Under the provisions of Section X. of the Consolidated Customs Act VI. of 1863, His Excellency the Governor in Council is pleased to declare the Karwar Pier and the Landing Wharf to be the only authorized public place for the landing and shipment of goods at that port.

The following Regulations touching the practice to be observed in Courts of Vice-Admiralty abroad, in proceedings instituted on behalf of Her Majesty's Ships, which have been established by Her Majesty's order in Council, bearing date the 9th of September 1865, are published for general information:—

At the Court at Windsor, the 9th day of September 1865;
PRESENT,

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 25th of August 1865, in the words following, viz. :—

I. Whenever any proceeding has been instituted in any Vice-Admiralty Court within Her Majesty's Dominions, by or on behalf of any of Her Majesty's Ships, for or in respect of any of the matters enumerated in the 12th Section of the Naval Agency and Distribution Act, 1864, the Proctor who shall have conducted such proceeding on behalf of Her Majesty's Ship shall, on the termination of the suit, submit his Bill of Costs for taxation, and the Court shall thereupon tax the same as between Proctor and Client.

III. If there are not any proceeds, or if the proceeds are insufficient to pay the costs, the Commanding Officer shall either by himself or through the Agent of the Ship make provision for the payment of any sum that may be due in respect of any such proceeding as may have been instituted in the Court.

IV. The Registrar of the Vice-Admiralty Court shall, as soon as he has taxed the Bill of Costs, and whether the amount thereof has or has not been paid out of the proceeds, forward the same to the Registrar of the High Court of Admiralty of England, together with a Certificate, signed by himself, stating the amount of the proceeds, if any, the payments thereout, and the balance which has been paid to the Commissariat Officer.

V. The Agent for the Ship shall, when the proceeds and bounties have been paid to the Naval Prize Account, leave with the Registrar of the High Court of Admiralty of England his account for taxation, and may include therein any charges that may have been paid by the Commanding Officer or by himself, and the Registrar may direct the amount at which he shall have taxed the said account to be paid out of the proceeds and bounties standing in the Naval Prize Account to the credit of the Prize.

VI. The Registrar of each Vice-Admiralty Court shall, within a month after the termination of each quarter, send to the Registrar of the High Court of Admiralty of England a Return, signed by himself, in the Form marked No. 1 hereto, of all Prizes in respect of which any proceedings have been taken in such Vice-Admiralty Court during that quarter.

VII. These Regulations shall, if approved by Her Majesty in Council, come into operation on the 1st day of January 1866.

To THE SECRETARY TO THE GOVERNMENT OF BOMBAY.

Dated Fort William, the 12th January 1866.

Sir,—With reference to Rule X. of the Notification, dated the 5th October 1864, relating to the admission of Officers to the Staff Corps, I am directed to state that, so far as the requirements of the Civil Department are concerned, it will be held sufficient to qualify an Officer in the Police for admission to the Staff Corps if he shall have passed the examination specially prescribed by the several local Governments and Administrations for the Police Department. Where more than one standard is laid down, the qualifying examination will be that of the lowest Standard.

2. It will, of course, be understood that this order in no way affects the concluding part of Rule X. above referred to, which declares that Police Officers, if transferred to Civil employment, will be required to pass the examination prescribed for Officers in Civil employment.

No. 63 of 1866.—His Excellency in Council has much pleasure in publishing the following despatch by Major Keatinge, commanding the Force operating against the Wagheers in Okhamundel, together with the Adjutant General's letter conveying His Excellency the Commander in Chief's commendation of the behaviour of the Troops:—

"No. 53 of 1865.

From Major R. H. KEATINGE, V. C., Political Agent,

Commanding Field Detachments in Kattywar,

To the ADJUTANT GENERAL OF THE ARMY, Bombay.

Operations of Troops
in the Field.

Dated 26th December 1865.

SIR,—I have the honour to inform you that on the 5th instant in the Koorinar Purguuna, south of the Gheer, I received information that the main outlaw band, numbering 200, had left Okhamundel for the Burda hills.

2. The regular postal lines all end north of the Gheer, and as there is nearly 30 miles of uninhabited jungle to be traversed before reaching its southern edge the difficulty of keeping up communications is very great. I therefore posted Lieutenant Walter with 60 bayonets 16th Regiment N. I., 20 sabres of Guicowar's Irregular Horse, and 90 Joonaghur Seebundy, with Lieutenant Walter Scott, Assistant Political Agent, on its southern border, and myself pushed up to Dulkhanea, on the north.

3. On the 10th instant I was joined there by Major Miles, commanding a Detachment of 70 bayonets 16th Regiment N. I. and a party of 25 sabres of Guicowar Contingent Horse.

4. The Wagheers were then committing petty depredations in the country beyond the south-west corner of the Gheer, the only direction unprotected.

The circumference of the Gheer is about 200 miles; to guard it with the means at my disposal was impossible; I therefore determined to brave the climate, and act from the centre of this nest of outlaws.

5. On the 13th, having collected a large supply of provisions, I encamped at Chedowree, in the middle of the Gheer.

6. On the 14th we patrolled in the direction where the Wagheers were supposed to be, marching upwards of 30 miles. Before daylight on the morning of the 16th we were under arms for another patrol, when news came in that Hurmurria had been attacked by a band of sixty men, and that Lieutenant Walter had started for it with his detachment.

7. My information led me to think the Bannage hill a well-known robber haunt, the most likely place for them to fall back upon, and we proceeded to patrol that neighbourhood.

8. At 3 p.m., as we were resting under trees, a sharp musketry fire opened about a mile distant from us, beyond a spur of some thickly wooded mountains.

9. We moved off instantly, a small party of 23rd Regiment N. L. I., under Color Havildar Deepajee Chowan who were on duty with me, forming the advance guard.

10. The detachment 16th Regiment N. I., under Major Miles, forming the main body, and a party of Seebundy escorting our few baggage mules on the reverse flank. As we crowned the hill, we came in view of the Wagheer band, retreating in good order towards the Bannage, engaged with Lieutenant Walter's detachment, who were following them up as rapidly as they could over ground which was very rocky and covered with long grass.

11. When the detachment under my command opened fire on the right rear of the enemy they fled in panic to the neighbouring mountain, and except a stand made by a few of them halfway up the ascent no more resistance was made.

12. Private Rugoo Seersut of 16th Regiment was dangerously wounded in this affair.

13. In their flight the outlaws lost all their horses, plunder, and beddings, and a considerable number of arms.

14. The grass was so high that I cannot state their loss; three at all events remained dead on the hill side, of whom two were Wagheers of note.

Our men pressed them closely up the ascent, but in descending they broke up so thoroughly that we were unable to follow them.

15. No news of them was procurable on the 17th; on the 18th, two patrols were out, and each party received information of the outlaws having taken food by force from the small hamlet of Kurrapan.

16. Captain Turnbull, who was in charge of one patrol, pushed on with his men to that village, but was unable to follow the track further.

17. Major Miles commanded the party with me, which consisted of 38 bayonets of 16th Regiment N. I. and a small detachment of Guicowar Contingent Horse under Jemadar Gunputrao.

18. By great good fortune we struck the tracks of the outlaws where they had during the night killed and eaten two of the goats taken from Kurrapan. Great confidence in the trackers alone permitted me to follow where they then led. The outlaws, all on foot, had taken the most impracticable line of country the Gheer afforded, and had tried all the traditional means of concealing their track.

19. The skilful puggies who led us (nearly all themselves pardoned outlaws) were not to be deceived by any ruse, and at 2 P. M., on the top of the Jindoolio hill, in grass breast high, with thin jungle, we came suddenly on the band asleep; they roused so very suddenly that the trackers in panic rushed back on the advance guard, which again fell back a few paces on me.

20. They did not, however, attempt to pass me; and on recovering themselves went with spirit to the front, Major Miles in the meantime bringing up the main body at the double.

21. The outlaws fled in utter panic, many leaving even their arms; bare headed and barefooted they fled down the steep sides of the hill. Systematic pursuit was impossible: two dead were found; the long grass may have concealed more.

Getting on the tracks of the largest party, whose movements we could see from the height, we followed them south-west, and at 5 P. M., in tree jungle so thick that a horse could barely be led through it, we again came on them.

22. This time their flight was so rapid that only the advance guard was able to fire, and the panic was so great that the outlaws left several of their naked swords on the ground.

23. The tracks were then followed to where they again settled into one path, and evening coming on the pursuit was abandoned for the night. We awaited daylight of the 19th on the tracks, and after following them westward as long as was possible returned to camp two hours after dark.

24. As far as I can ascertain, 20 guns, principally old percussion lock muskets, and the same number of swords, have been picked up during the two days' pursuit by the people with me.

25. I have throughout these very harassing days received most cordial assistance from the European and Native Officers who accompanied me.

Captain Turnbull, my Staff Officer, took charge of patrols, as the presence of a European Officer with each was desirable.

Civil Assistant Surgeon E. Butler, in addition to his professional duties, helped me by communicating intelligence, and taking command of the standing camp when not required in the field.

Lieutenant Walter Scott with the Joonaghur Seebundy was well up in the first day's affair.

Major Miles, Lieutenant Walter, and Lieutenant Simpson, of the 16th Regiment N. I., as well as the whole of their detachment, worked to my entire satisfaction.

26. The fighting we have seen has been very unsatisfactory, from the weakness of our enemy, but the marching has been most severe. We have during successive days been from twelve to fifteen hours moving under arms. The cheerfulness with which all ranks have gone through this trial, and the eagerness with which they have always pushed forward, enable me with confidence to commend them to the notice of His Excellency the Commander in Chief.

27. On the 21st instant, we reached Sasun Ness by a forced march, and there heard that the remainder of the band, with five wounded men, after undergoing great hardship from hunger and exposure, had emerged from the Gheer to the north-west, and that two of their number were secured on entering a village to buy food.

28. We continued the pursuit on the 22nd and 23rd up to the Ghirnar hills, but failing to get any further information I returned to Wissawaddur on the north-west border of the Gheer, and on the night of the 25th I heard of the band having broken across the plain for the Burdah Hills.

"I.—MATRICULATION EXAMINATION.

JUGONNATH SUNKERSETT SANSKRIT SCHOLARSHIPS.

1. Two Scholarships, one of Rs. 25 and one of Rs. 20 per mensem, will be awarded every year immediately after the announcement of the results of the Matriculation Examination, to the two candidates who shall have passed the Matriculation Examination, and answered best in a special Examination in Sanskrit, to be called the Jugonnath Sunkersett Sanskrit Scholarship Examination. These Scholarships will be tenable for three years at any of the Colleges or Institutions in Arts recognized by the University of Bombay.

2. These Scholarships shall be awarded according to the results (1) of the Matriculation Examination in Sanskrit, and (2) of a Supplementary Examination, to be held on the Fourth Monday in November.

3. The Supplementary Examination shall consist of the following two papers:—

The First Paper will consist of translation from passages in the following episodes of the Mahabharata:—

- a. Matsyopākhyāna.
- b. Sāvītryupākhyāna.
- c. Draupadīpramātha.
- d. Shakuntalākhyāna.

The Second Paper will contain a passage or passages in Sanskrit (not taken from the preceding books) to be translated into English, and a passage or passages in English to be translated into Sanskrit.

4. The Matriculation Examiners in Sanskrit each year shall be *ex-officio* Examiners for these Scholarships.

5. Candidates must forward their application to the Registrar (*vide Form*) along with their application for permission to attend the Matriculation Examination of the same year.

6. The names of the successful candidates, arranged in the order of merit, will be published along with the list of the candidates who may have passed the Matriculation Examination.

NOTIFICATION. — BOMBAY WATER WORKS.—NOTICE by the MUNICIPAL COMMISSIONER under Section 264 of Act II. of 1865.

The following Bye-laws for regulating the Supply of Water in Bombay have been sanctioned by Government, under date the 26th January 1866.

BYE LAWS.

PUBLIC SERVICE.

1. No dirty pot, chatty, or other vessel shall be used by any person or persons for drawing water from any of the Public Wells or Tanks.
2. No pot, chatty, or other vessel shall be rinsed out, washed, or cleansed in any of the said Wells or Tanks, and no water shall be thrown back into any such Wells or Tanks.
3. No horses, cattle, sheep, or other animals shall be washed in any of the said Wells or Tanks.
4. No person shall bathe in any Vehar water Well or Tank.
5. No carts, horses, or cattle, with the exception of "water bullocks," shall be taken or allowed to go upon the pavement surrounding any Well or Tank.

PRIVATE SERVICE.

6. The Superintendents of Wards, or any other officer appointed by the Municipal Commissioner, are to be at liberty, on giving twelve hours' notice, to enter, between sunrise and sunset, into any house or building to which water is laid on from the Main, for the purpose of inspecting the water pipes, cisterns, meters, and other things connected with the supply of water to such house or building.
7. No pipes must be attached to the works or to any pipe or apparatus connected therewith, nor must any alterations of pipes or extensions of the supplies of water be made without the consent of the Municipal Commissioner or officer authorised by him being first obtained; and all works thus sanctioned must be executed by "authorised Plumbers," as hereinafter described.
8. Meters, which will be supplied by the Municipal Commissioner at the cost of the house owners, must, except in cases of contract under Section 86 of Municipal Act, be fixed wherever water is used for ornamental or irrigational purposes.
9. The drawing cocks must be of brass, and of the kind called "Screw Down," and no cocks will be allowed except such as open and close slowly.
10. Inasmuch as it is essential to the protection of the interests of the consumers that the works to be done by Plumbers should be well executed, no Plumber will be allowed to perform any work connected with the supply of water, until he shall have been admitted and enrolled by authority of the Municipal Commissioner as an "authorised Plumber," and shall have entered into written agreement to conform to the Rules and Regulations of the Commissioner, and if at any time afterwards any such Plumber shall be found guilty of breaking or evading the said rules and regulations, or shall refuse to communicate any information required of him in regard to any work done by him or under his superintendence, his name will be struck off the list of "authorised Plumbers," and he will not afterwards be allowed to perform any work connected with the water supply.

11. Water, when delivered through meters will be charged for at the rate of 1 Rupee per thousand gallons, the measurement to be taken from the dial plate of the meter by the Ward Superintendent or other authorised officer.

12. The rate for water not supplied through meter will be—

5 per cent. on the 1st hundred,

2½ do. on the 2nd hundred,

1¼ do. on the 3rd and each successive hundreds of the assessed monthly rental of the house

13. No house will be supplied with water at a less charge than one Rupee per mensem; and whenever the rate under the foregoing rules would amount to less than that sum, the charge made will be one Rupee.

14. Persons occupying a portion of the house or building, who have obtained a supply of water expressly for themselves, will be charged only upon the assessed valuation of the part or portion of the house or building occupied by them provided that the connection be not accessible to other persons.

15. The occupation of a house for 15 days and upwards shall render the occupier liable to pay a whole month's water rate, and the occupation of a house for less than 15 days shall render the occupier liable to water rate of half a month.

16. No remission of rate will under any circumstances be allowed, except in cases where the supply of water is cut off for more than 3 days consecutively through defects in the Main, and such remissions will only be granted to persons applying for the same within one week from the date of such stoppage, the amount of the remission being deducted from the bill for the following quarter.

17. Occupiers becoming subject to water rate should, before changing residence, give notice in writing to the Superintendent of Ward as to the place and number of the house they have removed to, and in the event of their removal without such notice, they will be liable to water rate on their former habitation until such notice is received, in addition to a penalty for breach of Bye-Laws.

Power of Commissioner to cut off Water Supply.

18. Without prejudice, and in addition to the rights and remedies of the Commissioner in respect to any breach of the Bye-Laws, it shall be lawful for the Commissioner or officers authorised by him at any time to cut off the connection between the private pipes and the public main, in any of the following events:—

1st.—In default of payment of water rate within five days after same shall have been demanded.

2nd.—If any house-owner or occupier, whose house is supplied with water otherwise than through meters, shall permit any person or persons not living in the house to take water from their pipes, or shall give any water to them from their pipes.

3rd.—If the owner or occupier of any house shall wilfully or negligently damage his meter or private service pipe.

4th.—In case of the leakage of pipes or other defects in the private service arrangements.

5th.—If water shall be allowed to run to waste after the owner or occupier of the house has been twice warned not to allow it to do so.

19. The Municipal Commissioner is hereby, and by Section 260 of Act II. of 1865, empowered to impose such reasonable penalties as he may think fit, not exceeding Rs. 20 per each breach of these Bye-laws, and in case of a continued breach, penalties not exceeding Rs. 10 for each day such breach is continued after notice from the Commissioner to abstain from such breach.
