The following Notifications by the Government of India are republished for general information:—

"No. 43.

The 19th March 1862.

Act XIX. of 1861 having come into operation on the 1st instant, it is important to guard against any misapprehension among Treasury Officers as to the wishes of Government in regard to the action of District Officers generally in promoting the introduction of the new Currency.

The new Currency Notes are now a legal tender in certain Districts as specified in the Notification cited in the margin, and must necessarily be received, when tendered, in payment of demands of Government of every description; but Silver can only be demanded as of right in exchange for Notes at the several Presidency Towns whence they have been issued.

It is the desire of Government that, as far as possible, every facility may be afforded by local Officers for cashing Notes, and that every legitimate means may be employed to promote, generally, the free circulation of the new Currency; but it is equally their wish that there may be an entire absence of anything which could be construed into a desire to force the circulation, or in any way interfere with the free action of the community in resorting, at their own time, and in their own way, to the use of the Currency Notes. Officers will recollect that the Government have no direct interest in forcing the Paper Currency, and that any Act which leads to such a suspicion will only retard the period when confidence may be fully established, and the community reap the benefit of an improved circulating medium.

It may be expected that there will be a tendency to employ the new Notes to a considerable extent as a means of remittance and for small amounts among private parties, and in localities distant from Banks, it may be desirable that the Government should give facilities for this purpose; but it would be very objectionable if this were carried so far as to interfere with the legitimate operations of private enterprise, or with the system of Supply Bills to which the public are accustomed.

Much, in matters of this description, must necessarily be left to the discretion of the local Officers; but without incurring risk of inconvenience, it may be prescribed, generally, as the rule to be observed—

- 1st.—That Notes are to be received in payment of all demands of Government, but are for the present to be paid only when parties receiving payment do not object.
- 2nd.—That Notes are to be cashed at places where there are no Branch Banks acting as Agents for the Government Currency, and then only to a limited extent, and for small sums, as an accommodation to private parties or travellers at the discretion of Treasury Officers.
- 3rd.—That Supply Bills are to be paid, generally, at the option of the holders either in Coin or Notes, subject to such instructions as may, from time to time, be received from the Deputy Auditor and Accountant General.
- 4th.—That Notes should never be returned to the Presidency except under the direct instructions of the Deputy Auditor and Accountant General.
- 5th.—That a Report as to the progress of these measures should from time to time, be furnished to Government, and should the local Officers foresee any difficulty as likely to arise, they should at once report it.

GENERAL ORDERS

BY HIS EXCELLENCY THE HONORABLE THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

No. 222 of 1862.—The appointment of Lieut. A. Phillips, late of the 29th Regt. N. I., to the Staff Corps, announced in G. O. No. 701, dated 21st December 1861, is cancelled.

No. 223 of 1862.—The following General Order by the Government of India, dated 7th March 1862, No. 260, is republished :—

"In substitution of the Royal Warrant published in Government General Order, No. 29, of the 10th January 1862, the following paragraphs of a Military Letter from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for India, No. 17, of the 23rd January 1862, and the Royal Warrant therein referred to, are published in General Orders :—

1. 'With reference to my Despatch No. 462, of the 30th November 1861, with which I forwarded copies of a Royal Warrant, dated 30th October 1861 (War Office Circular, No. 722), modifying the conditions of the re-enlistment of discharged Limited Service Soldiers, and in which I requested that its provisions might be made applicable to India, I now transmit copies of a Royal Warrant which bears the same number and date as the one above alluded to, and which has been issued in substitution of it.

2. 'You will accordingly cancel the Royal Warrant which accompanied my Despatch of the 30th November last, and give effect to the one now sent.

3. 'In this Warrant you will observe, amongst other alterations and additions, that Limited Service Soldiers who may have already taken their discharges prior to the publication of the Warrant, and who shall re-engage subsequently to such publication, will be allowed, in conformity with the Regulations in force at the time of their discharge, the whole of their previous service towards pension, provided they re-engage within two years from date of discharge, and are specially recommended for this indulgence after not less than six months' renewed service.'

This Warrant and Regulations are to be substituted for those previously issued of the same number and date, which are hereby cancelled.

Whereas it has been represented to us that it is expedient to cancel that part of the 27th Clause of the Pension Regulations in Our Royal Warrant of the 1st July 1848, which prescribes the conditions under which a discharged Limited Service Soldier shall be permitted, on re-enlistment, to reckon his former service; Our will and pleasure is that, instead of the before-mentioned conditions, which are hereby cancelled, any Soldier who has been, or shall hereafter be, enlisted for Limited Service, and shall hereafter be discharged before or after the expiration of the first period of service, and shall be permitted to re-engage or again enlist within twelve months from the date of his discharge, shall be allowed, under Clauses 4 and 5 of the Regulations and restrictions hereunto annexed, or such others as shall from time to time be established by Our Secretary of State for War, and the General Commanding in Chief of Our Army, to reckon half the period of his former service towards his future claim to Pension.

REGULATIONS TO BE ANNEXED TO THE ROYAL WARRANT OF 30TH OCTOBER 1861. CIRCULAR NO. 722.

1. With a view to give full effect to the provisions of the Limited Enlistment Act, and at the same time to hold out every encouragement to time expired Soldiers of good character to continue in the Service, it is hereby notified that, in addition to the privilege of being permitted, on re-engagement, to count the full period of their first term of service towards increase of Good Conduct Pay, and to Pension on discharge, and of receiving a fresh Bounty, as well as the regulated allowance in lieu of a free kit, and an allowance of One Shilling a day for twenty days; men who re-engage at the Head Quarters of their Regiment for a second term of service, will be granted a furlough, if serving at Home, for a period of two months; commencing from the date of re-engagement; and if serving at either of the Stations named in the margin, will be provided with a free passage to this country at a convenient opportunity, at the discretion of the Commanding Officer, and a furlough for two months, commencing from the date of their arrival in the United Kingdom. They will also be provided with a free passage back to their Regiments, unless directed to join the Depôts thereof at the termination of their furloughs.

2. Soldiers, who at the time of their re-engagement may be serving in India, China, Ceylon, the Mauritius, Australia, or New Zealand will be allowed £5, and those serving in Canada, at the Cape of Good Hope, at St. Helena, and in the West Indies £3, in addition to the usual Bounty, as an equivalent for the furlough granted to re-engaged men serving at other Foreign Stations and at Home.

3. The Secretary of State also deems it expedient to point out that, although the re-enlistment of Limited Service Soldiers at any period within two years from date of discharge has been especially permitted under Clause 27 of the Pension Regulations in the Royal Warrant of the 1st July 1848, the Limited Enlistment Act does not contemplate such a proceeding; it is therefore to be understood that the system which has hitherto prevailed will be discontinued (except as specially provided in Clause 6), and in lieu thereof the following will be adopted, viz. :—

4. Soldiers who may hereafter be discharged after the completion of the first term of Limited Service will, if of good character, and in possession at the time of their discharge of a Good Conduct Badge or Badges, be permitted, as an indulgence, to re-engage within twelve months from the date of their discharge, provided those who had previously served in the Infantry are not above thirty-two years of age, and those in the Cavalry, Artillery, and Engineers not above thirty-four years of age at the time of their re-engagement; but men re-engaging under this arrangement will only be allowed to count half the period of their former service towards claims to Pensions, and must be recommended for that indulgence by their Commanding Officers on account of good conduct at the expiration of one year from date of re-engagement; they must also at the time of re-engagement declare the period of their former service, and cause of discharge from their last Corps. They will, however, be allowed to reckon the whole of their previous service towards Good Conduct Pay, but will be required to serve for one year with uninterrupted good conduct from date of re-engagement before they can be permitted to resume their previous Good Conduct Badges, when they will, on the recommendation of their Commanding Officers, be entitled to receive Good Conduct Pay from the date of their re-engagement.

5. Soldiers of good character who may hereafter be discharged, on reduction or on account of disability, or by purchase, &c., during the first term of Limited Service, and who may again enlist within twelve months from the date of discharge, will be allowed the benefit of the preceding provision for reckoning former service, and resuming former Good Conduct Pay.

6. Limited Service Soldiers, who may have already taken their discharges prior to the publication of the Warrant hereto annexed, and shall re-engage subsequently to such publication, will be allowed, in conformity with the Regulations in force at the time of their discharge, the whole of previous service towards pension, provided they re-engage within two years from date of discharge, and are specially recommended for this indulgence after not less than six months' renewed service.

"In continuation of Government General Order, No. 125, of the 4th February 1862, His Excellency the Governor General in Council is pleased to publish, for general information, the following observations by the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for India on Answers given by the Government of India to Questions connected with the late changes in the Indian Army, and published in Government General Order, No. 913, of the 11th October 1861:—

Suppose, under the circumstances, he was obliged to spend eighteen months at home, would all in excess of two years count against him for his promotion to a Majority? If it would not count against him for promotion, what is intended by the term 'authorised leave'?	114. No leave, except privilege leave, is to reckon towards promotion, except in the case of Lieutenant Colonels. See Despatch from Secretary of State, No. 315, published in General Order, No. 824, dated 17th September 1861. The Answer to Question 83, in which these words occur, has been cancelled by the Despatch above quoted.	114. If the question alludes to the time reckoned as Staff Service for promotion, the reply is correct.
118. By Government General Order, No. 332, there is no rank recognized in the Staff Corps between that of General Officer on Rupees 1,295 a month and Lieutenant Colonel on Rupees 827-14, but that of Brevet Colonel, the pay of which is the same as that of Lieutenant Colonel. The Bombay Government ask whether an Officer of the Staff Corps, not being a General Officer, on obtaining the Colonel's allowance would receive only Lieutenant Colonel's pay, with Colonel's allowance, or Colonel's pay as well as allowance, notwithstanding that there is no substantive rank of Colonel in the Staff Corps?	118. No instructions have been received from the Secretary of State respecting Colonel's allowances in the Staff Corps.	118. An Officer of the Staff Corps not being a General Officer, on obtaining Colonel's allowance, would receive Lieutenant Colonel's pay with the Colonel's allowance.

No. 225 of 1862.—The following General Order by the Government of India, dated 10th March 1862, No. 267, is republished :—

"The following paragraphs of a Military Letter from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for India, No. 1 of the 9th January 1862, are published for general information :—

'PARAGRAPH 18.—I have already expressed my approval of your decision that Officers above the rank of Subaltern shall not be eligible for appointments on the Regimental Staff. Those Officers, therefore, who elected to join the Staff Corps while holding Regimental Staff appointments, and who attained to the rank of Captain on so joining must be called upon to vacate those appointments.

19. With respect, however, to all such Officers as, being similarly situated, have not attained to the rank of Captain, I regret to be under the necessity of requesting that the General Order by the Madras Government, No. 363 of 18th October 1861, may be cancelled, and that, in the event of these Officers' services being required by the Commander in Chief for that purpose, they may be permitted to retain their appointments, but such Officers will vacate their position on the Regimental Staff on attaining the rank of Captain.

20. A consideration of what is due to the interests of the Public Service, no less than to the Officers themselves, has led me to this decision; but at the same time I desire that it may be distinctly understood, not only that all Officers of the Indian Army who remain with their Regiments have an equal claim to Staff employment with Officers of the Staff Corps, but also, that so long as any Subaltern belonging under the regular system to the several Regiments remain with those Regiments they should be understood to have, on all occasions of future vacancies among the Regimental Staff, the same amount of prior claim to such appointments as they have hitherto been allowed to possess.

21. In such cases the nomination to Regimental Staff Appointments will rest as heretofore with the Commander in Chief who, should he find it necessary to appoint an Officer of the Staff Corps, will apply to the Government for his services, should those services not be already at his disposal.'

REGULATIONS.

1. The existing General Officers of either Army shall continue, as at present, on separate lists.
2. All Colonels of either Army who attained that rank prior to the 17th February 1861 shall be continued on separate lists as at present, and shall succeed on separate lists to the rank of Major-General, Lieutenant-General, and General, under the Regulations now in force for each Army respectively; but if all the Colonels on one of the separate lists shall have become Major-Generals, while some of the Colonels on the other separate list are still unpromoted, those Colonels shall have the benefit of vacancies occurring in the lists of Generals of either Army, and Colonels so promoted shall be placed on an amalgamated list of Major-Generals, from which promotion shall be made by seniority in succession to all vacancies in the higher grades, whether of the British or Indian Service.
3. All Officers in either Army who shall have attained the rank of Colonel on or after the 17th day of February 1861, shall at once be placed according to the dates of their commissions, as Colonels on one general list, from which, so soon as the separate lists of Colonels are exhausted, promotion shall be made according to seniority in succession to all vacancies in the establishments of General Officers, whether of the British or the Indian Service, and Colonels so promoted shall enter upon the amalgamated list above provided, from which promotion shall be made by seniority in succession to all vacancies in the higher grades, whether of the British or Indian Service.
4. All promotions in the lower grades, in consequence of vacancies amongst General Officers, shall, until the general fusion hereinafter provided, fall in each case to that service to which the Officer creating the vacancy belonged; and such promotions shall be made under the Regulations now in force in either service.
5. When all the Colonels on the separate list of the Cavalry, Guards, and Line, of the British Army, and on that of the Indian Army, shall have become Major-Generals, the whole of the Field Officers including those of the Artillery and Engineers of both Armies, as well as Field Officers of the Royal Marines, shall be placed on one general list, from which all promotions shall be made up to the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel inclusive, in succession to vacancies on the General Officers' list; and from that time the senior Captain of the United Army and Royal Marines shall succeed to a Brevet Majority, under the 15th Clause of the Warrant of the 14th October 1858.
6. Promotion to the rank of General Officer in the Royal Artillery and Royal Engineers will continue to be carried on under the Regulations now in force, until all the Colonels of Artillery and Engineers, as the case may be, on the separate list of the Indian Armies, shall have become Major-Generals; then the General Officers of the Artillery of the Indian Army shall be amalgamated with those of the Royal Artillery; and in like manner, the General Officers of the Engineers of the Indian Army, with those of the Royal Engineers; promotions to the rank of General Officer in the Ordnance Corps being made subsequently to their respective amalgamations from one list of Colonels of the Royal and Indian Artillery, and from one list of Colonels of the Royal and Indian Engineers.

7. The present Establishment of General Officers of Her Majesty's Indian Artillery and Engineers was fixed at the rate of one Officer for each Battalion,* but as these Corps are now being incorporated with the Royal Artillery and Engineers respectively, it is necessary that the proportion of Generals to combatant Officers, adopted for Her Majesty's Forces, should be extended to the Brigades and Battalions now being added to the Artillery and Engineers respectively. Eventually, therefore, the Establishment of General Officers of the Brigades and Battalions now being transferred from the Indian Service will be fixed at twenty-six for the Artillery and twelve for the Engineers respectively.†

8. If at the time of the amalgamation of the General Officers of Artillery and Engineers provided in the 5th paragraph of this Warrant there shall be more General Officers of the Indian Artillery or Engineers than the proportion fixed as their Establishment, viz., twenty-six for the Artillery and twelve for the Engineers (a circumstance which might arise, from all promotions to the rank of General Officer in the Indian Service being now made on one general list, which includes Officers of all branches of the Service), the excess shall be absorbed before a Colonel of the branch concerned can be promoted. Or, if there be less than the established number, promotions shall be made to supply the deficiency from the general lists above mentioned, of Colonels of Royal and Indian Artillery and Engineers respectively.

9. Upon the transfer of the present twelve Regiments of European Cavalry and Infantry of the Indian Army to the British Army, a like number of General Officers will be taken off the Indian Establishment, and will, as Colonels of such Regiments, be transferred, according to the dates of their commissions, to the fixed Establishment of General Officers of the British Army.

But as the number (12) of General Officers thus brought from the Indian Establishment is less than the proportion (15) of General Officers due to the number of combatant Officers belonging to the transferred Regiments, an addition of three General Officers shall, on this account, be made to the unattached list of the British Army at the time referred to in paragraph 8 of this Warrant.

And in making these additions to the list of General Officers, the proportions of the different grades of General Officers now on the Establishment of the British Army shall be maintained.

10. The Field Officers coming to the British Army with these Regiments shall take their position on the general list of Field Officers, according to the date of their Army rank, by which their future promotion shall be governed.

11. The amalgamation of the Lists of General Officers, in accordance with these provisions, will in no wise affect the system which regulates the succession to the Colonelcies of Regiments of the British Army, or to the Colonels' allowances of Her Majesty's Indian Forces.

12. The present Establishment of General Officers of the Indian Army, inclusive of Artillery and Engineers, consists of twenty-five Generals, fifty Lieutenant-Generals, 145 Major-Generals, which numbers are, however, liable to reduction.

But the proportion of Generals maintained on account of the Indian Establishment shall at all times be governed by the principles adopted in respect to the British Forces, both as to numbers and gradation.

And reductions shall be made by gradual absorption, and by the promotion of not less than one Colonel for three vacancies amongst General Officers, until Supernumeraries are exhausted.

No. 239 of 1862.—The following General Order by the Government of India, dated 20th March 1862, No. 329, is republished:—

"His Excellency the Governor General in Council is pleased to observe that, before the revision of the pay of European Soldiers in 1840, European Non-Commissioned Officers on detached Staff employ in the Bengal Presidency received dry Batta at Rupees (10) ten per mensem, from which they provided their own rations.

2. On the revision of pay by Government General Order No. 146, dated 8th July 1840, the sum of (Rs. 1-9-10) one Rupee, nine annas and ten pie in Garrison, and Rupees (3-2-8) three, two annas, and eight pie per mensem on the Field Scale, was added to the pay of the European Soldiers of all ranks. This addition having been made applicable to those on Staff employ, a corresponding deduction, viz., of Rupees (3-2-8) three, two annas, and eight pie, was made from their dry batta, thus reducing it from Rupees (10) ten to Rupees (6-13-4) six, thirteen annas, and four pie per month.

3. It was subsequently ordered by Government General Order No. 59 of 17th March 1843, that as the pay of European Non-Commissioned Officers and Privates, whether on Staff employ or on Regimental duty, was uniform, so those on Staff employ should receive as dry batta no more than the equivalent for the sum of (5) five pence per diem, which is stopped for rations from the pay of the Soldier doing Regimental duty. The dry batta of European Non-Commissioned Officers and Privates on Staff employ was accordingly fixed by Government General Order of 17th March 1843, No. 59, at Rupees (6-5-4) six, five annas, and four pie per mensem, and it still continues at that rate.

4. It is known, however, owing to the additions made to the Soldiers' ration by General Order by the Governor General, No. 876, dated 28th October 1853, that the monthly cost of the Soldier's ration exceeds Rupees (6-5-4) six, five annas, and four pie even at the wholesale prices at which the articles of the ration are obtained by the Commissariat, and that the Soldier on detached employ cannot provide his food on that allowance.

5. It is ruled accordingly that European Non-Commissioned Officers, Corporals, and Privates on detached Staff employ, or serving in situations where they are not rationed by the Commissariat, shall, if not drawing consolidated salaries, be allowed dry batta at Rupees (10) ten, instead of Rupees (6-5-4) six, five annas, and four pie per mensem.

6. This indulgence is conceded to all who receive Military pay and dry batta.

No. 240 of 1862.—The following General Order by the Government of India, dated 20th March 1862, No. 342, is republished:—

"The Right Honorable the Governor General in Council is pleased, with the view of payments of Prize Money being made in England, concurrently with payments in India, to lay down the following Rules:—

1. That no Officer or Soldier shall receive his share in England so long as the Head Quarters of his Regiment shall be in India unless he produce a Certificate, in the case of an Officer, showing that his share has not been paid in India; or unless his name, in the case of a Non-Commissioned Officer or Soldier, be found on a Roll of unpaid shares forwarded from India.

II. That, on the embarkation of the Head-Quarters of any Regiment or Battery from India, payments in India shall cease; Nominal Rolls shall be forwarded to England, and thenceforward no payment shall be made in India to Officers or Soldiers of that Regiment or Battery, but upon the production of Certificates that their shares have not been, and will not be, paid in England.

III. With regard, however, to Corps already proceeded to England which, before embarkation, drew Prize Money for all except Volunteers to other Regiments in India, the foregoing Clause shall be in abeyance for two months from this date; claims on behalf of the Volunteers are to be submitted within that period by the Officers of the Corps which the Volunteers have joined.

IV. As regards Corps proceeded to England with or without having drawn Prize Money, and in which Corps Officers have assigned their shares to individuals residing in India, the shares in question will cease to be payable in India on the expiration of two months from this date, at the end of which period, if not claimed in this country by that time, they will be included in a List of unpaid shares for transmission to England. The same rule will apply to Officers of Regiments in India who have left the country, but have assigned their shares to individuals residing in India.

V. In all cases of deceased Officers and Soldiers who have left no representative in India, as also of Soldiers who returned to England prior to the commencement of distribution, and of Officers who similarly returned without having assigned their shares in India, the fact of their decease or of their having so returned, is to be notified in a complete copy of the Prize Rolls to be forwarded by the General Prize Committee to the Commissioners of Chelsea Hospital.

VI. In the case of Regiments which returned to England prior to the commencement of distribution similar complete Rolls will be sent to India. These Rolls will specify in every case whether the shares are to be paid in India, or by the Commissioners of Chelsea Hospital in England.

2. To enable the General Prize Committee to send to the Home Authorities the List of all unpaid shares, including those of men of both Line and Local Forces who may leave India while the distribution is being made without having received their shares of Prizes, Officers Commanding Regiments and Batteries are requested to send to the said Committee within a fortnight of the receipt of this Order, Prize Lists of Non-Commissioned Officers and men invalided and discharged and sent to England, and of deceased men who have left no heirs in India, and whose Estates have been sent to England.

Medical Practitioners particularly, are requested to aid the registration. Blank forms of Death Reports, to keep by them in readiness, are given gratuitously on application at the Office of the Deputy Commissioner of Police.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind, that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all single cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.

The following Extract from a Report of a recent Survey of the Cocos Islands by Lieutenant JACK-

son, I. N., Commander of the Bengal Government S. V. "Krishna," is published for general information:—

'On the morning of the 16th I hove to off Narcondam Island, with the peak bearing north (true) by azimuth, and observed its longitude west of Fort Cornwallis Flagstaff, Penang, $6^{\circ}02'48''$, and its latitude deduced from observation at noon by means of two patent log distances, $13^{\circ}27'00''$ north. The height above the level of the sea being 2,150 feet, and the variation 3° easterly.

From the above observations I find that Narcondam is placed about fourteen miles too far north in the Chart of the Bay of Bengal, published by Messrs. Allen and Company in London, 8th September 1857. This is obviously an oversight, as the latitude here given agrees with that of former observers.'
