Is hereby given, that persons desirous of entering into a Contract for supplying NATIVE BOATS, COUNTRY CRAFT, TONNAGE, &c. to the Military and Indian Naval Departments at the Presidency, for a period of two years from the 1st day of November next, may, on application at this Office from 11 A. M. till 5 P. M. daily (Sundays excepted), obtain copies of the Schedules or lists of prices, and such information relating thereto as they may require.

Military Department.

No. 1.—Schedule for supplying Native Boats and other Country Craft and Tonnage for the conveyance of Troops, Stores, &c., and also for the performance of Port duties.

Indian Naval Department.

No. 2.—Schedule for supplying Native Boats and other Country Craft and Tonnage for the conveyance of Timber, Coal, Goods, Stores, &c., as also for the performance of Harbour duties.

2. Verbal offers for the contract will be received at this Office on Friday the 21st instant, at 2 P. M. precisely, when intending contractors will be required to bid a per-centage above or below the prices exhibited in the above lists at which they will undertake the contract, on the understanding that the duties of the same must be performed in a satisfactory manner, as ordered, free of all charges beyond the stipulated price, and that the supplies made under it are liable to objection or rejection by the Executive Commissariat Officers, or by the indenting or receiving Officers; or by a Committee of Officers appointed on the part of Government, in the event of the contractor being dissatisfied with the decision of the above Officers, or either of them, it being understood that the decision of such Committee is to be final and binding on all parties.

3. No person will be allowed to bid for the contract unless he previously deposits in this office, in cash, the sum set opposite the Schedules, respectively, viz:—

Schedule No. 1.—Rupees (2,876) two thousand eight hundred and seventy-six.

Schedule No. 2.—Rupees (619) six hundred and nineteen.

Which sum will be forfeited in the event of delay, evasion, or refusal on the part of the contractor to execute the necessary deed of contract, should his

offer be accepted; in which latter case he must be prepared to give unexceptionable bonded security to the further amount, as follows:—

For Schedule No. 1.—Rupees (1,506) eleven thousand five hundred and six.

For Schedule No. 2.—Rupees (2,478) two thousand four hundred and seventy-eight.

Which, together with the amount previously deposited, will be held as a guarantee for the due fulfilment of his contract.

4. The contractor will be required to sign and seal a contract, stipulating that the rates contracted for shall include all fees and other charges leviable on vessels at the different Outports, as also that demurrage shall not be paid for Sundays.

5. The Commander in Chief of the Indian Navy, and all Government Officers, shall be at liberty to use Government Craft or Boats whenever they may think it expedient.

6. Government is at liberty to hire tonnage on Square-rigged Vessels for the conveyance of Troops, Stores, &c. through the agency of the Marine Department, or despatch the same by its own or private Steamers, or by means of the Railway when it can be made available, and the contractor shall have no claims whatever on Government for thus despatching Troops, Stores, &c. at any time.

7. Parties desirous of offering for the above contract are hereby informed that Government is already prepared to carry on the Boat contract under the orders of its Officers, unless favorable offers are received.

8. All Boats and other Craft supplied are to be surveyed and approved of by an Officer or Officers of the Indian Navy, or of the Master Attendant's Department, and the contractor will be held strictly responsible for the safe delivery of every description of Goods and Stores confided to his charge for transport, and must deliver them in the same state as when made over to him or those in his employ, and must make good all deficiency and damage sustained by Goods and Stores while in charge of himself, his Tindals, Nacodas, or others in his employ, during the passage, (the dangers of the sea and capture by the enemy excepted,) and he shall sign receipts for all Goods and Stores immediately they are made over to him, his Tindals, Nacodas, or others in his employ.

9. The contractor must comply immediately with all emergent demands, and meet others of less urgency within the periods stated in the requisitions made upon him; in failure whereof, this Department may immediately cause the required Tonnage, &c. to be hired at his risk and cost, if it be considered expedient so to do, and in all such cases thirty per cent. upon the amount of expenses incurred, or a fine of Rupees (50) fifty, at the option of the Executive Commissariat Officer, will be levied as liquidated damages for each and every such breach of contract; and in every such case it is to be understood that the contract may be cancelled, at the discretion of the Commissary General, and that, if the contract be so cancelled, the cash deposit of Rupees (2,876) two thousand eight hundred and seventy-six, on account of Schedule No. 1, and Rupees (619) six hundred and nineteen, on account of Schedule No. 2, mentioned in para. 3 of this Notice, will be forfeited to Government.

10. It is also to be understood that any negligence, evasion, or refusal on the part of a contractor to make supplies, or any attempt on his part, or that of his agents, to convey Stores, supply Tonnage, &c. in an improper manner, will subject him in every instance to be fined to the extent of twenty-five rupees, at the option of the Executive Commissariat Officer, from whose order an appeal may be made to the Commissary General, whose decision is to be final; but in cases when it may be deemed fit to exact any of the penalties provided for in the preceding clause, no further penalty shall be leviable under this clause.

11. Any party whose offer is accepted will be required to produce his sureties for the approval of the Honorable Company's Solicitor, within fifteen days from the date of the acceptance of his offer, or the contract will be resold. No reason will be stated for rejecting any security offered.

12. Bills for Tonnage supplied under this contract must be preferred within one month from the date of the supply being made, in default of which the contractor will be liable to forfeit the full value of the Tonnage, &c. supplied, for which bills have not been so preferred, unless it clearly appear, to the satisfaction of the Commissary General, that the delay was unavoidable.

13. The amount of retrenchments made by the Military Board on the contractors' bills will be recovered from the first bills preferred for payment; but in the event of such retrenchments, or any portion thereof, being remitted, the amount remitted will be refunded.

14. Any party who, after offering for the contract, fails to furnish the necessary security, as provided for in Clause 12 of this Notice, will be interdicted from bidding on future occasions, unless he produces a certificate from individuals of unexceptionable character and sufficient means, guaranteeing the due execution and performance of the contract, on his offer being accepted.

15. The annual outlay on the above contracts is estimated as follows, viz:—

The following extract from the proceedings of the Governor General of India in Council, in the Legislative Branch of the Home Department, under date the 9th September 1853, is published for general information :—

Read a second time the Draft of a proposed Act, dated the 15th May 1847, and published in the *Calcutta Gazette* of the 19th May 1847, for regulating the powers of Deputy Magistrates, appointed under Act XV. of 1843.

Resolution.—The Governor General in Council resolves, that the following amended Draft on the subject be published for general information :—

ACT No. — OF 1853.

An Act for regulating the Powers of Assistants to Magistrates, and of Deputy Magistrates, appointed under Act XV. of 1843.

Whereas Assistants to Magistrates, and also Deputy Magistrates, appointed under Act XV. of 1843, to exercise the powers of a Covenanted Assistant, under Regulations XIII. of 1797, IX. of 1807, or III. of 1821, are not competent to decide any cases but such as are referred to them by the Magistrate; and whereas this restriction is attended with practical inconvenience to complainants in petty criminal cases; It is enacted as follows :

I. It shall be competent to the local Government of each of the divisions of the Bengal Presidency to empower Assistants to Magistrates, and also Deputy Magistrates, appointed as aforesaid, to receive and try, without reference by the Magistrate, such charges as they are now competent to try upon reference by the Magistrate, subject to appeal from their decisions, according to the provisions of Section II. Act XXXI. of 1841.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be re-considered at the first meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 9th day of November next.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 16th of September 1853 :—

ACT No. — OF 1853.

An Act to amend the Law for facilitating the Acquisition of Land needed for Public Purposes, within the Local Limits of the Jurisdiction of the Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras.

I. The provisions of Act XX. of 1852, as herein modified, shall be applicable to all lands situate within the local limits of the jurisdiction of the Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras.

II. The powers given to the Civil Court of the Zillah in Section XIV. of Act No. XX. of 1852 shall, for the purposes of this Act, be exercised by the Supreme Court of Judicature at Madras either upon motion or petition; and the said Court, upon the investigation of any matter under the provisions of this Section, may compel the attendance of witnesses, and take their evidence, in the same manner as upon a trial of an action of law, and the said Court, upon such motion or petition, may award such costs as they may think just.

III. In all cases in which payment of any part of the purchase or compensation money, exceeding in amount the sum of five hundred Rupees, is held in

deposit according to Section XV. Act XX. of 1852, on account of any lands taken for any public purpose under this Act, the Government Securities mentioned in the said Section shall be deposited with the Government Agents at Fort St. George, in the name and with the privity of the Accountant General of Her Majesty's Supreme Court of Judicature at Fort St. George, to be placed by him to the credit of the persons interested in such lands, describing them as nearly as may be done, according to the course of proceeding in the said Court in matters and causes depending before it in Equity.

IV. The said Securities shall remain in the hands of the Government Agents, and the interest accruing on the Securities shall be, from time to time, received and paid under the order of the said Supreme Court, to the person or persons for the time being who would have been entitled to receive the rents and profits of the said lands if the same had not been taken as aforesaid, until there shall be some person or persons absolutely entitled to receive the principal sum of the moneys so reserved, and thereupon the said Government Securities, with all interest then due thereon, shall be transferred and paid to such person or persons under the like order of the said Court; and so long as no person can be found entitled to receive the interest of the said Government Securities, the Government Agent shall continue to receive, and from time to time to invest, the accumulation of interest due thereon, in the purchase of other Government Securities, to be held and applied by him on the same trusts as the Securities first purchased.

V. The right to receive payment of all sums not exceeding five hundred Rupees, which shall be held in deposit under the said Section XV. Act No. XX. of 1852, may be determined by the Madras Court of Small Causes, and the said Court may make an order for the payment thereof, which order shall be a sufficient indemnity to the Government, and all persons acting in obedience thereto.

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 16th day of December next.

The following Draft of a proposed Act was read in Council for the first time on the 16th September 1853 :—

ACT No. — OF 1853.

An Act to amend the 38th Article of War for the Native Army.

Whereas it is expedient that any Native Soldier who shall make away with or pawn any medal granted to him for service in the Field, or for general good behaviour, should be punished for such unsoldier-like conduct, It is enacted :

That there shall be added to the 38th Article of War for the government of the Native Officers and Soldiers in the Military Service of the East India Company the words following—that is to say : “or who shall make away with or pawn any medal or decoration granted him for service in the Field, or for general good conduct.”

Ordered, that the Draft now read be published for general information.

Ordered, that the said Draft be re-considered at the first Meeting of the Legislative Council of India after the 16th day of December next.

Public Order

To REGULATE the Religious PROCESSION of the MOHURRUM, and for the PRESERVATION of the PUBLIC PEACE during that Festival, sanctioned by the Right Honorable the Governor in Council, as provided for by Rule, Ordinance, and Regulation II. A. D. 1827.

1st. Every person desirous of erecting or carrying about a *Taboot*, *Punjia*, or *Dholeeka Punjia*, at the ensuing Mohurrum, must obtain a License from a Magistrate of Police, at the Fort Police Office; such License will be granted to Mahomedans only, and all persons obtaining them are hereby required to produce them when demanded by any Magistrate or Officer of Police.

2nd. Each *Taboot* is to have but one set of "*Tassa*," one set of "*Dholee*," one "*Kurna*," and fifteen "*Hillats*."

3rd. Any person who may be seen carrying a sword, dirk, bludgeon, or other offensive weapon, will be taken into custody.

4th. No *Taboots* are allowed to go in procession on the last night of the Mohurrum before 12 o'clock, or to continue so after 3 o'clock on the following morning, nor on the last day before 12

o'clock; and it is directed that they be thrown into the sea, and the ceremony concluded, by 5 o'clock P. M.

5th. These Processions are limited to the Bhen-dy Bazar Road, Duncan Road, Erskine Road, Obelisk Road, Chinch Bunder, and Market Streets. *Taboots* are not permitted to go abreast on the public road; and, on meeting, are to give way, each keeping to the left. On meeting carriages or horsemen, persons accompanying the *Taboots* are strictly enjoined to cease playing country music, the *Taboots* keeping the left side of the road.

6th. No Procession of the *Zool Junnah*, or Horse, through the public streets or roads, will be permitted.

7th. All persons licensed to sell Spirituous Liquors, and all vendors of Opium and Bhang, are to keep their shops closed; and persons found selling anything of an intoxicating nature during the aforesaid period will be taken into custody and punished.

8th. Water will not be allowed to be taken from the public Tanks and Wells, to be thrown before the Processions.

9th. Any persons violating any of the above Rules, or behaving in any manner likely to create a breach of the peace, or making a disturbance of any kind, will be immediately taken into custody, and dealt with according to Law.

The Most Noble the Governor General of India in Council is pleased to direct, that the following paragraph of Military letter from the Honorable the Court of Directors to the Governor of the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal, No. 80, dated the 13th July 1853, be published in General Orders:—

Letter dated 22nd March 1853, No. 62.

Advert to para. 141, of No. 127 of 1849, and solicit instructions whether, the Command of the Sappers and Miners having been declared incompatible with the appointment of Field Engineer, the Adjutancy should, or should not, in like manner, be declared incompatible with the appointment of Assistant Field Engineer; and whether Brevet rank can be considered as giving a Regimental Subaltern a claim to a Field Engineership.

Para. 4.—In reply to these inquiries, we have to apprise you, that the Adjutancy of the Corps of Sappers and Miners should be declared incompatible with the appointment of Assistant Field Engineer, and that Brevet Captains, like other Subalterns, of Engineers, are ineligible to the appointment of Field Engineer, and can only be so employed in the grade of Assistant Field Engineer, agreeably to the Regulations of the Service.

The foregoing rule is declared applicable to the three Presidencies.

The Most Noble the Governor General of India in Council is pleased to direct, that the following paragraphs of Military letter from the Honorable the Court of Directors to the Governor of the Presidency of Fort William in Bengal, No. 80, dated 13th July 1853, be published for general information:—

Letter dated 21st March 1853, No. 61.

Submit papers relative to free discharges of Soldiers, and to their passage to Europe. In the case of Private Cotton, Her Majesty's 93rd Regiment, who has served 12 years, with two distinguishing marks, application has been made for a free discharge for the purpose of returning to England, he being willing to pay his own expenses, rather than wait till the Invalids of next season are sent home.

Para. 2.—We have lately apprized the Government of Bombay, in reply to their inquiry whether Soldiers who purchase or obtain free discharge under recent Regulations are entitled to free passage to England, "that Soldiers who purchase their discharge are not entitled to

Military Letter dated 29th June 1853, No. 44, passage to Europe at the public expense, but that those who obtain a free discharge are entitled to a free passage, provided they enlisted in Europe." Under this rule Private Cotton was entitled to a free passage to this country.

3. The Circular dated Horse Guards, 8th December 1852, is applicable to Her Majesty's Troops serving in India. By it Soldiers entitled to free discharges, who wish to avail themselves of that indulgence, and to return home, are not to be finally discharged in India, but are to be sent to the United Kingdom "when opportunities offer," and be finally discharged on their arrival. As they are to be under Military discipline during the voyage, they must generally be sent with Detachments of Invalids, and be placed under the orders of the Officers in Command. In special cases, when the Commander in Chief may deem a Soldier worthy of indulgence, and recommend him for it, we are not aware of any objection to his being allowed to proceed separately, and to his being granted for this purpose the amount of passage money which would be incurred if he remained in India to proceed with the Invalids, the average cost of passage money in that season being allowed him for that purpose.

Every Officer appointed for the first time to a Revenue Survey Department is to enter it as a SUPERNUMERARY, and continue in that grade until he is reported by the Superintendent to be qualified for the independent charge of a Native Establishment, and a vacancy occurs among the ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENTS, when he will be promoted to the latter grade.

2. The Superintendent is not to report a Supernumerary as qualified for the charge of a Native Establishment until he has passed an Interpreter's Examination, either in Mahrattee or Goozerattee, and an Examination as regards reading and speaking in the language of the Zilla in which he is to be employed, and has also satisfied the Superintendent that he has acquired a sufficient knowledge of Plane Trigonometry, Field Surveying, and Topographical Drawing, and has completely mastered the detailed Rules for the Guidance of the Native Establishments in the execution of the various operations connected with the Survey.

3. Preference will be given by Government to Candidates for appointments who have already passed an Interpreter's Examination, and are proficient in the above branches.

4. The Most Noble the Governor General of India in Council is deeply grieved to announce the decease of the Honorable James Thomason, the Lieutenant Governor of the North-Western Provinces.

The Lieutenant Governor has long since earned for himself a name, which ranks him high among the most distinguished servants of the Honorable East India Company.

Conspicuous ability, devotion to the public Service, and a conscientious discharge of every duty, have marked each step of his honorable course: while his surpassing administrative capacity, his extended knowledge of affairs, his clear judgment, his benevolence of character, and suavity of demeanour, have adorned and exalted the high position which he was wisely selected to fill.

The Governor General in Council deplors his loss with a sorrow deep and unfeigned,—with sorrow aggravated by the regret that his career should have been thus untimely closed, when all had hoped that opportunities for extended usefulness were still before him, and that fresh honor might be added to his name.

The Most Noble the Governor General in Council directs that the Flag shall be lowered half-mast high, and that seventeen minute guns shall be fired at the respective seats of Government in India, so soon as the present Notification shall have been there received.

The Most Noble the Governor General in Council, having discharged the painful duty of announcing the death of His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor of the North-Western Provinces, is impelled, by a sense of the double loss which the State has at this time sustained, to depart from ordinary course, in order that he may further bear a public testimony to the merits and character of the gallant Soldier who has lately fallen by an assassin's hand.

The reputation of Lieut.-Colonel Mackeson as a Soldier is known to, and honored by, all. His value as a Political Servant of the State is known to none better than to the Governor General himself; who, in a difficult and eventful time, had cause to mark his great ability, and the admirable prudence, discretion, and temper which added tenfold value to the high soldierly qualities of his public character.

The loss of Colonel Mackeson's life would have dimmed a victory. To lose him thus by the hand of a foul assassin is a misfortune of the heaviest gloom for the Government which counted him among its bravest and best.
