MILITARY DEPARTMENT.

The following Resolution by the Government is notified for general information:—

His Excellency Sir William Mansfield in 1860, regarding the welfare of the soldiers' children in the Military Asylum, moved the Government to weigh the moral and physical advantages which might attend removal of the Byculla Schools to Panchgunny.

Thereon, by letter No. 2336 of 30th June 1860, the Bombay Education Society was asked to favour Government with its opinion both on the general question of removal of the Schools from Bombay and on the particular selection of Panchgunny. The sense of the Society collectively was not taken, but the Committee appointed a Sub-Committee to consider the matter, and communicated the Sub-Committee's Report to Government.

The Sub-Committee concluded that “they do not think it will ever be shown that the climate of Bombay is well suited to the full physical development of young children”; and that “there is, therefore, in the absence of opposing circumstances, reasonable ground for desiring to remove the Schools to a better climate.” The Report after stating objections to Aboo, Euteshwur, and Panchgunny,—this last being described as good in climate, but deficient in extent and in water supply,—stated that “the evidence, on the whole, preponderates in favour of Poorundhur as compared with Bombay or Poona; though it is not such as could be considered satisfactory without a full and carefully watched trial.” The report then, treating of whether there be any insuperable objection to removal of the Schools even to a better climate, gave the following conclusions:—

“That there is nothing in their sanitary condition to render the removal of the Schools desirable in the face of strongly opposing circumstances.

“That it will deprive them of the benefits which publicity affords, for stimulating vigilance, correcting errors, and supplying defects in the management, and for adding to their pecuniary means.

“That it will separate the children from the energetic operation of Christian civilization, and the examples of Christian charity and communion of worship.

“That it will deprive the children of the frequent opportunities they now enjoy of seeing their parents and friends.

“That it will interfere with efficient teaching.”

The Report stated that for these advantages “the only equivalent to be expected” by removal of the Schools is improvement in the physical condition of the children, and added,—“The Sub-Committee do not undervalue the importance of health and strength. Nevertheless, there are other considerations which should not be lost sight of. It is our duty to send forth from the School a good and useful member of society. If that end can be achieved, along with the highest degree of physical development, so much the better; but if the latter can only be attained by sacrificing, in a great measure, the means of securing the former, it is, in the opinion of the Sub-Committee, very doubtful, if we are justified in seeking it.”

These views prevented further movement at that time; but, in 1863, the attention of Government was drawn by several causes, principally by the Bombay Education Society's favourable experience of its Infant School, to the advantages which Poona offers; and a letter was addressed to the Secretary of the Bombay Education Society, No. 2749 of 15th September 1863, as follows:—

“An advertisement by your Society showing an intention to build an Infant School at Poona, has led the Government, in looking at its own responsibility for the large number of children in the Byculla

Schools who belong to the Military Asylum, to consider the advantages which Poona would offer to those of the older children also, who are not likely, for special reasons of health or local connexion, to be better provided for in Bombay than in the Deccan.

"His Excellency the Governor in Council, therefore, invites the Society to take this question into consideration, and does so with the more confidence, because, on reading the proceedings in 1860 and 1861 connected with proposals for removal to Panchgunny and for an experiment at Poorundhur, he finds that no one of the objections offered to those proposals holds against the removal of a portion of the Schools to Poona.

"The Government is prepared to give for the purposes of the Schools a portion of the plot of land close to the Post Office, on which the new Church is about to be built."

On the 23rd November last, the Secretary to the Society stated the intention of submitting the whole question to a Sub-Committee of Subscribers. Probably this intention was abandoned; for, on the 3rd March last, the Secretary replied as follows:—

"The Committee regret that their experience will not enable them to offer much for the consideration of Government on the point. It is true that the Infant Branch of their Institution, which has been established in Poona for seven years, has, in a sanitary respect, as indeed in every other, worked admirably. But, as a rule, the children do not remain above the age of eight years, and consequently there are no facts in the hands of the Committee on which to found their opinion as to the healthiness of the Deccan for older children. Medical opinions have been expressed adverse as also favourable to the continuance of European children in the Deccan after that age. But the Committee have no data to warrant them in endorsing either opinion. They cannot, however, but suppose that European children must have grown up in Poona sufficiently numerous to enable Medical men, if called upon, to report definitely on the question."

The Managing Committee of the Bombay Education Society, after several months' deliberation, has thus thrown upon the Government the task of further inquiry. The Government, looking to its guardianship of the large number of children in the Schools on the foundation of the Military Asylum, accepts the responsibility, and will appoint a Government Commission.

The existing Sanitary Commission is the fittest for determining the comparative physical advantages for which change of place has been desired.

This foundation established, it will remain to weigh the social, intellectual, and moral advantages attributed by the Sub-Committee of the Bombay Education Society in 1861, to residence in Bombay. For this purpose, and in order to the widest understanding of the matter, and the satisfaction of all who have at heart the welfare of the children of these Schools, His Excellency the Governor in Council desires the counsel of other fit persons, and, therefore, appoints—

Sir A. Grant, Bart., as President,

The Honorable Mr. Justice Forbes,

Colonel Donovan, (with the consent of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief) and

Mr. William Walker,

who, with the members of the Sanitary Commission, will form a special Commission for the present purpose. The Bombay Education Society is requested to choose one having their full trust, whom, when named, the Government will appoint on the Commission.

To the Commission so constituted, His Excellency the Governor in Council commends the inquiry; the end of which, the healthful education of the children of our soldiers and other British countrymen, duly regarded, will incite such diligent care as, guided by the ripe experience of the Commission, may not fail of a sound conclusion of the whole matter.

ISSUED BY THE INCOME TAX COMMISSIONERS FOR THE TOWN AND ISLAND OF BOMBAY UNDER ACT XXXII. OF 1860, SECTION XXXVII.

INCOME TAX.

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31st JULY 1864.

Notice is hereby given that every person within the Town and Island of Bombay who, by the Act XXXII. of 1860, for imposing Duties on Profits arising from Property, Professions, Trades, and Offices, is liable to the said Duties, and to return his or her Profits or Income, is hereby required to fill in a Return of his or her Profits and Income in the prescribed Form, and to transmit such Return duly signed with the Declaration prescribed by the Act, to the Assessors of the Town and Island of Bombay aforesaid, at their respective Offices, with in fifteen days from the date of the delivery of the Special Notice, under the penalties contained in the said Act.

Persons requiring Forms of Returns can procure them at the Office of the Assessors. Forms of such Returns will also be left at the usual place of Residence or Business of every person known or considered to be liable to the duties imposed by the said Act. But any person liable to the Duties who may not receive such Forms must apply for the same at the Office of any of the Assessors.

GENERAL ORDERS

BY HIS EXCELLENCY THE HONORABLE THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

MILITARY DEPARTMENT.

No. 141 of 1864.—The following promotion is made subject to Her Majesty's approval:—

Medical Establishment.

Senior Assistant Surgeon Thomas Murray, to be Surgeon from the 14th March 1864, vice Surgeon Major J. Vaughan, retired.

Bombay Castle, 21st March 1864.

No. 142 of 1864.—The usual certificate on honour attached to Bills of Contingent charges, is frequently mistaken as if subsequent inquiry of the particulars by the Audit Department questions the worth of the declaration.

The certificate of actual or intended payment, as a voucher for the charge, is exactly equivalent to the receipt of a person to whom a payment charged in the Bill had been made. It is no proof that the sum is properly chargeable to Government.

The certificate also that the expense was necessarily incurred, is merely superfluous and cannot be taken in place of the particulars which the Auditor requires.

Articles 17 to 21 inclusively, section XVIII. Jameson's Code are cancelled, and the following rule is substituted:—

"Contingent Bills will be vouched by such reasonable specification of particulars as the Auditor requires for judgment whether the service be wholly chargeable to Government and has been done at the least cost. Payments therein charged which cannot be conveniently vouched by receipts, should be vouched by certificate (at foot of the Bill) of their having been paid or of the intention to pay them so soon as the Bill shall be passed, as the case may be."

No. 143 of 1864.—The G. O. No. 356, of the 7th July 1863, relative to advances to Subaltern Officers of Artillery and Infantry on first Appointment to Field Batteries and Silladar Cavalry Corps is cancelled by direction of the Government of India.

No. 144 of 1864.—The Secretary of State has cancelled the nomination of Ensign W. C. Ramsden, Bengal General List, to Her Majesty's 106th Regiment, at his own request.

No. 145 of 1864.—The following General Order by the Government of India, dated 7th March 1864, No. 197, is republished:—

No. 197 of 1864.—In modification of the orders contained in the Resolutions and Government General Order, noted in the margin, the Right Honorable the Governor General in Council is pleased to direct the publication, for general information, of the following extract from a Resolution in the Financial Department, No. 1031 of the 25th February 1864:—

Resolution, Financial Department, No. 27, dated 7th April 1860.

"RESOLUTION.—Valuable public services connected with the reduction of the Military expenditure and the re-organization of the Military Accounts in conformity with the Budget system, have been performed by the Military Finance Commission, subsequently called the Military Finance Department; but the time has arrived when, as directed by the Secretary of State, this Office must be placed in proper relation to the Military Department.

"This is the head Office of the system of Army Accounts. The estimates for the Military Expenditure of the whole of India are collected here; and, after having been carefully revised, are submitted to the Financial Department. The ordinary correspondence with the Military Controllers' Paymasters, and other Officers connected with the Accounts of the Army, passes through this Office; and the Officer in charge of it assists the Government with his opinion upon every question relating to Military Expenditure which may be referred to him. In the discharge of these duties, the Head of the Office will, for the future, act in subordination to the Military Department, and will be designated the 'Accountant General' to that Department. His relation to the Military Department will be similar to that of the Accountant General to the War Office at Home; but it will, for the present, be for the public advantage that the ablest and most experienced Military Officer available should be selected for the duty, and that the Controllers and other Officers of Military Account in the three Presidencies should look to this office as the highest prize of their Department.

"The Accountant General will not be associated with the Auditor and Accountant General as a member of the 'Board of Appropriation Audit,' and although, in common with the other Account Officers of the Government, he should render all the assistance in his power to the Financial Department, his ordinary official relation will be entirely with the Military Department.

"The subordinate establishments of Controllers, Accountants, Examiners, and Compilers in every part of India, will remain as at present. All appointments and promotions will be made by the Government in the Military Department: and it will be the duty of the Accountant General to advise in all matters relating to the conditions of appointment and promotion, so as to secure the highest practicable standard of qualification. No change should, of course, be made in the scale of expenditure, nor in any of the rules relating to the Accounts, without the previous sanction of the Financial Department."

With reference to the above Resolution, His Excellency the Governor General in Council is pleased to appoint Colonel A. Broome, of the Royal Artillery, to be Accountant General to the Military Department from the 1st April 1864, from which date the arrangements now notified will have effect.

Subsidiary orders with reference to the conduct of business will hereafter be issued.

Blank forms of Death Reports, to keep by them in readiness, are given gratuitously on application at the Office of the Deputy Commissioner of Police.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind, that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all single cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.
