GOVERNMENT DEPARTMENTAL NOTICES.

FINANCIAL DEPARTMENT.

The following Notification by the Government of India is republished for general information :—

“ No. 542.

Simla, the 21st June 1864.

Extract from the Proceedings of the Government of India, in the Financial Department, Simla, under date the 4th June 1864.

Read an endorsement from the Accountant General, Public Works Department, No. 73, dated 18th instant, inquiring whether, in addition to the leaves mentioned in the Absentee Rules, Local Governments have power to grant to Uncovenanted Servants leave of absence, on private affairs, without pay and without the privilege of reckoning the period of such absence, as service.

RESOLUTION.—His Excellency the Governor General in Council considers that the Leave Rules do not debar Local Governments from permitting an Uncovenanted Servant, for good reasons, to be absent without pay and with forfeiture of the time for which he is absent, and allowing him on his return to resume charge of his appointment.

ORDER.—Ordered that a copy of the foregoing Resolution be forwarded to the Accountant General, Public Works Department, and to the Foreign, Home, Military, and Public Works Departments; as also, to Governments of Bengal, Madras, Bombay, North-Western Provinces, Punjab, and the Straits Settlements; the Civil Pay-Masters, Bengal, Madras, Bombay, North-Western Provinces, and Punjab being also furnished with a copy each.

GENERAL ORDERS

BY HIS EXCELLENCY THE HONORABLE THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

MILITARY DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 1st July 1864.

No. 307 of 1864.—The following will be considered the Peace Establishment of the Non-Commissioned Ranks in the Corps of Sappers and Miners :—

Serjeant Major.....	1	1st Corporals	4
Quartermaster Serjeant	1	2nd Corporals	4

The Establishment may be increased under the orders of the Commander-in-Chief, to the number allowed at present to meet the requirement of Active Service, or to provide for the superintendence of European Sappers, one Serjeant and one Corporal being allowed for 19 Second Corporals or Privates when under instruction at the Head Quarters of the Corps.

No. 308 of 1864.—General Order No. 20, dated 19th January 1864, permitting Chelsea Out-Pensioner Martin Conboy to draw his pension in this Presidency, is cancelled.

No. 309 of 1864.—Serjeants John George and James Baillie, of the Unattached List, employed in the Barrack Department, are promoted to the rank of Sub-Conductor, from 16th October and 19th November 1863, respectively.

Bombay Castle, 4th July 1864.

No. 310 of 1864.—When one of Her Majesty's British Regiments falls considerably below its establishment, the number of Non-Commissioned Officers at Head Quarters is to be restricted to the proportion due to the number of Privates actually present in India, viz :—

In Cavalry Regiments 1 Serjeant and 1 Corporal to every 15 Privates.

In Infantry Regiments 1 Serjeant and 1 Corporal to every 20 Privates.

Attention is called to the G. O. No. 727, of 22nd August 1859, which directs that no reductions of Non-Commissioned Officers who already hold that position shall be made on a falling off in the number of Privates; but the excess of Serjeants and Corporals is to be absorbed by promotion being stopped on Vacancies occurring, until the regulated proportion is attained.

No. 311 of 1864.—Lieutenant J. C. W. Bruce, Cadre Her Majesty's 48th Regiment Madras N. I., is allowed a furlough to Europe for three years, on medical certificate.

No. 312 of 1864.—Veterinary Surgeon J. M. Cullimore, Her Majesty's 3rd Regiment Madras Light Cavalry is permitted to proceed to the Isle of Bourbon and the Cape of Good Hope, with leave of absence for fifteen months, on medical certificate.

No. 313 of 1864.—Deputy Assistant Commissary T. Shore is allowed a furlough to Europe for one year, on medical certificate.

No. 316 of 1864.—The following General Order by His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief in India is made applicable to this Presidency :—

Head Quarters, Camp Kalka, 5th April 1864.

With reference to G. O. C. C. of the 11th July last, it is intimated that when Soldiers' necessaries are supplied from England, an addition of 5 per cent. will be made to the actual cost of the articles, to cover the expense of packing, freight, and deterioration.

The Right Honourable the Secretary of State for India has decided that such supplies from England shall be limited to the Articles named in the Royal Clothing Warrant of 10th October 1862, with the addition of Medal ribbon, and the undermentioned tools and materials for Tailors and Shoemakers' shops.

N.B.—This table is an extract from a more extensive yearly Return that is prepared for statistical purpose and chiefly for the detection of any removable sources of disease, with a view to improving the healthiness of the Island. As the principal object cannot be fully attained unless the true causes of death be recorded, persons at out stations are requested, in each case of death occurring in their circle, to obtain, in writing, from the Medical Attendant, the name of the fatal disease, that it may be delivered to the Policeman at the funeral place. Medical Practitioners particularly are requested to aid the registration. Blank forms of Death Reports, to keep by them in readiness, are given gratuitously on application at the Office of the Deputy Commissioner of Police.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind, that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all single cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.



No Afternoon Delivery during the Monsoon.—During the Monsoon there will be only two deliveries of Letters and Papers issued from this office, at 9 A. M. and 1 P. M. daily.

The Letter Boxes over the Island of Bombay will in consequence be cleared at 10 A. M. and 5 P. M., excepting on Sundays, when there will be one delivery at noon and one clearance of the Letter Boxes at 3 P. M.

Discontinuance of Night Mails.—In consequence of the insecure state of some portions of the Railway lines, the night Trains from Bombay have been temporarily discontinued; all Mails will therefore be despatched by the Mid-day Train. The regularity of the posts cannot be depended upon in the present state of the Railway lines.

Newspapers, &c. undeliverable.—The Public are informed that in consequence of the receipt of the Overland Mails in Bags instead of as heretofore in Boxes, a considerable number of Newspapers and Books have been found to be without covers and without addresses, and are in consequence insusceptible of delivery.

A list of these has been kept in the Bombay Post Office, where every facility will be afforded to persons who have not received expected Periodicals or Books from England, to recover missing property.

Lost Letters.—Several complaints have recently been made of the loss of heavy and important Stamped Letters for England, said or believed to have been posted, but which it is wholly out of the power of the Post Office to trace owing to their being unregistered and consequently unrecorded.

It is supposed that letters of the above description are made away with for the sake of the valuable stamps affixed to them, which can readily be detached and sold before obliteration in the Post Office.

It is therefore recommended that Postage Stamps attached to all letters should be crossed or defaced, in order to present less temptation to the peons and servants of postmen and to the Post Office Subordinates, and to lessen the chances of the sale of stamps, which cannot be effected readily when stamps are defaced, without washing them and subjecting the sellers to suspicion.

Letters for Nicaragua when sent *viâ* Marseilles, are liable to the additional French transit rate of Rs. 0-2-8 per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.

Samples of Merchandize by Post.—An arrangement has been made with the London Post Office for sending Patterns of Merchandize by Post between India and the United Kingdom, under the rules and at the rates of Postage indicated below. The arrangement will commence as regards despatches from India from the 1st May next. Intimation has been received from the London Post Office that the arrangement will commence as regards despatches thence from the 1st April.

1. The Patterns must not be of intrinsic value. The rule excludes all articles of a saleable nature, and whatever may have a value of its own apart from its mere use as a Pattern. The quantity of any material sent, ostensibly as a Pattern, must not be so great that it could fairly be considered as having on this ground an intrinsic value.

2. The Patterns must not bear any writing other than the address of the persons for whom they are intended, a manufacturer's or trade mark, numbers, and the prices of the articles; nor must they contain any letter closed or open, or any enclosure sealed or otherwise closed against inspection.

3. The Patterns must be sent in covers open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination; samples, however, of Seeds, Drugs, and so forth, which cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen or other material; but closed bags, although transparent, must not be used for this purpose.

4. The rule which forbids the transmission through the Post of any explosive or dangerous substance will of course be applicable to Patterns, and no article likely to injure the contents of the Mail Bags is to be sent.

5. No Pattern Packet can be received if it exceeds two feet in length, width, or depth, or 3 lbs. in weight.

6. The Inland Transit of Pattern Packets will be by Banghy Post.

7. The following Postage rates (prepaid by a Stamp or Stamps) will be charged on Pattern Packets sent under these regulations by Post to the United Kingdom. The rates being consolidated rates, no Inland Postage is leviable in addition:—

8. If the Packets be *prepaid with a single rate of Postage* (as given in Column 1 of the above Table), the full rate chargeable being more, they will be forwarded charged with the deficient Postage, together with an additional single rate.

9. If the Packets be *prepaid with less than a single rate of postage*, they will be forwarded charged with double postage, less the amount actually paid.

10. If the Packets be *wholly unpaid*, they will be forwarded charged with double postage.

N.B.—In respect to Inland Transit the general conditions for Patterns are similar to those for Book Packets, and they will be treated like Book Packets.

If received unpaid or insufficiently paid from the United Kingdom, they will be charged at the rates mentioned in Paras. 8, 9, and 10 of the foregoing notice.

Letters to Hong-Kong.—Under an arrangement made with the Colonial Government of Hong-Kong, letters transmitted by *private vessels* between Hong-Kong and India on and after the 1st May will be chargeable with postage at the place of delivery only, no postage being levied at the place of despatch. The charge on delivery in any part of India will be at the rate given below:—

The above rate is a consolidated rate, no extra charge for bounty money to ship Captains being leviable.

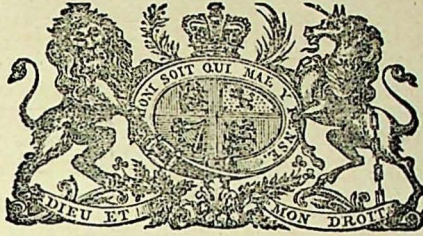
