SUMMARIES OF CONSTRUCTIONS OF INCOME TAX ACTS XXXII. AND XXXIX. OF 1860.

No. 70.

Salary,

When drawn at one time for several months, Assessment how to be made.

Act XXXII. of 1860, Section C.

In cases in which the accumulated salaries of several months are drawn together by the Officers entitled to the same, the Assessment of Income Tax should be made on the total of the amount drawn, and not separately on the sums due for each month.

Refunds,

On payments on account of past years, principle which should guide the grant of.

Act XXXII. of 1860.

Where Officers claim refunds on amounts paid by them to Funds in the present year, which they ought to have paid in past years, the refunds should be granted with reference to the principal laid down in the Financial Resolution, * No. 1058, dated the 30th January 1861.

* In the case in which the Resolution referred to was adopted, an Officer, having received in the year 1859 a larger amount on account of pay and allowances than he was entitled to, was retrenched the excess after the Income Tax Act came into operation, and the question arose whether the amount retrenched should be refunded in full, or whether Income Tax should not be levied upon it. It was held that, as the refund could not be regarded as a deduction from the Income of 1860, but was applicable to the Income of the previous year, Income Tax ought to be taken upon it. (Financial Department Order, No. 3403, dated 22nd March 1861.)

No. 71.

Medical Practitioner

May deduct from fees for professional services, cost of Horses kept wholly and exclusively for professional purposes.

Act XXXII. of 1860, Section XCVIII. Rule 9, Schedule 2.

(NOTE.—It having been suggested in reference to the foregoing construction that the word “exclusively,” as used in Section XCVIII, Rule 9, Schedule 2, Part VIII. Act XXXII. of 1860, was redundant, it was held that it was not redundant, but that it was a test whereby to ascertain, whether the word “wholly” properly applied; and, in illustration, it was pointed out that if a Medical practitioner kept a pair of Horses which he used by day to visit Patients, and by night to go to parties, he could not claim to deduct their cost, though possibly, but for his profession, he would not have kept any Horses; but that if in good faith, he kept an extra pair of Horses to visit Patients, it would not be right not to allow him to deduct their cost, because he might once or twice in the course of the year have used them for private purposes, when the horses kept for his private use fell lame.) (*Financial Department Order, No. 3795, dated 1st April 1861.*)

Carcoons,

Pay of, when disbursed by Government, deductions for Income Tax, how to be adjusted.

Act XXXII. of 1860, Sect. C. Rule 15.

A Medical Practitioner, in making a return of his profits to the Income Tax, may deduct from the fees received for his professional services, the cost of any Horses kept by him wholly and exclusively for the purpose of paying professional visits.

When the pay of the *Carcoons* in the Presidency of Bombay is disbursed by the Government to suit the convenience of the *Wuttundars*, the deductions on account of Income Tax, must be adjusted in accordance with Rule 15, Section C., Act XXXII. of 1860.—(*Financial Department Order, No. 3628, dated 3rd April 1861.*)

A gratuity or compensation granted for wounds received in action, is not liable to Income Tax.—(*Financial Department Order No. 4045, dated 9th April 1861.*)

It is the duty of the Consulting Engineers to Government, as Special Assessors under Act XXXII. of 1860, to deduct the Income Tax payable on Railway Salary Bills, and to pass for payment in cash the net and not the gross amount of such Bills.—(*Financial Department Order No. 2659, dated 9th March 1861.*)

A person having compounded for his Income Tax for a number of years is not liable to any increase of the amount payable by him under such composition during the term thereof, in consequence of the acquisition of a new and distinct source of Income.

The mortgager alone is chargeable in respect to the property, and is liable to be assessed to the full extent of the yearly value without reference to any sums which he may pay by way of interest or otherwise to the mortgagee.

But if the mortgager pay to the mortgagee out of the rents or profits of the mortgaged property any sum by way of interest or part payment on account of the mortgage debt, he will be entitled to the relief afforded by Rules XXVIII. to XXXI. Section XCVIII. of the Act. Under Rule XXVIII. the mortgager will, in the first instance, be charged with the duty upon the whole of the rent or profits out of which such annual sum or interest is payable, and the mortgagee will not be liable to be charged in respect of the money so received by him. But under Rule XXIX. the mortgager, in paying the mortgagee such yearly sum or interest, will be entitled to deduct the duty with which he is chargeable upon that amount, and under Rules XXX. and XXXI. the mortgagee will be bound to allow such deduction, and the mortgager will be effectually discharged by the payment of the annual sum, or interest less such deduction.—(*Financial Department Order No. 4046, dated 9th April 1861.*)

Subscriptions to the Band and Mess of an Irregular Corps are exempt from Income Tax, if deducted in the same way in which the subscriptions paid to the Band and Mess of a Regular Regiment are deducted.

The monthly payments made by the Officers of the Regiment of Artillery to the Bonus Fund of the Regiment are not exempt from Income Tax.—(*Financial Department Order No. 3190, dated 16th March 1861.*)

European Non-Commissioned Officers and Soldiers, employed as Clerks in the Office of the Judge Advocate General are not liable to Income Tax, if they are considered as employed on Military work, and they receive less than 415 Rupees 6 annas per month. But if their duties as Clerks are looked upon as of a Civil nature, they are liable.—(*Financial Department Order No. 3190, dated 16th March 1861.*)

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT.

The Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to publish the following Rules for general information :—

Rules to regulate applications to Government for grants of land or other concessions, required by Companies associated for the purpose of carrying out any public undertaking, project, or scheme within the Presidency of Bombay and its dependencies.

1. That notice by the Promoters of such undertaking, project, or scheme, of their intention to apply to Government shall be published in at least one English, one Gujarati, and one Marathi Newspaper, and also in the *Government Gazette* in the three above-named languages, at least four (4) weeks before the said application be received.

2. That, if it be the intention of the Promoters to apply to the Legislative Council for permission to levy any tolls, rates, or duties, or to alter any tolls, rates, or duties, or directly or indirectly to affect the rights of those having the power of levying tolls, rates, or duties, then the notice specified in Rule 1 shall clearly specify such intention.

3. That a written notice shall be served on each and all parties, or on their legal representatives, whose rights are affected, or are likely to be affected by the proposed undertaking, project, or scheme, at least four weeks before any application to Government be received.

4. That a plan, on a scale of not less than four inches to the statute mile, shall be deposited in the Office of the Collector of the district in which the said undertaking, project, or scheme, may be situated, four weeks before any application to Government be received; which plan shall describe clearly the situation of the proposed undertaking, project, or scheme, and the situation of the adjoining lands, accompanied by a book of reference, showing the names of existing proprietors, and of the tenants of the lands or properties intended to be occupied by the proposed undertaking, project, or scheme, and of the adjoining lands and properties; and the Collector of the district shall, at the time of receipt of the said plan and book of reference, endorse upon each of them a memorandum stating the date of receipt by him. The said plan and book of reference shall be open to public inspection on all lawful days, between the hours of 10 A. M. and 4 P. M., without fee or reward.

5. That an estimate of the expense of the undertaking, project, or scheme, shall be furnished, signed by the Directors of the Companies or parties promoting or projecting the same; and that such estimate shall be deposited with the aforesaid plan and book of reference at the same time and under the same conditions.

6. That the application shall be accompanied by the list of subscribers to the said undertaking, project, or scheme, which shall contain the name in full; the description and the place of residence or business of each subscriber; the amount of his subscription, with the amount he has paid up; and that the amount subscribed for shall amount to a sum equal to one half the amount of the estimate before application be received.

7. That a sum equal to ten (10) per cent. of the total estimated cost of the undertaking, project, or scheme, shall be deposited, before application to Government be received, to the credit of the Accountant General, in a Government Bank, either in Cash or approved Security, with an agreement that such sum is not to be withdrawn, except with the consent of Government, certified by the Secretary in the Public Works Department, that the undertaking, project, or scheme has been sanctioned by Government, or has been rejected or withdrawn.

8. That, previous to the application to Government, an alphabetical list, in the English language, of subscribers, the amount of subscription, and the amount paid up, be printed at the expense of the Promoters of the said undertaking, project, or scheme, and that one copy of such printed list shall be deposited with each of the following parties:—

A Secretary to Government

The Chamber of Commerce, Bombay.

The Collector of the districts in which it may be proposed to carry out the said undertaking, project, or scheme.

9. That the date of the proposed commencement of the works, dating from the sanction of Government, and also the estimated date of completion of certain defined portions of the same, shall be set forth by the promoters of such undertaking, project, or scheme, in their application to Government.

10. That the sanction or approbation of Government shall not be considered as conveying approval of any undertaking, project, or scheme in an engineering or in a pecuniary point of view.

11. Further, it will rest with the promoters of any undertaking, project, or scheme, to satisfy, by purchase, compensation, or otherwise, all the proprietors whose rights may be damaged by the execution of such undertaking, project, or scheme, and also to provide similar satisfaction for any consequential damages to surrounding properties. In case of any dispute arising between such parties and the Promoters or Directors of any undertaking, project, or scheme, Government will lend their aid in adjusting and settling such disputes.

12. That the Promoters of any undertaking, project, or scheme, shall also submit to Government, a table showing the maximum rates which they propose to levy, binding themselves not to increase them without the sanction of Government.

13. It must be understood that Government reserves to itself the right to disallow or to reject any undertaking, project, or scheme, which may be presented or submitted to it; and also Government reserves to itself the right to impose such terms or conditions before according their final approval, as in each case may appear to it to be requisite.

N.B.—This table is an extract from a more extensive yearly Return that is prepared for statistical purposes, and chiefly for the detection of any removable sources of disease, with a view to improving the healthiness of the Island. As the principal object cannot be fully attained unless the true causes of death be recorded, persons of all stations are requested, in each case of death occurring in their circle, to obtain, in writing, from the Medical Attendants the name of the fatal disease, that it may be delivered to the Policeman at the funeral place. Medical Practitioners, particularly, are requested to aid the registration. Blank forms of Death Reports, to keep by them in readiness, are given gratuitously on application at the Office of the Deputy Commissioner of Police.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind, that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all single cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.

DRAFT OF BYE LAWS for the INSPECTION and MANAGEMENT of MARKETS in the TOWN and ISLAND of BOMBAY, made by the MUNICIPAL COMMISSIONERS for the TOWN of BOMBAY, under authority of Section 96, Act XIV. of 1856.

1. Every Market being private property, whether used as a Public or Private Market, shall be under the control of the Municipal Commissioners for the Town of Bombay and their Successors, and such Commissioners and the Inspector of Markets, or any other Officer appointed by them, may, either with or without their or his Servants, enter every such Market at all reasonable hours, and inspect the same, or may depute any other persons to enter and inspect the same.

2. The Gates of every such Market shall be opened at Gun-fire in the morning, and shall be closed at 9 o'clock at night.

3. The Proprietor or Proprietor's Farmer or Farmers of every such Market shall have a pipe laid on from the nearest water main, and shall cause every such Market to be thoroughly washed and cleansed once in every twenty-four hours.

4. Every Market shall be kept thoroughly clean, and shall be paved and provided with covered drains for the conveyance of wastage water to the nearest public drain or sewer, which drains shall be constructed in all respects to the satisfaction of the Municipal Commissioners for the Town of Bombay.

5. The Municipal Commissioners or any other officer appointed by them may place in every such Market one or more Peon or Peons to preserve order therein, and to seize and detain any Meat, Vegetable, or other article or thing intended for the food of man, if the same shall appear to such Peon or Peons to be unfit for such food, and the expense of such Peon or Peons shall be paid by the Proprietor or Proprietor's Farmer or Farmers of every such Market.

A Sub-marine Telegraph Cable having been laid between the Ports of Akyab and Khyouk-Phyoo, the attention of Commanders of Vessels anchoring in its neighbourhood is requested to the following instructions, prepared by Captain Burbank, of Her Majesty's Bengal Steamer *Fire Queen* :—

INSTRUCTIONS.

Vessels proceeding in or out of the Khyouk-Phyoo Harbour, should, on no account, anchor to the Westward of the Reliance Buoy, for the following reasons :—

1st. The legitimate passage is to the Eastward of the Buoy.

2nd. The Sub-marine Telegraph Cable is laid from Circuit House, or Flag Staff Point, along the Western side of the Channel; and when the Pagoda Rock bears N. E.; Non-degree N. by E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E.; Reef Island N. $\frac{1}{4}$ W.; Saddle Island S. W. $\frac{1}{4}$ S.; Flag Staff Point S. E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E., there is a large bend in the Cable to the Eastward, consequently all Vessels should be prevented, for the safety of the Cable, from anchoring with the above bearings on.

Vessels anchoring with the Red Buoy on with Flag Staff Point will always clear the Cable, provided the Pagoda Rock is not brought to bear to the Eastward of N. E. by N., but they should on no account bring Flag Staff Point open to the Southward of the Red Buoy.

Vessels anchoring to the N. W. of Pagoda Rock will always clear the Cable by keeping Flag Staff Point well open to the Eastward of Red Buoy as far as it can be seen. Vessels anchoring off Pagoda Rock, should endeavour to anchor as near to the Rock as possible.

Vessels running between the Island of Penny Kyong and Angrey Kyong having cause to anchor, should border a little on the latter Island, for the Cable is laid down along the Centre Channel approaching Penny Kongy gradually for about six miles from entrance when it is brought ashore.

It is therefore thought that it may contribute to the convenience of future visitors if it be thus made more generally known that (there being no Pay Office on the Hills) Pay has to be drawn, after arrival on them, by transmitting Abstracts, duly countersigned, to the Paymaster Southern Division, Trichinopoly, with a last Pay Certificate; who, provided he receive them about the 7th, includes the amount in his General Order in arrears for the past month, on the Treasury at Coimbatore, whence it is sent so as to reach this Station Office for *distribution* usually on the 18th or 19th. There is only this *one* monthly transmission of Military Pay to the Hills; so that individuals arriving too late to be included in it, as above, have often to wait another month.

Officers of other Presidencies can only draw Pay under a Certificate from the Accountant Military Department of their Presidency. Certificates from Division Pay Offices of other Presidencies are insufficient: Officers are often at protracted inconvenience after arrival from having been unaware of this.

It is also notified, that it is extremely difficult to get Bills or Notes, of any kind whatever, cashed on the Hills: individuals often suffer great inconvenience from coming with the contrary impression.

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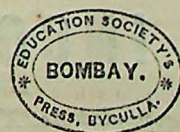
