The following Notification, issued at the Camp of His Excellency the Viceroy and Governor General of India, is republished for general information:—

“No. 45.

### NOTIFICATION.

#### FOREIGN DEPARTMENT.—POLITICAL.

*Governor General's Camp, Bughola, the 27th February 1863.*

On Saturday, the 14th, and Monday, the 16th February 1863, His Excellency the Viceroy and Governor General held Durbars for the private reception of the Princes and Chiefs of Central India, Rajpootana and Bundelcund.

The Princes and Chiefs of the following States had audiences of His Excellency:—

Each Chief, with the exception of the Jagheerdars of Kothee, Logassee, Alipoora, and Gourihar, was accompanied by a few of his nearest relations and of his Principal Officers of State.

On Tuesday, the 17th February, the abovementioned Princes and Chiefs with their attendants, the Principal Native residents of the Agra Division of the North Western Provinces, and the Civil and Military Officers of Agra and the adjoining districts, were received by the Viceroy and Governor General in open Durbar.

When all were assembled, the Viceroy and Governor General entered and took his seat under a Royal Salute. His Excellency then addressed the assembled Chiefs in the following words:—

“Princes and Chiefs—In inviting you to meet me here it was my wish in the first place to become acquainted with you personally, and also to convey to you, in obedience to the gracious command which I received from Her Majesty the Queen upon my departure from England, the assurance of the deep interest which Her Majesty takes in the welfare of the Chiefs of India. I have now to thank you for the alacrity with which, in compliance with my request you have, many of you from considerable distances, assembled at this place.

“Having received during the course of the last few days many of the principal personages among you in Private Durbar, where I have had the opportunity of communicating my views on matters of interest and importance, I need not detain you on this occasion by many words.

“Before taking leave of you, however, I desire to address to you collectively a few general remarks upon the present state of affairs in India, and upon the duties which that state of affairs imposes upon you all.

“Peace, I need hardly remind you of the fact, now happily prevails throughout the whole extent of this vast Empire; Domestic treason has been crushed, and Foreign enemies have been taught to respect the power of the Arms of England.

“The British Government is desirous to take advantage of this favorable opportunity, not to extend the bounds of its dominions, but to develop the resources and draw forth the natural wealth of India, and thus to promote the well-being and happiness, both of Rulers and of the People.

“With this view, many measures of improvement and progress have already been introduced, and among them, I may name as most conspicuous, the Railway and Electric Telegraph, those great discoveries of this age which have so largely increased the wealth and power of the mightiest nations of the West.

“By diffusing education among your vassals and dependants, establishing schools, promoting the construction of good roads, and suppressing, with the whole weight of your authority and influence, barbarous usages and crimes such as Infanticide, Suttee, Thuggee, and Dacoitee, you may, Princes and Chiefs, effectually second these endeavours of the British Government, and secure for yourselves and your people a full share of the benefits which the measures to which I have alluded are calculated to confer upon you. I have observed with satisfaction the steps which many of you have already taken in this direction, and more especially the enlightened policy which has induced some of you to remove transit and other duties which obstructed the free course of commerce through your States.

“As representing the Paramount power it is my duty to keep the peace in India. For this purpose Her Majesty the Queen has placed at my disposal a large and gallant army, which, if the necessity should arise, I shall not hesitate to employ for the repression of disorder and the punishment of any who may be rash enough to disturb the general tranquillity. But it is also my duty to extend the hand of encouragement and friendship to all who labour for the good of India, and to assure you that the Chiefs who make their own dependants contented and prosperous, establish thereby the strongest claim on the favour and protection of the British Government.

“I bid you now, Princes and Chiefs, farewell for a time, with the expression of my earnest hope, that on your return to your homes, health and happiness may attend you.”

After the concluding Ceremonies the Viceroy left his seat under a Royal Salute. The Maharajahs of Gwalior and Jeypore and the Sekunder Begum of Bhopal having been conducted from the Tent, the assembly broke up.

On Wednesday, the 18th February, the Viceroy and Governor General, accompanied by the Secretary to the Government of India, and by the Officers of His Excellency's Personal Staff, paid return visits to thirteen of the Princes and Chiefs in succession at their respective encampments.

His Excellency was met by the Chiefs themselves and by their Principal Ministers, in accordance with established custom, and was received at each encampment, both on arrival and departure, with a Royal Salute.

In each case the usual offerings were presented and accepted, and the customary Ceremonies having been observed, His Excellency retired.

ISSUED BY THE INCOME TAX COMMISSIONERS FOR THE TOWN AND ISLAND OF BOMBAY UNDER ACT XXXII. OF 1860, SECTION XXVIII.

### INCOME TAX

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31st JULY 1863.

Notice is hereby given that every person within the Town and Island of Bombay, who, by the Act XXXII. of 1860, for imposing Duties on Profits, arising from Property, Professions, Trades, and Offices, is liable to the said Duties, and to return his or her Profits or Income, is hereby required to fill in a Return of his or her Profits and Income in the prescribed Form (B), and to transmit such Return duly signed with the Declaration prescribed by the Act, to the Assessors of the Town and Island of Bombay aforesaid, at their respective offices, within 15 days from the date of the delivery of the Special Notice, under the penalties contained in the said Act.

Persons requiring Forms of Returns can procure them at the Office of the Assessors. Forms of such Returns will also be left at the usual place of Residence or Business of every person known or considered to be liable to the Duties imposed by the said Act. But any person liable to the Duties who may not receive such Forms, must apply for the same at the Office of any of the Assessors.

From the OFFICIATING AUDITOR GENERAL OF INDIA.

To All DEPUTY AUDITORS and ACCOUNTANTS GENERAL.

Sir,—The Resolution of Government in the Financial Department, No. 1,211 A, dated the 31st

\* "There being a difference of opinion between the Officiating Deputy Auditor and Accountant General and the Officiating Civil Paymaster N. W. Provinces, as to the best mode of dealing with ordinary casual savings in fixed Establishment Charges, the Governor General in Council directs that the savings be deducted from the amounts of the bill, and the balance, instead of the full sanctioned scale of charge be passed."

December last,\* rules, that casual savings shall be deducted from the amount of the monthly bills for fixed Office Establishment, and that the balance, instead of the full sanctioned scale of charge, shall be passed; I have accordingly the honour to request that the savings, if hitherto shown, may be excluded in future from both sides of your accounts.

2. In Bengal, in the North Western Provinces, and probably elsewhere, it has been the practice in numerous cases to include, in the bills drawn for Establishments, the full salary of vacant appointments, and although not passed in some instances by the Civil Paymaster, the amount has been charged under the several Budget heads, and credited as savings on the Receipt side of the Account. The actual transactions are thus swelled by a nominal charge and a nominal credit.

3. This practice is opposed to the requirements of the Budget system, under which the actual charges alone should appear, in order that the unexpended portion of the grant may remain in balance. The Civil Service appointments are an exception to this rule, as savings from these appointments are transferred to a suspense head of account for the payment of deputation or other allowances. But in all other cases the nominal debit and credit should be omitted in account.

4. Fines levied on employées, and savings from absence on leave, if any, should be similarly dealt with whenever practicable, and the charge exhibited minus such fines or savings. Where the fine has been realised, and a deduction in account is not practicable, the amount should be exhibited as a Miscellaneous receipt under the head corresponding with that to which the charge belongs, and the refund of such receipts, whenever it occurs, should be charged under "A Refunds," to prevent a double charge under the Budget head of expenditure; on the other hand, when the fines have not appeared in account, any subsequent remission and payment should be entered under the proper Budget head, as a payment out of the grant.

2. If any deductions are to be made from the monthly abstracts owing to absence, savings or fines, they must be shown in red ink in the body of the abstract against the place of the incumbent; and the total at foot corrected accordingly. This will then agree with the "total after deductions" on the reverse. The Memorandum on the reverse, showing the difference between the sanctioned amount and the total passed after deductions, is convenient, and should be retained.

3. Officers will observe however that, if the savings are credited to any fund, as Police fines to Police Superannuation Fund, and savings from pay of Civil Servants on leave, to Civil Service Absentee Fund (for the present official year, after which this fund will no longer be exhibited in Account,) the salaries must be passed in full against the Budget Grant and the savings credited per Contra.

4. This Notification cancels paragraph 3 of this Department Notification No. 36, dated 3rd February 1861, and Notification No. 39, dated 23rd idem, it also modifies Notification No. 20, dated 9th February 1863.

2. The French transit rate of two annas per quarter ounce must be collected in addition upon all Letters sent to the United Kingdom *via* Marseilles.

3. Letters addressed to any of the countries enumerated above may be registered if the parties desire it, in which case the postage must be paid in advance; but a Registration fee of 8 Annas (which is inclusive of a Foreign Registration fee of 4 Annas) will be levied in addition to the postage. On registered letters for Russia and Poland, a further registration fee of 2 annas 8 pies per ½ ounce in addition will be levied.

4. The following rates of Postage will be collected on Newspapers and Printed Papers of every kind that may be forwarded to Germany and to the undermentioned States through Germany. If posted at a Mofussil Station, inland Indian postage in addition will be levied:—

5. The following conditions are to be observed in sending Printed Papers:—

1st.—Every Packet must be sent without a cover or with a cover open at the end or sides.

2nd.—There must be no enclosure except Newspapers or other Printed Papers.

3rd.—There must be no other writing or marks upon the Newspapers or Printed Papers than the name and address of the person to whom they are sent, nor anything upon the cover but such name and address, the printed title of the papers, and the printed name and address of the Publisher or the Vendor who sends them.

4th.—No packet must exceed 2 feet in length, width, or depth, or three pounds in weight.

**Caution against sending Valuables by Post.**—Robberies of Mails in various parts of the interior have lately become unfortunately of frequent occurrence, and there seems reason to infer that the highwaymen have been actuated either by information received from accomplices connected with bankers and firms, or by a suspicion that the Mails contain Gold, Banknotes, or other valuables.

Such depredations not only interfere with the safe and speedy transport of the important portion of the Mails, viz. that containing letters, but they entail upon owners of property heavy losses, as well as seriously cripple the efficient working of the Post Office Department.

Government orders on the subject of sending valuables by post are plain and explicit; they are now repromulgated, and the public are hereby cautioned against the practice, in the hope that they will see the advisability of not sending by the Government post, gold or other valuables, as, by so doing, the public Mails are exposed to peril and robbery, and their own property to risk, since the Post Office under the Postal Act\* is freed from responsibility for valuables enclosed in Parcels.

\* POSTAL ACT.—Section 49.

“The Government shall not be responsible for any loss or damage which may occur in respect of any thing entrusted to the Post Office for conveyance; and no person employed by the Government in the Post Office Department shall be responsible for any such loss or damage, unless that person shall cause such loss or damage negligently, maliciously, or fraudulently.”

*Postal Regulations.*

“In order to protect as far as possible the Mail from the chance of robbery, Officers in charge of Post Offices shall not knowingly receive Coin, Bullion, Precious Stones, Jewels, for despatch either by Letter or Banghy Post.

If a Post Master be informed or otherwise becomes acquainted with the fact that any letter or parcel contains valuables, he should refuse to receive it.”

**Loss of Newspapers, &c.**—The following Remarks of the London Post Office Department are published for general information, more especially for that portion of the public who have had to complain of the loss of “*Home Newspapers*.”

Whilst trouble and loss are too often caused by the carelessness or dishonesty of some of the twenty-three thousand servants of the Post Office, yet the instances are not few in which it has been shown to the satisfaction even of the complainant that the fault attributed at first sight to the Post Office rested really in other quarters.

The publisher of one of the London papers complained of the repeated loss in the Post Office of copies of his journal addressed to persons *abroad*. An investigation showed that the abstraction was made by the publisher's clerk, his object apparently being to appropriate the stamps required to defray the foreign postage. In another case, a general complaint having arisen as to the loss of Newspapers sent to the chief Office in St Martins-le-Grand, the investigation led to the discovery of a regular mart held near the office, and supplied with Newspapers by the private messengers employed to convey them to the post. Again, a man was detected in robbing a news-vender's cart by volunteering on its arrival at the entrance of this Office to assist the driver in posting the newspapers; instead of doing so, he walked through the hall with those intrusted to him, and upon his being stopped, three quires of a weekly paper were found in his possession.
