ISSUED BY THE INCOME TAX COMMISSIONERS FOR THE TOWN AND ISLAND OF BOMBAY UNDER ACT XXXII. OF 1860, SECTION XXXVII.

INCOME TAX.

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31ST JULY 1865.

Notice is hereby given, that every person within the Town and Island of Bombay, who, by the Act XXXII. of 1860, for imposing Duties on Profits arising from Property, Professions, Trades, and Offices, is liable to the said Duties, and to return his or her Profits or Income is hereby required to fill in a Return of his or her Profits and Income in the prescribed Form, and to transmit such Return, duly signed with the Declaration prescribed by the Act, to the Assessors of the Town and Island of Bombay aforesaid, at their respective Offices in the Town Barracks, within 15 days from the date of the delivery of the special Notice, under the penalties contained in the said Act.

Persons requiring Forms of Returns can procure them at the Office of the Assessors. Forms of such Returns will also be left at the usual place of Residence or Business of every person known or considered to be liable to the Duties imposed by the said Act. But any person liable to the Duties who may not receive such Forms must apply for the same at the Office of any of the Assessors.

To His Excellency the Right Honorable the Governor General of India in Council.

SIR,—I have to acquaint you that it has recently been resolved that Officers of the Indian Civil and Military Services, in this country, on leave of absence, and requiring extensions of leave, instead of being examined by the examining Physician, as heretofore, shall appear before a Medical Board, of which Sir R. Martin, C.B., is President.

2. In accordance with this arrangement, I have to request that the last Clause of the Appendix to the revised Code of Civil Absentee Rules forwarded with my Financial Despatch, dated the 7th instant, No. 262, may be altered as follows:—

'If the applicant for an extension of leave on medical certificate be residing within 20 miles of London, he must produce a certificate from the Medical Board attached to the India Office, showing the necessity for such extension. If residing beyond that distance from London, certificates in the second of the above forms must be produced from two Medical Practitioners.'

To His Excellency the Right Honorable the Governor General of India in Council.

SIR,—The Secretary of State for War has recently determined on a revision of the computations of qualifying service upon which Officers of Her Majesty's Service have obtained promotion to the rank of Colonel under the Royal Warrant of 1853.

2. An Abstract of the Rulings of the Secretary of State for War, in interpretation of the Warrant, which have governed the revisions in the cases of British Officers is herewith transmitted, in order that a similar course may be adopted in reference to Officers of Her Majesty's Indian Forces under the Warrant applicable to them.

Qualifying Service required of a Lieutenant Colonel previous to his obtaining the rank of Colonel in the Army under the provisions of the Royal Warrant of 14th October 1858.

HORSE GUARDS: 8th September 1864.

Lieutenant Colonels after serving five years in the following appointments will be promoted to the rank of Colonel:—

17. Captain or Major with rank of Brevet Lieutenant Colonel in Command of a mixed force amounting to 400 men for a period exceeding one calendar month at a time, unless the Officer in temporary command shall be in receipt of the pay of the command owing to the death or removal of the Commandant, when the period (short of one calendar month) for which he receives the pay will be admitted as service of a qualifying nature under Clause 11.
18. Regimental Major who is a Brevet Lieutenant Colonel in command of a Wing of a Regiment serving abroad which may be so divided as to constitute two distinct commands.
19. Deputy Inspector of Fortifications.

Officers appointed to Staff situations at home (not commissioned) will reckon service from date of taking up the Staff duties, and Officers selected for similar appointments abroad will reckon service from date of embarkation to the station until date of disembarkation when returning home. Officers acting in staff appointments which qualify for the rank of Colonel are not permitted to reckon such service unless confirmed in the appointment.

Blank forms of Death Reports, to keep by them in readiness, are given gratuitously on application at the Office of the Deputy Commissioner of Police.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind, that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all single cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.

The first and second deliveries from the General Post Office will be made an hour earlier, the first at 8 A.M. and the second at 12, the former consist, when the Trains arrive in time, of the Inland Mails from the South Eastern and Baroda Railway Lines.

The Mails from the North East Railway and South Konkun will be issued with the second delivery.

A third or evening delivery will be made at 4 P.M.

The Mails that arrive in the evening by the South East and the Baroda Railway Trains will not be susceptible of delivery the same evening until the Trains' hours are altered, but may be had on application at the Post Office until 7 P.M.

On Sundays there will as usual be one delivery at 12 noon.

The letter-boxes at the Receiving Houses will be closed at 4 P.M. on ordinary days, and at 3 P.M. on Sundays.

No chargeable parcels can be received at the Post Office for any Post Town of the Lines of Railway.

New Four-Anna Stamp.—The following Extracts of a letter No. 78, dated the 15th October 1864, from the Secretary of State for India to the Governor General of India in Council, are forwarded for the information and guidance of Postal Officers:—

“With the view of preventing a repetition of forgery, the Secretary of State has directed that in future the Four-anna Postage Stamp be printed in Green, instead of as heretofore in Black.”

“Postage stamps for India will also be in future printed on a water-marked paper, which will be so arranged that each stamp will contain a separate design in its centre as in the case of the English postage stamps. The margins and blank spaces will bear no water mark, and a forged stamp printed on these portions, or on paper of any similar description, will be liable to immediate detection.”

Persian Gulf Mails.—The British India Steam Navigation Company's Mail Packet Boats will in future leave Bombay on fixed days, viz., the 1st and 15th of each month, for Busora, commencing with the 15th February, and will make the voyage direct *via* Muscat instead of *via* Kurrachee, at which latter port they will not touch on either the up or down voyage.

2. The Mail bags for Muscat, Bunder Abbas, Guader, Linga, Bushire, and Bussora, will be closed in future at 12 (noon) on the 1st and 15th of each month.

The quantity of any material sent, ostensibly as a Pattern, must not be so great that it could fairly be considered as having on this ground an intrinsic value.

2. The Patterns must not bear any writing other than the address of the persons for whom they are intended, a manufacturer's or trade mark, numbers, and the prices of the articles; nor must they contain any letter closed or open, or any enclosure sealed or otherwise closed against inspection.

3. The Patterns must be sent in covers open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination; samples however, of Seeds, Drugs, and so forth, which cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen or other material; but closed bags, although transparent, must not be used for this purpose.

4. The rule which forbids the transmission through the Post of any explosive or dangerous substance will of course be applicable to Patterns, and no article likely to injure the contents of the Mail Bags is to be sent.

The quantity of any material sent, ostensibly as a Pattern, must not be so great that it could fairly be considered as having on this ground an intrinsic value.

2. The Patterns must not bear any writing other than the address of the persons for whom they are intended, a manufacturer's or trade mark, numbers, and the prices of the articles; nor must they contain any letter closed or open, or any enclosure sealed or otherwise closed against inspection.

3. The Patterns must be sent in covers open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination; samples however, of Seeds, Drugs, and so forth, which cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen or other material; but closed bags, although transparent, must not be used for this purpose.

8. If the Packets be *prepaid with a single rate of Postage* (as given in Column 1 of the above Table), the full rate chargeable being more, they will be forwarded charged with the deficient Postage, together with an additional single rate.

9. If the Packets be *prepaid with less than a single rate of postage*, they will be forwarded charged with double postage, less the amount actually paid.

10. If the Packets be *wholly unpaid*, they will be forwarded charged with double postage.

N.B.—In respect to Inland Transit the general conditions for Patterns are similar to those for Book Packets, and they will be treated like Book Packets.

If received unpaid or insufficiently paid from the United Kingdom, they will be charged at the rates mentioned in Paras. 8, 9, and 10 of the foregoing notice.
