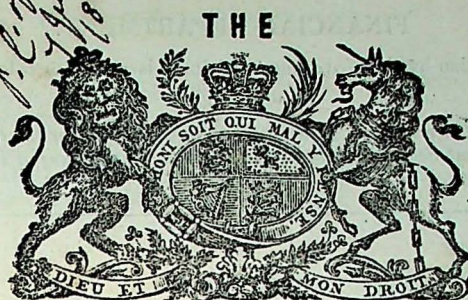

General Notice

ISSUED BY THE INCOME TAX COMMISSIONERS OF THE TOWN AND ISLAND OF BOMBAY UNDER ACT XXXII. OF 1860, SECTION XXXVII.

INCOME TAX

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31st JULY 1862.

Notice is hereby given, that every person within the Town and Island of Bombay, who, by the Act XXXII. of 1860, for imposing Duties on Profits arising from Property, Professions, Trades, and Offices, is liable to the said Duties, and to return his or her Profits or Income, is hereby required to fill in a Return of his or her Profits and Income in the prescribed Form (B), and to transmit such Return, duly signed with the Declaration prescribed by the Act, to the Assessors of the Town and Island of Bombay aforesaid, at their respective Offices within 15 days from the date of the delivery of the special Notice, under the Penalties contained in the said Act.

Persons requiring Forms of Returns can procure them at the Office of the Assessors. Forms of such Returns will also be left at the usual place of Residence or Business of every person known or considered to be liable to the Duties imposed by the said Act. But any person liable to the said Duties, who may not receive such Forms, must apply for the same at the Office of any of the Assessors.

EDUCATIONAL DEPARTMENT.

The Director of Public Instruction requests that, in order to prevent disappointment, Native Authors and Translators will give him the earliest intimation, with full particulars, of any Work for which Governmental patronage is to be solicited. At present it happens sometimes that a person commences the translation of a book in ignorance that the same work has been already taken up by some one else.

The Director of Public Instruction further wishes to check the inconsiderate publication of new elementary school-books, especially in Mathematics, which are not likely to supersede the excellent text-books now in use. He would suggest that other classes of literature may be more usefully taken up, such as standard works of History, Biography, and General Literature; books of reference on a complete scale in various branches of knowledge, especially such as are not likely to become soon obsolete. Works of fiction, poetry, dramatic literature, and generally such publications as are likely to command numerous readers, will be looked upon with as much favour as books designed to inform or instruct; indeed, they will be even more welcome.

GENERAL ORDERS

BY HIS EXCELLENCY THE HONORABLE THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

MILITARY DEPARTMENT.

No. 352 of 1862.—In consequence of the transfer of the business connected with the Assets of deceased Officers, and Men, from the late Sub-Treasurer to the Presidency Paymaster, it is hereby notified for general information, that communications on subjects relating thereto which, under the former system, would be addressed to the Sub-Treasurer, should be addressed to the Presidency Paymaster.

References in regard to deposits made prior to the 1st March 1862, should be addressed to the Deputy Auditor and Accountant General, Bombay.

No. 353 of 1862.—The following Orders by the Government of India are republished for observance under this Presidency:—

"No. 10257.

Extract from the Proceedings of the Government of India, in the Financial Department, under date the 19th August 1861.

Read again from the Chief Secretary to the Government of Fort St. George, No. 201, dated 20th April 1861, with enclosures.

Read again report by the Auditor General of India, No. 170, dated 13th May 1861.

Read again letter of this Department to the Government of Fort St. George, No. 8204, dated 19th June 1861.

Read communication from the Military Finance Department, No. 542 A, dated 2nd August 1861.

Read a further communication from the Military Finance Department, No. 596 A, dated 8th August 1861.

Resolution.—The Accountant General to the Government of Madras suggested that the expenditure incurred by the Commissariat Department of that Presidency on account of supplies for the Civil Department should cease to be incurred through that Department, and that all Civil Officers who received such supplies should obtain them in the market.

The Government of Fort St. George adopted this suggestion, and requested that arrangements might be made for the supply of stores to the Civil Departments subordinate to this Government, which heretofore obtained their supplies through the Madras Commissariat.

The Auditor General of India, to whom this proposal was referred for report, remarked that the only arrangements which appeared to be necessary for carrying out the suggestion of the Accountant General, Madras, were the issue of orders to the heads of all the Departments concerned, to the effect that in future stores should be procured from the market, or, if to the advantage of Government, through the Madras Commissariat on the usual indents, but that in either case cash must be paid for the supplies.

A copy of this report was sent to the Government of Fort St. George in reply to their communication on the subject, with an intimation that the Auditor General had been requested to issue the necessary orders to the heads of all Departments as suggested by him, and the Madras Government was asked to issue the necessary instructions in respect to the places and departments in the Madras circle.

With reference to this letter to the Madras Government, the Military Finance Department, to whom a Copy thereof was sent for information, advises that orders be issued regarding the supply of stores to the Steamers at Maulmein, to the Alguna Reef Light House, to the Steamers at Rangoon, to the Flotilla at Thyet Myo, and also to the Ecclesiastical Department, Rangoon.

The Military Finance Department also inquire whether that Department shall give orders as to the supplies to the Nagpore Irregular Force.

In a subsequent letter, the Military Finance Department also advise, with reference to the Notification of the Deputy Auditor and Accountant General, Bengal, published at page 2350 of the *Gazette* of the 3rd instant, regarding the payment for stores obtained from the Madras Commissariat, that the rule be made general for all India, and not special, as at present, for Madras.

This last recommendation of the Military Finance Department His Excellency the Governor General in Council understands to be, that the rule laid down that stores be paid for in cash, be made general for all India without reference to the source through which they are procured, the object being that by compelling cash payments, which must necessarily be made by a Civil or Military Authority the transaction comes directly under the review of the controlling Officer of the Service to which it relates, and with this view, His Excellency in Council is pleased to sanction its adoption for all India. It is not intended, His Excellency in Council remarks, that these arrangements shall necessarily involve a change in the source of supply of stores in all cases. They are simply that stores provided through the existing sources of supply must be paid for in cash, and that these sources need not be resorted to when it is not clearly to the advantage of Government, and certainly not when stores can be procured in the market upon advantageous terms.

In order to introduce the system of cash payments, as adverted to above, all over India, His Excellency the Governor General in Council desires that the chiefs, Civil and Military Departments, be respectively requested to issue the necessary orders on the subject.

With reference to the inquiry of the Military Finance Department as to whether that Department shall give orders as to the supplies to the Nagpore Irregular Force, His Excellency in Council remarks that as these supplies are now treated as Military charges, it clearly falls within the jurisdiction of the Military Finance Department to issue the necessary instructions regarding them.

Order.—Ordered that copies of this Resolution be sent to the Auditor General of India and the Military Finance Department, with a request that they will take measures for carrying out the proposal for the enforcement of cash payments, as noticed above, on account of supply of stores to the several Military and Civil Departments under their respective control.

No. 355 of 1862.—Referring to G. G. O. No. 452 of the 20th July 1860, Officers proceeding by the *Overland route* who may be entitled to free passage according to existing regulations will no longer be provided with passage tickets, but will draw the amount of passage-money charged by the Peninsular and Oriental Company for a first-class passage from Bombay to Southampton, and make their own arrangements for passage.

Officers are permitted to take whichever of the Overland routes they may find most convenient.

Officers entitled to free passage will be furnished, on application at the Quartermaster General's Office at the Presidency, with two certificates—one as a voucher for their passage-money, for presentation at the Pay Office, the other to be presented at the P. and O. Company's Office, stating that their passage-money is paid by Government. This will enable them to claim the extra baggage allowed to Government passengers by the new contract with the P. and O. Company.

The Cape passage-money rules for sick Officers remain for the present unaltered.

“The following Rule which has received the sanction of the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for India for calculating the service of Officers who, formerly under the Old Furlough Regulations, have joined the Staff Corps, and whose service from date of joining that Corps is to be reckoned under the New Furlough Regulations, is published for general information and guidance :—

- Officers having elected (or who not having before elected might, on their entering the Staff Corps, desire to elect.) the Old Furlough Regulations will carry with them into the Staff Corps so much of their service (authorised leave included) as may have been passed within Indian limits and no more. Before they can retire on the pension of any particular rank they will be required to serve for such further period as will, with that service, complete the full period prescribed for the pension of any particular rank, with the liberty of availing themselves, after their entry into the Staff Corps, of the privilege periods* of absence allowed by paragraph 30 of the New Furlough Regulations.

N.B.—This table is an extract from a more extensive yearly Return that is prepared for statistical purposes, and chiefly for the detection of any removable sources of disease, with a view to improving the healthiness of the Island. As the principal object cannot be fully attained unless the true causes of death be recorded, persons of all stations are requested, in each case of death occurring in their circle, to obtain, in writing, from the Medical Attendants the name of the fatal disease, that it may be delivered to the Policeman at the funeral place. Medical Practitioners particularly, are requested to aid the registration. Blank forms of Death Reports, to keep by them in readiness, are given gratuitously on application at the Office of the Deputy Commissioner of Police.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind, that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all single cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.

Express Mail.—The Public are informed that an "Express Overland Packet" will not in future be made up and despatched from Bombay in any direction on the arrival of the English Mail Steamer, arrangements having been made for forwarding all Overland Letters (including one copy of the Home News or Overland Mail for the different Presses) by an "Express Mail," which will travel at a rate nearly equal to that of the Express. Information of this arrangement has been communicated to Her Majesty's Post Master General, so that Express Postage may not be levied on letters or papers in future. As it occasionally occurs that Steamers arrive so close upon Train hours that it is not practicable to select the papers that belong properly to the Editors of Journals, it is recommended that such arrangements should be made by those who desire to have papers without fail as will ensure a copy of an Overland paper being posted at the Bombay Post Office in sufficient time for despatch by the Express Mail.

Refusal to pay Postage.—Many cases having recently occurred, in which parties have refused to pay Postage justly claimed by the Post Office, it is considered advisable to intimate to the Public that the Postal Authorities are authorised by Law (Section XXXVII. Act XVII. of 1854) to stop, without giving any intimation, the delivery of letters, packets, &c., to parties so refusing to pay Postage, and that the Law will be strictly adhered to.

Postage on Stamped Note Paper.—The following decision of the Director General, on the liability of Stamped Note Paper to be charged with Postage for overweight, is published for the guidance of Post Officers:—

"Unless there is an enclosure in the Letter, or it is in some way made unnecessarily heavy, no Letter written on Half-anna Stamped Note Paper should be charged with Postage on the ground of overweight."

Ceylon, Parcels to.—The Colonial Secretary of Ceylon having brought to the notice of the Supreme Government that Parcels are sent from India beyond the prescribed weight, Postal Subordinates are directed not to despatch, in future, by Dâk, any Parcel to that Colony weighing above 3 lbs.

Ceylon, Postage to, must be prepaid on Letters sent by land *viâ* Madras.

Promissory Notes, sent free under certain conditions. Notice is hereby given, that the Government of India has ruled that when Government Promissory Notes, belonging to private individuals in the Mofussil, are forwarded to the Office of the Accountant General to the Government of India for renewal or for enforcement of payment of interest, &c. through a Provincial Treasury Officer, and returned by the former Officer, the covers containing such Notes may be sent free of postage.

Bhangy Parcels.—The Director General has ordered that Bhangy Parcels should not be delivered if the addressee refuses to give a receipt for them.

Should any person obtain a Parcel, and subsequently refuse to give a receipt for it, it will be necessary to require a receipt before giving up any Parcel which may subsequently be received for that person. In such cases, a notice should be sent, informing the addressee that a Parcel has been received, which will be delivered to him, or to any person duly authorized to receive it, on a receipt being given in the Delivery Book.

Change of Residence.—In order to facilitate the delivery of letters, &c., parties arriving at and leaving Bombay are requested to send notice of their movements and whereabouts to the Bombay Post Office.

Changes of Address and Instructions to stop Letters directed to Out-Stations cannot be attended to after the Mail Steamer has been signalled.

The numerous references made to the Post Office on such occasions, and very frequently after the Overland Mails have been brought to the Post Office, preclude the possibility of attending to them correctly, and the above information is given to prevent disappointment.

Despatch of Expresses prohibited.—The Director General of the Post Office of India begs to inform all Public Officers that, with the sanction of the Government of India, he has prohibited the despatch of Expresses on any line on which there is a Telegraph, unless the Officer sending the Express certify in writing, in the manner indicated below, that its despatch is absolutely necessary for the Public Service.

The Certificate must be in the form of a letter to the Director General, explaining why the Express is sent, and what saving of time is expected.
