SIR,—In my Despatch, dated 8th August 1863, No. 291, paragraph 7, I informed you that I had suggested to the Secretary of State for War, that the Surgeons of the new Brigades of Artillery and new Line Regiments should be supplied from the Indian service as heretofore, until the arrangements for the future organization of the Indian Medical Service shall have been determined upon.

2. I learn from a recent communication from the War Office that the new Line Regiments, with only three exceptions, together with four Brigades of Horse Artillery and nine of Foot serving in India, are reported to be without permanent Surgeons, and that His Royal Highness the Field Marshal Commanding-in-Chief apprehending that serious inconvenience might ensue, has recommended that Surgeons should be at once appointed from the British Establishment to those Brigades and Regiments which are at present unprovided.

3. I have informed Earl de Grey in reply that I considered the time to have arrived when arrangements should be made for appointing Surgeons to the new Brigades of Artillery and new Line Regiments as vacancies occur in them, from the British Medical Establishment, and I have requested that all present vacancies might be filled up from that establishment without delay.

4. I request that the necessary instructions may be given with a view to carrying into effect this arrangement.

No. 126 of 1865.—The following Description of the Military Limits of Aden is published:—

Beginning at the Eastern end of the line of works at the Isthmus, the boundary runs along the Eastern shore taking in Front Bay, Seera Island and Causeway, Haket Bay, and round by Marshag into Fishermen's Bay; thence to a point on the Hill at the head of the Haket Valley, and down the spur to the S.E. corner of the Commissariat Ballock Shed. It then turns N.W. running parallel with the Town and along the road to the Main Pass to within about 70 yards of the road to the Native Infantry Officers' Lines. It then turns S.W. to the S.W. corner of the Gaol, and thence along the South Wall of the Gaol to the S.W. corner of the Commissariat Stores, round which it runs to a point at the N.W. angle of the Bazaar. It then turns N.W. to the S.W. corner of the new Native Infantry Lines, then in a S.W. direction to old Pillar No. 4, whence it turns again N.W. to the W. end of the Regimental Bazaar and along the road in rear of the Engineer Stores, and skirting the Eastern and Northern boundary of the Residency Compound, it runs to the head of the Koo-suf Valley, thence along the Northern Spur to the Main Pass. It then follows the road to the Western end of the Line of Works at the Isthmus.

The Military Limits beyond the Line of Works extend as far as the British boundary at the Khore Muksa. El-Ayna or Flint Island, the Ordnance Bay, Landing Pier, and the small Valley to the South, are within Military Limits.

The Pier to the North of the new Town of Towye and the ground to the South of the road up to the Hill are within Military Limits.

The Commissariat Store is within Military Limits.

Ras Morbat and Ras Tarshyne, are in Military Limits, defined as follows :—beginning at the Government Water Condenser at Steamer Point the Military Boundary runs long the N. E. boundary of the P. and O. Medical Practitioners particularly are requested to aid the registration. Blank forms of Death Reports, to keep by them in readiness, are given gratuitously on application at the Office of the Deputy Commissioner of Police.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind, that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all *single* cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY.—We, the undersigned, with a view to assist in supplying some of the most urgent wants of our city, by providing additional room for its increasing commerce, and additional house accommodation, in a healthy situation and at moderate charges, for its increasing population, in accordance with the repeatedly expressed wishes of Your Excellency in Council, have the honour to make the following application under Act XXII. of 1863, with the provisions of which we undertake to comply.

1. We have the honour to solicit from your Excellency in Council a concession of the foreshore and portion of the Mahim Bay, situate and lying between Worlee Point and the Bridge of Lady Jamsetjee's Causeway, being the whole of the south-western, southern, and south-eastern portion of the Bay, and all the proprietary and other rights of Government over the same. The foreshore and portion of the Bay thus applied for are laid down in the accompanying plan.

2. We have the honour further to solicit a concession of the Government land on Worlee Point on which the Worlee Fort stands, and the Government land at Mahim on which the Mahim Fort stands, be the same more or less, and all the proprietary and other rights of Government over the same. The portions of Government land thus applied for are laid down in the accompanying plan.

3. In the event of the solicited concession being granted to us by Your Excellency in Council, we propose and hereby undertake, by means of a Joint Stock Company formed for the purpose with ample and adequate resources, to reclaim from the sea the whole of that portion of the Bay described in paragraph 1, raising it to two feet above high-water mark, and securing it by a firm sea-wall, and to utilize the land thus reclaimed from the sea, and the Government land therewith conceded in the construction of a new port and of a new suburban town.

4. We have the honour, finally, to solicit for obvious reasons that Your Excellency in Council will concede to the Company the rights of Government over Mahim Bay, and the prior right of reclaiming and utilizing other portions of the Bay upon terms to be agreed on between Government and the Company previous to such reclamations.

"With the view of preventing a repetition of forgery, the Secretary of State has directed that in future the Four-anna Postage Stamp be printed in Green, instead of as heretofore in Black."

"Postage stamps for India will also be in future printed on a water-marked paper, which will be so arranged that each stamp will contain a separate design in its centre as in the case of the English postage stamps. The margins and blank spaces will bear no water mark, and a forged stamp printed on these portions, or on paper of any similar description, will be liable to immediate detection."
