REVENUE DEPARTMENT.

It is hereby notified, for general information, that the new capital of North Canara is in future to be known by the name of "CARWAR," and all the Departments are requested to give effect to this Resolution.

The following memoranda by Mr. Clements R. Markham on the subject are also published for general information.

MEMORANDUM on the Change of Name from Sedashighur to one that is simpler and more easily spelt.

THE OLD CARWAR FACTORY.

IN considering the question of changing the name of the new port on the west coast of India from Sedashighur (Seda-Shiva-ghur) to a more convenient and pronounceable one, the following notes may raise a doubt whether the name of *Carwar* has not a better right to the contemplated honour than that of *Beitcul*.

Carwar is a name well known in history, and it was for many years one of the principal factories of the East India Company on the west coast. *Beitcul* (composed of two Arabic words meaning "A Home for all") is the name of an insignificant little village in the bay.

The East India Company had a large stone-built factory at *Carwar* (or *Codavaud*) as long ago as 1663. The factory was on the south side of the Kala-nuddee river, and about three miles from its mouth, where its ruins may still be seen.

The factory was established for collecting pepper, cardamoms, &c. for the Company's ships, and at one time muslins of very superior quality appear to have been manufactured there for export. The Company's ships found secure anchorage in *Carwar* bay, and were occasionally careened in the cove (now called *Beitcul* cove). In 1663, it is recorded by Bruce, that sales of lead and broad cloth were effected at the *Carwar* factory, in exchange for pepper, cardamoms, cassia lignum, and dungarees. When *Indiamen* arrived at *Surat*, some of them, with a proportion of European goods, were sent to *Carwar* and other factories, under orders to dispose of them, and to return with the produce intended for Europe.

The petty *Rajah* of *Soonda* frequently levied contributions from the *Carwar* factory; the Portuguese also incessantly intrigued against the English, and at last it was determined to dissolve the establishment. This was in 1679. After the death of *Sevaje*, however, the Presidency of *Surat* appears to have regretted the orders from home to abandon *Carwar*. Mr. John Child, who was appointed to the Presidency of *Surat* in 1682, was to re-establish the factory there, and he enlarged its establishment in order to keep open the means of obtaining pepper, cardamoms, benjamin, cloth, and cassia lignum.

In 1690 three ships took in pepper at *Carwar*, without proceeding to *Surat*, and thus were the first to open a direct trade between *Carwar* and England.

During the last ten years of the seventeenth century, the Dutch made every effort to depress the English pepper trade at *Carwar*, but the factory continued its operations, and it appears in the list of factories belonging to the two East India Companies at their union in 1707-8.

But in 1720 it was attacked by the *Rajah* of *Soonda*, the muslin manufactory was destroyed, and the English were obliged to abandon the place. *Carwar* appears to have been originally fixed upon as a site for a factory from the excellence of the anchorage in the bay, for it is not in a very central position as regards the pepper and cardamom districts.

The Company always regretted that they had been compelled to abandon the *Carwar* factory, and in December 1750, Robert Holford was sent to open a trade in pepper there. He persevered for two years against the vigorous opposition of the Portuguese, and the insolence of the natives. He was not permitted to rebuild the old factory, because it was built of stone and might be converted into a fort, nor to put his own bungalow in a posture of defence. At last the Portuguese appeared before the port with a fleet, and took possession of the native fort; and the Bombay Government recalled their agent in September 1752.

"Thus ended the last attempt to form an English factory at *Carwar*, or as it has since been called *Sedashevagur*."—*Bombay Quarterly Review*, VI., p. 210.*

These particulars respecting the old factory show that not only the point of land, but the bay, and the English establishment were all known by the name of *Carwar* from 1663 to the abandonment of the place in 1752. The name is short and easy to pronounce, and, if for these reasons, the adoption of a new name is in contemplation, it would appear that the claim of *Carwar* is much stronger than that of *Beitcul*.

Further Memoranda respecting Carwar.

The earliest mention of the modern harbour of Sedashighur is probably to be found in Ludovico Varthema's Narrative, A. D. 1502. This quaint old Italian traveller visited a place called *Battacala*, which may be the modern *Beitcul*.

Alexander Hamilton (A. D. 1688-1723) was there for some time, and always called the town, factory, and river, *Carwar*, although he also mentions *Batucola* and *Batcoal*. Hamilton's *Batucola*, however, seems to have been to the south of *Honore* (the modern *Batcull*) and this also may have been

the site of Varthema's Battacala. Hamilton's *Batcoal*, which he describes as two leagues from Anjediva Island, is no doubt the modern *Beitcul*. He only mentions it once, in describing the position of the island,—“the Portuguese have an island called Anjediva, about two miles from *Batcoal*, which they fortified, &c.”

Of Carwar, however, he gives a very full account. He says that it has the advantage of a very good harbour on the south side of a bay, and a river capable of receiving ships of 300 tons. The factory was fortified with two bastions and some small cannon.

The Chief of Carwar Factory was held in great esteem in the country, and he kept a score of good English dogs for the chase, each allowed 2 lbs. of boiled rice daily. Indeed, the fame of Carwar as a place for good sport spread far and wide, and induced two English sportsmen, one of whom was a son of Lord Goring, to undertake a voyage to the East Indies. They spent three years at Carwar, A.D. 1678-81, and sailing for England in the latter year, Mr. Goring died four days after the ship left Carwar and was buried on an island four leagues from the shore, off Batacola.

The English had a great cotton trade at Carwar, and employed 50,000 people in the manufactory, but when the Mogul soldiers invaded the country, they cut the Company's cloth from the looms. Hamilton was at Carwar in 1718, when, owing to the unpopularity of Mr. Taylor, the Factor, the Rajah of Soonda besieged the factory, and two years afterwards it was altogether abandoned.

Hamilton says there are two islands off the mouth of Carwar river, called Shipe and Gur (Coormaghur? and Deoghur?), and that there is a sharp rock in the middle of the channel between Carwar Head and the Oyster Rocks, in 15 feet of water.

MY LORD,—Several applications have been received from the younger Officers of the new Line Regiments for permission to reconsider their election for those Corps and to resume their positions in the local Army.

As the principal object cannot be fully attained unless the true causes of death be recorded, persons of all stations are requested, in each case of death occurring in their circle, to obtain, in writing, from the Medical Attendant, the name of the fatal disease, that it may be delivered to the Policeman at the funeral place. Medical Practitioners, particularly, are requested to aid the registration. Blank forms of Death Reports, to keep by them in readiness, are given gratuitously on application at the Office of the Deputy Commissioner of Police.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind, that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all single cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.

Revenue Survey and Assessment, Goozerat.

It being generally believed that the Superintendent of Revenue Survey and Assessment is empowered by Law to put up Survey Boundary Marks, at certain fixed charges, ir-
respective of the cost of labour in different Districts, the Superintendent of Revenue Survey and Assessment Goozerat hereby gives notice to the owners, occupiers, and cultivators of land, in the Talookas (of the principal division of the Surat Collectorate, and Sub-Collectorate of Broach,) noted in the margin, which will be under Survey this season, that they themselves are allowed by law to put up Boundary Marks (by their own hired labourers) so long as such marks are of the size and material approved by the Survey Officers, and the owners, occupiers, and cultivators of land are hereby required to do so as soon as their fields are measured.

2. If within two days of the measurement of any field, the owner, occupier, or cultivator does not erect the Boundary Marks required by law, he will be served with the Notice required by Act III. of 1846, and if within the days of grace allowed by the said Notice, the owner, occupier, or cultivator fails to erect Boundary Marks of the size and number required, such marks will be erected by the Survey Officers, and the cost (whatever it may be) recovered under the provisions of Act III. of 1846.

3. Neither the Superintendent, nor Assistants Superintendent of Revenue Survey, have any power to regulate the price of labour, and if owners and occupiers of land (who can always employ their own farm labourers to erect Boundary Marks) decline to do so, under the impression that the Survey Officers are obliged by law to erect Boundary Marks at a cheap rate, they will find they are mistaken, and must take the consequences.

4. In those Districts in which stones are procurable, and where stone Boundary Marks are allowed, the Survey Officers will be prepared through their Contractors—to furnish stones of the regulation size, at a small fixed charge per stone.





2nd.—There must be no enclosure except Newspapers or other Printed Papers.

3rd.—There must be no other writing or marks upon the Newspapers or Printed Papers than the name and address of the person to whom they are sent, nor anything upon the cover but such name and address, the printed title of the papers, and the printed name and address of the Publisher or the Vendor who sends them.

4th.—No packet must exceed 2 feet in length, width, or depth, or three pounds in weight.
