Notice

Is hereby given, that persons desirous of entering into a contract with this Department for SUPPLYING BREAD to Troops on the march from the Presidency to the Deccan, for the term of one year from the 1st day of December next, may, on application at this office from 11 A. M. till 5 P. M. daily, (Sundays excepted,) obtain copies of the Schedule or list of price, and such information relating thereto as they may require.

2. Verbal offers for the contract will be received at this office on Tuesday the 18th proximo, at 2 P. M. precisely, when intending contractors will be required to bid a per-centage above or below the price in the above list at which the supply will be made, on the understanding that the Bread supplied is to be of the first quality, and delivered to Troops on the line of march

free of all charges beyond the stipulated price, in such quantities as may from time to time be demanded, and that the same is liable to examination and rejection by the executive Commissariat Officer, or by the indenting or receiving Officer; or by a Committee of Officers appointed on the part of Government, in the event of the contractor being dissatisfied with the decision of the above Officers, or either of them; it being understood that the decision of such Committee is to be final, and binding on all parties.

3. Offers will be received only from parties residing at, or who have agents in Bombay.

4. The party or parties whose offer may be accepted must supply every detail of Troops proceeding from the Presidency to the Deccan, whose numerical strength may exceed seven, with fresh Bread throughout the march.

5. No person will be allowed to bid for the contract unless he previously deposits in this office, in cash, the sum of Rupees (32) thirty-two, which sum will be forfeited in the event of delay, evasion, or refusal on the part of the contractor to execute the necessary deed of contract, whenever required to do so, on his offer being accepted, in which latter case he must be prepared to give unexceptionable bonded security to the further amount of Rupees (130) one hundred and thirty, which, together with the amount previously deposited, will be held as a guarantee for the due fulfilment of his contract.

6. A contractor must comply immediately with all emergent demands, and meet others of less urgency within the periods stated in the requis-

tions made upon him; in failure whereof, or if any supply be condemned by a Committee of Officers as aforesaid, the Bread, or such other article as may be required in lieu thereof, shall be purchased by this Department without delay, at his risk and cost, if it be considered expedient to do so; and in all such cases (30) thirty per cent. upon the amount of expenses incurred, or a fine of from Rupees (25) twenty-five to (50) fifty, at the option of the executive Commissariat Officer, will be levied as liquidated damages for each and every such breach of contract; it being understood that the simple condemnation of any article by a Committee constitutes such a breach of contract, whether the rejected article be replaced by the contractor or by this Department; in every such case, also, it is to be understood that the contract may be cancelled at the discretion of the Commissary General, and that if the contract be so cancelled, the cash deposit of Rupees (32) thirty-two, mentioned in paragraph 5 of this Notice, will be forfeited to Government.

7. It is also to be understood that any negligence, evasion, or refusal on the part of a contractor to make supplies, or obey orders, or any attempt on his part, or that of his agents, to pass off an article of an inferior quality in lieu of that he is bound to supply, or any neglect to deliver it at the time and place ordered, will subject him, in every instance, to be fined to the extent of (25) twenty-five rupees, at the option of the executive Commissariat Officer, from whose order an appeal may be made to the Commissary General, whose decision is to be final; but in cases when it may be deemed fit to exact any of the penalties provided for in the preceding clause, no further penalty shall be leviable under this clause.

8. It is further to be understood that the contractor, or an accredited agent on his part, approved of by the executive Commissariat Officer, is to attend at this office during the usual hours of business, *i. e.* from 10 A. M. to 5 P. M. daily, (Sundays excepted,) also at such other time or place as may be indicated by the executive Commissariat Officer, when he may consider it desirable for the public service to require such attendance.

9. Any party whose offer is accepted will be required to produce his sureties for the approval of the Honorable Company's Solicitor, within fifteen days from the date of the acceptance of his offer, or the contract will be re-sold. No reason will be stated for rejecting any security offered.

10. Bills for articles supplied under this contract must be preferred within one month from the date of the delivery of the article, in default of which the contractor will forfeit the full value of the supplies for which bills have not been so preferred, unless it clearly appear, to the satisfaction of the Commissary General, that the delay was unavoidable.

11. The amount of retrenchments made by the Military Board on the contractors' bills will be recovered from the first bills preferred for payment; but in the event of such retrenchments, or any portion thereof, being remitted, the amount remitted will be refunded.

12. Any party who, after offering for the contract, fails to furnish the necessary security, as provided for in Clause 9 of this Notice, will be interdicted from bidding on future occasions, unless he produces a certificate from individuals of unexceptionable character and sufficient means, guaranteeing the due execution and performance of the contract, on his offer being accepted.

13. The annual outlay on the above contract is estimated at Rupees 652.

5. No Liquor will on any account whatever be allowed to be sold to any European Soldier without a written pass, bearing the signature of the Superintendent of Bazars.

6. The conditions of the contracts shall not be considered binding or in force in any respect until confirmed by superior authority.

7. The person or persons whose tenders may be accepted will be required, ere entering on the performing of their contracts, to deposit with the Superintendent of Bazars the amount of one month's stipulated payment, as his or their personal security for the due execution of the agreement. This is to be in addition to the monthly payment in advance of the sums tendered for the contracts.

8. The contractor or contractors will be allowed no drawback on account of scarcity, drought, &c.

9. The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 2nd of September 1853 :—

ACT No. — OF 1853.

An Act to amend the Law relating to Pleaders in the Courts of the East India Company.

Whereas it is expedient to amend the Law relating to Pleaders in the Courts of the East India Company, It is enacted as follows :—

I. Section XVI. Regulation XXVII. of 1814, of the Bengal Code, and Section XVI. Regulation XIV. of 1816, of the Madras Code, are hereby repealed.

II. No Pleader shall be bound to attend in any of the Courts of the East India Company, on any day fixed for the transaction of Civil business, or to notify to the Court his inability to attend, unless he shall be employed in some cause or business which, according to the practice of the Court, may be heard or transacted therein on that day, anything in any Law or Regulation to the contrary notwithstanding.

III. Every Attorney on the roll of any of Her Majesty's Supreme Courts of Judicature in India shall be entitled as such to plead in any of the Sudder Courts of the East India Company, or in any of the Courts subordinate thereto, subject, however, to all the rules for the time being in force in the said Sudder and other Courts respectively, applicable to Barristers pleading therein, whether relating to the language in which the Court is to be addressed, or to any other matter.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

I. Section XVI. Regulation XXVII. of 1814, of the Bengal Code, and Section XVI. Regulation XIV. of 1816, of the Madras Code, are hereby repealed.

II. No Pleader shall be bound to attend in any of the Courts of the East India Company, on any day fixed for the transaction of Civil business, or to notify to the Court his inability to attend, unless he shall be employed in some cause or business which, according to the practice of the Court, may be heard or transacted therein on that day, anything in any Law or Regulation to the contrary notwithstanding.

III. Every Attorney on the roll of any of Her Majesty's Supreme Courts of Judicature in India shall be entitled as such to plead in any of the Sudder Courts of the East India Company, or in any of the Courts subordinate thereto, subject, however, to all the rules for the time being in force in the said Sudder and other Courts respectively, applicable to Barristers pleading therein, whether relating to the language in which the Court is to be addressed, or to any other matter.

MY LORD,

With reference to the Universal Exhibition which is to be opened in Paris in 1855, several Foreign Manufacturers have written to the Minister of the Interior to know, 1st, whether Productions of which the importation into France is prohibited, will be admitted at the Exhibition; 2nd, whether, at the termination of the Exhibition, such productions must be re-exported, or will they be allowed to be sold for internal consumption.

These two questions, My Lord, have met with a reply conformable to the enlightened views which have led His Majesty the Emperor to decree the Universal Exhibition of 1855. It has consequently been decided, that not only will the prohibited articles be admitted at this Exhibition, but also that after its close, and at the will of the Exhibitors, can be re-exported, free of all Duties, or sold in France for internal consumption, on payment of a duty of 30 per cent., according to the value.

These dispositions will be placed among the General Regulations which are being prepared at this moment, but in consequence of the discussions which appear to have already arisen out of France, in regard to the system of prohibited Merchandize destined for the Exhibition of 1855, I have been chosen to have the honor of informing your Excellency of the Resolutions adopted on this subject by the Government of His Imperial Majesty. Your Excellency will, perhaps, deem it proper immediately to make known these dispositions to the Trade and Manufacturers of Her Britannic Majesty's subjects.
