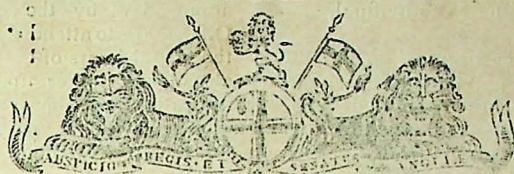

Verbal offers for the contracts will be received at this Office, on Monday the 17th December 1855, at 12 o'clock precisely, when bidders will be required to bid a percentage above or below the prices exhibited in the above lists at which the supply will be made, on the understanding that the articles supplied are to be of unexceptionable quality, and are to be delivered in the first instance at the Commissariat Stores at Ahmednuggur, if required, and afterwards to the indenting Departments, in good condition, free of all charges beyond the stipulated price, in such quantities as may from time to time be demanded, and that the same are liable to examination and rejection by the executive Commissariat Officer, or by the indenting or receiving Officer; or by a Committee of Officers appointed on the part of Government, in the event of the contractor being dissatisfied with the decision of the above Officer, or

either of them; it being understood that the decision of such Committee is to be final, and binding on all parties.

3. No person will be allowed to bid for any contract unless he previously deposits in this Office, in cash, the sum exhibited opposite the Schedule referring thereto, which sum will be forfeited in the event of delay, evasion, or refusal on his part to execute the necessary deed of contract when required to do so, on his offer being accepted, in which latter case he must be prepared to give unexceptionable bonded security to the further amount shown opposite each Schedule, which, together with the amount previously deposited, will be held as a guarantee for the due fulfilment of his contract.

4. Contractors must comply immediately with all emergent demands, and meet others of less urgency within the periods stated in the requisitions made upon them, in failure whereof, or if any supply be condemned by a Committee of Officers as aforesaid, the articles, or such others as may be required in lieu thereof, shall be purchased by this Department without delay, at their risk and cost, if it be considered expedient to do so; and in all such cases thirty (30) per cent. upon the amount of expenses incurred, or a fine of Rs. fifty (50), at the option of the executive Commissariat Officer, will be levied as liquidation of damages for each and every such breach of contract,—it being understood that the simple condemnation of any article by a Committee constitutes such a breach of contract, whether the rejected articles be replaced by the contractors or by this Department; in every such case, also, it is to be understood that the contracts may be cancelled, at the discretion of the Commissary General, and that if the contracts be so cancelled, the cash deposits mentioned in para. 3 of this Notice will be forfeited to Government.

5. It is also to be understood that any negligence, evasion, or refusal on the part of contractors to make supplies, or obey orders, or any attempt on their part, or that of their agents, to pass off articles of an inferior quality in lieu of those they are bound to supply, or any neglect to deliver them at the time and place ordered, will subject them, in every instance to be fined to the extent of Rs. twenty-five (25), at the option of the executive Commissariat Officer, from whose order an appeal may be made to the Commissary General, whose decision is to be final; but in case when it may be deemed fit to exact any of the penalties provided for in the preceding clause, no further penalty shall be leviable under this clause.

6. It is further to be understood, that the

contractors, or accredited agents on their part, approved of by the executive Commissariat Officer, are to attend at this Office daily during the usual hours of business before mentioned, also at such other time or place as may be indicated by the executive Commissariat Officer, when he may consider it desirable for the public service to require such attendance.

7. Any party or parties whose offers are accepted will be required to produce their sureties for the approval of the Cantonment and Civil Authorities, within fifteen days from the date of the acceptance of their offers, or the contracts will be resold. No reason will be assigned for rejecting any security offered.

8. Legislative Council.

17th November 1855.

The following Act, passed by the Legislative Council, received the assent of the Most Noble the Governor General on the 23rd October 1855 (communicated to the Legislative Council on the 17th November 1855), and is hereby promulgated for general information:—

ACT No. XXIX. OF 1855.

An Act for amending Act No. VI. of 1844.

Whereas it is prescribed, by Regulation II. of 1803 of the Madras Code, that the Collectors of the public revenue, derived from duties on commodities by Sea or Land, as well as from other sources, shall be under the immediate control of the Board of Revenue, and shall obey all orders communicated to them by the authority of that Board; and it is expedient to amend Act No. VI. of 1844, in so far as it may be construed to exempt any orders or proceedings of officers employed in the collection of Customs from the revision and control of of the said Board of Revenue, and in so far as it makes the proceedings of Collectors of Customs depend upon the orders of Government in certain cases; It is enacted as follows:—

I. The Board of Revenue is empowered to revise the proceedings of all officers employed in the collection of Sea Customs and Land Frontier Customs, under Act No. VI. of 1844, and to annul or modify the orders of such officers.

II. The Board of Revenue is empowered, instead of the Governor in Council, to pass orders in all cases in which, by the proviso in Section XVII. Act No. VI. of 1844 relating to baggage, and by Sections XXVI. and LXI. of the same Act, the proceedings of the Collectors of Customs are dependent on the orders of Government.

III. In case of imported goods being charged by a Collector of Customs, under the first rule annexed to Schedule A of Act No. VI. of 1844, with a rate of duty above what they are liable to on the declaration of the importer as to the place of manufacture or production, an appeal shall lie to the Board of Revenue, instead of the Governor in Council.

ACT No. XXX. OF 1855.

An Act to repeal Section VII. of Act No. XXVIII. of 1839.

Whereas it is expedient to repeal Section VII. of the said Act, the provisions thereof being unnecessary—

Preamble.

Section VII. Act XXVIII.
1839 repealed.

I. It is enacted that Section VII. of Act No. XXVIII. of 1839 be repealed.

Legislative Council.

10th November 1855.

The following Bill was read a second time in the Legislative Council on the 10th November 1855, and was referred to a Select Committee who are to report thereon after the 14th of February next:—

A Bill to relieve the Court of Sudder Fouzdary Adawlut at Bombay from the supervision of the Gaols in that Presidency.

WHEREAS it is expedient to relieve the Court of Sudder Fouzdary Adawlut at Bombay from the supervision of the Gaols in that Presidency: It is enacted as follows:—

I. Clause Third Section XVI. Regulation XIII. 1827 of the Bombay Code; and so much of Clause Fourth Section XXVII. of the same Regulation as enacts that the Court of Sudder Fouzdary Adawlut shall furnish information to Government of the state of the Gaols in each Zillah; and Sections IV. and V. Regulation XVI. 1828 of the same Code, are hereby repealed.

II. From and after the passing of this Act, the supervision of all Gaols in the said Presidency shall be vested in, and exercised by, the Governor in Council of Bombay; and for the better supervision and inspection thereof, it shall be lawful for the said Governor in Council to appoint such person as he shall think fit, to inspect and superintend the said Gaols, subject to the orders of the said Governor in Council, and to vest in such person such power and authority for the purposes aforesaid as to the said Governor in Council may seem proper.

Legislative Council.

The following Bill was read a first and second time in the Legislative Council on the 17th November 1855, under suspension of the Standing Orders, and ordered to be promulgated for general information:—

A Bill to prohibit the exportation of Saltpetre, except in British vessels bound to the Ports of London or Liverpool.

Whereas it is expedient that, during the continuance of hostilities between the Allied Powers and the Emperor of Russia, the exportation of Saltpetre from India, except in British vessels bound to the Port of London or to the Port of Liverpool, should be prohibited: It is enacted as follows:—

I. Until the Governor General of India in Council shall otherwise order, it shall not be lawful for any person to export Saltpetre from any part of the Territories in the possession and under the Government of the East India Company, except in a British vessel bound either to the Port of London or to the Port of Liverpool.

II. If any person shall attempt to export Saltpetre contrary to the provisions of this Act, the same shall be seized and confiscated.

III. Every person who shall export or attempt to export Saltpetre contrary to the provisions of this Act, or who shall aid or assist in such exportation or attempt, shall, upon conviction before a Magistrate or a Justice of the Peace, be subject to a fine not exceeding the rate of 20 Rupees for every ton of Saltpetre so exported or attempted to be exported.

IV. No Collector or other Officer of Customs shall, on or after the 17th day of November 1855, grant a pass or permit for the exportation or shipment for exportation of Saltpetre from any part of the said Territories, except in a British vessel bound for the Port of London, or for the Port of Liverpool; and every Collector and other Officer of Customs is hereby indemnified for any thing heretofore done or hereafter to be done according to the provisions of this Act.

V. Nothing in this Act shall extend to any Saltpetre shipped prior to the 17th day of November 1855, nor to any Saltpetre for the exportation or shipment for exportation whereof, otherwise than according to this Act, a permit or pass was granted on or before that day.

VI. Any Custom House Officer may without warrant seize Saltpetre liable to confiscation under this Act.

VII. If any Saltpetre shall be seized as liable to confiscation, the Collector of Customs shall investigate the case, and according to his judgment shall either release the same or adjudge it to confiscation; and whenever he shall declare the same to be confiscated, he shall report his proceeding for confirmation and final adjudication to the superior Revenue authorities.

VIII. Any person, whether a European British subject or not, who shall be guilty of any offence for which, according to the provisions of this Act, he shall be liable to a fine, shall be punishable for such offence by any Justice of the Peace, Magistrate, or person lawfully exercising the powers of a Magistrate; and any person hereby made punishable by a Justice of the Peace shall be punishable upon summary conviction.

6. The men to be recommended for this Gratuity, without reference to the total length of their service, must, for 18 years, have borne an irreproachable character, and have never been convicted by a Court Martial, or if not coming strictly within these latter conditions must have particularly distinguished themselves by gallantry and zeal in the Service.

The Gratuity so awarded will be paid shortly after presentation of the Medal and placed in the Regimental Savings' Bank to be there held, not under the control of the Soldier, in deposit at interest, until his discharge; and shall be deemed to be his personal property, subject only to forfeiture for misconduct of which he may be convicted by a General, Garrison, or District Court Martial; and should he die before he has completed 21 years' service, or after completing such service before his discharge, such Gratuity, with its accumulated interest, shall be deemed to be a part of his effects, and be payable to his legal representative.

7. With the view of further marking meritorious conduct, and of inciting other Soldiers to imitate such conduct, it is directed that upon awarding to such Soldiers the above Gratuity, they shall be entitled to wear a Silver Medal having on one side the words "For long Service and Good Conduct," and on the other side, the Company's Arms, with the name and rank of the Soldier. This Medal will be delivered to the Soldier by the Commanding Officer of the Regiment on Parade, and shall be worn by him as an honorable testimonial of approbation of his conduct, during the remainder of his service.

10. The Commander in Chief will notify to Government the names of the individuals to whom these Gratuities and Medals have been periodically awarded, in order that sanction may be given to the investment of the amount of Gratuity in the Regimental Savings' Banks; and the Government of the Presidency, upon receiving a Notification that the individuals are about to be discharged with such Gratuity and Medal, will, through the Honorable the Court of Directors, so far as is practicable, notify to the Parishes to which the men belong, the honorable distinction which has been conferred upon them.

A proportion of water-proof or oil-skin Capes, for use on board-ship during wet weather, will also be provided when considered necessary. These, as well as the hammocks, are to be returned into store at the end of the voyage for re-issue.

Before embarkation, the Great Coats in use are to be carefully examined, and all that may be considered unfit for the service, though they may not have lasted the full time, are to be exchanged for new ones. This Rule does not apply to Troops embarking for ordinary duty at Stations beyond sea.

A supply of Great Coats and Blankets to repair losses is to be sent under charge of the Commissariat Department whenever the service is likely to be protracted.

A supply of flannel banians, boots and socks, is also to be sent in such cases, for issue at such reduced prices as may, from time to time, be fixed with the sanction of Government, not in the first instance, but at the expiration of a certain time, to be determined, according to circumstances, by the General Officer Commanding.

For Men proceeding to England with their Regiments or Detachments—all Invalids, time-expired men, and others provided with a passage by Government.

Colonial Newspapers or Prices Current posted in India for Great Britain are not subject in India to any charge for Postage, but Newspapers posted in India, addressed to any British Colony or Possession, or any Foreign Port, or any Port in India, are, if sent by Her Majesty's Steamers, or *via* Southampton through England, liable to a Postage charge of One Penny (9 pie), which must be prepaid. Newspapers sent through Great Britain *via* Marseilles are liable to a Postage charge of Four Pence (3 annas), and if addressed to British North America *via* the United States, a further charge of One Penny must be levied on account of the United States in addition to all other Postage.

Newspapers and Prices Current brought to India by Her Majesty's Packets from a Foreign Port, without having passed through Great Britain, are chargeable with One Penny (9 pie) on delivery.

211. All Steam Postage, if pre-paid, must be paid by means of Postage Stamps affixed to the Letter; it is chargeable in addition to Indian Inland Postage, and is credited to the English Post Office.

212. No Letter or other article can be despatched to any place not within the Territories under the Government of the East India Company, unless the full amount of Inland Postage must be pre-paid. The following Rules, which, under the orders of the Government of India, have been issued for the guidance of the Officers of the Post Office, are published for general information:—

I. Letters arriving at the Presidency towns by Mail Steamers will be immediately sorted for delivery, without any reference to instructions which may have been received regarding change of address. Such changes will be left to be discovered by the Delivery Officers, and be corrected in the Forward and Unclaimed Departments of the Office.

II. A separate instruction will be required for every change of address, and no instruction will be attended to for more than three months after its receipt.

III. Under Section XXIII. of Act XVII. of 1854, Forward Postage will be charged, in addition to all other Postage due or paid thereon, upon every letter without exception which may be re-directed in any Post Office. For example, if a letter posted in Calcutta, and addressed to Hooghly, is, under instructions which may have been received from the addressee, re-directed in the Calcutta Post Office, and sent to Barrackpore, Forward Postage will be charged in addition to the Postage which would have been due had the letter been despatched to Hooghly according to its original address.

IV. The practice of giving instructions to the Officers of the Post Office to intercept and re-direct letters not only imposes much labour upon them, but, in large Offices, seriously retards the delivery and despatch of the Mails. A Register of instructions regarding changes of address will be kept in every Post Office, but it must be understood that it is impossible to guarantee that they shall be attended to, except in the case of letters received for delivery.
