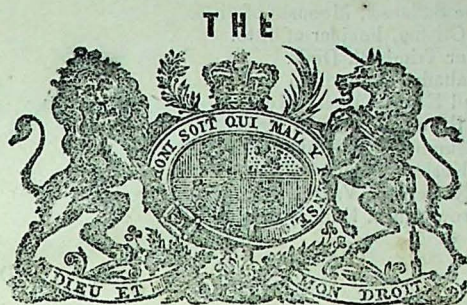

ISSUED BY THE INCOME TAX COMMISSIONERS FOR THE TOWN AND ISLAND OF
 BOMBAY UNDER ACT XXXII. OF 1860, SECTION XXVIII.

INCOME TAX

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31ST JULY 1863.

Notice is hereby given that every person within the Town and Island of Bombay, who, by the Act XXXII. of 1860, for imposing Duties on Profits, arising from Property, Professions, Trades, and Offices, is liable to the said Duties, and to return his or her Profits or Income, is hereby required to fill in a Return of his or her Profits and Income in the prescribed Form (B), and to transmit such Return duly signed with the Declaration prescribed by the Act, to the Assessors of the Town and Island of Bombay aforesaid, at their respective offices, within 15 days from the date of the delivery of the Special Notice, under the penalties contained in the said Act.

Persons requiring Forms of Returns can procure them at the Office of the Assessors. Forms of such Returns will also be left at the usual place of Residence or Business of every person known or considered

to be liable to the Duties imposed by the said Act. But any person liable to the Duties who may not receive such Forms, must apply for the same at the Office of any of the Assessors.

GOVERNMENT DEPARTMENTAL NOTICE.

FINANCIAL DEPARTMENT.

The following Resolution of the Government of India is republished for general information :—

“ FINANCIAL DEPARTMENT.

No. 1 G.

Extract from the Proceedings of the Government of India, in the Financial Department, under date the 2nd January 1863.

READ a Despatch from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State, No. 193, dated the 25th November 1862.

RESOLUTION 1.—His Excellency the Governor General in Council is pleased to resolve that the following Extract from the Despatch mentioned above be published for general information :—

‘ The Memorials from the Covenanted Civil Servants of the several Governments in India on the subject of their retiring Annuities, and of the Pensions of their Widows and Orphans, together with your Financial letter, dated the 7th March 1862, No. 40, the Financial letter from Madras, dated the 8th February 1862, No. 2, the public letter from Bombay, dated the 12th April 1862, No. 13, and the several Minutes of Members of the respective Governments in India in reference thereto, have been considered by me in Council.

‘ It does not appear to be necessary to give a detailed reply to the observations of your Government, or to the requests contained in the several Memorials, as the result of the consideration by Her Majesty’s Government of those observations and Memorials will be apparent from the decision which I have now to communicate.

‘ In regard to the period of service which is in future to be required as a qualification for an Annuity, Her Majesty’s Government see no reason for altering the period of twenty-five years’ service and twenty-

two years' residence (including one year's sick leave, if such has been taken as at present), but they cannot allow any future special leave of absence from India on private affairs to count as residence.

'No sufficient ground appears to have been assigned for increasing or altering the amount of the full Annuity, which must therefore remain at £1,000, or of the amount of the percentage of deduction from salaries, which will continue at four per cent., the amount of subscriptions to accumulate, as at present, at six per cent. interest.

'Her Majesty's Government are of opinion that there is ground for making some alteration in the terms on which Annuities are granted, and they have decided that a Civil Servant who has completed the prescribed period of service and residence shall be granted by Government an Annuity of £600; and that he shall have the option of taking in addition an Annuity of the amount not exceeding £400, which his accumulated subscriptions with interests will purchase according to the Table now in force, or of adding to his subscriptions such a sum as will purchase an Annuity of any amount which, added to the £600 granted by Government, will not exceed the full Annuity of £1,000. They have also decided that Annuities without limitation as to number, may be granted on application, at any time, to Covenanted Civil Servants who have completed the prescribed periods of service and residence, and whose resignations of the Service have been accepted, and that those Civil Servants who have obtained Annuities since the Memorials were sent in be admitted from this date to the benefit of the arrangement now sanctioned.

'It must be clearly understood that in the event of the death of a Subscriber, his accumulated subscriptions will lapse, and that no return of subscriptions can, under any circumstances, be allowed.

'Her Majesty's Government are also disposed to make some provision for Covenanted Civil Servants who, having devoted a portion of their lives and energies, and especially those years during which men qualified for a profession to the service of Government, are deprived of the fruits of their labour by sickness, which may compel them to resign the Service before they have become entitled to an Annuity. In any such cases, when clearly proved by a Medical Certificate, the following Pensions may be granted:—

'If under five years' service, a Grant of £500.

'Of five years' service and under ten, an Annuity of £150.

'Of ten years' service and under fifteen, an Annuity of £250.

'Of fifteen years' service and under twenty, an Annuity of £350.

'Of twenty years' service and under twenty-five, an Annuity of £450.

'Her Majesty's Government are willing to sanction the payment of all the Annuities quarterly and to the date of decease with the same option as to payment in India or England as at present.

2. His Excellency in Council is also pleased to direct the publication of the following paragraphs of of the same Despatch containing Orders regarding the claim to assistance from the State preferred by the Bengal Civil Fund, the Madras Civil Fund (Charity Branch), and the Bombay Civil Fund (Provident Branch):—

'Her Majesty's Government have no intention of withdrawing the aid which has been hitherto granted, and they see no reason for increasing it. If the Subscribers prefer it, there would apparently be no objection to granting, in lieu of the present indirect aids, an annual sum equal to the average of the donations during the past five years, the future interest on the balance of the Funds being in that case fixed at five per cent., and the remittance of the sums required by the Funds in England being made at the same rate of exchange as that fixed annually for the adjustment of transactions with the British Exchequer.

'These changes may severally be brought into immediate operation, and a copy of this Despatch will be forwarded to the Governments of Madras and Bombay, respectively, for the information and guidance of those Governments.'

GENERAL ORDERS

BY HIS EXCELLENCY THE HONORABLE THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

MILITARY DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 8th January 1863.

No. 7 of 1863.—The following General Order by the Government of India, No. 1114, dated 16th December 1862, is republished:—

“As some misapprehension is believed to exist with respect to the competency of the Head of a Department, the accounts of which are controlled by the Military Finance Department, to remit a retrenchment made by one of the Examiners on account of Departmental expenditure of any kind, His Excellency the Governor General in Council is pleased to notify that the Controller of Military Finance *alone* has the power of remitting such a retrenchment, on sufficient explanation being afforded to warrant the charge being passed under existing rules.

2. But, as the opinion of the Head of the Department must have great weight with the Controller, the reply to the retrenchment should be sent through the former, who will forward it to the Controller with such remarks as he may deem necessary.

3. Whenever the Officer retrenched wishes the case to be submitted to Government, in the event of the Controller not feeling justified in remitting the retrenchment himself, he should state this in the reply, which the Controller will, in that case, submit for the orders of Government in the usual way.

This order is applicable to the three Presidencies.

No. 8 of 1863.—The following General Order by the Government of India, No. 1111, dated 16th December 1862, is republished:—

“The following Military letter from the Right Honourable the Secretary of State for India, No 413, dated 8th November 1862, and the instructions referred to in the 2nd paragraph thereof, are published for general information:—

‘MILITARY.

No. 413.

TO HIS EXCELLENCY THE RIGHT HONORABLE THE GOVERNOR GENERAL OF INDIA IN COUNCIL,

MY LORD,—1. I have to inform you that in communication with the Secretary of State for War, I have consented, in calculating the Pensions of those Soldiers, who, in transferring their services from the Local Army of India to Her Majesty's British Service, elected the British rates of Pension, that the same increase of Good Conduct pay shall be reckoned as has been allowed for the latter service under Royal Warrants.

2. A copy of the instructions issued by the Secretary of State for War to the Commissioners of Chelsea Hospital on the subject is herewith forwarded.

Extract from letter addressed to the Secretary, Chelsea Hospital, from War Office, dated 10th September 1862.

“Reference having recently been made to the Indian Office as to whether, in reckoning the pensions of Soldiers who have transferred their services from the Local Army of India to the Line or Artillery, the same increase may be granted for Good Conduct pay as has been allowed for the latter Arms under Royal Warrants, I am directed by the Secretary of State for War to inform you that Sir Charles Wood has authorised this boon to all Soldiers of the Local Army, who, in transferring their services, elected to have their Pensions reckoned according to the regulations of this Office, and I am to request that their Pensions may in future be calculated accordingly, and that the Commissioners will furnish quarterly a Statement of the extra expense thus incurred, in order that it may be reimbursed to the Public from Indian Revenue.”

As the principal object cannot be fully attained unless the true causes of death be recorded, persons of all stations are requested, in each case of death occurring in their circle, to obtain, in writing, from the Medical Attendant, the name of the fatal disease, that it may be delivered to the Policeman at the funeral place. Medical Practitioners, particularly, are requested to aid the registration. Blank forms of Death Reports, to keep by them in readiness, are given gratuitously on application at the Office of the Deputy Commissioner of Police.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind, that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all *single* cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.

3. For Gold the Bullion certificate will be at twenty days' sight.

4. All Gold and Silver Bullion and Coins that may be tendered to the Mint for coinage may be melted and cast into Bars by the Mint Premelting establishment prior to their being received or assayed. Should the Bullion prove unadapted for coinage it will be returned to the importer who must pay the premelting fee calculated on the gross weight in tolas.

5. If Bullion is transferred from the name of one proprietor to that of another after it has been tendered to the Mint, or withdrawn previous to registry, a fee of two annas for each box will be charged.

6. It is to be understood that, until the Bullion, or Coin, has been thus delivered at the Mint Scales in the Bullion Receiving room, it is in the custody, and at the risk, of the importer, to whom, however, every facility will be afforded for securing it in the Bullion Strongholds.

This issue of the Account Current shall constitute "Registry," and twenty-four hours after such issue, provided that within that time the Account Current may have been approved by the Importer and returned to the Mint Master, the Mint Master will deliver to the Importer a Bullion certificate on Her Majesty's Treasury authorising the holder to receive the amount.

8. The seignorage on Gold Bullion, or Coin, shall be at one per cent. of the standard value. The seignorage on Sicca Rupees shall be one per cent. There shall be no seignorage on short weight Madras, Furruckabad, or Government Rupees.

The seignorage on all other descriptions of Silver Coins and Bullion shall be two per cent.

9. The Refinage charge on Silver below six dwts. in assay worse than the Indian Standard shall be at the rate of four per cent. per dwt. of worseness. The Refinage charge on Gold shall be at the rate of one half per cent. for every five carat grains of worseness below the Indian Standard.

The Public are hereby informed that henceforth the Letter Box at the General Post Office, Fort, will be closed at 6 p. m. daily on week days, and at 4 p. m. on Sundays, for letters for all parts of India, &c. Late letters, on prepayment in postage stamps of the usual Fee of 3 annas each, can be posted up to 7 p. m. daily.

No Registered Letters will be taken after 5-30 p. m.

Letters, &c. can be posted at the Receiving Houses up to 4 o'clock p. m. on week days, and 3 p. m. on Sundays.

Letters received by Railway from Poona, Sattara, Belgaum, Sholapore, Ahmednuggur, Nagpore, Calcutta and Madras Presidencies will be issued at the first delivery 8 A. M., and those received from Guzerat, Scinde, Katiawar, Cutch, Khandeish, Malwa, Agra and N. W. Provinces by the second delivery at 11 A. M. daily.

REGISTERED LETTERS.

Camp Nynectal, 21st October 1862.

With the sanction of His Excellency the Governor General in Council, the following orders in the Postal Department are published for general information:—

RULES RELATING TO THE REGISTRATION OF LETTERS SENT THROUGH THE POST OFFICE.

By the payment of a fee of Four Annas in addition to the ordinary Postage, *both of which must be prepaid in Stamps*, any Letter, Newspaper, Pamphlet, or Book may be registered to any place under the Government of India or in the United Kingdom and Colonies.

2. Information regarding the Foreign Countries to which Letters can be registered, and the conditions thereof, will be found in the "Steam Postage Schedule for the Post Offices in India."

3. Letters intended to be registered must be brought to the Post Office at least half an hour before the time fixed for closing the Mail; if brought after that time, they will be stamped "Too Late," and retained for the following Mail.

4. A Postmaster or other official, on being applied to register a Letter, will grant a receipt, and retain a copy on the counterpart of the Cheque Book for the purpose; the dated Office Stamp should be affixed to the receipt, and also to the copy.

5. So soon as a letter is registered, the Postage Labels thereon should be defaced, and the Special Stamp "*Registered*," should be affixed; the address and weight should then be entered in the *yellow cover*, after which, the Letter and the cover should be folded up together, and placed under lock and key, until the time for closing the Mail.

6. On opening a Mail Packet, the Postmaster should carefully examine the Registered Letters, and compare the weight of each with the entries thereof in the Chulan and yellow cover; the Office Dated Stamp should then be affixed to them, and also to the yellow cover, after which they should be disposed of as prescribed in the rules for opening and distributing the Mail.

7. In disposing of a Registered Letter, care must be taken to ensure *proof* of transfer by each official through whose hands it passes from the time of receipt to that of delivery; an acknowledgment must therefore be taken by initials, or otherwise, from each person into whose hands it may be given for *custody, despatch, or delivery*.

8. On delivery of a Registered Letter, the Postman should obtain the signature of the addressee on the yellow cover; the "*original*" receipt will be retained in the Delivery Office, and the "*duplicate*" returned to the Office of Despatch *by the first Mail*.

9. The "*duplicate*" receipt, on being returned, should be pasted to the counterpart in the Cheque Book; when not received back within the proper time, it should be called for, and a note of the requisition made on the duplicate receipt in the Cheque Book.

10. On a Registered Letter having to be *re-directed*, the duplicate portion of the yellow cover should be receipted and returned to the Office of Despatch, with a remark showing the Office to which it has been forwarded.

11. When a Registered Letter cannot be delivered, it should be forwarded without delay, together with the original yellow cover, to the Office of Despatch, in view to be returned to the Sender, and, if he cannot be found, it should be sent to the Dead Letter Office.

12. When a Registered Letter is found to be missing, the Postmaster must *immediately* submit a full and clear report of the circumstance to the Inspecting Postmaster and Postmaster General, and also to the Office of Despatch, in view to a searching inquiry being at once instituted to ascertain *where* and *how* it disappeared.

13. The Postmaster General will, without delay, bring to the notice of the Director General the loss or theft of a Registered Letter, and on completion of the inquiry instituted thereon, report the result.

14. By Section 49 of the Postal Act, Government does not guarantee, and is not responsible for, the safety of a Registered Letter, but any official through whose neglect it may be lost or made away with, will be called to strict account, and may be required to make good any loss.

15. Registration makes the transmission of a Letter more secure, by rendering it practicable to trace it from one official to another; if, therefore, by neglect of prescribed precautions, it is lost or made away with, the officials of the Post Office will have no ground for complaint if held responsible for the consequences of their neglect.

16. As registration does not involve a receipt for the *contents* of a Letter, and as abstraction thereof may take place *before* as well as *after the cover is posted, and even after delivery*, it is recommended that the addressee who expects valuable enclosures, should, at the time of granting a receipt, open the letter *in the presence of the Postman*.

17. A Letter containing Bank Notes, Postage Stamps, or other valuable articles, should, as a rule, be registered, and should be securely folded, or enclosed in a substantial envelope, and *always sealed with wax*, in order to prevent, as far as possible, its being tampered with.

N. B.—A Letter is not ordinarily of importance to any person excepting the addressee; but if valuable articles are enclosed, the case is otherwise, and temptation is thrown in the way of the numerous persons in the Post Office through whose hands it passes. Hence the precaution of registering such Letters is recommended.

Government Parcels by the P. & O.C.o.'s Steamers.—The following Circular, issued by the Bombay Government, is circulated for the information and guidance of Postal functionaries :—

"GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

"The Right Honorable the Governor in Council is pleased to direct that, in future, whenever Heads of Departments may have to send, by the Peninsular and Oriental Company's contract Steamers, Service Packets, the Postage on each of which, if transmitted through the Post Office, would exceed Rs. 24, they shall not forward them by Post, but through the Peninsular and Oriental Company's Parcel Agency Office, paying the Freight due thereon, which should be charged for in Contingent Bills.

"It is to be distinctly understood, that Parcels forwarded as now directed, are not to contain Letters, which must be sent as usual through the Post Office.

"All articles to the same address, from any Office or Department, should be made into one Parcel whenever practicable.

Whenever Service Parcels of the description mentioned in it are brought to the Post for being posted for the marginal Stations, the senders' attention should invariably be drawn to the Government Circular.

Parcels for Sind and the Punjab are despatched from Bombay by Burmah Company's Contract Steamers; they are therefore liable to Ship Postage from Bombay to Kurrachee, and those intended for transmission from the latter Station in the interior will be charged with the usual Postage according to their distances.

3. Parcels posted at Outstations and intended for transmission to Sind and the Punjab from Bombay, will, in addition to the Postage as mentioned in the 1st paragraph, be liable to Inland Banghy Postage to Bombay.
