ISSUED BY THE INCOME TAX COMMISSIONERS FOR THE TOWN AND ISLAND OF BOMBAY UNDER ACT XXXII. OF 1860, SECTION XXXVII.

INCOME TAX.

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31st JULY 1864.

Notice is hereby given that every person within the Town and Island of Bombay who, by the Act XXXII. of 1860, for imposing Duties on Profits arising from Property, Professions, Trades, and Offices, is liable to the said Duties, and to return his or her Profits or Income, is hereby required to fill in a Return of his or her Profits and Income in the prescribed Form, and to transmit such Return duly signed with the Declaration prescribed by the Act, to the Assessors of the Town and Island of Bombay aforesaid, at their respective Offices, within fifteen days from the date of the delivery of the Special Notice, under the penalties contained in the said Act.

Persons requiring Forms of Returns can procure them at the Office of the Assessors. Forms of such Returns will also be left at the usual place of Residence or Business of every person known or considered to be liable to the duties imposed by the said Act. But any person liable to the Duties who may not receive such Forms must apply for the same at the Office of any of the Assessors.

The following Notification by the Government of India in the Financial Department is republished for general information :—

" No. 5634.

Fort William, the 16th November 1863.

NOTIFICATION.—The following extract (paragraphs 8 and 9) from a Financial Despatch from the Right Hon'ble the Secretary of State for India, No. 174 of 1863, dated the 30th September, is published for general information :—

PARA. 8.—I take this opportunity of calling your attention to the practice of recommending Uncovenanted Servants for special Pensions. The Code of Rules which was published on the 4th of January 1831 prescribed "that the rates of Pensions shall be fixed on a graduated scale within the prescribed limitations, with reference to the responsibility and arduousness of the employment, the degree of merit of the individual, and the nature and length of his service;" and in my Financial Despatch of the 8th of December 1862, No. 205, I observed (paragraph 9) that "Pensions of the full amount stated are to be granted only as the reward of approved service." It appears, however, to be the custom for Heads of Departments in India to recommend, in nearly every case, the full amount of Pension which the Rules permit; and whenever the service rendered has been at all above the average character, a special Pension is recommended in excess of that which the Rules authorize.

9. It cannot be too strongly insisted upon, and made known to the whole body of Uncovenanted Officers, that the full Pension authorized under the Rules is not to be given as a matter of course, but only where the service performed has been really such as to merit the approval of Government, and this should be invariably kept in view in considering recommendations for Pension.

The following General Order by His Excellency the Governor General of India is republished for general information :—

"No. 157A. of 1863.—His Excellency the Governor General is pleased to publish the following extracts of a Despatch from the Right Honourable the Secretary of State for India, No. 311, dated 31st August 1863, regarding the absentee and acting allowances of Military Officers in Civil employ, the provisions of which are applicable to all the Presidencies :—

'Para. 31.—With your Despatch, No. 23, in the Financial Department, you forward a further Report from the Committee of Secretaries regarding the absentee and acting allowances of Military Officers in Civil employ, with a note thereon by your Financial Secretary.

32.—You concur generally in the recommendations of the Secretaries, with the amendments noted by the Financial Secretary, and propose the adoption of the following principles :—

1st.—That every Military Officer in Civil employ when on leave should draw pay under the Military Rules; and

2nd.—That every Military Officer when acting in any Civil appointment should draw his Civil pay under the Civil Rules.

33.—Upon these two principles you propose the following Rules for the Officer on leave :—

A Military Officer in Civil employ on leave, either in India or in England, shall draw precisely the pay which he would be entitled to draw under the Military Leave Rules, except when on privilege leave as hereafter specially provided.

Such pay shall be provided from the Civil Department excepting only in cases where the allowances so drawn would exceed the entire Civil pay of the appointment, when the excess will be paid by the Military Department. The Staff salary of any Officer shall be held to be the difference between the Indian pay and allowances of his rank and the full salary of his permanent appointment.

34.—For the Acting Officer your Government proposed the following Rules :—

A Military Officer acting for another in Civil employ shall draw deputation allowance under the rule by which the allowance is grafted to Covenanted Civil Servants.

If the Officer be in Military Staff employ such deputation allowance will be given in addition to his Military pay and allowances, plus half the Staff pay of his substantive appointment.

If the Officer hold no substantive Staff appointment, Civil or Military, it will be given in addition to his Military pay and allowances.

A Military Officer in Civil employ performing the duties of his substantive appointment, and at the same time officiating in another, is entitled to his substantive salary and in addition to a deputation allowance of 20 and 10 per cent. on the Staff salary of the appointment in which he is officiating, provided the pay of the substantive appointment with the addition of the deputation allowance does not exceed the pay of the higher appointment.

A subordinate acting for his principal or for any other Officer at the same Station is not entitled to deputation allowance for the first month while so acting, unless he is required to act on two occasions within a brief period (say twelve months), in which case he draws deputation allowance for the whole period during which he may have held the appointment in excess of one month as if he had acted continuously.

A Military Officer proceeding from one Civil appointment to another shall be allowed to draw, during the authorized period of transit, out of the salary of the office he is about to join, a sum equal to that of his previous situation. This Rule to be preceded by an Order making the Civil Rules for joining time applicable to Military Officers in Civil employ.

A Military Officer in Civil employ can take three months' cumulative privilege leave (under the Civil Rules only), but he must earn it by thirty-three months' continuous service in the Civil Department alone.

35.—These several Rules are approved of.'

No. 588 of 1863.—Captain F. R. Jardine, Treasure Chest Officer at Dapoolce, is permitted to proceed to Bombay, with leave of absence from 1st December 1863 to 15th January 1864, for the purpose of appearing before the Civil and Military Examination Committee.

No. 589 of 1863.—Captain T. H. Turner, of the Royal Artillery, Examiner Ordnance Department, having returned to duty, resumed charge of his office on the 10th instant.

No. 590 of 1863.—The following General Order by the Government of India, dated 17th November 1863, No. 695, is republished :—

“No. 695 of 1863.—The following Rules under which Soldiers of Brigades and Batteries of the Royal Artillery, and of Regiments of Cavalry and Infantry returning to England, will be permitted to transfer their services to Corps serving in India, are to have effect in the three Presidencies in supersession of all previous orders on the subject, which are hereby cancelled :—

2. Men of Brigades or Batteries of the Royal Artillery ordered to return to England will, with their own consent, be transferred to other Brigades and Batteries of the Regiment in India, but will not be allowed any bounty. They will be transferred in the rank they held in their former Brigades or Batteries.

3. On a Regiment of Cavalry or Infantry being ordered to return to England, the Non-Commissioned Officers and Men in excess of one-half of its established strength will be allowed to volunteer to other Regiments in India of the same arm, which have not more than eight years' foreign service.

4. The volunteering into any one Regiment is to be limited to the number which will increase the strength of such Regiment to 8 per cent. in excess of the prescribed establishment.

5. Non-Commissioned Officers of Cavalry and Infantry cease to hold their rank on the day they are struck off the strength of their Corps and they join their new Regiments as Privates.

6. Unlimited service men above the age of forty, who may be found fit to perform one year's service, will be allowed to volunteer without bounty.

7. No man will be allowed to volunteer who is about forty years of age unless declared by a Medical Board to be physically fit and capable of performing a Soldier's duty in the East Indies.

8. Worn-out men, confirmed drunkards, men suspected of malingering, and men of recorded vicious character, are debarred from volunteering, and the Officer superintending the volunteering is to reject all men who, from the Regimental and Company's Defaulter Books, appear to be decidedly bad characters, and who are unlikely to prove themselves good and effective Soldiers.

9. Unlimited service men will be allowed a bounty of thirty (30) Rupees.

10. Men of limited service, who have full six years to serve, will be allowed a bounty of sixty (60) Rupees.

Those who have five years to serve a bounty of fifty (50) Rupees.

Those who have four years to serve a bounty of forty (40) Rupees.

Those who have three years to serve a bounty of thirty (30) Rupees.

Those who have two years to serve a bounty of twenty (20) Rupees.

Those who have one year to serve a bounty of ten (10) Rupees.

Men who have less than one year of their term of service unexpired may volunteer, but will not be allowed any bounty.

11. Soldiers who have received a bounty for volunteering will not be allowed their discharge unless, in addition to any purchase money, to be paid by them under the Regulations of the service, they refund the rate of bounty above laid down for each year of service unexpired.

12. Volunteers for Highland Regiments (who must be Natives of North Britain) will be allowed a gratuity of twelve Rupees and eight annas (12-8), in addition to the bounty to cover the cost of their necessary Highland equipments.

This gratuity is not allowed to men who volunteer from one Highland Regiment to another.

13. The bounty money is to be paid to Volunteers on their joining their new Regiments.

14. Men on the Unattached List, borne on the Rolls of Regiments returning to England, who may be desirous of continuing in their Staff situations, must volunteer into other Corps of the same arm remaining in India, but will receive no bounty.

They will retain their rank on the Unattached List, and be borne as Supernumeraries in the Returns of their new Regiments in the rank which they held in their former Corps when transferred to the Unattached List. When remanded to their new Regiments, provided it is not owing to misconduct, they will join them in the rank in which they are borne on the Regimental Returns, and will remain supernumerary of that rank until absorbed.

It is thought that some withhold their assistance through the notion that reports of the single casualties coming now and then under their observation could but little affect the Returns; but it ought rather to be borne in mind, that the accuracy of the Returns depends on the correct reporting of all *single* cases, for of such only the aggregate is made up.

His Honor the Officer administering the Government, directs it to be notified for general information that, on and after the 1st March next, a fixed Dioptric Light of the First Order will be exhibited on *Isle aux Fouquets*, a small Islet on the edge on the reef $\frac{1}{2}$ a mile to the North of the Southern entrance of the Port of Mahébourg in the Island of Mauritius.

A detailed description of, and sailing directions for, making this Light, are published below for general information.

MAURITIUS.

Sailing directions in reference to the Light House on Isle aux Fouquets, Grand Port.

1. The Light House is built upon a small Island called *Ile aux Fouquets*, in Latitude $20^{\circ} 24' 20''$ South, and Longitude $57^{\circ} 45' 9''$ East. It marks the Southern entrance to Grand Port, and is 880 yards to the E. N. E. of Ile de Passe; there is a small Islet between them.

2. Ile de Passe, which bounds Grand Port entrance to the Northward, is easily known by the Battery and other Buildings thereon; there are times when Rollers entirely block the Pass, although the depth is from 14 to 22 fathoms; but, generally speaking, the Reefs on either hand are perfectly visible from the Foreyard.

3. The Island on which the Light House is built is 3 miles to the Eastward of the nearest Point of the Mainland, and on the very edge of the Coral Reef which skirts this part of the Coast of Mauritius: the Light House (as well as the adjacent Buildings) is *white*; its ground line is 39 feet above the mean Sea level, and it forms a most conspicuous object which cannot possibly be mistaken.

4. The Light House serves as a guide to Vessels passing Grand Port by day, or by night.

5. The Apparatus is a Dioptric of the First Order, showing a *fixed white light* from sunset to sunrise, visible in every direction from Seaward, but dark on the land side. The Light (focal plane) is $108\frac{1}{2}$ feet above the mean Sea level (the rise of tide being 3 feet), and in clear weather can be seen at a distance of 16 nautical miles from the Deck of a Vessel 12 feet above the water.

6. There is a Government Pilot in Mahébourg, who will, in a few months, be stationed at the Light House, and who will board Ships bound to Mahébourg, on their making the usual Signal.

7. Vessels bound to Mahébourg may approach the Light on any bearing from N. by E. to W. by S.; when about 2 miles from it, they should heave to with the head *off shore*, until the Pilot comes alongside.

8. Should it be desired to get into shelter as soon as possible, approach the Light under easy sail till within about $\frac{1}{2}$ of a mile, in order to avoid a shoal patch of 6 fathoms off Pointe Laverdie, which is the extreme point of the Coral Reef bounding the South side of the entrance of Grand Port; steer so as to round Ile de Passe at the distance of $\frac{1}{2}$ a mile, as a Spit runs out from its South side for about a Cable's length; then haul to the Northward, and anchor in 18 to 20 fathoms; it is, however, not recommended to attempt the foregoing without a Pilot, except in cases of extreme necessity.

9. A Vessel coming from the Southward and bound to Port Louis round the *North end of the Island of Mauritius*, the usual track, should, after sighting Grand Port Light, steer so as to pass it at a distance of about 4 miles; when, at that distance, the Light bears W. by S., a N. N. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. course for 9 miles will, if the weather be clear, bring a Vessel in sight of Flat Island Revolving Light bearing about N. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W.; the course can then be shaped as required.

10. A Vessel coming from the Northward having Flat Island Light on a bearing of N. N. W., must be careful after sighting Grand Port Light not to bring it, *when at less than eight miles distance*, on a more southerly bearing than S. W. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., or she will be too near the Coast Reef to the Northward of that Light.

11. The Coast Reef to the Eastward of, and bounding, Grand Port has a Bank of irregular soundings extending some distance to seaward; the lead, if carefully attended to, will prove a tolerable guide in very thick weather.

12. The bearings in the foregoing instructions are all Magnetic, and will carry a Ship at least 3 miles from the Coast Reef.

13. No Vessel bound into Grand Port ought to approach it *at night*; she should heave to well to the *Southward* of the Light, as the drift being to the Northward she might find herself to Leeward in the morning, and lose much time in working up.

Post Line between Goa and Karwar (late Sadashewghur).—A Post Line has been opened between Goa and Karwar (Sadashewghur), 58 miles apart. The former, which is at present the nearest Telegraph Station to the latter, is available in both directions for Telegrams, which can also be sent by "Express," if desirable, at Express rates of Postage—4 annas per mile.

Telegrams meant to be forwarded by the daily Post should not be later than 10 A.M. in reaching Goa.

Newspapers addressed to Regimental Schoolmasters exempt from Postage.—In continuation of Circular No. 98, dated 13th October 1862, Post Office Officials are informed, that Imported Newspapers, addressed to Schoolmasters of Regiments, should be regarded as exempt from Forward Postage.
