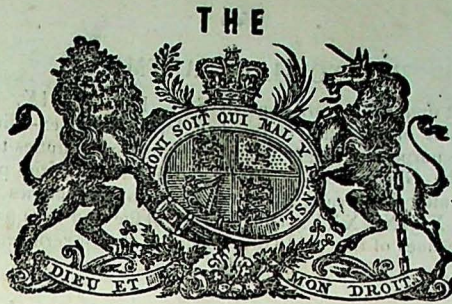

Fort William, Council Chamber, the 17th April 1862.

SIR,—I am directed to acknowledge the receipt of your letter No. 125, of the 29th January last, in which you raise the following questions regarding cases where the preparatory leave granted to Officers who obtain leave to proceed to Europe on medical certificate is exceeded:—

- I. Is the Officer entitled to any and what pay for the time intervening between the expiry of his preparatory leave and the date of embarkation?
 - II. Has the Officer the option, if so disposed, of reckoning his sick leave from date of expiry of preparatory leave instead of from date of embarkation?
2. I am desired to inform you, in reply to the first question, that, under the circumstances supposed, an Officer is entitled to no pay; and with reference to the second, that there is no option, but that every special case of this description might be considered on its merits.

The following Extract from the Proceedings of the Government of India, in the Financial Department, dated 15th March 1862, No. 2231, is published for general information:—

RESOLUTION.—Mr. A. G. Crommelin, an uncovenanted Officer of the Public Works Department, holding the appointment of Executive Engineer on the Barce Doab Canal, obtained leave to Europe on medical certificate under an order of this Government, dated the 12th December 1858, and reported his departure from India on the 7th March 1859. While in England he was allowed extensions of leave by instalments for another year, which carried his leave up to the 7th March 1861. But having, with the permission of the Secretary of State, left England to return to India *via* Bombay by a Steamer of the 12th February 1861, he did not arrive in Bombay till the 15th March following, i.e. eight days after

the expiration of his leave. By an order of the Government of the Punjab, dated the 25th April 1861, which was subsequently confirmed by this Government, he was appointed to officiate as Controller and Examiner of Public Works Accounts in the Punjab, and he reported his arrival at Lahore on the 27th April 1861.

The Public Works Department, in reporting these circumstances in May last, inquired whether special leave on one-third allowances could be granted to Mr. Crommelin for the period occupied in travelling from Bombay to Lahore, and was informed in reply that as Mr. Crommelin had exceeded the leave granted to him under Section V. of the Absentee Rules of the Uncovenanted Service, he was "not entitled to any special leave that would carry allowances with it."

Mr. Crommelin now inquires whether the period between his landing at Bombay and arriving at Lahore (viz. from the 15th March to the 27th April 1861) may be allowed to count for pension, and solicits orders as to whether any retrenchment should be made in the case of Mr. Purdon, another uncovenanted Officer of the Public Works Department in the Punjab, who, with the sanction of the Secretary of State, exceeded his sick leave for two years by two months, and was allowed special leave to rejoin his appointment for two months more, during which he received half salary.

The Public Works Department, in referring Mr. Crommelin's inquiry for consideration and orders, raises the following general questions connected with the grant of leave of absence to Uncovenanted Servants:—

1. To what allowances is an absentee entitled during the third year of sick leave?

"During one year of the entire period of absence under this rule the absentee will be subjected to a deduction of one-half, and during the remainder to a deduction of two-thirds of his allowances, provided, however, that he shall in no case draw a larger sum than Rupees 6,000 (£600) per annum."

2. What is the correct construction of the passage in the Resolution passed in this Department, on the 14th October 1857, declaring that an absentee on special leave is entitled to the rates of allowances granted under Clause 3 of Section 5 of the Absentee Rules (cited in the margin)?

3. Is the permission given to an Uncovenanted Officer by the Secretary of State to return to his duty a mere formality, or does it entitle him to retain his appointment if he exceeds his leave; and, in the latter case, does the excess and the time occupied in joining count towards pension?

The Civil Paymaster, Fort William, whose opinion on the subject was called for, replies in regard to the case of Mr. Crommelin, that "when an Uncovenanted Officer forfeits his appointment by over-staying his leave, he is not entitled to special leave, inasmuch as he has no appointment to join, consequently the period intervening between the date of Mr. Crommelin's return to Bombay and that of his assuming charge of his office at the Punjab cannot count as service qualifying for pension."

With reference to the first and second questions raised by the Public Works Department, the Civil Paymaster reports that an absentee during the third year of sick leave is entitled to one-third of his salary, and during special leave to one-third or one-half, according as the period of his absence on sick leave shall or shall not have exceeded twelve months; and that it is therefore necessary to recover from Mr. Purdon the difference between half and one-third of his salary during the period of his special leave.

His Excellency the Governor General in Council concurs in the views of the Civil Paymaster, and observes, with regard to the third point referred for consideration by the Public Works Department, that the question whether an Uncovenanted Servant, who has the permission of the Secretary of State to return to his duty, is entitled to retain his appointment, depends on the circumstances under which that permission was given. If an officer merely applies to be allowed to return to his duty on a particular Steamer without explaining that his leave will expire before he can reach India, the permission of the Secretary of State (which would then be given as a matter of course) cannot be held to imply that it was intended he should retain his appointment contrary to the letter of the rules; but if, on the other hand, the officer explains to the Secretary of State that his leave will be exceeded, it may fairly be inferred that it was intended that his claim to his appointment should not be forfeited, and in this case he might be held to be entitled to special leave, and to count such special leave as service qualifying for pension. Every case, however, must be considered on its merits. No general ruling can be passed.

Ordered that a copy of the foregoing Resolution be forwarded to the Public Works Department for information and further orders, and that the original papers received from that Department, with Memorandum No. 80, dated the 7th January 1862, be returned,—copies being kept in this office for record.

ISSUED BY THE INCOME TAX COMMISSIONERS OF THE TOWN AND ISLAND OF BOMBAY UNDER ACT XXXII. OF 1860, SECTION XXXVII.

INCOME TAX

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31st JULY 1862.

Notice is hereby given, that every person within the Town and Island of Bombay, who, by the Act XXXII. of 1860, for imposing Duties on Profits arising from Property, Professions, Trades, and Offices, is liable to the said Duties, and to return his or her Profits or Income, is hereby required to fill in a Return of his or her Profits and Income in the prescribed Form (B), and to transmit such Return, duly signed with the Declaration prescribed by the Act, to the Assessors of the Town and Island of Bombay aforesaid, at their respective Offices within 15 days from the date of the delivery of the special Notice, under the Penalties contained in the said Act.

Persons requiring Forms of Returns can procure them at the Office of the Assessors. Forms of such Returns will also be left at the usual place of Residence or Business of every person known or considered to be liable to the Duties imposed by the said Act. But any person liable to the said Duties, who may not receive such Forms, must apply for the same at the Office of any of the Assessors.

SIR,—It has been brought to the notice of His Excellency the Governor General in Council, that there prevails a very objectionable practice among the District Treasury Officers of the Punjab, of making payments on account of salaries prior to audit, and on insufficient authority, and that although a prohibitory circular was issued by the Deputy Auditor and Accountant General enjoining its discontinuance, such advances still continue to be made.

2. Under these circumstances, His Excellency in Council considers it absolutely necessary to rule that advances of this description shall not be made except in cases of real and great emergency, which must be immediately reported to the Government of India, in this Department.

Vernacular Class in the Grant Medical College.

An Examination for Admission into the Vernacular Class will be held at the Grant Medical College, at 11 A. M., on the 7th June next.

2. Candidates must be between the ages of 15 and 20 years, and physically fit for the duties of a Soldier.

3. They must possess a knowledge of the Marathi language in the Balbodh and Modi characters, sufficient to enable them to read and write letters and petitions, but a preference will be given to those who possess a competent knowledge of English.

4. No Candidate will be admitted who cannot produce a Certificate from a person of respectability, of character and conduct.

5. All students admitted must, as a condition of their appointment, reside, if required, within the College premises.

6. Students while at the College will receive the pay of First Grade Native Apprentices, viz. Rupees (8) eight per mensem.

7. They will remain in the College for three years, and, after successfully passing their examination, will be appointed Second Hospital Assistants.

8. All Native Apprentices now in the Service, whose acquirements may entitle them to appear at the Examination, and who may desire to be examined, will be admitted to examination, and preference will be given to them over other Candidates.

9. The power of dismissal for misconduct or incompetence is vested in the Principal of the College. A report of the dismissal of any Student will, however, be made to the Principal Inspector General.

10. The final Examination of Students of the Vernacular Class will be conducted by the Principal and Professors.

1st.—It is the duty of an Officer before leaving India to obtain his last Pay Certificate; he should therefore at the time of applying for leave address the Deputy Pay Master in whose Circle of payment he may be, with a request that his accounts may be adjusted, and at the port of embarkation he should apply at the Pay Office for a last Pay Certificate. In the event of his not being able from any cause to obtain this Certificate, he should address the Military Accountant on the subject, and that Officer will investigate the circumstances of the case and submit a Report thereon to the Military Finance Department for transmission to Government.

2nd.—In cases in which Officers return Home "for residue of Furlough," the period remaining unexpired should be stated in their papers by the Pay Department.

3rd.—The Right Honorable the Secretary of State for India having observed, in his letter No. 497, dated the 31st December 1861, paragraph 10, that 'the final settlement of all pay and allowances issued to an Officer prior to his quitting India, whether in an advance or otherwise, is invariably left to the Authorities in India,' it will not be necessary for the Officers of the Pay Department in future to call upon Officers on Furlough in England, who, on promotion, may apply to India for an adjustment of pay (for the period issued to them prior to their leaving this country) to furnish a Certificate under the signature of the Authorities at the India Office to the effect that no such adjustment has been made by them.

4th.—This Order is applicable to the three Presidencies, and will have effect from this date.

"The Secretary of State for War having decided that, under Clause 5 of the Good Conduct Warrant, Soldiers who have completed 16, 21, and 28 years' service, and whose names have not been entered in the Regimental Defaulters' Book for the last 14 years preceding their claim, are entitled to receive at once the rates of Good Conduct Pay granted after 18, 23, and 28 years' service, respectively. I have no objection to this interpretation of the Warrant being made applicable to the Troops in India, and request that the necessary instructions may be issued accordingly.

No. 322 of 1862.—The following G. O. by the Government of India, dated 22nd April 1862, No. 456, is republished:—

"Hitherto, on a British Regiment in the Bengal Presidency leaving India, the Pay Master has been allowed to remain in India for one month after departure of his Corps, in order to settle his accounts, and for the whole of that period, if not embarking before its expiration, he has retained Indian Allowances.

2. This indulgence was necessary while British Corps throughout the Bengal Presidency were paid by advances issued from the Presidency Pay Office, a system which led to open accounts.

3. In future, however, the detention of the Pay Master will not usually be necessary, consequent on British Regiments being now paid through Divisional Pay Masters, whereby the advances taken up for the issue of Pay to Soldiers for the current month are settled on the presentation of the Abstracts on the first day of the month following, and open accounts are not allowed to exist.

4. The period for a Pay Master to settle his accounts is accordingly restricted to one week, or to the first departure of a Mail Steamer on or after expiration of that week. Permission to remain in India, or draw Indian Allowances, for a longer period, will only be granted when reasonable cause can be shown, and on special application in each case. The Controller of Military Finance in submitting the request will explain fully the progress made by the Examiners in auditing the accounts, as also the state of the Pay Master's transactions.

N.B.—This table is an extract from a more extensive yearly Return that is prepared for statistical purposes, and chiefly for the detection of any removable sources of disease, with a view to improving the healthiness of the Island. As the principal object cannot be fully attained unless the true causes of death be recorded, persons of all stations are requested, in each case of death occurring in their circle, to obtain, in writing, from the Medical Attendants the name of the fatal disease, that it may be delivered to the Policeman at the funeral place. Medical Practitioners particularly, are requested to aid the registration. Blank forms of Death Reports, to keep by them in readiness, are given gratuitously on application at the Office of the Deputy Commissioner of Police.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind, that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all single cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.

“Note.—The above Charges were defrayed from the permanent advance of Rupees I hold for the purpose of paying such Charges.”
