Para. 1. Sir,—I have received and laid before Her Majesty the loyal and congratulatory address from the inhabitants of Bombay, on the occasion of the birth of a Royal Prince to their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales.

Public Order

To REGULATE the Religious PROCESSIONS of the MOHURRUM, and for the PRESERVATION of the PUBLIC PEACE during the Festival, Sanctioned by the Honorable the Governor in Council, under the Provisions of Section LXXVII. of Act No. XIII. of 1856.

1st.—Every person desirous of erecting or carrying about a *Taboot*, *Punja*, or *Dholeeka Punja*, at the ensuing Mohurrum, must obtain a License from the Commissioner of Police, at the Mazagon Police Office. Such Licenses will be granted to Mahomedans only: and all persons obtaining them are hereby required to produce them when demanded by any Magistrate or Officer of Police.

2nd.—Each *Taboot* is to have but one set of "*Tassa*," one set of "*Dholee*," or "*Kurne*," and fifteen "*Hillals*."

3rd.—Any person who may be seen carrying a sword, dirk, bludgeon, or other offensive weapon, will be taken into custody.

4th.—No *Taboots* are allowed to go in procession on the last night of the Mohurrum before 12 o'clock, or to continue so after 3 o'clock on the following morning; nor on the last day before 12 o'clock; and it is directed that they be thrown into the sea, and the ceremony concluded by 5 o'clock P.M.

5th.—*Taboots* are not permitted to go abreast on the public road; and, on meeting, are to give way, each keeping to the left. On meeting carriages or horsemen, persons accompanying the *Taboots* are strictly enjoined to cease playing country music, the *Taboots* keeping the left side of the road.

6th.—No Procession of the Zool Junnah, or Horse, through the public streets or roads will be permitted.

7th.—All persons licensed to sell Spirituous Liquor, and all vendors of Opium and Bhang, are to keep their shops closed; and persons found selling anything of an intoxicating nature during the aforesaid period, will be taken into custody.

8th.—Water will not be allowed to be taken from the public Tanks and Wells to be thrown before the Processions.

9th.—Any persons violating the above Rules, or behaving in any manner likely to create a breach of the peace, or making a disturbance of any kind will be immediately taken into custody, and dealt with according to law.

GENERAL ORDERS

BY HIS EXCELLENCY THE HONORABLE THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

MILITARY DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 3rd June 1864.

No. 267 of 1864.—Agreeably to G. G. O. No. 580, of 24th November 1863, a Matron on Rs. 15 and an Assistant Matron on Rs. 8 per mensem are allowed to Hospitals of European Regiments (Cavalry or Infantry), and to Hospitals at the Head Quarters of Brigades of Artillery with more than 3 Batteries attached.

2. A Matron on Rs. 15 per mensem is sanctioned for European Hospitals of Batteries of Artillery and of all Detachments exceeding 100 in strength.

3. A Matron on Rs. 15 a month, for so long as her services are considered necessary by the Divisional Deputy Inspector General of Hospitals, is also sanctioned for the Kurrachee and Khandala Depôt Hospitals, and for the Sanitarium Hospitals at Ghizree, Aboo, Colaba, and Poorundhur.

Erratum.—The date of promotion of Russaidar Meedad Khan, Poona Horse, notified in G. O. No. 248, dated 18th May 1864, is 17th April 1864.

Bombay Castle, 4th June 1864.

No. 268 of 1864.—The subsistence allowance to Native Recruits enlisted elsewhere than at Head Quarters of the Regiment is increased from two annas and six pies to three annas a day payable without any deduction from the date of enlistment to that of joining their corps.

No. 269 of 1864.—The following General Order by the Government of India, dated 5th May 1864, No. 397, is republished:—

"No. 397 of 1864.—His Excellency the Governor General in Council is pleased to notify that the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for India has approved of the grant of half and quarter rations, respectively, to the wives and children of Non-Commissioned Officers and Soldiers of European Regiments, in addition to the authorized subsistence allowance, whenever the exigencies of the public service may require the separation of the men from their families.

No. 270 of 1864.—The following General Order by the Government of India, dated 9th May 1864, No. 403, is republished:—

"No. 403 of 1864.—The Right Honorable the Governor General in Council is pleased to publish for general information the following Despatch received from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for India, relative to the substitution of Honorary Commissions for the Veteran Commissions, formerly bestowed upon Warrant Officers of long and meritorious service.

2. In accordance with the instructions conveyed in paragraphs 11, 12, and 13, the question of a revision of the scale of pay, pensions, and other advantages at present granted to the higher grade of Warrant Officers, is now under consideration.

3. In the sense of the 14th paragraph, the Right Honorable the Governor General in Council will be prepared to forward the names of a certain number of selected Officers holding the superior departmental grades in view to their submission to Her Majesty for Honorary rank:—

'INDIA OFFICE; London, the 30th January 1864.

To His Excellency the Right Honorable the Governor General of India in Council.

SIR,—I have received and considered in Council the late Governor General's letter, No. 90A, dated the 19th September 1863, upon the subject of the substitution of Honorary Commissions for the Veteran Commissions, formerly bestowed upon Warrant Officers of long and meritorious service; and also a Despatch from your Government, No. 294 of the 8th October last, forwarding copy of a letter from the Government of Bombay on the same subject.

2. The Governor General observes, that, as the grounds upon which Her Majesty's Government have determined that the grant of Commissions in the Veteran Establishment shall be discontinued are not expressed, His Lordship is unable to meet or discuss them, and can only submit the reasons which force him earnestly to deprecate the proposed measure.

3. The determination to discontinue the grant of Commissions to the Veteran Establishment to Warrant Officers in India, and to substitute Honorary Commissions in their stead, was adopted after much and careful consideration, and with the concurrence of the Secretary of State for War, and the Field Marshal Commanding in Chief.

4. Under the altered circumstances of the Army in India, it was perceived that the practice of granting such Commissions, involved an anomaly, which, now that all Commissions would emanate from the direct authority of the Crown, it was necessary to get rid of, with a view to the complete assimilation of the usages of the service in India and elsewhere.

5. It was, therefore, determined to grant, according to the practice which obtains in Her Majesty's service, Honorary Commissions in lieu of Veteran Commissions to deserving Officers of this class.

6. The objections raised by His Lordship, the late Governor General, to the discontinuance of Veteran Commissions, are founded upon the loss and disappointment which is experienced by a very deserving class of public servants, by the substitution of rank without pay for a Commission which carried important pecuniary advantages.

7. The Government and Commander in Chief in Bombay object upon similar grounds.

8. In my Despatch, No. 461 of the 16th December 1862, paragraph 5, it is stated:—"It is to be understood that Commissions of this nature will not carry pay or increase of pay on attaining advanced rank. The remuneration of the individuals must be dependent on their position in the department or post in which they may be serving."

9. I entirely concur in the opinion expressed by His Lordship, the Governor General, regarding the value to the State of the class of public servants who are likely to be affected by this change.

10. There can be no doubt that the pecuniary advantages which have heretofore accompanied Commissions in the Veteran Establishment were fairly earned and well bestowed, but it is evident that such advantages are placed on their proper footing by being granted in connection with departmental service past or present, in which the recipient may be useful and distinguished, rather than as the accompaniment of a grade among the commissioned ranks of the Army, the duties of which he is, in most cases, not supposed to be fitted for, or expected to perform.

11. The Honorary Commission appears more appropriate for this class of public servants, while it is quite in accordance with the usages of Her Majesty's service.

12. I shall not object, however, to such a revision of the present scale of pay, pensions, and other advantages granted to the higher grade of Warrant Officers in the Ordnance and other Departments, as shall secure to a limited number of those grades, advantages in these respects fully equal to those which they may be considered to have lost by the discontinuance of Veteran Commission.

13. I request, therefore, you will take the subject into early consideration, with a view to the adoption of a uniform system in the three Presidencies, by which a limited number of Warrant Officers in the higher grades may be admitted to a scale of pay and pension, such as shall constitute a fitting remuneration for the discharge of their important duties, and a suitable recognition of past services in their several departments.

14. Of the Officers holding the superior departmental grades, a certain number might be, from time to time, selected, and their names submitted to Her Majesty for honorary rank.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind, that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all single cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.

As a general rule, the Packets for sailing Vessels will be closed the evening preceding the date of Departure.

Registered Letters.—The attention of the Public is called to the following paragraph 17 of the Rules for Registering letters at Post Offices :—

“ Paragraph 17. A letter containing Bank Notes, Postage Stamps, or other valuable articles, should, as a rule, be registered, and should be securely folded, or enclosed in a substantial envelope, and *always sealed with wax*, in order to prevent, as far as possible, its being tampered with.”

Letters to Hong-Kong.—Under an arrangement made with the Colonial Government of Hong-Kong, letters transmitted by *private vessels* between Hong-Kong and India on and after the 1st May will be chargeable with postage at the place of delivery only, no postage being levied at the place of despatch. The charge on delivery in any part of India will be at the rate given below :—

Letters not exceeding $\frac{1}{2}$ oz	4 Annas
Do. exceeding $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. and not exceeding 1 oz	8 „
Do. exceeding 1 oz and not exceeding 2 oz	1 Rupee.
Do. and for every additional oz. or fraction of an oz	8 Annas.

The above rate is a consolidated rate, no extra charge for bounty money to ship Captains being leviable.

Lost Letters.—Several complaints have recently been made of the loss of heavy and important Stamped Letters for England, said or believed to have been posted, but which it is wholly out of the power of the Post Office to trace owing to their being unregistered and consequently unrecorded.

It is supposed that letters of the above description are made away with for the sake of the valuable stamps affixed to them, which can readily be detached and sold before obliteration in the Post Office.

It is therefore recommended that Postage Stamps attached to all letters should be crossed or defaced, in order to present less temptation to the peons and servants of postmen and to the Post Office Subordinates, and to lessen the chances of the sale of stamps, which cannot be effected readily when stamps are defaced, without washing them and subjecting the sellers to suspicion.

Newspapers, &c. undeliverable.—The Public are informed that in consequence of the receipt of the Overland Mails in Bags instead of as heretofore in Boxes, a considerable number of Newspapers and Books have been found to be without covers and without addresses, and are in consequence insusceptible of delivery.

A list of these has been kept in the Bombay Post Office, where every facility will be afforded to persons who have not received expected Periodicals or Books from England, to recover missing property.

Letters to Nicaragua.—By an arrangement made by Her Majesty's Post Master General, letters posted in India for Nicaragua will, if marked *via* Southampton, be liable to the following rates of postage:—

Letters for Nicaragua when sent *via* Marseilles, are liable to the additional French transit rate of Rs. 0-2-8 per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.

Samples of Merchandize by Post.—An arrangement has been made with the London Post Office for sending Patterns of Merchandize by Post between India and the United Kingdom, under the rules and at the rates of Postage indicated below. The arrangement will commence as regards despatches from India from the 1st May next. Intimation has been received from the London Post Office that the arrangement will commence as regards despatches thence from the 1st April.

1. The Patterns must not be of intrinsic value. The rule excludes all articles of a saleable nature, and whatever may have a value of its own apart from its mere use as a Pattern. The quantity of any material sent, ostensibly as a Pattern, must not be so great that it could fairly be considered as having on this ground an intrinsic value.

2. The Patterns must not bear any writing other than the address of the persons for whom they are intended, a manufacturer's or trade mark, numbers, and the prices of the articles; nor must they contain any letter closed or open, or any enclosure sealed or otherwise closed against inspection.

3. The Patterns must be sent in covers open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination; samples, however, of Seeds, Drugs, and so forth, which cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen or other material; but closed bags, although transparent, must not be used for this purpose.

4. The rule which forbids the transmission through the Post of any explosive or dangerous substance will of course be applicable to Patterns, and no article likely to injure the contents of the Mail Bags is to be sent.

5. No Pattern Packet can be received if it exceeds two feet in length, width, or depth, or 3 lbs. in weight.

6. The Inland Transit of Pattern Packets will be by Banghy Post.

7. The following Postage rates (prepaid by a Stamp or Stamps) will be charged on Pattern Packets sent under these regulations by Post to the United Kingdom. The rates being consolidated rates, no Inland Postage is leviable in addition:—

8. If the Packets be *prepaid with a single rate of Postage* (as given in Column 1 of the above Table), the full rate chargeable being more, they will be forwarded charged with the deficient Postage, together with an additional single rate.

9. If the Packets be *prepaid with less than a single rate of postage*, they will be forwarded charged with double postage, less the amount actually paid.

10. If the Packets be *wholly unpaid*, they will be forwarded charged with double postage.

N.B.—In respect to Inland Transit the general conditions for Patterns are similar to those for Book Packets, and they will be treated like Book Packets.
