dying as aforesaid, which shall remain after satisfying such marine or ship debts as aforesaid, shall with all convenient speed be transmitted to such Secretary as aforesaid, by the Officer or person employed or required to take care of, collect, and receive the same; and such Secretary shall cause the same, or the surplus thereof remaining after satisfying such debts, and after and subject to such payment and application as is hereinbefore authorized, to be paid to the executor or legal representative (if in India) of such Officer, Seaman, or other person, or if such executor or legal representative shall not be in India, or shall not within twelve months from the death of such Officer, Seaman, or other person, claim such surplus, then and in that case such Secretary shall remit the said surplus to the Court of Directors of the East India Company in London, to be by them paid to the executor or legal representative of such Officer, Seaman, or other person so deceased; and such remittance at the end of twelve months as aforesaid, shall be a discharge to such Secretary from all actions, suits, and demands in respect of such surplus; provided always that the Registrars of Her Majesty's several Supreme Courts in India shall not, nor shall the Administrator General of either of the said Presidencies, be required or entitled to take out letters of administration with the will annexed or otherwise in respect of such surplus.

XII. The provisions of this Act are intended to apply, and shall apply, only to European Officers and Seamen, and to other persons being Europeans belonging to the Indian Navy, who may die as aforesaid.

XIII. And whereas the Governor in Council of Bombay made certain Rules, bearing date 27th July

1844, to be observed on the decease of European Officers and European Seamen belonging to the Indian Naval Service, purporting to be Rules made in pursuance of the provisions of the said Act of the 3rd and 4th Victoria, and the Articles of War thereto annexed, and which Rules have been acted upon, it is hereby enacted that the said Rules shall no longer be acted upon, but that all acts heretofore done within any part of the territories under the Government of the East India Company, which were authorized by the said Rules, shall be deemed to be valid, and that no act thereby authorized to be done shall be questioned in any Court of Justice in any part of the territories under the Government of the East India Company.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 8th day of October next.

But the contracts will be sold for the actual number of Troops that may be present on the day of sale, which will be duly notified to the bidders at the time; and the amount of the monthly payment shall not be increased or decreased on account of Troops arriving in or departing from the Cantonment, unless the strength of such Details exceeds one-fourth the number of men for whom the contracts have been entered into. It is, however, to be distinctly understood, that any alteration in the number of Camp Followers will not entitle the contractors to claim any remission in the payment of the stipulated monthly amount of their respective engagements; and the departure of Troops from the Cantonment, as above specified, will alone give claim for remission.

5. The conditions of the contracts shall not be considered binding or in force, in any respect, until the same are confirmed by the superior authority.

6. The person or persons whose tenders may be accepted will be required, ere entering on the performance of their contract, to deposit with the Superintendent of Bazaars the amount of one month's stipulated payment, as his or their personal security for the due execution of the agreement. OUR GOVERNOR GENERAL OF INDIA IN COUNCIL.

1. We forward copy of a letter which has been addressed to Her Majesty's Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs by the French Ambassador, announcing the intention of the Emperor of the French to hold an Universal Exhibition of Agricultural and Industrial Products at Paris, in May 1855.

2. We request that you will give the widest publicity to this announcement, in such a manner as you may deem best calculated to meet the wishes of the Emperor of the French, as respects the contributions of the products of India.

3. The further Notification referred to, regarding the arrangements of the Exhibition, shall be transmitted to you as soon as we receive it. You will make every necessary communication to the subordinate Presidencies upon the subject.

I have the honor to acquaint your Excellency that His Majesty the Emperor of the French has ordered by a Decree, dated 8th March last, that an Universal Exhibition of Agricultural and Industrial Products will be held at Paris on the 1st May 1855.

In hastening to bring this intelligence to the notice of Her Britannic Majesty's Government, I must at the same time, my Lord, give you the assurance that the Exhibitors of those countries who may wish to respond to our appeal will meet with every facility that can be desired for the reception, the installation, and the protection of their products in the Palace of Industry. A further Notification, which I shall have the honor to communicate without delay to your Excellency, will decide precisely the conditions on which our Universal Exhibition will be carried out, the rules under which the Merchandize will be exposed to view, and the different sorts of products which will be admitted.

I ought to add, in conclusion, that the Government of His Imperial Majesty hopes that the Government of Her Britannic Majesty will add as much as in it lies to the solemnity of 1855, by drawing the attention of the industrious of those countries who will be ready to respond to the invitation which is addressed to them now with the same eagerness as England can certify was evinced on our part in 1851.
