ISSUED BY THE INCOME TAX COMMISSIONERS FOR THE TOWN AND ISLAND OF BOMBAY UNDER ACT XXXII. OF 1860, SECTION XXVIII.

INCOME TAX

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31st JULY 1863.

Notice is hereby given that every person within the Town and Island of Bombay, who, by the Act XXXII. of 1860, for imposing Duties on Profits, arising from Property, Professions, Trades, and Offices, is liable to the said Duties, and to return his or her Profits or Income, is hereby required to fill in a Return of his or her Profits and Income in the prescribed Form (B), and to transmit such Return duly signed with the Declaration prescribed by the Act, to the Assessors of the Town and Island of Bombay aforesaid, at their respective offices, within 15 days from the date of the delivery of the Special Notice, under the penalties contained in the said Act.

Persons requiring Forms of Returns can procure them at the Office of the Assessors. Forms of such Returns will also be left at the usual place of Residence or Business of every person known or considered to be liable to the Duties imposed by the said Act. But any person liable to the Duties who may not receive such Forms, must apply for the same at the Office of any of the Assessors.

No. 276 of 1863.—Captain P. P. Fenwick, of H. M.'s 25th Regt. N. I., Assistant Resident at Baroda, is allowed a furlough to Europe for twenty months, on medical certificate.

No. 277 of 1863.—Conductor A. E. Norman, attached to the Bazar Department at Poona, is allowed a furlough to Europe for fifteen months, on medical certificate.

No. 278 of 1863.—Surgeon F. Broughton is allowed a furlough to Europe for eighteen months, on medical certificate.

3. The orders marginally noted, allow the following Establishment, viz. : Six 1st Class Barrack Masters on a Staff Salary of Rs. 120, with the Military pay and allowances of their respective ranks.

G. G. O. No. 645, dated 20th July 1859.

Government Resolution No. 5598, dated 3rd December 1859.

Government Resolution No. 5821, dated 22nd December 1859.

Government Resolution No. 445, dated 1st February 1860.

G. G. O. No. 374, dated 13th June 1860.

Government Letter No. 2867, dated 8th October 1861.

Six 2nd Class Barrack Masters, on a Staff Salary of Rs. 70, with the Military pay and allowances of their respective ranks.

One Sub-Conductor at Poona on the pay and allowances of his rank.

Thirty-two Barrack Serjeants, on a staff salary of Rs. 20 each, in addition to their Military pay and allowances. Conveyance allowance to eighteen Barrack Serjeants at Rs. 10 each.

4. Under this organization of the Establishment, it has been found that in certain instances Barrack Serjeants holding positions of minor responsibility have been in the receipt of higher allowances than their Superiors in rank and position, to obviate which a regularly graduated scale of pay according to Classes is hereby authorised; promotion to these Classes being accorded on the same principle as at present, viz. by selection, not seniority.

5. The revised Establishment and organization will therefore be as follows:—

Two Senior Barrack Masters, on a consolidated salary of Rupees 275-10-6 each.

Four 1st Class Barrack Masters, on a consolidated salary of Rupees 265-14 each.

Three 2nd Class Barrack Masters, on a consolidated salary of Rs. 215-14 each.

Six 3rd Class Barrack Masters, on a consolidated salary of Rs. 111-1-4 each.

Twenty-seven Barrack Serjeants, on a Staff Salary of Rs. 20 each, in addition to their Military pay and allowances.

* Or to 3rd Class Barrack Masters, as the case may be. Conveyance allowance for eighteen Barrack Serjeants,* to be distributed as at present at Rs. 10 each.

6. The Salaries sanctioned by this Order to Barrack Masters include Military and Staff pay and allowances of every kind, except travelling allowance, which will still be disbursed to them at the rates, and on the occasions, mentioned in paragraph 4 of G. G. O. No. 645 of 1859, and G. O. C. No. 1173, dated 6th December 1862.

7. Under the operation of this order the two Senior Barrack Masters in the Department will be designated "Senior Barrack Masters," and will have charge, respectively, of the Presidency and Poona Circles.

8. The four Barrack Masters next in rank will be designated "First Class Barrack Masters," and will have charge respectively of the Northern, Sind, Mhow, and Rajpootana Circles.

9. The three Barrack Masters next in rank will be designated "Second Class Barrack Masters," and will have charge respectively, of the Belgaum, Nuggur, and Aden Circles.

10. The remaining six Barrack Masters will be designated "Third Class Barrack Masters," and be posted, one to the Presidency, two to the Poona, one to the Mhow, one to the Northern, and one to the Rajpootana Circle, as Assistants to the Barrack Masters of their respective Circles.

No. 280 of 1863.—In General Order No. 196, of 7th April 1863, after the words "the authority of the Cantonment Magistrate will cease," the following words are to be added, "In the districts thus transferred."

With reference to the same General Order, the authorities concerned are reminded that Section LXVI. Act 12 and 13 Victoria Cap. 43, and Section II. of Act No. XI. of 1841 remain in force at Kurrachee against persons amenable to the provisions of those Acts, and that Courts of Request must be assembled as heretofore for cognizance of the actions specified in those Sections.

Notice.

The following Rules for the entry for Home consumption of Spirits used exclusively in the Arts, Manufactures or Chemistry, are published for general information, in accordance with Section II. of Act XXIII. of 1862.

I. On making entry of Spirits of the above description in accordance with the Provisions of Section 62 of Act VI. of 1863, the Importer is to state on the face of the Private Manifest whether the article is desired to be charged at the rate of duty laid down in Schedule A to Act XI. of 1862, or at the rate of 10 per cent. *ad valorem* allowed by Section II. of Act XXIII. of 1862.

II. In the event of the higher rate of Rupees 3 per Imperial Gallon, or above, having been elected, the Spirits will be passed after payment of Duty in the usual manner, but in the event of the lower rate of 10 per cent. *ad valorem* having been stated, the Spirits concerned must, before removal from the Custom-house premises, be rendered unfit for use as a beverage and incapable of being converted to that purpose.

III. With this view the Importer will be required to mix with every nine Gallons of such Spirits, one Gallon of Pyroxilic Spirit (methylic alcohol), the admixture to take place on the Custom-house premises and in presence of a Custom-house Gauger. On a Certificate of the latter officer being attached to the Private Manifest that the admixture has been duly made and completed, the Spirits will be assessed for duty at the rate of 10

per cent. *ad valorem* on the quantity imported, and passed from the Custom House, after payment, in the usual manner.

IV. The quantity of Pyroxilic Spirit necessary for admixture with any consignment of Spirits of the above description, at the rate of one Gallon to every nine Gallons of Spirits, must be procured at the Importer's own expense, and the process of mixing must be carried out personally by the Importer or his agent, or other authorised servant. Samples of "Pyroxilic Spirit" will be retained by the Gauger, with which that brought by Importers will be tested before use. If the Pyroxilic Spirit be not equal to the samples, the Importer shall be required to mix such additional proportion with the Spirits of Wine to be imported as the Commissioner of Customs may direct.

V. Spirits of Wine, &c. may be moved into Bond, under the prescribed conditions of similar Bonded Goods without previously having been rendered unfit for use as a beverage in the manner mentioned, but prior to removal from Bond for Home consumption of any portion of such Spirits at the rate for Customs of 10 per cent. *ad valorem*, the course above described must be carried out at the Warehouse, in the presence of the Warehouse-keeper and Gauger, or of other qualified Officers duly appointed.

N.B.—This table is an extract from a more extensive yearly Return that is prepared for statistical purposes, and chiefly for the detection of any removable sources of disease, with a view to improving the healthiness of the Island. As the principal object cannot be fully attained unless the true causes of death be recorded, persons of all stations are requested, in each case of death occurring in their circle, to obtain, in writing, from the Medical Attendant, the name of the fatal disease, that it may be delivered to the Policeman at the funeral place. Medical Practitioners, particularly, are requested to aid the registration. Blank forms of Death Reports, to keep by them in readiness, are given gratuitously on application at the Office of the Deputy Commissioner of Police.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind, that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all single cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.

CHINA SEA.

ISLANDS BETWEEN SINGAPORE STRAITS
AND BORNEO.

The Bearings are Magnetic.

The Survey of the Islands in the south-western part of the China Sea, between Singapore Straits and the Coast of Borneo, having been completed in H. M. Surveying Vessel *Rifleman*, the result is hereby made known for general information.

As this paper will embody all the information contained in the account of the *Rifleman's* survey of the Tambelan Islands published in October last, together with the results of the observations required to determine the astronomical positions at that time incomplete, that account is consequently cancelled.

All the Meridian distances have been referred to Fort Fullerton, Singapore, in Lats $1^{\circ} 17' N.$, Long. $103^{\circ} 51' 18'' E.$ The islands have been connected together by Astronomical positions, and true bearings.

With the view that Navigators may readily correct their Horsburgh's, the Islands will be referred to in the order they occur in that work.—See Vol. 11, pages 303 to 305, both inclusive.

St. Barbe.—This Island is well described in Horsburgh, and requires no further remark here. We made the highest hill on the N. E. end to be in Lat. $0^{\circ} 8' 6''$, Long. $107^{\circ} 13' 32'' E.$ and the height 762 feet. The height of the hill on the south end is 684 feet.

Direction Island.—The apex in Lat. $0^{\circ} 14' 39'' N.$, Long. $108^{\circ} 2' E.$ is 639 feet high. In Horsburgh this Island is stated to be larger than *St. Barbe*, but it is, in fact, only one-third of its size. The description in other respects is good.

Welsted Shoal.—The position of this danger is very accurately given in Horsburgh. From unfavorable weather we were only able to obtain a single observation, this made the Latitude to be $0^{\circ} 32' 27'' N.$ The Longitude $107^{\circ} 53' E.$ was obtained by true bearings to *Direction Island* and *Tambelan Peak*.

The rocks extend half a mile in an E. N. E. and W. S. W. direction, their breadth being about a cable's length. They consist of a number of pinnacles, with depths varying from seven to three fathoms.

When at anchor on the shoal *Direction Island* bore by compass S. $27^{\circ} 30' E.$,—the small islet off the west side of that Island being just visible from the bridge, and the compass bearing of *Tambelan Peak* was N. $36^{\circ} 40' W.$

Pulo Dattoo.—We made the Peak in Lat. $0^{\circ} 7' 38''$, Long. $108^{\circ} 35' 50'' E.$, and its height to be 1,042 feet. It is correctly described in Horsburgh, as are also the Islands betwixt *Mampava* and *Sambas*, &c.

St. Esprit Islands.—The highest part of the largest Island of this group is in Lat. $0^{\circ} 37' 31'' N.$, Long. $107^{\circ} 0' 50'' E.$, and the height 817 feet. The group is correctly described in Horsburgh, and it is only necessary to remark here that vessels should be cautious when passing through

them, as we found a coral patch of three fathoms between the *Brace Islands* and the island next west of them.

Houqua Shoal.—Is a doubtful danger which appears on the latest Admiralty Chart S. by W. 4 miles from S. W. island of the *St. Esprit Group*.

The *Rifleman* was steaming over and about its reported position for a day, but could not discover it. We are not in possession of the particulars respecting it.

Green Island.—Is correctly described in Horsburgh. Its centre is in Lat. $0^{\circ} 44' 43'' N.$ and Long. $107^{\circ} 18' 52'' E.$

The *Tambelan Islands*.—Are also correctly described in Horsburgh. We made the highest peak of the Great *Tambelan* to be in Lat. $1^{\circ} 1' 05'' N.$ and Long. $107^{\circ} 32' 22'' E.$

Rodger or Ellen Rock.—Is of very small extent, and as described by Mr. Alexander Rodger in Horsburgh, page 305, is about 100 yards square; but at low water Spring Tides there is but three feet water on it.

This is an exceedingly dangerous rock, for there are regular soundings of from 19 to 22 fathoms close to and for miles round it. The *Rifleman* was steaming about this danger for four days before it was found, although every effort was used to discover it. It was ultimately found by the tide making against the wind and causing a slight ripple.

We made its position to be as follows. Lat. $0^{\circ} 41' 15'' N.$, Long. $107^{\circ} 21' 12'' E.$

There is little doubt, but this is the rock seen by Mr. Robert Loney, R. N., when in command of the *Rose Ellis*, and marked in the Admiralty Charts as *Rose Ellis*. The rock is so far from the Islands, that the least error of bearing either in the compass or in the observation, would cause the discrepancy in its position as given by Captains Rodger and Loney.

Europe Shoal.—Was found to extend about a mile in a N. by E. and S. by W. direction, the shallowest patch being in about the middle of the line, and having three fathoms on it at low water spring tides. Horsburgh gives two fathoms, but we could not find less than three, and all our boats were sounding over it several hours. Southwards of the three fathom patch, the Shoal extends to the westward nearly three-quarters of a mile, having from six to ten fathoms over this part of it. All round the Shoal there is from eighteen to twenty-five fathoms water.

We made the position of the three fathoms patch to be as follows: Lat. $1^{\circ} 11' 19'' N.$, Long. $107^{\circ} 25' 27'' E.$

White Rock.—About 80 feet high, lies E. S. E. from *Pulo Jarrang* the S. E. Island of the *Tam-*

belans. On its S. W. side are two small pinnacle rocks about twelve feet above high water. Vessels should not make too free with this rock, as shoal water extends from it between the N. W. and S. W. bearings to a distance of two cables.

Constance Shoal.—In the latest Admiralty Charts there is a danger marked "Constance?" and laid down about one mile and three quarters south of Large Jarrang. The *Rifleman* was steaming a whole day about its position without it being discovered. Beyond being marked in the chart we are not furnished with any particulars, and moreover, the shoal being marked as doubtful in itself, and not as of doubtful position merely, we are induced not to believe in its existence.

A Coral Shoal however was found to lie off the S. W. end of Little Jarrang, the shoalest part of which with three fathoms on it bears N. 68° W., nine-tenths of a mile from the S. W. end of that island. From this patch—which is its western extreme, it extends about S. E. by E. three quarters of a mile, with depths over it varying from four to nine fathoms. This, probably, is the Constance Shoal.

Tambelan highest peak on with right the extreme of Harbour the island clears it half a mile to the westward, and White Rock on with the right extreme of Large Jarrang leads over nine fathoms on the S. E. end of it. White Rock kept well open of the right extreme of large Jarrang, clears the danger to the southward.

There are seventeen to twenty fathoms between this shoal and Little Jarrang.

Several other Shoal patches and dangers were found near the Tambelans, but they lie out of the track of ordinary Navigators, and which a glance at the chart will give a better idea of than a long account here.

Rocky Islands.—Situated N. 54 W. 12 miles from the channel between Pula Way and Outer Island of the Tambelan group are merely two barren rocks, the resort of sea birds. They are bold, close to and occupy a space of about two cables in extent. The northern and larger one 134 feet in height, is in Lat. 1° 11' 9" N., Long. 107° 13" E.

Gap Rock.—North eleven miles from the Eastern extreme of the Tambelans in Lat. 1° 12' 30" N. and Long. 107° 34' 30" E., is very remarkable, consisting of two large boulders lying upon a flat rock. The larger of these boulders is 124 feet above the water. There is no small rock to the eastward of it as mentioned in Horsburgh, but a shoal extends about two cables from its south side.

St. Julian.—N. 44½ W, 24 miles from the large island of the St. Esprit group in Lat. 0° 55' 40" N., Long. 106° 43' 30" E., is a remarkable island, being nearly a mile long and only a cable's length broad. It is low in the centre rising to a hill 537 feet high on the north end and to one 318 feet high on the south end. The hill on the north end forms an exceedingly bold cliff to seaward. We found deep water close to on all sides.

Camel's Hump.—N. 28 E. 18½ miles from St. Julian, in Lat. 1° 11' 46" N., Long. 106° 53' E., is about half a mile long in an east and west direction, and about a third of a mile broad. It is well named, the highest part of the island forming a sort of hump, the height of which is 574 feet. We discovered no danger in its vicinity.

Saddle Island.—N. E. ½ E. 12 miles from St. Julian, in Lat. 1° 19' 21" N. Long. 107° 2' 17" E., is only half a mile long, and a quarter of a mile broad, it also is well named. The hills forming the saddle are in line on a S. ¼ W. and opposite bearing, the higher one on the north side being 387 feet high.

Victory Island.—In Lat. 1° 34' 46" N. Long. 106° 18' 40" E. rises to a hill in the centre 285 feet in height. We found a patch of five fathoms with deep water all round, about one-third of a mile off its S. W. end.

Acasta Rock.—Lies N. by W. 4 miles from Victory Island. It is just under the surface of the water, and in calm weather presents exactly the appearance described in Horsburgh, "the central part of a very brown colour, declining to a pale green around." The least swell breaks on it.

Doubtful Reef.—Of Horsburgh does not appear on the Admiralty Charts; and we saw nothing of such a danger when near its position.

Barren Rock.—E. by S. ¼ S. 7½ miles from Victory Island, in Lat. 1° 31' 50" N., Long. 106° 25' 35" E., is a whitish rock 80 feet high, about a cable's length in size, with deep water all around it.

Tides, Weather, &c.—As we were constantly shifting our surveying ground, we had no good opportunity for obtaining a series of tide observations. Such as we were able to procure were so irregular that no general conclusion could be formed from them. We observed, however, during the S. W. Monsoon—from the middle of July to the middle of September; and also in the month of December during the N. E. Monsoon, that Tides set to windward every day against the prevailing current, although they were uncertain as to commencement and time of duration.

The weather was very fine and the winds generally light. Ships would frequently shorten their passages through this part of the China Sea if they kept a kedge ready to let go during light airs and calms, and when both current and tide would otherwise be setting them back over the ground they had with difficulty gained. We saw several vessels set back in this way.

Concluding Remarks.—All the above Islands, like most others in the tropics, are covered with a dense vegetation, and have generally white sandy beaches, upon which turtle and the iguana may frequently be found.

The Islands of the St. Esprit group and others are occasionally visited by small parties of Malays for the purpose of catching turtle.

The only Islands permanently inhabited are those of the Tambelan group, all of which have a few Malays upon them. The village in the bay of the great Tambelan contains about five hundred inhabitants, but vessels cannot get any supplies there. We found the greatest difficulty in procuring a few fowls, &c., for our use while employed on the Survey.

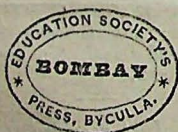

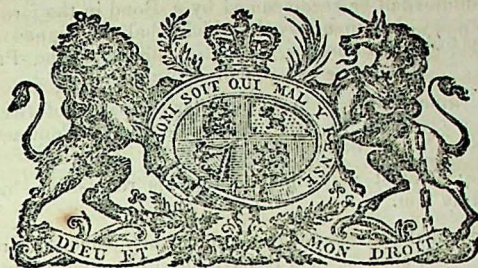

“PROCLAMATION No. 6.

IN THE NAME of Her Majesty VICTORIA, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, QUEEN, &c. &c. &c.

M. C. JOHNSTONE.—By His Honor, Major General MONTAGUE CHOLMELEY JOHNSTONE, for the time being in the Command of Her Majesty's Land Forces and Administering the Government of Mauritius and its Dependencies, &c. &c. &c.

In virtue of the power vested in me by Article XXVI. of Ordinance No. 16 of 1862, intituled ‘An Ordinance to authorize Engagements of Indian Immigrants to be made for Five Years, and to declare and amend, in certain other respects, the Law regarding Indian Immigrants in the Colony.’

I hereby order and proclaim that the said Ordinance, No. 16 of 1862, shall come into operation on and from the sixth day of April 1863.

ORDINANCE No. 16 of 1862.

W. STEVENSON.—Enacted by the Governor of Mauritius and its Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Council of Government thereof.

An Ordinance to authorise Engagements of Indian Immigrants to be made for Five Years, and to declare and amend, in certain other respects, the Law regarding Immigrants in the Colony.

[22nd April 1862.]

Whereas it is expedient to authorize Engagements of Indian Immigrants to be made for Five Years, and to declare and amend, in certain other respects, the Law regarding Indian Immigrants in this Colony.

Be it therefore enacted by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Council of Government, as follows :—

I.—Requisitions by persons in Mauritius wishing to introduce or engage Immigrants from India, shall, in future, be framed in terms of Schedule A, hereto annexed; and shall be made alternatively for Male Immigrants to be engaged in India to serve the Requisitionists, or for Male Immigrants to be allotted to Requisitionists in Mauritius.

Intending employers to make requisitions.

II.—Every such requisition shall be accompanied by a Bond in the form and terms of Schedule B, hereto annexed, which shall be signed by the Requisitionist and two Sureties, on whose sufficiency the Protector of Immigrants for the time being shall determine.

Requisitionists to give Bond and find Sureties.

III.—Every such requisition shall remain in force for the period of twelve months, and no longer, from its date to the date of any Contract, passed in India in execution thereof.

Requisitions to remain in force for specified time.

Provided, that any Requisitionist may stipulate that his requisition shall remain in force for any shorter period to be specified by him.

IV.—Any Immigrant who shall be engaged or allotted to any person in terms of any such requisition, shall be held to have been introduced into the Colony at the expense of the Requisitionist, who shall be bound, in the first instance, to repay to the Government the whole expense of introduction of such Immigrant, and other incidental expenses, including the proportional expense of introducing Females. Any sums on these accounts which may be recovered from any substituted, or other employer of the Immigrant, shall be applied towards extinction or diminution of such obligation to repay.

Immigrant held introduced at the expense of Requisitionist.

V.—Every Male Immigrant leaving India to come to Mauritius for hire, shall, before leaving India, either be engaged to an employer named in his Contract, or shall be taken bound to serve an employer to whom he shall be allotted by the Protector of Immigrants, on his arrival at Mauritius.

Immigrant to be taken bound by Contract in India.

VI.—Every such Immigrant shall, in India, sign a Contract either in the terms and form of Schedule C, or in the form of Schedule D, hereto annexed, according as it may be necessary for him to enter into a *Special Contract* to serve an individual employer therein named, or a *Contract with the Government of Mauritius* to serve any employer to whom he may be allotted by this Government: and, in either case, the Contract to be so signed, shall, *inter alia*, bind him to a service for Five years.

Such Contract to be for Five years, and in specified form.

VII.—If, after the date when this Ordinance shall come into operation, the Estate on which any Immigrant shall be engaged to work, shall be sold, alienated, succeeded to, or transferred to another person, during the currency of the Contract, the Immigrant shall be bound to perform all the conditions of the Contract to the new proprietor of the Estate, who, in like manner, shall be held bound to perform the stipulations thereof incumbent upon the employer.

Immigrant to serve new proprietor of Estate on its being transferred.

The provisions in this Article shall only apply to such contracts in which they shall be embodied.

VIII.—Upon any new proprietor being substituted under a Contract, in terms of the foregoing provisions, the former employer will be entitled to be freed from the obligations incumbent on him by the Contract: provided that he shall satisfy the Stipendiary Magistrate of the District that the Immigrant will not suffer thereby, and provided that all arrears of Wages be paid before the former proprietor shall be so liberated. In every such case, a docket in the terms of Schedule E shall be endorsed on the Contract by the Stipendiary Magistrate.

Former proprietor to be freed from Contract on certain conditions.

IX.—The provisions in the last preceding Articles are without prejudice to any obligation incumbent on any Immigrant by the law now existing: and more especially without prejudice to the obligation under which it is hereby declared every Immigrant labourer lies to perform his Contract of service, notwithstanding any transfers or sales, one or more, of the Estate upon which he agreed to work: provided always that in such case the original employer, or any employer substituted to him in terms of any law existing at the time, shall remain bound to perform the stipulations of such Contract incumbent upon him.

Law as to obligations of Immigrants on transfer of Estates declared.

X.—Any Immigrant, under written Contract, may have his Contract transferred to any other employer for the residue of its term: provided the transfer be made by the Stipendiary Magistrate, with the consent of the Immigrant and the then present and future employers.

Contract may be transferred.

XI.—Female Immigrants from India may be engaged either in India or in Mauritius, upon Contracts in the terms of Schedule F: provided that they shall only be employed in such lighter kind of labour as they may be fitted for, and also provided that no such Contract be for a longer period than one year.

Female Immigrants may be engaged.

XII.—It shall be lawful to the Protector of Immigrants, or the Stipendiary Magistrate of the District, to modify, and—if necessary—to suspend the Contract of any female who shall be unable to perform the conditions thereof, on account of family or domestic duties, or of advanced pregnancy.

Protector of Immigrants and Stipendiary Magistrates may modify such engagements.

Every such modification or suspension shall be made on terms equitable for both parties, and shall be endorsed, by the Protector or the Stipendiary Magistrate, on the Contract.

XIII.—Any Indian Immigrant who shall be incapacitated by sickness from labour during his Contract shall be entitled to lodging, food, as well as medical care, at the expense of his employer, during such incapacity.

Immigrants to be lodged and fed during sickness, for a certain time.

XIV.—Every Immigrant who shall have completed or redeemed his industrial residence,—or who shall have been released therefrom,—shall forthwith be entitled to receive, from the Stipendiary Magistrate of his District, an old Immigrant's Ticket, in the form of Schedule G, hereunto appended.

Old Immigrants' Tickets issuable by Stipendiary Magistrates.

XV.—It shall be lawful for the Protector of Immigrants to issue to any persons who, he shall be satisfied, are Indian-Immigrants, and who shall not be able to show that they are not bound in industrial residence in the Colony,—Tickets in the form of Schedule H.

Protector may issue New Immigrants' Tickets to Immigrants without papers.

XVI.—All persons receiving such Tickets shall be dealt with on the same footing as new Immigrants subject to allotment as at the date of their several Tickets; but without prejudice to their being entitled to relief from any burden consequent thereon, upon showing that they had previously completed the whole or part of their industrial residence in the Colony.

The rules existing at the time as to allotments, may be applied to all Immigrants receiving such Tickets, and also to all New Immigrants whose Contracts of service shall be broken on account of any misconduct on their part.

XVII.—It shall be lawful for the Protector of Immigrants, at any time, either personally, or by any person deputed by him in writing, in terms of Schedule I., to enter and inspect any Asylum, Hospital, School, Camp of labourers, or other establishment of any kind, in which Indian Immigrants are received, and also to enter upon any Estate or premises (except private dwelling-houses) in which any Immigrant is employed or located, and to investigate the condition and state of any Immigrants who may be therein respectively.

He shall also be entitled to require any Immigrants in any such places, respectively, to be brought before him, or the person whom he shall depute, as aforesaid, upon any such visit.

Any person who shall obstruct or molest the Protector of Immigrants, or his Deputy aforesaid, in the performance of the said duty, shall, on conviction before the Stipendiary Magistrate of the District, be condemned to a fine not exceeding £20 sterling, or to imprisonment for a period not exceeding one month.

XVIII.—Any Immigrant who shall unlawfully absent himself from work, shall (besides losing his claim to Wages and Allowances during such absence) forfeit to his employer one Halfpenny for each Shilling of his monthly Wages, for each day of absence.

Punishments for unlawful absence.

This forfeiture may be applied by the employer in the first instance, but subject to his justifying the same to the Stipendiary Magistrate, in the event of the Immigrant complaining that his Wages have not been fully paid.

Instead of the forfeiture hereinbefore mentioned, the Immigrant shall be liable, on complaint by his employer, to be sentenced by the Stipendiary Magistrate of his District to imprisonment for a period not exceeding fourteen days, or (at the option of the employer) to a prolongation of the Contract equivalent to the time of absence.

Every Immigrant sentenced to prolongation of his service, shall be entitled to redeem such prolongation by paying to his employer at the rate of six Shillings sterling for every Calendar month thereof.

XIX.—No such forfeiture, imprisonment, or prolongation, respectively, as in the last preceding Article provided, shall be incurred if the Wages of the Immigrant shall have been unpaid for any period longer than Two Calendar months before his absence, or if more than Two Calendar months shall have elapsed between the Immigrant's return from such absence and the application of the forfeiture, or lodging of the complaint against him, as the case may be.

Punishments for absence not incurred, if employer has not performed his part of the Contract.

Further, no such forfeiture, imprisonment, or prolongation, shall apply if the employer shall have refused an application for payment of the Wages lawfully due to the Immigrant, before the time of such absence.

XX.—In the case of any service being prolonged, as herein aforesaid, the extent of prolongation shall be endorsed on the Immigrant's Contract and Ticket; and, during such prolongation, he shall be subject to all the conditions of his Contract, and to the punishment by this Ordinance provided, in case of unlawful absence.

Prolongation of Contracts to be treated as part of Contracts.

Punishments for fraudulently obtaining &c., Tickets of Immigrants.

XXI.—The penalty of imprisonment for a period not exceeding three months, shall be incurred by any one:—

- Who shall obtain or attempt to obtain an old Immigrant's Ticket, or a duplicate old or new Immigrant's Ticket, by means of false pretences;
 - Who, being in possession of an old or new Immigrant's Ticket not intended for himself, shall, for any purpose whatever, personify the Immigrant therein designed;
 - Who shall use as his own, and for any purpose whatever, an Immigrant's Ticket designed for another person;
 - Who shall give up, either temporarily or permanently, to any one, any Immigrant's Ticket in his possession, in order that the same may be used for any fraudulent purpose;
 - Who shall aid or abet, counsel or assist any person, in committing any of the foregoing offences;
- The Stipendiary Magistrate within whose jurisdiction any of these offences shall have been committed, shall have jurisdiction to try the same, and to adjudge and impose the punishment thereof.

XXII.—All sums due to Government under any Bonds which shall have been executed in virtue of the provisions of Ordinance No. 5 of 1849, and all sums due to Government for the introduction, engagement, or allotment, of any new Immigrant whatever, shall be recoverable in any District Court in which the party liable to the same shall have his domicile at the time; notwithstanding that the amount of any such debt aforesaid may be beyond the ordinary jurisdiction of District Courts.

Recovery of sums due for introduction of Immigrants.

In case of such debt being due upon any Bond, the District Magistrate shall entertain, and proceed in the cause, and shall give judgment in the same respectively upon receiving a written application from the Protector of Immigrants for the time being, without its being necessary for any person or Officer to attend the District Court in such cause.

XXIII.—Any employer shall be entitled, on application to the Stipendiary Magistrate of the District, to obtain the release of any Immigrant in his service, who shall have been imprisoned on his complaint for any act or non-feasance not involving a breach of the peace, or of the public Law of the Colony.

Employer may have servant released in certain cases.

XXIV.—It shall be lawful to the Governor in Executive Council, from time to time, to make Regulations for carrying out the purposes of this Ordinance, and from time to time to alter the same; and all such Regulations, on being published in the Government Gazette, shall have the same effect as if they had been contained *verbatim* herein; provided that they are not inconsistent with the spirit and meaning of any of the provisions hereof.

Repeal of existing laws.

XXV.—The following laws, viz. :—

Art. 3 of Ordinance 21 of 1854, Ord. 65 of 1860 are hereby repealed; Ord. 30 of 1858 is hereby repealed in so far as it is inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance, but reserving the operation of the said laws, in so far as they regard any right or interest which shall have been acquired under the same.

XXVI.—This Ordinance shall come into operation on a day to be hereafter fixed by Proclamation.

The said Requisitionist and the said Sureties promise to pay to the Protector of Immigrants all such expenses of introduction upon the said Immigrants being delivered to the said Requisitionist; such payment to be exigible previous to their leaving the Depôt.

In default of the said Requisitionist's claiming such Immigrants within seven clear days after they shall have been received at the Port Louis Depôt, the said Requisitionist and the said Sureties bind themselves to pay to the Protector of Immigrants one shilling per day for each Immigrant as his cost of maintenance during the interval between his arrival at the Depôt and his entering on service; and in case of such default and of any of the said Immigrants electing to be free from their engagement, the said Requisitionist and the said Sureties do further bind themselves to pay to the Protector the whole expense attending the introduction of the Immigrants so electing and of the females accompanying them.

The said Requisitionist and the said Sureties hereby consent that the Certificate of the Protector of Immigrants shall be conclusive evidence against them, in all Courts and places, of the amount chargeable against them, in respect of the said expenses of introduction, or of the said costs of maintenance, as the case may be.

In virtue of the power vested in me by Article IV. of Ordinance No. 11 of 1863, intituled, 'An Ordinance to amend Ordinance No. 16 of 1862, intituled "An Ordinance to authorise engagements of Indian Immigrants to be made for Five Years and to declare and amend, in certain other respects the law regarding Indian Immigrants in the Colony;'"

I hereby order and proclaim that the said Ordinance, No. 11 of 1863, shall come into operation on and from the Sixth day of April 1863.

ORDINANCE No. 11 of 1863.

M. C. JOHNSTONE.—Enacted by His Honor the Officer Administering the Government of Mauritius and its Dependencies, with the advice and consent of the Council of Government thereof.

AN ORDINANCE to amend Ordinance No. 16 of 1862, intituled 'An Ordinance to authorise Engagements of Indian Immigrants to be made for Five Years, and to declare and amend, in certain other respects, the law regarding Indian Immigrants in the Colony.'

[27th March 1863.]

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend, in certain respects, Ordinance No. 16 of 1862, intituled 'An Ordinance to authorise engagements of Indian Immigrants to be made for Five Years, and to declare and amend, in certain other respects, the law regarding Indian Immigrants in the Colony;'

Be it therefore enacted by His Honor the Officer Administering the Government, with the advice and consent of the Council of Government, as follows:—

I.—The Appeals from Judgments and Orders of Stipendiary Magistrates to the Supreme Court, as provided by the 19th Article of Ordinance No. 15 of 1852, intituled 'An Ordinance for amending and repealing Ordinance No. 26 of 1848,' shall not any longer be competent, and the same are hereby transferred from the Supreme Court to a Bench of Magistrates sitting in Petty Sessions, in terms of the 18th Article of the said Ordinance.

The Appeal to be made to such Bench of Magistrates shall be made, heard, and decided, and the Proceedings therein shall be conducted in the same manner, and under the same conditions, as nearly as may be, as in the cases of Appeals to the Supreme Court made under the law existing previous to the passing of this Ordinance, but with the following exceptions, viz:—

(1).—The Recognizance specified in the said 19th Article, shall bind the party giving the notice of an Appeal as in this Ordinance provided, to appear and prosecute his Appeal, with due diligence, to its conclusion before the Bench of Magistrates aforesaid, and to pay such Costs as the said Bench of Magistrates may award; such Costs in no case to exceed the sum of £5 sterling.

(2).—The Notice of Appeal and the transmission of certified copies of the Sentence or Order and Evidence, respectively, provided in Articles 19 and 20 of the Ordinance last above mentioned; shall not be made to the Registry of the Supreme Court, but to an Officer whom the Governor, or Officer Administering the Government, shall appoint as the Clerk of Appeals under this Ordinance.

II.—In any Appeal aforesaid, the Protector of Immigrants shall have right to intervene and appear on behalf of any Immigrant being a party to such Appeal.

III.—When any action of damages shall lie at the instance of any Immigrant against any person chargeable with any official duty in relation to any complaint by or against such Immigrant, or in relation to any matter arising out of any Contract of Service of such Immigrant, such action being grounded on any neglect or misconduct in relation to such duty, the Protector of Immigrants shall (subject to the orders of the Governor) have right to institute and carry on such action, and to obtain, and cause to be executed, judgment therein for and on behalf of the said Immigrant.

Any such action at the instance of the said Protector shall not be challengeable on the ground that it embraces the rights of action of two or more Immigrants concerned, provided the said rights are founded on the same facts and law : but without prejudice to the Court or Judge before whom such action may be brought directing that the proceedings in the same be conducted in such manner, by way of division or separation of the said rights or interests, as may be deemed just by the said Court or Judge.

IV.—This ordinance shall come into operation on a day to be fixed by Proclamation.
