REVENUE DEPARTMENT.

The following Resolution by the Government of India, dated the 8th May 1861, is republished for general information and guidance:—

FINANCIAL DEPARTMENT.

No. 5383.

Fort William, the 8th May 1861.

RESOLUTION.—Certain applications for additional establishments having been submitted for consideration and orders since the Budget Estimates for the current official year were passed, His Excellency the Governor General in Council observes that such applications cannot be complied with, unless the expenditure on account of them can be met by a reduction of other items of expenditure under the heads of service to which the applications in question appertain.

This principle has already been enunciated on more than one occasion.

It was explained in the Report of the Budget and Audit Committee, No. 6, of the 27th October 1860, that the Budget Estimates were to exhibit the "scale of charge" of the year; and it was pointed out that that scale of charge should embrace, under each department, the whole of the charges appertaining to such department, whether to be paid in the Presidency to which they belong or elsewhere. Separate provision was made only for "extraordinary expenditure rendered necessary by unforeseen emergency;" and it was remarked, on paragraph 38 of the Budget and Audit Committee's Report No. 10, of the 18th January 1861, in respect to such expenditure, "that as all charges of whatever character that have to be included in the Budget Estimates as the scale of charges for the year, should be definitely and clearly set forth in the Budget Estimates of the several departments, and brought under fixed and clearly defined heads, and based on calculations sufficiently specific to be capable of verification, the 'extraordinary' expenditure referred to does not come within the above, nor is it expenditure on account of petty contingencies or miscellaneous items for which provision is made in the Budget Estimates for various purposes regularly recognized by Government and classed under fixed heads of service. It is confined to expenditure on account of Wars, Famines, Inundations, and such like occasions which cannot ordinarily be foreseen, and may best be provided for by special grants as the emergencies arise."

The Governor General in Council requires that the Rules thus laid down shall be strictly adhered to; that the sums sent in by the Local Governments and passed by this Government, shall be held to be sufficient for the wants of the Local Governments for the year; and that these sums shall in no instance be exceeded except in cases of the description above-mentioned, and in cases of pensions and gratuities, the occasions for which cannot be accurately foretold and certainly provided for in the Budgets.

In all other cases, whether of establishments or casual charges the requirements of the Local Governments will be sufficiently met by the arrangement set forth in the Resolution of this Department, No. 11322, of the 15th November 1860, under which the heads given in Column 3 of the Statement entered in the margin, were prescribed as the heads to which specific sums would be appropriated, and within the limits of which the Local Governments would be at liberty to expend at discretion, subject to the following provisions, viz:—

"1st.—That any alteration in the distribution of the charges of a department be at once reported with all details, as at present, to the Government of India."

"2ndly.—That no salary of any Officer appointed by any Government can be altered or redistributed without the sanction of the Government of India previously obtained."

"3rdly.—That no general rates of pay or allowances shall be altered nor any charge incurred, which can pledge the Government beyond the year to which the Estimate relates, without the sanction of the Government of India;" and

"4thly.—That all existing Rules relating to the control of the Government of India over pensions and superannuations remain in force."

The Governor General in Council desires that the attention of all Departments, Governments, and Officers, be specially directed to these rules; and he requests that in future all Officers will refrain from sending in any applications for expenditure in excess of the Budget grants, except in special cases of the nature referred to above.

Subsidiary orders in connection with the charges of the Military Department will be issued, in accordance with the principle of the above instructions, by the Military Finance Department.

Civil Pay Masters, Fort William, Madras, Bombay, the North-Western Provinces, and the Punjab.

ORDER.—Ordered, that a copy of the foregoing Resolution be sent to the Departments, Governments, and Officers, noted in the margin, for information and guidance, and for the issue of further necessary orders.

The following Despatches, addressed by the Bombay Government to Her Majesty's Secretary of State for India, are published for general information:—

RAILWAY DEPARTMENT.

To Her Majesty's SECRETARY OF STATE FOR INDIA, London.

RIGHT HONORABLE SIR,

From the analysis of the Revenue Account of the Great Indian Peninsula Railway Company for the half-year ending the 31st December 1859, forwarded with our despatch No. 35, dated the 24th May last, you will have observed that there was a considerable falling off in the Third Class Passenger Traffic during that half-year, and that we had suggested a reduction in the rate of fare for that Class from 3 to 2 pies per mile. The propriety of introducing a new Third Class Carriage, with superior accommodation to that afforded by the present Third Class, but inferior in convenience to the Second Class Carriages, at a slightly higher rate than the present Third Class rate, was at the same time suggested to the Company.

2. The Committee of Directors have now submitted a proposal, by their Traffic Manager, to introduce a Fourth Class rate of 2 pies per mile, to meet the requirements of the poorest classes, the present* rates remaining *in statu quo*. It has been further proposed to employ high-sided waggons for the use of these passengers, each waggon carrying 60 passengers, and the

present Third Class Carriages being provided with seats.

3. The Committee have recommended the adoption of this proposal as an experimental measure for one year.

4. From our Resolution dated the 15th instant (No. 1161), it will be perceived that we have authorised the introduction of the proposed new class of Carriage, and have intimated to the Committee that we consider the rate of 2 pies too close to the present Third Class rate of 3 pies, and that to give the experiment of low fares the best chance of success, a rate of 1½ pie per mile should be tried for six months.

To Her Majesty's SECRETARY OF STATE FOR INDIA, London.

RIGHT HONORABLE SIR,

With reference to your despatch No. 24, dated the 24th July last, we beg to enclose copy of a letter from our Consulting Engineer for Railways, No. 1772, dated the 16th July last, handing up a proposal by the Great Indian Peninsula Railway Company for a general reduction of their Goods' rates.

2. In the new Tariff submitted by the Company, the classification of Goods stand as at present, but the rates of fare have been altered as follows:—

3. We have sanctioned the adoption of the Tariff with the modification proposed by our Consulting Engineer for Railways on the principle of levying the Ghaut rates on the 3rd, 4th, and 5th Class Goods. The Tariff will come into operation from the 1st October next, and is to remain in force for one year, at the expiration of which period the Company have been requested to submit a report as to how it has worked.

4. The proceedings transcribed in Collection No. 2 relate to the minimum weight fixed for the conveyance of 1st and 2nd Class Goods. To these proceedings we solicit attention.

5. Collection No. 3 comprises copy of a Correspondence submitted by the Commissary General of the Army regarding the heavy rates charged by the Railway Company on Government Stores sent to the Deccan as compared with those of the Commissariat Contractors. The new Tariff of the Great Indian Peninsula Railway has done away with this anomaly, and we would respectfully suggest that the several Railway Boards in England be encouraged to urge on their local Boards and Agents in this country the necessity of turning their attention to the subject of reducing their charges.

It is stated that Officers who were present considered that the effect of the charge was to enable many Europeans to escape from actual slaughter, and time was gained which enabled the faithful Bhopal Artillery to man their Guns. Colonel Travers' Horse was shot in three places, and his Accoutrements were shot through in various parts. He commanded the Bhopal Levy.
Late 46th Bengal Native Infantry.	Lieut.-Colonel Samuel James Browne, c. b.	For having at Seerporah, in an engagement with the Rebel Forces under Khan Allie Khan, on the 31st of August 1858, whilst advancing upon the enemy's position at day-break, pushed on with one Orderly Sowar upon a nine-pounder Gun that was commanding one of the approaches to the enemy's position, and attacked the Gunners, thereby preventing them from reloading and firing upon the Infantry, who were advancing to the attack. In doing this, a personal conflict ensued, in which Captain, now Lieutenant-Colonel, Samuel James Browne, Commandant of the 2nd Punjab Cavalry, received a severe sword-cut wound, on the left knee, and shortly afterwards another sword-cut wound, which severed the left arm at the shoulder; not, however, before Lieutenant-Colonel Browne had succeeded in cutting down one of his assailants. The Gun was prevented from being reloaded, and was eventually captured by the Infantry, and the Gunner slain.

"His Excellency the Governor General in Council is pleased to publish, for general information, the following paragraphs of a Military letter from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for India, No. 106, of the 28th February 1861:—

1. Her Majesty has been pleased to give direction that a Medal should be prepared to commemorate the successes of Her Majesty's British and Indian Forces, Naval and Military, employed in the Operations in China, which terminated in the Capture of the City of Canton on the 29th of December 1857, and also in the Operations which have recently terminated in the Capture of the City of Peking, and the restoration of Peace.

2. Her Majesty has also been pleased to command—

1st.—That a Clasp, to be attached to the said Medal, inscribed "Canton, 1857," be granted to such of Her Majesty's Forces aforesaid as were employed in the Operations undertaken against the City of Canton.

2ndly.—That a Clasp to be attached to the said Medal, inscribed "Taku Forts, 1860," be granted to such of Her Majesty's Forces aforesaid as were employed in the Capture of the Taku Forts; and,

3rdly.—That a Clasp to be attached to the said Medal, inscribed "Peking, 1860," be granted to such of Her Majesty's Forces aforesaid as were employed in the Capture of Peking.

3. Her Majesty has further been pleased to command that the Medal be the same as that already granted by Her Majesty in commemoration of the Operations formerly undertaken in China, omitting the date 1842 inscribed thereon, and that it be suspended from a Ribbon of the same width and pattern as that worn with that Medal; and that a Clasp, to be attached to the Medal, inscribed, "China, 1842," be granted, in addition to the Clasps already enumerated, to such of Her Majesty's Forces aforesaid then employed in the service of Her Majesty and of the East India Company, who have received the Medal granted by Her Majesty in commemoration of the former Operations, and have served in the Operations which have recently terminated, in order that they may not lose the reward and record of their former services.

4. The requisite instructions will be issued by the General Commanding in Chief to Officers commanding Her Majesty's Forces in China, to enable His Royal Highness to give effect to Her Majesty's gracious intentions, by the preparation of Medal Rolls.

5. In the event, however, of any of the Corps having returned to India before the receipt of such instructions, your Government should direct the preparation and transmission of the Medal Rolls of such Corps.

6. In the preparation of these Rolls care should be taken to particularize the Officers and Soldiers who may be in possession of the China Medal of 1842, as in such case Clasps only are on the present occasion to be awarded.

With reference to paragraph 5 of the above letter, the Governments of Madras and Bombay, and His Excellency the Commander in Chief in India, are requested to adopt early measures to furnish the Rolls of the Officers and Soldiers of Corps already returned to India, who are entitled to the Medals and Clasps now authorized by Her Majesty.

RESOLUTION.—His Excellency the Governor General in Council has had under his consideration the strength of Native Infantry which it may be necessary hereafter to keep up in India, and the amount of reductions which it may, in consequence, be possible to make in existing Establishments.

2. When the orders lately issued by the Government of India for relieving the Army from numerous Civil Guards and other Non-Military duties are fully carried out, a strength of 600 Privates per Regiment will be sufficient for all ordinary duties of a Native Infantry Battalion in time of peace, and His Excellency in Council is therefore pleased to fix this number as the ordinary Establishment of all Native Infantry Regiments, Regular and Irregular, throughout India, and to direct that all such Corps be reduced to that strength with the least practicable delay.

3. Every Native Infantry Regiment in India will hereafter consist of eight Companies, with the following uniform Establishment :—

4. Each Regiment in Bengal will have a Non-effective Native Staff, composed of one Subadar-Major, a Drill Havildar, a Drill Naick, eight Color Havildars, eight Pay Havildars, one Drum Major, and one Fife Major.

5. In Madras and Bombay the Establishment of Native Staff will remain as at present.

6. Corps having Honorary Colors will retain the Extra Native Officers, and all other classes of Native Officers and Non-Commissioned Officers not above specified will, for the future, be modified to meet in Bengal Regiments the reduced Establishment.

10. The Mhairwarra and Mhair Local Battalions will be dealt with as Police, and estimated for accordingly. Regarding the remaining Regiments under the Government of India, separate orders will be issued. In the meantime the Strength and Establishment of each Regiment will be reduced to the uniform Standard above laid down for the Native Infantry throughout India.

11. There are at present four Regiments of Sikh Infantry and seven of Punjaub Infantry (1st to 6th and 25th), and the Corps of Guides, under the immediate orders of the Punjaub Government. It is not the present intention of the Governor General in Council to remove these Corps from under the orders of the Punjaub Government, but they will be borne on the Rolls of the Bengal Army, retaining their distinguishing designation as "Sikh Regiments," "Punjaub Regiments," and "Guides."

Fifteen Regiments, as named in the margin, are either Extra or Irregular Battalions of the former Bengal Army, or have lately been embodied from men of that Army who had shown exemplary devotion to their duty, or are Local Regiments which have been transferred to the Army of Bengal under His Excellency the

7. Further orders will be issued regarding Non-Combatant Establishments.

8. The Returns show the number of Regiments or Battalions, into which the Native Infantry of India is divided, to have been in August last, as given in the margin.

9. Of the twenty-eight Regiments* returned as under the Government of India, the Pegu Light Infantry and one of the Nagpore Regiments are under orders for disbandment.

12. Of the sixty-three Regiments of Native Infantry, as detailed in the margin, under His Excellency the Commander in Chief in India, fifteen belong to the Regular Native Infantry of the Bengal Army. Of these, three, viz. the 4th, 58th, and 73rd, are to be broken up, and the remaining Regiments will, for the future, be enrolled as the 1st to the 12th Regiments of Native Infantry of the Bengal Army, retaining all Honorary distinctive marks which may have been granted to them by Government in times past.

Commander in Chief. Of these the Nusseree Battalion will be broken up.

14. The Camroop Regiment, the Arracan Local Battalion, and the Bnaugulpore Hill Rangers will be transferred to the Police, and will be either broken up, or absorbed into the General Police, as may be found best in the opinion of the Local Government. The 2nd Gwalior Infantry has already been broken up.

15. Of the Regiments of Punjaub Infantry the 10th, 12th, 13th, and 14th will be broken up.

17. Of the whole sixty-three Regiments under His Excellency

the Commander in Chief in India, as explained above, it is required, by the financial necessities of the State, that reduction should be made of such Corps as can possibly be dispensed with.

18. The Governor General in Council therefore directs that, in addition to the Regiments already named above, as to be transferred to the Police, or broken up, three more, viz. the Cawnpore, Moradabad, and Kemaon Levies shall be disbanded; and that all the men of the Regiments to be broken up, who are not discharged under the general rules which will be hereafter laid down, shall be transferred as supernumeraries to other Regiments of Native Infantry.

19. There will remain forty-eight Regiments of Native Infantry under His Excellency the Commander in Chief.

20. The Bengal Native Infantry will then consist of the following Regiments, viz. :—

21. In the Madras Army the reduction already effected by the Government of Madras and His Excellency the Commander in Chief, leave little to be done as regards the Establishment of Native Infantry. In August 1859, there were fifty-two Regular and three Extra Regiments of Native Infantry, of ten Companies each, with a total established strength of 62,775 men. These have since been reduced to the Normal Establishment of fifty-two Regiments, of eight Companies each, with a total established strength on the 1st November 1860 of 36,348 men, being a reduction of 104 Companies and 26,437 men, including supernumeraries, who are in course of absorption. The effective strength, on the 1st November last, was under 40,000 men, so that an actual reduction has already been effected to the extent of at least 22,775 men.

22. In the Bombay Army, the Native Infantry Regiments have been already reduced from ten to eight Companies, and the number of Privates to 600 per Regiment; three extra Battalions and the 3rd Belooch Battalion organised in 1857-58 have been reduced, and the Veteran Battalions abolished; but the number of Regiments is still one in excess of what it was before the year 1857, owing to the organisation of two Regiments of Jacob's Rifles and of two Regiments (the 30th and 31st) organised in June 1858, in place of the 21st and 27th Regiments disbanded.

23. His Excellency the Governor General in Council resolves that four Regiments, such as His Excellency the Governor in Council of Bombay may select, shall now be broken up; the Officers and Men composing them being disposed of, with the least possible prejudice to their individual interests, as the Honorable the Governor in Council, and His Excellency the Commander in Chief at Bombay, may think best for the Public Service.

24. On the 1st August 1859, the strength of the Native Infantry of the Bombay Army was 30,158 Non-Commissioned Rank and File; but, under the operation of this Order, as well as by the previous action of the Government of Bombay, it will be reduced to 21,360 of all Ranks, making a total reduction of upwards of 8,000 men of all Ranks.

25. The Establishment of Native Infantry in the Indian Army, the Estimates for which will be submitted in the Military Department, will henceforward be as follows:—

26. The following Rules are laid down for disposing of the supernumeraries who will remain under the above Orders:—

In each Army His Excellency the Commander in Chief is authorised to discharge all inefficient men, who may not be recommended for transfer to the Pension Establishments, as well as all able-bodied men under four years' service, who have no special claim for good service in the field. To the above, as to able-bodied men of above four years' service who may wish to have their discharge, gratuities will be allowed according the following scale:—

Transfers of Commissioned, Non-Commissioned officers, and Privates being made so as to equalise the strength of the Regiments maintained. In addition to the above, a gratuity, not exceeding two months' pay, will be granted as travelling allowance in proportion to the distance to be travelled to the men's homes, under Rules which will be laid down by His Excellency the Commander in Chief. Men transferred to the Police will be allowed to reckon in the constabulary their service in the Line. All Native Commissioned, Non-Commissioned Officers, and Privates, who have served the regulated period for Pension, if physically unfit for active Field Service, may be recommended for transfer to the Pension Establishment.

27. As regards the 73rd Native Infantry, and the 10th and 14th Punjaub Infantry, it will be in the discretion of His Excellency the Commander in Chief to withhold recommendations or gratuities from any men who, by their misconduct, have proved themselves unworthy of them.

28. For the special purpose of carrying out this order, the Invaliding Committees will be composed of two Medical Officers and one Regimental Officer, if possible a Field Officer, to be selected by His Excellency the Commander in Chief.

29. After the equalisation of the strength of Corps, and the pensioning and discharge of men ordered to be so dealt with, supernumeraries will be absorbed by vacancies; but, to prevent stagnation in promotion, one step will be given for every two vacancies in each of the grades of Naick, Havildar, Jemadar, and Subadar, pending the absorption of supernumeraries.

30. The Military Finance Department are charged with the duty of issuing such subsidiary orders as the above arrangements, in their financial effect, may call for.

31. The same Rules will be applicable to all Corps under the Government of India, the Governor General's Agent, Resident, or other Political Officer, under whose immediate control the Regiment is now placed, being vested with the same powers for the purpose of carrying out the orders as are given in the above Rules to the Commander in Chief, and being charged with the duty of seeing that the orders are carried into effect with the least practicable delay.

Medical Practitioners, particularly, are requested to aid the registration. Blank forms of Death Reports, to keep by them in readiness, are given gratuitously on application at the Office of the Deputy Commissioner of Police.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind, that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all *single* cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.

For Letters exceeding the weight given above, in the case of those addressed to Sardinia, &c. 2 Annas and 4 Pies are to be added for every additional quarter of an ounce, in addition to 5 Annas and 4 Pies for every additional ounce or fraction of an ounce. In the case of Letters addressed to the States of Italy not under Sardinian Postal rules, *i. e.* Sicily, Naples, Rome, and the Papal States, 1 Anna and 4 Pies are to be added for every additional quarter of an ounce, and 1 Rupee 8 Annas for every additional ounce or fraction of an ounce.

Newspapers addressed to Sardinia, Tuscany, Parma, Modena, and the Romagna, cannot be prepaid in India to their destination. The India Inland rate of Postage of one Anna for each Paper, not weighing more than six tolas, must be therefore prepaid on all Newspapers not posted in Calcutta, Madras, or Bombay.
