ISSUED BY THE INCOME TAX COMMISSIONERS FOR THE TOWN AND ISLAND OF BOMBAY UNDER ACT XXXII. OF 1860, SECTION XXXVII.

INCOME TAX.

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31st JULY 1865.

Notice is hereby given, that every person within the Town and Island of Bombay, who, by the Act XXXII. of 1860, for imposing Duties on Profits arising from Property, Professions, Trades, and Offices, is liable to the said Duties, and to return his or her Profits or Income is hereby required to fill in a Return of his or her Profits and Income in the prescribed Form, and to transmit such Return, duly signed with the Declaration prescribed by the Act, to the Assessors of the Town and Island of Bombay aforesaid, at their respective Offices in the Town Barracks, within 15 days from the date of the delivery of the special Notice, under the penalties contained in the said Act.

Persons requiring Forms of Returns can procure them at the Office of the Assessors. Forms of such Returns will also be left at the usual place of Residence or Business of every person known or considered to be liable to the Duties imposed by the said Act. But any person liable to the Duties who may not receive such Forms must apply for the same at the Office of any of the Assessors.

No. 460 of 1864.—The undermentioned out-pensioner of Chelsea Hospital having been permitted to reside and draw his stipend in this Presidency, payment of pension is to be made and charged accordingly:—

No. 13, Gunner Edward Gardener, 18th Brigade, Royal Artillery, One Shilling a day from the date on which he shall have ceased to draw Regimental Pay.

No. 461 of 1864.—Surgeon H. P. Lawrence is granted a furlough to Europe for eighteen months, on medical certificate, from the date of departure of the Steamer from Point de Galle.

No. 464 of 1864.—Men on the unattached List may have furlough on sick certificate under the restrictions stated in G. O. No. 399, dated 23rd June 1860, notwithstanding that they may have volunteered for General Service, or have been transferred from British Regiments to the unattached List.

No. 465 of 1864.—The following General Order by the Government of India, dated 15th September 1864, No. 745, is republished:—

“No. 746 of 1864.—The 10th paragraph of Government General Order, No. 875 of the 26th October 1853, regarding the mode of payment to Native Soldiers of the Madras and Bombay Armies on furlough, is to be expunged, and the following substituted for it:—

“10. The disbursing Officers will furnish, at the beginning of each month, to the Military Accountant of the Presidency to which the Soldier belongs, a statement of the payments made by them during the month, in the accompanying form No. 2,* accompanied by the original receipts. The duplicate receipts will accompany the account current as vouchers in support of the relative debits.”

No. 466 of 1864.—The following General Order by the Government of India, dated 15th September 1864, No. 759, is republished:—

“No. 759 of 1864.—In order to remove doubts as to the claims of non-combatants to share in prize distributions, it is notified, for general information, that such classes are only allowed to share when their presence under the enemy's fire may have been expressly required by proper authority.

2. Bheesties and puckallies, when required to be present with their troops or companies in action and under fire, to supply the soldiers with water; store lascars, dooly bearers, and other mustered establishments, employed under fire; cooks of European regiments, obliged to take the meals of the soldiers under fire into the trenches during a siege; and artillery and mounted officers' syces required to be present under fire with spare horses, have accordingly been allowed to share.

3. The claims of each individual belonging to one of these classes, or to any other fixed military establishment, must be supported by a certificate that he was specially required to be present with the troops in action, and that he was in consequence actually exposed to the enemy's fire, and the certificate should show by what authority, and under what circumstances he was ordered to be so exposed.

Lieutenant W. T. Keays, Acting Sub-Assistant Commissary General 1st Class, will revert to the grade of Acting Sub-Assistant Commissary General 2nd Class.

No. 469 of 1864.—The following appointments are made from the date of Major Thacker's resignation of his appointment in the Commissariat Department:—

No. 470 of 1864.—The following General Order by the Government of India, dated 26th August 1864, No. 702, is republished:—

"No. 702 of 1864.—With reference to Article 65, Section XXXI. page 321, of the Code of 1849, it is hereby notified that a Soldier may remit *bond fide* savings from his pay to his friends in England as well as to his family.

2. The remittance must not exceed the net amount of pay which has accrued to the Soldier since the last remittance made by him, nor the net amount of his pay for one year last passed, as prescribed in paragraph 231, page 71, of the War Office Explanatory Directions.

"No. 708 of 1864.—The following Despatches, received from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for India, are published for General information:—

INDIA OFFICE; London, the 31st May 1864.

To His Excellency the Right Honorable the Governor General of India in Council.

SIR,—Your Military letter, dated 5th April, No. 148, transmits a reference made by Colonel Curtis, Commanding Her Majesty's 21st Hussars, asking for information in regard to his service for pension. Your Government observe that you are not in a position to give any definite reply to these questions, as they are not distinctly met by any of the instructions you have from time to time received from Her Majesty's Government. You also state that here is an important distinction between those Officers who entered the Staff Corps and those who volunteered for the new Line Regiments. The former were distinctly told, before quitting the local service, that they would be brought under the new furlough regulations. No such declaration was made to those who volunteered for the new Line Regiments.

2. It appears to me that the instructions of Her Majesty's Government have been precise and clear in respect to both classes of Officers. In the same manner that the Staff Corps Officer has been informed that his service for pension, after joining the Staff Corps, will reckon under the new furlough rules, the new Line Officer has been assured that his position, with respect to pension, remains unaltered by his transfer to the British Army.

3. In reply to your letter, dated 19th February 1863, No. 75, which requested explicit instructions as to the rules under which leave of absence was to be granted to Officers of the new Brigades of Artillery and new Line Regiments, I stated that the amount of leave to be deducted from the service of these Officers for pension, would depend on the furlough rules they might have chosen, and that, in respect to leave of absence, the position of those Officers remained unaltered by their transfer to the British Army. In my Despatch, dated 30th June 1863, I informed you that all Officers of the Artillery and new Line Regiments would, 'without reference to the furlough regulations they may have elected, and by which their claim to pension will be determined,' receive six months' allowances during absence on medical certificate. Again the answer given in my Despatch, dated 24th November last, No. 402, to the third question then put by your Government, clearly showed it was intended that, as regards *pension*, these Officers, if they had not already made their election, were still to have the option of claiming the advantages of the old or new furlough rules at pleasure as if they had continued in the local service.*

4. It now appears to your Government that all cases which can arise in regard to the service for pension of these Officers would be equitably met by deciding as follows;—

'*Firstly.*—That Officers who, before entering the new Line Regiments, had elected for the new furlough regulations, can only count their leave for pension under those regulations.'

5. This is quite correct. A similar restriction would have been applied to them had they remained in the local service.

'*Secondly.*—That Officers who, before entering the new Line Regiments, had made no election, or who had elected for the old furlough regulations, may count for pension under the old rules all the leave they have already taken or may hereafter take, or count it all under the new; or count the leave taken before entering the regiment under the old regulations, and the leave taken since entering the regiment under the new regulations in the same way as Staff Corps Officers are entitled to do under G. O. No. 520 of 1862.'

6. This would not be in accordance with the intentions of Her Majesty's Government. The position of the new Royal Artillery and line Officer as to pension, it has been ruled, is to remain unaltered. It follows, then, that if the Officer has elected the old furlough rules, his pension must be regulated by those rules. If he has chosen the new furlough rules, his service for pension must be calculated under those rules. If he has made no election, he must be required to do so, at the appointed time, in the same manner he would have been required to elect had he remained a local Officer. Upon this point, I would draw your attention to the concluding part of my letter to your Government, dated 24th April 1863, No. 152, which stated,—

'The amount of leave to be deducted from service for pension will depend upon the furlough rules which they may have chosen, and it will be necessary that the Commanders in Chief of the several Presidencies should be careful to require that every Officer who has not yet made his selection should do so (the same being reported to Government) on the first occasion of his making application for leave of absence.'

7. With regard to the particular case of Colonel Curtis, 21st Hussars, out of which the present reference has arisen, I have to inform you that it is still competent to this Officer, who, it is stated, has not taken leave of absence since the establishment of the new furlough rules, and has consequently not been required to make his election, to make his choice of the furlough rules he would abide by when he may apply for leave of absence, or for permission to retire from the service, whichever may first happen.

INDIA OFFICE; London, 16th July 1864.

To His Excellency the Right Honorable the Governor General of India in Council.

SIR,—With your letter, dated 15th May, No. 189, you transmit papers containing your decisions on questions raised, whether Officers of the new Royal Artillery and new Line Regiments are to be allowed, in common with Officers of the Indian service, furloughs within Indian limits; and whether, in the cases of these Officers, if under the old rules, as regards retiring pension, the whole or any part of such furlough is to be recorded against their service for retiring pension.

2. The decision conveyed in your Secretary's letter No. 469, dated 16th January 1864, regarding the terms on which Officers of the Indian service may take furlough in India, is in accordance with my Despatch, No. 403, dated 24th November 1863, and has my approval.

3. With regard to the question raised in the letter of the Adjutant General, dated 13th February 1864, whether the above decision is to apply to Officers of the new Artillery and new Line Regiments, I would observe that such Officers, being under the regulations applicable to British Officers, they have no claim to "furlough," if by the term is meant the fixed periods of leave of absence allowed under Indian rules. The decision contained in your reply to the Adjutant General, dated 24th February 1864, No. 774, to the following effect, was therefore correct:—

'Officers of the new Royal Artillery and new Line Regiments obtain leave of absence from the Commander in Chief; but the Government of India can see no objection to these Officers taking long leave in India with His Excellency's permission, on the understanding that English pay only can be granted to them for periods of leave in excess of those for which Indian Allowances are passed under existing rules.'

4. My Despatch, dated 31st May, No. 171, will have caused you to modify the decision contained in your Secretary's letter to the Secretary to the Government of Madras, dated 12th April, No. 322, 'that, if Officers of the new Line Regiments are permitted to take long leave in India in lieu of furlough to Europe, the whole period of such leave must be held to reckon against their service counting for pension.'

5. Such of these Officers as may have elected the old furlough regulations, will still be allowed to count leave of absence in India to the authorised extent as service for pension.

With reference to the foregoing Despatches and to those on the same subject previously published in General Orders, the Right Honorable the Governor General in Council considers it necessary to state concisely what the intentions of Her Majesty's Government are in respect to the rules under which Officers of the new Brigades of Artillery and of the new Line Regiments can obtain leave of absence in India or to England, and the extent to which such leave affects their claim to pension.

Officers of the Brigades of Royal Artillery and of the new Line Regiments are, as regards leave of absence brought entirely under the rules laid down in Her Majesty's Regulations. Leave, whether within or beyond Indian limits, is granted to them entirely under the orders of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, with whom it rests to grant, withhold, or extend it.

The restrictions which, under Indian rules, are placed on the grant of furlough, as to the time which must be passed in India, before a furlough can be taken, and the periods of Indian service which must intervene between an Officer's return from furlough and his being permitted to proceed again to England are, as regards Officers of Royal Artillery and the new Line Regiments, abrogated, the only limits to the leave which may be granted to them are those which may be caused by the requirements of the service.

On the other hand, the Officers who are thus relieved from the restrictions of the Indian rules cease to have a claim to furlough, as implying a right to take leave of absence for a fixed period after certain stated intervals.

With regard to the extent to which the leave, Officers of the Royal Artillery and new Line Regiments may obtain, will affect their claim to pension, Her Majesty's Government have ruled that the amount of leave to be deducted from their service for pension will depend on the furlough rules they may have chosen, or, in the case of those who have not yet done so, and to whom an option is open, the rules they may hereafter choose.

This order does not apply to Officers of the Royal Engineers (late Indian Engineers), who remain, as heretofore, under the Indian regulations.

Whereas, it has been represented to Us that it is expedient to cancel Our Royal Warrant of the 30th October

1861, which prescribes the conditions under which a discharged Limited Service Soldier shall be permitted, on re-engagement or re-enlistment, to reckon his former service: Our will and pleasure is, that instead of the before-mentioned conditions, which are hereby cancelled, any Soldier who has been, or shall hereafter be, enlisted for Limited Service, and has been, or shall

hereafter be, discharged, before or after the expiration of the first period of service, and shall be permitted to re-engage or re-enlist within twelve months from the date of his discharge, shall be allowed, under Clauses 2 and 3 of the Regulations hereunto annexed, or such others as shall from time to time be established by Our Secretary of State for War and the Field-Marshal Commanding in Chief of Our Army, to reckon the full period of his former service towards future claims to Good Conduct Pay and Pension.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, this sixth day of June, 1864, in the twenty-seventh year of Our reign.

Regulations to be annexed to the Royal Warrant of the 6th June 1864.—Circular No. 865.

1. With a view to hold out every encouragement to time-expired Soldiers of good character to continue in the Service, it is hereby notified that, in addition to the privilege of being permitted, on re-engagement, to count the full period of their first term of service towards Good Conduct Pay and Pension, and of receiving a fresh Bounty, as well as the regulated allowance in lieu of a free Kit, and an allowance of 1s. a-day for 20 days—men who re-engage at the Head Quarters or

Depôt of their regiment for a second term of service, will be entitled to a gratuity of £1, and a furlough for 2 months, or, when serving at certain foreign stations, a pecuniary allowance in lieu of the furlough.

The furlough for men serving at Home will commence from the date of their re-engagement;—and for men serving at Gibraltar and Malta, from the date of their arrival in this country; a passage for such men will be provided, at the public expense, at a convenient opportunity, at the discretion of the Commanding Officer, from those stations, and back again if they are not ordered to join the depôts of their regiments at the termination of the furlough.

Men serving in India, China, Ceylon, the Mauritius, Australia, or New Zealand, will be allowed £5, and men serving in Canada, at the Cape of Good Hope, at St. Helena, or in the West Indies £3, in lieu of the furlough, and in addition to the gratuity of £1. The allowance in lieu of the furlough will not, however, be granted to men who re-engage after their regiment has been placed under orders to return Home; as in such cases furloughs will be allowed as soon after the arrival of the regiment in this country as circumstances will permit.

2. Soldiers of good character who have been, or may hereafter be, discharged after the completion of the first term of Limited Service, will be permitted to re-engage or re-enlist within 12 months from the date of their discharge, for any Corps of the same Arm of the service as that from which they were discharged, provided they are not above thirty-four years of age. Men so re-engaging or re-enlisting will be allowed to count the full period of their former service towards Good Conduct Pay and Pension; and on joining the Corps in which they re-engage or re-enlist, they will be permitted to resume the Good Conduct Badges and rates of Good Conduct Pay which they may have been in possession of at the time of their discharge; provided, however, that at the time of their re-engagement or re-enlistment, they shall declare the period of their former service, and the cause of their discharge from their last Corps.

3. Soldiers of good character who have been, or may hereafter be, discharged on reduction, on account of disability, by purchase, or otherwise, during their first term of Limited Service, and who re-enlist within twelve months from the date of their discharge, and are not above thirty-four years of age, will be allowed the benefit of the preceding provision for reckoning former service, and resuming former Good Conduct Pay.

RULES FOR SANDAL-WOOD AUCTION SALES.

1. Every Auction Sale shall be held in the presence of the Superintendent or Deputy Superintendent of the District, or Conservator or Assistant Conservator of Forests.
2. The assortment of the Sandal-wood as made by the Public authorities will on no account be disturbed.
3. The highest bidder shall be the purchaser, and in the event of any dispute arising between two or more bidders at the same price, the lot so disputed shall be put up again and resold.
4. The former system of upset prices is abrogated, but in the event of the first three lots in each class not averaging such a price as may be considered a fair market value by the Officer presiding, he shall be at liberty, should he deem it proper so to do, to stop all further sales in that Class.
5. Any surplus that may be found in weighing the quantity sold for delivery to the purchaser will be charged to him at the same rate at which the lot is sold.
6. A Candy in the Mysore Province is equal to 560 English Pounds, or 20 Maunds of 40 Seers, but that of the Coorg Province is equal to 550 Pounds only.
7. The wood will be handed over to the purchaser at the Sandal Kotees, and the whole quantity purchased, must be paid for, and taken possession of, within 30 days from the date of the sale.
8. Any quantity which may remain unpaid for at the expiration of 30 days from the date of sale, will be resold at the risk of the first purchaser; and should the wood paid for not be removed from the Sirkar Kotees within 3 months from the date of payment, Kotee rent at the rate of 4 annas per Candy will be charged from date of sale. It will then be weighed in the presence of one of the Forest Assistants and removed out of the Kotees, and the losses arising therefrom shall be borne by the purchaser. The Government does not hold itself answerable for the loss of weight arising from the wood being kept in store after sale.
9. The purchaser shall, after the sale, deposit a sum equal to 25 per cent. of the amount of his purchase, to be forfeited to the Government on failure of his adhering to the terms above specified.
10. It is to be understood that in conformity with existing rules, no Sandalwood can be sold by private individuals within the Mysore territories, or pass without a passport, which will be granted on application by the Forest or Revenue authorities.

Medical Practitioners particularly are requested to aid the registration. Blank forms of Death Reports, to keep by them in readiness, are given gratuitously on application at the Office of the Deputy Commissioner of Police.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind, that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all single cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.

Registered Letters.—The attention of the Public is called to the following paragraph 17 of the Rules for Registering letters at Post Offices :—

“Paragraph 17. A letter containing Bank Notes, Postage Stamps, or other valuable articles, should, as a rule, be registered, and should be securely folded, or enclosed in a substantial envelope, and always sealed with wax, in order to prevent, as far as possible, its being tampered with.”

No Afternoon Delivery during the Monsoon.—During the Monsoon there will be only two deliveries of Letters and Papers issued from this office, at 9 A. M. and 1 P. M. daily.

The Letter Boxes over the Island of Bombay will in consequence be cleared at 10 A.M. and 5 P.M., excepting on Sundays, when there will be one delivery at noon and one clearance of the Letter Boxes at 3 P. M.

Samples of Merchandize by Post.—An arrangement has been made with the London Post Office for sending Patterns of Merchandize by Post between India and the United Kingdom, under the rules and at the rates of Postage indicated below. The arrangement will commence as regards despatches from India from the 1st May next. Intimation has been received from the London Post Office that the arrangement will commence as regards despatches thence from the 1st April.

1. The Patterns must not be of intrinsic value. The rule excludes all articles of a saleable nature, and whatever may have a value of its own apart from its mere use as a Pattern. The quantity of any material sent, ostensibly as a Pattern, must not be so great that it could fairly be considered as having on this ground an intrinsic value.

2. The Patterns must not bear any writing other than the address of the persons for whom they are intended, a manufacturer's or trade mark, numbers, and the prices of the articles; nor must they contain any letter closed or open, or any enclosure sealed or otherwise closed against inspection.

3. The Patterns must be sent in covers open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination; samples, however, of Seeds, Drugs, and so forth, which cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen or other material; but closed bags, although transparent, must not be used for this purpose.

4. The rule which forbids the transmission through the Post of any explosive or dangerous substance will of course be applicable to Patterns, and no article likely to injure the contents of the Mail Bags is to be sent.

5. No Pattern Packet can be received if it exceeds two feet in length, width, or depth, or 3 lbs. in weight.

6. The Inland Transit of Pattern Packets will be by Banghy Post.

7. The following Postage rates (prepaid by a Stamp or Stamps) will be charged on Pattern Packets sent under these regulations by Post to the United Kingdom. The rates being consolidated rates, no Inland Postage is leviable in addition:—
