INCOME TAX.

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31ST JULY 1865.

Notice is hereby given, that every person within the Town and Island of Bombay, who, by the Act XXXII. of 1860, for imposing Duties on Profits arising from Property, Professions, Trades, and Offices, is liable to the said Duties, and to return his or her Profits or Income is hereby required to fill in a Return of his or her Profits and Income in the prescribed Form, and to transmit such Return, duly signed with the Declaration prescribed by the Act, to the Assessors of the Town and Island of Bombay aforesaid, at their respective Offices in the Town Barracks, within 15 days from the date of the delivery of the special Notice, under the penalties contained in the said Act.

Persons requiring Forms of Returns can procure them at the Office of the Assessors. Forms of such Returns will also be left at the usual place of Residence or Business of every person known or considered to be liable to the Duties imposed by the said Act. But any person liable to the Duties who may not receive such Forms must apply for the same at the Office of any of the Assessors.

GOVERNMENT DEPARTMENTAL NOTICES.

REVENUE DEPARTMENT.

The following Extract from the Proceedings of the Government of Bombay in the Revenue Department is published:—

EXTRACT from the Proceedings of the Government of Bombay in the Revenue Department, dated 15th September 1864.

Read the following Extract from the Proceedings of the Government of India in the Home Department Simla, under date the 6th August 1864, No. 1781.

RESOLUTION.—The attention of the Governor General in Council has been attracted to the increase which has of late years taken place in the expense of collecting and assessing the Land Revenue. The accompanying Statement will show how serious this increase has been.

2. The Governor General in Council is fully aware that the extension of settlement operations in Oudh, the North-Western Provinces, and the Central Provinces, and other parts of India, must for a time cause considerable increase of expenditure. Economy is, however, for this reason more urgently required in other directions, and particularly with respect to the permanent Establishments for the collection of the revenue, in which a still larger increase is also apparent.

3. The Governor General in Council believes that some portions of this increase are due to the reorganization, lately sanctioned on a more liberal scale, of the European administrative agency in the Central Provinces, and the Non-regulation Provinces of Bengal, and of a Forest Department all over India. Other portions of the increased expenditure now under notice may doubtless likewise be traced to schemes separately discussed, and sanctioned on full consideration by the Government of India as

good and necessary in themselves. Nevertheless it is not improbable that a careful scrutiny of existing Establishments generally may suggest important reductions. The Governor General in Council would therefore invite the Local Governments and Administrations early and earnestly to consider measures tending to bring the expenditure on Revenue Establishments within more reasonable limits.

4. The increase of expenditure is (with the exception of Madras) so large and so general, while the circumstances of the various Provinces are so widely different, that the advance of expenditure has no doubt arisen from a great diversity of local causes; it is not therefore possible to indicate any general means for securing the desired reduction.

5. It may however be observed, that in Districts under settlement much of the current work is necessarily thrown into the Settlement Department. The Governor General in Council would suggest for consideration the expediency in such cases of employing a portion of the Collector's Staff, or at least of transferring it in part to the Settlement Department, in lieu of entertaining, as is at present believed often to be the case, a full complement for either Department.

E. g., partitions, transfers of proprietary rights, a very large number of rent cases, disputes as to occupancy, proprietary right, or actual possessions, cases of alluvion and diluvion, disputed boundaries, summary settlements, lapsed revenue free-holdings, &c. &c., &c.

6. It will be the duty of Commissioners and other responsible Officers entrusted with the supervision of settlement operations, to see that economy is observed in this respect, and also that temporary officials, such as Ameens and others, are retained no longer than is absolutely necessary, and that the work, whether of survey or measurement, is not delayed by inquiries into disputes which can be with greater advantage decided when the season for working in the field is over.

7. The same principle should indeed be observed as to all temporary Establishments; they should be invariably utilised to the fullest extent possible, and, so far as is practicable, should be formed out of such portions of the permanent Establishment as can be relieved of their regular duties, in consequence of the employment of the temporary Establishments, and such temporary Establishments should moreover be kept within the smallest possible limits, and discharged as soon as their work is at an end. In like manner no Revenue Survey Establishments which cannot be thoroughly utilised should be kept up, and care should be taken that all questions of principle or policy connected with settlement operations are promptly disposed of, so that these operations shall in no case be impeded.

8. As regards permanent Establishments, the Governor General in Council is of opinion, that reduction in some Districts and Provinces may be eventually effected by the consolidation of petty Treasuries,* as well as of those which render accounts direct to the Account Department. It is to be remembered that by this regards the Establishments of the Treasuries themselves,

measure economy is effected, not only as regards the number of Guards requisite. The details of this measure involve, however, so many and varied considerations, that His Excellency in Council will not at present do more than commend the subject particularly to the notice of the Local Governments and Administrations.

9. In those Provinces in which Government Revenue Establishments are maintained in the interior of Districts, it may be possible to effect some economy by the consolidation of these or the reduction of their Establishments, especially in cases where estates are large, and chiefly owned by wealthy proprietors, and when, in consequence, the actual collection of the revenue is effected with comparative ease.

10. The Governor General in Council is aware that objections may be urged to this measure on administrative grounds: no doubt there is force in such objections; but the Governor General in Council is inclined to believe that they are not unfrequently exaggerated.

11. It is not intended by these remarks to limit attention to the possibility of reduction in the directions which they indicate; many others will doubtless suggest themselves to local authorities, and the Governor General in Council confidently reckons on the zealous co-operation of all the Officers of Government in reviewing existing Revenue Establishments, and in reporting every reduction that may appear practicable.

12. The heads of Governments and Administrations in examining such proposals and the objections offered to them, will of course bear in mind the local circumstances of each District—Establishments which may barely suffice for the necessities of one District will naturally be often susceptible of reduction in the case of another. It will be expedient, therefore, to require that every local Officer in submitting his opinion on the Establishments subordinate to him should give at full length the reasons upon which he bases his recommendations. The Governor General in Council takes this opportunity of again urging the necessity of the utmost caution in bringing forward proposals to enhance expenditure in all branches of the Government service, whether involving an increase to salaries or to the strength of Establishments. It is the paramount duty of all Officers who find themselves under the necessity of making such proposals, not to do so without anxiously considering the possibility of an equivalent reduction of expenditure in some other direction.

Ordered also that thirty copies of the Resolution be forwarded to the Foreign Department, whence the necessary communication will be made to the Government of the Punjab and the other Administrations under the control of that Department.

RESOLUTION.—The letter from the Government of India to be referred to the Deputy Auditor and Accountant General, with a request that he will be so good as to show the receipts as well as charges of the Land Revenue, Forest and Abkaree, of this Presidency separately for each year of the return, together with the percentage which the charges in each case bear to the receipts under the respective heads, showing, as regards the Land Revenue, the percentage both exclusive and inclusive of the Revenue Survey Settlement charges. He should also be requested to explain, as briefly as may be, the causes of the increase in the charges for each year, and to give, exclusive of the causes of increase in the charges, the same information with regard to the other Governments and Administrations, in order that the percentage cost of their Establishments to Revenue may be compared, as far as possible, with those of the Bombay Government.

2. Copies of this letter should also be sent, through the Commissioners, to all Officers of Land Revenue and Survey Settlement Officers, with an intimation that the subjects noted by the Government of India should receive immediate attention. On the receipt of information which has been called for from the Account Department, further instructions will be issued.

(900) nine hundred per mensem.

No. 442 of 1864.—The following General Order by the Government of India, dated 7th September 1864, No. 723, is republished :—

“ No. 723 of 1864.—The following rules are to be observed from the 1st September 1864, in the admission of allowances to Officers attached to Native Regiments when performing the duties of other Officers temporarily absent :—

1. The allowance for charge, repair of arms, and payment of wings and squadrons, the office allowance of Adjutants, and of doing-duty Officers in the Cavalry, and the allowance for repairs of tents of Quartermasters, are to be paid to the Officers present and actually performing the duties of the appointments, and not to absentees, unless the absentee be on privilege leave, when, to retain his right to the wing, squadron, contract, or office allowance, he must provide for the performance of his duties to the satisfaction of his Commanding Officer.

2. An Officer, directed to officiate in an inferior appointment in his regiment, is not entitled to any portion of the staff salary of such lower situation, but he will draw the charge, contract, or office allowance of the appointment. In such cases, the arrangement for carrying on the duties of the appointment is a matter of regimental detail, which should be directed in regimental orders, and does not require the confirmation of Government or of the Commander-in-Chief. Thus, a Second in Command and Squadron Officer being directed to take charge of another squadron in addition to his own, or an Adjutant being ordered to assume charge of a squadron, or a Squadron Officer or Adjutant acting for a doing-duty Officer, would only be entitled to the allowance for the payment of the squadron, or to the office allowance of the doing-duty Officer, in addition to his own staff salary and Office or other allowance. In like manner in the Infantry, a Wing Officer, being ordered to assume charge of the other wing, in addition to his own, or of the Adjutant's or Quartermaster's Office, or an Adjutant being directed to assume charge of the Quartermaster's Office, would simply draw the office, contract, or charge allowance of the appointment.

3. When an Officer is directed to officiate in a higher appointment, as in the case of a doing-duty Officer directed to officiate as Quartermaster or Adjutant, an Adjutant or Quartermaster as Wing Officer, a Wing or Squadron Officer as Second in Command, or a Second in Command as Commandant, the regimental order nominating him must be submitted for confirmation to His Excellency the Commander in Chief, or (in the case of corps under Government) for confirmation by the Government of India. In such cases, the officiating Officer is entitled to half the staff salary of his substantive appointment, together with half the staff salary of the officiating appointment, and the charge, contract, or office allowance of the officiating appointment for a period of six months, and, after that period, in the event of the continued absence of the permanent incumbent, to the full staff pay and charge, contract, or office allowance of the officiating appointment, and to no portion of the salary of his substantive appointment, except that allowed under Clause 2 of this order.

No. 443 of 1864.—The following General Order by the Government of India dated 9th September 1864 No. 734, is republished:—

“No. 734 of 1864.—His Excellency the Governor General in Council, under the authority of the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for India, is pleased to publish the following rules in supersession of existing regulations on the subject of examination in the native languages.

These rules are to be considered applicable to the three Presidencies, and will take effect from the 1st February next.

There will be two standards of qualification in the Hindustani language,—the *first* to be in the place of the examination, now commonly called the *Colloquial* Examination, and of the examinations for the command of troops and companies, in regiments under the old organization, and for a medical charge; and the *second* to be in the place of the examinations now called the P. H. Staff, Adjutants', Interpreters', and all similar examinations in the three Presidencies; but all Officers who have passed these latter examinations, or who may pass them before the 1st February next, will be eligible for the Staff Corps or for ordinary staff employment without further examination.

FIRST STANDARD.

II. The object of the *First* Standard is to ensure that Officers passing it shall have acquired such a knowledge of the Hindustani language as shall enable them efficiently to discharge their military or professional duties when serving with native troops.

III. To this end candidates will be tested as to their ability to read and translate passages from easy Hindustani books, written in the Persian and *Deva Nāgari* characters; and to speak on and interpret common or professional subjects, so as to understand, and to be understood by, any ordinary uneducated native of India.

TESTS.

IV. *First*.—Reading fairly, and construing with accuracy, not less than half of an octavo page of the under-mentioned works:—

1. “Hindustani Selections” in the Persian character.
2. “Hindustani Selections” in the *Deva Nāgari* character.

Second.—Conversing with the Examiners, or with natives of India, on subjects likely to occur in the performance of regimental or professional duty, in the transaction of ordinary business, or in the course of every-day life.

If this test be applied through the medium of a native of India, he should speak the plain Hindustani of the Presidency or Province in which the examination is held, free from peculiarities of idiom and dialect, and not a *patois*,—and though, as regards the performance of professional duties, it must, to a certain extent, be technical in its nature; if, in other respects, the candidate prove his ability to comprehend readily all that is said to him, and to make himself fairly intelligible, more should not be required.

SECOND STANDARD.

V. The object of the *Second* Standard is to insure that Officers passing it shall have acquired such a knowledge of the Hindustani language as shall qualify them, so far as that language is concerned, for general employment on the staff, and for admission to the Staff Corps.

VI. To this end candidates will be tested as to their ability,—1st, to read and construe passages in books of ordinary difficulty in *Urdu* and *Hindi*; 2nd, to make accurate and idiomatic written translations from English into Hindustani in both the Persian and *Deva Nāgari* characters; 3rd, to read and translate petitions, native letters, &c., in *Urdu* and *Hindi*; 4th, to converse with educated or uneducated natives of India.

TESTS.

First.—Reading fluently, and construing with readiness and accuracy, not less than an ordinary octavo page of the undermentioned works:—

1. The *Bāgh-o-Bahār*.
2. Selections from the prose of the *Prem Sagar*.

Second.—Translating accurately, and with correctness of idiom and grammar, not less than half an ordinary octavo page of plain English into language similar to that of the *Bāgh-o-Bahār*, in the Persian character, and an equal amount, in the *Deva Nāgari* character, into language similar to that of the *Prem Sagar*.

Third.—Reading fairly, and translating readily and correctly, Hindustani Manuscripts, written in both the Persian and *Deva Nāgari* characters.

These MSS. may be selected from the proceedings of a case in Court, from reports or petitions addressed to Civil or Military Authorities, from letters passing between natives of India in the ordinary course of business, or from private correspondence. They should not be written with the clearness of a printed book, nor yet in a very cramped or crabbed hand: but in such a manner, as fairly and honestly to represent the written characters as practically employed in the Presidency or Province in which the examination is held.

Fourth.—Conversing with the Examiners or with natives of India with fluency, and with such correctness of pronunciation, grammar, and idiom, as to be at once intelligible.

VII. Every candidate passing an examination by the *First* Standard in Hindustani, will be entitled to receive an allowance of Rs. 180; and on passing by the *Second* Standard, an allowance of Rs. 180 additional; or, in the case of an Officer passing at once, by the *Second* Standard, Rs. 360.

Examination in Languages, other than Hindustani.

VIII. In addition to the foregoing examinations, there will be examinations for Military Officers in the languages of India, other than Hindustani, hereinafter mentioned:—

IX. The tests for examinations in any of these languages are to correspond with those laid down for the examination by the *Second Standard* in Hindustani, except that, in examinations in Sanskrit, the colloquial and MSS. portions must be omitted; and that, except in the Presidency of Bombay, the colloquial portion of the examination in Arabic may be dispensed with.

X. Every candidate passing an examination under Rule VIII., will be entitled to receive a donation of Rs. 800, if the examination be passed in Arabic or Sanskrit; or of Rs. 500 if the examination be passed in any other language.

XI. It will be competent for any Local Government, with the sanction of the Governor General in Council, to award a pecuniary donation of Rs. 500 to Officers passing an examination of equal difficulty with that appointed for the *Second Standard*, in any oriental language other than Hindustani or than the languages mentioned in Rule VIII., the study of which it may be thought desirable for special reasons to encourage.

XII. Every candidate, offering himself for examination in any of the undermentioned languages, will, after passing the examination in such language, according to the *Second Standard* as aforesaid, be permitted to offer himself for further examination in the same language, for the purpose of obtaining a certificate of High Proficiency. A candidate having passed the examination in Hindustani by the *Second Standard*, will be eligible for further examination for a certificate of High Proficiency in Urdu or Hindi or both.*

XIII. Every candidate who shall pass an examination for a certificate of High Proficiency under Rule XII., will be entitled to receive a donation of Rs. 2,000, if the examination be passed in Arabic or Sanskrit; or of Rs. 1,500 if the examination be passed in any other language.

XIV. Degrees of Honor may be awarded to Military Officers in the *Persian, Arabic, and Sanskrit* languages, but in no other language. The tests for such Degrees are to be in accordance with the tests prescribed by the College of Fort William.

XV. Every candidate obtaining a Degree of Honor in Arabic or Sanskrit, will be entitled to receive a donation of Rs. 5,000, and in Persian of Rs. 4,000.

XVI. In addition to the foregoing donations, the Government of India, and the Governments of Madras and Bombay, respectively, may award a Gold Medal to any Officer employed under any such Governments, who is reported by the Board of Examiners to have passed an examination in any language with extraordinary merit.

XVII. No Officer shall receive any pecuniary reward for passing in any language under Rule VIII. or Rule XII., whose period of actual residence in India exceeds ten years; nor shall any Officer receive any pecuniary reward for passing under Rule XIV., whose period of actual residence in India exceeds fifteen years.

XVIII. The limitations prescribed by the last preceding rule, are not to apply to any Officer passing an examination under Rule VIII., in any of the following languages, viz., Burmese, Assamese, Pushtu, Ooriya, and Sindhi, within five years from the date of the promulgation of these Rules.

As the principal object cannot be fully attained unless the true causes of death be recorded, persons at out-stations are requested, in each case of death occurring in their circle, to obtain, in writing, from the Medical Attendant, the name of the fatal disease, that it may be delivered to the Policeman at the funeral place. Medical Practitioners particularly are requested to aid the registration. Blank forms of Death Reports, to keep by them in readiness, are given gratuitously on application at the Office of the Deputy Commissioner of Police.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind, that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all *single* cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.

Samples of Merchandise by Post.—An arrangement has been made with the London Post Office for sending Patterns of Merchandise by Post between India and the United Kingdom, under the rules and at the rates of Postage indicated below. The arrangement will commence as regards despatches from India from the 1st May next. Intimation has been received from the London Post Office that the arrangement will commence as regards despatches thence from the 1st April.

1. The Patterns must not be of intrinsic value. The rule excludes all articles of a saleable nature, and whatever may have a value of its own apart from its mere use as a Pattern. The quantity of any material sent, ostensibly as a Pattern, must not be so great that it could fairly be considered as having on this ground an intrinsic value.

2. The Patterns must not bear any writing other than the address of the persons for whom they are intended, a manufacturer's or trade mark, numbers, and the prices of the articles; nor must they contain any letter closed or open, or any enclosure sealed or otherwise closed against inspection.

3. The Patterns must be sent in covers open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination; samples, however, of Seeds, Drugs, and so forth, which cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen or other material; but closed bags, although transparent, must not be used for this purpose.

4. The rule which forbids the transmission through the Post of any explosive or dangerous substance will of course be applicable to Patterns, and no article likely to injure the contents of the Mail Bags is to be sent.

5. No Pattern Packet can be received if it exceeds two feet in length, width, or depth, or 3 lbs. in weight.

6. The Inland Transit of Pattern Packets will be by Banghy Post.

7. The following Postage rates (prepaid by a Stamp or Stamps) will be charged on Pattern Packets sent under these regulations by Post to the United Kingdom. The rates being consolidated rates, no Inland Postage is leviable in addition:—

9. If the Packets be *prepaid with less than a single rate of postage*, they will be forwarded charged with double postage, less the amount actually paid.

10. If the Packets be *wholly unpaid*, they will be forwarded charged with double postage.

N.B.—In respect to Inland Transit the general conditions for Patterns are similar to those for Book Packets, and they will be treated like Book Packets.

If received unpaid or insufficiently paid from the United Kingdom, they will be charged at the rates mentioned in Paras. 8, 9, and 10 of the foregoing notice.
