INCOME TAX.

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31st JULY 1865.

Notice is hereby given, that every person within the Town and Island of Bombay, who, by the Act XXXII. of 1860, for imposing Duties on Profits arising from Property, Professions, Trades, and Offices, is liable to the said Duties, and to return his or her Profits or Income is hereby required to fill in a Return of his or her Profits and Income in the prescribed Form, and to transmit such Return, duly signed with the Declaration prescribed by the Act, to the Assessors of the Town and Island of Bombay aforesaid, at their respective Offices in the Town Barracks, within 15 days from the date of the delivery of the special Notice, under the penalties contained in the said Act.

Persons requiring Forms of Returns can procure them at the Office of the Assessors. Forms of such Returns will also be left at the usual place of Residence or Business of every person known or considered to be liable to the Duties imposed by the said Act. But any person liable to the Duties who may not receive such Forms must apply for the same at the Office of any of the Assessors.

To His Excellency the Right Honorable the Governor General of India in Council.

SIR,—With your letter, dated 5th November last, No. 376, you submit a question which has been raised regarding the rate of pension to which Medical Officers, who may be compelled to retire from sickness or accident after a service of six years, are to be held to be entitled with reference to the General Order No. 507 of 20th June 1864, which notified that Medical Officers entitled to half pay pension, under present Regulations, are eligible for the same according to their relative Army rank, as fixed by Royal Warrant.

2. By the Royal Warrant of 13th January 1860, an Assistant Surgeon, after six years' service as such, is to have relative rank as Captain. The same Warrant declares that "such relative rank shall carry with it all precedence and advantages attaching to the rank with which it corresponds."

3. My Despatch dated 16th May last, No. 152, stated that Officers compelled to leave the service on account of ill health, and entitled to half pay pensions under present Regulations, would, in future, be allowed the half pay of their relative rank.

4. Under these circumstances, I am of opinion that in respect to retirement on half pay, the Assistant Surgeon, after a service of six years, should be treated as an Officer having the Regimental rank of Captain has hitherto been treated; that is, without being required to show any qualifying period of service; he should be permitted to retire on the half pay of Captain, on showing sufficient proof of disqualification for further service.

5. Medical Officers under six years' service having the rank of Lieutenant, will continue, in respect to retirement on account of ill health, subject to the Regulations applicable to Subaltern Officers.

No. 173 of 1865.—Under instructions by the Government of India, the Regiment of Southern Mahratta Horse will be disbanded from the 30th April next.

The Regiment was raised by Major John Ramsay in 1850 from the Cavalry in the service of the Sattara and Kolapoor States, and of the Jagheerdars of the Southern Mahratta Country. Some of the men had previously done good service to the British Government at the capture of Badamee, and in the campaign in the Southern Mahratta Country of 1844, including the capture of the Hill Fortress of Punalla.

The Regiment has always proved itself a body of faithful and gallant Soldiers, they volunteered for service in Persia in 1856, and one Troop landed and did duty at Bushire. Themselves inhabitants of the Southern Mahratta Country, and surrounded by disaffection, the zeal and alacrity of officers and men in 1857-58, under the Command of Colonel George Malcolm, C.B., largely assisted in maintaining the British authority in the Sattara and Southern Mahratta Districts. The rapid march of the Detachment under Lieutenant Kerr, to Kolapoor in September 1857; their gallant conduct at the Pagah against the Mutineers; the subsequent conduct of the Detachment at Kolapoor under Russoldar Bahadar Sheikh Rahimon; their behaviour at Bejjapoor, and at Hulgulie, at which place they drove the enemy into the village, and then on foot joined a detachment of Native Infantry in storming it; their share in the forced march to Sholapoor, and the capture of that Fort, and again in the occupation of Nurgood for which the Regiment, and especially, Russoldar Major Sew Pursad Sing received the high approbation of Government, and Duffadar Sheikh Ahmed received the Order of Merit for scaling the wall and opening the gate; their service in Central India against Tantia Topce, and their gallantry in action at Chota Oodeypoor, are some of the most notable services of the Regiment at that critical time.

His Excellency the Governor in Council particularly acknowledges the valuable services of Russoldar Major Sew Pursad Sing, and of Russoldar Sirdar Khan, and of the other Native Commissioned Officers.

The arrangements for disbandment are as follows:—

Sillidars of good character and undoubted efficiency will be allowed to volunteer to the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd Cavalry to the extent of the vacancies in those corps.

The Volunteers on joining their new Regiments will receive a complete set of Arms, Accoutrements, and Clothing at the cost of the State.

Men of fourteen years' service, and of less than twenty years' will receive half-pay Pension; men of twenty years' service, and of less than thirty years' two-thirds pay Pension; and men of thirty years' and upwards full pay Pension according to their relative rank in all cases.

Men who have claims on Government for former service in Native States will be allowed to count two years of such service as equal to one year's service for Pension.

Men under fourteen years' service will be discharged with gratuities as follows:—

Under five years' service six months pay (for Sowars at Rs. 9-6-0 a month).

Five years' service and under ten years Rs. 100.

Ten years' service and upwards Rs. 150.

The European Officers will receive their present Staff Allowances as a minimum rate of Staff Pay for six months from 1st May next.

The Major General Commanding the Forces will be pleased to issue any needful subsidiary orders.

No. 174 of 1865.—The Government of India has sanctioned, subject to confirmation by Her Majesty's Government, a separately organized Escort for the Governor of Bombay, to be formed by selection from the Southern Mahratta Horse on the disbandment of that Regiment.

The Corps will be styled the "Governor's Body Guard," and the number of men and rates of pay will be as follows:—

Each Native Commissioned, Non-Commissioned Officer, and Soldier will receive Rs. 10 monthly in addition whilst serving in the Body Guard.

The usual contingent allowance will be given for repair of arms.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind, that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all single cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.

6th.—Road communication already exists between the causeway and Bombay.

7th.—Several other roadways afford immediate communication to many important positions on the new reclamations.

8th.—The Promoters undertake to protect Lady Jamsetjee's Causeway as it exists at present, and to erect only such buildings as shall prove an ornament to the causeway.

New Four-Anna Stamp.—The following Extracts of a letter No. 78, dated the 15th October 1864, from the Secretary of State for India to the Governor General of India in Council, are forwarded for the information and guidance of Postal Officers:—

"With the view of preventing a repetition of forgery, the Secretary of State has directed that in future the Four-anna Postage Stamp be printed in Green, instead of as heretofore in Black."

"Postage stamps for India will also be in future printed on a water-marked paper, which will be so arranged that each stamp will contain a separate design in its centre as in the case of the English postage stamps. The margins and blank spaces will bear no water mark, and a forged stamp printed on these portions, or on paper of any similar description, will be liable to immediate detection."

Persian Gulf Mails.—The British India Steam Navigation Company's Mail Packet Boats will in future leave Bombay on fixed days, viz., the 1st and 15th of each alternate month, for Busora, commencing with the 15th February, and will make the voyage direct *viâ* Muscat instead of *viâ* Kurrachee, at which latter port they will not touch on either the up or down voyage.
