Term of one year and eleven months, commencing from the 1st day of February 1854, and to terminate on the 31st day of December 1855, will be received at the Office of the Superintendent of Bazars and Police at this Station, and that of the Commissary General of the Army in Bombay, at 1 o'clock p. m. on Saturday the 8th day of October 1853, after which date and hour none will be received.

2. No person will be allowed to tender for the contracts unless he deposits with his offer the sum of Company's Rupees (1200) one thousand and two hundred, in cash, for the Liquor, and (200) two hundred for the Drug contract, which will be forfeited in the event of delay, evasion, or refusal to execute the necessary deed of contract, and two unexceptionable securities will also be required from the highest tenderers to guarantee their fulfilment of the terms of the respective contracts.

3. The Troops composing the Station are as follows, viz :—

4. But should it so happen that any portion thereof be withdrawn before the date fixed for the sale of the contracts, they shall be entered into for those actually present on the date of sale.

5. No Liquor will on any account whatever be allowed to be sold to any European Soldier without a written pass, bearing the signature of the Superintendent of Bazars.

6. The conditions of the contracts shall not be considered binding or in force in any respect until confirmed by superior authority.

7. The person or persons whose tenders may be accepted will be required, ere entering on the performing of their contracts, to deposit with the Superintendent of Bazars the amount of one month's stipulated payment, as his or their personal security for the due execution of the agreement. This is to be in addition to the monthly payment in advance of the sums tendered for the contracts.

8. The contractor or contractors will be allowed no drawback on account of scarcity, drought, &c.

9. The arrival in or departure out of the local limits of the said Command of Details of Troops, shall not affect the liability of the said contractor or contractors, his or their executors and administrators, to perform these contracts, nor shall such arrival or departure affect the rate to be paid by the said contractor or contractors, his or their executors and administrators, for the exclusive privilege, save as hereinafter mentioned, viz. that if during the existence of this contract Native Troops are located or withdrawn from the local limits of the said Command, exceeding in strength one-fourth the number of Native Troops hereinbefore specified, the amount payable by the said contractor or contractors, his or their executors or administrators, for the said exclusive privilege, shall be increased or decreased under orders by the Superintendent of Bazars, to such extent as a Committee of Officers, to be convened and nominated on the part of the Honorable East India Company, shall determine.

10. The increase or decrease in the number of Followers attached to Corps and Departments at

Aden shall not affect the amount payable monthly by the contractor or contractors, except as regards those attached to the Engineer Department, to whom alone the rule in the foregoing clause will be held applicable.

11. The Liquor contractor will be bound to defray the expenses of maintaining an establishment of 4 Peons, for suppressing the clandestine sale of Spirits to European Troops, whenever the Commanding Officer may deem proper.

The 26th August 1853.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 26th August 1853:—

ACT No. — OF 1853.

An Act to repeal Regulation VII. of 1816, and to declare the Law which is to be in force in the Tract of Land granted to Maharajah Imrit Rao.

Whereas a tract of land situated near the town of Teroha, in the district of Banda, was granted as an independent Jagheer by the British Government to the Maharajah Imrit Rao; and whereas by Regulation VII. of 1816, of the Bengal Code, it was enacted that from and after the date of that Regulation the jurisdiction of the Courts of Civil and Criminal Judicature, and the operation of the general Regulations, should not extend to the tract of land aforesaid; and whereas Maharajah Benaik Rao, son of the said Maharajah Imrit Rao, died on the 6th day of July 1853, and it is now expedient to repeal the above-mentioned Regulation; It is enacted as follows:

I. Regulation VII. of 1816, of the Bengal Code, is hereby repealed.

II. The said tract of land being part of the district of Banda, all Laws and Regulations now in force within that district shall be in force in the said tract of land.

III. All cases, Civil or Criminal, in which the cause of action arose, or the offence was committed, within the said tract of land, before the passing of this Act, may be tried and determined by the Courts of the said district of Banda, and the general Laws and Regulations now in force there may be applied and administered by the said Courts in the trial and determination of such cases; but if in any case it shall appear that the application of the said Laws and Regulations would operate unjustly if applied to the trial and determination of any such case, it shall be lawful for the said Courts to try and determine the same according to equity and good conscience.

IV. Provided always, that no Court shall try or determine any case, Civil or Criminal, with respect to which a final decision was pronounced, previously to the said 6th day of July 1853, by any Court or person within the said tract of land, having at the time of the decision lawful power and authority to pronounce it; and that, with the exception of cases within the provisions of Section IV. of the said Regulation VII. of 1816, no act committed within the said tract of land prior to the 31st day of August 1853 shall be deemed an offence punishable under the provisions hereof, if at the time of the commission of such act the same was not contrary to the laws then in force in the said tract of land.

V. Nothing in this Act shall extend to any crime or offence within the provisions of Section III. or IV. of the said Regulation committed before the passing of this Act, but every such crime or offence shall be dealt with and punished as if this Act had not been passed.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 26th day of October next.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 2nd of September 1853:—

ACT No. — OF 1853.

An Act to amend the Law relating to Pleaders in the Courts of the East India Company.

Whereas it is expedient to amend the Law relating to Pleaders in the Courts of the East India Company, It is enacted as follows:—

I. Section XVI. Regulation XXVII. of 1814, of the Bengal Code, and Section XVI. Regulation XIV. of 1816, of the Madras Code, are hereby repealed.

II. No Pleader shall be bound to attend in any of the Courts of the East India Company, on any day fixed for the transaction of Civil business, or to notify to the Court his inability to attend, unless he shall be employed in some cause or business which, according to the practice of the Court, may be heard or transacted therein on that day, anything in any Law or Regulation to the contrary notwithstanding.

III. Every Attorney on the roll of any of Her Majesty's Supreme Courts of Judicature in India shall be entitled as such to plead in any of the Sudder Courts of the East India Company, or in any of the Courts subordinate thereto, subject, however, to all the rules for the time being in force in the said Sudder and other Courts respectively, applicable to Barristers pleading therein, whether relating to the language in which the Court is to be addressed, or to any other matter.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be reconsidered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India, after the 2nd day of December next.

The following extract from the proceedings of the Governor General of India in Council, in the Legislative Branch of the Home Department, under date the 9th September 1853, is published for general information:—

Read a second time the Draft of a proposed Act, dated the 15th May 1847, and published in the *Calcutta Gazette* of the 19th May 1847, for regulating the powers of Deputy Magistrates, appointed under Act XV. of 1843.

Resolution.—The Governor General in Council resolves, that the following amended Draft on the subject be published for general information:—

ACT No. — OF 1853.

An Act for regulating the Powers of Assistants to Magistrates, and of Deputy Magistrates, appointed under Act XV. of 1843.

Whereas Assistants to Magistrates, and also Deputy Magistrates, appointed under Act XV. of 1843, to exercise the powers of a Covenanted Assistant, under Regulations XIII. of 1797, IX. of 1807, or III. of 1821, are not competent to decide any cases but such as are referred to them by the Magistrate; and whereas this restriction is attended with practical inconvenience to complainants in petty criminal cases; It is enacted as follows:

I. It shall be competent to the local Government of each of the divisions of the Bengal Presidency to empower Assistants to Magistrates, and also Deputy Magistrates, appointed as aforesaid, to receive and try, without reference by the Magistrate, such charges as they are now competent to try upon reference by the Magistrate, subject to appeal from their decisions, according to the provisions of Section II. Act XXXI. of 1841.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be reconsidered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 9th day of November next.

Public Order

To REGULATE the Religious PROCESSION of the MOHURRUM, and for the PRESERVATION of the PUBLIC PEACE during that Festival, sanctioned by the Right Honorable the Governor in Council, as provided for by Rule, Ordinance, and Regulation II. A. D. 1827.

1st. Every person desirous of erecting or carrying about a *Taboot*, *Punjia*, or *Dholeeka Punjia*, at the ensuing Mohurrum, must obtain a License from a Magistrate of Police, at the Fort Police Office; such License will be granted to Mahomedans only, and all persons obtaining them are hereby required to produce them when demanded by any Magistrate or Officer of Police.

2nd. Each *Taboot* is to have but one set of "*Tassa*," one set of "*Dholee*," one "*Kurna*," and fifteen "*Hillals*."

3rd. Any person who may be seen carrying a sword, dirk, bludgeon, or other offensive weapon, will be taken into custody.

4th. No *Taboots* are allowed to go in procession on the last night of the Mohurrum before 12 o'clock, or to continue so after 3 o'clock on the following morning, nor on the last day before 12 o'clock; and it is directed that they be thrown into the sea, and the ceremony concluded, by 5 o'clock P. M.

5th. These Processions are limited to the Bhandy Bazar Road, Duncan Road, Erskine Road, Obelisk Road, Chinch Bunder, and Market Streets. *Taboots* are not permitted to go abreast on the public road; and, on meeting, are to give way, each keeping to the left. On meeting carriages or horsemen, persons accompanying the *Taboots* are strictly enjoined to cease playing country music, the *Taboots* keeping the left side of the road.

6th. No Procession of the *Zool Junnah*, or Horse, through the public streets or roads, will be permitted.

7th. All persons licensed to sell Spirituous Liquors, and all vendors of Opium and Bhang, are to keep their shops closed; and persons found selling anything of an intoxicating nature during the aforesaid period will be taken into custody and punished.

8th. Water will not be allowed to be taken from the public Tanks and Wells, to be thrown before the Processions.

9th. Any persons violating any of the above Rules, or behaving in any manner likely to create a breach of the peace, or making a disturbance of any kind, will be immediately taken into custody, and dealt with according to Law.
