SIR,—His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to direct that Matriculated Students of the Bombay University shall be exempt from liability to pass the examination required of Candidates for employment in the Revenue Department.

2. Any Matriculated Student may be admitted to employment in the Revenue Department without further examinations. If so employed he will be examined after a period of one year in the Departmental subjects which form part of the tests at the examination for Candidates.

GENERAL DEPARTMENT.

The following Rules are published for general information:—

RULES on the various points enumerated in Section LXIII. of Act XIII. of 1864, relating to the Emigration of Native Labourers.

1. Proportion of women taken to be not less than 25 per cent. of the number of adult emigrants embarked. Children to be taken at any age if accompanying their parents or relatives and approved of by the Medical Inspector.
2. The description, quantity, and quality of provisions, the daily allowance of food, water, &c., to be issued to each emigrant during the voyage, and the nature and amount of clothing to be supplied to each emigrant, will be found in Appendices AA, BB, respectively.—*Vide* Schedule No. 1.
3. During their residence at the Dépôt the emigrants to be under the medical care of the Emigration Medical Inspector, appointed under Section XVII. of Act XIII.; during the voyage to be under the medical care of the Surgeon of the Vessel, appointed under paragraph 2, Section XLVIII., of the same Act, to be approved of by the Medical Inspector.
4. The nature, quality, and quantity, of medical drugs and other stores to be carried on board emigrant vessels in accordance with the scale and list, attached hereto, marked CC.—*Vide* Statement No. 3.
5. Every emigrant vessel to be fitted with four bell-mouthed metal ventilators—two forward and two aft—not less than 18 inches in diameter—the mouths of them to be movable and clear above the rail; and two air-shafts, not less than 3 feet square—one aft, the other forward.
6. Three dirt-tubs, one and a half feet high and two and a half feet in diameter, to be secured on the emigrant deck—one aft, one amid-ships, and one forward. These will be emptied at the end of each watch, or oftener if necessary. Two Topasses, or Scavengers, shall be engaged by the Master of the vessel expressly for attendance on the emigrants.

7. Boats to be provided as follows:—Vessels 300 to under 500 tons 4 Boats; Vessels 500 and under 900 tons 5 Boats. All Boats to be in good serviceable condition, completely equipped with sails, oars, &c. One Boat to be a Long-boat, and one a Life-boat; the latter to be hung from the Quarter Davits, ready for lowering at a moment's notice. The Yard and Stay Tackles to be kept ready in the Long-boat, so that no delay may occur in hoisting the Boat out when necessary to do so. With the exception of the tackles abovementioned and the Boat's gear, nothing to be kept in the Boat.

8. A temporary platform will be built over the Long-boat for the sole use of the emigrants.

9. The vessel will also be furnished with a suitable Fire Engine, or Force Pump, which shall be kept in good order, in case of fire, and worked from time to time to ensure its being so.

10. The Surgeon or Medical Officer in charge will keep a diary or journal, in accordance with the form and instructions provided him by the Medical Inspector of Emigrants under the direction and approval of the Principal Medical Inspector General, containing full explanations, as called for by Clause 6 of Section LXIII.

11. Every Emigrant Ship shall have a duly qualified Master, and 3 Mates to be approved of by the Protector of Emigrants, and an efficient Crew.

12. The Master will be particular with regard to the ventilation and cleanliness of the vessel, and attend to any suggestions that may be made by the Medical Officer in charge with this view.

13. Cleaning parties, in the proportion of 5 to every 100 adult emigrants embarked, to be selected by the Medical Officer, if possible, from men amongst the emigrants accustomed to sea-service. Such men to be remunerated on the termination of the voyage with 5 Rupees if the duty has been performed to the satisfaction of the Medical Officer. Two cooks to every 100 cooking adults embarked also to be selected, if possible, from men amongst the emigrants accustomed to sea-service. Such cooks to receive a remuneration of 10 Rupees each at the end of the voyage provided the duty has been performed to the satisfaction of the Medical Officer.

14. Before the emigrants are permitted to embark the vessels shall be inspected by the Protector, who will see—

15. That the space to be occupied by the emigrants is perfectly clear, with the exception of the fittings.

16. That the sides and upper part have been whitewashed.

17. Light spars to be lashed to the midship stanchions, fore and aft, three feet from the deck.

18. Double ladders, facing contrary ways, fitted to each hatchway.

19. A Sick Bay to be set apart on the lower deck (or under the poop of the vessel), to be divided for the different sexes. The space thus set apart not to be included in the space allotted for berthing the emigrants.

20. In the event of any epidemic or contagious disease breaking out, the parties affected to be immediately separated from the rest of the emigrants, and placed in the long-boat, or other sheltered place on deck, approved of by the Medical Officer.

21. A booby or slide hatch to be fitted for each hatchway, and to be so fitted that they will not be likely to fetch away in the event of meeting with bad weather.

22. A windsail to be fitted for each hatchway.

23. The space allotted to emigrants is to be entirely given up to them. The crew not to be allowed access thereto, except on duty.

24. Two good lamps or lanterns will be kept burning on the emigrant deck, one forward and one aft, well secured and locked up, from sunset to sunrise.

25. Naked lights to be strictly prohibited in any part of the vessel. Lucifer matches not to be allowed on board.

26. Smoking below strictly prohibited.

27. The Master will cause the lower or emigrant deck to be visited from time to time by an Officer of the vessel, who will see that there is no infringement of the rules, and for the prevention of irregularities.

28. Two scuttle-butts for water for the sole use of the emigrants to be placed securely on the upper-deck.

29. The upper deck to be kept free from all lumber—in fact, of everything but the ship's fittings, the scuttle butts, and cooking-places.

30. Four life-buoys to be kept in readiness, one on each bow and one on each quarter.

31. Proper cooking-places for the use of the emigrants solely to be firmly secured on the upper deck.

32. Necessaries to be fitted on board on each side of the upper deck (not in the head) in the proportion of one to every seventy-five adults to be embarked, to have a shoot to carry off the soil clear of the ship's side, and to be supplied with a can and bucket for drawing water. One of these to be appropriated exclusively to the women and children.

33. The Master of the vessel shall appoint one of his Officers to attend at the daily issue of provisions and water to the emigrants.

34. Any suggestions with regard to alterations of diet, or the issue of "extras," made by the Medical Officer in charge, to be duly attended to by the Master, who will enter the same in the official Log, the Medical Officer attaching his signature thereto in token of its having been done at his recommendation.

35. The water for the use of emigrants shall be carried in iron tanks, or casks of well seasoned hard wood, the casks to be chunamed inside, and no cask capable of containing more than 300 gallons of water.

36. Should the Medical Officer in charge of the emigrants be unable to converse with them in their vernacular language, an Interpreter shall be provided by the Agent of the ship, or Master, to be approved of by the Protector of Emigrants.

37. The final examination proving satisfactory, the Protector will authorize the embarkation of the emigrants provided the Medical Inspector is satisfied that there is nothing in the state of their health, or in that of the general population of Bombay, to render it unadvisable.

38. All regulations having been complied with, the Protector will deliver the License to the Agent or Master of the vessel, and then the vessel may proceed on her voyage.

When the Medical Officer of the ship shall think it advisable that non-cooking Emigrants be supplied with cooking provisions, or any change made in the diet of the Emigrants, the same to be complied with by the Master and entered in the official Log, the Medical Officer attaching his signature thereto.

Emigrants of ten years and upwards shall receive daily issues of provisions according to the above scale, subject to such changes of dietary as may be ordered by the Medical Officer of the ship.

The provisions for the morning meal shall be issued sufficiently early to allow it to be ready by 9 A. M., those for the afternoon meal to allow it to be ready by 4 P. M.

All provisions are to be issued by an Officer specially appointed to that duty by the Master of the ship. The issues shall be recorded day by day, in a form supplied for this purpose by the Emigration Agent, to be signed daily by the issuer and the Medical Officer of the ship.

Whenever cooking shall be prevented by bad weather, or by any other cause, or shall be deemed unadvisable by the Medical Officer, 8 ounces of Powa or Biscuits (at the discretion of the Medical Officer) and 1 ounce of Sugar shall be issued to each adult for each meal in lieu of the cooked provisions.

Children above two and under ten years of age are to receive one-half of the above-mentioned rations.

Every child under two years of age who has no mother, or whose mother is unable to nurse it, shall receive every day 1 pint of Milk, and from 3 to 6 ounces of Sago or Arrowroot at the discretion of the Medical Officer.

Each nursing mother shall receive, besides her ordinary diet, a daily allowance of a pint of Milk, and 3 to 6 ounces of Sago or Arrowroot at the discretion of the Medical Officer.

Fresh Bread, at the rate of 8 ounces per adult, shall be issued for breakfast during the first two days of the voyage to such Emigrants as may choose to take it rather than rice.

- 6 Iron Cooking Pots, medium-size, for making curry, &c.
- 6 Iron Boilers with Covers, large size, for boiling rice, &c.
- 3 Hatchets for cutting wood.

- 30 Brooms.
- 5 Buckets for every 100 Tons.
- 3 Portable Life Buoys.
- 1 or 2 small Iron Boilers for making changes.

Note.—In addition to the quantities of provisions mentioned in the Lists, five days' full allowance for each Emigrant embarked of non-cooking provisions is to be put on board of the Ship for use should bad weather prevent cooking.

Notification.—It being declared by Section 249 of Act No. XXXII. of 1860, “for imposing duties on profits arising from Property, Professions, Trades, and Offices,” that the Act shall continue in force until the 1st day of August 1865 and no longer, the attention of all Offices of Pay and Audit is hereby directed to Section 100 of the said Act, with reference to which official salaries and emoluments which are subject to audit or are payable on or after the 1st of August 1865 will be exempt from Income Tax. Thus the salaries for July, which are payable only on the 1st of August, will not be liable to the tax.

2. The same principle applies to the Funds. None of the interest which may accrue on and after the 1st of August will be liable to Income Tax, notwithstanding that some portion of it may be for a period prior to the 1st August.

Blank forms of Death Reports, to keep by them in readiness, are given gratuitously on application at the Office of the Deputy Commissioner of Police.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind, that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all single cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.
