Notice

Is hereby given, that persons desirous of entering into a contract for supplying such of the Hospital Clothing, &c. as may be required by the Commissariat Department at Poona, to meet demands from the several Stations of this Division, (with the exception of Ahmednuggur,) for the term of two years from the 1st June next, may, on application at this Office, from 11 A. M. till 5 P. M. daily, (Sundays excepted,) obtain copies of the Schedule, or List of Prices, and such information relating thereto as they may require.

2. Verbal offers for the contract will be received at this Office on Friday the 20th proximo, at 12 o'clock precisely, when bidders will be re-

quired to bid a per-centage above or below the prices exhibited in the list above alluded to at which the supply will be made, on the understanding that the articles supplied are to be of unexceptionable quality, and agreeable to such of the samples as will be shown at the sale; and all articles are to be delivered, in the first instance at the Commissariat Stores if required, and afterwards to the indenting Departments, in good condition, free of all charges beyond the stipulated price, in such numbers or quantities as may from time to time be demanded; and that the said articles are liable to examination and rejection by the executive Commissariat Officer, or by the indenting or receiving Officer; or by a Committee of Officers appointed on the part of Government, in the event of the contractor being dissatisfied with the decision of the above Officers, or either of them; it being understood that the decision of such Committee is to be final and binding on all parties.

3. No person will be allowed to bid for the contract unless he previously deposits in this Office, in cash, the sum of Rupees (525) five hundred and twenty-five, which sum will be forfeited in the event of delay, evasion, or refusal on the part of the contractor to execute the necessary deed of contract, whenever required to do so, on his offer being accepted, in which latter case he must be prepared to give unexceptionable bonded security to the further amount of Rupees (2,100) two thousand and one hundred, which, together with the amount previously deposited, will be held as a guarantee for the due fulfilment of his contract.

4. A contractor must comply immediately with all emergent demands, and meet others of less

urgency within the periods stated in the requisitions made upon him, in failure whereof, or if any supply be condemned by a Committee of Officers as aforesaid, the articles, or such others as may be required in lieu thereof, shall be purchased by this department, without delay, at his risk and cost, if it be considered expedient to do so; and in all such cases (30) thirty per cent. upon the amount of expenses incurred, or a fine of Rupees (50) fifty, at the option of the executive Commissariat Officer, will be levied as liquidated damages for each and every such breach of contract; it being understood that the simple condemnation of any article by a Committee constitutes such a breach of contract, whether the rejected articles be replaced by the contractor or by this department; in every such case, also, it is to be understood that the contract may be cancelled at the discretion of the Commissary General, and that if the contract be so cancelled, the cash deposit of Rupees (525) five hundred and twenty-five, mentioned in para. 3 of this Notice, will be forfeited to Government.

5. It is also to be understood that any negligence, evasion, or refusal on the part of a contractor to make supplies, or obey orders, or any attempt on his part, or that of his agents, to pass off articles of an inferior quality in lieu of those he is bound to supply, or any neglect to deliver them at the time and place ordered, will subject him, in every instance, to be fined to the extent of (25) twenty-five Rupees, at the option of the executive Commissariat Officer, from whose order an appeal may be made to the Commissary General, whose decision is to be final; but in cases where it may be deemed fit to exact any of the penalties provided for in the preceding clause, no further penalty shall be leviable under this clause.

6. It is further to be understood that the Contractor, or an accredited Agent on his part, approved of by the executive Commissariat Officer, is to attend at this Office during the usual hours of business, *i. e.* from 10 A. M. to 5 P. M. daily (Sunday excepted), also at such other time or place as may be indicated by the executive Commissariat Officer, when he may consider it desirable for the Public Service to require such attendance.

7. Any party whose offer is accepted will be required to produce his sureties for the approval of the Collector, within fifteen days from the date of the acceptance of his offer, or the contract will be resold; no reason will be stated for rejecting any security offered.

8. Bills for articles supplied under this contract must be preferred within one month from the date of the delivery of the articles, in default of which the contractor will forfeit the full value of the supplies for which bills have not been so preferred, unless it clearly appear to the satisfaction of the Commissary General that the delay was unavoidable.

9. The amount of retrenchments made by the Military Board on the contractor's bills will be recovered from the first bills preferred for payment; but in the event of such retrenchments, or any portion thereof, being remitted, the amount remitted will be refunded.

10. Any party who, after offering for the contract, fails to furnish the necessary security, as provided for in Clause 7th of this Notice, will be interdicted from bidding on future occasions, unless he produces a certificate from individuals of unex-

ceptionable character and sufficient means, guaranteeing the due execution and performance of the contract, on his offer being accepted.

11. The annual outlay on the above contract is estimated at Rupees (10,511) ten thousand five hundred and eleven.

12. No reason will be assigned for the rejection of any offer.

NOTICE TO MARINERS. STORNOWAY LIGHTHOUSE AND BEACON.

The Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses hereby give Notice, that a Lighthouse has been built upon Arnish Point, at the entrance to the Harbour of Stornoway, in the Island of Lewis, in the County of Ross, the Light of which will be exhibited on the night of Saturday, 1st January 1853, and every night thereafter, from the going away of daylight in the evening, till the return of daylight in the morning.

The following is a specification of the Lighthouse, and the appearance of the Light, by the Engineer to the Commissioners:—

The Lighthouse is in N. Lat. 58° 11' 28", and W. Long. 6° 22' 10". By Compass, the Lighthouse bears from Chicken Head N.W., distant about 3 nautical miles.

The Stornoway Light will be known to Mariners as a Revolving Light, which shows a Bright White Light once every half minute. The Light is elevated 56 feet above the level of high water of ordinary spring tides, and may be seen at the distance of about 10 miles, and at lesser distances according to the state of the atmosphere; to a near observer, in favourable circumstances, the Light will not wholly disappear between the intervals of greatest brightness. It illuminates an arc from about N.N.E. to about N.W. by N. $\frac{1}{4}$ N., facing the entrance to Stornoway, and an arc from about S.W. $\frac{3}{4}$ S. to about E.S.E., facing up the Harbour, the intervening arcs being masked.

The Commissioners further give notice that a Beacon has been erected on a Reef running out from Arnish Point, placed about 200 yards from the Lighthouse, on which a Light will be thrown from the Lighthouse Tower; and from the top of the Beacon an *apparent* or *Reflected* Light of low power will, in favourable states of the weather, be visible to Vessels entering the Bay.

The Commissioners hereby further give Notice, that by virtue of a Warrant from the Queen in Council, dated 11th February 1851, the following Toll or Duty to be levied in respect of that Light shall be as follows, viz:—

“For every vessel belonging to the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland (the same not belonging to her Majesty, her heirs and successors, nor being navigated wholly in ballast), and for every Foreign Vessel, which, by any Act of Parliament, Order in Council, Convention or Treaty, shall be privileged to enter the Ports of the said United Kingdom, upon paying the same duties of Tonnage as are paid by Vessels belonging to the United Kingdom (the same not being navigated wholly in ballast), which shall pass or derive benefit from the said Light at Stornoway, *one Farthing* per

Ton of the burden of every such vessel for each time of passing or deriving benefit from the said Light, if on a Coasting Voyage, and double the said Toll for each time of passing or deriving benefit from the said Light, on an Oversea Voyage, and for every Foreign Vessel navigated as aforesaid not privileged in manner hereinafore mentioned, double the amount of the respective Tolls hereinbefore specified."

The strength of Regiments, &c. to be computed agreeably to the number of men actually present with the Force on the date of the Sale, which will be duly notified to the bidders at the time, and the amount of monthly payments shall not be increased or decreased on account of Troops arriving or departing from the Brigade, unless the strength of such Details exceeds one-fourth the number of men on account of whom the Contract has been entered into.

4. The tenders, verbal and sealed, are to specify the amount offered for the contract in Company's Rupees, and no person will be allowed to bid or tender for the contract unless he previously deposit in this Office, and in that of the Commissary General's Office at Bombay, the sum of Company's Rupees five hundred (500) which will be forfeited in the event of delay, evasion, or refusal to execute the necessary deed of contract; and the person whose offer or tender is accepted will be required to add thereto a further sum sufficient to complete the amount to one month's stipulated payment in advance, which sum (including the above 500 Rupees) will be retained as a deposit in the Superintendent of Bazars' Office, until the expiration of the engagement.

5. Further, the contractor will be required to furnish two unexceptionable securities, who will have to bind themselves for the due fulfilment of the contract, and to make good all deficiencies in the payment of the same.

7. The contractor will also be bound to defray the expenses of maintaining a Preventive Police, where and whenever the entertainment of such may be found necessary by the Commanding Officer, for suppressing the clandestine sale of Spirits to the European Troops.

The contract is to be taken with all its advantages and drawbacks, and the contractor will not be considered entitled to any remission in consequence of failure of seasons, scarcity, drought, or any other causes whatever, save those distinctly specified in the contract; consequently all petitions for remission of monthly payments will not be attended to.

The following Act is brought up before the Legislative Council this day, the Governor General of India in Council being desirous that no time should be lost in passing the Act:—

Resolved,—That the Rule requiring that no Draft of a Law shall be ordered to be published till at least one week shall have elapsed from the day on which it was first laid before the Council of India in its Legislative Department, and that the Rules requiring that all Acts of the Governor General of India in Council shall be brought up for second reading in two months, or in three months, from the date of the first reading, be suspended in respect to the following proposed Act, and that it be at once passed into law:—

ACT No. IX. of 1853.

An Act to amend Act No. VI. of 1853.

It is hereby enacted, that the first eight Sections of Act No. VI. of 1853, shall not extend to any case in which a petition for the sale of any saleable tenure was presented on the first day of Bysack, 1260, of the Bengal era, nor to any case in which any proceedings were pending at the time of the passing of the said Act.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 22nd of April 1853:—

ACT No. — of 1853.

An Act for bringing under the operation of the Regulations and Acts in force in the Presidency of Bombay, certain Territories subordinate to that Presidency.

Whereas the possessions of the Chief of Vishalghur, situate below the Ghauts in the Southern Concan, have been added to the British Territories:

I. It is hereby enacted, that from and after the 1st day of 1853, the villages and hamlets mentioned in the annexed Schedule shall be subject to all Regulations and Acts which are or shall be in force within the Territories subject to the Presidency of Bombay.

II. It is hereby further enacted that the Purgunnahs of Yawul, Chopra, and Pachora, and the turf of Lohara, in the Province of Khandesh, formerly belonging to His Highness Scindia, and which have been permanently ceded to the British Government, shall be deemed to have been subject, from the 26th of February 1845, to the Regulations and Acts in force in the Bombay Presidency, to the same extent as if the said Purgunnahs and turf had not been transferred to His Highness Scindia after the passing of Regulation XXIX. of 1827 of the Bombay Code, and shall continue to be subject to the same extent to all Regulations and Acts which are or shall be in force within the Territories subject to the Presidency of Bombay.

SCHEDULE.

Territorial description of the villages forming the Ghera of the Vishalghur Fort, formerly belonging to the Pratimdhree of Colapoor: they are bounded on the East by the Syhadree range, on the South and West by the Lanje Turf of the Rutnaghirree District, on the North by the Dewule Turf of the Rutnaghirree District.

The Ghera is comprised of the undermentioned villages and hamlets, 19:—

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 6th of May 1853:—

ACT No. — of 1853.

An Act to amend Act No. XXII. of 1836.

Whereas it is expedient to prevent boats, rafts, and floats from remaining longer than necessary in any part of the lines of Navigation described in Act No. XXII. of 1836; It is enacted as follows:

I. Section IV. of the said Act is repealed, except as to rent now due under any order or Notification made in pursuance of the provisions thereof.

II. The Governor of Bengal shall be competent to prescribe the length of time during which boats, rafts, or floats may remain in any part of either of the lines of Navigation aforesaid without paying rent or demurrage, and also the rate of rent or demurrage to be levied on any boat, raft, or float which shall so remain longer than the prescribed time.

III. The provisions of Sections VII. VIII. and IX. of the said Act, so far as they apply to rent, are hereby extended to the rent or demurrage to be prescribed in pursuance of this Act.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 6th day of July next.

Officers visiting the Neilgherries are, in numerous instances, at great inconvenience on first arrival, owing to their coming in expectation of finding it in their power to draw Pay, due to them in arrears, early in the month, as elsewhere. It is therefore thought that it may contribute to the convenience of future visitors if it be thus made more generally known that (there being no Pay Office on the Hills) Pay has to be drawn, after arrival on them, by transmitting Abstracts, duly countersigned, to the Paymaster Southern Division, Trichinopoly, with a last Pay Certificate; who, provided he receive them about the 7th, includes the amount in his General Order in arrears for the past month, on the Treasury at Coimbatore, whence it is sent so as to reach this Station Office for *distribution* usually on the 18th or 19th. There is only this *one* monthly transmission of Military Pay to the Hills; so that individuals arriving too late to be included in it, as above, have often to wait another month.

Officers of other Presidencies can only draw Pay under a Certificate from the Accountant Mi-

litary Department of their Presidency. Certificates from Division Pay Offices of other Presidencies are insufficient: Officers are often at protracted inconvenience after arrival from having been unaware of this.

It is also notified, that it is extremely difficult to get Bills or Notes, of any kind whatever, cashed on the Hills: individuals often suffer great inconvenience from coming with the contrary impression.
