## REVENUE DEPARTMENT.

The following extract from the Proceedings of the Government of India, in the Financial Department, dated 19th February 1863, No. 506 G, is published for information and guidance of all concerned :—

“Read again Financial Resolution, No. 157g, of the 9th August 1862, regarding the levy of Income Tax on salaries of Officers serving in Foreign States.

Read also the returns submitted in compliance with the requisition contained in the above Resolution.

RESOLUTION.—Several questions having arisen as to the proper construction to be put upon Section I., Act XXXIX. of 1860, the Honorable the President in Council is pleased, after careful consideration to rule as follows :—

Against British subjects in Foreign Territory not employed in the service of Her Majesty, it is not the intention of the Government of India to press the demand for Income Tax : and the public servants of a Foreign State employed in Foreign Territory are clearly exempt from the incidence of the tax. Only the servants of the British Crown are to be considered as public servants within the meaning of the Section under review. All the members of the last class are taxable without reference to the question whether or not the funds for the payment of their salaries are provided by a Native State.

This ruling cancels all previous orders on the subject, and specially those noted in the margin. But arrears of the tax will not be demanded from those Officers who, under any of the orders hereby superseded,

## POLITICAL DEPARTMENT.

The following Notification, issued at the Camp of His Excellency the Viceroy and Governor General of India, is republished for general information:—

“No. 3.

## NOTIFICATION.

FOREIGN DEPARTMENT.—POLITICAL.

*Camp Agra, Thursday, 12th February 1863.*

His Excellency the Viceroy and Governor General held a Durbar at Benares on the 7th instant, for the reception of the Principal Native Nobility, the residents of the city, and division of Benares, and the divisions of Patna and Allahabad.

The undermentioned Princes and Gentlemen were admitted to private audiences with the Governor General.

- 1.—Descendants of Mirza Koorum Bukht, a member of the Ex-Royal family of Delhi.

Mirza Mahomed Mohsun Bukht.

Birindia Bikram Sah.
- 5.—Maharajah Isree Persaud Narain Sing Bahadoor, Maharajah of Benares, and his nephew.
- 6.—Rajah of Vizianagram.
- 7.—Sumboo Narain, as representative of his father, the Honorable Rajah Deo Narain Sing Bahadoor.

A salute of 13 guns was fired on the arrival and departure of the Maharajah of Benares.

Afterwards the Gentlemen above named, with the exception of the members of the Delhi family and of the Nepal princes, together with other Native Gentlemen entitled to the privilege, and the Principal Civil and Military Officers of Benares and the neighbourhood, assembled in General Durbar. The Viceroy and Governor General entered and took his seat under a Royal salute.

The Native Gentlemen present were introduced to the Viceroy and Governor General in the order of their precedents, and presented the usual offerings, which were accepted by the Governor General, but returned to those who did not receive Khilluts. His Excellency conferred Khilluts on those who were received in private Durbar, the Chief Nobility of the Patna Division and the Rajahs of Manda, and Bansee, from the Allahabad Division.

After the Native Gentlemen had been introduced to the Viceroy, and before the presentation of the Khilluts, His Excellency addressed the gentlemen assembled in Durbar as follows:—

“It affords me much satisfaction to find myself surrounded here by so many Native Gentlemen of high character and influence, Gentlemen, who in times of confusion and trouble gave proof of their loyalty and fidelity to the British Crown. I welcome more especially the Maharajah of Benares, and I beg to assure him that if I omit to return his visit to-day, I shall do so, because the multiplicity of my engagements prevents me from carrying my intention into effect. I welcome also the Maharajah of Vizianagram, who, although he be a visitor here, occupies a high position, and enjoys deservedly a high reputation in the part of India where he resides. I welcome, too, the Maharajahs of Doonraon and Bettia, who have come to this place from the District of Patna, which is under the able administration of my esteemed friend, the Lieutenant Governor of Bengal; and I welcome generally the Rajahs and Gentlemen who have come here from the Districts of Benares, Patna, and I believe Goruckpore and Allahabad. I have, moreover, a special word of welcome for the son of my trusty Councillor, Rajah Deo Narain Sing. The Rajah offered to accompany me from Calcutta to this place in order to be present at this Durbar, but I declined to accept his offer, because I wished him to remain with my Council while it is engaged in the work of Legislation. It is the desire of Her Majesty the Queen that the Native Gentlemen of India should be represented in the Council of the Governor General, in order that when Laws are made for India their opinions and wishes, and feelings may receive due consideration. It is my intention and duty to do everything in my power to give effect to Her Majesty's gracious intention in this respect. Among the Rajahs and Gentlemen here to-day are many who have large Estates in the neighbourhood and along the line of Railway which we travelled over yesterday. The value of those Estates will be greatly enhanced by the completion of the important work of which we are about to-day to celebrate the opening. I need hardly remind them that they will owe this advantage to the introduction of British Engineering skill, and British capital into this country. I trust that the consideration of this fact, and of similar facts, which are of daily occurrence, will tend to produce a kindly feeling between the races by showing them to what an extent they may be

mutually useful to each other. Meanwhile I hope that the gentlemen whom I am addressing will turn these advantages to account by doing their utmost to improve their properties, and to promote the happiness and welfare of their ryots and dependants."

On the conclusion of the ceremonies His Excellency the Viceroy and Governor General left the Durbar under a Royal salute, and the assembly broke up.

Owing to other engagements the Viceroy and Governor General was unable on this occasion to pay the usual return visit to His Highness the Maharajah of Benares.

## General Notice

ISSUED BY THE INCOME TAX COMMISSIONERS FOR THE TOWN AND ISLAND OF BOMBAY UNDER ACT XXXII. OF 1860, SECTION XXVIII.

### INCOME TAX

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31ST JULY 1863.

Notice is hereby given that every person within the Town and Island of Bombay, who, by the Act XXXII. of 1860, for imposing Duties on Profits, arising from Property, Professions, Trades, and Offices, is liable to the said Duties, and to return his or her Profits or Income, is hereby required to fill in a Return of his or her Profits and Income in the prescribed Form (B), and to transmit such Return duly signed with the Declaration prescribed by the Act, to the Assessors of the Town and Island of Bombay aforesaid, at their respective offices, within 15 days from the date of the delivery of the Special Notice, under the penalties contained in the said Act.

Persons requiring Forms of Returns can procure them at the Office of the Assessors. Forms of such Returns will also be left at the usual place of Residence or Business of every person known or considered to be liable to the Duties imposed by the said Act. But any person liable to the Duties who may not receive such Forms, must apply for the same at the Office of any of the Assessors.

## GENERAL ORDERS

BY HIS EXCELLENCY THE HONORABLE THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

## MILITARY DEPARTMENT.

*Bombay Castle, 26th February 1863.*

No. 112 of 1863.—The following General Order by the Government of India, dated 3rd February 1863, No. 98, is republished :—

“The following paragraphs of a Military letter from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for India, No. 461, dated 16th December 1862, are published for general information :—

*Paragraph 1.*—The system under which certain descriptions of Commissions have been conferred in India has lately been under the consideration of Her Majesty's Government.

3. Commissions on the Veteran Establishment have been granted, on the recommendation of the respective Governments in India, to Warrant Officers of Ordnance, or other Departments, considered deserving of such reward on account of long and meritorious service. The promotion of these Officers from grade to grade has also been sanctioned in cases of unusual merit or length of service.

4. It has been determined that Commissions of this class shall be discontinued, and that Honorary Commissions for the future be granted in their place. Commissions of this kind will also be granted, in special cases, to Non-Commissioned Officers employed on detached Civil or Military duty in India, who are eminently distinguished by long and faithful service.

5. It is to be understood that Commissions of this nature will not carry pay, or increase of pay, on attaining advanced rank. The remuneration of the individuals must be dependent on their position in the Department or post in which they may be serving.

6. Unattached Commissions may still be conferred on Warrant and Non-Commissioned Officers employed on Staff or detached duty, who may distinguish themselves in Action, in the same manner as has hitherto been done under the sanction given in Despatch dated 22nd April 1846, No. 11.\*

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind, that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all *single* cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.

## Design for Competition.

### EUROPEAN GENERAL HOSPITAL.

The Bombay Government are prepared to receive designs for a new European General Hospital to be built on the Esplanade, Bombay.

Lithographed copies of the general plan of the accommodation required with a schedule of measurements according to the arrangements of the building which have been generally approved by the medical authorities and Government, together with plans of the proposed site, can be had on application at the office of the Superintending Engineer Presidency Circle, Bombay, and at the India Office, London.

The rates on which the work is to be calculated will also be furnished at those offices, and the gross estimate is not to exceed Rupees 3,80,000.

Complete plans and estimates are also required for residences for the Surgeon and House Surgeon, and for quarters for eight sick officers, to be arranged in two or three blocks distinct from, but in the immediate vicinity of the main Hospital.

The designs of these buildings should harmonize in character and style with the main building.

The estimate for these, calculated on the same rates, should not exceed 1,25,000 Rupees

There must be ample provision for through ventilation which is obtained in Bombay by a sea breeze blowing generally from W. to S. W. during the months from May till September, and from various points from N. W. by N. to S. W. by S. during the rest of the year, provision should be made to exclude the N. and E. winds, which blow most frequently by night.

The walls must be protected as far as possible from the direct rays of the sun.

The designs are unrestricted as to style, provided it is suited to the climate and to the use to which the building is to be devoted, and as to materials, provided that they are procurable in Bombay at prices which will admit of their being used in the building as designed.

The designs must include

1. Ground plan and plan of each story.
2. Elevation of each of the 4 faces.

The plans and elevations to be on a scale of not less than 10 feet to an inch. Specification and estimate with sections &c., in sufficient detail to enable the judges to decide whether the plan can be carried out within the sum allowed.

Prizes will be awarded for the two best designs—Rs. 2,500 for the best, and Rs. 1,000 for the next in merit, provided the design fairly fulfils the above conditions.

If the best designs, in an artistic point of view, fail to fulfil any one of the above essential conditions, the judges will be empowered to reduce or withhold the prize, and no prize will be awarded to a design merely because it fulfils the conditions, if otherwise conspicuously deficient in artistic merit.

The drawings and estimates &c. should be sent in on or before September 1st in the usual manner with mottos and envelopes containing the name and address of the artist to the Superintending Engineer Presidency Circle, by whom the envelopes will be opened in presence of the Chief Engineer and Secretary to Government Public Works Department after the prizes have been adjudged.

All the designs received will be exhibited in the Town Hall, Bombay, for one month before the adjudication of the prizes, and unless claimed and removed by the authors, for one month afterwards.

The envelope containing the name should state the author's wish whether the name should be appended to the design when exhibited after the adjudication.

The Prizes will be adjudged by the Executive Committee of Fort Improvement Commission and the Engineers of the Great Indian Peninsula and Bombay and Baroda Railways, who will be asked to aid Government in the adjudication.

In the event of any design being finally adopted by Government for execution without further modification than is made by the designer at the instance of Government, the Prize will be made up to one per cent. on the amount of the estimate as revised by the Executive Committee.

It will be optional to Government to avail themselves of the services of the author in altering or executing any design which gains a prize or premium, any design to which a prize or premium is awarded will remain the absolute property of Government.

Unsuccessful designs will be returned to the authors if claimed by them or by their authorised Agents, within one month from the period of adjudication, during which period if not claimed they will remain exhibited in the Town Hall, Bombay.

And also, that at the same time and place will be holden a Session of Admiralty, for the trial of all Treasons, Murders, Piracies, Robberies, Felonies, Misdemeanors, Offences, and other Maritime Crimes whatsoever done or committed on the High Seas.

And I hereby give Notice to all persons bound to prosecute and give evidence at the above Sessions, or in any way concerned therein, that they are to attend at the time and place abovementioned, and not to depart without leave of the Court.

2. The French transit rate of two annas per quarter ounce must be collected *in addition* upon all Letters sent to the United Kingdom *via* Marseilles.

3. Letters addressed to any of the countries enumerated above may be registered if the parties desire it, in which case *the postage must be paid in advance*; but a Registration fee of 8 Annas (which is inclusive of a Foreign Registration fee of 4 Annas) will be levied in addition to the postage. On registered letters for Russia and Poland, a further registration fee of 2 annas 8 pies per  $\frac{1}{2}$  ounce in addition will be levied.

4. The following rates of Postage will be collected on Newspapers and Printed Papers of every kind that may be forwarded to Germany and to the undermentioned States through Germany. If posted at a Mofussil Station, inland Indian postage in addition will be levied:—

5. The following conditions are to be observed in sending Printed Papers:—

1st.—Every Packet must be sent without a cover or with a cover open at the end or sides.

2nd.—There must be no enclosure except Newspapers or other Printed Papers.

3rd.—There must be no other writing or marks upon the Newspapers or Printed Papers than the name and address of the person to whom they are sent, nor anything upon the cover but such name and address, the printed title of the papers, and the printed name and address of the Publisher or the Vendor who sends them.

4th.—No packet must exceed 2 feet in length, width, or depth, or three pounds in weight.

**Caution against sending Valuables by Post.**—Robberies of Mails in various parts of the interior have lately become unfortunately of frequent occurrence, and there seems reason to infer that the highwaymen have been actuated either by information received from accomplices connected with bankers and firms, or by a suspicion that the Mails contain Gold, Banknotes, or other valuables.

Such depredations not only interfere with the safe and speedy transport of the important portion of the Mails, viz. that containing letters, but they entail upon owners of property heavy losses, as well as seriously cripple the efficient working of the Post Office Department.

Government orders on the subject of sending valuables by post are plain and explicit; they are now repromulgated, and the public are hereby cautioned against the practice, in the hope that they will see the advisability of not sending by the Government post, gold or other valuables, as, by so doing, the public Mails are exposed to peril and robbery, and their own property to risk, since the Post Office under the Postal Act\* is freed from responsibility for valuables enclosed in Parcels.

\* POSTAL ACT.—Section 49.

“The Government shall not be responsible for any loss or damage which may occur in respect of any thing entrusted to the Post Office for conveyance; and no person employed by the Government in the Post Office Department shall be responsible for any such loss or damage, unless that person shall cause such loss or damage negligently, maliciously, or fraudulently.”

*Postal Regulations.*

“In order to protect as far as possible the Mail from the chance of robbery, Officers in charge of Post Offices shall not knowingly receive Coin, Bullion, Precious Stones, Jewels, for despatch either by Letter or Banghy Post.

If a Post Master be informed or otherwise becomes acquainted with the fact that any letter or parcel contains valuables, he should refuse to receive it.”

**Loss of Newspapers, &c.**—The following Remarks of the London Post Office Department are published for general information, more especially for that portion of the public who have had to complain of the loss of “*Home Newspapers*.”

Whilst trouble and loss are too often caused by the carelessness or dishonesty of some of the twenty-three thousand servants of the Post Office, yet the instances are not few in which it has been shown to the satisfaction even of the complainant that the fault attributed at first sight to the Post Office rested really in other quarters.

The publisher of one of the London papers complained of the repeated loss in the Post Office of copies of his journal addressed to persons *abroad*. An investigation showed that the abstraction was made by the publisher's clerk, his object apparently being to appropriate the stamps required to defray the foreign postage. In another case, a general complaint having arisen as to the loss of Newspapers sent to the chief Office in St Martins-le-Grand, the investigation led to the discovery of a regular mart held near the office, and supplied with Newspapers by the private messengers employed to convey them to the post. Again, a man was detected in robbing a news-vender's cart by volunteering on its arrival at the entrance of this Office to assist the driver in posting the newspapers; instead of doing so, he walked through the hall with those intrusted to him, and upon his being stopped, three quires of a weekly paper were found in his possession.
