Is hereby given, that the contracts for the exclusive privilege of SELLING ARRACK and COUNTRY LIQUOR, and INTOXICATING DRUGS (Ganja, Opium, Khuskhus, and Tobacco), to the Troops and Camp Followers at Baroda, for one year, from 1st November 1853 to 31st October 1854, will be put up to competition at the Office of the Superintendent of Bazars at Baroda, at noon on the 15th September 1853.

2. Verbal offers for the contracts will be received by the above-named Officer on the date and hour specified in the preceding paragraph; and sealed tenders, accompanied by the requisite cash deposit, will also be received by the Commissary General of the Army at Bombay, on the same date.

3. No person will be allowed to bid or tender for the contract unless he deposits with his offer the sum of Company's Rupees (120) one hundred and twenty for the Liquor, and Rupees (60) sixty for the Drug contract, which will be forfeited in the event of delay, evasion, or refusal to execute the necessary deed of contract; and two unexceptionable securities will also be required from the highest bidders, to guarantee their fulfilment of the terms of the respective contracts.

But the contracts will be sold for the actual number of Troops that may be present on the day of sale, which will be duly notified to the bidders at the time; and the amount of the monthly payment shall not be increased or decreased on account of Troops arriving in or departing from the Cantonment, unless the strength of such Details exceeds one-fourth the number of men for whom the contracts have been entered into. It is, however, to be distinctly understood, that any alteration in the number of Camp Followers will not entitle the contractors to claim any remission in the payment of the stipulated monthly amount of their respective engagements; the departure of Troops from the Cantonment, as above specified, will alone give claim for remission.

5. The conditions of the contracts shall not be considered binding or in force, in any respect, until the same are confirmed by the superior authority.

6. The person or persons whose tenders may be accepted will be required, ere entering on the performance of their contract, to deposit with the Superintendent of Bazars the amount of one month's stipulated payment, as his or their personal security for the due execution of the agreement. This is to be in addition to the monthly payment in advance of the sums tendered for the contract.

7. Further particulars relative to these contracts will be made known on application at the Office of the Superintendent of Bazars at Baroda, and that of the Commissary General of the Army at Bombay, from 10 A. M. till 4 P. M. every day, Sundays excepted.

8. The contractor will have to defray the expenses of maintaining a Preventive Police, when and wherever the Brigadier Commanding may deem necessary, for the suppression of clandestine sale of Spirits to European Troops.

2. Verbal offers for the contract will be received at this Office on Saturday the 3rd proximo, at 2 P. M. precisely, when intending contractors will be required to bid a per-centage above or below the prices exhibited in the above list at which the contractor will undertake the work, on the understanding that it must be performed in a satisfactory manner, and that the materials used must be of unexceptionable quality, according to musters which may be seen in this Office, or of the usual description; that the work must be performed whenever ordered, on the Departments requiring it, free of all charges beyond the stipulated price; and that the same are liable to examination and rejection by the executive Commissariat Officer, or by the indenting or receiving Officer; or by a Committee of Officers appointed on the part of Government, in the event of the contractor being dissatisfied with the decision of the above Officers, or either of them; it being understood that the decision of such Committee is to be final, and binding on all parties.

3. No person will be allowed to bid for the contract unless he previously deposits in this Office, in cash, the sum of Rupees (81) eighty-one, which sum will be forfeited in the event of delay, evasion, or refusal on the part of the contractor to execute the necessary deed of contract, whenever required to do so, on his offer being accepted, in which latter case he must be prepared to give unexceptionable bonded security to the further amount of Rupees (326) three hundred and twenty-six, which, together with the amount previously deposited, will be held as a guarantee for the due fulfilment of his contract.

4. A contractor must comply immediately with all emergent orders for packing stores, covering and dammerring packages, &c., and other similar duties of less urgency must be completed within the periods stated in the requisitions made upon him; in failure whereof, or if any work be condemned by a Committee of Officers as aforesaid, this Department may immediately cause the work to be executed at his risk and cost, if it be considered expedient to do so; and in all such cases (30) thirty per cent. upon the amount of expenses incurred, or a fine of from Rupees (30) thirty to (100) one hundred, at the option of the executive Commissariat Officer, will be levied as liquidated damages for each and every such breach of contract; it being understood that the simple condemnation by a Committee of any work performed constitutes such a breach of contract, whether the rejected work be completed by the contractor or by this department; in every such case, also, it is to be understood that the contract may be cancelled at the discretion of the Commissary General, and that if the contract be so cancelled, the cash deposit of Rupees (81) eighty-one, mentioned in para. 3 of this Notice, will be forfeited to Government.

5. It is also to be understood, that any negli-

gence, evasion, or refusal on the part of a contractor to perform the work or obey orders, or any attempt on his part, or that of his agents, to use materials of an inferior quality in covering and dammerring packages in lieu of those he is bound to use, or any neglect on his part to perform the work at the time and place ordered, will subject him, in every instance, to be fined to the extent of (25) twenty-five Rupees, at the option of the executive Commissariat Officer, from whose order an appeal may be made to the Commissary General, whose decision is to be final; but in cases when it may be deemed fit to exact any of the penalties provided for in the preceding clause, no further penalty shall be leviable under this clause.

6. It is further to be understood that the Contractor, or an accredited Agent on his part, approved of by the executive Commissariat Officer, is to attend at this Office during the usual hours of business, *i. e.* from 10 A. M. to 5 P. M. daily (Sundays excepted), also at such other time or place as may be indicated by the executive Commissariat Officer, when he may consider it desirable for the Public Service to require such attendance.

7. Any party whose offer is accepted will be required to produce his sureties for the approval of the Honorable Company's Solicitor, within fifteen days from the date of the acceptance of his offer, or the contract will be resold; no reason will be stated for rejecting any security offered.

8. Bills for work performed under this contract must be preferred within one month from the date of the performance of the work, in default of which the contractor will forfeit the full value of the work executed for which bills have not been so preferred, unless it clearly appear to the satisfaction of the Commissary General that the delay was unavoidable.

9. The amount of retrenchments made by the Military Board on the contractor's bills will be recovered from the first bills preferred for payment; but in the event of such retrenchments, or any portion thereof, being remitted, the amount remitted will be refunded.

10. Any party who, after offering for the contract, fails to furnish the necessary security, as provided for in Clause 7th of this Notice, will be interdicted from bidding on future occasions, unless he produce a certificate from individuals of unexceptionable character and sufficient means, guaranteeing the due execution and performance of the contract, on his offer being accepted.

11. The annual outlay on the above contract is estimated at Rupees 1,634.

The 29th July 1853.

The following Act, passed by the Governor General of India in Council on the 29th July 1853, is hereby promulgated for general information:—

Act No. XIII. of 1853.

An Act for bringing under the operation of the Regulations and Acts, in force in the Presidency of Bombay certain Territories subordinate to that Presidency.

Whereas the possessions of the Chief of Vishalghur, situate below the Ghants, in the Southern Concan, have been added to the British Territories :

I. It is hereby enacted, that from and after the 1st day of September 1853, the villages and hamlets mentioned in the annexed Schedule shall be subject to all Regulations and Acts which are or shall be in force within the Territories subject to the Presidency of Bombay.

II. It is hereby further enacted, that the Pergunnahs of Yawul, Chopra, and Pachora, and the Turf of Lohara, in the Province of Khandesh, formerly belonging to His Highness Scindia, and which have been permanently ceded to the British Government, shall be deemed to have been subject, from the 26th of February 1845, to the Regulations and Acts in force in the Bombay Presidency, to the same extent as if the said Pergunnahs and Turf had not been transferred to His Highness Scindia after the passing of Regulation XXIX. of 1827 of the Bombay Code, and shall continue to be subject to the same extent to all Regulations and Acts which are or shall be in force within the Territories subject to the Presidency of Bombay.

SCHEDULE.

Territorial description of the villages forming the Ghera of the Vishalghur Fort, formerly belonging to the Pritinidhee of Vishalghur: they are bounded on the East by the Syhadree range, on the South and West by the Lanje Turf of the Rutnaghirree District, on the North by the Dewulé Turf of the Rutnaghirree District.

The Ghera is comprised of the undermentioned villages and hamlets, 19 :

FORT WILLIAM,

The 22nd July 1853.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 22nd July 1853:—

Act No. — of 1853.

An Act to provide for the Administration of Civil and Criminal Justice, and of Police, and for the Collection of the Public Revenue, in the Provinces of Tenasserim and Arracan.

Whereas, for the removal of doubt, it is expedient to provide by law for the administration of Civil and Criminal Justice, and of Police, and for the collection of the public Revenue, in the Provinces of Tenasserim and Arracan, It is enacted as follows :

I. The Judicial and Executive Authorities in the Provinces of Tenasserim and Arracan shall henceforth be guided in their proceedings by the Rules contained in Schedule A appended to this Act, which Rules have the force of law.

II. All proceedings heretofore held, and acts done, by the said Authorities under such Rules as have been, from time to time, sanctioned by the Executive Government, are hereby declared to be legal; and no proceedings or acts heretofore held or done by the said Authorities shall be called in question before any Court by reason of any want of jurisdiction, provided such proceedings or acts have been held or done in good faith, and in accordance with established custom.

III. In matters not provided for in the Rules contained in Schedule A of this Act, the said Authorities and all other Courts and Authorities shall be guided in their proceedings and decisions by the Regulations of the Bengal Code, and the Acts of the Government of India in force for the time being, so far as the same are applicable to the circumstances of the said Provinces, and not inconsistent with the said Rules.

SCHEDULE A.

Rules for the Administration of Civil and Criminal Justice, Police and Revenue, in the Tenasserim and Arracan Provinces.

I. The Officers appointed to administer Civil and Criminal Justice, Police and Revenue, in each of the Provinces of Tenasserim and Arracan, are—

1. The Commissioner.
2. The Deputy Commissioners.
3. The Assistants to the Commissioners.
4. The Extra-Assistants.
5. The Goung Gyoops.

CIVIL JUSTICE.

II. Every Goung Gyoop may receive and try original suits to any amount not exceeding three hundred rupees.

III. Every Extra-Assistant may receive and try original suits to any amount not exceeding one thousand rupees, and also appeals from decisions of Goung Gyoops referred to him by the Deputy Commissioner.

IV. Every Assistant may receive and try original suits to any amount under ten thousand rupees, and also appeals from original decisions of Extra-Assistants and Goung Gyoops referred to him by the Deputy Commissioner.

V. Every Deputy Commissioner may receive and try original suits to any amount under ten thousand rupees, and also appeals from original decisions of Assistants, Extra-Assistants, and Goung Gyoops within his jurisdiction; he may also call for and try any original suit pending before any such Assistant, Extra-Assistant, or Goung Gyoop, and he may remove any suit pending in one subordinate Court to another.

VI. The Commissioner may receive and try original suits of ten thousand rupees and upwards in amount, and all appeals from original decisions passed by the Deputy Commissioners, and all special appeals from decisions passed in appeal by Deputy Commissioners, Assistants, and Extra-Assistants; he may also call for and try any appeal and any original suit pending in any tribunal within his jurisdiction, and he may remove any suit or appeal from any one Court to any other Court in his jurisdiction.

VII. Provided that no original suit shall be tried by any of the Officers mentioned in Sections II. III. IV. V. and VI. unless, in cases relating to immoveable property, the property be situate within the Province, Town, or District to which such Officer is appointed, or unless in other cases the cause of action shall have accrued within such Province, Town, or District, or the defendant at the time of the commencement of the suit shall dwell or carry on business therein.

VIII. No original suit other than suits for the recovery of land under Section XCII. of these Rules shall be received in any of the said Courts, unless the same be commenced within the periods hereinafter mentioned, that is to say—

1. Suits for personal damages within one year after the accruing of the cause of action.

2. All other suits within six years after the accruing of the cause of action.

3. Provided that in computing the above-mentioned periods of limitation the time shall be excluded during which the plaintiff shall be under the disability of infancy, idiocy, or lunacy, or during which the plaintiff shall be precluded by law from suing the defendant, by reason of any disability whatever either of the plaintiff or of the defendant.

4. If the defendant, at the time of the accruing of the cause of action, shall be absent from the Province, the period of limitation shall be calculated from the time of his first return to the Province after the cause of action shall have accrued; a defendant shall not be deemed to have returned to the Province within the meaning of this Rule, unless he shall continue to reside therein for three months after his return.

IX. All suits shall be tried and decided openly and publicly in the presence of the parties or of their authorized agents, or such of them as shall attend.

X. Plaints may be made to a Judge verbally, in which case they must be reduced to writing in his presence by an Officer of Court, or they may be made in writing and presented to the Judge either by the plaintiff or by his authorized agent; whereupon the Judge shall make summary inquiry by examination of the plaintiff or his agent as to the merits, and may reject the plaintiff upon such summary inquiry if it shall appear that the plaintiff has no cause of action. The Judge upon rejecting a plaint shall record his decision, which shall be reduced to writing in his own hand, together with the reasons on which it is founded, and shall also record the substance of the examination of the plaintiff or his agent, which shall be read over to and signed by such plaintiff or his agent.

XI. No stamps shall be required on any petitions, pleadings, or other law papers. An institution fee of five per cent. on the amount sued for, and stated in the plaint, shall be deposited in Court by the plaintiff before any process is issued, unless the Judge shall be satisfied of the inability of the plaintiff to pay the institution fee, in which case he may remit the same. These fees shall be reckoned as part of the costs of the suit.

XII. If upon summary investigation into the merits of the plaint it shall be admitted, the Court shall summon the defendant to answer it in person or by agent on a certain fixed day.

XIII. The summons shall contain a short particular of the cause of action, and an order to the defendant to appear before the Court on a specified day, and to bring with him any documents which he may have in his possession and which he may think conducive to his defence, and a list of such witnesses as may be necessary for his defence.

XIV. The summons shall be served personally upon the defendant a sufficient time before the day fixed for his appearance, to enable him to appear in Court on that day.

XV. If, on or before the day appointed for appearance, it shall be proved to the Court that the summons cannot be served in the manner above prescribed, a second summons, appointing another day for the appearance of the defendant, shall be issued.

XVI. Such summons may be served either personally, or by affixing a copy thereof to some conspicuous part of the place of abode of the defendant, and also affixing a copy thereof in the Court-room.

XVII. If the second summons be served in manner aforesaid, a reasonable time before the day appointed

for the appearance of the defendant, to enable him to appear on that day, it shall be deemed to have been duly served.

XVIII. If the plaintiff shall not appear in person or by agent on the day appointed for the appearance of the defendant, the Judge may, according to his judgment, either dismiss the suit or nonsuit the plaintiff, or make a decree against him *ex-parte*.

XIX. If the defendant shall not appear by himself or an agent on the day fixed, and the Court shall be satisfied that the summons has been duly served, the case shall be heard and decided *ex-parte*, as if the defendant were present.

XX. Provided that when a decree shall be made against a party *ex-parte*, and such party shall appear in person or by agent within a reasonable time afterwards, and shall show sufficient cause for his previous non-appearance by himself or agent, the Judge, upon such terms and conditions as he may think just, may rescind the decree; and may also order restitution if the decree shall have been executed: but no decree shall be reversed without previously summoning the party interested to support it, and allowing him to show cause by himself or his agent why it should not be rescinded.

XXI. If upon the day fixed for the defendant's appearance the plaintiff and defendant shall appear before the Court in person or by agent, the Judge shall interrogate the parties present or their agents, so as to ascertain the precise point or points at issue between them, which he shall then determine and declare. He shall next interrogate the parties or their agents as to the proof which each desires to bring forward, and as to the documents, if any, which he requires to be produced by any party or witness, and he shall limit the parties to such witnesses and proofs as they shall satisfy him are needful to prove the point or points declared to be at issue. The whole of the interrogatories, and the determination of the point or points at issue, and the order made by the Judge as to the witnesses and proofs, shall be reduced to writing by the Judge in his own hand, and the record shall be attested by the signature of the Judge. The Judge shall then fix a day for continuing the hearing of the case and receiving the proofs, and the parties must produce their witnesses by that day either by procuring their attendance voluntarily or by judicial summons. After the arrival of the day so fixed, the hearing shall not be again deferred unless good and sufficient reason be shown to the Court for such further postponement.

XXII. Every party, and also every witness, shall produce, or cause to be produced, any document in his possession which the Judge shall require him to produce.

XXIII. All processes shall be served or executed by or through Officers of the Court at the expense of the parties, and the amount of such expense shall be part of the costs in the suit; the Court may in its discretion exempt pauper parties from the payment of the expense of serving or executing process.

XXIV. The Court may at any time pending a suit, upon due cause shown, cause the attendance of principal parties instead of agents, recording the reason in each instance for so doing. In such case, if the party required to attend shall fail to do so, the Judge may proceed in the same manner as where the party in other cases fails to appear by himself or his agent.

XXV. Any witness whose expenses for his journey to and from the Court, and for the period of his probable detention (at a reasonable rate, to be fixed by the Court) shall have been deposited in Court by the party desiring his attendance, and to whom the fact of the deposit having been made shall have been made known by the terms of the summons addressed to him, shall, if he shall without lawful excuse refuse or omit to attend when duly summoned, be subjected at the discretion of the Court to fine or imprisonment, or both.

XXVI. All parties and witnesses who shall be examined must be examined in their own language *vid*

voce by the Judge, in the presence of the parties or their agents, or of such of them as shall attend, and the substance of their evidence must be reduced to writing, and translated for the information of any party by whom such language shall not be understood. Each party in a suit may examine and cross-examine the opposite party and all witnesses in the suit. The proceedings shall be recorded in English in the Courts of the Commissioner, the Deputy Commissioners, the Assistants, and of the Extra-Assistants (if they have a knowledge of English); otherwise, and in all other Courts, in the language of the country.

XXVII. The evidence having been gone through, and the parties or such of them as desire it having been respectively heard by themselves or their agents, in support of their cases, a decision shall be given by the Judge, which must be reduced to writing in his own hand, together with the reasons on which it is founded. The Judge shall at the same time declare what have been the actual costs of the suit, and by what parties and in what proportion they are to be paid.

XXVIII. The Commissioners have authority to fix, with the approval of the Government, the scale of pleader's fees, to be awarded as costs of suit.

XXIX. The cost of serving processes shall be calculated according to the actual rate of the pay of the Officers employed to serve them for the time during which they were occupied in the service. And if a process be sent by the public dak, then according to the rate of postage which, if it had not been sent "on service," it would have been necessary to pay for its transmission.

XXX. Any Judge except a Goung Gyoop may, at the time of deciding a suit, punish either party for fraudulent or vexatious conduct in the course of the suit by a fine, commutable, if not paid, to imprisonment for not more than one year. In such case a Goung Gyoop may send the party in custody for trial and punishment to the Deputy Commissioner or Assistant.

XXXI. All documentary evidence which shall be adduced upon the trial of a suit must be filed and placed among the records. If original documents shall be returned to the parties, authenticated copies must be substituted on the file.

XXXII. Appeals from decisions already passed, or which shall hereafter be passed, must be made in writing within ten days from the decision appealed against.

XXXIII. They may either be presented to the appellate Court, or to the Court from which appeal is made.

XXXIV. Appeals made after the expiration of ten days, as above prescribed, shall not be received, unless good cause of delay be shown to the satisfaction of the appellate Court.

XXXV. When an appeal has been admitted, the appellate Court shall fix a day for the hearing, and shall notify the same to the appellant and to the respondent; and on the day fixed the parties present shall be heard by themselves or their agents, and the appeal tried and decided. If further evidence be deemed necessary by the superior Court, it will be called for, or the case sent to the lower Court for further investigation. The superior Court may re-examine any of the parties or witnesses examined by the lower Court.

XXXVI. A regular appeal from every original decision of the Commissioners, and a special appeal from every decision of the Commissioners in regular appeal, shall lie to the Sudder Dewanny Adawlut at Calcutta, under the rules prescribed for appeals to that Court.

XXXVII. Every Court may cause the immediate execution of its decrees by giving possession of the thing awarded, or in the case of debt, damages, or costs, by process against the person of the defendant, or against his lands, houses, goods, and other effects, or by both such processes if it shall appear to the Judge to be necessary.

XXXVIII. Provided also that it shall be in the

discretion of the Judge, previously to issuing execution upon a decree made *ex-parte*, to require from the decree-holder sufficient security to make such restitution as may be ordered in case the decree be set aside by the Court.

XXXIX. Provided also that no debtor be imprisoned in execution until his creditor shall have paid one month's subsistence in advance, at a rate varying from one anna to four annas per diem, at the discretion of the Judge, and so on previous to the commencement of each month of imprisonment; failing which, the debtor is to be released, and must not again be imprisoned for the same debt.

XL. Provided also that no debtor shall be imprisoned in execution after he shall have satisfied the Court that he has done his best to pay the debt, and has no property or effects remaining from which the debt can be discharged; provided that if upon petition of the decree-holder or otherwise it shall appear to any Court above that of a Goung Gyoop, that the defendant has fraudulently alienated or disposed of any of his property or effects, or that he has committed any other wilful misfeasance, for the purpose of defrauding his creditors in general, or the plaintiff in the suit, such Court may sentence the defendant to simple imprisonment for a fixed term not exceeding one year, and after the expiration of that imprisonment he shall be released. But such imprisonment shall not extinguish his liability to satisfy the decree, or from having execution issued against any lands, houses, or effects which shall then belong to him, or to which he shall at any future time become entitled.

XLI. Every appellate Court may upon appeal stay execution of the decree appealed against, causing security to be taken from the appellant, if necessary, for the eventual satisfaction of the award with costs.

XLII. An office for the Registry of Deeds shall be established in the several Districts of these Provinces, under the immediate charge of the Deputy Commissioner or Assistant, as the Commissioner shall determine. A single book, to be made of paper of English manufacture, shall suffice; the pages of such book are to be numbered, and each leaf is to be signed with his initials by the Registrar, who is to certify at the end of the book how many pages it contains, and to affix his signature at full length, with the date of the certificate. A fee of one rupee is to be paid on the registry of any deed, and a fee of eight annas on a copy being taken from the book, and a fee of four annas for permission to inspect the book, which is always to be done in presence of the Registrar. The fees are to be the perquisite of the Registrar, who is to defray the expense attending the purchase and preservation of the books, and keep a record of his receipts. It shall for the present be optional with parties to register deeds or not, as they think proper.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE.

XLIII. Every Goung Gyoop may receive and try all petty charges of theft, assault, affray, abusive language, and the like, occurring within his jurisdiction, or referred to him by a Deputy Commissioner or Assistant, and may, on conviction, sentence to imprisonment in the stocks for any time not exceeding twelve hours, or to a fine not exceeding ten rupees, commutable, if not paid, to imprisonment not exceeding twelve hours in the stocks.

XLIV. Every Deputy Commissioner or Assistant may receive and try all charges of a criminal nature, and may sentence, on conviction, to any punishment warranted by law for the offence, not exceeding two years' imprisonment with or without labour, or fine not exceeding five hundred rupees, commutable, if not paid, to imprisonment, with or without labour, for a term not exceeding two years.

XLV. Every Deputy Commissioner may, before or during trial, remove any case from any one to any other subordinate Court, or to his own Court, or from his own to any subordinate Court.

XLVI. Provided that every Goung Gyoop who, before or after the completion of a trial, may think the sentence fit to be passed heavier than that which he is empowered to pass, shall transmit the proceedings to the Deputy Commissioner to whom he is subordinate, and shall also cause the parties and their witnesses to appear before the Deputy Commissioner, who may receive and try the same. And every Deputy Commissioner or Assistant who shall be of a like opinion, before or after trial of any case, shall in like manner transmit it to the Commissioner for trial, and shall cause the parties and their witnesses to appear before him at such time and place as he may appoint.

XLVII. The Commissioner may receive and try all cases upon committal by a Deputy Commissioner or Assistant for trial before him; and may sentence on conviction to any punishment authorized by law for the offence, not exceeding imprisonment for fourteen years with labour and irons, and fine to any amount warranted by law.

XLVIII. If the Commissioner be of opinion, after the trial of any case, that a more severe sentence should be passed, he shall forward the proceedings with his opinion to the Court of Nizamut Adawlut at Calcutta, and the said last-mentioned Court may, if they approve of the proceedings held on the trial, pass any sentence warranted by law for the offence which they may deem adequate to the same, or if they disapprove of the proceedings held on the trial, may pass such order thereon as may seem fit; provided that no sentence of death shall be passed except by the concurrent voices of two or more Judges of the last-mentioned Court.

XLIX. The Commissioner may remove any case before or during trial from any one Court to any other Court.

L. Upon complaint or charge of any offence, the Court, by which it is to be tried may, previous to causing the attendance of the accused, examine the accuser touching the charge and his means of proving it, and may then summon the witnesses named by the accuser, and may also summon the accused, or arrest him if the charge be of a nature to warrant his arrest, or if on being duly summoned he shall fail to appear; and in either case the accuser shall be warned to appear again on a certain fixed day, to be present at the examination of his witnesses, and to be confronted with the accused.

LI. If the accused, being duly summoned, fail to appear and cannot be arrested, the Court may attach his property of all kinds, and after one month may declare it forfeited to Government.

LII. All processes shall be served or executed by or through Officers of the Court, and without expense to the parties, except in misdemeanors and petty cases, in which the Court in its discretion shall think that such expense ought to be borne by the parties at whose instance the process shall be issued.

LIII. Any witness who shall, without lawful excuse, refuse or omit to attend when duly summoned, or shall refuse to give evidence, or to produce any document in his possession which he shall be summoned to produce, and which the Court shall order him to produce, shall be subject, at the discretion of the Court, to fine or imprisonment, or both, according to the extent of power vested in the Court to fine and imprison offenders.

LIV. Upon the day fixed as above, or upon such subsequent day as the Court may fix, the accuser and his witnesses shall be examined in presence of the accused, if he have appeared, and they may also be cross-examined by him; and no person accused shall be convicted of any offence until he shall have been confronted with the accuser and with the witnesses of the accuser.

LV. The Court shall then examine the accused touching his defence and his means of rebutting the accusation by evidence, and shall summon his witnesses

and examine them on a day fixed, of which notice must be given to the parties. After hearing the evidence for the defence, or after hearing the defence, if the accused shall name no witnesses, the Court shall, except in cases transmitted as above mentioned, pass sentence, and shall immediately carry its sentence into execution. The proceedings shall be recorded in English in the Courts of the Commissioners, Deputy Commissioners, and Assistants, and in all other Courts in the language of the country.

LVI. Any accuser who shall appear to the Court to have made an accusation wilfully false, may, on the acquittal of the accused, be sentenced, according to the powers of the Court, to fine or imprisonment, or both.

LVII. Pending a trial or examination, the Court by whom the same is held may, according to the circumstances of the case, detain the accused in custody, or hold him to bail, or on his own recognizances, as may seem fit, and may take security or personal recognizance from the accuser, and from witnesses, for their attendance when and where required.

LVIII. The whole or any portion of a fine levied from an accuser or accused under these Rules may, at the discretion of the Court, be paid to the party aggrieved by the offence for which the fine is levied.

LIX. All trials for serious or heinous offences of such a nature that the accused, if convicted, would be sentenced to imprisonment for more than six months, or to a fine commutable to such imprisonment, shall be held with the assistance of a jury.

LX. The Commissioner shall cause to be prepared and published annually in each Deputy Commissioner's jurisdiction a list of qualified jurors, of whom ten jurors shall in rotation, and according to notice to be given to them from time to time, attend at the sudder station of the Deputy Commissioner, in order to sit upon the trials of accused persons. Every juror shall, if he demand it, be paid on and for every such day of attendance the sum of one rupee. And no juror shall be kept in attendance for more than ten days at one time.

LXI. No juror shall, except in the case of unavoidable necessity, be discharged during the continuance of a trial in which he may be engaged.

LXII. If any juror, having been summoned, shall without lawful excuse neglect to attend in pursuance of such summons, or after appearance shall wilfully absent himself without the leave of the Court, or being thrice audibly called shall not answer to his name, may be fined at the discretion of the Court, and, in default of payment, imprisoned for not more than one month without labour.

LXIII. Every jury shall, according to the discretion of the Judge, consist of five or three jurors, to be taken by lot out of the jurors present, and they shall deliver as a verdict, by the mouth of one of them, the opinion of the majority of them as to the guilt or innocence of the parties tried; and their verdict shall be recorded on the proceedings of the trial.

LXIV. The Judge presiding at the trial may decide according to the verdict of the jury or against it at his discretion; in either case he must state his reasons in full, and these, together with the sentence, shall be recorded on the proceedings of the trial.

LXV. An appeal shall lie to the Deputy Commissioner from every sentence or order passed by a Goung Gyoop, and to the Commissioner from every sentence or order passed by a Deputy Commissioner or Assistant, in trials held without the assistance of a jury, and in trials in which the sentence may have been contrary to the verdict of a jury.

LXVI. No appeal shall lie in any case in which the Judge and the jury agree as to the verdict.

POLICE.

LXVII. The subordinate Officers ordinarily appoint-

ed to administer Police in the Provinces of Tenasserim and Arracan are—

In the principal towns,

Goungs or Thannadars.
Peons.

In all other places,

Thoogyees or Rawa Goungs.
Peons.

LXVIII. A Peon is subordinate to the Goung or Thannadar in the principal towns, and to the Thoogyee or Rawa Goung in all other places. His duty is to apprehend and carry to his immediate superior any person actually committing an offence before him, or on a hue and cry; to prevent breaches of the peace; and to report all crimes occurring within his knowledge to his immediate superior.

LXIX. A Goung is subordinate to the Deputy or Assistant Commissioner, and a Thoogyee or Rawa Goung is subordinate to the Goung Gyoop of his division.

LXX. The duty of a Goung or Thannadar, and of a Thoogyee or Rawa Goung, is to notify to his immediate superior, and to make immediate inquest into, all cases of murder, wounding, dacoity, highway-robbery, burglary, theft, arson, tumultuous assemblage, affray, and other heinous offences occurring within his jurisdiction; to apprehend and convey to his immediate superior persons accused or strongly suspected of having committed those offences, or of intention to commit them; to cause the attendance of prosecutors and witnesses in such cases; and to notify to his immediate superior, and make immediate inquest into, all cases of sudden or suspicious death.

LXXI. Where in places other than the principal towns Thannadars are appointed in addition to the ordinary Police, the Thoogyees or Rawa Goungs are also subordinate to the Thannadars.

LXXII. It is the duty of a Goung Gyoop or Thannadar to keep himself and his superiors informed of the occurrence of all cases enumerated in Section LXX within his jurisdiction, and of all circumstances connected with them; to superintend and control his subordinates in the execution of their duties, and personally to assist them, if necessary, especially in all investigations of importance; to convey to the Deputy Commissioner or Assistant all persons apprehended by himself or by his subordinates on account of the above offences; and to cause the necessary attendance of prosecutors and witnesses in such cases.

LXXIII. It is the duty of a Deputy Commissioner to superintend, control, and assist his subordinates in the exercise of their functions.

REVENUE.

LXXIV. The subordinate Officers appointed to administer revenue affairs in the provinces of Tenasserim and Arracan are Thoogyees or Rawa Goungs.

LXXV. Each district is formed into divisions, under Goung Gyoops, and circles comprising one or more villages under Thoogyees or Rawa Goungs.

LXXVI. Each circle is divided into portions of country called Prens or Quengs, and these constitute the tracts upon which a separate assessment is fixed.

LXXVII. It is the duty of the Thoogyee or Rawa Goung annually, or at such longer periods as may be directed by the Government, to measure and assess the lands of each cultivator in his circle; and after the assessment has been approved by the Deputy Commissioner or Assistant, to collect the revenue so assessed, and for that purpose to present to each cultivator a bill with a distinct specification of each item of demand.

LXXVIII. It is also the duty of the Thoogyee or Rawa Goung annually to make a return of the capitation tax payable by each individual, and after the return has been approved by the Deputy Commissioner or Assistant, to collect the tax so assessed, presenting to

each tax-payer a bill with a distinct specification of each item of demand.

LXXIX. The standard of measurement in Tenasserim is the English acre of 43,560 square feet. The standard of measurement in Arracan is the Bengal beegah of 14,400 square feet.

LXXX. Every Goung Gyoop's division, and every Thoogyee or Rawa Goung's circle, has a distinct boundary. Each cultivator will pay revenue for each of the fields he cultivates to the Thoogyee or Rawa Goung in whose circle such field is situated. Capitation tax will be paid to the Thoogyee or Rawa Goung in whose circle the tax-payer resides.

LXXXI. No land shall be liable to the payment of revenue more than once in a year. The rates of Land Revenue Assessment shall be fixed by the Commissioner, subject to the approval of Government; but they shall in no case exceed three rupees an acre, except within the towns of Akyah and Khyouk Phyou, as provided in Act No. XXXV. of 1852.

LXXXII. The rates of capitation tax shall likewise be fixed by the Commissioner, subject to the approval of the Government, but they shall in no case exceed the following:—

	In the Plains.	In the Hills.
Married persons.....	Rs. 4	Rs. 2
Unmarried persons.....	„ 2	„ 1

And no person who cultivates six acres or eighteen beegahs of land, and upwards, shall pay a higher rate of capitation tax than two rupees.

LXXXIII. All females, all persons less than 18 years or more than 60 years of age, all religious teachers and school-masters, and all who, from blindness, insanity, disease, or otherwise, are incapable of gaining a livelihood, are exempt from capitation tax. All settlers from other countries are exempt from capitation tax for seven years after their arrival.

LXXXIV. The Commissioner of Tenasserim may, with the sanction of Government, levy a duty on all teak timber brought from the interior to Moulmein; provided that the rate of duty shall not exceed two rupees twelve annas the log on timber brought by the Salween River, or four rupees the log on all other timber.

LXXXV. Any person who fails to pay any amount of revenue, tax, or duty due by him, within ten days after a demand being made and a receipt offered by or by order of a public officer; and any person who after diligent search cannot be found, in order that the tax bill or receipt may be presented to him, shall be liable to the following processes:—

1st. A written notice, to be issued by the Deputy Commissioner or Assistant on the complaint of the Thoogyee or other Officer, warning the party that unless payment of the amount of revenue duty or tax, together with all expenses incurred by reason of the default, be made within ten days from the date of the notice being served upon him, or affixed to his dwelling, he will be liable to arrest and imprisonment in the civil jail, and his property, real and personal, will be attached, and will be liable to be sold in satisfaction of the demand.

2nd. At the expiration of the time fixed, if the defaulter still neglects to pay or to appear, he may be apprehended and confined in the civil jail; the whole of his property will at the same time be attached; his personal property will, after due public notice of not less than ten days, be sold first, and if that is insufficient to satisfy the demand, then, and not otherwise, his real property also.

3rd. After the sale of personal or real property, the defaulter shall not be liable to further imprisonment, or to arrest, if it shall appear to the Deputy Commissioner or Assistant before whom the case may be brought that he has not wilfully concealed or made away with any of his property, but has done his best to pay the amount due.

4th. All timber shall be liable to be attached for the duty due upon it, and if such duty be not paid within ten days from the time of such attachment, the timber shall be liable, after due public notice of not less than ten days, to be sold to satisfy the demand.

LXXXVI. All applications for remission of revenue duty or tax must be made to the Deputy Commissioner or Assistant within ten days from the date of a receipt being given or tendered to the person from whom revenue or tax is demanded by or by authority of a revenue officer. If the period of ten days be exceeded, such application shall not be received, unless upon good cause being shown for the delay. Applications for remission on account of drought, inundation, blight, or other injury to or failure of crop, shall be made while that crop is still on the ground, or they will not be received unless good cause shall be shown for the delay.

LXXXVII. Land rented or cultivated by a defaulter, though owned by another person, is nevertheless liable to be sold for arrears of revenue due thereon, in like manner as if it were the property of the defaulter.

LXXXVIII. Thoogyees or Rawa Goungs are empowered to make grants of small portions of waste or jungle land for paddy cultivation, not exceeding twenty beegahs, under the following Regulations:—

1st. On a person making application for waste or jungle land, the Thoogyee or Rawa Goung shall go to the spot himself, and make a sketch of the ground; if he cannot do so, he shall measure it, and note its boundaries. He shall then attach a notice to the Zayat, or other public place of the nearest village, and otherwise in the most effectual manner make it generally known that an application has been made for the piece of ground, and that, unless cause is shown to the contrary within fifteen days from the date of the notice, it will be granted to the applicant. Should no other claimant appear within the time stated, the Thoogyee or Rawa Goung shall give the applicant a grant of the land in such form as may be determined by the Commissioner, and enter the grant in a register of the same form, to be kept by him for the purpose. The grants shall be numbered annually by each Thoogyee or Rawa Goung, commencing at the beginning of each Burmese year.

2nd. If any one shall afterwards claim the land, he must file a suit in the civil Court for its recovery, but in the event of a decree being given in his favour, the land shall not be made over to him until after the ensuing harvest.

3rd. In granting waste or jungle lands under the above rule, preference shall be given by the Thoogyee or Rawa Goung to the owner or owners of the field nearest to such waste land, who shall make application for it within the term of fifteen days, stated in the notice aforesaid.

4th. Lands granted under the above rule shall be exempted from assessment for different periods, according to the description of jungle upon them, agreeably to the following table:—

Class.	Description of Jungle.	Period of Exemption.
1	Long and short grass, if it have not been cultivated within the memory of man.	1 year to 2, according to the description of grass.
2	Kaing, Thekkay, Kyeik, reeds, bushes, &c.	3 years.
3	Small trees not exceeding one foot in diameter at 2 cubits above the ground	4 years.
4	Large trees exceeding one foot in diameter at 2 cubits from the ground	6 years.

5th. Land which in order to be cultivated requires to be thoroughly drained, or strongly embanked to prevent the entrance of salt water, shall be entitled to the same period of exemption as land of the 4th class, without reference to the description of jungle upon it. Land which requires the construction of embankments, at an

expense probably not exceeding one rupee per beegah of the quantity of land reclaimed by means of the embankment, shall be entitled to the same period of exemption as land of either the 2nd or 3rd class, according to the judgment of the Thoogyee or Rawa Goung, without reference to the description of jungle upon it.

6th. Land may be granted under the above rule by the Thoogyee or Rawa Goung for the purpose of planting fruit trees or other trees or plants, and such land shall be exempted from assessment for periods according to the following table, without reference to the description of jungle upon it at the time of its allotment:—

Class.	Description of Trees and Shrubs.	Period of Exemption.
1	Cocoanut, Betelnut, Nayan, Spice, and all Palm trees, except Dhanes	10 years.
2	Dhanes, Mango, Jack, and all other fruit trees, except Plantains	7 years.
3	Plantain, Pan-vine, Sugar-cane, (not being annual,) Neeba, Mulberry	1 year.

7th. The class to which any land shall be considered to belong is to be determined by the description of jungle existing, or fruit trees or shrubs to be planted on three-fourths of its area, or as near that proportion as possible. Where plantains are planted *bona fide* only as a shade to cocoanut or other trees, they will not be considered as forming a plantain garden.

8th. No person shall without a general or special order of Government have new land on the above terms of exemption otherwise than as an addition to his existing cultivation, or unless he has never cultivated land before. The circumstance, however, of a cultivator leaving part of his existing cultivation *bona fide* fallow will not preclude him from obtaining fresh allotments of waste or jungle land.

9th. If land be granted under the above rule for the purpose of planting fruit trees, or other trees or plants, it shall be forfeited unless three-fourths of its area be planted in accordance with the terms of the grant, and within a period to be specified therein.

LXXXIX. A Deputy Commissioner or Assistant may make grants of land not exceeding two hundred and ninety beegahs or one hundred acres in extent each, on the terms above mentioned. They will be registered by him in a form similar to that prescribed in the preceding rule.

XC. Grants of waste land in excess of two hundred and ninety beegahs or one hundred acres shall be under such rules, and on such conditions, as the Government may for time to time determine.

XCI. If any cultivator who shall receive land under the above rules shall abandon the land so allotted to him after the period of exemption, under circumstances which shall prove that he has used the land only for the profit to be gained from it during such period of free occupancy, and not for the purpose of ulterior cultivation, he shall be liable, at the discretion of the Deputy Commissioner or Assistant, to assessment in arrears for the whole period of exemption, either at the full rate for land of similar description in the circle in which the land is situated, or at any reduced rate.

XCII. Persons to whom land has descended from their ancestors, or persons who shall have purchased or taken on mortgage land which shall have descended from ancestors, shall, on agreeing to pay the fixed assessment, have the right of reclaiming their land within a term of ten years after such land may have been made over by the Thoogyee or Rawa Goung, or other Government Officer, to another party for cultivation; provided, however, that if the party to whom the land shall have been allotted by the Thoogyee or Rawa Goung shall have planted fruit trees, strongly embanked it, or otherwise invested capital in the permanent improvement of the land, the person reclaiming it shall be allowed to do so only on paying to the person in oc-

cupation the value of such improvements, to be determined either by private arbitration or by a suit in Court, as shall be agreed upon by the parties.

XCIII. Persons who have held land obtained from a Thoogyee or Rawa Goung, or other revenue officer, for an uninterrupted period of ten years, shall be allowed the same right, subject to the same provisions as in the last rule.

XCIV. All holders of land, whether coming under the above descriptions or not, shall report to the Thoogyee or Rawa Goung, in writing, before the full-moon of Kasong in each year, whether there be any portion of the land previously held by them which they do not intend to cultivate themselves, or for which they have not provided a cultivator during the next season. The Thoogyee or Rawa Goung may then make over the land so left in his hands, or any portion of it, so that the portion be in one parcel, to any other person applying for it, subject to the rights of redemption laid down in Rules XCII. and XCIII. Unless a holder of land report to the Thoogyee or Rawa Goung, as above directed, he will be required to pay the tax on his land, whether it is cultivated or not. After having reported to the Thoogyee or Rawa Goung his intention not to cultivate, he can only again take up the land, or any portion of it, by authority from the Thoogyee or Rawa Goung, who may, if the land be not already made over to another party, restore it, or any portion of it, in one parcel, to the original holder.

XCV. The intention of reclaiming or of trying by a suit to reclaim land on the principles declared in Rules XCII. and XCIII., must be made known to the Thoogyee or Rawa Goung before the full moon of Kasong in each year, otherwise it will not, unless with the consent of the cultivator, be made over until after the ensuing harvest.

XCVI. All complaints relative to arrears of revenue, duty, or tax, or disputed revenue accounts, shall be received and tried by the Deputy Commissioner or Assistant. A Deputy Commissioner may refer any such cases for trial to an Assistant. Every decision of a Deputy Commissioner or Assistant shall be subject to appeal to the Commissioner, if preferred within fifteen days from the date of the decision.

XCVII. All complaints against Government Revenue Officers or persons employed in the Revenue Department, of making or being accessaries to unauthorized collections or receipts on any account, or of corruptly receiving more than is due to Government, shall be received and decided by the Deputy Commissioner or Assistant. Persons convicted of such offences shall be liable to the penalties described in Section XI. Regulation XXVII. of 1793. Such cases shall be appealable to the Commissioner within fifteen days from the date of the decision appealed against, but not afterwards, unless good cause for the delay be shown to the satisfaction of the Commissioner.

XCVIII. Any person who maliciously or vexatiously makes a false complaint in the Revenue Department may be punished by the Officer before whom such complaint may be decided, with a fine, not exceeding fifty (50) rupees.

XCIX. In all cases tried in the Revenue Department the Officer deciding them may award expenses of suit at his discretion, and, if the expenses are not paid, levy the amount by distraint of the personal property of the party liable.

C. All holders of grants of land shall comply with such instructions as they may, from time to time, receive from the Deputy Commissioner or Assistant of the District in which the grants are situated, relative to furnishing returns of population, of capitation tax, and other statistics relating to their grants. Any grantee wilfully refusing or neglecting to give such returns when duly required from him, or wilfully furnishing false returns, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding two hundred (200) rupees for each offence.

CI. Any grantee who shall offer obstruction to the measurement of any land in his grant, after the measurement has been duly authorized by the local revenue

authorities, or shall incite other persons to do so, and any person who shall offer obstruction to the measurement of land, whether within any grant or elsewhere, after such measurement shall have been duly ordered by any of the local revenue authorities, shall be liable to the penalties mentioned in Rule C., and to payment of all expenses incurred through his act of obstruction.

CII. The amount of all fines imposed under these rules, except such as are imposed under Rule XCVII. may, if not paid by the party or parties liable, be levied by the sale of his or their personal property, or if not paid, and no property be found, the party may be sentenced to imprisonment in the civil jail for any period not exceeding one month.

MARINE.

CIII. The Commissioner may, with the sanction of the Government, make regulations for the guidance of Commanders and others on board ships or vessels in any port of the Tenasserim and Arracan Provinces, and for the general management and conservancy of any such ports, and may enforce such rules by the imposition of moderate fines, not exceeding rupees fifty in any case. He may also, with the sanction of Government, levy such port, light, and other dues, not exceeding in the whole a ton on every vessel entering the port, as may be necessary to defray the expenses of any such port. And all such fines and dues shall be recovered by the process in force for the recovery of arrears of revenue.

GENERAL.

CIV. The Goung Gyoops are in all respects subordinate to the Deputy Commissioner and the Assistant of the jurisdiction to which they belong.

CV. The Assistants are in all respects subordinate to the Deputy Commissioner of the jurisdiction to which they belong, but the Deputy Commissioner may, with the sanction of the Commissioner, delegate any portion of his executive authority to an Assistant.

CVI. The Deputy Commissioners are in all respects subordinate to the Commissioners.

CVII. All executive powers possessed by subordinate officers are possessed by their superiors.

CVIII. All subordinate Officers are to obey all orders, and execute or cause to be executed all warrants or processes addressed to them by their superior.

CIX. If any subordinate Officer shall wilfully exceed or abuse his power, he shall, on conviction before his superior, sitting as a judicial Officer, be liable to fine or imprisonment, or both.

CX. The Commissioners shall superintend and control all Officers, in their respective provinces. A Commissioner may appoint, suspend, or dismiss, and may delegate to any Deputy Commissioner or Assistant the power of appointing, suspending, or dismissing all or any Officers below the grade of Assistant; and he may suspend any Deputy Commissioner or Assistant.

CXI. In the construction of these rules, unless where there is anything in the context inconsistent with such construction, the word "Judge" and the word "Court" shall be deemed to include any of the Officers mentioned in Rule I. when acting judicially.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 22nd day of September next.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 5th August 1853:—

An Act to provide for the Levy of Duties of Customs in the Provinces of Arracan and Tenasserim.

Whereas it is expedient to provide for the levy of Customs Duties on goods imported by sea into the Provinces of Arracan and Tenasserim ; It is enacted as follows :—

I. So much of Act No. VII. of 1848 as excepts the several ports in the Provinces of Arracan and Tenasserim from the operation of Section III. Act No. VI. of 1848, and so much of Sections XVIII. and XIX. of Act No. I. of 1852 as relates to the said Provinces, are repealed.

II. All goods imported by sea into any part of the said Provinces from any port not subject to the Government of the East India Company; or from the port of Aden, or from any of the ports in the Straits of Malacca, shall be charged with the same rates of duty as those charged on goods of the same description imported into the Provinces of Bengal and Orissa.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 5th day of October next.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 12th August 1853 :—

ACT No. — OF 1853.

An Act to amend the Law of Arrest on Mesne Process in Civil Actions in the Supreme Courts of Judicature, and to provide for the Subsistence of Destitute Prisoners confined under Civil Process of any of the said Courts.

Whereas the present power of arrest in the Supreme Courts of Judicature at Fort William in Bengal, Fort St. George, and Bombay, ought to be restricted ; It is hereby enacted as follows :—

I. No person shall be arrested or held to bail upon mesne process in any Civil action, on the Common Law side of any of the said Supreme Courts of Judicature, unless an order authorising such arrest shall be made by the Court in which the action shall be brought, or by one of the Judges thereof ; and it shall be in the discretion of the Court or Judge in any case to grant or refuse an order.

II. Provided that no such order shall be made unless the Court or Judge shall be satisfied by affidavit of the plaintiff, or of some other person, that the plaintiff has a good cause of action against the defendant to the amount of two hundred rupees or upwards, either for debt or for damages, and in addition thereto, that there is probable cause for believing—

1.—That the defendant has absconded, or is concealing himself for the purpose of avoiding service of the process of the Court ; or,—

2.—That he has withdrawn or is likely to withdraw himself or his property or effects, or some part thereof, from the jurisdiction of the Court, for the purpose of avoiding the process of the Court ; or under such other circumstances as to induce the Court or Judge to believe that the ends of justice are likely to be defeated unless a Capias or Warrant of Arrest be issued against him ; or,—

3.—That he has removed, concealed, or disposed of his property or effects, or some part thereof, for the purpose of defrauding his creditors generally, or the plaintiff in the action, or that he is about to do so.

III. An order for arrest may be made, and a Capias or Warrant issued thereon, in any stage of the cause before final judgment, and against any one or more of several defendants.

IV. Previously to making any such order, the Court or Judge may require the personal attendance of the plaintiff, and of any person who shall make an affidavit for the purpose of obtaining such order, and may examine them orally upon oath.

V. A copy of every affidavit upon which any such order shall be founded shall be delivered to the sheriff with the Writ or Warrant to be issued in pursuance of the order, and shall be delivered to the defendant at the time of his arrest or detention under the Writ, otherwise the Court or Judge may order the defendant to be discharged.

VI. No person shall be carried to or detained in prison by virtue of any Writ or Warrant issued in pursuance of any such order until he shall have been personally taken before the Court or Judge who shall have made the order for arrest, or before one of the Judges of the same Court, except for the purpose of detention, if necessary, for a reasonable time, until he can be carried before such Court or Judge.

VII. Any person arrested or detained upon any such Writ of Capias or Warrant of Arrest, may apply to the Court, or to a Judge thereof, for a rule or order calling on the plaintiff to show cause why the person arrested should not be discharged out of custody, and the Court or Judge may make absolute or discharge such rule or order, and direct the costs of the application to be paid by either party, or may make such other order therein as to the Court or Judge shall seem fit ; provided that such rule or order shall be made absolute in every case in which the Court or Judge shall be satisfied that the plaintiff, in any stage of the cause subsequent to the arrest, has been guilty of unreasonable delay in pleading or in bringing on for trial or argument any issue of fact or law, notwithstanding the delay may not be such as to entitle the defendant to sign judgment of Non Pros., or to apply for judgment as in case of a nonsuit, and provided also that any order made by a Judge under this Act may be discharged or varied by the Court, on application made thereto by either party dissatisfied with the order.

VIII. If any motion or application for the discharge of a defendant be made upon affidavit, but not otherwise, the plaintiff may oppose the same by affidavits, in addition to that upon which the order for the arrest was made.

IX. The Court or Judge may order and compel the personal attendance, at the hearing of any motion or summons, of both or either of the parties, and also of any person who shall have made an affidavit in support of, or in opposition to, the motion ; or which shall have been used upon the application for the order, and may examine such person or persons orally upon oath, or allow him or them to be examined and cross-examined upon oath by the respective parties or their counsel ; the sheriff or gaoler shall be bound to bring before the Court or Judge any prisoner detained in his custody on Civil process, whose attendance may be so ordered.

X. Every person now in custody upon mesne process issued out of any of the said Supreme Courts of Judicature, for any debt or demand, and who shall not have filed a petition to be discharged under the laws now in force for the relief of Insolvent Debtors in India, shall be entitled to his discharge at the expiration of one month from the time of the passing of this Act, upon entering a common appearance to the action ; provided nevertheless, that every such prisoner shall be liable to be detained, or, after such discharge, to be again arrested by virtue of any writ of Capias or Warrant of Arrest, issued in pursuance of any such special order as aforesaid, at the suit of the plaintiff in the action, or of any other plaintiff.

XI. First.—If it shall be made to appear, to the satisfaction of any of the said Courts, or any Judge thereof,

that any person detained in custody by virtue of any mesne process, or of any writ of execution, or of any attachment for the non-payment of money, or in the nature of civil process issued out of such Court, is unable to maintain himself whilst in prison, it shall be lawful for the Court or any Judge thereof to order the person at whose suit the prisoner shall be detained in custody to deposit with the keeper of the prison a certain amount of money for the subsistence of the prisoner for the current month, and to continue to make a certain specified monthly deposit in advance at or before the commencement of every subsequent month for the subsistence of the prisoner, so long as he shall be detained in custody.

Second.—If the person ordered to make such deposit as aforesaid shall fail to make the same, the prisoner shall, after such default, be forthwith discharged out of custody; and such discharge shall be a sufficient authority for the plaintiff to cause a common appearance to be entered for the prisoner, in any case wherein an appearance is necessary to be entered.

Third.—The amount of deposit shall be fixed by the Court or Judge at the time of making such order, subject to future revision from time to time, on sufficient grounds being shown. The rate of such deposit shall not exceed four annas, nor be less than one anna, a day, unless in the case of illness, or other special cause, to be specified in the order, in which case the subsistence money may be increased, to an amount not exceeding eight annas a day, during the continuance of such illness or other special cause.

Fourth.—The money so deposited shall be employed for the subsistence of the prisoner.

Fifth.—The amount spent in providing subsistence for a prisoner detained upon mesne process shall be costs in the cause.

Sixth.—The amount spent in providing subsistence for a prisoner detained in execution shall be added to the amount of the judgment, and the prisoner shall be liable to be detained in execution for the amount, in the same manner as if such amount had been included in the judgment and Writ of Execution.

Seventh.—The amount spent in providing subsistence for any person detained under any such Writ of Attachment as aforesaid, shall be deemed part of the attachment in respect of which the attachment was issued, and shall subject the prisoner to the same liability as if the attachment had been issued for the non-payment thereof to the person making the deposit.

Eighth.—All money deposited as aforesaid which shall not have been spent at the time of the prisoner's discharge from custody, shall be returned to the person who made the deposit.

XII. Any order of the Court or of a Judge for the discharge of a prisoner under the provisions of this Act, shall be sufficient authority to the sheriff and gaoler for such discharge, so far as concerns the action or suit to which such order relates; provided that when an order shall be made for the discharge of a prisoner upon his entering a common appearance, such discharge shall not be made until a certificate shall be produced to the keeper of the prison from the officer of the Court with whom appearances are entered, to the effect that an appearance has been entered according to the terms of the order.

XIII. It shall be the duty of the sheriff and of the keeper of every prison in which any person shall be confined under any such process as above mentioned, to report to the Court out of which the process issued the name of every prisoner confined under such process who shall appear to be unable to maintain himself in prison; and it shall be lawful for the Court or a Judge, upon any such report, to cause the prisoner to be forthwith brought before them, or to make such other order as may seem fit; and the sheriff shall be bound to serve any rule or order made under this Act which the Court or Judge shall order him to serve.

XIV. Any rule or order made in pursuance of the provisions of this Act shall be a sufficient justification for any sheriff, gaoler, or other officer, for any act which he may do in pursuance thereof.

XV. In the construction of this Act, the word "affidavit" and the word "oath" shall include affirmation in cases where "affirmation" is allowed instead of an oath, and unless there is anything in the context repugnant to such a construction; words in the singular number shall include the plural, and words in the masculine gender shall include females.

XVI. Nothing in this Act is intended to alter or affect any rule in force in any of the said Courts not inconsistent herewith, or any of the provisions of the Act in force for consolidating and amending the law relating to Insolvent Debtors in India.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 12th day of November next.

2. Sealed tenders for the contract will be received at this Office on Friday the 16th proximo, at 2 P. M. precisely.
