Is hereby given, that persons desirous of entering into a Contract for supplying NATIVE BOATS, COUNTRY CRAFT, TONNAGE, &c. to the Military and Indian Naval Departments at the Presidency, for a period of two years from the 1st day of October next, may, on application at this office from 11 A. M. till 5 P. M. daily (Sundays excepted), obtain copies of the Schedules or Lists of prices, and such information relating thereto as they may require.

Military Department.

No. 1.—Schedule for supplying Native Boats and other Country Craft and Tonnage for the conveyance of Troops, Stores, &c., and also for the performance of Port duties.

Indian Naval Department.

No. 2.—Schedule for supplying Native Boats and other Country Craft and Tonnage for the conveyance of Timber, Coal, Goods, Stores, &c., as also for the performance of Harbour duties.

2. Verbal offers for the contract will be received at this office on Friday the 23rd instant, at 2 P. M. precisely, when intending contractors will be required to bid a per-centage above or below the prices exhibited in the above lists at which they will undertake the contract, on the understanding that the duties of the same must be performed in a satisfactory manner, as ordered, free of all charges beyond the stipulated price, and that the supplies made under it are liable to objection or rejection by the Executive Commissariat Officers, or by the indenting or receiving Officers; or by a Committee of Officers appointed on the part of Government, in the event of the contractor being dissatisfied with the decision of the above Officers, or either of them, it being understood that the decision of such Committee is to be final and binding on all parties.

3. No person will be allowed to bid for the contract unless he previously deposits in this office, in cash, the sum set opposite the Schedules, respectively, viz:—

Schedule No. 1. Rupees (2,876) two thousand eight hundred and seventy-six.

Schedule No. 2. Rupees (619) six hundred and nineteen.

Which sum will be forfeited in the event of delay, evasion, or refusal on the part of the contractor to execute the necessary deed of contract, should his

offer be accepted; in which latter case he must be prepared to give unexceptionable bonded security to the further amount, as follows:—

For Schedule No. 1. Rupees (11,506) eleven thousand five hundred and six.

For Schedule No. 2. Rupees (2,478) two thousand four hundred and seventy-eight.

Which, together with the amount previously deposited, will be held as a guarantee for the due fulfilment of his contract.

4. The contractor will be required to sign and seal a contract, stipulating that the rates contracted for shall include all fees and other charges leviable on vessels at the different Outports, as also that demurrage shall not be paid for Sundays.

5. The Commander in Chief of the Indian Navy, and all Government Officers, shall be at liberty to use Government Boats or other Craft whenever they may think it expedient.

6. Government is at liberty to hire tonnage on Square-rigged Vessels for the conveyance of Troops, Stores, &c. through the agency of the Marine Department, or despatch the same by its own or private Steamers, or by means of the Railway when it can be made available, and the contractor shall have no claims whatever on Government for thus despatching Troops, Stores, &c. at any time.

7. It is to be distinctly understood, that all other public Departments will be at liberty to make their own arrangements for the supply of Tonnage, &c. should they deem it desirable so to do, independently of this contract.

8. Parties desirous of offering for the above contract are hereby informed that Government is already prepared to carry on the Boat contract under the orders of its Officers, unless favorable offers are received.

9. All Boats and other Craft supplied are to be surveyed and approved of by an Officer or Officers of the Indian Navy, or of the Master Attendant's Department, and the contractor will be held strictly responsible for the safe delivery of every description of Goods and Stores confided to his charge for transport, and must deliver them in the same state as when made over to him or those in his employ, and must make good all deficiency and damage sustained by Goods and Stores while in charge of himself, his Tindals, Nacodas, or others in his employ, during the passage, (the dangers of the sea and capture by the enemy excepted,) and he shall sign receipts for all Goods and Stores immediately they are made over to him, his Tindals, Nacodas, or others in his employ.

10. The contractor must comply immediately with all emergent demands, and meet others of less urgency within the periods stated in the requisitions made upon him; in failure whereof, this Department may immediately cause the required Tonnage, &c. to be hired at his risk and cost, if it be considered expedient so to do, and in all such cases thirty per cent. upon the amount of expenses incurred, or a fine of from Rupees (30) thirty to (300) three hundred, at the option of the Executive Commissariat Officer, will be levied as liquidated damages for each and every such breach of contract; and in every such case it is to be understood that the contract may be cancelled, at the discretion of the Commissary General, and that, if the contract be so cancelled, the cash deposit of Rupees (2,876) two thousand eight hun-

dred and seventy-six, on account of Schedule No. 1, and Rupees (619) six hundred and nineteen, on account of Schedule No. 2, mentioned in paragraph 3 of this Notice, will be forfeited to Government.

11. It is also to be understood that any negligence, evasion, or refusal on the part of a contractor to make supplies, or any attempt on his part, or that of his agents, to convey Stores, supply Tonnage, &c. in an improper manner, will subject him in every instance to be fined to the extent of twenty-five rupees, at the option of the Executive Commissariat Officer, from whose order an appeal may be made to the Commissary General, whose decision is to be final; but in cases when it may be deemed fit to exact any of the penalties provided for in the preceding clause, no further penalty shall be leviable under this clause.

12. Any party whose offer is accepted will be required to produce his sureties for the approval of the Honorable Company's Solicitor, within fifteen days from the date of the acceptance of his offer, or the contract will be resold. No reason will be stated for rejecting any security offered.

13. Bills for Tonnage supplied under this contract must be preferred within one month from the date of the supply being made, in default of which the contractor will be liable to forfeit the full value of the Tonnage, &c. supplied, for which bills have not been so preferred, unless it clearly appear, to the satisfaction of the Commissary General, that the delay was unavoidable.

14. The amount of retrenchments made by the Military Board on the Contractors' Bills will be recovered from the first bills preferred for payment; but in the event of such retrenchments, or any portion thereof, being remitted, the amount remitted will be refunded.

15. Any party who, after offering for the contract, fails to furnish the necessary security, as provided for in Clause 12 of this Notice, will be interdicted from bidding on future occasions, unless he produces a certificate from individuals of unexceptionable character and sufficient means, guaranteeing the due execution and performance of the contract, on his offer being accepted.

16. The annual outlay on the above contracts is estimated as follows, viz:—

Is hereby given, that the contracts for the exclusive privilege of SELLING ARRACK and COUNTRY LIQUOR, and INTOXICATING DRUGS (Ganja, Opium, Khuskhus, and Tobacco), to the Troops and Camp Followers at Baroda, for one year, from 1st November 1853 to 31st October 1854, will be put up to competition at the Office of the Superintendent of Bazars at Baroda, at noon on the 15th September 1853.

2. Verbal offers for the contracts will be received by the above-named Officer on the date and hour specified in the preceding paragraph; and sealed tenders, accompanied by the requisite cash deposit, will also be received by the Com-

missary General of the Army at Bombay, on the same date.

3. No person will be allowed to bid or tender for the contract unless he deposits with his offer the sum of Company's Rupees (120) one hundred and twenty for the Liquor, and Rupees (60) sixty for the Drug contract, which will be forfeited in the event of delay, evasion, or refusal to execute the necessary deed of contract; and two unexceptionable securities will also be required from the highest bidders, to guarantee their fulfilment of the terms of the respective contracts.

But the contracts will be sold for the actual number of Troops that may be present on the day of sale, which will be duly notified to the bidders at the time; and the amount of the monthly payment shall not be increased or decreased on account of Troops arriving in or departing from the Cantonment, unless the strength of such Details exceeds one-fourth the number of men for whom the contracts have been entered into. It is, however, to be distinctly understood, that any alteration in the number of Camp Followers will not entitle the contractors to claim any remission in the payment of the stipulated monthly amount of their respective engagements; and the departure of Troops from the Cantonment, as above specified, will alone give claim for remission.

5. The conditions of the contracts shall not be considered binding or in force, in any respect, until the same are confirmed by the superior authority.

6. The person or persons whose tenders may be accepted will be required, ere entering on the performance of their contract, to deposit with the Superintendent of Bazaars the amount of one month's stipulated payment, as his or their personal security for the due execution of the agreement. Is hereby given, that sealed tenders for the contracts for the exclusive privilege of SELLING ARRACK, COUNTRY LIQUOR, and INTOXICATING DRUGS (Ganjah, Opium, and Khuskus,) to the Native Troops and Camp Followers at Aden, for the Term of one year and eleven months, commencing from the 1st day of February 1854, and to terminate on the 31st day of December 1855, will be received at the Office of the Superintendent of Bazars and Police at this Station, and that of the Commissary General of the Army in Bombay, at 1 o'clock p. m. on Saturday the 8th day of October 1853, after which date and hour none will be received.

2. No person will be allowed to tender for the contracts unless he deposits with his offer the sum of Company's Rupees (1200) one thousand and two hundred, in cash, for the Liquor, and (200) two hundred for the Drug contract, which will be forfeited in the event of delay, evasion, or refusal to execute the necessary deed of contract, and two unexceptionable securities will also be required from the highest tenderers to guarantee their fulfilment of the terms of the respective contracts.

3. The Troops composing the Station are as follows, viz :—

- 16th Regiment Madras Native Infantry.
- E Company 5th Battalion Native Artillery.
- B Company Madras Sappers and Miners.
- Followers attached to Corps and Departments.

4. But should it so happen that any portion thereof be withdrawn before the date fixed for the sale of the contracts, they shall be entered into for those actually present on the date of sale.

5. No Liquor will on any account whatever be allowed to be sold to any European Soldier without a written pass, bearing the signature of the Superintendent of Bazars.

6. The conditions of the contracts shall not be considered binding or in force in any respect until confirmed by superior authority.

7. The person or persons whose tenders may be accepted will be required, ere entering on the performing of their contracts, to deposit with the Superintendent of Bazars the amount of one month's stipulated payment, as his or their personal security, for the due execution of the agreement. This is to be in addition to the monthly payment in advance of the sums tendered for the contracts.

8. The contractor or contractors will be allowed no drawback on account of scarcity, drought, &c.

9. The arrival in or departure out of the local limits of the said Command of Details of Troops, shall not affect the liability of the said contractor or contractors, his or their executors and administrators, to perform these contracts, nor shall such arrival or departure affect the rate to be paid by the said contractor or contractors, his or their executors and administrators; for the exclusive privilege, save as hereinafter mentioned, viz. that if during the existence of this contract Native Troops are located or withdrawn from the local limits of the said Command, exceeding in strength one-fourth the number of Native Troops hereinbefore specified, the amount payable by the said contractor or contractors, his or their executors or administrators, for the said exclusive privilege, shall be increased or decreased under orders by the Superintendent of Bazars, to such extent as a Committee of Officers, to be convened and nominated on the part of the Honorable East India Company, shall determine.

10. The increase or decrease in the number of Followers attached to Corps and Departments at Aden shall not affect the amount payable monthly by the contractor or contractors, except as regards those attached to the Engineer Department, to whom alone the rule in the foregoing clause will be held applicable.

11. The Liquor contractor will be bound to defray the expenses of maintaining an establishment of 4 Peons, for suppressing the clandestine sale of Spirits to European Troops, whenever the Commanding Officer may deem proper.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 12th August 1853 :—

ACT No. — OF 1853.

An Act to amend the Law of Arrest on Mesne Process in Civil Actions in the Supreme Courts of Judicature, and to provide for the Subsistence of Destitute Prisoners confined under Civil Process of any of the said Courts.

Whereas the present power of arrest in the Supreme Courts of Judicature at Fort William in Bengal, Fort St. George, and Bombay, ought to be restricted; It is hereby enacted as follows :—

I. No person shall be arrested or held to bail upon mesne process in any Civil action, on the Common Law side of any of the said Supreme Courts of Judicature, unless an order authorising such arrest shall be made by the Court in which the action shall be brought, or by one of the Judges thereof; and it shall be in the discretion of the Court or Judge in any case to grant or refuse an order.

II. Provided that no such order shall be made unless the Court or Judge shall be satisfied by affidavit of the plaintiff, or of some other person, that the plaintiff has a good cause of action against the defendant to the amount of two hundred rupees or upwards, either for debt or for damages, and in addition thereto, that there is probable cause for believing—

1.—That the defendant has absconded, or is concealing himself for the purpose of avoiding service of the process of the Court; or,—

2.—That he has withdrawn or is likely to withdraw himself or his property or effects, or some part thereof, from the jurisdiction of the Court, for the purpose of avoiding the process of the Court; or under such other circumstances as to induce the Court or Judge to believe that the ends of justice are likely to be defeated unless a Capias or Warrant of Arrest be issued against him; or,—

3.—That he has removed, concealed, or disposed of his property or effects, or some part thereof, for the purpose of defrauding his creditors generally, or the plaintiff in the action, or that he is about to do so.

III. An order for arrest may be made, and a Capias or Warrant issued thereon, in any stage of the cause before final judgment, and against any one or more of several defendants.

IV. Previously to making any such order, the Court or Judge may require the personal attendance of the plaintiff, and of any person who shall make an affidavit for the purpose of obtaining such order, and may examine them orally upon oath.

V. A copy of every affidavit upon which any such order shall be founded shall be delivered to the sheriff with the Writ or Warrant to be issued in pursuance of the order, and shall be delivered to the defendant at the time of his arrest or detention under the Writ, otherwise the Court or Judge may order the defendant to be discharged.

VI. No person shall be carried to or detained in prison by virtue of any Writ or Warrant issued in pursuance of any such order until he shall have been personally taken before the Court or Judge who shall have made the order for arrest, or before one of the Judges of the same Court, except for the purpose of detention, if necessary, for a reasonable time, until he can be carried before such Court or Judge.

VII. Any person arrested or detained upon any such Writ of Capias or Warrant of Arrest, may apply to the Court, or to a Judge thereof, for a rule or order calling on the plaintiff to show cause why the person arrested should not be discharged out of custody, and the Court or Judge may make absolute or discharge

such rule or order, and direct the costs of the application to be paid by either party, or may make such other order therein as to the Court or Judge shall seem fit; provided that such rule or order shall be made absolute in every case in which the Court or Judge shall be satisfied that the plaintiff, in any stage of the cause subsequent to the arrest, has been guilty of unreasonable delay in pleading or in bringing on for trial or argument any issue of fact or law, notwithstanding the delay may not be such as to entitle the defendant to sign judgment of Non Pros., or to apply for judgment as in case of a nonsuit; and provided also that any order made by a Judge under this Act may be discharged or varied by the Court, on application made thereto by either party dissatisfied with the order.

VIII. If any motion or application for the discharge of a defendant be made upon affidavit, but not otherwise, the plaintiff may oppose the same by affidavits, in addition to that upon which the order for the arrest was made.

IX. The Court or Judge may order and compel the personal attendance, at the hearing of any motion or summons, of both or either of the parties, and also of any person who shall have made an affidavit in support of, or in opposition to, the motion; or which shall have been used upon the application for the order, and may examine such person or persons orally upon oath, or allow him or them to be examined and cross-examined upon oath by the respective parties or their counsel; the sheriff or gaoler shall be bound to bring before the Court or Judge any prisoner detained in his custody on Civil process, whose attendance may be so ordered.

X. Every person now in custody upon mesne process issued out of any of the said Supreme Courts of Judicature, for any debt or demand, and who shall not have filed a petition to be discharged under the laws now in force for the relief of Insolvent Debtors in India, shall be entitled to his discharge at the expiration of one month from the time of the passing of this Act, upon entering a common appearance to the action; provided nevertheless, that every such prisoner shall be liable to be detained, or, after such discharge, to be again arrested by virtue of any writ of Capias or Warrant of Arrest, issued in pursuance of any such special order as aforesaid, at the suit of the plaintiff in the action, or of any other plaintiff.

XI. *First.*—If it shall be made to appear, to the satisfaction of any of the said Courts, or any Judge thereof, that any person detained in custody by virtue of any mesne process, or of any writ of execution, or of any attachment for the non-payment of money, or in the nature of civil process issued out of such Court, is unable to maintain himself whilst in prison, it shall be lawful for the Court or any Judge thereof to order the person at whose suit the prisoner shall be detained in custody to deposit with the keeper of the prison a certain amount of money for the subsistence of the prisoner for the current month, and to continue to make a certain specified monthly deposit in advance at or before the commencement of every subsequent month for the subsistence of the prisoner, so long as he shall be detained in custody.

Second.—If the person ordered to make such deposit as aforesaid shall fail to make the same, the prisoner shall, after such default, be forthwith discharged out of custody; and such discharge shall be a sufficient authority for the plaintiff to cause a common appearance to be entered for the prisoner, in any case wherein an appearance is necessary to be entered.

Third.—The amount of deposit shall be fixed by the Court or Judge at the time of making such order, subject to future revision from time to time, on sufficient grounds being shown. The rate of such deposit shall not exceed four annas, nor be less than one anna, a day, unless in the case of illness, or other special cause, to be specified in the order, in which case the subsistence money may be increased, to an amount not exceeding

eight annas a day, during the continuance of such illness or other special cause.

Fourth.—The money so deposited shall be employed for the subsistence of the prisoner.

Fifth.—The amount spent in providing subsistence for a prisoner detained upon mesne process shall be costs in the cause.

Sixth.—The amount spent in providing subsistence for a prisoner detained in execution shall be added to the amount of the judgment, and the prisoner shall be liable to be detained in execution for the amount, in the same manner as if such amount had been included in the judgment and Writ of Execution.

Seventh.—The amount spent in providing subsistence for any person detained under any such Writ of Attachment as aforesaid, shall be deemed part of the demand in respect of which the attachment was issued, and shall subject the prisoner to the same liability as if the attachment had been issued for the non-payment thereof to the person making the deposit.

Eighth.—All money deposited as aforesaid which shall not have been spent at the time of the prisoner's discharge from custody, shall be returned to the person who made the deposit.

XII. Any order of the Court or of a Judge for the discharge of a prisoner under the provisions of this Act, shall be sufficient authority to the sheriff and gaoler for such discharge, so far as concerns the action or suit to which such order relates; provided that when an order shall be made for the discharge of a prisoner upon his entering a common appearance, such discharge shall not be made until a certificate shall be produced to the keeper of the prison from the officer of the Court with whom appearances are entered, to the effect that an appearance has been entered according to the terms of the order.

XIII. It shall be the duty of the sheriff and of the keeper of every prison in which any person shall be confined under any such process as above mentioned, to report to the Court out of which the process issued the name of every prisoner confined under such process who shall appear to be unable to maintain himself in prison; and it shall be lawful for the Court or a Judge, upon any such report, to cause the prisoner to be forthwith brought before them, or to make such other order as may seem fit; and the sheriff shall be bound to serve any rule or order made under this Act which the Court or Judge shall order him to serve.

XIV. Any rule or order made in pursuance of the provisions of this Act shall be a sufficient justification for any sheriff, gaoler, or other officer, for any act which he may do in pursuance thereof.

XV. In the construction of this Act, the word "affidavit" and the word "oath" shall include affirmation in cases where "affirmation" is allowed instead of an oath, and unless there is anything in the context repugnant to such a construction; words in the singular number shall include the plural, and words in the masculine gender shall include females.

XVI. Nothing in this Act is intended to alter or affect any rule in force in any of the said Courts not inconsistent herewith, or any of the provisions of the Act in force for consolidating and amending the law relating to Insolvent Debtors in India.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 12th day of November next.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 26th August 1853:—

An Act to repeal Regulation VII. of 1816, and to declare the Law which is to be in force in the Tract of Land granted to Maharajah Imrit Rao.

Whereas a tract of land situated near the town of Teroha, in the district of Banda, was granted as an independent Jagheer by the British Government to the Maharajah Imrit Rao; and whereas by Regulation VII. of 1816, of the Bengal Code, it was enacted that from and after the date of that Regulation the jurisdiction of the Courts of Civil and Criminal Judicature, and the operation of the general Regulations, should not extend to the tract of land aforesaid; and whereas Maharajah Benaik Rao, son of the said Maharajah Imrit Rao, died on the 6th day of July 1853, and it is now expedient to repeal the above-mentioned Regulation; It is enacted as follows:

I. Regulation VII. of 1816, of the Bengal Code, is hereby repealed.

II. The said tract of land being part of the district of Banda, all Laws and Regulations now in force within that district shall be in force in the said tract of land.

III. All cases, Civil or Criminal, in which the cause of action arose, or the offence was committed, within the said tract of land, before the passing of this Act, may be tried and determined by the Courts of the said district of Banda, and the general Laws and Regulations now in force there may be applied and administered by the said Courts in the trial and determination of such cases; but if in any case it shall appear that the application of the said Laws and Regulations would operate unjustly if applied to the trial and determination of any such case, it shall be lawful for the said Courts to try and determine the same according to equity and good conscience.

IV. Provided always, that no Court shall try or determine any case, Civil or Criminal, with respect to which a final decision was pronounced, previously to the said 6th day of July 1853, by any Court or person within the said tract of land, having at the time of the decision lawful power and authority to pronounce it; and that, with the exception of cases within the provisions of Section IV. of the said Regulation VII. of 1816, no act committed within the said tract of land prior to the 31st day of August 1853 shall be deemed an offence punishable under the provisions hereof, if at the time of the commission of such act the same was not contrary to the laws then in force in the said tract of land.

V. Nothing in this Act shall extend to any crime or offence within the provisions of Section III. or IV. of the said Regulation committed before the passing of this Act, but every such crime or offence shall be dealt with and punished as if this Act had not been passed.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 26th day of October next.

4. A contractor must comply immediately with all emergent demands, and meet others of less urgency within the periods stated in the requisitions made upon him; in failure whereof, or if any supply be condemned by a Committee of Officers as aforesaid, the articles, or such others as may be required in lieu thereof, shall be purchased by this Department without delay, at his risk and cost, if it be considered expedient to do so; and in all such cases thirty per cent. upon the amount of expenses incurred, or a fine of from Rupees (30) thirty to (120) one hundred and twenty, at the option of the executive Commissariat Officer, will be levied as liquidated damages for each and every such breach of contract; it being understood that the simple condemnation of any article by a Committee constitutes such a breach of contract, whether the rejected articles be replaced by the contractor or by this Department; in every such case, also, it is to be understood that the contract may be cancelled, at the discretion of the Commissary General; and that if the contract be so cancelled, the cash deposit of Rupees (214) two hundred and fourteen, mentioned in paragraph 3 of this Notice, will be forfeited to Government.

5. It is also to be understood that any negligence, evasion, or refusal on the part of a contractor to make supplies, or obey orders, or any attempt on his part, or that of his agents, to pass off articles of an inferior quality in lieu of those he is bound to supply, or any neglect to deliver them at the time and place ordered, will subject him, in every instance, to be fined to the extent of twenty-five rupees, at the option of the executive Commissariat Officer, from whose order an appeal may be made to the Commissary General, whose decision is to be final; but in cases when it may be deemed fit to exact any of the penalties provided for in the preceding clause, no further penalty shall be leviable under this clause.

6. It is further to be understood that the contractor, or an accredited agent on his part, approved of by the executive Commissariat Officer, is to attend at this Office during the usual hours of business, *i. e.* from 10 A. M. to 5 P. M. daily (Sundays excepted), also at such other time or place as may be indicated by the executive Commissariat Officer, when he may consider it desirable for the public service to require such attendance.

7. Any party whose tender is accepted will be required to produce his sureties for the approval of the Honorable Company's Solicitor, within fifteen days from the date of the acceptance of his tender, or the contract will be resold. No reason will be stated for rejecting any security tendered.

8. Bills for articles supplied under this contract must be preferred within one month from the date of the delivery of the articles, in default of which the contractor will forfeit the full value of the supplies for which bills have not been so preferred, unless it clearly appear, to the satisfaction of the Commissary General, that the delay was unavoidable.

6. General Orders.

MILITARY DEPARTMENT.

BY THE RIGHT HONORABLE THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

Bombay Castle, 9th September 1853.

No. 545 of 1853.—In assimilation of the Rules of this Presidency for the provisioning of European Troops to those in force under Bengal, the Right Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to sanction the appointment of a European Butcher at each of the principal Stations for European Troops, on a salary of Rupees Twenty per mensem, to be drawn in Abstract with the Corps.

Commanding Officers at the principal Stations, at which one or more Regiments of European Troops are cantoned, are authorised to select a Butcher of suitable qualifications for the after-mentioned duties, from the Artillery, Dragoons, or Infantry, and to appoint him in their public Orders, transmitting a Descriptive Roll of the selection to Head Quarters of the Army, for the information of the Commander in Chief; the Butcher so appointed being, however, as a matter of course, to move with his Corps on its removal from the Station, when his place will be filled by another nomination.

The European Butchers are to be regularly bred tradesmen, in preference, when procurable, of good character and sober habits.

The Butcher's duties are—

1st.—To attend at the Slaughter-houses of the contracting Butchers of their respective Stations, to see that they are kept thoroughly clean.

2nd.—To superintend and direct the whole process of preparing the Meat intended for issue to the Troops.

3rd.—To report speedily to the Commissariat Officer should the Meat about to be issued not appear to be of a good and wholesome quality, in order that an immediate inspection may take place before the Meat is removed.

4th.—To make regular daily inspection of the number and quality of the Sheep and Bullocks actually on hand, and to keep the Officer Commanding the Station regularly apprised of the Contractors' attention to the following important article of their agreement:—

“Contractors must agree to keep up a stock ready for slaughter equal to 15 days' consumption, and must provide a sufficiency of the best available fodder for the proper maintenance of stock for this period.”

If the Contractor fail in the duties prescribed in the preceding paragraph, and if the Officer Commanding the Station, in communication with the Executive Commissariat Officer, shall consider such failure proved, this will be a sufficient ground for cancelling the Contract, and for the prohibition of the defaulting Contractor from being again employed.

Mutton is to be issued twice a week in lieu of Beef, and in the same quantity, whenever circumstances admit, and it can be procured in sufficient quantity.

Under the sanction of Commanding Officers of Stations, Rations of either Beef or Mutton (Rations for Hospitals excepted) may be issued whenever circumstances may demand a departure from regular usage.

Whenever any portion of the Rations or Diet tendered for a Corps or Hospital is deemed objectionable, and the Contractor declines exchanging it forthwith, the Commanding Officer should immediately assemble a Regimental Committee, for the purpose of inspecting them.

Should the Regimental Committee be of opinion that the articles are unfit to be issued to the Men, the report of the Committee is to be at once sent to the Executive Commissariat Officer, with a view to his immediate attendance, care being taken that the Rations are meanwhile kept in a shady place, under charge of a Sentry.

Should the Commissariat Officer, on an inspection of the condemned articles, coincide in opinion with the Regimental Committee, he will immediately require the Contractor to substitute fresh Rations; and in the event of his failing to do so within a reasonable time, the Commissariat Officer will supply the deficiency, at the cost of the Contractor.

If, on the other hand, the Commissariat Officer should be of opinion that the articles objected to by the Regimental Committee ought to be issued, he will forthwith apply to the Officer Commanding the Station for a Special Committee, which should, when practicable, be composed of Officers not under the rank of Captain, with one or more Medical Officers. The decision of this Committee is to be considered final.

In all cases of condemnation of provisions, the Committee's reports should show whether the articles are deemed of inferior quality only, or decidedly unwholesome, and, when pronounced positively unwholesome, whether by a Regimental Committee, the opinion of which is concurred in by the Commanding and Commissariat Officer, or by a Station Committee, subsequently convened, in accordance with the foregoing Rule, the provisions are to be instantly destroyed in the presence of the Committee.

Whenever it may happen that from sickness, or other unavoidable cause, the Commissariat Officer is unable to proceed to the Lines or Hospitals of a Corps to inspect Rations condemned by a Regimental Committee, a Special Station Committee is to be at once applied for.

The condemned articles are not, under any circumstances, to be sent to the Commissariat Officer's quarters for inspection previous to the assembly of the Station Committee.

All Officers concerned are held strictly responsible for the observance of these Rules.

As a general rule, on the receipt of tenders for Contracts, the lowest offer which is accompanied by satisfactory security should be accepted, with the exception of cases in which the Executive Commissariat Officer may adduce good and reasonable objections against the securities, or against the offer itself.

These objections should, for the satisfaction both of the Military Board and of Government, be most clearly stated, showing distinctly the causes which lead Executive Commissariat Officers to urge the rejection of low tenders. Vigilance must, however, be exercised, that needlessly high prices be not allowed.

Tenders from old Contractors at higher rates are not to be accepted in preference to lower offers, accompanied by due security, without good and sufficient grounds for such preference.

Strict attention and frequent personal supervision on the part of Executive Commissariat Officers are hereby enjoined.

The use of French Brandy of the purest spirit is to be substituted for that of English Brandy in Hospitals.
