### REVENUE DEPARTMENT.

ISSUED BY THE INCOME TAX COMMISSIONERS FOR THE TOWN AND ISLAND OF BOMBAY UNDER ACT XXXII. OF 1860, SECTION XXVIII.

## INCOME TAX

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31ST JULY 1863.

Notice is hereby given that every person within the Town and Island of Bombay, who, by the Act XXXII. of 1860, for imposing Duties on Profits, arising from Property, Professions, Trades, and Offices, is liable to the said Duties, and to return his or her Profits or Income, is hereby required to fill in a Return of his or her Profits and Income in the prescribed Form (B), and to transmit such Return duly signed with the Declaration prescribed by the Act, to the Assessors of the Town and Island of Bombay aforesaid, at their respective offices, within 15 days from the date of the delivery of the Special Notice, under the penalties contained in the said Act.

Persons requiring Forms of Returns can procure them at the Office of the Assessors. Forms of such Returns will also be left at the usual place of Residence or Business of every person known or considered to be liable to the Duties imposed by the said Act. But any person liable to the Duties who may not receive such Forms, must apply for the same at the Office of any of the Assessors.

  - III. *Torts and Criminal Law*.—Professor Reid, LL.D., on Wednesdays. Junior and Senior Law Students.
  - IV. *Contracts and Mercantile Law*.—Professor Hore, M.A., on Fridays. Junior and Senior Law Students.
  - V. *Judicial Evidence and Procedure*.—Professor Reid, LL.D., on Saturdays. Junior and Senior Law Students.
2. The course in *General Jurisprudence* is open free to Senior Students of the Elphinstone College.
  3. Other candidates if found to possess a sufficient knowledge of English will be admitted upon paying Rupees 30 in advance for the Session.
  4. The other courses are open free to Students who have already attended for at least one Session, a course of Lectures in General Jurisprudence, and passed a satisfactory examination in the same.

The following Rules for the entry for Home consumption of Spirits used exclusively in the Arts, Manufactures or Chemistry, are published for general information, in accordance with Section II. of Act XXIII. of 1862.

I. On making entry of Spirits of the above description in accordance with the Provisions of Section 62 of Act VI. of 1863, the Importer is to state on the face of the Private Manifest whether the article is desired to be charged at the rate of duty laid down in Schedule A to Act XI. of 1862, or at the rate of 10 per cent. *ad valorem* allowed by Section II. of Act XXIII. of 1862.

II. In the event of the higher rate of Rupees 3 per Imperial Gallon, or above, having been elected, the Spirits will be passed after payment of Duty in the usual manner, but in the event of the lower rate of 10 per cent. *ad valorem* having been stated, the Spirits concerned must, before removal from the Custom-house premises, be rendered unfit for use as a beverage and incapable of being converted to that purpose.

III. With this view the Importer will be required to mix with every nine Gallons of such Spirits, one Gallon of Pyroxilic Spirit (methylic alcohol), the admixture to take place on the Custom-house premises and in presence of a Custom-house Gauger. On a Certificate of the latter officer being attached to the Private Manifest that the admixture has been duly made and completed, the Spirits will be assessed for duty at the rate of 10 per cent. *ad valorem* on the quantity imported, and passed from the Custom House, after payment, in the usual manner.

IV. The quantity of Pyroxilic Spirit necessary for admixture with any consignment of Spirits of the above description, at the rate of one Gallon to every nine Gallons of Spirits, must be procured at the Importer's own expense, and the process of mixing must be carried out personally by the Importer or his agent, or other authorised servant. Samples of "Pyroxilic Spirit" will be retained by the Gauger, with which that brought by Importers will be tested before use. If the Pyroxilic Spirit be not equal to the samples, the Importer shall be required to mix such additional proportion with the Spirits of Wine to be imported as the Commissioner of Customs may direct.

V. Spirits of Wine, &c. may be moved into Bond, under the prescribed conditions of similar Bonded Goods without previously having been rendered unfit for use as a beverage in the manner mentioned, but prior to removal from Bond for Home consumption of any portion of such Spirits at the rate for Customs of 10 per cent. *ad valorem*, the course above described must be carried out at the Warehouse, in the presence of the Warehouse-

As the principal object cannot be fully attained unless the true causes of death be recorded, persons of all stations are requested, in each case of death occurring in their circle, to obtain, in writing, from the Medical Attendant, the name of the fatal disease, that it may be delivered to the Policeman at the funeral place. Medical Practitioners, particularly, are requested to aid the registration. Blank forms of Death Reports, to keep by them in readiness, are given gratuitously on application at the Office of the Deputy Commissioner of Police.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind, that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all *single* cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.



Officers in charge of Civil Treasuries are informed that this Department has received a communication from the Officiating Auditor General of India, intimating that the Government of India has been pleased to resolve, in supercession of the instructions contained in Financial Resolution No. 7872 of the 27th June 1861.

Circular No. 54, dated 11th May 1863.

1. That the charge to be paid out of the Budget Grants shall be those *which come in course of payment*, instead of those *falling due* within the official year.
  2. That all balances of Grants unexpended on the 30th April last shall be held to have lapsed from that date; and all Budget Expenditure, both on current and arrear account from the 1st of the current month of May, shall be charged against the Budget Grants for 1863-64; and
  3. That from the same date the separate column provided in the Forms of Accounts for "Payments in 1863-64 out of the Grants for 1862-63" shall be abolished, and the Receipts and Payments be exhibited in two columns only, viz. "On account of previous years" and "On account of 1863-64."
2. The words "which come in course of payment" apply to charges *passed* in the Civil Pay Office—say in 1862-63, but *not paid* until 1863-64. Such payments are to be entered in the column headed "On account of previous years."
3. The Disbursing Officers are to note on the Bills whether the charges appertain to the current, or a previous year, and record the items accordingly in their Cash Accounts.

**Caution against sending Valuables by Post.**—Robberies of Mails in various parts of the interior have lately become unfortunately of frequent occurrence, and there seems reason to infer that the highwaymen have been actuated either by information received from accomplices connected with bankers and firms, or by a suspicion that the Mails contain Gold, Banknotes, or other valuables.

Such depredations not only interfere with the safe and speedy transport of the important portion of the Mails, viz. that containing letters, but they entail upon owners of property heavy losses, as well as seriously cripple the efficient working of the Post Office Department.

Government orders on the subject of sending valuables by post are plain and explicit; they are now repromulgated, and the public are hereby cautioned against the practice, in the hope that they will see the advisability of not sending by the Government post, gold or other valuables, as, by so doing, the public Mails are exposed to peril and robbery, and their own property to risk, since the Post Office under the Postal Act\* is freed from responsibility for valuables enclosed in Parcels.

\* POSTAL ACT.—Section 49.

“The Government shall not be responsible for any loss or damage which may occur in respect of any thing entrusted to the Post Office for conveyance; and no person employed by the Government in the Post Office Department shall be responsible for any such loss or damage, unless that person shall cause such loss or damage negligently, maliciously, or fraudulently.”

#### Postal Regulations.

“In order to protect as far as possible the Mail from the chance of robbery, Officers in charge of Post Offices shall not knowingly receive Coin, Bullion, Precious Stones, Jewels, for despatch either by Letter or Banghy Post.

If a Post Master be informed or otherwise becomes acquainted with the fact that any letter or parcel contains valuables, he should refuse to receive it.”

1st.—Every Packet must be sent without a cover or with a cover open at the end or sides.

2nd.—There must be no enclosure except Newspapers or other Printed Papers.

3rd.—There must be no other writing or marks upon the Newspapers or Printed Papers than the name and address of the person to whom they are sent, nor anything upon the cover but such name and address, the printed title of the papers, and the printed name and address of the Publisher or the Vendor who sends them.

4th.—No packet must exceed 2 feet in length, width, or depth, or three pounds in weight.
