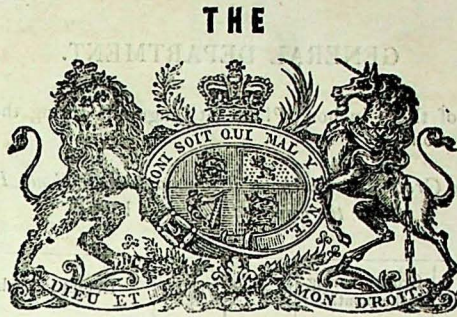

GENERAL ORDERS

BY HIS EXCELLENCY THE HONORABLE THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

MILITARY DEPARTMENT.

Bombay Castle, 29th March 1866.

No. 211 of 1866.—The services of Captain A. G. Mayne, 1st Regiment Light Cavalry, are placed at the disposal of the Government of India for appointment to the Central India Horse.

Bombay Castle, 3rd April 1866.

No. 212 of 1866.—The following Order is confirmed:—

Dated 8th March 1866, by the Brigadier General Commanding at Belgaum, directing that the daily ration of Potatoes to the men of the 26th Cameronians be increased from 8 to 12 ounces, and the issue of one ounce of limejuice and one ounce of sugar to such men of the corps as the Medical Officer may consider require it.

No. 213 of 1866.—With reference to G. G. O. No. 204, of 27th ultimo, Major J. A. M. Macdonald, Deputy Secretary will act as Secretary to Government during the absence of Colonel Marriott.

No. 214 of 1866.—Colonel T. T. Christie, 9th Regt. N. I., is appointed to the Brigade Staff, with the temporary rank of Brigadier General, during the absence of Brigadier General Younghusband, C.B., or until further orders.

No. 215 of 1866.—With reference to General Order No. 433, dated 23rd September 1864, the following General Order by the Government of India, dated 21st March 1866, No. 294, is republished:—

"No. 294 of 1866.

In continuation of Government General Order No. 734, dated 9th September 1864, His Excellency the Governor General in Council is pleased to direct that the standard aid tests for Degrees of Honor and Certificates of High Proficiency in Arabic, Sanskrit, and Persian, shall be re-published; that the books herein below mentioned (para. III) shall, until further orders, be the test books in the various languages in which examinations are held under Clause VIII. of the order above referred to; and that, with the view of removing certain doubts which are believed to exist regarding examinations in the Oriental languages, the following additional rules shall be laid down.

The following is the test for a Degree of Honor:—

I. Construing with readiness and accuracy from the undermentioned books:—

2. Translating into English with accuracy, about two octavo pages, one in prose and the other in poetry, selected from some difficult work, not being a test book.

3. Translating a difficult passage from English, with accuracy, elegance, and neatness of expression, and perfect correctness of Spelling and Grammar.

4. Conversing with idiomatic accuracy and fluency.

Examinations for a Degree of Honor will be of a searching nature, and the exercises, both oral and written, must be performed with such excellence as distinctly to establish a claim to eminent proficiency. The colloquial test in Sanskrit, and in Arabic, except in the Bombay Presidency, may be omitted.

II.—The following is the test for a Certificate of High Proficiency:—

2. Translating into English with accuracy a passage of moderate difficulty of about half an octavo page in length, not taken from the test books.

3. Translating accurately and idiomatically, and with accuracy of Grammar, into the language in which the examination is held, an English paper of moderate difficulty.

4. Translating in like manner a paper of English sentences.

IV. Examinations for Degrees of Honor and Certificates of High Proficiency, and examinations in Arabic, Sanskrit, and Persian, under Rule VIII., will take place only at the Presidency Towns. Examinations by the Higher and Lower Standards [see Rule X.] and in the other languages under Rule VIII. will, ordinarily, be held in the interior, as has hitherto been the practice in P. H. and Interpreters' examinations, except in cases where facilities for the purpose are not available. The examination in Bengali, Guzerathi, Mahrathi, Canarese, Tamil, Telugu, and Malayalum will be conducted in the same manner as examinations by the Higher Standard are directed to be. Examinations in Assamese, Punjabee, Pushtu Burmese, Ooriya, and Sindhi, will be conducted by Standing Committees appointed by the Governments of Madras and Bombay, and, with the sanction of the Government of India, by the local Governments and Administrations immediately subordinate to it. All proceedings of such Committees are to be submitted through the Boards of Examiners of the respective Presidencies, who, to insure uniformity, will furnish the Committees with the necessary instructions and forms of reports, and will record the results, reporting all successful examinations to the proper department for publication in Government or Army General Orders and local Gazettes as the case may require.

V. An Officer may present himself for examination in any language under Rule VIII. without passing in Hindustani, either by the Lower or Higher Standard.

VI. An Officer who has passed the Interpreter's examination in any language, may present himself for examination for a Certificate of High Proficiency in that language, without passing an examination by the Higher Standard, or under Rule VIII., but in no other.

For the purposes of this rule, Hindustani in the Bengal Presidency shall include Urdu and Hindée, but in the Madras and Bombay Presidencies only Urdu.

VII. Any Officer having passed only the colloquial examination, or any examination for which he has not received any Munshi allowance, will, on passing by the Lower Standard, be entitled to receive the prescribed allowance of Rupees 180, or, on passing by the Higher Standard, a further allowance of the same amount—both sums may, as heretofore, be passed at a single payment to an Officer passing the Higher Standard in the first instance.

VIII. Officers who have passed by the standards heretofore known as P. H., Staff, and Adjutant's examinations, or any examination of a lower grade than that of Interpreter, cannot present themselves for examination for a Certificate of High Proficiency in Hindustani, without having first passed by the Higher Standard; though in other respects all Officers having passed the P. H. examination in the Bengal Presidency, under the old rules, are considered in the same position as those who have passed by the Higher Standard under the new, with the exception that they cannot hold the Interpretership of a British Regiment on the full staff salary of the appointment.

IX. The orders of the 9th September 1864 supersede all previously existing rules regarding the examination of Military Officers in the Oriental languages.

X. In future the 1st and 2nd Standard will be known as the Lower and Higher Standard, and will be indicated in the Army List and elsewhere by the letters L. S. and H. S. respectively.

No. 223 of 1866.—The following General Order by the Government of India, dated 13th March 1866, No. 255, is republished :—

"No. 255 of 1866.

His Excellency the Governor General in Council has much satisfaction in publishing the following extracts from a despatch from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for India, No. 388, dated India Office, London, the 9th December 1864, sanctioning the establishment of good-service pensions in the Indian Army as rewards for distinguished or meritorious services :—

'PARA. 1. I have considered in Council your Military letter No. 286, dated 13th August 1864, in which you suggest the establishment of a system of good-service pensions for Officers of the Indian Army based upon that which has been adopted in Her Majesty's British Service.

2. The proposal of your Government is that fifty such pensions of £100 per annum be given to the Indian Army, under certain conditions.

* * * * *

7. Her Majesty's Government therefore sanction the introduction of a system of good-service pensions in the Indian Army, under the following regulations :—

I. Fifty good-service pensions of £100 per annum will be distributed among the Officers of the several Staff Corps and of Her Majesty's Indian Army at the three Presidencies.

II. Officers of all ranks will be considered eligible for the pensions on the recommendation of the Government of the Presidency to which they belong, supported by that of the Government of India; but, except under very special circumstances, the grant will be restricted to Officers above the rank of Lieutenant.

III. The good-service pension will be given up by an Officer on resignation of the Service or on coming into the receipt of the Colonel's allowance; but an Officer placed on half pay, or retiring upon full or half-pay pension, will retain the good-service pension in addition to such half-pay or pension.

IV. Ordinarily the good-service pension will be conferred upon Officers of the effective list; but Officers who may have been placed on half pay, or who may have retired from the service on full or half-pay pension, will also be considered eligible for them.

V. On the nomination of any Officer to a good-service pension being sanctioned by the Secretary of State for India in Council, a notification to that effect will be published in the *Gazette of India* specifying the military services of the Officer.

2. Officers of the Royal (late Indian) Artillery and Engineers are eligible for these pensions, as well as Officers of the new Line Regiments so far as service rendered before their transfer to the Line is concerned.

3. His Excellency in Council further notifies, with reference to instructions received in a Despatch from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State, No. 24, dated 25th January 1866, that Officers of the Indian Medical Service will in future be considered eligible for the good-service pension. Notification.—The following Notification containing "Sailing Directions for entering the Bassein River," is republished for general information:—

MARINE NOTIFICATION.

The Flag Staff formerly at Dalhousie (which place has been entirely given up as a Pilot Station) has been erected on the S. E. point of Haingyee or Negrais Island, and the following revised directions for entering the Bassein River are consequently published:—

Sailing Directions for entering the Bassein River.

I. Strangers should not attempt the passage to the westward of Negrais Island.

II. Vessels coming from the southward should bring Diamond Island to bear N. W., then steer for it until the Fair Way Buoy, which is situated $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles N. E. of the Island, is visible; when near the Fair Way Buoy bring the Flag Staff on the S. E. point of Haingyee, on or a little shut in with the north-east point of that Island, which will place a ship nearly in mid channel; she should then steer up the Channel keeping these marks on till Pagoda Point bears west (true), when she must haul more to the eastward, passing the Flag Staff Point about half a mile distant in about from 8 to 10 fathoms; when abreast of the Flag Staff a vessel should not haul more to the northward, or bring the Flag Staff point to bear to the southward of S. W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. (true), until she has made rather better than half the distance between the Flag Staff Point and the north Point of Haingyee; this is necessary to avoid a ridge of rocks visible at low water spring tide, that run out from the Island, and extend somewhat beyond a line drawn from point to point of the Island. She may then haul in gradually and anchor in under the high land with the north point of the Island, bearing about N. W. by N. in 5 or 6 fathoms mud, where, in the S. W. Monsoons, smoother water will be found than higher up off Dalhousie.

It is here remarked that the centre of Diamond Island kept on the line of bearing S. 29 W. or S. W. by S. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. nearly will carry a vessel up nearly as far as Dalhousie Point clear of all dangers. Commanders of vessels are also informed of the necessity of paying careful attention to the set of the tides between Diamond Island and Orestes Shoal; they run nearly east and west, and do not take the course of the river until they reach above the Black Buoy.

III. Vessels entering from the westward in latitude north of Diamond Island, should bring it to bear S. E. Steer in for it until the Fair Way Buoy is made, then proceed as above directed for vessels entering from the southward. This passage, however, should be attempted by Sailing Vessels only in the North-East Monsoon.

IV. Vessels unable from stress of weather to distinguish the different marks, should anchor under Diamond Island, where good anchorage and smooth water is to be found.

The best and safest anchorage during the S. W. Monsoon is with the north end of the Island bearing W. $\frac{1}{4}$ N., and distant one mile.

V. Pilots are usually to be had at or near Diamond Island. Should a Pilot be on shore there when a vessel is seen approaching, a Pilot Jack will be hoisted at the mast-head of the Flag Staff erected on the Island. But vessels not finding one and being provided with Lieutenant Ward's Chart, need have no hesitation in coming in as far as the north end of Haingyee. Should a Pilot be at Haingyee, the Pilot Jack will be hoisted at the Flag Staff erected on that Island.

VI. Buoys—

A First Class Red Buoy marks the extreme south end of the Orestes Shoal.

A First Class Red Buoy marks the eastern limit of the Orestes Shoal.

A First Class Black Buoy marks the extreme edge of the shoal extending from Porian Shore.

A First Class Red Buoy marked E. W. in white letters is placed $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles north-east of Diamond Island.

A small Red Buoy marks the extreme northern limit of the shoal extending off the north-east end of Haingyee.

VII. The shoal extending south of Haingyee is called the "Orestes" Shoal, and that extending from Porian Shore westward is called the Porian.

The sailing directions from Dalhousie or Negrais Island to Bassein remain unchanged.

ROUTE OF THE PROCESSION.

After which the Registrar will make DECLARATION of the Degrees conferred.

8.—The Registrar will read a Report by the Syndicate of the Proceedings of the University during the past year.

9.—The CHANCELLOR will deliver an Address.

10.—The CHANCELLOR will dissolve the Convocation.

11.—PROCESSION.—The assembly will arise and remain standing *in their places* while the procession retraces the path by which it entered, and withdraws from the Hall through the South-East door.

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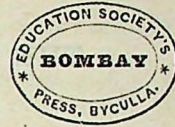

First Delivery at 7 A.M.—The through Mails from Madras, South Coast and S. E. Railway line, also from the Baroda line, and Local Mails from Poona and Nassick.

Second Delivery at 11 A.M.—Calcutta, N. W. Provinces and Eastern Mails.

Third Delivery at 2 P.M.—Local Letters, and any Sea or other Mails received after the Second Delivery.

The Mails that arrive after the issue of the 3rd or 2 P.M. delivery will not be issued the same evening, but Letters and Papers may be had on application at the Post Office until 7 P.M.

Postage to Denmark, Sweden, and Norway.—Under instructions from Her Majesty's Post Master General, London, it is notified that in future the following reduced rates of postage, British and Foreign combined, will be levied on letters posted in Bombay and sent *via* Southampton through the United Kingdom to Denmark, Sweden, and Norway:—

The prepayment of postage on letters is optional, but unpaid letters will be liable to an increased charge on delivery.

The postage on Newspapers and Book Packets transmittable as above remains unchanged.

Letters addressed to any of the above countries can be registered if desired, but upon such letters the postage and the registration fee of 8 annas each letter *must be paid in advance*.

Patterns or Samples of Merchandize can also in future be sent to Denmark only at the same rate of postage as Book Packets, and subject to the usual regulations of Pattern post.

Persian Gulf Mails.—The British India Steam Navigation Company's Mail Packet Boats will in future leave Bombay on the 3rd and 17th of each month, for Bussora, and will, in consequence of the disturbed state of Muscat, make the voyage *viâ* Kurrachee.

2. Mail bags for Kurrachee, Bunder Abbas, Linga, Bushire, and Bussora, also Bagdad and Turkish Arabia, will be closed in future at 12 (noon) on the above dates.

Ship Letters Postage.—As letters received or despatched by private ship or steamer are charged with extra *i. e.* ship postage of one anna each letter in addition to all other postages due, and which is levied on delivery of the letter, it is requested that letters intended for despatch by private vessels should be always so marked on the cover, otherwise in the absence of such direction they will be forwarded by land, where land communication exists.

Goa and the Malabar Coast Mails will, until further notice, be made for despatch to the Stations named below by the Coast and River Navigation Company's Steamer.

The Letter Boxes will be closed at 12 noon, up to which time Letters can be posted.

Letters intended for despatch by the above opportunity should always have the superscription "Per Steamer," and are liable to an extra Ship Postage of one anna per cover on delivery.

Mauritius and Cape of Good Hope Mails.—Regular monthly communication has been established between Port Louis (Mauritius) and Table Bay (Cape of Good Hope), calling at Natal. A Branch Packet will leave Port Louis immediately after the arrival of the Packets from Suez and Aden, that is, about the 25th of the month, and will return to Port Louis in time for the Packet appointed to leave for Aden and Suez on the 6th of each month.

Letters for Natal and the Cape of Good Hope, St. Helena, and Ascension, if marked *viâ* Aden and Mauritius, will be sent by the route above mentioned, by the P. & O. Company's Packets on the 29th of each month in the fair season.

The Postage on prepaid letters sent by this route will be 8 annas for $\frac{1}{2}$ ounce. Prepayment is optional.

Postage on Letters for Italy.—Letters for any place in the Kingdom of Italy can be prepaid in India at the option of the sender, and will be forwarded with the British Mails to Alexandria, and from thence to their destination by Brindisi or Ancona.

3. Unpaid letters from Italy are subject, on delivery in India, to the above rates, and to an additional charge of one penny (eight pies) for each half ounce.

4. Sea and Italian Postage on Newspapers, Books, Printed Papers, and Packets of Samples for Italy cannot be fully prepaid in India, but when posted at any Office except at the port of despatch are liable to Indian Newspaper and Book Post rates, which must be prepaid.

Delivery of Letters.—The delivery of letters being not only retarded, but rendered almost impossible in Bombay and large towns, owing to the imperfect form of address generally adopted, the Public at large are invited to assist the Post Office, when addressing Letters to any Municipal Town, by writing invariably the name of the Street and the number of the House, and informing their correspondents of the same, by heading their Letters inside accordingly.

2. Want of attention to these apparently trifling particulars, not only delays delivery by compelling the Letter Carriers to hunt over the whole length of a street for perhaps a single person, but it affords an excuse for non-delivery, and a temptation to the Letter Carriers to throw away or destroy the Letter, owing to the trouble imposed by the want of proper direction.

3. Besides this, it also places the Post Office Department entirely in the hands of Letter Carriers, upon whose experience of localities it becomes necessary to rely.

From the 1st proximo letters posted in India addressed to any French Post Office in Turkey * (except Constantinople), or to the French Post Offices at Tunis and Tangiers, may be sent at the option of the sender either unpaid or paid, and will be subject to the rates of postage to

which they would be liable if addressed to France, according to the following table:—

2. Postage, if prepaid, must be paid by means of stamps attached to the letter on the side on which the address is written.

3. Unpaid letters received in India will be charged at the rate of As. 8-8 per quarter-ounce.

4. Prepaid letters may be registered, double postage being prepaid in stamps. No separate registration fee will be levied.

Care should be taken to endorse "By French Post" on letters sent under this notice.

Books and Patterns to Belgium.—Under an additional Postal Convention concluded between Great Britain and Belgium, Books and Patterns can be sent through Great Britain to Belgium under the following Regulations:—

In future, under the term "Book Packets" may be forwarded not only stitched or bound books, pamphlets, and sheets of music, but also printed proof sheets, with ordinary corrections in writing and manuscript attached to such proofs and having reference to them as well as legal and other documents in manuscript; photographs and drawings [so long as those articles are not in glass or placed under glass]; prints or maps, printed, engraved, or lithographed, and whether in paper, parchment, or vellum; but no letter or communication of the nature of a letter, must be forwarded in such packets, or in or upon their covers.

Further, all legitimate binding, mounting, or covering of a book, publication, &c., or of a portion thereof, will be allowed, whether such binding, &c., be loose or attached; as also rollers in the case of prints & maps; markers (whether of paper or otherwise) in the case of books; and, in short, whatever is necessary for the safe transmission of literary or artistic matter, or usually appertains thereto.

Patterns or Samples of Merchandise may also, in future, be sent to Belgium at the same rates of postage as Book Packets, and subject to the following Regulations:—

1st.—The Patterns or Samples must not be of intrinsic value. This Rule excludes all articles of a saleable nature, and, indeed, whatever may have a value of its own, apart from its mere use as a Pattern or Sample; and the quantity of any material sent ostensibly as a Pattern or Sample must not be so great that it can fairly be considered as having on this ground an intrinsic value.

2nd.—There must be no writing or printing, in addition to the address of the person for whom the packet is intended, and the address of the sender other than a trade-mark and numbers and the prices of the articles; and these particulars must, in all cases, be given, not on loose pieces of paper, but on small labels attached to the Samples, or the bags containing them.

3rd.—The Patterns or Samples must be sent in covers open at the ends, so as to be easy of Examination. Samples, however, of seeds, drugs, and so forth, which cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen or other material tied at the neck; or the bags may be entirely closed, provided that they be transparent, so that the Officers of the Post Office may be able to satisfy themselves as to the nature of the contents.

4th.—No article likely to injure the contents of the mail bags, or the person of any officer of the Post Office, may be sent through the Post as a Pattern.

If either of the foregoing Rules be infringed, the packet must not be forwarded.
