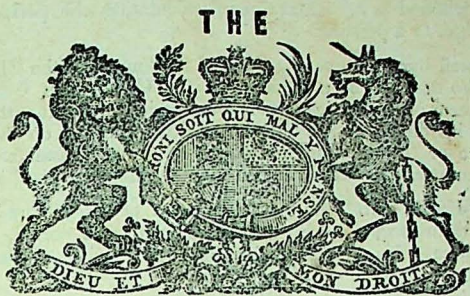

GOVERNMENT NOTIFICATIONS TO THE PUBLIC. JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT.

With reference to the Notification at page 333, of the *Government Gazette*, dated the 14th August 1862, the following revised Rules relating to Furloughs and Leave of Absence for the Chief Justice and Judges of the High Court of Judicature for the Presidency of Bombay, are published for general information:—

1. A furlough for the period of one year, with an allowance of £1,000, payable by quarterly payments, shall be allowed to the Chief Justice and to each Puisne Judge of the High Court after seven years' actual service as Chief Justice, or Chief Justice and Judge, or Judge of the said Court.
2. The furlough granted under these Rules to a Judge selected from the Covenanted Civil Service shall be exclusive of the furlough to which such Judge is entitled under the Rules applicable to furloughs allowed to members of such Service.
3. If a Judge of the High Court, selected from the Covenanted Civil Service, who has not taken his furlough under the rules applicable to his branch of the Service before his appointment to the High Court, shall take such furlough within one year after the expiration of his furlough under these rules, the furlough taken by him as Judge of the High Court shall be reckoned as so much time of his furlough under the rules applicable to the Covenanted Service, and the amount drawn by him shall be adjusted, with reference to such rules, by deductions from the allowances payable to him as a Civil Servant on furlough.

4. A Chief Justice, or Puisne Judge, during his absence on furlough, shall retain his office, but such furlough shall not be reckoned as actual service in calculating the period of Service entitling the Chief Justice, or Puisne Judge, to a pension.

5. Leave may be granted by the Governor General in Council to the Chief Justice, or any Puisne Judge of the High Court who may not be a member of the Covenanted Civil Service, under medical certificate, once during the term of his service, either for a period of six months on half salary, payable on return and resumption of his duties, or for a period of fifteen months on an allowance of £1,000 per annum. Such Chief Justice or Puisne Judge during his absence shall retain his office; but if his absence shall, under any circumstances, exceed fifteen months, his office shall be vacated.

6. If any Judge of the High Court, who has taken leave of absence under the foregoing rule for a period of six months, shall desire to extend his absence beyond such period, he shall be permitted to do so under due medical certificate, his allowance for the entire period of absence being calculated at the rate of £1,000 per annum.

7. Leave of absence, under medical certificate, to Judges of the High Court who are members of the Covenanted Civil Service will be regulated by the rules "for sick leave" applicable to the Civil Service generally.

8. No more than six months of the leave granted under medical certificate shall be reckoned as actual service in calculating the period of Service entitling the Chief Justice or Puisne Judge to a pension.

9. Short leave on private affairs may be granted to the Judges of the High Court, under the rules applicable to Government Civil Servants.

ISSUED BY THE INCOME TAX COMMISSIONERS FOR THE TOWN AND ISLAND OF BOMBAY UNDER ACT XXXII. OF 1860, SECTION XXVIII.

INCOME TAX

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31ST JULY 1863.

Notice is hereby given that every person within the Town and Island of Bombay, who, by the Act XXXII. of 1860, for imposing Duties on Profits, arising from Property, Professions, Trades, and Offices, is liable to the said Duties, and to return his or her Profits or Income, is hereby required to fill in a Return of his or her Profits and Income in the prescribed Form (B), and to transmit such Return duly signed with the Declaration prescribed by the Act, to the Assessors of the Town and Island of Bombay aforesaid, at their respective offices, within 15 days from the date of the delivery of the Special Notice, under the penalties contained in the said Act.

Persons requiring Forms of Returns can procure them at the Office of the Assessors. Forms of such Returns will also be left at the usual place of Residence or Business of every person known or considered to be liable to the Duties imposed by the said Act. But any person liable to the Duties who may not receive such Forms, must apply for the same at the Office of any of the Assessors.

GENERAL ORDERS

BY HIS EXCELLENCY THE HONORABLE THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

MILITARY DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 8th April 1863.

No. 199 of 1863.—The following General Order by His Excellency the Governor General of India, dated Camp Sibancee, 5th March 1863, No. 11A is republished:—

“The following copy of an Order in Council, dated 9th January 1863, promulgated in the *London Gazette* of the 13th January last, and received with Military Letter from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for India, No. 55, dated 31st January 1863, is published for general information:—

At the Court at Osborne House, Isle of Wight, the 9th day of January 1863.

PRESENT:

The Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Whereas by an Order in Council, dated at Windsor, the Thirtieth day of August One thousand Eight hundred and Sixty-two (reciting certain provisions of an Act passed in the Fifty-ninth year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intitled ‘An Act to prevent the enlisting or engagement of Her Majesty's subjects to serve in Foreign Service, and the fitting out or equipping in Her Majesty's dominions vessels for warlike purposes, without Her Majesty's licence’) Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, being desirous of enabling Her subjects to engage in and enter the Naval and Military Service of the Emperor of China, was pleased to order and it was thereby ordered that from and after the First day of September then next, it should be lawful for Horatio Nelson Lay, one of Her Majesty's subjects, and Sherard Osborn, a Captain in Her Majesty's Navy, to enter into the Military and Naval Service of the said Emperor, and to accept any commission, warrant, or other appointment under the said Emperor, and to accept any money, pay, or reward for their services, and to fit out, equip, purchase, and acquire ships or vessels of war for the use of the said Emperor, and to engage and enlist British subjects to enter the Military and Naval Service of the said Emperor. And it was thereby further ordered that it should be lawful for every British subject to enlist and enter himself, by engaging and enlisting himself with the said Horatio Nelson Lay and Sherard Osborn, and no other person or persons whatsoever, in the Military and Naval Service of the said Emperor, and to serve the said Emperor in any Military, warlike, or other operations, either by land or by sea, and for that purpose to go to any place or places beyond the seas, and to accept any commission, warrant, or other appointment from or under the said Emperor, and to accept any money, pay, or reward for his service. Provided always, that the licence and permission thereby given should be in force only for the term of two years from the said First day of September then next, unless, by order in Council, made in manner aforesaid, such period should be further extended.

And whereas Her Majesty, by, and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is desirous of extending and enlarging the permission and licence contained in the said Order in Council.

Her Majesty is therefore pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered that from and after the Sixteenth day of December One thousand Eight hundred and Sixty-two, it shall be lawful for all Military Officers in Her Majesty's Service to enter into the Military Service of the said Emperor, and to accept any commission, warrant, or other appointment under the said Emperor, and to accept any money, pay, or reward for their services.

And it is hereby ordered that it shall be lawful for all Officers in Her Majesty's Military Service to serve the said Emperor in any Military, warlike, or other operations, and for that purpose to go to any place or places beyond the seas, and to accept any commission, warrant, or other appointment from or under the said Emperor, and to accept any money, pay, or reward for their services. Provided always, that the licence and permission hereby given shall be in force only until the First day of September One thousand Eight hundred and Sixty-four, unless by order in Council, made in manner aforesaid, such period should be further extended.

No. 205 of 1863.—Lieut. A. F. Danvers, of the Staff Corps, District Superintendent of Police, Oude, has been permitted by the Government of India, to proceed to Europe, on sick certificate for twenty months.

TO HIS EXCELLENCY THE RIGHT HONORABLE THE GOVERNOR GENERAL OF INDIA IN COUNCIL.

MY LORD,—Referring to my letter dated 14th August last, I have to inform you that it has been arranged, with the view of obviating the delay which now takes place, that the promotions in the whole of the Royal Artillery and Engineers shall be made exclusively in this country; casualties as they occur in the Corps being immediately reported to the Horse Guards by the Officers Commanding Brigades in India, and promotions in succession being carried out on receipt of such advices, after approval by the Field Marshal Commanding-in-Chief and the Secretary of State for India in Council.

2. In consequence of this alteration it is necessary that the Governments in India should furnish special reports of all retirements amongst the Officers of the late Indian Brigades of Artillery and Battalions of Engineers which may take place in India, with a view to their early communication to the Horse Guards.

“Subadar Major Mairwan Sing ‘Bahadoor,’ of the 5th Regiment Bombay Native Light Infantry, is promoted from the Second to the First Class of the Order of British India with the title of ‘Sirdar Bahadoor,’ from the 24th December 1862, in succession to pensioned Subadar-Major Jullum Sing of the First Class, deceased.

From Lieut. Colonel C. BINGHAM, Deputy Adjutant General to the MILITARY SECRETARY, INDIA OFFICE (dated Horse Guards, 5th December 1862).

SIR,

With reference to the communications from the India Office, dated respectively 15th October and 14th November 1862, the Deputy Adjutant General Royal Artillery has the honour herewith to transmit copy of a General Regimental Order, paragraph 12 of which contains the necessary instructions on the subject of the adjustment of the Accounts of Artillery men proceeding to India and returning from that country.

Extract General Regimental Order.

Paragraph 12. It appearing that the Regulations of the Indian Service direct that all the accounts of Soldiers are to be finally settled before leaving India, this rule is to be strictly observed in the Royal Artillery from the date of the receipt of this order.

In like manner the accounts of men of the corps proceeding to India are to be duly adjusted before their embarkation.

If the foregoing instructions are complied with the difficulties experienced in the remittance of small debts recovered from men will be obviated.

The Secretary of State for India in Council has consented to the remittance through the India Office at the exchange of 2 shillings the rupee of the amount of all debts of the above nature now outstanding.

Caution against sending Valuables by Post.—Robberies of Mails in various parts of the interior have lately become unfortunately of frequent occurrence, and there seems reason to infer that the highwaymen have been acquainted either by information received from accomplices connected with bankers and firms, or by a suspicion that the Mails contain Gold, Banknotes, or other valuables.

Such depredations not only interfere with the safe and speedy transport of the important portion of the Mails, viz. that containing letters, but they entail upon owners of property heavy losses, as well as seriously cripple the efficient working of the Post Office Department.

Government orders on the subject of sending valuables by post are plain and explicit; they are now repromulgated, and the public are hereby cautioned against the practice, in the hope that they will see the advisability of not sending by the Government post, gold or other valuables, as, by so doing, the public Mails are exposed to peril and robbery, and their own property to risk, since the Post Office under the Postal Act* is freed from responsibility for valuables enclosed in Parcels.

* POSTAL ACT.—Section 49.

“The Government shall not be responsible for any loss or damage which may occur in respect of any thing entrusted to the Post Office for conveyance; and no person employed by the Government in the Post Office Department shall be responsible for any such loss or damage, unless that person shall cause such loss or damage negligently, maliciously, or fraudulently.”

Postal Regulations.

“In order to protect as far as possible the Mail from the chance of robbery, Officers in charge of Post Offices shall not knowingly receive Coin, Bullion, Precious Stones, Jewels, for despatch either by Letter or Banghy Post.

If a Post Master be informed or otherwise becomes acquainted with the fact that any letter or parcel contains valuables, he should refuse to receive it.”

Her Majesty's Post Master General having intimated that a Postal Convention has been concluded with Prussia, Bremen, and Hamburg, the public are hereby informed that the following Rates of Postage (British and Foreign combined) will be collected upon Letters forwarded through the United Kingdom to Germany and to certain countries, the correspondence of which passes through Germany. The Postage on these Letters may be paid in advance, or it may be paid on delivery at the option of the Senders. All Unpaid Letters will be liable to an increased charge on delivery:—

Letters addressed to any of the countries enumerated above may be registered if the parties desire it, in which case *the postage must be paid in advance*; but a Registration fee of 8 Annas (which is inclusive of a Foreign Registration fee of 4 Annas) will be levied in addition to the postage. On registered letters for Russia and Poland, a further registration fee of 2 annas 8 pies per ½ ounce in addition will be levied.

4. The following rates of Postage will be collected on Newspapers and Printed Papers of every kind that may be forwarded to Germany and to the undermentioned States through Germany. If posted at a Mofussil Station, inland Indian postage in addition will be levied:—

3rd.—There must be no other writing or marks upon the Newspapers or Printed Papers than the name and address of the person to whom they are sent, nor anything upon the cover but such name and address, the printed title of the papers, and the printed name and address of the Publisher or the Vendor who sends them.

4th.—No packet must exceed 2 feet in length, width, or depth, or three pounds in weight.
