The following Act, passed by the Legislative Council of India, received the assent of the Right Honorable the Governor General on the 31st July 1857, and is hereby promulgated for general information:—

ACT No. XXIV. OF 1857.

An Act to authorise the Levy of Port-dues and Fees, at the present Rates, for a further period of Six Months.

Whereas the period during which the dues and fees now usually collected at the several Ports within the territories in the possession and under the Government of the East India Company may be collected at such Ports respectively, as fixed by Act XVI. of 1856, will expire on the 13th of August 1857, and it is expedient to extend that period;

It is hereby enacted, that the dues and fees now usually collected at the several Ports within the said territories may be collected at such Ports during the period of six months from the 13th of August 1857.

Continuance of existing Port-dues and Fees for six months.

The following Bill, as amended by the Select Committee, to whom it was referred, is hereby published for general information:—

A Bill to render Officers and Soldiers in the Native Army liable to Forfeiture of Property for Mutiny, and to provide for the Adjudication and Recovery of Forfeitures of Property in certain cases.

Whereas it is expedient to render Officers and Soldiers in the Native Army, who shall be convicted of mutiny, subject to the forfeiture of all their property, and to provide for the adjudication and recovery of forfeitures in certain cases; It is enacted as follows:—

I. Every Officer and Soldier, or other person subject to the Articles of War for the Native Army, who shall be convicted of mutiny, shall forfeit all his property, of every description.

II. If any person who shall have committed treason, or any offence for which, by this Act or Act XI. of 1857, or Act XIV. of 1857, or Act XVI. of 1857, his property is declared to be forfeited, shall have been killed, or shall have died, or shall have escaped out of the territories of the East India Company, before he shall have been convicted of the offence, or shall keep out of the way for the purpose of avoiding trial, any Court or other authority which might have tried such offender, if he could have been brought to trial, shall, upon the application of the Magistrate or other Officer authorised by Government to make such application, hold an inquiry; and on proof that the person charged with having committed the offence was guilty thereof, and that he is dead, or has escaped out of the territories of the East India Company, or cannot after diligent

Adjudication of forfeiture in case of death or escape of offender before conviction of an offence for which property is liable to be forfeited.

search be found, shall adjudge that all the property of such offender shall be forfeited to Government.

III. The forfeiture, whether upon conviction of an offence as aforesaid, or upon an adjudication of forfeiture under this Act, shall extend to all property and effects of or to which the offender shall have been possessed or entitled, either at the time of committing the offence, or at the time of the conviction or of the adjudication of forfeiture, or at any intermediate time; and no sale, alienation, or other disposition of such property, made subsequently to the commission of the offence, or made at any time with the fraudulent intention of preventing a forfeiture, shall have any effect against the right of Government to the forfeiture. Provided that nothing in this Section contained shall affect any transferee of any negotiable security, who shall prove that he acquired the same in good faith, and with due caution for valuable consideration.

Proviso.

IV. All immovable property of the offender, which shall be alienated after the passing of this Act, and before the commission of any offence specified in Section II. shall be forfeited in the same manner as if no such alienation had been made, unless the alienation be made in good faith and for valuable consideration, or unless the same shall have been made and registered more than three months before the commission of the offence.

Alienation made and registered three months before commission of offence.

V. The Court or other authority by which the offender shall be convicted, or the forfeiture shall be adjudged, may specify, in the conviction or adjudication, the day on which the offence was committed, if it can be ascertained.

VI. In any proceeding concerning property alleged to have been forfeited, the conviction shall be conclusive evidence that the offence was committed, and (if the day be specified in such conviction) that the offence was committed on that day; if the day be not specified, the conviction shall be *prima facie* evidence that the offence was committed on the day mentioned in the charge. In any such proceeding, an adjudication of forfeiture under this Act shall be *prima facie* evidence of the commission of the offence, and (if the day be specified in the adjudication) that the offence was committed on that day; if the day be not specified, the adjudication shall be *prima facie* evidence that the offence was committed on the day mentioned in the charge. Any adjudication under this Act shall be filed with, and may be proved in the same manner as, the records of the Principal Court of Criminal jurisdiction of the District.

VII. After the conviction or adjudication, the Collector or other Chief Officer appointed by Government for the collection of Revenue, or any other Officer whom the Government may specially appoint, may seize and take possession of the forfeited property: if he require the assistance of a Court to enable him to obtain possession of any such property by reason of any dispute respecting the title to the same or for any other cause, the Principal Civil Court of original jurisdiction of the District in which the property is situate may, upon the production of a certified copy of the conviction or adjudication, hear and determine, in a summary manner, upon petition, any matter in dispute relating to such property. Any order which may be passed by the Court shall not be subject to appeal; but the party against whom the same may be given, by any Court other than one of Her Majesty's

Supreme Courts of Judicature, shall be at liberty to bring a suit to establish his right at any time within one year from the date of the order.

VIII. In case any person whose property shall have been so adjudged to be forfeited shall afterwards surrender himself, and shall, upon trial before a competent Court, be acquitted of the offence, his property shall be restored upon proof, to the satisfaction of the Court, that he did not escape or keep out of the way for the purpose of evading justice.

IX. No suit or other proceeding shall be had or taken on account of the seizure of any property seized in pursuance of this Act, or for the restoration or recovery of such property, unless the same be instituted within one year from the time of the seizure.

X. In case it shall appear to a Magistrate that there is reasonable ground to suppose that any person is guilty of any offence specified in Section II. of this Act, and that any property liable to forfeiture for the offence is likely to be made away with, it shall be lawful for the Magistrate to attach such property and secure the same until the trial of the offender, or until an inquiry for the purpose of adjudication under this Act shall be had.

XI. The word "Magistrate" in this Act shall include any Officer competent to commit for trial for any offence specified in Section II. of this Act.

The following Bill was read a second time in the Legislative Council on the 1st August 1857, and was referred to a Select Committee, who are to report thereon (under suspension of the Standing Orders) on the 8th idem:—

A Bill relating to the Importation, Manufacture, and Sale of Arms and Ammunition, and for Regulating the Right to Keep or Use the same.

Whereas it is expedient to regulate the importation, manufacture, and sale of Arms and Ammunition, and the right to keep or use the same; It is enacted as follows:—

I. No person shall carry or use, or have in his custody or possession, any Arms of the following description, (that is to say) any fire-arms, bayonet, sword, spear, or spear-head, without a license for that purpose granted by such Officer as is hereinafter authorised to grant licenses; and if any person shall carry or use, or have in his custody or possession, any such Arms as aforesaid, without such license, he shall be liable, on conviction before a Magistrate, to a fine not exceeding One hundred Rupees for the first offence, and to a fine not exceeding Two hundred Rupees for a second or subsequent offence: and the Arms shall be forfeited to Government upon conviction either of a first or subsequent offence, if the Magistrate or other Officer before whom the offender shall be convicted shall so adjudge.

II. The license shall be in the form in the Schedule to this Act annexed, or to the like effect.

III. If any person shall carry or use, or have in his custody or possession in any public place, any such Arms without such license as afore-

Going armed in a public place without license.

said, any Magistrate within whose jurisdiction the same

Arms may be seized. may be found, or any European Commissioned Officer in the service of Her Majesty or of the East India Company on actual duty, or any Member of any Volunteer Corps enrolled by authority of Government whilst on actual duty, or any Police Officer, may seize and detain such Arms, or cause the same to be seized and detained; and if such Arms be so carried or used, or be found

And persons refusing to give name, &c. may be detained. in the custody or possession of any person without such license as aforesaid, between sunset and sunrise, or if the

person carrying or using the Arms shall neglect or refuse to give his name and address upon being requested so to do, or shall give a false name or address, the person so carrying or using such Arms, or in whose custody or possession the same shall be found, may be apprehended and detained without a warrant by any person hereinbefore authorised to seize the Arms.

IV. If any such license be accidentally lost or de-

Renewal of lost license. stroyed, a new license may be granted upon application made by the person licensed, upon his making a declaration to the effect that the license has been accidentally lost or destroyed. If any person shall make a false

False declaration. declaration in any case in which by this Act a declaration is required to be made, or shall wilfully give a false answer to any material question which may be put to him in reference to the granting or refusal of a license, he shall be deemed guilty of perjury, and shall be liable to be proceeded against and punished accordingly.

V. The foregoing provisions respecting licenses shall not be applicable to—

Exemptions from licensing provisions. 1. European Commissioned Officers in the Military or Naval Service of her Majesty or of the East India Company.

2. Police Officers and other persons, in respect of Arms the property of Government furnished by Government for their use.

3. Licensed manufacturers of, or dealers in, Arms.

4. Arms covered by a pass from a Collector of Customs in course of removal under such pass, and according to the conditions therein specified.

5. Arms in the course of removal from a licensed dealer in Arms to a person authorised to keep or use the same; or Arms sent by a licensed person for repair to a person licensed to manufacture, sell, or repair Arms.

The 4th and 5th exceptions shall not prevent the seizure and detention of Arms found in any public place until the same are satisfactorily accounted for, unless the same be removed under a pass for that purpose by an Officer authorised to grant the same.

6. Members of the family, or representatives of any licensed person deceased, for three weeks after the death of such person, in respect of Arms specified in any license to carry or use Arms granted to such deceased person. Provided such members of his family or representatives shall not within the said space of twenty-one days have been required by the Magistrate or Officer authorised to grant licenses to deliver up the Arms.

VI. It shall be competent to the Governor General in Council to exempt any

Governor General in Council may exempt persons or classes of persons. persons, or class or classes of persons whom he shall think fit from the operation of this Act.

VII. Every person hereby prohibited from keeping or using Arms without a

Penalty for going armed in public, and refusing to produce license, &c. license, who shall be found in any public place with any such Arms as aforesaid in his possession, shall, whenever required so to do by

any Magistrate, Deputy Magistrate, or Assistant to a Magistrate, or by any European Commissioned Officer in the service of Her Majesty or of the East India Company, or any Member of a Volunteer Corps established by authority of Government whilst on duty, or by any Police Officer, produce the license authorising him to carry or use such Arms, and shall also allow such Arms to be inspected, and shall state his name and place of residence; and in case any such person shall refuse or neglect so to do, or shall give a false name or place of residence, it shall be lawful for such Magistrate, Commissioned Officer, Member of a Volunteer Corps, or Police Officer, to apprehend or cause such person to be apprehended, and also to seize the Arms in his possession, or to cause such Arms to be seized; and the person so neglecting or refusing as aforesaid shall be liable, on conviction before a Magistrate, to a fine not exceeding One hundred Rupees; and the Arms seized shall be forfeited to Government, if the convicting Magistrate shall so adjudge.

VIII. If any person shall manufacture, repair, sell, License for manufacture or sale of Arms. or keep or expose for sale any Arms, or shall manufacture, or sell, or keep or expose for sale percussion caps, gunpowder, or other

Ammunition, without a license to deal in Arms or Ammunition, as the case may be, granted by the Governor General in Council, or the Executive Government of the Presidency or place in which such Arms shall be manufactured, sold, or repaired, or by an Officer authorised by the Governor General in Council, or by the Executive Government of the Presidency or place, to grant such licenses, he shall, on conviction before a Magistrate, forfeit, for every such offence, the sum of Five hundred Rupees.

IX. Any licensed person, who shall sell Arms or Ammunition, shall enter, in Dealers in Arms to enter purchaser's name, &c. in a book. a book to be kept by him for that purpose, the name and address of the purchaser, and the nature, description, and quantity of the Arms or Ammunition sold. Such book shall be open at all

times to inspection by the Magistrate or other duly authorised Officer; and copies may be taken of all entries therein contained. If any such person shall omit or fail duly to keep such a book, or if any person shall prevent or obstruct the inspection thereof, or shall make a false entry therein, he shall be liable, on conviction before a Magistrate, to a penalty not exceeding Five hundred Rupees; and his license may be revoked by the person or persons authorised to grant such licenses.

X. The Magistrate or other Officer authorised by Government may at any time enter the premises in which Arms or Ammunition shall be manufactured or kept by any licensed manufacturer of or dealer in Arms or Ammunition, in order to inspect the stock-in-trade of such manufacturer or dealer; and if any such manufacturer or dealer shall intentionally conceal from such Magistrate or other Officer as aforesaid any part of his stock-in-trade, or shall wilfully refuse to point out where the same is kept, he shall, on conviction before a Magistrate, forfeit a sum not exceeding Two hundred Rupees; and any part of the stock-in-trade so concealed shall be forfeited, if the convicting Magistrate shall so adjudge.

XI. If any person shall keep or have in his possession percussion caps, gunpowder, or other Ammunition, without a license, keep or sell the same, he shall, on conviction before a Magistrate, forfeit the sum of One hundred Rupees, for the first offence, and Two hundred Rupees, for second or subsequent offence; and such percussion caps, or other Ammunition

if the convicting Magistrate shall so adjudge. Provided that any person licensed to keep fire-arms, or not prohibited by law from keeping the same for private use, may without license have in his possession gunpowder, percussion caps, or other Ammunition in reasonable quantities for private use.

XII. Any license granted under the provisions of this Act may be revoked or suspended by the person or persons authorised to grant such licenses.

XIII. No Arms or Ammunition shall be imported without the license of the Governor General in Council or Executive Government, except Arms and Ammunition imported for private use by any person authorised or licensed to keep, or not prohibited by law from keeping, the same in his possession.

XIV. Any Magistrate, if he have reasonable cause for suspecting that Arms or Ammunition are kept in any house, building, or other place, or are therein in the possession of any person not licensed or authorised by law to possess the same, may, with such assistance as he shall think necessary, by night or by day, and by force if necessary, enter and search any such house or place; or may by his warrant cause the same to be entered and searched in manner aforesaid. All such Arms or Ammunition found therein may be seized and confiscated. Every person found in such house or place, who shall appear to have kept or been privy to the keeping or deposit therein of such Arms, may be taken into custody. It shall be competent to a Magistrate to delegate to any of his European Assistants the powers conferred on him by this Section.

XV. The Governor General of India in Council, or the Executive Government of any Presidency or place, or the Chief Commissioners of the Punjab and Oude respectively, or the Commissioner of Nagpore, or any other persons authorised by Government, may order a general search for Arms to be made, by any officers or persons named in such order, in any City, Town, District, or place specified therein. The persons authorised by any such order, and all persons acting under their authority, shall have the like powers of entry, search, and seizure as are conferred on Magistrates by the last preceding Section.

XVI. The Governor General of India in Council, or the Executive Government, or other person authorised by the Governor General in Council, may issue notice, requiring all manufacturers of or dealers in Arms or Ammunition, and all persons prohibited from keeping Arms without a license, to give notice of all places in which such Arms are kept, within a time to be specified in the notice; and any manufacturer of or dealer in Arms or Ammunition, or other person, not giving notice within the time specified, shall, on conviction before a Magistrate, be liable to a penalty not exceeding Five hundred Rupees, and the Arms or Ammunition may be confiscated, if the convicting Magistrate shall so adjudge.

XVII. Licenses to keep, use, manufacture, or sell such Arms as aforesaid shall be granted as follows (that is to say):—
In the Presidency Towns, and in the Settlement of Prince of Wales' Island, Singapore, and Malacca, by the Commissioner of Police.
In all other places, by the Magistrate, Joint Magistrate, or other person exercising the full powers of a Magistrate.

XVIII. In case any person, to whom a license under this Act to keep, use, manufacture, or sell such Arms as aforesaid shall be refused,

Appeal against refusal of license.

shall consider himself aggrieved, he shall be at liberty, within two months after the refusal, to appeal against the same. Such appeal shall be preferred, in the Presidency Towns of Calcutta, Madras, and Bombay, and in the Settlement of Prince of Wales' Island, Singapore, and Malacca, to two Magistrates of Police; in other places to the Commissioner of the District: and in case it shall be determined upon such appeal that a license ought to be granted, the same shall be granted accordingly. Fourteen days' notice in writing of the intention to appeal shall be given to the Officer refusing the license.

XIX. No person shall use or have in his custody or possession any cannon, howitzer, or mortar, without a license from the Governor General of India in Council, or the Executive Government of any Presidency. If any person shall use or have in his custody or possession any cannon, howitzer, or mortar, without such license, he shall be liable, on conviction before a Magistrate, to a fine not exceeding Two thousand Rupees, and to imprisonment for a term not exceeding Two years; and such Arms shall be forfeited to Government, if the Magistrate or other Officer before whom the offender shall be convicted shall so adjudge.

XX. Any fine or penalty levied from any person convicted of an offence under this Act, or any portion of such fine or penalty, may be awarded to the informer. A Magistrate may also, upon the adjudication of any case under this Act, authorise a sum not exceeding one-half of the value of any Arms or Ammunition confiscated to be given as a reward to the informer.

XXI. The word "Magistrate" shall include a person exercising the powers of a Magistrate, a Commissioner of Police, and a Justice of the Peace; and every person hereby made punishable by a Justice of the Peace may be punished upon summary conviction.

XXII. This Act shall take effect in any District, City, Town, or place, to which the same shall be extended by order of the Governor General of India in Council, or of the Executive Government of any Presidency or place; and shall take effect from the day named in such order.

XXIII. It shall be lawful for the Governor General in Council, or the Executive Government of any Presidency or place, from time to time to withdraw, from the operation of the provisions of this Act, any part or parts of any District or place which he may previously have declared to be subject thereto; and, in like manner, as occasion shall require, to subject the same again to the operation of such provisions.

Duration of Act.

XXIV. This Act shall continue in force for Two years.

"No. 964 of 1857.—Under instructions from the Honorable the Court of Directors, conveyed in their Despatch No. 92, dated the 10th June 1857, the Right Honorable the Governor General of India in Council is pleased to announce for general information the new arrangements for the Medical Department at the three Presidencies, which have been determined upon by the Honorable Court.

1. The several Medical Boards at the three Presidencies are to be abolished, and the functions heretofore confided to those Boards are to be placed in the hands of an Officer at each Presidency, to be selected for that purpose by the Governor General in Council or by the Governors in Council. This Officer is to be designated Director General of the Medical Department, and to be appointed for a term of five years' service, renewable by the Government if they should think that the interests of the Public Service will be thereby advanced.

The Director General is to be allowed the services of a Secretary, and of an adequate Office Establishment.

2. The Director General at each Presidency will be assisted by Officers to be designated Inspectors General. In Bengal there will be one Officer in each of the two Divisions of the Bengal Territories, viz :

The Lower Provinces, including Pegu,

The North-Western Provinces, including the Punjab,

who shall be the Inspector of all the Hospitals, Military and Civil, and Dispensaries, Depôts of Medical Stores, and all Establishments connected with the Medical Department in his Division. This Officer shall make periodical tours through his Division, and shall report the results of his inspection to the Director General, but he is not to be the channel of correspondence between the Director General and the Superintending Surgeons, who are, as at present, to correspond direct with the Head of the Medical Department.

3. There will be one Inspector General in each of the Presidencies of Madras and Bombay. The appointment, like that of the Director General, will be for a term of five years' service, renewable by the Government if the interests of the Public Service will be thereby advanced.

4. The number of Superintending Surgeons at each of the three Presidencies, and their duties, will continue as at present.

The succession to these appointments will not depend on seniority alone, but the selection will, as prescribed in existing Regulations, be made with reference to established character for distinguished zeal, strict assiduity, and professional ability, due regard, however, being had to seniority, when not opposed by considerations of a still more powerful nature.

5. Assistant Surgeons will hereafter be divided into two Classes. Those who have served ten years will be designated "1st Class," and their Juniors "2nd Class" Assistant Surgeons.

First Class Assistant Surgeons in Medical charge of Corps will be allowed the Medical Staff Salary of Surgeons, viz. Rupees 300 (three hundred) per mensem.

6. With reference to the new Furlough Regulations, (Government General Order No. 1150, dated 17th November 1854, paragraphs 29 to 37), the following scale of Retiring Pensions is applicable to the Medical Department:—

7. By existing Regulations, a Medical Officer holding the appointment of Member of the Medical Board is required absolutely to retire from the Service after he has served five years in that appointment. Hereafter, a Medical Officer who has passed a tour of duty in the highest appointments will, if he is still fit for the Service, be permitted to return to the performance of other Medical duties, until he shall have completed thirty-five years' service, and so be enabled to qualify for the highest rate of Retiring Pension.

8. The relative rank of Medical with Military Officers under the new arrangements will be as follows:—

Director General with Brigadier General.
 Inspector General with Colonel.
 Superintending Surgeons with Lieutenant Colonels.
 Senior Surgeons with Majors.
 Surgeons with Captains.
 Assistant Surgeons with Lieutenants.

9. When Committees are convened by Government, and composed of Military and Medical Officers, or of these and Civilians also, the relative precedence of the Members is to be that in which they are named in the Order convening the Committee. In such cases, the President may belong to any branch of the Service.

Whenever Committees composed of Military and Medical Officers are convened by the Commander in Chief, or by other Military Authorities, the President is invariably to be a Military Officer, and the Members are to take precedence according to their relative rank.

10. The Director General, Inspector General, and Superintending Surgeons will be appointed by the Governor General in Council or the Governors in Council.

The present Members of the Medical Boards at the three Presidencies, who may not be selected for employment, will be employed under the Orders of the Governor General in Council and Governors in Council, in such manner as, without delaying the adoption of the new system, and without reducing the allowances of incumbents, shall allow them to serve the remainder of their tour of five years' service in the way most advantageous to the public interests.

13. A period will be assigned from which the new arrangements shall come into effect in Bengal, and the Governors of Madras and Bombay in Council will be pleased to fix the date at which they shall come into effect at those Presidencies respectively.

"II. A Separate Instruction will be required for every Change of Address, and no Instruction will be attended to for more than three months after its receipt."

2. Many parties, heedless of the extra labour imposed upon the Post Office, will not take the trouble of intimating their Change of Residence to their Correspondents and Agents, and thus leave their Letters and Papers to be Re-directed in this Office for months after they have changed their place of abode. The rule laid down by the Director General will be strictly followed in future.

3. Letters Re-directed in this Office will be charged with *Forward Postage*, and Letters addressed to the interior, but stopped in transit, for delivery in Bombay, will be taxed as Re-directed Letters.
