CONTRACT FOR THE SUPPLY OF PROVISIONS, &c.

Persons desirous of entering into a Contract for the supply of such Provisions, &c. as may be required by the Commissariat Department at the Presidency for the term of one year from the date of the acceptance of the tender, may, on application at this Office, from 11 A. TRANSPORT TRAIN BETWEEN WASSIND AND INDORE.

The Government Bullock Transport Train between Wassind and Indore having been thrown open to the Public, the following Rules and Regulations are published for general information :—

1st. There are Fifty-four Stages between Wassind and Indore, six miles apart : the Cattle will be relieved at every Stage.

2nd. There are three descriptions of Carriages :—

1st Class or Spring Carts for Passengers.

2nd „ Muster Carts „ do.

3rd „ Country Carts „ do. and Goods.

3rd. Of these, until further notice, twenty Carts will be available for Passengers and Goods daily.

4th. Tickets for passages &c. upwards from Wassind will be granted at the Head Quarter Office, Bombay, and downwards at Indore, Mhow, and intermediate Stations, by the Assistant Director or Inspectors on the Line.

5th. The Halting Stations between Wassind and Indore are as follows :—

PASSENGER TRAIN.

1st. The Train will start at 3 p. m. daily from each end of the Line, and also from each Halting Station, at the same hour, except on Sundays, when Passengers will not be received unless in cases of emergency. This is not applicable to Passengers wishing to travel through without halting; but whenever halts are made, the above hour for starting must be conformed to; if voluntary halts be made at any Station beyond 24 hours, demurrage will be charged at the rate of two Rupees per every hour in excess of that time.

2nd. Twenty pounds of Luggage will be allowed free of charge to Passengers travelling by spring cart, and ten pounds per muster cart. A spring cart will carry two adults, and a muster and country cart, four.

3rd. All Luggage in excess of the above weight must be paid for, and will be sent with the Travellers on country carts at the Train rates of hire; 500 pounds in weight are allowed to each cart in the fair weather, and 400 pounds in the monsoon.

4th. All fares for Passengers and excess Luggage must be prepaid.

5th. Tickets must be shown or given up by Passengers to the Subordinates of the Train, at the Halting Stations on demand. Any Passenger refusing to comply will have to pay the fare from the Terminus in rear to his destination, and will be prevented from proceeding further by the Train, unless the prescribed amount is at once paid or arranged for.

6th. Passengers are on no account whatever to ill-treat the Cattle, Drivers, or Subordinates of the Train. Should any person employed in the Department evince a want of proper civility, or cause unnecessary inconvenience, the same should be reported to the Director at Bombay, or to the Assistant Director at Mhow, detailing all particulars, with the names of the Drivers, Stations, Dates, &c.

7th. Passengers are earnestly requested to conform strictly to the above Rules, as infringements of them not only disturb the arrangements of the Department and interrupt the working of the Train, but may cause considerable inconvenience to themselves.

GOODS TRAIN.

1st. The Train will start from Wassind and intermediate Halting Stations downwards at 3 p. m. daily, and upwards to Bombay from Indore, Mhow, and other Halting Stations at 9 a. m.

2nd. Until arrangements are made for receiving Goods in Bombay, Consignees must forward them by Railway at their own cost to Wassind,—but Tickets for Goods must be obtained and paid for at the Head Quarter Office, Bombay. These Tickets should be enclosed or presented to the Inspector of the Transport Train at Wassind, who will, on receipt of the Goods from Bombay by Railway, forward them to their respective destinations.

3rd. Goods, including Opium, intended for despatch upward, will in like manner be forwarded from Indore, Mhow, and all the principal intermediate Stations.

4th. Goods Trains will necessarily travel at a slower rate than Passenger Trains, and be subject to greater detention at the Halting Stations, for examination and such repairs to carts as may be found necessary.

5th. One spare cart will be allowed to every ten engaged for Opium and other Goods, for the accommodation of the Escort in charge, and to prevent delay in cases of accident.
