Legislative Council of India.

17th October 1857.

The following Bill was read a second time in the Legislative Council of India on the 17th October 1857, and was referred to a Select Committee, who are to report thereon after the 21st of January next:—

A Bill for the Levy of Port-Dues in certain Ports within the Limits of the Gulf of Cambay.

Whereas it is necessary to fix the amount of the Port-dues to be hereafter levied and taken in the Ports named in the Schedule to this Act, being Ports within the limits of the Gulf of Cambay; It is enacted as follows:—

I. Port-dues, at rates not exceeding the rates contained in the Schedule to this Act, shall be chargeable in respect of every sea-going vessel of the burthen of ten tons and upwards which shall enter any of the said Ports.

Port-dues chargeable on sea-going vessels of ten tons and upwards entering any of the Ports.

II. When any vessel enters any of the said Ports, being driven in by stress of weather, or in consequence of having sustained any damage, or for any other reason, but does not discharge or take in any cargo or passenger therein (with the exception of such unshipment and re-shipment as may be necessary for the purpose of repair), the Port-due

Rate of Port-due on vessels compelled by stress of weather to enter any of the Ports.

shall enter any of the said Ports.

chargeable in respect of such vessel shall be at a rate equal to one-half the rate chargeable in respect of other vessels.

III. Provided that, when any vessel, having left any of the said Ports is compelled to re-enter it by stress of weather, or in consequence of having sustained any damage, no Port-due shall be chargeable in respect of such vessel.

IV. No vessel shall be required to pay at the same Port any Port-due chargeable under this Act oftener than once in the same calendar month.

V. This Act shall commence and have effect from and after the Commencement of Act.

pursuant to Section XLII. of Act XXII. of 1855, declare, by notification to be published in the Bombay Gazette, the rates at which Port-dues shall be levied in any of the said Ports, subject to the provisions of and within the limits prescribed by this Act; and from and after the said date no Port-due shall be levied at any of the said Ports except under the authority of Act XXII. of 1855 and of this Act.

Legislative Council of India.

3rd October 1857.

The following Bill was read a second time in the Legislative Council on the 19th September 1857, and was referred to a Select Committee, who are to report thereon after the 7th of January 1858:—

A Bill to extend the Provisions of Act XXI. of 1855 in the Presidency of Port St. George to Minors not subject to the Superintendence of the Court of Wards.

Whereas, by Section XX. Regulation V. 1804, and

Preamble. Section III. Regulation X.

1831 of the Madras Code, the Zillah Courts, subject to the confirmation of the Sudder Adawlut, are authorised and required to appoint guardians to the Minor heirs of property of every description not subject to the jurisdiction of the Court of Wards; and whereas, by Act XXI. of 1855, better provision has been made for the education of Minors subject to the superintendence of the Court of Wards; and it is expedient that the same powers which are thereby given to the Collectors and Courts of Wards, in respect of the Minors under their superintendence, should be exercised by the Zillah Courts, subject to the control of the Sudder Adawlut, in respect of the Minors for whom they are required to appoint guardians; It is enacted as follows:—

I. The general superintendence and control of the education of every male Minor, for whom a guardian has been or shall be appointed by the Zillah Court, is hereby vested in the Judge of the Zillah Court of the District within whose jurisdiction such Minor's estate is situate; or, if such Minor is possessed of immoveable property within the jurisdiction of more than one Zillah Court, in the Judge of such Court as the Sudder Adawlut shall direct.

II. The Judge of the Zillah Court, subject to the control of the Sudder Adawlut, is hereby authorised, to exercise in respect of such Minor and the guardian of such Minor, all the powers and authorities which, by Sections II. III. IV. and V. Act XXI. of 1855, the Collector of Revenue or the Court of Wards is authorised to exercise in respect of Minors and guardians of Minors whose property is under the management of the Court of Wards.

III. The right to the custody of the person of every male Minor, for whom a guardian is appointed by the Judge of the Zillah Court, is hereby vested in the person appointed by the Judge of the Zillah Court, with the confirmation of the Court of Sudder Adawlut, either originally or upon the removal of a former guardian, to be the guardian of such Minor.

IV. All orders and proceedings of a Judge of a Zillah Court under the provisions of this Act shall be subject to the revision of the Court of Sudder Adawlut, and every person aggrieved by any such order or proceeding may prefer an appeal therefrom to the Court of Sudder Adawlut.

Rules for the Conduct of Assemblies and Processions in the Public Roads, Streets, and Thoroughfares on the Island of Bombay and Colaba, and for keeping Order therein; made under authority of Section LXXVII. of Act XIII. of 1856, with the sanction of the Right Honorable the Governor in Council.

1. Assemblies or Processions passing along any Public Street, Road, or Thoroughfare, shall keep on the left side, and shall not occupy more than one-half of such Road, Street, or Thoroughfare, in order that there may be no obstruction to the passing and repassing of Horses, Vehicles, and Foot Passengers.

2. Assemblies and Religious or other Processions meeting Carriages or Horses shall immediately cease playing Country or other Music, and shall not recommence playing such Music until such Carriages or Horses shall have passed.

3. No unnecessary noise will be permitted in the neighbourhood of any Place of Public Worship during the hours of worship, and all Processions passing such Places of Worship, during the time of worship, shall cease playing Country or other Music, and proceed on without noise.

4. Corpses from those parts of the Town which lie to the South of the Waree Bunder, Baboola Tank, Obelisk and Grant Road, shall be conveyed by the Grant Road to the new Junction Road leading to the Bridge on Bellasis Road, and thence to the Place of Cremation and Burial recently opened out on the Flats at Byculla.

5. Any person or persons who shall wilfully violate or infringe any of the foregoing Rules shall be liable to the Penalty prescribed in the above quoted Section LXXVII. of the said Act XIII. of 1856.

Its steady perseverance and eager resistless courage have gloriously upheld the authority, and will not disappoint the expectations, of England.

Sir,—I have the honour to forward, for submission to His Lordship the Governor General in Council, two Despatches, which have arrived from Major General Wilson, Commanding the Field Force before Delhi, and the Adjutant General of the Army.

I beg very particularly to call the attention of His Lordship to the matter contained in these two communications, and to give expression to the very cordial feeling I experience towards Major General Wilson and the Force under his Command.

It is impossible to be too lavish of praise for the untiring energy, invincible fortitude, and splendid gallantry by which this Force has been distinguished, from the General in Command to the Private Soldier in the Ranks.

All have done their duty most nobly ; and the steadfast courage of the Men has enabled the General to carry out his enterprise, in spite of scanty means and a deadly season.

SIR,—I have the high satisfaction of reporting, for the information of the Major General Commanding in the Upper Provinces, and through him of His Excellency the Commander in Chief and of Government, that on the morning of the 14th instant the Force under my Command successfully assaulted the City of Delhi.

Under present circumstances, Major General Gowan will, I trust, allow me to withhold for a time a full and complete detail of the operations from their commencement to their close, and to limit myself to a summary of events.

After six days of open trenches, during which the Artillery and Engineers, under their respective Commanding Officers, Major Gaitskell and Lieutenant Colonel Baird Smith, vied with each other in pressing forward the work, two excellent and most practicable breaches were formed in the walls of the place, one in the curtain to the right of the Cashmere Bastion, the other to the left of the Water Bastion; the defences of those Bastions, and the parapets giving musquetry cover to the Enemy commanding the breaches, having also been destroyed by the Artillery.

The assault was delivered on four points. The 1st Column, under Brigadier General J. Nicholson, consisting of Her Majesty's 75th Regiment (300 men), the 1st European Bengal Fusiliers (200 men), and the 2nd Punjaub Infantry (450 men), assaulted the main breach, their advance being admirably covered by the 1st Battalion Her Majesty's 60th Rifles, under Colonel J. Jones. The operation was crowned with brilliant success; the Enemy, after severe resistance, being driven from the Cashmere Bastion, the Main Guard, and its vicinity, in complete rout.

The 2nd Column, under Brigadier Jones, of Her Majesty's 61st Regiment, consisting of Her Majesty's 8th Regiment (250 men), the 2nd European Bengal Fusiliers (250 men), and the 4th Regiment of Sikhs (350 men), similarly covered by the 60th Rifles, advanced on the Water Bastion, carried the breach, and drove the Enemy from his guns and position, with a determination and spirit which gave me the highest satisfaction.

The 3rd Column, under Colonel Campbell, of Her Majesty's 52nd Light Infantry, consisting of 200 of his own Regiment, the Kemaoon Battalion (250 men), and the 1st Punjaub Infantry (500 men), was directed against the Cashmere Gateway. This Column was preceded by an explosion party, under Lieutenants Home and Salkeld, of the Engineers, covered by the 60th Rifles. The demolition of the Gate having been accomplished, the Column forced an entrance, overcoming a strenuous opposition from the Enemy's Infantry and heavy Artillery, which had been brought to bear on the position. I cannot express too warmly my admiration of the gallantry of all concerned in this difficult operation.

The Reserve, under Brigadier Longfield, Her Majesty's 8th Regiment, composed of Her Majesty's 61st Regiment (250 men), the 4th Punjaub Rifles (450 men), the Belooch Battalion (300 men), the Jheend Rajah's Auxiliaries (300 men), and 200 of Her Majesty's 60th Rifles, who joined after the assault had been made, awaited the result of the attack, and, on the Columns entering the place, took possession of the posts I had previously assigned to it. This duty was ultimately performed to my entire satisfaction.

The firm establishment of the Reserve rendering the assaulting Columns free to act in advance, Brigadier General Nicholson, supported by Brigadier Jones, swept the Ramparts of the place from the Cashmere to the Cabul Gates, occupying the Bastions and Defences, capturing the Guns, and driving the Enemy before him.

During the advance, Brigadier General Nicholson was, to the grief of myself and the whole Army, dangerously wounded. The Command consequently devolved on Brigadier Jones, who, finding the Enemy in great force, occupying and pouring a destructive fire from the roofs of strong and commanding houses in the City on all sides, the Ramparts themselves being enfiladed by Guns, prudently resolved on retaining possession of the Cabul Gate, which his Troops had so gallantly won, in which he firmly established himself, awaiting the result of the operations of the other Columns of Occupation.

Colonel Campbell, with the Column under his Command, advanced successfully from the Cashmere Gate by one of the main streets beyond the 'Chandnee Chouk,' the central and principal street of the City, towards the Jumma Musjid, with the intention of occupying that important post. The opposition, however, which he met, from the great concentration of the Enemy at the Jumma Musjid and the houses in the neighbourhood,—he himself, I regret to state, being wounded,—satisfied him that his most prudent course was not to maintain so advanced a position with the comparatively limited force at his disposal, and he accordingly withdrew the head of his Column, and placed himself in communication with the Reserve,—a measure which had my entire approval; I having previously determined that, in the event of serious

opposition being encountered in the Town itself, it would be most inexpedient to commit my small Force to a succession of street fights, in which their gallantry, discipline, and organisation could avail them so little.

My present position, therefore, is that which, under such a contingency, I had resolved to occupy and establish myself in firmly as the base of my systematic operations for the complete possession of the City. This embraces the Magazine on one side and the Cabul Gate on the other, with the Moree, Cashmere, and Water Bastions, and strong intermediate posts, with secure communication along the front and to the rear.

From this base, I am now cautiously pressing the Enemy on all points, with a view to establishing myself in a second advanced position, and I trust before many days to have it in my power to announce to the Supreme Government that the Enemy have been driven from their last stronghold in the Palace, Fort, and Streets of the City of Delhi.

Simultaneously with the operations above detailed, an attack was made on the Enemy's strong position outside the City, in the Suburbs of Kissengunge and Pahareepore, with a view of driving in the Rebels, and supporting the main attack, by effecting an entrance at the Cabul Gate after it should be taken.

The Force employed on this difficult duty I entrusted to that admirable Officer Major C. Reid, Commanding the Sirmoor Battalion, whose distinguished conduct I have already had occasion to bring prominently to the notice of superior Authority, and who was, I much regret, severely wounded on this occasion. His Column consisted of his own Battalion, the Guides, and the men on duty at Hindoo Rao's (the main Picquet), numbering in all about 1,000, supported by the Auxiliary Troops of His Highness the Maharaja Rumber Singh, under Captain R. Lawrence.

The strength of the positions, however, and the desperate resistance offered by the Enemy, withstood for a time the efforts of our Troops, gallant though they were, and the combination was unable to be effected. The delay, I am happy to say, has been only temporary, for the Enemy have subsequently abandoned their positions, leaving their guns in our hands.

In this attack I found it necessary to support Major Reid with Cavalry and Horse Artillery, both of which Arms were admirably handled respectively by Brigadier Hope Grant, of Her Majesty's 9th Lancers, Commanding the Cavalry Brigade, and Major H. Tombs, of the Horse Artillery, who inflicted severe punishment on the Enemy, though I regret their own loss was very heavy.

The resistance of the Rebels up to this time has been that of desperate men, and to this must be attributed the severe loss we have sustained, amounting proximately, so far as I am able to judge, in the absence of Casualty Returns, to 46 Officers killed and wounded, and about 800 Men. Amongst those of whose services the State has been deprived are many Officers of distinction and merit, holding superior Commands, whose places cannot be supplied; and I have specially to lament the loss which has been sustained by that splendid Corps, the Engineers, nine Officers of that Arm having fallen in the gallant performance of their duty.

Until I am in possession of reports from Brigadiers and other Commanding Officers, I shall be unable to enter more fully into the details of these operations, and I trust the circumstances under which I write will excuse any slight inaccuracies or imperfections which my Despatch may exhibit.

The absence of such reports also prevents my bringing to notice the names of those Officers and Men who have specially distinguished themselves. This will be my grateful duty hereafter. But I cannot defer the expression of my admiration for the intrepidity, coolness, and determination of all engaged, Europeans and Natives, of all Arms of the Service.

City of Delhi, 18th September 1857.

From the ADJUTANT GENERAL OF THE ARMY,
To the OFFICER COMMANDING AT CAWNPORE.

SIR,—On the afternoon of the 14th, I despatched a messenger to you, intimating the success of the assault in Delhi, which took place that morning, and that we held from the

Cabul Gate to the College. Since then we have pushed on, and now occupy from the Cabul Gate along the line of the Canal, with our left holding the Bank, which opens on the Chandnee Chouk. The Magazine was breached during the 15th, and taken by assault at daybreak on the 16th. You will understand from this that the Mutineers occupy the Burn Bastion, and all that portion of the City to its south, excepting the Bank; they also still occupy the Palace and Selimgurh, and have a Camp pitched outside near the Ajmere Gate. The Palace wall will be breached as soon as we attain a suitable site for our Battery, which we have not yet acquired. Our Mortars have been brought into the Town, and are shelling the Palace. The Guns taken on the works have also been turned upon the portions of the town which are in possession of the Mutineers, and we are gradually pressing forwards. The usual license which invariably accompanies an assault of a large City has somewhat retarded our advance, but order is fast being restored. At first the Mutineers offered obstinate resistance, but they have become less active. The townspeople are flying the City in crowds, and the Mutineers themselves are deserting in large bodies, their Cavalry, it is reported, having almost entirely disappeared. We can get no good information as to the Mutineers' line of retreat, but some say Gwalior. Few pass over the bridge. Their positions at Kissengunge were abandoned on the day after the assault; seven Guns being left behind in position.—Our casualties on the day of the assault were,—Europeans: Killed, 8 Officers, 162 Rank and File; Wounded, 52 Officers, 510 Rank and File. Natives: Killed, 103; Wounded, 310. Missing, 10 Europeans. Total Europeans and Natives, killed and wounded, 1,145. The following Officers killed:—Engineer, Lieut. Tandy, H. M.'s 75th; Lieut. Fitzgerald, H. M.'s 52nd; Lieut. Bradshaw, H. M.'s 8th; Lieut. Webb, 1st Fusiliers; Major Jacob, Captain MacBarnet, 55th N. I., doing duty; Lieut. Davidson, 26th N. I., doing duty with 2nd Punjaub Infantry; Lieut. Murray, 42nd N. I., doing duty with Guides.—Wounded. Artillery, Major Tombs, Lieut. Lindsay; Engineers, Lieuts. Greathead, Maunsell, Medley, Salkeld (dangerously), Chesney, Brownlow (dangerously), Hovenden, Pemberton; Local Ensign Gustavinske, 6th Dragoons; Captain Rosser (mortally), 84th Foot, doing duty with 9th Lancers; Captain the Honorable A. Anson, Lieut. B. Cuppage, 6th Light Cavalry, doing duty with 9th Lancers; H. M.'s 75th Foot, Colonel Herbert; Lieutenants Armstrong, Watson, Dayrell, 58th N. P. S. 19th.—During the night we advanced our left up to Abbott's house, and also Khan Mahomed's house. This gives us a strong position up to within 150 yards of the Palace walls. All our Mortars are bearing upon the Jumma Musjid and the southern part of the Town, which is being fast evacuated, the resistance becoming much less on our right: we are also progressing by working through the houses. The King and Royal family are said to have evacuated the Palace, and gone to the old Fort outside the City to the south. Our very small number makes it necessary to be cautious in taking

possession of so large a City, for the great number we have of sick and wounded, and our loss on the day of the assault, have reduced us very much. This was too late to be sent yesterday.

NOTIFICATION.—In supersession of the Notification of the 18th January 1856, it is hereby declared, that all Medical Officers in the Service of the Government are, as a general rule, entitled to remuneration for professional attendance on the families of those public servants whom they are bound to attend gratuitously. An exception is made in the case of the families of Military Officers, Staff or Regimental, and of Chaplains and Assistant Chaplains; but this exception does not include the families of Commissioned Military Officers in Civil employment.

The amount of remuneration for attendance on the families of public servants shall be left in every case to private adjustment; and the conduct of any Medical Officer who makes a demand which, under the circumstances of the case, shall appear to the Government to be excessive, will be noticed as it deserves.

Whenever Convict labour is employed in the execution of Public Works, the value of such labour shall be duly charged for in the Accounts of the Work, and a corresponding credit allowed in account to the Civil Department by which the Convicts were supplied.

2. The charge for convict labour will be fixed at two-thirds of the usual rate paid for free labour of a like description.

3. No actual money payments will be made by Executive Engineers on account of the charge for convict labour, but a memorandum, in duplicate, will be prepared, countersigned both by the Engineer and the Civil Officer, one copy to be rendered by the former with his accounts, the other by the latter, in order that the necessary adjustments may be made in account.

4. Where materials prepared by convicts—the value of which would be credited to a Gaol Fund, placed at the disposal of a Magistrate, or on which a commission is allowed to the Gaoler—are supplied to an Officer of the Public Works Department, they shall be paid for in cash, and dealt with in his accounts as though they had been purchased from any other source.

5. The final determination of the value of the labour, according to the rule in paragraph 2, rests with the Engineer.

6. The Engineer will prepare his Bill of his own actual expenditure in the usual manner, carrying out the amount in an item of "Total." He will subjoin "Amount to be credited to the Judicial Department on account of Convict Labour," annexing the countersigned memorandum as a voucher, and showing the whole charge in an item

of "Grand Total." The Auditor of Public Works Accounts will debit the Grand Total to its appropriate Head, by credits of the due portions to the Executive Engineer and to "Judicial Charges General."

7. The Civil Officer by whom the convicts were supplied will transmit his countersigned copy of the memorandum of charge directly to the Accountant General, for adjustment.

માંથી, અથવા જસીની શિક્ષા ઓછી કરીને દંડ ઠરાવ્યો હોય તેનો જે અવેજ વસૂલ થાય તેમાંથી
સરકારનું લેણું હોય તે ઘાદ કરીને બાકી અવેજ રહે તેના અર્ધા ભાગ સુધી જે અંમલદારને इनाम આપવાનું
પોતાની નજરમાં આવતું હોય તેઓને પોતાની મર્જી પ્રમાણે ભાગે પડતું વેહેંચી આપવું. પણ મીઠું, અથવા
તંબાકુ સિવાય વિજી જનસ પકડે ત્યારે એ પ્રમાણે કરવું:—કેમ કે મીઠું, અથવા તંબાકુ જન કચ્ચો હોય
તે પકડવા બાબત इनाम આપતો વખતે સરકારનાં લેણાં બાબત કંઈ વાદ કચ્ચા વગર તે વેચાણની
ઉપજમાંથી નિમે ભાગ સુધી આપવાને તે અંમલદાર મુખત્યાર છે.
